Chimp Parachutes After 2-Orbit Trip

Kennedy Sees Short Term For Reservists

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy today told men called into military service they may get out of uniform within less than a year.

Urging them not to grumble in the meantime, he said they provide the strength to spare the United States a choice between humiliation and a holocaust.

Somewhat heatedly, Kennedy took note at a news conference of newspaper stories reporting discomfited and possible shortcomings in equipment and training programs for reservists and National Guardsmen summoned to service as a result of the East-West crisis over Berlin.

The president said his administration—contrary to some speculation—never intended to hold men called up for more than a year.

He said he said it to let them out before the end of the 12-month period for which they were originally ordered to service.

Kennedy also observed that Congress approved the call-up

which the administration initiated last summer.

Kennedy, in a clear attempt to bolster the morale of the reservists and guardsmen whose lives were disturbed by the muster of additional strength, said the soldier on duty in a "cold and windy camp" is rendering the most valuable service as an airplane on 15-minute alert with the Strategic Air Command.

Kennedy said his administration had felt the nation lacked adequate conventional military strength.

He said the armed forces were increased "to prevent a war, not to fight a war."

"We want to have a choice between humiliation and holocaust," Kennedy said with reference to a middle ground between surrender and the devastation of nuclear war.

Kennedy declared once again that this country wants to negotiate a peaceful settlement of East-West issues "but does not intend to surrender."

He said a key point in any future negotiations with the Soviet Union will be the question of internationalization of the autobahn road route to Berlin.

The president covered a wide range of questions in the news conference.

In the midst of the half-hour session with 372 newsmen and onlookers he announced that the space shuttle "Columbus" had taken off at 10:07 a.m. from Cape Canaveral, Fla.

"He reports that everything is perfect and working well," Kennedy said as his audience roared with laughter.

Kennedy, in reply to questions about the show of U.S. force over the Dominican Republic last week, said the "United States would be most concerned" if one country in this hemisphere moved against another with force.

The president had been asked if the United States was prepared to use force to thwart any attempt by the regime of Fidel Castro in Cuba, for instance, to overthrow another government.

Lands Safely In Atlantic

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Space chimp Enos, his intended three-orbit trip cut in two because of trouble with capsule systems, parachuted safely into the Atlantic 500 miles southeast of Bermuda today.

Two destroyers, the Stines and the Compton, steamed toward the landing area as several aircraft took up the search for the capsule which was brought down by scientists decided to terminate the flight.

The capsule landed at 1:28 p.m. EST, three hours and 21 minutes after it rode an Atlas rocket into the sky from Cape Canaveral at 10:07 a.m.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported radio signals from the capsule indicated the chimp was in good condition when he landed.

A P-5M search aircraft sighted the capsule as it parachuted toward the water and seven minutes after the capsule hit, the plane reported that it was floating upright.

An announcement from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration at 1:10 p.m. said that "as the spacecraft-travelled across the Pacific Ocean near the end of its second orbit, stations detected increased inverter temperatures and an attitude control action other than normal."

The announcement said a signal was sent to reset the satellite clock in the cockpit so that it would fire the reverse rockets as it would slow the orbital speed from 17,800 miles an hour so that the capsule would pass gradually across the southern United States to the landing.

The clock fired the rockets at 1:08 p.m.

When the decision was made to bring the capsule down, the chimp reportedly still was in excellent condition and performing his tasks, receiving banana pellets and sips of water as his reward.

There was no further explanation from NASA on just how the inverter and controls were affected.

An inverter is a device used to switch electrical current from AC to DC to run certain spacecraft systems. This apparently was overheated.

The attitude control system relies on electronic detectors to determine whether the spacecraft is on the proper course.

If it is not, signals are sent to hydrogen peroxide-driven jets on the side of the capsule. The jet action returns it to the proper course.

Officials announced that the Cape Canaveral tracking facility made contact with the descending capsule at 1:18 p.m. and all indications were that Enos was in good condition.

Just what effect the suddenly terminated flight might have on U.S. plans to send up a man for a space orbit before the end of the year was uncertain.

NASA had planned to go all out on such a program. If today's flight was wholly successful and was scheduled to name the man to make the trip at a news conference later today.

The freckle-faced astrochimp, a 37½ pound native of Africa's French Cameroons, tipped away from Cape Canaveral at 10:07 a.m. EST atop a thundering Atlas rocket. The huge Atlas performed perfectly and blasted the two-ton, bell-shaped capsule into an orbit ranging from 99 to 146 miles high. The speed was about 17,800 miles an hour.

In swift succession, tracking stations at Bermuda, a mid-Atlantic ship, the Canary Islands, Nigeria, Zanzibar and an Indian Ocean ship reported that the flight was proceeding normally, all spacecraft systems were working, and the tiny passenger was doing his job correctly.

A report from the flight surgeon at the Mercury control center at Cape Canaveral said Enos, a 3½ year old male, had not missed a trick, indicating that his ability to function was not hindered in any way by the crushing force of blastoff or the initial entry into the weird world of weightlessness.

A few minutes of the intended 4½ hour ride.

The orbits were to take an average of 80½ minutes, which would mean an end of the flight at 2:37 p.m. EST if it would not become necessary to terminate it earlier. It was scheduled to land about 200 miles southeast of here.

A tape-recorded voice message was being received clearly from the capsule.

A huge recovery force of ships and planes was in the impact zone.

Hearing Set On Mexican Workers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Several moves are under way to restrict the movement of Mexican workers into the United States.

The Labor Department has called a hearing here Dec. 8 on admission of Mexican farm laborers.

Attention is directed to a provision of law permitting the department to ban Mexican recruiting if it is found to affect adversely the wages and working conditions of U.S. workers.

The Texas State AFL-CIO has filed a federal suit here to enjoin the Justice Department and Immigration Service from permitting Mexican workers to commute regularly from their homes to U.S. jobs, particularly at Laredo and El Paso.

The moves are generally aimed at keeping out Mexican and Canadian contenders for jobs wanted by Americans. They could result in raising considerably the labor costs in nonfarm employment in U.S. communities along both borders and in U.S. farm areas generally.

The Kennedy administration lost an attempt earlier this year to get Congress to amend the Mexican Farm Worker Import Law to require payment of wages to Mexicans substantially the same as the wage levels paid to domestic farm labor.

Kennedy then signed with reluctance a two-year extension of the

South Africa Is Condemned Again In U. N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The U.N. General Assembly voted a new condemnation of South Africa's white supremacy laws Tuesday night but ruled out punitive boycotts or possible expulsion from the United Nations at this time.

Asian-African efforts to call for harsh trade and diplomatic penalties that would isolate South Africa, as well as a move to ask the Security Council to expel South Africa, failed to get the two-thirds majority needed for approval.

The United States, Britain, France and other nations accused of colonialism by the Communist and Asian-African nations asked that the anti-apartheid legislation be dropped. The United States and Africa to change it.

The Security Council shelved Cuba's complaint against the stationing of U.S. warships off the Dominican Republic as a show of support for President Joaquin Balaguer. No member of the 11-nation council, including the Soviet Union was willing to back up Cuba's charges with a formal resolution.

The United States and the Soviet Union launched a new round of private talks in an attempt to break the deadlock on resumption of disarmament negotiations.

Latimer May Run For Senate Post

Truett Latimer, 33 state representative from Taylor County in the last five biennial sessions of the Texas Legislature, is "seriously considering" making the race for the Texas Senate from the 24th District, he said Tuesday.

Latimer said he has been giving increasingly serious consideration to the Senate post as the urging of friends and supporters. The 24th District consists of Stonewall, Borden, Garza, Kent, Haskell, Taylor, Shackelford, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Howard, Mitchell and Nolan counties.

The Taylor County representative was elected to the Legislature in 1952 from a field of four candidates. He has been re-elected for each two-year term since then. He has held many numerous committee posts including chairman and vice-chairmanship of several important legislative committees. He has served as one of the Legislature's 43 standing committees, including two terms on water,

three on agriculture, four on insurance and two on appropriations. Latimer has sponsored numerous pieces of legislation of state-wide significance. In 1955 he helped rewrite the insurance code which restored order to the then-chaotic insurance industry, Texas' second largest business.

He was the author of the 1957 Texas Feed Control Act, the Texas Feed Control Act of 1957, and legislation calling for study of possible Constitutional revision. He also was the House sponsor of the bill creating the West Central Texas Municipal Water District which now is constructing a vast reservoir on Hubbard Creek in Stephens County to serve the cities of Breckenridge, Albany, Anson and Abilene.

Latimer was born in Albany, Texas. He graduated from Luaders High School and received the bachelor of arts degree from Hardin-Simmons University where he now is employed as alumni director.

It's Not Merchandise That's Needed, But Salesmanship

Some two or three months ago, Luther Hodges, U. S. Secretary of Commerce, wrote a sound magazine article in which he declared that a lot of American economic ailments could be cured by good, old-fashioned, aggressive salesmanship.

He wrote wistfully of the days not very far distant when a salesman SOLD, and a product sold. He spoke glowingly of the time when a salesman took the initiative, showed his wares with pride, knew his merchandise, displayed interest in the prospective purchaser and rejoiced in making a sale.

Frankly, it read like ancient history. But I, too, can remember those halcyon days, not too long gone. Mr. Hodges begged for their revival in the interest of increasing the gross national product and upping the annual industrial output. But there is certainly no point in producing more goods and gear as long as salesmanship, once thought of as an American art, is no longer practiced.

Come to think of it, I can't remember when last an enthusiastic salesman or woman tried to sell me anything for my home or myself. I have memories only of frustrating attempts to get indifferent salespeople to permit me to buy a new dress or a carpet.

"Indifference" is the key word in selling today. Walk into any retail store across the nation, not just in New York alone, and try, try to flag the attention of the sales person. Whether it is a neighborhood grocery store or an upper crust about the retail battle today is not for "good" Mr. Hodges' attention from clerks who once were employed to wait on customers.

But salespeople now are hired to entertain each other, to gather in little knots of two and three behind counters and exchange confidences so fascinating that they are oblivious to customers who should drop dead.

Recently I have been interested in kitchen equipment—the whole works, from cabinets to sinks to electrical appliances. I spent a fruitless two hours in the widely advertised and much wanted kitchen department of one of New York's biggest stores a few days ago without being able to get anyone to show the slightest interest in selling me anything.

A dozen idle salesmen stood on the floor. Each time I approached one and asked to see, say, a wall oven, or a dishwasher, the salesman, without exception, would jerk a thumb in some nebulous direction and say, "It's over there." In two hours, no one offered to show me a single cabinet or appliance, much less sell his amateur standing by attempting to explain any piece of equipment or sell it to me.

Now kitchens today are all made by Carrier and are sold by the carat. I point this out only to prove that what I was shopping for was not a cotton handkerchief but a solid gold Cadillac. Still, no one was interested in waiting on me, in finding out what I wanted, or in showing me, for example, a brand new stove which has just come onto the market and how it works.

I was in the vernacular, a pigeon and a pigeon with a sizable sum of money to spend. But not a salesman in the kitchen department would trouble himself to get up off his self-upholstery and sell. Their detachment—or, shall I say, non-involvement—was complete.

After two hours, I finally dawned on me that I couldn't force these people to sell me anything. So I left.

Well, that was one end of town. At the other, or haute couture, terminus I tried to buy a winter coat ten days ago. Although the sales personnel's non-alignment was a total, I finally broke through the ice of neutrality and persuaded a grand duchess to sell me a coat. I am still waiting for the coat. The store tells me the salesgirl lost it or something.

La, maybe we could get the economy off its dead center if we could get the salespeople off their's.

Fats, Oils Near Record

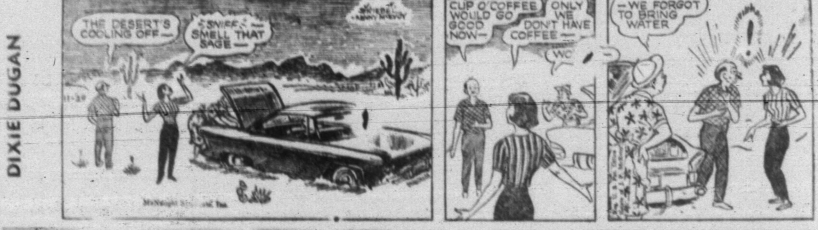
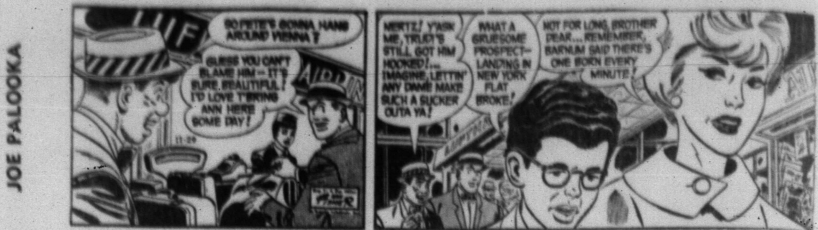

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States again will supply almost one-third of the world's trade in fats and oils this year, the Agriculture Department said today.

Fats and oils are moving in international trade at a near record volume. World exports in 1961 are forecast at almost 9 million short tons, only fractionally less than last year's record and almost 40 per cent more than the 1950-54 average.

U.S. production is estimated at a record 8,339,000 short tons this year, with exports of 2,681,000 short tons. World production of fats, oils and tallow for 1961 is expected to total a record 32.3 million tons, 3 per cent above last year.

WASHINGTON (AP)—This year's apple crop is turning out to be larger than expected, with supplies particularly heavy in Michigan, New York and New England.

Lions Hear AF Officer

Captain Charles Smith, Information Officer at Webb Air Force Base, addressed the Downtown Lions Club at their regular weekly luncheon meeting yesterday. Captain Smith described the new basic trainer, the T-38, soon to be put in use by the Pilot Training Squadron at Webb. The T-38s are arriving at Webb at the rate of two to four a week and are now being used for instructor familiarization and transition. The first class to be instructed in the new ship will be in April. At that time Webb will have some 72 of the new T-38s. The twin-engine trainer is built by Northrup Aviation as a transitional trainer between the subsonic T-33 and the super-sonic Century series fighters. They have a rate-of-climb of 30,000 feet per minute. On single engine operation they can climb out at 6,000 feet per minute. Each T-38 costs \$700,000. Student pilots will have about 12-months training in the T-38.

Deepest Producer In State Completed

HOUSTON (AP)—The Gulf Oil Corp. says the deepest producing well in Texas has been completed 13 miles southeast of Pecos. Gulf's No. 2 Cleveland wildcat in Reeves County was tested from perforations at 17,200 feet with a calculated open flow of 37 million cubic feet of gas a day, the company said Tuesday. Total depth was 17,720. The Parker Drilling Co. of Tulsa was the contractor. The announcement said the well represents the first production from the Ellenberger formation in the Delaware Basin. The previous producing depth record was 16,600 feet in the No. 1 J. C. Kelly well that belongs to Atlantic Refining Co.

When Does Home Become Mobile?

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—When is a mobile home a mobile home? Only when it can move, says Jacksonville Northey C. Cox, who wants the city to require proof of mobility before exempting mobile homes from property taxes. He suggested an ordinance requiring house trailers to pass a highway test each month—just as the city requires boats tied at the city dock to prove their seaworthiness with a four-hour cruise each month. "Most of these trailers are not mobile, he said. They are fixed permanent homes. But we get no taxes from them, other real estate taxes or personal property."
