Following is the list of dates issued by Lysterla:

May 15: Last day to file for Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, Representative in Congress, State Senator or Representative, District Judge or District Attorney.

June 5: Last day to file for state offices with the executive committee.

June 17: Last day to file for county and precinct offices.

June 19: County Executive Committee determines the order of names on the ballot and assesses costs.

June 22: First day for filing first campaign expense report; state and district candidates' reports filed with the secretary of state; county candidates, with county clerk.

June 26: Last day for first campaign expense report.

July 2: Absentee voting begins.

July 10: First day for second campaign expense report.

July 18: Last day for absentee voting.

July 22: First primary, Precinct conventions held at 2:00 at voting places. Election Judges to make returns to County Clerk as soon as counting completed.

July 29: County Convention.

July 31: Last day for first expense report, second primary.

August 1: Last day for final expense report, first primary.

Engineers To Be Hired In Civil Service Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced an examination for Engineer to fill positions paying from \$4,600 to \$6,400 in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity. A few positions throughout the United States may also be filled. The positions covered by this examination are in all branches of engineering.

To qualify, applicants must (a) have completed a 4-year college course leading to a bachelor's degree in engineering, or (b) have had 4 years of progressive experience in technical engineering, or (c) have had a combination of such education and experience. In addition, they must have had from 2 to 4 years professional experience in engineering, the amount depending on the salary for which they wish to be considered. Pertinent graduate study may be substituted for part of the professional experience. No written test will be given.

Council Canvasses Election Returns

Returns of the April 4th city election were canvassed at a regular meeting of the City Commission Tuesday night, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. The canvass did not change the results of the election.

Rain Gauges Register About One Inch Here Tuesday Night

Economists Are Against Brannan Farm Plan, Magazine Survey Reveals

TOPEKA, Kansas, April 12.—Agricultural economists, who make a business of knowing about farm programs, have rejected the Brannan Farm Plan in a national survey made by a national farm magazine.

The magazine asked economists at state agricultural colleges for a simple "yes" or "no" vote on the proposition as it has been explained by Charles F. Brannan, U. S. Secretary of Agriculture. Of all those who voted, 82.7 per cent were opposed to the plan. Following are the results of their balloting:

Against the Brannan Plan — 359
For the Brannan Plan — 75
Not voting — 27

"Brannan made his proposals for a farm program before the House and Senate Agriculture Committees more than a year ago," the farm magazine said. "He has been talking about it ever since and trying to force it through Congress."

"All he's got to date is a lot of argument. No farm program proposal since McNary-Haugen, just after World War I, has stirred up so much controversy. The ordinary citizen doesn't understand what all the ruckus is about. He has wished somebody would say whether or not we should have the Brannan Plan."

The 17th Decennial Census, to be conducted in April, asks all employed and unemployed persons 14 years of age and over for information on the kinds of work they do. Probably well over 30,000 different occupations will be reported to the Census takers.

In collecting data on occupations in past censuses, the census-takers discovered many odd pursuits. There was the woman who gave her trade as "egg-breaker." For eight hours a day, she broke eggs, to be used in bakeries. Another highly specialized job was that of the man who measures the distance of flight of different breeds of pigeons.

The inventory of Americans at work revealed many other strange ways of making a living. One man ran a "fishworm ranch." Another worked for a tanner as an "unhairer." "Tooth pick flavorer," and "whistle-typer" were reported by two others. In the food industry, there were found a "potato-peeler" in a potato chip factory, a man who spent his days as a "ham sniffer," and one who might be called an "artilleryman," because he shot cereal out of a gun.

In 1940, the enumerators sometimes found the question of occupation touchy. One sensitive young girl, when asked the occupation of the head of the household, replied emphatically, "Electrician." When queried as to the kind of business he plied his trade, she stated reluctantly, "Well, he lights the red lanterns on a sewer construction project."

He was reportedly registered at the hotel under an assumed name.

He was caught in the room of J. M. Maloney of Pennsylvania, who awakened to find the man going through his suit case. He was asked what he was doing, and is said to have replied that he was "looking for Joe."

Maloney examined his pockets and found that the money was missing. He asked the man to return the money but his request was refused, the man denying he had the money. When Maloney described what was missing, the suspect returned it to him.

He was held in the room until officers arrived. Arrest was made by Officer Weldon Page.

The 17th Decennial Census, to be conducted in April, asks all employed and unemployed persons 14 years of age and over for information on the kinds of work they do. Probably well over 30,000 different occupations will be reported to the Census takers.

College Rodeo Event Is Planned By H-U

The largest field in history is expected for the fourth annual Hardin-Simmons University Intercollegiate Rodeo as over 125 members representing 10 states have been invited to attend the three day affair April 27, 28, and 29 at the new \$10,000 Carl Myers Memorial Arena.

A total of 30 colleges and universities from 10 states have been sent entry blanks for the five performances, one Thursday night, and matinee and evening performances Friday and Saturday.

PLUGGED AND ABANDONED

West Bros. and Turnstill have plugged as a dry hole their No. 1 Mrs. Celia McCrea, a shallow oil test northwest of Putnam, it was reported here today.

The best the weather man could promise the Cisco area today was a forecast for increasing cloudiness and probable showers after the first rain in more than two months registered from 7 of an inch to one and a half inches in gauges in this section Tuesday night.

The city hall rain gauge measured 1.2 inches, and a gauge in the west part of town registered 1.4 inches. At Lake Cisco, the fall was 7 of an inch.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal said that Lake Cisco caught very little water due to the drought in the watershed. "It just made what water we had a little wetter," he said.

County Agent J. M. Cooper reported the fall in Eastland was about half an inch. He believed this section received most of the night's moisture. It was understood little or no rain fell south of Cisco.

A slow rain began falling about midnight. Most of the rain fell during a mild thunderstorm about daylight Wednesday.

City firemen were called out at 6 a. m. after lightning ignited electrical wires in the downtown area. The blaze was put out with no damage.

The rain was sufficient for gardening projects to begin, most people believed. One farmer told The Press that "we didn't get as much rain as we needed, but is certainly helped."

Education Survey Questions Being Asked In Census

Among inquiries being made of Americans in the 17th Decennial Census is one which will concern the highest year of school completed. This enumeration also will ascertain the number of children and youths attending school.

Ten years ago, the 16th Decennial Census revealed that the average American was 25 years old and over — that is, old enough to have finished his formal schooling — had completed 8.4 years of school, or slightly more than the elementary grades.

Some portent of what the 1950 Census statistics may reveal about the education attainment of the average adult American is found in the results of a sample survey the Bureau of the Census made in 1947. By 1947 the median year of school completed had risen to 9.0 years, or the completion of one year of high school. The 1947 median for males was 8.9 and for females 9.3 years of school completed.

In 1940, the median number of school years completed for males 20 to 24 years of age still attending school was 14.0, and for females 13.7. In 1947, the median for the comparable group of males had declined to 12.8 years, whereas that for females had risen to 14.0 years. The decline in the median for males was due to the interruption of their schooling by service in the armed forces, or employment in war industry during the years of World War II.

The statistics from the 1950 Census on educational attainment will reveal whether or not the "G. I. Bill" was successful in helping enough war veterans to remain in school a sufficient length of time to raise the educational level for these enrolled males up to the 1940 level.

Progress Noted In Cleanup Project

The city-wide cleanup campaign being conducted this week under the sponsorship of the City of Cisco is making considerable progress, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today.

Pickups of trash and debris in the west part of town were to be completed. The trucks will work in East Cisco on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Mr. Rosenthal asked the cooperation of all residents to make the campaign a success and to prevent the trucks from having to make more than one trip to the various parts of the city.

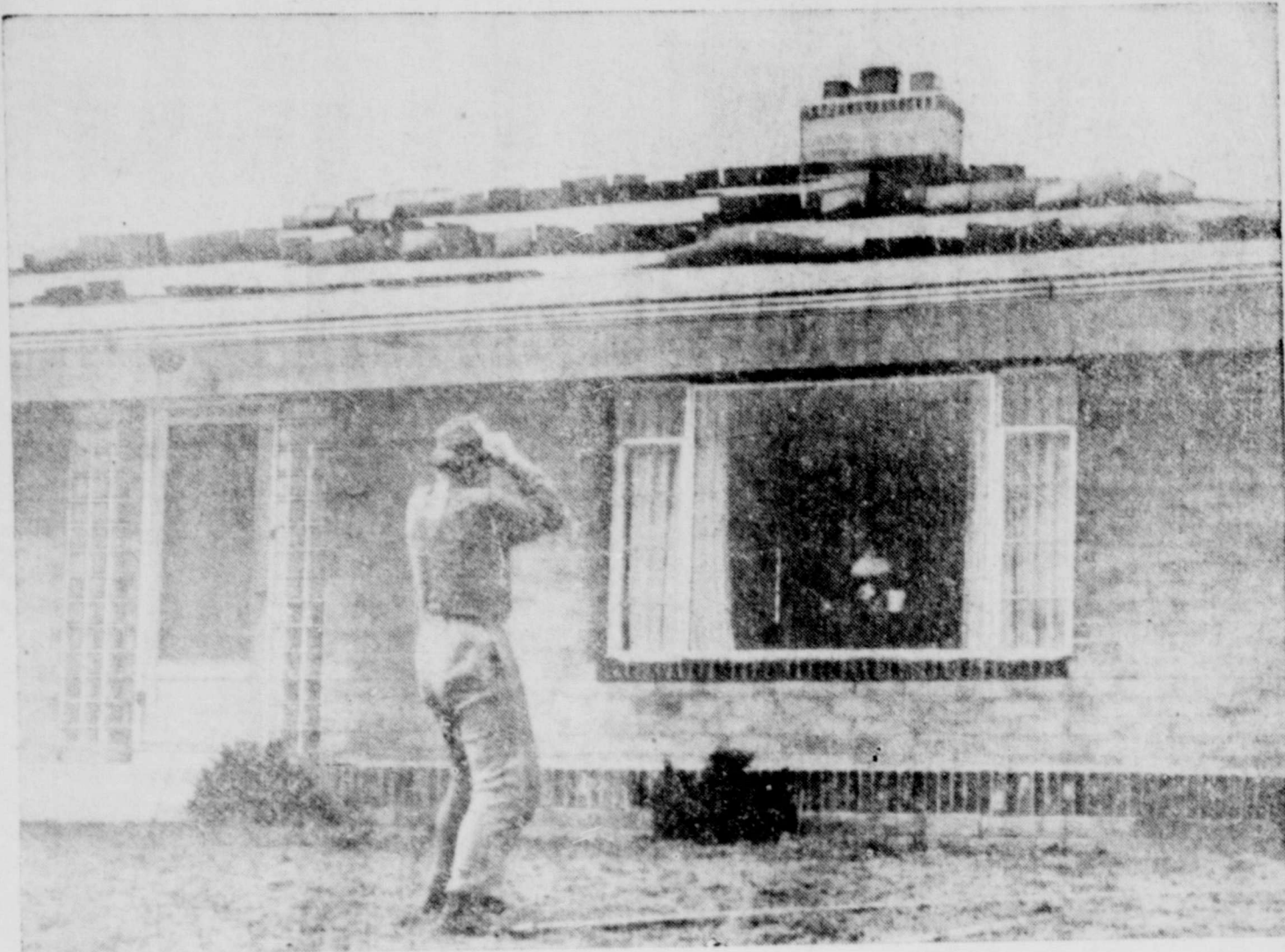

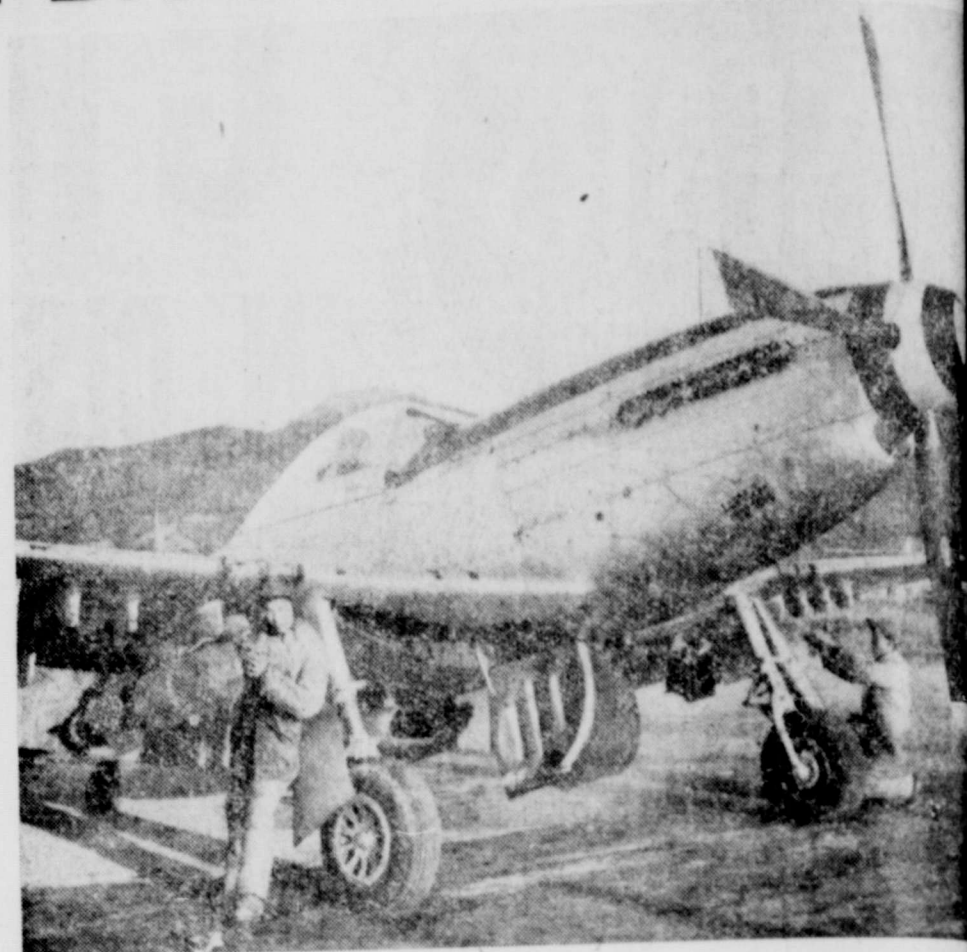

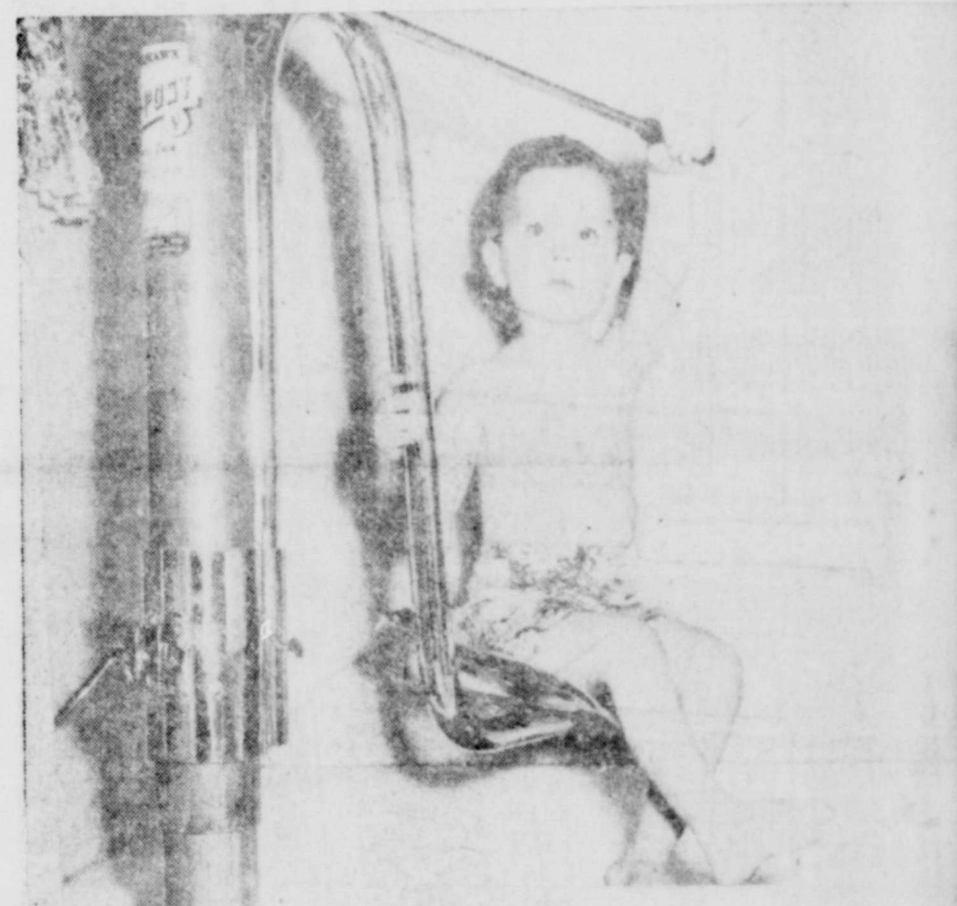

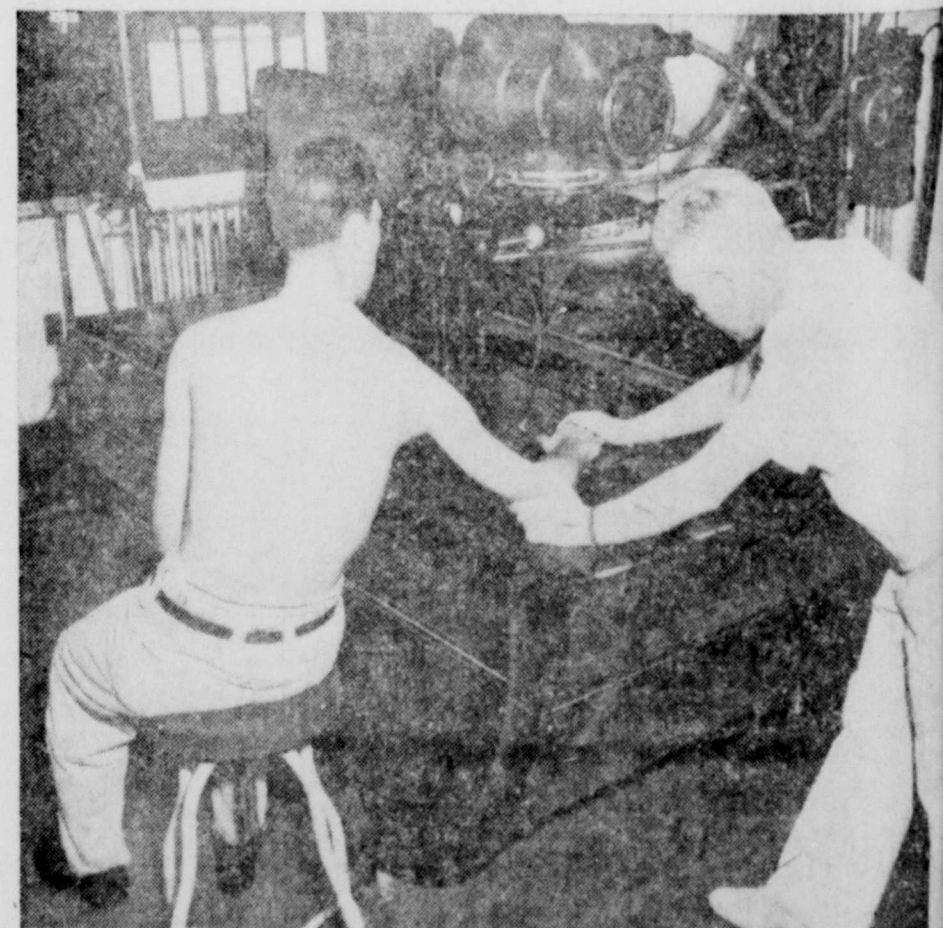

We detoured off the highway for a few miles and went by the home of our friends, Mr. and Mrs. Clemson Agnew, and found that they were not at home.

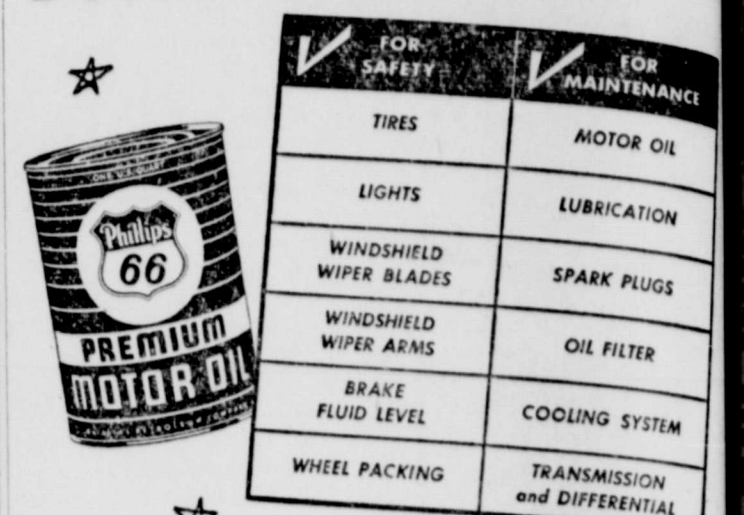
