Government Cuts Down On Commodity Program

Coleman City Secretary Danny Jameson received word last week that the government food program will be drastically reduced in the months ahead and that the available commodities may be down to a trickle after the distribution in May. The food given away in Santa Anna is distributed from Coleman.

Previously it had been announced that honey and rice would be deleted from March orders to be distributed

in April. Now it is announced that cheese and non-fat milk will not be available after the May distribution. This leaves flour, cornmeal and butter; however butter was cut in half the past year and cornmeal and flour have been on limited supply for some time.

Thus it appears that the supply of surplus government commodities has been exhausted. The future of the program is very uncertain at this

Super Tuesday Countdown Begins, See Sample Ballots

The much talked about "Super Tuesday" is just about here and Texas voters are having to make some tough decisions about their voting this time around. You may vote in either the Democratic primary or in the Republican, but not in both. With County races heating up, the decision of where to cast one's ballot is even harder to make, since the local races are essentially Democratic.

Primary day was a lot easier for the average Texan voter when this was a one-party state. But the rise of Republicanism in the state has created a dilemma for the erstwhile Republican voters. Although the party has grown in strength, vestiges of an all-Democratic Texas remains, especially at the local level.

Recognizing this dilemma is easy. Proposing a solution isn't—at least not for this Super Tuesday.

Of course, the Presidential

primaries are of vital concern to all voters and should take much consideration while choices are being made.

In a recent survey of Southern voters, Bush was shown to be the leading contender among the Republican candidates favored by 43 percent of Republican voters most likely to vote on March 8, with Dole favored by 25 percent. The Dole forces said their prospects were particularly bleak in Texas, which offers the biggest single cache of Super Tuesday delegates. The survey showed Robertson with 19 percent and Kemp 5 percent.

Dukakis was a narrower favorite in the Democratic survey, at 21 percent, and Jackson second with 13 percent. Jackson is showing strength both nationally and in the south. He leads in polls in Virginia and in South Carolina and is second in North Carolina.

Polls also indicate large numbers of undecided voters among the

Democrats, 25 percent or more in many places.

The race between the incumbent State Senator Grant Jones and his challenger Temple Dickson will also be a race to contend with when trying to decide which polling place to enter as they are not opposed from the Republican camp, although the name of Rex Andrews will appear on the Republican Ballot for the District 24 Senate race. Andrews dropped out of the race within a day of his announcing, but too late to have his name removed from the ballot.

In addition to expressing their preference for presidential candidates, statewide office holders and legislators, Texas voters will get to have their say on two controversial issues as part of the March 8 "Super Tuesday" election.

Not that their votes are going to settle those issues...since the issues are only on the ballot as non-binding referenda.

Voters in the Republican primary will be able to vote on whether English should be the official language of Texas, while Democratic voters will be able to express their feelings on whether Texas should continue to elect its judges.

The GOP ballot provides that "English should be established as the official language of the state of Texas and the United States of America. Since the Constitution does not give the Federal Government authority to regulate language use, the matter is considered to be reserved to the states.

Democrats won't be voting on an official language but they will be voting (in Spanish and in English, as will the Republicans) on whether "Texas shall maintain their right to select judges by direct vote of the people rather than to change to an appointed process created by the legislature.

Absentee voting for both the Democratic and the republican primaries continues through Friday, March 4. Personal appearance absentee voting is conducted at the county clerk's office in the Coleman County courthouse. Absentee ballots sent by mail had to be in the County Clerk's office by Tuesday March 1.

In Santa Anna the Democrat polling place will be at the Coleman County Telephone Co-op and in Rockwood voters wishing to vote Democrat will cast their ballots at the Community Center.

The Republican polling site for both Santa Anna and Rockwood will be the Lion's Club building in Santa Anna.

All polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Polling Places Designated

Polling places in Santa Anna and Rockwood for the Democrat and the Republican primaries to be held Tuesday, March 8, have been designated.

In Santa Anna, the Democrats will hold their primary election at the Coleman County Telephone building and the precinct convention will begin at 7:15 p.m., also at the Telephone Co-Op building.

CHRISTIANITY

What is Christianity?

Is it a name which we hide behind in order to try and show others we are better than them? Is it an organization we've joined so that we might have social standing? A word we use to give us special privileges? Or is it something we've rejected because we feel too many others claim it for all the wrong reasons? Have we chosen to be called Christians because our parents were called Christians or because of a personal experience with the Lord?

Every denomination that teaches Christianity, or the religion of Jesus Christ, bases itself on the Holy Bible. No group or person calling themselves Christians has been able to live without the Bible.

Without the Bible it would be impossible to tell you of our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, or to show the folly of being sinful and the wisdom of being good. From first to last it points out that sin always meets with punishment and that goodness meets with reward. This is the basis of every religion that is really a religion, and the Bible teaches it better than any book.

Webster defines Christian as "A person professing belief in Jesus as the Christ, or in the religion based on the teachings of Jesus—having the qualities demonstrated and taught by Jesus Christ, as love, kindness, etc."

We find the story of Jesus' life and teachings in the New Testament. Always sinless, always good, always thinking of His Father in heaven, always mindful of His human brethren, the son of God lived His earthly life, and perished on the cross at Calvary, giving His life as an everlasting sacrifice for the redemption of the creatures God had made so many ages before "in His own image."

And then after the death and resurrection of Jesus we are told of the devoted band of apostles, chosen by Jesus Himself, to go out into the world and preach His religion. They were called Christians because of what they believed and what they stood for. Jesus set down only two or three rules, but they were great ones. "Believe in me and ye shall have everlasting life," "Do unto others as ye would have them do unto you," and "Love me and keep My commandments" were the things He ordered. Never did He turn a repentant sinner away, knowing that His Father would not do so. Thus is God constantly giving men chances to save themselves, as He has done from the time He first put Adam on the earth. This, then, is the basic teaching of the Bible and Christianity: that man always has a chance if he will repent of his sins and obey God's laws.

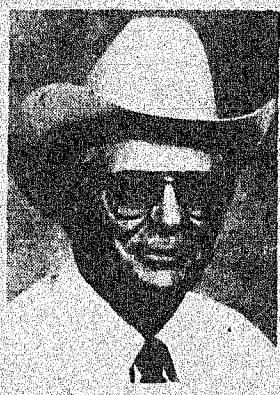

You May Have Unclaimed Money

Forgotten something? Something like a utility deposit from college? Or a savings account opened when your children were young but never use? Maybe your Uncle Ned had a producing oil well or two that he never got around to telling anyone about.

The Texas State Treasury can help you find lost accounts such as these and more. On Sunday, March 6, newspapers across the state will publish a list of 75,000 Texans who have more than \$50 million in lost or forgotten money in accounts ranging from checking and savings accounts to oil royalties and corporate stocks.

Persons who find their name on the list may reclaim their property by calling the State Treasury, toll free at 1-800-321-2274 or by writing to the State Treasury at P.O. Box 12608, Capitol Station, Austin, Tex. 78711.

"There is no set time limit for making a claim," Treasurer Ann Richards emphasized. "Please be patient if you are calling on the toll-free number, especially in the first few days after the list is published. You can be assured that if you have money coming to you, you will get it."

She said that last year, the State Treasury published a similar list and about \$50 million was reunited with owners.

Under state law, checking and savings accounts, mineral royalties, insurance payments, safe deposit boxes, utility deposits and the like are turned over to the state if accounts are inactive for at least three years.

The state may use the funds for general state services and for education, but the owners or their heirs may file a claim at any time in the future for the money held by the state.

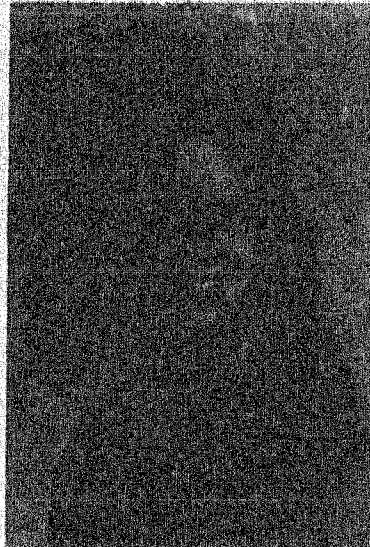

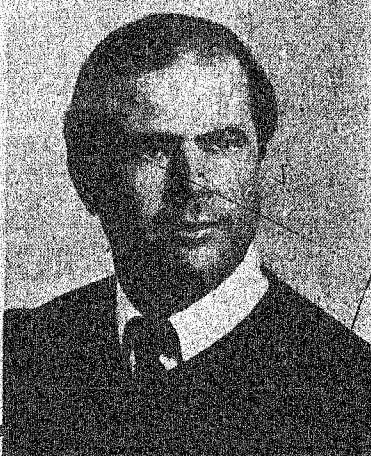
