Widening of County Highways Is Progressing Nicely

Fences Nearly All Set Back from Rising Star to Romney on Highway 23; Other Right-of-Way Is Secured

A. F. Taylor, special right-of-way man for securing lands for widening the highways of Eastland county, in accordance with the plans of the state highway commission, while in Cisco Wednesday stated that work was progressing nicely at this time.

"The survey has been completed and all fences set back on Highway 23 from Rising Star to within one mile of Romney," Mr. Taylor said. "There is a part of the right-of-way on this road between Romney and Cisco that has not yet been secured, but I understand the Cisco committee is now working on the matter. Just as soon as these lands have been secured the survey of the road from Romney to Cisco will be made."

"The right-of-way work on the Bankhead highway has not been as thorough as the work that has been done on 23 and 67. Every bit of the land has been secured from Rising Star to Romney, and only the work between Romney and Cisco has been slow. All the right-of-way between Gorman and Carbon has been secured, and the survey crews, working out of Gorman on 67, are now half way to Carbon. Fences are being moved back and the survey will be made to Carbon just as soon as the fences are removed from the right-of-way."

"Ranger has been alive to the importance of widening Bankhead highway from the day the work was started. They have secured every foot of land that is needed, even through Ranger, where city lots had to be obtained to widen the highway. In one instance a filling station had to be bought. All of the work is done, and it is now up to Eastland and Cisco to complete their part of the work. Just as

soon as this is done the surveying crews will start at the county line west of Dothan, and Engineer Early says the highway commission is ready to start road building the day all of the lands are secured for widening the highway."

B. INGRAM IS FOUND GUILTY; GIVEN 10 YEARS

The jury in the case of Buford Ingram, whose trial began Monday in the 88th district court, returned their verdict at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, finding the defendant guilty and assessing his punishment at ten years in the penitentiary. The case went to the jury Tuesday night. Ingram, who was indicted with his brother Tim Ingram, in connection with the robbery of the D. L. Allen store at Nimrod on the night of March 6, secured a mistrial when the case was tried a few weeks ago.

The Ingrams were indicted for robbery with firearms. Complaints are pending against them in the federal court at Fort Worth in connection with the same robbery, as it is alleged that a portion of the money taken from Allen was postal funds, Allen being the Nimrod postmaster.

No time was lost in placing Buford Ingram's brother, Tim, on

trial on the same charge. A jury was chosen Wednesday to try him. County Attorney Sparks and Assistant County Attorney Sterling Holloway are conducting the prosecution. J. Lee Cearley is the attorney for the Ingram brothers.

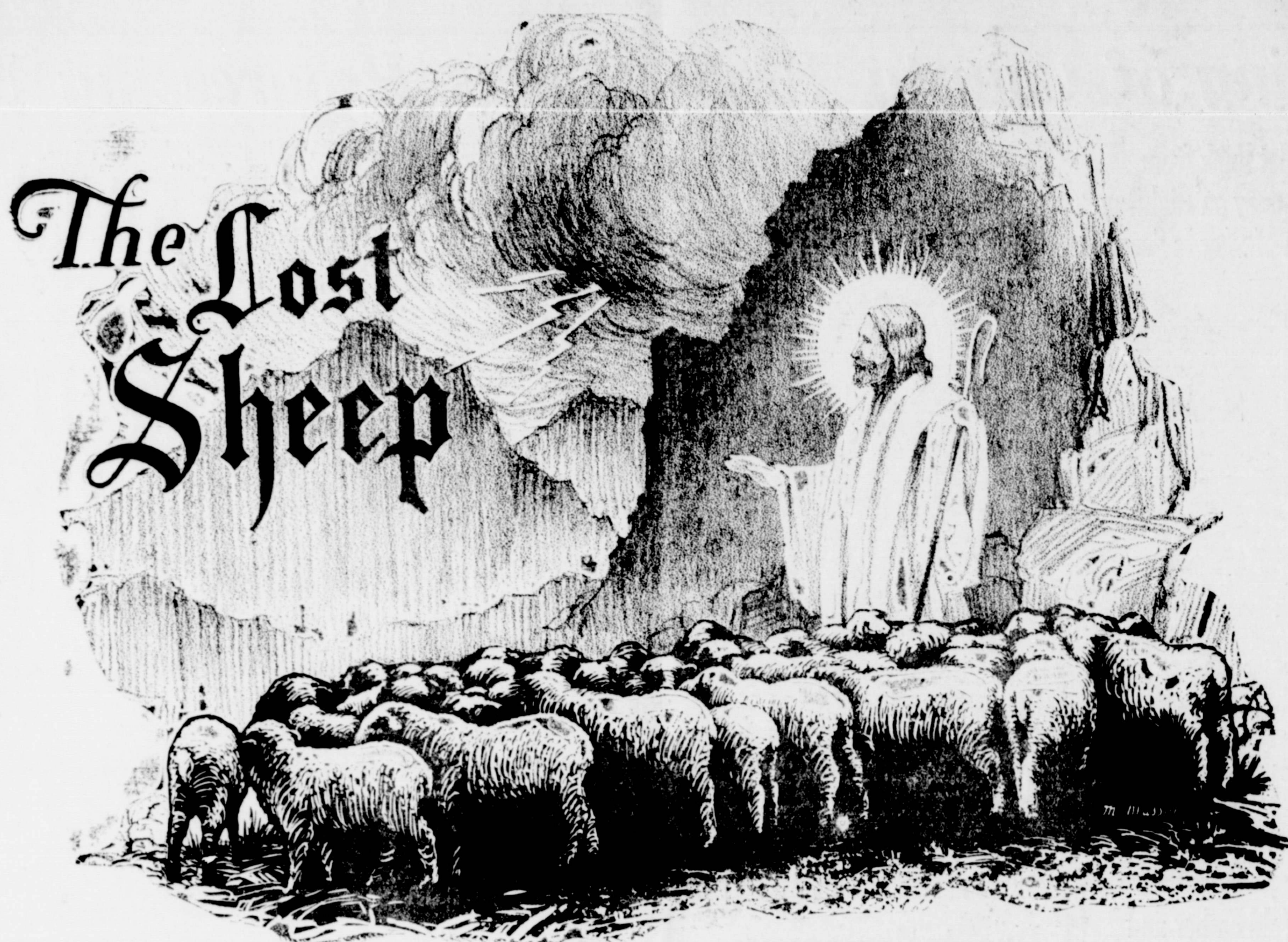

Crops in South Part of County Helped by Recent Rains

Cotton to Benefit But Hard Lands Need More Precipitation, Farmer Says; Favors Plan for Milk Plant

Wm. Eifert, living six miles south of Cisco, west of the Rising Star highway, stated that a nice rain fell in the south part of the county a week ago. "While the precipitation was not as much as needed, yet that which fell did a wonderful lot of good to all growing stuff," Mr. Eifert said. "Since the rain everything is growing along nicely, and this rain will be sufficient to bring up what cotton that will be planted in the sandy lands, but the hard lands are still pretty dry. Those living on the hard lands are needing rain pretty badly."

"But I do not expect to plant much cotton as I am raising feed crops, and expect to market most of my crops on root—feed to livestock. I have about 40 acres in feed crops, and depend more on the livestock I sell than on the crops grown on my farm. I have about 25 head of cattle and about 12 head of hogs. I try to have something in every shipment sent out by the Cisco Co-operative association. However, I will only be able to ship one hog when the shipment goes out next Tuesday."

Asked how much cotton he expected to plant this year Mr. Eifert said: "I will probably plant about 20 acres. I am gradually quitting cotton—cutting down my acreage each year. In 1926 I planted 60 acres, in 1927 I had 40 acres, this year I expect to cut it to 20. I am trying to drop 20 acres each year, and if my present plans work out will plant no cotton in 1929."

"No, I am not patronizing the cream route as my cattle are Herefords, and are not famous for their cream production," he said. "The cream route runs near my farm, and is doubtless a good thing. I may get interested in dairy cattle later on, but at present am specializing in beef stock."

"I understand that Cisco is talking of building a milk plant. Believe that will be a great thing for the farmers of the Cisco Country. It will furnish a market for all dairy products, and anything that supplies a market for farm products helps the farmer, makes better prices and helps the entire section. These of my neighbors who are patrons of the cream route are pleased, so far as I have been able to learn."

G.O.P. VOTE OF EASTLAND CO. GIVEN HOOVER

One of the most largely attended Republican county conventions ever held in Eastland county was that of Tuesday, when practically every precinct in the county was represented by the 40 delegates attending and participating in the deliberations. And it was noticed that among the delegates were several new faces never previously seen in a Republican convention in this county, said F. A. Blankenbecker, chairman of the 24th senatorial district, who headed the delegation from the West Cisco precinct.

The convention was called to order by Blankenbecker, at 4 o'clock in the city hall at Eastland. The temporary officers elected were A. L. Agate, of Eastland, chairman; O. B. Newberry, of Gorman, secretary; Wallace Wagner, of Ranger, sergeant-at-arms. A committee on credentials and delegates was named, consisting of A. L. Agate, of Eastland; F. A. Blankenbecker, of Cisco; and J. F. Drienhofer, of Ranger. The resolutions committee was composed of Guy Dabney, of Cisco, chairman; Wallace Wagner, of Ranger, and W. W. Wallace, of Cisco.

The report of the resolutions

committee, which was unanimously adopted, endorsed the candidacy of Herbert Hoover for presidential nominee, and R. B. Creager for national committeeman from Texas. The delegates were instructed to vote for representatives to the national Republican convention at Kansas City who will support Hoover for president, and Creager for national committeeman from Texas.

Permanent organization was perfected with the election of Dr. H. B. Tanner, of Eastland, chairman; O. B. Newberry, of Gorman, secretary, and Wallace Wagner, of Ranger, sergeant-at-arms.

Upon the recommendation of the committee on delegates the following delegates and alternates were elected to represent Eastland county at the state Republican convention at Dallas May 22: F. A. Blankenbecker, Guy Dabney, Cisco; Dr. H. B. Tanner, A. L. Agate, E. E. Freyschlag, Eastland; O. B. Newberry, Gorman.

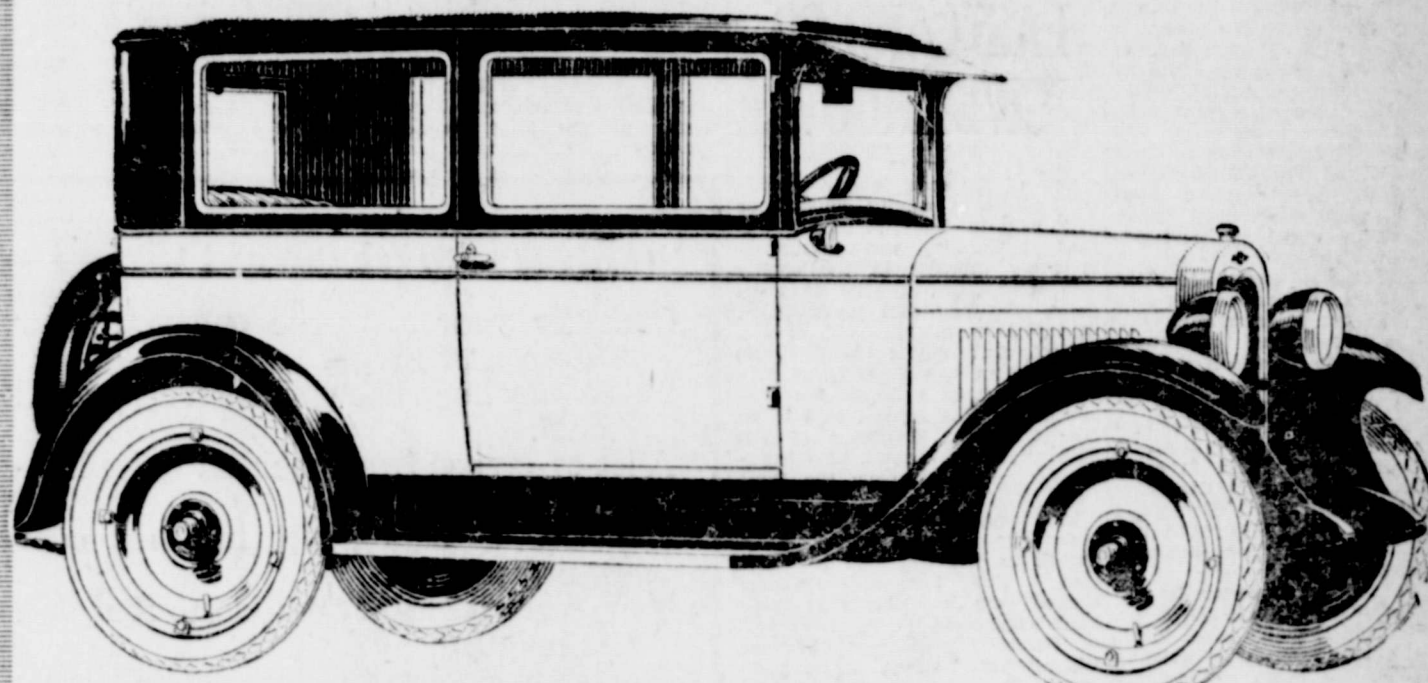

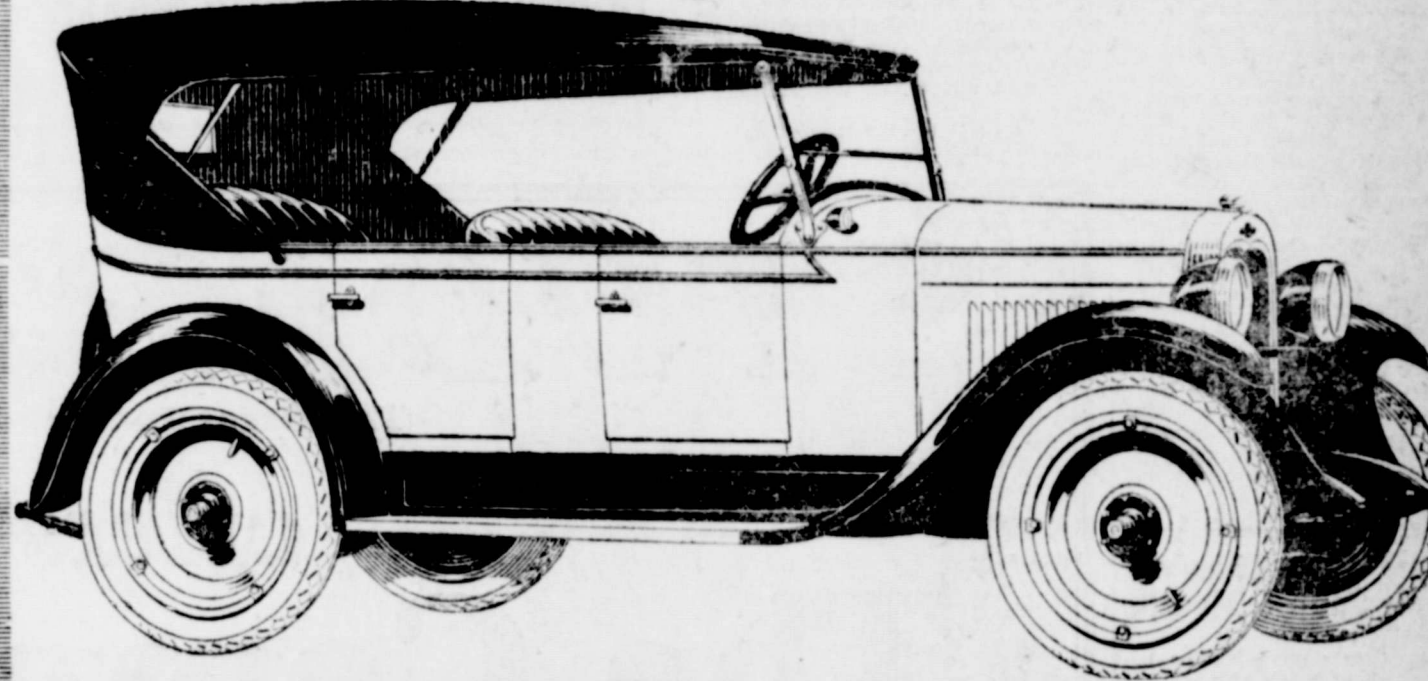

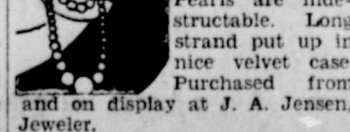
