Red Miller Top Speaker At CC Sports Banquet Tuesday Night

The first Clarendon College All Sports Banquet was held in the school Cafeteria Tuesday evening, May 2 with the local Jaycees sponsoring the event. Gene White was master of ceremonies for the evening.

College Bulldogs, Doggets, school dignitaries, and Clarendonites were privileged to hear a most outstanding speaker, Coach Red Miller of Cameron College, Lawton, Oklahoma, address the group. Mr. Miller held the attention of his listeners with his clever wit and humor while at the same time bringing out some of the more serious aspects not only to be practiced in the field of sports but in life as well.

To succeed in both he stressed three necessary attributes: Mental Fitness, Moral Fitness, and Physical Fitness, and pointed out various problems faced by some of the greatest sportsmen, as well as leaders in the realm of religion, leadership and endeavors in all walks of life. The comment is frequently made that this fellow is lucky or that team is lucky and in closing he gave his version of this term **Lucky**. In thinking he considered the L as representing Love; the U, understanding; the C, courage; the K, Knowledge; and the Y, Yearning; and with the help of God, he stated, he hoped to attain them all before he came to the end of the road.

Rev. W. R. Lawrence pronounced both the invocation and the benediction and the young men participating in College sports were introduced by their coach, Lawrence Overcast. Mrs. Jean Moore introduced the Doggett cheerleaders. On the lighter side Mrs. Norma Selvidge's drama class presented a short skit.

Of special interest to the Bulldogs was the presentation of awards made by the Jaycee President Bob Bell. Mike Barrera, a freshman student from Laredo, received the Fighting Heart trophy. Harry Cannon, a freshman student from Alquiipa, Pennsylvania received the Most Valuable Player Award and also the plaque which will be placed in the school trophy case.

Through contributions of the business men of Clarendon the Jaycees presented Coach Overcast with a console TV, two suits, a shirt and tie.

It is hoped that this All Sports banquet will become an annual affair.

Red Cross Home Nursing Classes Planned

The Donley County Chapter of the American Red Cross has just completed arrangements for a training course "Care of the Sick and Injured" to be taught to students currently enrolled in Homemaking II classes. This course is designed to teach students to give safe, effective nursing care to members of their families in accordance with physician's orders.

The class is being taught by Mrs. Velma Bourland, a certified Home Nursing Instructor and Homemaking teacher in the local school system. Text books for the class were purchased by the Clarendon FHA Chapter as a community service project this year and will be used for future classes in the Homemaking Department. All other equipment will be furnished by the Donley County Red Cross Chapter and stored in the Homemaking Department.

Clarendon High School has three students taking part in Inter-scholastic League competition at Austin this week.

From the athletic departments Archie Smith will compete in Shot Put in Track and Field events, and Steve Adams will represent the region in Tennis Singles.

Literary wise Tim Caldwell will participate in the field of Science.

Fire Safety Program Held At High School

Fires don't just happen—they are caused, Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau, pointed out in a graphic fire demonstration held Tuesday morning at the Clarendon High School. He went on to name the three causes of most fires: "Men, women, and children."

In the 45 minute program Smetana used a variety of demonstration equipment and materials placed on tables 16 feet in length to dramatize seven basic facts about fire, its use, and control: (1) What fire is; (2) How to control fires; (3) The fact that nothing is fire-proof; (4) Kitchen fires and their control; (5) Fuel vapors; (6) The power of petroleum products; and (7) Household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Using a "fire triangle board" Smetana illustrated that fire is like a three-legged stool—it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are (1) fuel, (2) heat, and (3) air. He stated that in American homes these three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds—an average of 1,500 home fires every day, causing more than 5,000 deaths in home fires every year.

Creating quite a loud explosion from one single drop of gasoline, Smetana stated that one gallon of gasoline contains approximately 155,000 drops and under ideal conditions, could produce an explosion force equal to the power of at least 30 sticks of dynamite.

After demonstrating how fires can be caused by overloaded electrical circuits and improper fusing, Smetana pointed out that many fires of this type are blamed on faulty wiring. He suggested that "faulty thinking" is involved more often than "faulty wiring."

The demonstration, which was brought to the Clarendon High School under the sponsorship of the Donley County Farm Bureau, is part of a long-range fire prevention program now being conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau, Safety Department. The demonstration has been presented over 400 times for some 125,000 people. There were approximately 250 present for the demonstration in Clarendon Tuesday.

Jack Tolbert assisted Smetana during the demonstration as the school's Junior Fire Marshal.

Mental Health Unit Organized Here

Thursday evening interested persons gathered in the Hospitality Room of the Farmers State Bank to learn more of the function and purpose of the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Association. Special speakers for the occasion were Rev. Eads, president of the Panhandle association; Mrs. T. Z. Walker, executive secretary for the Panhandle association; and Dr. Carol Anderson of West Texas State University. The Clarendon Young Homemakers sponsored the meeting.

Following the program Rev. W. R. Lawrence served as moderator for a business meeting to elect officers and set up a Mental Health Unit in Donley County. Maurice Risley will serve as District Board member and chairman of the local unit. Other officers serving with Mr. Risley will be Mrs. Jo Schollenbarger, secretary; Mrs. Velma Bourland, finance; Mrs. Sherry Semrad, publicity chairman; Mrs. Faye Montgomery, education chairman; and Mrs. Nancy Kidd, membership chairman.

This group will work with the Amarillo Association attempting to bring to our community needed information and resources regarding Mental Health.

Area Experiences Late Spotted Freeze

Some tender plants and fruit were damaged Sunday night when the mercury plunged below the freezing point in some areas of the county. The official reading here in Clarendon was 34 degrees but the thermometer was located on a hill. There was lots of ice on the Little League Park fence only two blocks away where the sprinkler had been left running during the night. This area was considerably lower than the thermometer.

Hubert Rhoades at Ashtola reported approximately 1/8 inch ice and damage to garden plants, especially tomatoes. Numerous other low areas reported a killing freeze. This late freeze date is certainly unusual for this area but you can expect most anything to happen in the Panhandle area. Another topper was the strong wind that blew Friday thru Sunday.

BASS FRY PLANTED IN GREENBELT RESERVOIR

J. B. Sutton with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, planted the first shipment of 75,000 black bass fry in Greenbelt Reservoir last Wednesday afternoon. The bass fry came from the state hatchery at Dundee.

Sutton stated that this was the first load of approximately 240,000 bass to be put in the lake the remainder of this month and June. Channel cat are scheduled to be put in the lake in September.

Small Towns Have Promise For Future

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been conducting a study of small town problems, as have many other survey groups, and has recently released a complete report entitled "The Small Community in West Texas."

Many suggestions have been put forth in an effort to preserve the small town as the last citadel of gracious living, neighborliness and close friendships based upon intimate knowledge of the hopes, dreams and ambitions of one another according to John Ben Sheppard, president of the WTCC in summarizing findings of the Small Towns Task Force.

Among some of the findings pointed out were the need for proper leadership and communication between leaders and those who follow for successful completion of community projects. This entails the participation of the entire community. Other aspects included such points as educational, recreational and cultural opportunities, development of natural and man-made tourist attractions, development of Regional junior colleges, industrial possibilities, and the assuming of more civic responsibilities by elected officials and citizens. Do It Yourself programs were especially lauded citing specific examples.

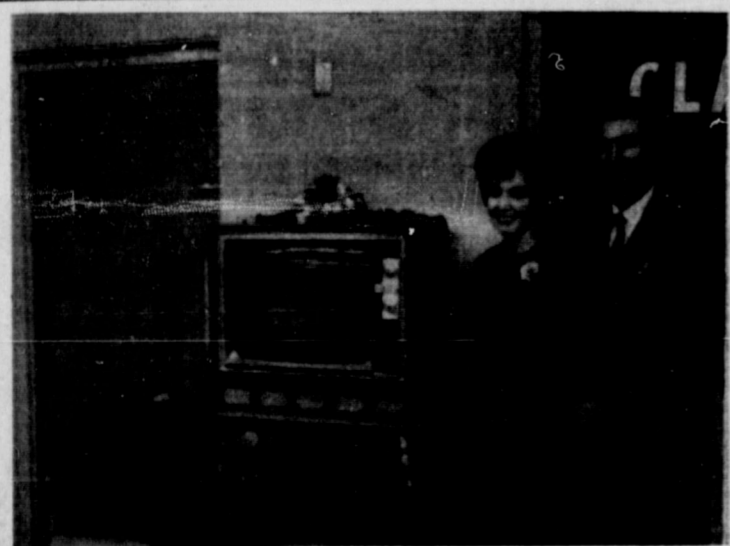
MARK VETERANS GRAVES BY MEMORIAL DAY

"Always Close The Gate, Son"

Not long ago we heard a young man say; "Each day I work with my father I learn something that helps me." We admired him for saying it at the time, and later we kept on thinking about the many things we learned from my own father as we worked and visited together during his life.

Our "Old Homeplace" seemed to have more than the usual amount of gates and I was always tempted to leave one down until we were to come back a bit later. Usually he would say; "Always Close The Gate, Son." It seemed there were gates every-

where; one for the horse pasture, the weaned calves, and one for the cows that calved in the spring and still another for those that were to offspring in the fall. There were heifers too young to run with the bull and on and on. But, it seemed always to be urgent and important that the pastures were kept separate. To me, it remained constant temptation to leave one open.

He would always remind me that his experience had been that it would take longer to un-mix the cattle sooner or later than I would save by my leaving the gates open. That when we returned might be like locking the barn after the horse was gone.

This proved to be true with horses and cattle, and thinking back over it we got a true lesson for our daily life. There are always those little gates here and there along life's road that if we leave open will cause a lot of trouble later on.

I thought of what a little gate it was to leave open when our hired man let me have some Bull Durham to smoke. Then, later when we smoked three packs of ready rolls per day how hard it was to close the gate.

I thought of the good credit rating that I inherited and how easy it was to leave the gate open to easy payments, and how hard it could be to close.

It is easy to find the gate to the creek on Sunday instead of to church, and it is hard to find the road back later. We could name so many little gates along life's way that there is a temptation to leave down.

Thinking back over the years of my life I would want to tell my own boy to; "Always Close The Gate, Son."

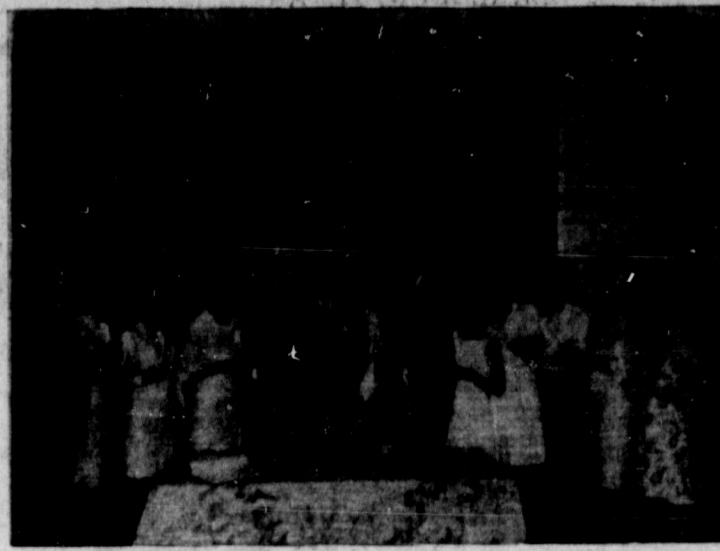

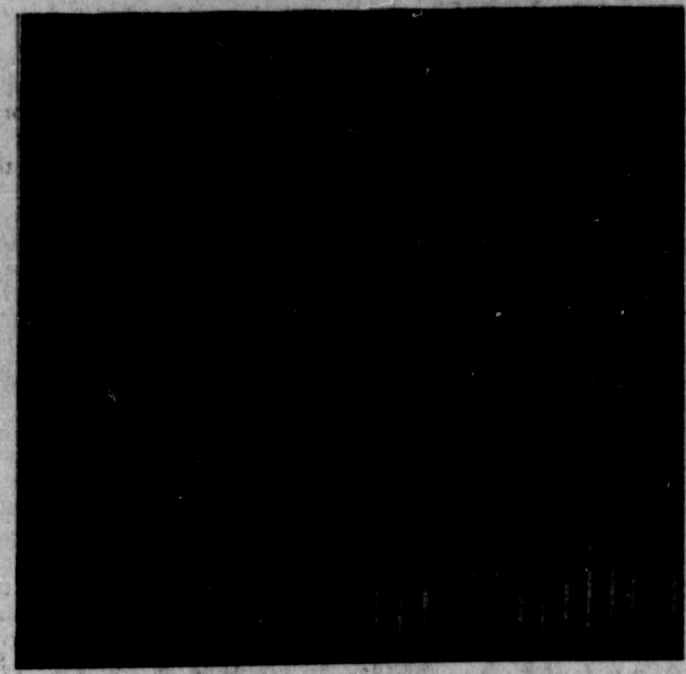

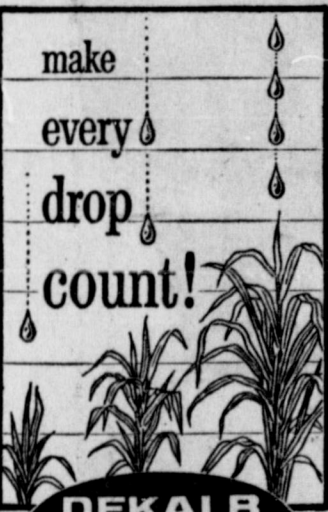
