Rev. David Griffin Named Outstanding Citizen

The Rev. David Griffin, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Bogata, was elected Outstanding Citizen of the Year of Bogata at the Annual Chamber of

Commerce Banquet Saturday, March 22 at the school cafeteria.

Griffin was elected from official ballots placed at Buckman Drug Store in Bogata. James Wood, president of the Chamber of Commerce, commented that a number of people had been nominated, but that Griffin had received the largest number of votes.

Griffin has been a pastor in Bogata for five years, but will begin a new ministry in South Texas after June 1. He has been involved in scouting and other youth related programs, and was named Rural Minister of the Year for the North Texas Conference in 1979. Frontier Day in Bogata has been partially directed by Griffin.

Burglaries Cleared With Arrests

The 6:30 a.m. Saturday, March 22 arrest of a Deport man, Richard Earl Davidson, 21, ended a string of burglaries from Cunningham to DeKalb, including the Feb. 14 burglaries of Tide, Inc., Community Public Service and Deport Welding.

A Deport juvenile was also arrested in connection with some of the burglaries, and both are presently being held in Bowie County Jail in DeKalb. Davidson is under a \$25,000 bond for armed robbery.

Mark Whitehouse, Red River County Deputy Sheriff who took custody of the men Saturday, March 22 from the Paris Police said that on Friday night, March 21, the pair stole a car in Paris, drove to Clarksville and abandoned the car behind the Sonic Drive Inn. They walked through town, broke into Gilbert Motors and took a TV set from the office, then took another car, Whitehouse said. They drove to Avery, where they

burglarized a Mobil Station, and broke into the Avery Cafe, where they burglarized a cigarette machine and juke box and kitchen.

From Avery, Whitehouse continued, they drove to DeKalb, where the pair robbed a lady in a washateria at knifepoint, then to Annona, where they took the cash register from Annona Gulf, and finally to Cunningham, where they burglarized the Musgrove Country Store. Whitehouse said the boys continued to Blossom, where they threw the cash register and the purse into the Blossom City Lake.

The arrest also cleared 19 burglaries in Red River County, Whitehouse said, including the Jan. 25 burglary of Turner's Dry Goods, Ace Hardware, Bogie's Cafe and the Bogata VFW. Feb. 15 burglaries cleared included the Exxon Service Station in Avery, City Beauty Shop, Avery Cafe, Gids Mobil Service and Moore's Grocery in Avery. March 13 burglaries cleared included Bearden Insurance Agency in Avery, Community Public Service in Detroit, Wagon Wheel Cafe, Detroit Propane, Detroit Superette, Turner's Dry Goods and Joe Ford's Grocery.

March 21 burglaries cleared were Annona Gulf, Avery Cafe and Gids Mobil Station in Avery. Officers recovered food and money taken from Avery Cafe, \$92 taken in the armed robbery.

Davidson was on parole in Lamar County at the time of his arrest.

The burglaries which occurred on Feb. 14 in Deport included the theft of a

new one ton truck and safe, which was loaded on the truck and taken to Blossom.

There the burglars attempted to open the safe, got the truck stuck in the mud,

burned the motor up and tried to get unstuck with a stolen tractor.

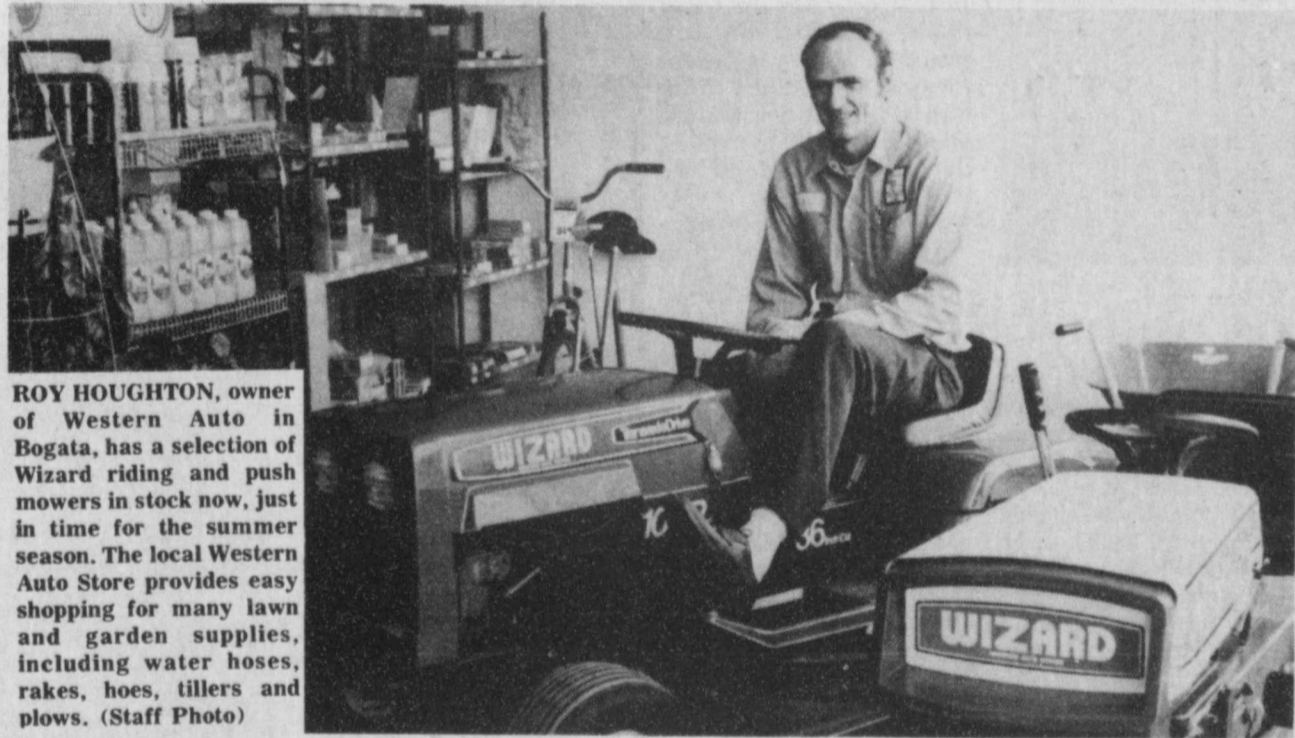

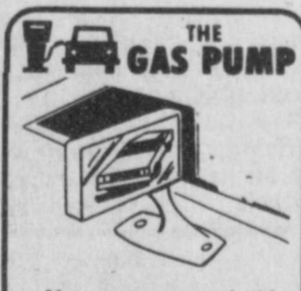

Weekly Ag Update

By Herb Brevard
East Texans have experienced a wide variety of weather during the past week. The cold temperatures and high winds have delayed some agricultural activities. Dr. Ken Smith, area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, advises landowners to be extremely careful and to delay application of herbicides during windy days. Grassburrs will be germinating during early April and Smith suggests that herbicides for their control be applied as soon as possible. Simazine has done a good job of grassbur control for many producers. All label directions should be strictly followed.

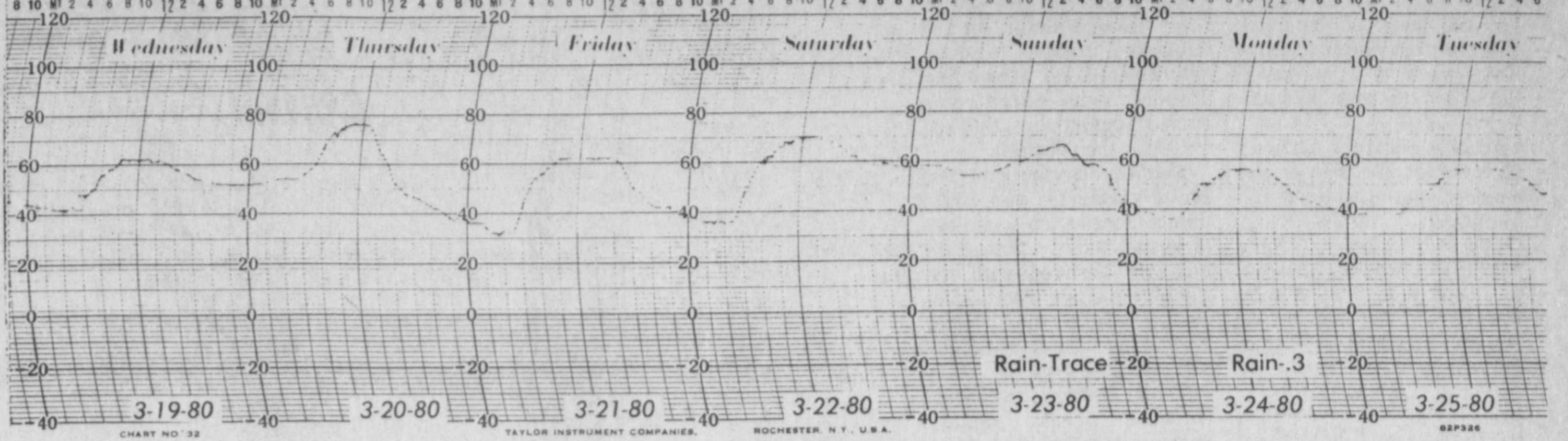
Before applying fertilizer to hay meadows, producers should control the weeds. Smith says that an acre can produce only a given amount of forage and it is up to the landowner whether the production is weeds or high quality grass.

Producers should try to get two cuttings of hay before hot weather. The first cuttings should be the best quality if weeds are controlled. Therefore, producers should try to get a major part of their hay needs from these two cuttings. Meadows can then be grazed during the hot months when lower quality forage is growing.



Use your rear and side-view mirrors often to "drive behind" as well as ahead and you'll have an advantage in the mileage game. Besides being a safety habit, using the mirrors lets you avoid many turns and stops, thus saving momentum and gasoline.

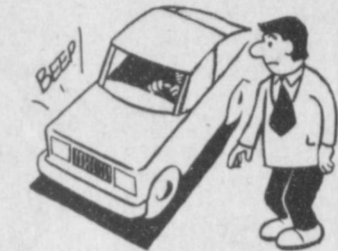
