Second Annual County Fair 50,000 Union Shopmen Is Declared Great Success Recalled to Old Places

Despite the threatening weather coming at the close of the second annual Runnels County Fair Saturday night, the large crowds lingered until the midnight hour when Sunday forced the curtains to go down in what was declared to be the most successful county fair ever held in West Texas.

It is estimated that at least 20,000 people attended the fair during last Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The crowds were by far the largest ever brought here for any occasion, the city for the three days and nights being crowded as never before.

The crowds came early and stayed late. A sprinkle of rain during the early hours of the night only served to cool the breezes and make the weather all the more enjoyable for the fun-seekers. Later in the night, about 10:00 o'clock, a flurry of wind caused the crowds to scatter, but only for a short time, and as the wind subsided, the crowds turned out again, and lingered until the Sabbath day drove them home.

A more successful county fair was never held than the one which closed here Saturday night. While the crowds were the largest ever seen here, the people were the best humored, and the most orderly ever assembled. There were no complaints heard on any hand for lack of amusement, accommodations, and good treatment. All who came went away pleased with the entertainment given.

The various committees and officers of the Runnels County Fair Association deserve credit for the successful way the free fall fair was handled. All worked untiringly, and the spirit of co-operation counted for much.

The merchants contributed liberally of their time and money to make the fair a success, and express themselves as being well pleased with the affair.

"Ballinger is the best town we have played this year," said Donald McGregor, the giant owner of the McGregor Shows, which helped to furnish the amusement for the fair. The big giant said that his shows and concessions did the best business here they have done anywhere this year. The carnival grounds were a "seething mass" of humanity Saturday night, as well as on other nights, but Saturday night

was the big night. People came from distant points Saturday and spent the day taking in the various exhibits and turned out Saturday night for a good time, and they had it.

Exhibitors carried off cash prizes aggregating considerable money, to say nothing of the blue and red ribbon awards. A complete list of the awards will be published in The Ledger within the next few days.

Pretty Work of Six Year Old

Little Miss Liliosa Gully was the center of attraction Friday afternoon as she sat in the Children's Tea Room and crocheted on her doll wardrobe. Happy Hollow Farm Exhibit

One of the most attractive exhibits presented at a county fair by a community, and that community representing one man largely, was the Happy Hollow exhibit. This exhibit was prepared and staged by H. M. Linecum, with some entries by others in the neighborhood, and there is something of everything to be found on a well appointed and self supporting farm. Mr. Linecum does not devote his whole time to a one-sided production, but diversifies on a general and profitable scale. His interests are as diversified as his program of farming for he includes the people of his community in his efforts to be of service to everyone who is striving to improve their farming and home conditions. Mr. Linecum is something of a journalist too, and his articles on "better farming" and "better stock breeding" have appeared in numerous periodicals.

The Happy Hollow community exhibit was awarded second prize in the community classification.

Maverick Exhibit Wins First Prize

The Maverick community exhibit won first prize in the agricultural display. This exhibit was arranged by N. D. Lee, and goes to show what can be done in any community in Runnels county if the people will band together and co-operate. Mr. Lee gathered the exhibits and arranged them, and Maverick received publicity thru the exhibit that will be worth much to that part of the county. CAN'T PASS BONUS OVER PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—A sufficient number of votes in the senate to sustain the presidential veto of the soldier bonus bill were declared assured today. A canvass of the senate was made by advisors of the president to determine whether the bill could go over the veto, and those canvassing the senate declared that a sufficient number of votes would be polled against the measure to prevent it from passing by the two-thirds majority. President Harding announced last Saturday that he had determined to disapprove the bill, it was said.

MINE OPENED; BUT NO WORD FROM 47 MEN

(By Associated Press)
JACKSON, Calif., Sept. 18.—The opening connecting the Kennedy mine with the Argonaut mine, where forty-seven men have been entombed for twenty-two days, has been enlarged, and this morning was made to full size necessary for the passage of the rescue crews into the Argonaut. It was officially announced. A great force of draft from the Kennedy mine into the Argonaut indicated that there had been no cave-in on the forty-two hundred foot level, Argonaut officials said. The absence of the cave-in would permit rescue workers to enter the Argonaut as soon as the debris had been cleared away. The crew on the 3600 foot level won the \$5,000 bonus for being the first crew to break through, officials of the mine announced. Fire in the mine has decreased since the opening between the Kennedy and Argonaut shafts was made.

No word had come through the hole made into the Argonaut mine to indicate whether any of the miners were alive or not. Fear is that most of them, if not all, have perished.

WAR SHIPS PROTECTING SEA PORT

(By Associated Press)
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 18.—The entire British Atlantic fleet is being sent to reinforce the Mediterranean squadron for the protection of the Constantinople straits and the Dardanelles. This will create the most formidable armada of warships ever assembled in an area of like size.

There is increasing apprehension for the security of the city among the population as the result of Great Britain's energetic measures to protect it. The circulating of the report that the warships were coming to protect the city restored order where much confusion and excitement prevailed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The war department today ordered detached Major Sherman Miles from the artillery school at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and assigned him as American attaché at Constantinople on the staff of Rear Admiral Bristol, and was ordered to proceed to his new post without unnecessary delay.

GENTLE HORSE KICKS TO HURT

Wyman Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Jones, of the Crews country, was painfully injured Sunday night when his saddle horse kicked him, cutting an ugly gash under the chin and otherwise bruising the face of the young man. Wyman was attending a singing in the neighborhood and started home. He walked up behind his horse and laid hand on the horse's hip and as he did so the horse struck the blow which came near proving serious. The horse is said to be a gentle pony and never attempted to kick anyone before. Mr. Jones thinks the horse was asleep when the boy touched him on the hip.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—Several railroads today restored jobs to striking shopmen under the Warfield-Jewell truce. Strikers who went out eighty days ago were given their places back by a number of roads.

Some estimates place the number of men called back to work as high as fifty thousand out of the three hundred thousand who went out on strike on July 1st.

Railroads which refused to enter the agreement to take the strikers back announced today that they are daily increasing their number of new employees and do not need the men who went out on strike.

AUTOMOBILE TRAVEL STAMPEDES CATTLE

He undertook to drive the calves from his ranch at Norton to Ballinger Friday night, thinking that they could make the trip better at night on account of it being cooler at night and less travel on the roads, but he realized that he had made a serious mistake before he reached Ballinger a short time before daylight Saturday morning. Everybody and his girl came to the Runnels County Fair at Ballinger Friday night, and the fair visitors monopolized the road in going home just as Mr. Stubblefield was trying to get to Ballinger with his calves, and he declares that he didn't know that there were as many autos in Runnels county as traveled the Ballinger-Norton highway Saturday morning. He experienced much trouble in getting to town with his cattle and lost five or six head.

CUTS HAND WHILE GETTING A SHAVE

CHARGE VISITORS SMALL FEE

Admission to State Museums and Palaces of France Now Matter of Stated Price.

Visitors to the state museums and palaces in Paris are now required, reports the Daily Telegraph correspondent, to pay an entrance fee. The fees vary from 1 franc at the Louvre to 50c at the Petit Trianon, and the first day's experience yielded very encouraging results. Although the Louvre was open only in the afternoon, the receipts for the day were 3,000 francs. Three hundred francs were taken at the Luxembourg, and the Cluny museum and the Arc de Triomphe each took 350.

The director of the National museum estimates that during the 200 days a year on which an admission fee is charged—that is, allowing two free days per week—the receipts at the Louvre will average 2,000 francs a day. Few people, he said, object to paying the small fee, but it will relieve the taxpayer of a great part of his burden for the benefit of state museums. A proposal is being considered to charge for admission to the gardens of Versailles on the days when the fountains are playing, as the spectacle—always a great attraction to visitors—costs 30,000 francs to 35,000 francs a day at the present price of coal.

MANY USERS OF TELESCOPE

Dealers Report Practically a Steady Demand for Glasses in All Months of the Year.

"We sell telescopes all the year round, but the demand for them is greater in summer than in other seasons," said the salesman in a New York optician's shop. "Perhaps that is because it is easier to remain outdoors and study the stars on a summer night than it is when the weather is colder."

"Also, in summer people buy telescopes for other purposes than to study the stars. Folks on the seashore get them to look at passing vessels, at the clouds and other things. We sell some also to those who live in the mountains and use the telescope for lookout purposes. But of course, the greater number of telescopes, especially the high-power glasses, are bought for the study of the heavens."

"Annually we sell an average of 200 telescopes for amateur use. They range in size from the hand glass, with 1-inch lens, to the glass that is supported on a tripod and has a lens 3 to 3½ inches in diameter. Larger lenses than the 3½ inch size are seldom bought by amateurs. They are for professional use."

"Jinxes" Were Numerous.

A number of seafaring passengers aboard the Adriatic, which caught fire from an explosion on Thursday night, said yesterday that there was a number of signs attending the sailing of the ship which were construed as "jinxes" by the sailors. Among these were:

The ship lost an anchor in the Mersey.

Nearly hit the Holyhead-Dublin ferry.

The birds refused to fly aboard the ship.

And the explosion occurred very close to the spot where the Titanic went down in 1912.

Denatured Alcohol.

Denatured alcohol is grain alcohol made unfit for use as a beverage. Completely denatured alcohol is made by adding 10 gallons of wood alcohol and a half gallon of benzine to 100 gallons of ethyl alcohol. This is free from government tax and may be bought by any one for use as fuel or light.

The denaturing must be done when the alcohol is produced and in bonded warehouses used exclusively for the purpose and for storing denatured alcohol, and is done under the supervision of the government. The grain alcohol may be made from grain, corn, potatoes or similarly starchy products, but the conditions under which it must be produced make it impracticable except for well-equipped factories.

Easy to Prevent Goiter.

"Simple goiter is the easiest of all diseases to prevent," wrote Doctor Marine, the great specialist in this disease, some time ago. Iodine is known to be necessary to the normal function of the thyroid gland. Goiter is an expression of deficiency of iodine in the thyroid, and the elaborate experiments made recently by Dr. O. P. Kimball on the school children of Akron, Ohio, furnish conclusive evidence that administering a minute quantity of iodine every day acts as a preventive in such regions where goiter prevails.

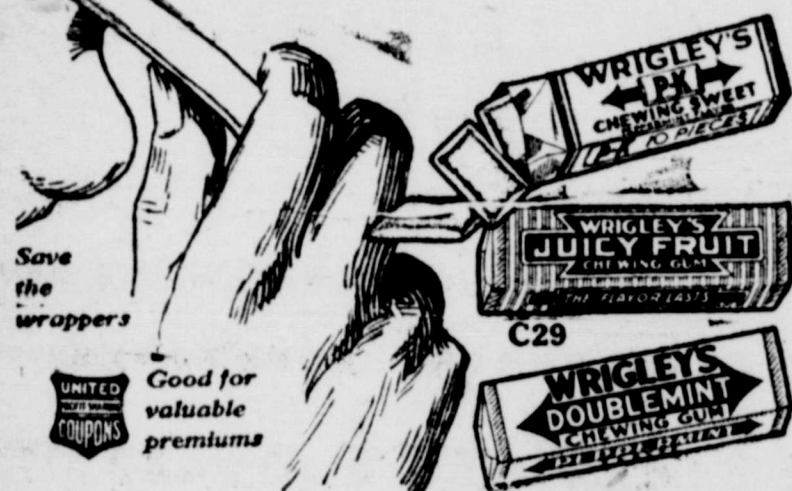

"What's in a Name?" By MILDRED MARSHALL

Facts about your name; its history; meaning; whence it was derived; significance; your lucky day and lucky jewel

IMOGENE

NOT so frequent in usage, but none the less lovely and possessing of a good deal of poetic charm is Imogene. The name has no definite history and etymologists find it difficult to account for it, but the generally accepted theory is that it is another form of the Imagina.

There was Imogene of Lumbago in 1499 and various other instances of the use of the name by German women. How England secured the name of Imogene is open to speculation. It is probable that Shakespeare's heroine established her vogue there, though etymologists contend that it was used by British ladies before the master playwright wrote his version of the old story of the deserted and betrayed wife, which he so strangely places at the court of the last independent British prince.

At any rate, Shakespeare called his heroine Imogene, thus establishing her vogue forever. The name is still a great favorite in England, but has never had widespread popularity here, due, perhaps, to its rather poetic associations. Also, it usually degenerates into "Gene." A few devoted admirers of Shakespeare (and others unwittingly) give the name to girl babies in baptism, probably ignorant of the fact that as Ynoge, the name was once bestowed on a daughter of Emperor Pandrus of Greece, and the wife of Brutus, according to Geoffrey of Monmouth. She was mentioned in Anne of Brittany's funeral oration in 1514.

Imogene's talismanic stone is the jacinth. It was said to protect her from danger, especially of lightning. Worn when traveling, it will insure her a happy, successful journey. Wednesday is her lucky day, and 6 her lucky number.

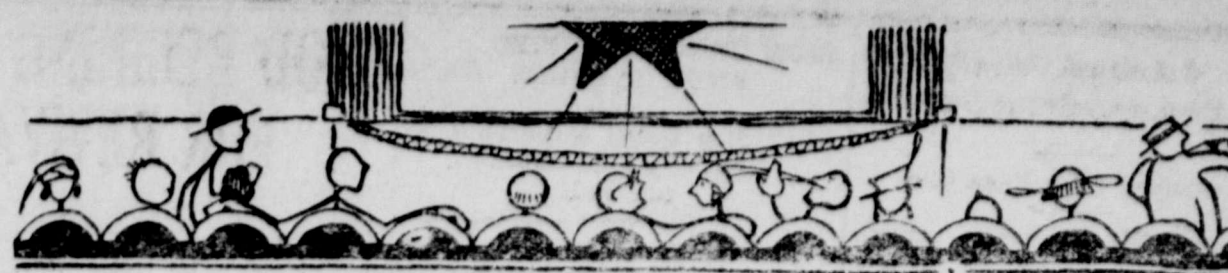
WHY? CAN'T WE SEE IN THE DARK

WHEN we state that we "see" an object we are accustomed to believe that we actually see the thing itself, whereas, as a matter of fact, all that our eye takes in is the light which is reflected from the object. This light, by reason of the varying shadows and intensities, gives us our impression of what the object looks like—which is the reason that the same thing will often appear to be different to a number of persons.

Because light is a necessary adjunct of "sight," it follows that the absence of light—or darkness—will nullify the sight and make the things which surround us totally invisible. Without light, our eyes are useless, and even the light itself is scarcely more necessary than reflection as may be proved by looking into a mirror and then into a sheet of plain glass. The former, on account of the reflection obtained by the coating of mercury at the back, reflects the light. The latter reflects only a portion of it from its polished surface and the image which we see is in the nature of a vision, lacking the depth and the perspective attainable in the mirror. If anyone could invent a scientifically perfect black point which would absorb all light and reflect none, he would solve the riddle of invisibility, for it would be impossible to see such objects even in the brightest of sunlight.
