### Fifth Of Grain Farms Signed For Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—Over one-fifth of the nation's corn and sorghum grain farms had signed up by May 5 to retire-land this year under the Agriculture Department's emergency feed grain program.

A department report showed that by that date 558,823 of the 2.5 million grain farms had agreed to divert 12.22 million acres from the surplus grains in 1961 to about \$250 million and price supports on the grain they do produce.

The department's diversion goal is about 20 million acres. The sign-up continues through May.

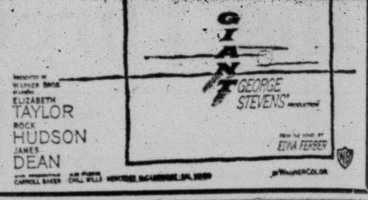

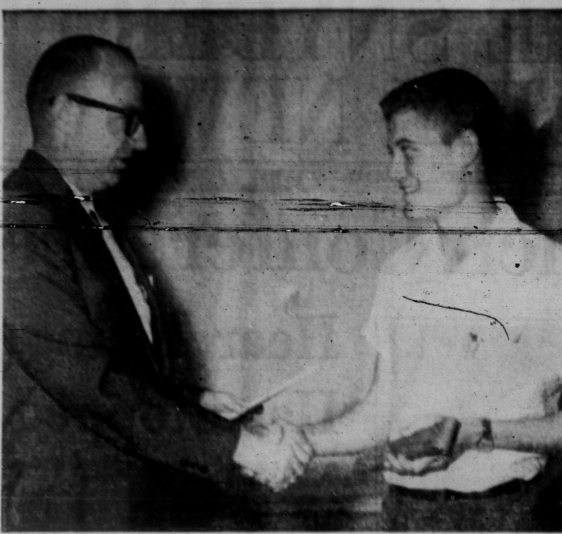

## Workers Toil To Hold Back Flood

Near record flood crests passed against weakened and soggy levees in sections of the Midwest flood belt today as workers toiled around the clock to hold back the surging waters.

Flood conditions appeared the most serious in sections of Southern Illinois, where six counties have been designated disaster areas.

Although swollen rivers and streams still plagued areas in Indiana, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Ohio and Kentucky, the threat of major flooding reportedly eased. Skies were generally clear across the entire flood belt.

The floods, in less than a week, have caused 25 deaths, injured more than 100 persons and forced some 1,300 families from their homes in Indiana, Missouri, Southern Illinois, Kansas and Kentucky. Property damage runs into the millions of dollars.

Working under the glare of big spotlights, flood fighters in Lawrenceville, Ill., hurriedly shored up weakening levees against the flooding Embarras River. National Guard units were sent into the southeastern Illinois town of 5,500 Wednesday. Units also were dispatched to other critical areas.

Across the state, at New Athens about 25 miles southeast of St. Louis, the rain-swollen Kaskaskia River poured waters through the town and the 2,000 residents started evacuation operations.

Army Engineers said about 200,000 acres were under water in the Missouri River Valley, including the Osage River and about 150,000 in the Osage Basin.

### Employment Drive Set

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Price Daniel has announced Texas will join in a nationwide campaign to reduce unemployment under the slogan "when they work, you profit. Hire now."

Daniel said "reports from a majority of the major cities in Texas indicate that the job picture is brightening considerably. Unemployment is on its seasonal downturn, and the momentum of improvement is gaining daily."

"Our employment staff estimates that there are many thousands of instances where our employers in business and industry have need for additional personnel, but for one reason or another have not crystallized their decision to hire these needed workers now. Men at work represent buying power and buying power maintains Texas business and industry," Daniel said.

The governor said the "hire now" campaign, directed by the Texas Employment Commission, "will make an immediate improvement in our unemployment situation."

### Compromise On Tax Seen

HOUSTON (AP)—The Houston Chronicle said today Gov. Price Daniel is willing to compromise on the two per cent retail sales tax bill.

"Part of the compromise must include additional taxation on natural gas or Daniel may run for a fourth term next year," the Austin story said.

"If they don't put something on gas with Louisiana taxing it at twice what we do—that will be the biggest political issue in the Texas campaign next year."

Daniel did not say he would or would not run for governor again but the Chronicle said he raised that possibility with this added comment:

"I don't mean the issue of more tax on natural gas will be raised by me because I have no intention of running for office next year. If we can solve this financial problem and get it out of the way in a fair way, I would be willing to say I definitely would not be a candidate for reelection."

### Uncontested Bills Are Up

AUSTIN (AP)—The Senate considered today an uncontested bill calendar with 100 measures, mostly local in application.

One bill by Sen. Henry Gonzalez provides that public school teachers shall not be required to or prohibited from engaging in political activities.

Another changes the name of the Dallas-Texas Commission to Texas Navy Commission.

Other bills include SB482, authorizing counties and cities to finance construction of jails for joint use.

HB632 removing real estate brokers from the occupation tax law.

HB421 providing for the filing and distribution of rules and regulations by state administrative agencies with the secretary of state for the public's use.

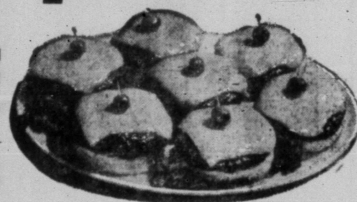

Nogales Gains Fame For Its Menu As Well As Nippy Juice

NOGALES, Mexico. — Word that the United States Government may drastically cut the dollar value of goods and souvenirs a returning tourist may bring back into the U. S. A. is depressing news to merchants south of the border.
"Buy now before Uncle Sam lowers boom" exclaims a shop owner holding up a matching silver belt, bracelet, necklace and earrings.
"Take it now while you can lay 'em up" advises a salesgirl in a linen shop specializing in bright embroidered dresses.
"Maybe soon you have to drink beer instead of home" warns a liquor dealer who obviously believes that two gallons in the hand are worth one in Mexico.
At the moment, with the two-cent allowance still set at \$300, I do not see how any tourist could spend that much in Nogales unless he bought the shop, lock, stock and barrel. In fact, I do not see how anyone could squander \$300 here unless he arrived in a truck. That is, always barring the Texas silver, and even it is very expensive by American standards.
Surely \$35 worth of Mexico's lovely, and colorful glassware would fill the back of a station wagon. However, the tourist who is seeking nirvana and does not want to worry about the economy south of the border and its ability to produce cheap and lovely goods should not stray off the main street.
The business district of Nogales, approximately three blocks wide, lies at the bottom of a narrow, almost perpendicular canyon on each side. The local populace lives in little houses clinging at crazy angles to the cliffs. Endless streets have been patiently cut out of the sheer face of the precipice in place of sidewalks. Away from the business district there is a bleak look to both the town and its people.
Tourism is literally the way of life in Nogales. But to people who live in nearby Arizona, Nogales is famous for more than bargain-basement gin and handicrafts.
Out here in these great open spaces where roads run straight for miles after miles, no Arizonaan thinks twice before he jumps into his car and heads for Nogales and the Cavern Cafe. Few small towns any place in the world can boast such an immaculate, gourmet restaurant, specializing in all kinds of wild game in season, from mallard ducks and boar to doves and quails.
The Cavern, as its name suggests, is a cave followed out of a solid rock cliff that rises a block back of the main drag. In the long ago, before tourism came to sweeten life in Nogales, the cave was used for many years as the town jail. That much is certain. But whether Geronimo kept his prisoners there, as legend now says, is something else again.
No matter how hot the streets of Nogales, the Cavern is an always cool retreat, without aid of man-made air-conditioning, and a very large one, too. Tourists, their aches and their arms bulging with pottery, tin candlesticks, fringed leather jackets and huge glass water jugs, begin to retreat to the Cavern as early as 12 noon.
The tourist Johnny-Come-Lately who doesn't show up till 1 p. m. is apt to have to cool his heels at the bar, solacing himself with Margaritas. That innocent name conceals a Mexican neopolite consisting of two parts of tequila, 1 part Cointreau and the juice of one lime, served in a glass whose rim has been rubbed with lime juice and dipped in salt.
Even that is regarded as a tenderfoot potion. The men who have been separated from the boys take their tequila neat, followed by a chaser that consists of a lick of salt, held in one palm, and the juice, sucked from half a lime, held between thumb and forefinger.
Among the Cavern's most famous dishes is its "fresh Guaymas Green Turtle soup." This is no thin, pallid liquid such as sophisticates identify as green turtle soup, but a rich, thick brew that will hold either a spoon or a man upright. Delicious, too. Some quick-freeze magnets should coax the Cavern to put this soup on the market as a solace and boon to man in a wicked world.

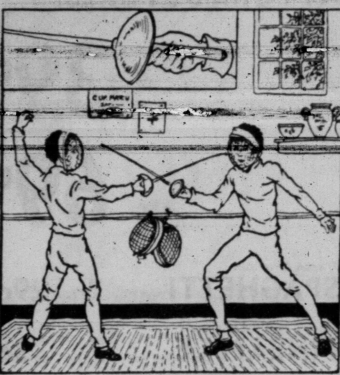

Pole Disputes Red Doctrine

WARSAW (AP)—Some of the basic theories and tactics in communism's fight against religion are being publicly disputed by Leszek Kolakowski, a prominent leader of Poland's liberal Communist philosophers.

The naval base is built around the outer bay of Guantanamo. There is a Cuban-controlled inner bay and access to this bay by ships of any nation is guaranteed by treaty.

The Washington Post reported that the U.S. Navy had Navy ships and aircraft in the Cuban area.

Their presence was described by the Navy as routine. They had nothing to do with the Cuban danger, the Navy said.

Trouble To South Is Just Beginning

Editor's Note—For the last 16 days during and after the anti-Castro invasion of Cuba, AP reporter Bern Price worked in the sensitive listening post of Guantanamo Bay Naval Base.

The grapevine there is so efficient that reports of activities in Havana, 600 miles west, sometimes reach the base before they are broadcast by the Castro regime.

Within hours after the grapevine report of U.S.-held survivors reached the base, the Castro captives from the abortive invasion—who were being interrogated in Havana on television—began talking of a particular island, Vieques.

They said they had been trained for the invasion at the U.S. military base at Vieques, which is just a 30-minute helicopter ride from San Juan, Puerto Rico.

While the rumor about the Vieques prisoners was seeping into Guantanamo, it was also circulating in San Juan and New York.

A Navy officer talked by radio to the naval station at San Juan, asking if news was being checked on the rumors could be admitted to Vieques.

The answer was that no one would be admitted to the base without special permission from Washington.

On the assumption that training bases are normally open to visitors, efforts were made to gain access to Vieques through the Central Intelligence Agency and the White House.

The CIA was noncommittal. A White House spokesman said it would not assist in the matter of entry.

While the Vieques operation was kept secret, the New York Times has reported the story of the 1954-55 invasion of Cuba by Fulbright Batista, a lawyer and member of the anti-Castro invasion forces.

## Both Candidates Emphasize Conservatism In Speeches

Rival candidates for the U.S. Senate in the May 27 runoff election are underlining their conservatism.

Sen. William A. Blakley told a rally in Victoria Wednesday night.

"I am a Democrat and have always been a Democrat, but I am a conservative too.

"I am a conservative because I want to conserve the things that have made this great state what it is and the things that have made the Democratic party great.

"I have only one boss and one mandate and that is the people of Texas."

He said that John G. Tower,

his Republican opponent, has claimed he is the most conservative candidate but he said Tower has not explained in what way he is most conservative.

Tower told a luncheon meeting of the Dallas Junior Chamber of Commerce Wednesday that Blakley is what he called an inconsistent New Frontier conservative.

He said that Blakley had supported President Kennedy in the general election last November and asked "where was Bill Blakley when the Democratic platform was being drawn?"

Tower recalled that he had fought liberal planks in the Republican platform at the Chicago convention.

He said a Republican victory would "serve notice that the people are cognizant of the social manifestations of the New Frontier and are going to fight it."

A true conservative, he said, is not a mossbacked stick-in-the-mud who wants to go back to the horse and buggy days.

"If we are going to turn the tide against socialism, we must elect men who will vote their conscience and not for political expediency," he said.

After his speech, Tower was asked in a question from the audience why he was accepting the personal aid of U.S. Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., in his campaign instead of that of former Vice President Richard Nixon.

Tower replied that he and Goldwater were "like-minded people" and that Goldwater was the recognized leader of conservatism regardless of party.

He said he believed Nixon would be more effective as an administration critic on the national level without engaging in a Texas campaign.

Blakley campaigned Wednesday in Freeport, Lake Jackson, Angleton, Bay City, Wrenn, El Campo, Ganado and Edna before going to Victoria. At Freeport, he shook hands with workers leaving the big Dow Chemical Co. plant.

In talks to supporters, he emphasized the need of getting people to vote.

## Products Of Gardens Are Increasing

Lower prices and increased supplies from southern gardens are featured in the fruit and vegetable markets of Texas this week.

Strawberries and watermelons are abundant and lower prices encourage heavy buying.

Plenty of Texas oranges and grapefruit remain. Bananas and lemons also rate the "good buy" label.

Cantaloupes are lower. Honeydew and cranshaw melons and red sweet cherries made their debut early this week, but prices are fairly high.

Onions, potatoes, cabbage and cauliflower are "best buys" in many markets. They're given close competition by greater volume of snap beans, beets, celery, clipped sweet corn, cucumbers, eggplant, greens and green onions, lettuce, blackeye peas, new potatoes, radishes and purple-top turnips.

Prices on live lambs are almost 20 per cent lower than a year ago. Supplies are substantial. Broilers, fryers and turkeys are plentiful at budget prices.

## Deficit Cut By Payments

AUSTIN (AP)—May 1 franchise tax payments cut more than \$30 million from the general revenue fund deficit, the state treasurer reports.

The deficit was \$99,985,073 April 24, the last time the treasurer sent out a call for checks written on the fund. At the close of business Wednesday it was \$67,941,535, just shy of the \$63 million figure predicted for Aug. 31 when the state closes its books on 1961.

State Treasurer Jesse James notified banks to send in for payment general revenue warrants through No. 221,237, dated Jan. 13. The call includes checks totaling \$39,463,858.

Revenue into the fund since April 24 totaled \$39,508,733. Drafts from general revenue totaled \$9,163,576.

# Film Of Space Ride Shown

WASHINGTON (AP) — The man's eyes darted from side to side. His chest heaved. His helmeted head bent forward to look through a porthole. A strap of his spacesuit waved in the air like a piece of seaweed.

This was Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr., America's first astronaut, viewed by a movie camera inside his capsule as he rode 111 minutes during his historic flight from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

The dramatic film was shown for the first time Wednesday before an audience of congressmen and many of their office workers who crowded into the House caucus room.

The first and last parts of the film, showing the Redstone rocket's liftoff and the landing at sea of the capsule, aired on special television coverage on the spot last Friday.
