WHEELER TO HOST SHAMROCK IN GRID OPENER FRIDAY HERE

Owning the state's longest winning streak, the Class B state champions of 1977 Wheeler Mustangs open defense of their crown Friday night at 8 PM on Nicholson Field as they toe it up with bitter rival Shamrock.

The Mustangs will be out to extend their winning streak to 20 games and three straight over the Irish but it will be no easy task for the black and gold gridders of new head coach Joe Allen.

Shamrock is now tutored by Leonard Peters who was head coach at Windthorst in '77 and

Mustang fans won't forget that epic battle of last season and the spittled play of Windthorst 2nd the Irish have displayed a lot of enthusiasm thus far in workouts. The Irish have shown up well

in their two pre-season scrimmages with Phillips and Mangum, Oklahoma and will present a supreme test for the Mustangs who are coming off a rugged scrimmage with Wellington.

Several changes have been made in the Mustangs lineup for the Shamrock game as both of these two old rivals have installed new systems.

The Mustangs will run out of

the wing T and I formations and will use a split four for their basic defense. The Irish will counter with a straight T formation on offense, although they will go to a wing set and also a strong set at times, and will play a 59 defense. "Shamrock has a quarterback that throws well and a good fullback that will keep you honest," Coach Allen said this week. "We had a lot of breakdowns in our Wellington scrimmage and have made some changes that we hope will im-

prove us both offensively and defensively," Allen added.

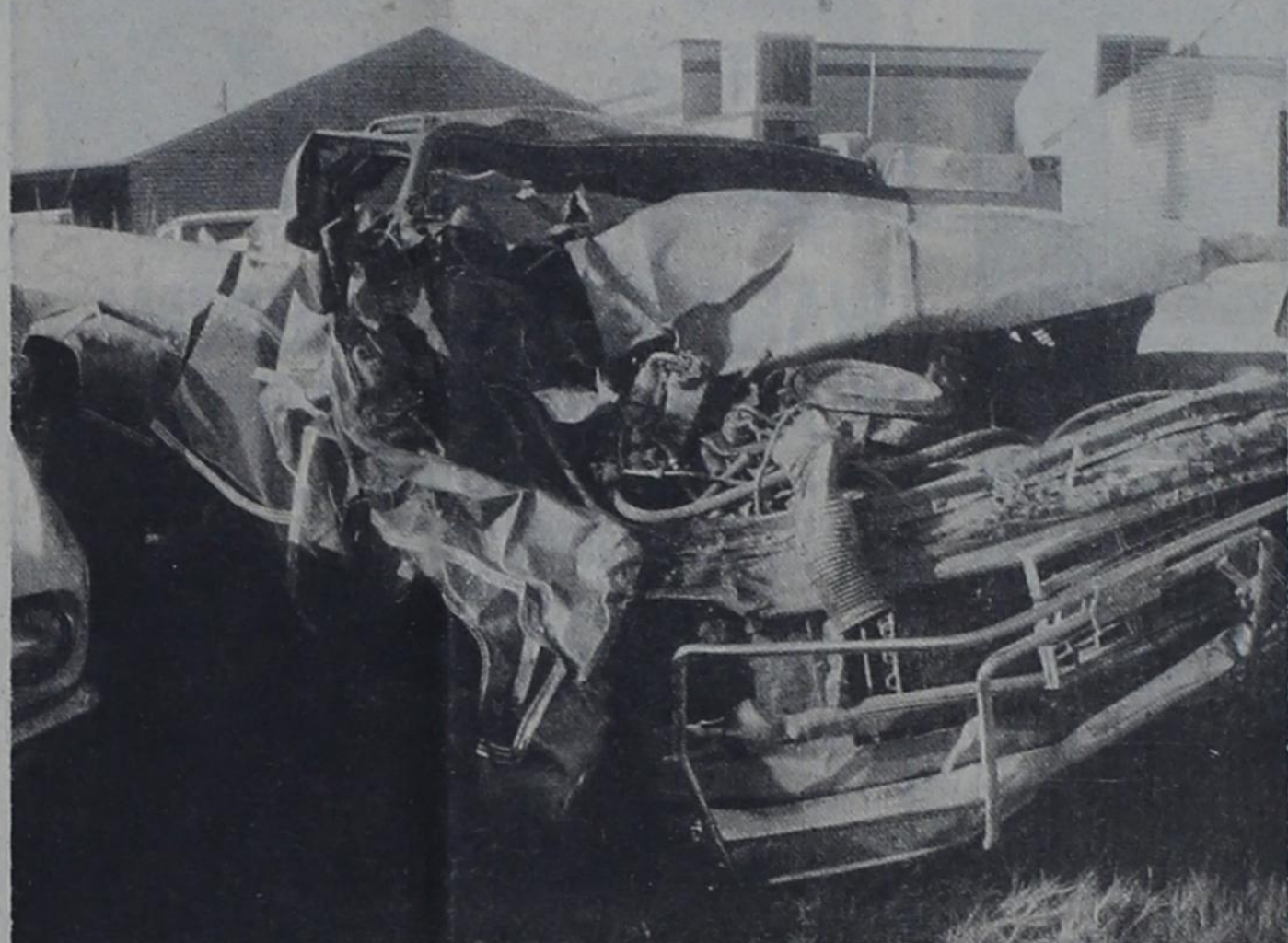

CHOOSE WHEAT SEED CAREFULLY

Wheat producers, commencing their planting in the major wheat growing areas of Texas, are faced by a problem that has been increased by the summer drought in much of the state: procuring good wheat seed.

Obtaining good wheat seed may be more difficult than usual this season as drought and disease have caused extreme shriveling and low test weight in most areas, Dr. Frank C. Petr, area agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service her cautioned. He noted that good seed is an important aspect in the successful production of any crop.

It is very risky to plant wheat seed that is shriveled or damaged by fungus organisms that cause diseases such as glume blotch and black point, he warned. In such seed, the disease organisms are present in large numbers ready to attack the wheat, especially if it is subjected to heat, moisture or cold stress, Petr said.

"When it is absolutely necessary to use seed that may be harboring disease organism, thorough seed treatment with an effective labeled fungicide is essential," he said.

If planting a field that produced diseased wheat the previous season, seed treatment will help to avoid problems, but may not eliminate the disease potential, the Extension agronomist said.

Plump healthy seed of an adopted variety is the ideal sought by successful producers, he said. However, seed shriveled by drought can be used successfully in some situations if proper precautions are taken, he added. "Do not use shriveled seed where it is necessary to plant deep to reach adequate moisture for germination. Germination plus emergence from a three or four inch depth requires a lot of energy.

"The reduced size of the endosperm in shriveled seed definitely limits the amount of energy stored in the form of carbohydrates and starch. Food reserves derived from the seed are necessary for germination, emergency and early growth of the seedling until sufficient leaves are formed to supply energy through photosynthesis," he said.

In semi-arid areas such as the

High Plains, wheat is sometimes planted in dry soil in anticipation of rain at some later date, Petr noted. Shriveled seed is not well adapted to such situations

because it lacks vigor and is more subject to disease invasion as well as insect damage. "Even plump normal seed should be treated with a protective fungicide and insecticide," he advised.

Shriveled seed also presents a problem in determining the correct seeding rate for a desired stand, the Extension agronomist said. In a shriveled seed lot, a

bushel by weight may contain twice as many seeds as a plump seed lot.

"Under optimum conditions, even the most shriveled seed may produce a plant resulting in too thick a stand. On the other hand, if conditions are even slightly averse many of the shriveled seeds may fail to

germinate, resulting in a thin, uneven stand subject to weed competition and without potential for maximum yields," Petr said.

PRUSSIC ACID OR CYANIDE POISONING IN LIVESTOCK

Livestock producers should be alerted to the fact that a prussic acid buildup may occur in certain

plants that have been stressed by drought followed by a rain that causes the formation of new growth. Serious cattle losses have already occurred in certain areas of North Central Texas and may occur in other areas where conditions cause a buildup of toxicity in stressed plants. There are many plants containing the toxic principal that can poison livestock, however, some of the more common are Johnson grass, Sorghum, Sorghum hybrids, Sudan grass, Choke cherry, Black cherry and even Flax. The hydrocyanic acid is not found in appreciable quantities in healthy growing plants. The acid develops only when the normal growth of plants has been re-

tarded or stopped by drought, bruising, trampling, wilting or following a frost. Some areas of Texas have suffered from drought, and if a rain or shower occurs, the resulting growth may become very dangerous if eaten by animals or made into hay and fed before the hydrocyanic acid is completely released.

Prussic acid poisoning works rapidly and affected animals rarely survive more than 1 or 2 hours. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes of eating toxic material and may die within 2 or 3 minutes.

1. Don't forget that wilted or new growth of Johnson grass, Sudan grass, Sorghum or Sor-

ghum hybrids may be dangerous.

2. Suspect material can be checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory or a local veterinarian if he has the test material. If samples of forage are sent to the labs, about a pound of forage from different areas should be collected, packed in a plastic bag, and repacked in a refrigerated container for shipment. This can be handled by the veterinarian, if so desired.

3. Hungry cattle or horses should not be turned in a pasture with plants that may prove dangerous. Animals that have been filled up on hay and are not hungry are less apt to be poisoned when turned into potentially dangerous fields.

4. Call a veterinarian immediately if cyanide poisoning is suspected and tell him what you think may be the problem. He can then be prepared to bring an antidote for the poison. Speed is important since the toxic principal works very rapidly. Cattle-men may want to have several bottles of antidote on hand for emergency use. A veterinarian can provide the product and instructions for its use.

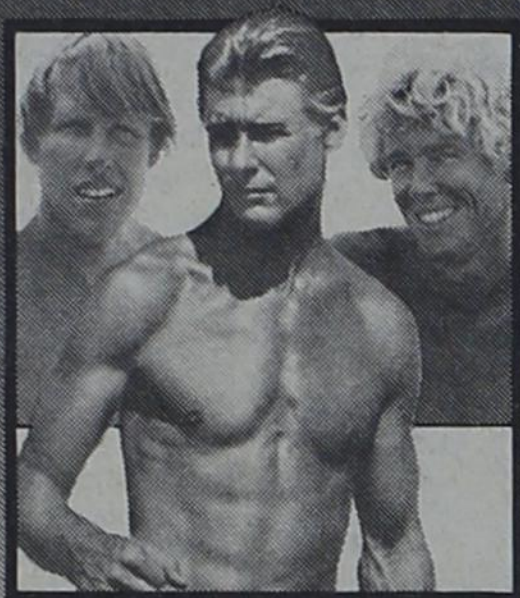

WATER SUPPLY ON RANGELAND

The distribution of water on rangeland is very important. The larger the pasture the more important it becomes. When water is properly placed it helps spread the stock uniformly and helps prevent over grazing and increases uniform use of the grass. It is also a safeguard against drought when some locations are without water. It makes livestock management easier and helps livestock remain in better condition. It can help prevent gullies due to excessive trailing by livestock.

Where to locate water facilities can be a big problem. First it will depend on the availability of water. Where availability is not a problem make sure it is accessible and not in a rough area.

Avoid water in one end of a long narrow pasture. Locate so stock can graze in all directions from the water. Cattle normally graze into the wind so locate water where stock can fan out in grazing going to and from the water. Space water so stock will travel no more than two miles on smooth land, one mile in rolling country and less than a mile in rough country.

If the Soil Conservation Service can be of help in water or water related problems please call or come by the office in Wheeler.

EXIT A FOUR LETTER WORD YOU SHOULD USE

Rebuilt to twice its original size after being destroyed by fire in 1970, the Beverly Hills Supper Club in Southgate, Kentucky, boasted the title "Showplace of the Nation." Offering top names in the entertainment field in a luxurious suburban setting, the club was indeed a showplace. It included a large nightclub and two floors of elegant dining rooms, party rooms, and liquor lounges. But the show place was again reduced to charred ruins on Saturday night, May 28, 1977.

That night an electrical fire broke out in one of the party rooms. Employees battled the blaze with portable extinguishers for 15 minutes before giving up and calling the fire department. By this time, smoke was traveling fast throughout the building. A 16-year-old busybody, Walter Bailey, realized what was hap-pening and interrupted a comedy act to announce there was a fire. He pointed to two exits and told the audience to walk out either one.

"The worst thing was that a lot of people didn't believe me when I said there was a fire," Bailey later lamented. Some people began to file out, but since the comedians kept up their rou-tine after Bailey's announce-ment, many thought he was part of the act. Thick smoke soon made it obvious that the building was on fire, and panic took hold. A mad dash to the exits overturned closely spaced tables and chairs. People tripped, fell and were trampled. The lights went out, blinding those who could still see through the smoke. Those who made it to the exits found themselves in a maze of narrow corridors crowded with people fleeing from other rooms. Only a small number of the club's exits led directly outside. One group located a door leading to the roof, only to find it locked. In the end, 164 died and scores were injured.

An investigation of the fire by Kentucky state authorities re-vealed that the Beverly Hills violated numerous building and fire safety codes. The electrical wiring was not up to standard. The interior finish of the club burned like paper. There was neither a sprinkler system nor fire walls to keep the fire from spreading. Exits were inade-quate, hard to find, and, in at least one instance, locked. In addition, the club was packed to about twice its capacity. All this, plus mass panic led to high death toll.

The NFPA estimates that in 1975, there were 41,500 fires in public places and that more than half of these occurred in restau-rants, taverns, and nightclubs. Certainly, building and fire safety laws need to be enforced. But no matter how conscientious law makers, building inspectors and owner-operators are, the potential for fire will still exist, in restaurants and night clubs, careless disposal of smoking materials is always a possibility especially considering that patrons often are drinking. Food service establishments also have the danger of kitchen fires.

Osteen, Clermont, Fla.; Jewell Epperson, Bonham, Tex.; Roy Epperson, Windom, Tex.; A. L. and nannie Mae Chaffin, Gainesville, Texas; Lena Cole and a friend from Clyde, Tex.; Genevieve and Jim Baird, Austin, Texas; Nora Cole, Abilene, Tex.; Oleto and Gene Stewart, Abilene, Tex.; and Joe and Sis Massengale, Hoover, Texas. All in all there were 157 in attendance this year. In 1976 the count was 155.

upward floor by floor to put out the balze. When it was over, 119 of the hotel's 258 occupants were dead and about 90 injured.

Among the dead was Frank W. Winecoff who designed it without fire escapes and with only one staircase because it was a "fire-proof" building. He overlooked the fact that although the struc-ture of the building would with-stand fire, the interior would not. The walls of the Winecoff were lined with painted burlap, the windows framed with wood, and furniture, drapes and bedding amde with flammable fabrics.

Many famous fires occurred in so-called "fireproof" buildings. The worst fire in a public place in this country also occurred in a "fireproof" building. Six hun-dred two people, mostly women and children, lost their lives when the Iroquois Theater in Chicago caught fire during a matinee performance a few days after Christmas, 1903. Highly combustible plush drapes, thick carpeting, and hemphilled seats fed the flames that resulted when a spark from a floodlight ignited scenery.

The fire escapes had not been completed and emergency exits were hidden, locked and opened inward. In addition, the regular exits from the galleries all led into one corridor, funneling hundreds of panicky people into a relatively small area. Panic throughout the theater led a many people being trampled to death. All this in a theater that had been advertised as "absol-utely fireproof."

No building is fireproof. Slow burning materials used in the construction of a building and for its furnishings and finishes only make a building resist burning, allowing more time for escape. Today, more buildings are fire resistive both inside and out and are designed with the need for fast emergency evacuation in mind. But don't depend on the foresight of others to save you in a fire. History has shown that the result can be disastrous.

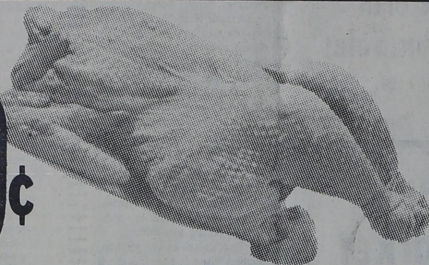
