



# Cheaper Interest Getting Attention

NEW YORK (AP) — Among plans for getting industry rolling at a faster pace the one you hear the most about today is making credit more available and interest rates cheaper.

Rumors that the Washington money managers plan to do just that have affected prices of stocks and bonds recently. The question seems sure to be debated in the presidential campaign. And a side line is that U. S. rates already are lower than in most other countries.

The Federal Reserve Board in June did cut the interest rate it charges member banks for borrowing money from it. But this wasn't passed along in any cut in the banks' own prime loan charges, which are the lowest rates at which business firms of the highest credit standing can borrow from commercial banks on the secured basis.

Some stock traders have been looking for the Federal Reserve to cut its rate again to try to force some action.

The Federal Reserve also made credit easier in the stock market. It reduced to 70 per cent from 90 per cent the amount of cash you must put up if you want to buy stocks on margin. The markets responded to this only half heartedly.

Federal agencies have eased credit terms for government guaranteed mortgages without stimulating home building much.

Banks continue to hope that the Federal Reserve will cut the amount of reserves they must keep on hand with it. New York and Chicago banks particularly hope their reserve requirements will be cut to the level of other major cities.

This would give banks more money to lend to business. And if business wants to borrow more for expansion or other activities, that could pep up the economy.

But at the moment most bankers contend that the prime rate is staying at 5 per cent, because their reserves aren't plentiful enough yet to warrant a cut in view of the steady demand for all the money they have to lend.

Many business firms have been able to borrow for less in the commercial paper market, where investors often have money for corporations with high ratings. But this market is limited.

# Says Cubans Misuse Mail Privileges

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States demanded today that the Cuban government stop using its free mailing privileges to distribute anti-American propaganda in this country.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield said he had learned the Cuban central government has been "misusing" the franking privilege to mail into this country unsolicited pamphlets, contents of which are untrue, abusive, unsubstantiated, provocative and hostile to the United States, and attack the economic policy and integrity of this government.

He addressed his demand to Cuban Minister of Communications Raul Chueca Morales.

His letter noted the Cuban government franked mail has been coming in under the first-class privilege, which means it cannot be opened for inspection by postal authorities. Summerfield said, however, that his department "is becoming aware of the situation" as a result of complaints made by persons receiving the unsolicited material.

A postal union agreement embraces the American countries and Spain under which government mailing recognized as free under domestic laws would also be handled free by all members of this union.

# Guilty Pleas Are Entered

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Beverly Aadland's mother left court shaken and weeping after a judge found her guilty of contributing to the delinquency of her daughter, traveling companion of the late Errol Flynn.

Florence Aadland faces a probation hearing and sentencing Sept. 1. The conviction carries a possible one-year jail term.

Witnesses had testified that mother and daughter were drunk at a party at the Aadland apartment March 19. Photographs were introduced that showed Beverly, 17, and Mrs. Aadland with partially clad males.

# GOP Senators To Push Ike Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republicans declared a strategy today of pressing President Eisenhower's legislative program by every possible means, including offering his proposals as riders to bills brought up by Democrats.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, the Republican floor leader, also announced after a White House conference that he will introduce immediately a bill to carry out Eisenhower's two civil rights proposals that were omitted from the civil rights legislation passed by Congress earlier this year after a bitter struggle.

A scrap over this move could point up the big split between Northern and Southern Democrats over the civil rights issue.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, the Republican presidential nominee, attended the breakfast session with Eisenhower. The meeting ran nearly two hours.

Afterward, Nixon went back into the White House. Dirksen told newsmen the discussion centered primarily on the President's legislative program but also touched on politics and the election campaign.

He said that Nixon "entered into the general discussion right along the line" and that the legis-

# Southerners Still Hold Whip Hand

WASHINGTON (AP) — Southern opponents of civil rights measures hold the whip hand on that issue in the present biennial session of Congress—and they made plain today they intend to use it.

Sen. Richard B. Russell (D-Ga.), chief spokesman for the Dixie forces, said he was prepared to make use of "every parliamentary weapon in the arsenal" if necessary.

"If they expect to accomplish anything else," he said of sponsors of civil rights legislation, "they won't bring it up."

Russell spoke in an interview as Republicans maneuvered to force a test vote in the Senate on two civil rights proposals urged by President Eisenhower Monday.

One would set up by law a commission to seek an end to racial hiring discrimination under government contracts. The other would help school districts meet added costs of integrating.

Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said he would offer Tuesday if not today, a bill embodying the President's recommendations. Both were omitted from a bill passed earlier this year.

Dirksen said he would seek to have the new measure placed on the Senate calendar for action without being referred to the Judiciary Committee, long a dead end for civil rights bills.

Such a move would be subject to a Southern filibuster, but a test vote could be forced by a motion to table and thus kill the motion. Dirksen said that if the tabling motion carried, he thought it would "just about wind up civil rights proceedings for this session." The effect would be to route the bill to the Judiciary Committee.

For the Republicans the vote would have the advantage of pointing up the deep division between Northern and Southern Democrats over civil rights.

The present situation plays right into the hands of the Southerners.

# Cuba Eyes U. S. Mines

HAVANA (AP)—The Cuban government today set up a National Institute of Mining, a step that could be preliminary to seizure of the U. S. mining properties that escaped Prime Minister Fidel Castro's weekend nationalization of most American holdings in Cuba.

A decree announced after a marathon Cabinet session said the mining institute was empowered to "plan investigation and development of mineral production." The institute was made a division of the Industrialization Department of the National Institute of Agrarian Reform-INDRA.

The largest mining interests in Cuba are the Moa Bay Mining Co. (nickel), now shut down because its American owners say they cannot make a profit under Cuban mineral export laws, and the Niacro Nickel plant, owned by the U. S. government. Officials of both companies are negotiating with the Cuban government over their future.

Before Castro seized the foreign-owned oil refineries in Cuba, the government created a National Petroleum Institute as part of INRA.

# Alaskans Voting On Capital Change

 JUNEAU, Alaska (AP)—Lagged by both the mountains and the sea, this once-roaring gold camp's fight to remain capital of the nation's largest state was in the hands of the voters today. An estimated 35,000 ballots, far below the record number of 50,343 cast in the 1958 general election, were expected to decide whether Juneau would lose the capital to the Cook Inlet-railbelt area, dominated by booming Anchorage, the state's largest city.

Gov. William A. Egan would be empowered to name a five-man committee to select an actual site in the Cook Inlet-railbelt area for a new capital, to be established by Jan. 1, 1963. If the proposal wins approval.

Egan and the other two top Democrats in the state, Sens. Ernest Gruening and E. L. Bartlett, both have said they oppose the capital move proposal.

So have the two top Republicans, Mike Stepiovich, who was

governor of Alaska under territorial status; and John Butrovich, who fought Egan for the governorship two years ago.

Drawing their main support in Anchorage, backers of the capital move plan argued that Juneau was too far from the Anchorage-Fairbanks center of population that great economies could be achieved by moving the capital from Juneau, and that air transportation to Juneau, the only year-round means of getting here, was often interrupted by fog and rain clouds.

And, pointing at Juneau's place on a narrow ledge between high mountains and deep-flooding Gasline Channel, they said there is no room for capital expansion here.

Every point was denied heatedly by the Juneau backers in a bitter campaign that has raged unabated for a year.

They argued the state does not have the financial means for transferring the capital from Juneau. "What money it has they

is needed for roads, hospitals, juvenile facilities and mental health facilities.

Almost forgotten in the heat of the capital campaign were nomination races for one U.S. Senate seat and the state's U.S. House of Representatives seat.

Democrat E. L. Bartlett was opposed for his party's nomination for another term in the Senate. Battling for the GOP bid to face him were Lawrence Brayton, a Fairbanks surveyor, and

Democratic Rep. Ralph J. Rivers has opposition within his own party in his bid for another term from David N. Boyer, a hotel owner from Kenai. Three men, William C. Haugaard, a Sitka lawyer; R. L. Rettig, an Anchorage accountant; and Jack Ryan, a Fairbanks newspaperman, seek the GOP nomination.

## Constitution Party Picks Its Nominee

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—The Constitution Party Monday night named Charles Sullivan, 39-year-old Clarkdale, Miss., attorney, as its presidential candidate.

Sullivan, who ran third in the race for governor of Mississippi, was not present at Monday night's meeting, attended by approximately 350 delegates from Texas, Tennessee, Mississippi and Michigan.

Party leaders have delayed naming a nominee for the vice-presidency until they confer with Sullivan.

A major plank in the platform of the conservative party's platform calls for abolishment of the federal income tax.

Nomination of the Mississippi lawyer and judge climaxed several weeks of work by the party in trying to find a suitable candidate.

His name was placed in nomination by Dr. Charles W. Finley of Lubbock, chairman of the negotiating committee.

Sullivan's selection caused one person—Addie Barlow Frazier of Dallas—to walk out of the convention.

Mrs. Frazier, a leader in the pro-segregation White Citizens' Council, said she wanted to place in nomination the name of Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas.

The Constitution Party's goal is to get enough electoral votes to prevent either the Democratic or Republican parties from receiving a majority in November—thus throwing the election into the House of Representatives, leaders said.

## Parr Ranch Up For Sale

SAN D'ISO, Tex. (AP)—George B. Parr's former Dobie Ranch will be sold at auction Nov. 15 to settle claims against the South Texas political leader.

George Clower, trustee, said bidding on the 53,711-acre ranch in Webb and LaSalle counties will start at one million dollars.

Duval County filed \$672,000 in claims and in 1956 took possession of the ranch which Parr admitted buying and improving with funds borrowed from the county treasury.

Duval County will receive net proceeds from the sale except for 20 per cent or a maximum of \$300,000 which will go to satisfy other claims against Parr.

Bidders will be required to post certified checks for \$100,000 to guarantee performance.

Details of the sale were agreed to by Clower and his attorney, Oscar Spitz, and Duval County Atty. Walter Purcell and Dist. Atty. Sam Burris. Spitz said the ranch is expected to bring 1 million dollars.

## New Fire Truck In Turbulent Start

TOKYO (AP)—The seven-man fire brigade of Komae, a farm community in northern Tokyo, was proud of its new fire truck.

To insure it against traffic mishaps, the volunteer firemen dressed in holiday best and set out on the truck to have it blessed at the Narita Fudo Buddhist Temple.

The route fire chief Yoshio Yamaguchi tried to overtake a speeding truck, miscalculated, and the fire wagon turned over.

Yamaguchi jumped under the truck, died later in a hospital. Four other firemen were seriously injured.

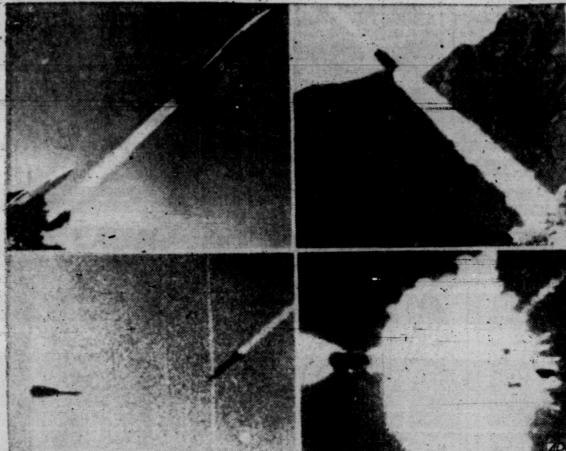

# Playboy Is Out Of Jail

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Released from jail for lack of proof of adultery with Princess Ira von Furstenberg, Hohelohé, 20, playboy Francisco (Baby) Pignatari slept off his fatigue and then traded insults Monday night with the man who put him there.

Drawn and red-eyed after 36 hours behind bars, the Brazilian millionaire said of Ira's estranged husband, Prince Alfonso Hohelohé, 43: "I do not even wish to mention that guy's name; it simply makes me sick. I may not have a title, but at least I have honor."

The Spanish nobleman, who has done well selling cars in Mexico, replied in like manner.

Hohelohé is suing his wife for a divorce and custody of their two sons. Cristóbal, 4, and Alfonso, 16 months. She has the children with her in a guarded hotel suite.

Twenty-two Mexican policemen broke into the suite before dawn Sunday, seeking Pignatari on adultery charges filed by Hohelohé. The police said Pignatari was found in trousers and shirt but the princess did not appear.

Pignatari and the six-man guard he had hired to protect Ira and

her sons put up a fight. The Brazilian playboy and his men were carted off to jail and additional charges of resisting arrest were filed.

Pignatari was freed because, under Mexican law, his presence in the apartment did not constitute evidence of illicit relations. His lawyers threatened to file countercharges against the prince.

Pignatari's guards also were released.

The Brazilian described himself as an old friend of the princess' family and said he was in Mexico to watch out for her financial interests. The princess claimed the prince is after the fortune their sons may inherit from her family, which has a substantial interest in Italy's vast Fiat motor industry.

Pignatari said Hohelohé would agree to the divorce "if only the princess would accede to that man's price of half a million dollars to give up his claim for the custody of each child."

The prince said: "I have no interest in either her money or her. All that I want is to have my sons under my protection in order to raise them as Christians and moral persons."

Lawyers on both sides settled down for a long struggle.

# Addison Refuses To List Lenders

DALLAS (AP)—John Milton Addison has acknowledged that he was "commercially" in debt \$37,000, but he would not outline his "lenders" debts on the grounds that it might incriminate him.

The uranium promoter Monday filed his list of commercial creditors with Federal Bankruptcy Referee Elmore Whitehurst, but pleaded the Fifth Amendment to the others.

His petition said that due to his being under a federal criminal indictment the information contained in a complete list of "lenders" would violate his constitutional rights of self-incrimination.

Whitehurst said that he will take the matter under advisement.

In the meantime, Whitehurst said he will continue with the proceedings, under information requested from the attorneys for the petitioning creditors in the involuntary bankruptcy petition.

The commercial debt list filed Monday includes a \$23,450 indebtedness to a Idaho Springs, Colo., service station; \$1,000 to the Dallas Aero Service and \$1,200 to Western Airlines.

Addison said that this was the best list he could compile at present because some of his business records were in the hands of former associates and law enforcement officials.

A full "schedule" of his assets will be filed today, Addison said in his petition.

The promoter, under order from Whitehurst to have the list of all his creditors and his sched-

ule filed by Monday.

If Whitehurst rules that Addison is in contempt of court by not filing the list of lenders, the matter will be referred to Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson for a decision.

### Tree-Cutters Are Forced To Quit

BOSTON (AP)—South Boston mothers, shouting protests, Monday night forced a two-man tree-cutting crew to quit felling oaks for a 240-car parking lot at Marine Park.

The power saw crew retired in defeat after cutting down only one of eight trees.

The Metropolitan District Commission plans a half-million-dollar covered skating rink on the site of a crumbling aquarium. The neighbors approve this but complain loudly over plans to fill a grassy bowl in front of their homes for a parking area.

### Women In Britain Are Better Drivers

LONDON (AP)—A British insurance company survey says it has shown that British women are safer drivers than men. The company is cutting liability premiums for women drivers at least 10 per cent.

A company spokesman said men can get the discount if they can prove their wives or daughters do most of the driving.

# Laos Army In Control, Say Reports

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—Laos army elements have staged a coup and taken over in Vientiane, the Laotian capital, unofficial but reliable reports received here said today.

The sketchy reports, which could not be confirmed immediately, said Vientiane airfield had been closed.

The Laotian government of Premier Tiao Souvanna was formed in June, with army backing, after 35 of the 62 members of the National Assembly elected in May pledged allegiance to Souvanna's new political party.

Souvanna's party was an offshoot of the military-political Committee for Defense of National Interests which ousted Premier Phou Sananikone in a virtual coup in December after Phou proclaimed a neutral foreign policy.

A usually well informed source in Singapore reported that the development in Laos did not appear to be a coup but rather an "internal shuffle within military elements of the government."

The source said on the basis of sketchy information moderate forces still appeared to be in power in the landlocked Indochina kingdom and it was believed the change was not Communist-inspired.

The Laotian ambassador to Thailand, Prince Khamman, said the Vientiane radio had reported army rebels had taken over the capital at 3 a.m. today but had given no details.

"I think the situation is calm," the ambassador said.

# Road Crash Kills Four

CLEVELAND, Tex. (AP)—A car crashed into a tree near here Monday and killed four Splendor, Tex., persons, including a woman who was freed in the slaying of her husband.

They are Mrs. Ethel Mae Simpson, 38, who was acquitted on Dec. 31, 1958, on a charge of murdering her husband, Edwin Clark, 30, his wife, Mrs. Emma Lee Clark, 22, and their son, Norman, 2.

Another Clark son, Larry, 8, was injured.

Constable E. J. McDonald said Mrs. Simpson, who was driving, veered to avoid hitting an oncoming car. Her car hit a pine tree 9 miles south of here in Southeast Texas.

James Walter Simpson, a Fort Worth Convair airplane plant employe, was shot while on a fishing trip on the San Bernard River near Freeport, in Brazoria County, July 3, 1958.

Mrs. Simpson pleaded self-defense, claiming her husband tried to drown her and later threatened her with a knife.

She first claimed a Negro killed Simpson and raped her. Later she admitted shooting Simpson.

# New Record Wool Yield Is Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new record in world wool production was predicted by the Agriculture Department today for the 1960-61 marketing year.

It estimated production would total 5,625,000,000 pounds, grease basis, (3,210,000,000 pounds, clean content). This would be one per cent more than last year and 38 per cent more than in 1951-52.

The rate of increase in production of wool in Communist countries has greatly exceeded that of the Free World nations in the last decade, the department said. It reported that production in the Communist bloc countries jumped 88 per cent, due primarily to the doubling of output in the U.S.S.R. During the same period free world production increased 20 per cent, due mainly to a 36 per cent increase in the five major producing countries of the southern hemisphere. These countries produced 70 per cent of the free world total and 56 per cent of the world total.

The estimated U.S. production of shorn wool for 1960 is 205,300,000 pounds, 3 per cent more than in 1959 and the highest since 1946.

World wool prices, the department said, are expected to continue at present levels until the opening of the 1960-61 marketing season in Australia late this month. Trade sources expect a slightly easier tone to prevail then, with the rate of mill activity in the chief manufacturing countries slowing up.

# Miami Man Sues For False Arrest

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—A Miami man, jailed 31 days as a material witness to a slaying he reported, is suing Dade County Law officials for more than a million dollars.

Elliott Fletcher, 35, based his suit on a contention of false imprisonment. He asked a million dollars punitive damages and more than \$5,000 for loss of work during the time he spent in jail.

Fletcher complained that while he fretted behind bars, the accused slayer went free on bond.

# Soviets Plan New Shopping Facilities

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Government is going to spend 17 billion rubles—nearly two billion dollars at the tourist rate of exchange—in the next five years on new shops, shopping and fashion centers and warehouses.

The Central Committee of the Soviet Communist Party ordered the building program and complained of both shoddy goods and services furnished buyers. It recommended self-service stores, alteration departments in ready-to-wear shops, more snack bars, better advertising and decoration.

All the news from abroad, even from regions only 90 miles off our shores, has been increasingly drolery for too long. But it has merely been the Stygian dark before the dawn, the storm before the rainbow.

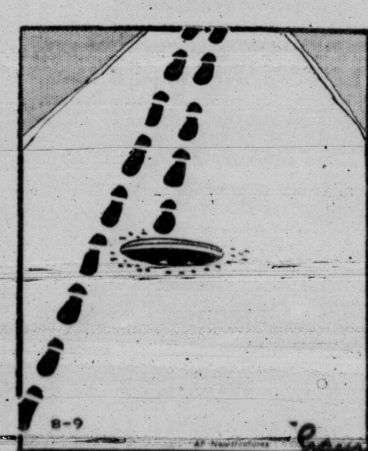

# Tech Expansion Furthered By... An Aggie!

LUBBOCK, Tex. (AP)—About 41,500 seats are being installed in Jones stadium as Texas Tech prepares for its first season of championship contention in South-west Conference football.

Know who was most important in preparing Tech for its conference entry? Well, it was an Aggie. Yes, the late W.G. (Bill) McMillan of Lubbock, who quarterbacked the Texas A&M team in 1921, was the man who showed Tech how to build—or rather move—its stadium.

Tech was voted into the conference in 1936 to have to wait four years to compete for the title in football in order not to be a financial handicap to the conference. Tech wanted to expand its stadium seating to a figure more comparable to those of the other members. The stadium, built in 1947 had a capacity of 27,000 which was too small to assure conference members of adequate receipts. The school decided enlargement rather than construction of a new stadium was more desirable because of the ideal location of the stadium on the campus, near the coliseum, track and other athletic facilities. But how?

The most obvious method of rounding out the stadium's "horseshoe" was counseled against because fans are slow to buy seats behind the goal lines—even though end zones generally furnished the best view of the hottest action. Nor did the expense of an over-hanging second deck seem advisable.

Finally, McMillan, a contractor and long-time Texas Tech booster, came to the rescue.

Mrs. E.N. Jones, wife of a former Texas Tech president, vividly recalls when McMillan came up with the idea of moving the stands. "At an early September high school game," Mrs. Jones related, "Bill was sitting by Dr. Jones and me. He just sat there quietly for a long time, not paying any attention to the game. Then he turned to us and, rather excitedly, told us he knew how Tech could enlarge its stadium."

McMillan noticed seven sections of each side of the concrete-and-steel stadium were connected only by tarred expansion joints. Essentially, his plan was to separate the sections and pull the stands apart. Excavation of the playing surface would come next, followed by the lining of the ensuing slopes with new stands. That way, all the additional seating would be between the goal lines.

DeWitt Weaver, the Tech athletic director and coach, was easily convinced. His only suggestion was to inspect of moving both stands to transfer only one side, the east, twice as far. McMillan concurred and his proposal—unprecedented in stadium construction—met the approval of Texas Tech's administration and board of directors.

McMillan, who already had built the Tech student union, museum, two wings of the administration building, the infirmary, the power plant and a dormitory, was looking forward to bidding on the stadium expansion project.

But he died Oct. 23, 1958. The history-making move began last fall and the stadium will be ready Sept. 17 when Texas Tech opens its first season of championship football competition.

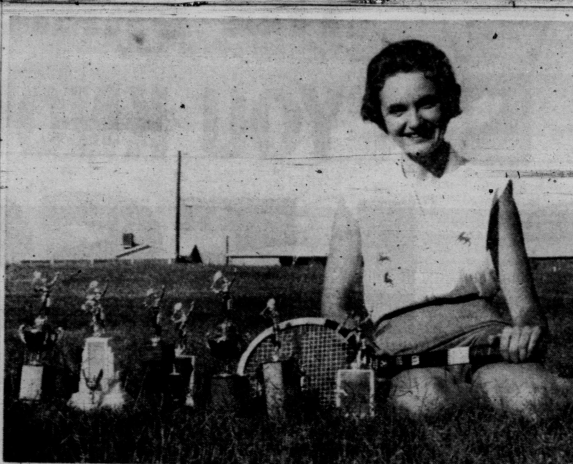

## Sime Reverts To Role Of 'Darkhorse'

COVINA, Calif. (AP)—Dave Sime took two steps and limped off the track in pain—his bid for the 1956 United States Olympic team shattered.

Sime, resting in a chair, at the Olympic team's training camp near here, didn't talk much Monday of the leg injury that ruined his 1956 chances and still haunts him.

He talked of the new Sime— healed and flashing the old speed that has made him a surprising threat for a gold medal at Rome.

"I'm four-tenths of a second better now than at the Olympic trials," the former Duke University athlete said. "Each week I feel stronger."

Sime had been considered no better than a darkhorse even to make the United States team. In the trials he tied for the third and final spot on the 100-meter.

Two straight victories in pre-Olympic meets have assured him of a starting berth at Rome. The second came last Friday night at Long Beach when he ran 100 meters in 10.5 seconds—one-tenth slower than at the times but against a seven-mile-an-hour wind.

Sime, who four times in 1956 and 1957 equaled the world's 100-yard dash record of 9.3 seconds, doesn't talk about Germany's Armin Hary or Canada's Harry Jerome, who recently broke the world's 100-meter record with clockings of 10 flat.

Sime has had leg trouble ever since he first hurt it in the 1956 collegiate trials and then tried to run in the Olympic trials two weeks later.

"I've had hamstring trouble in my leg all spring," he said. "But this steady training and weather have helped me. Now I'm ready."

With McKinley ahead, 2-1, in the first set after breaking Reyes service in the third game, rain began to fall. Mexican officials called the match and announced it would be continued today.

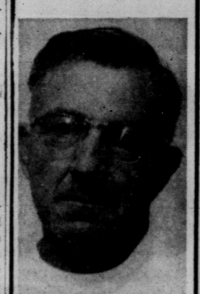
But Freed demurred. He said the team members had plane reservations home and that it would be impossible to play today. He ordered McKinley to default.
