Final District Game Here with Hawley

The Bronte Longhorns will play their final regularly scheduled football game Friday night with Hawley. The game will be on local ground. The Horns do not have to win the contest in order to take the district championship, but they are looking for a win and an unblemished record in district play.

The Hawley lads are sporting a position of third place in the district, being behind Bronte and

Jim Ned. They have a stronger district record than Forsan, Loraine or Trent.

In record comparisons, the Horns have an 8-1 season record, compared with Hawley's 2-7, and in district 7-B competition the local lads boast a 4-0 to Hawley's 2-2. Some observers said this week this contest could be the best since Bronte played Jim Ned.

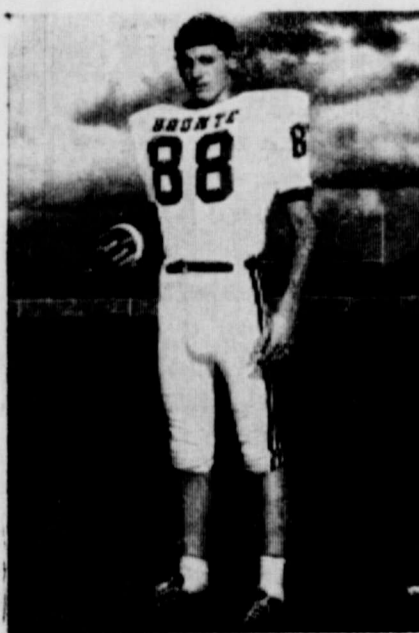
Last Week's Results

Book Parade Set For Saturday

A Book Week Parade will be held Saturday in Bronte in observance of the 50th anniversary of Children's National Book Week. Purpose of the parade, which will be sponsored by the Diversity Club, will be to emphasize the need for familiarity with books and to stimulate the desire to read.

Students in grades 1-6 are eligible to participate in the parade. Prizes will be awarded for first, second and third place winners who wear the best costume or outfit representing a book or a character from a book.

The parade will form at 10 a.m. at the school and will proceed through the downtown area, turn south on Highway 277 at Main Street, then turn west at the Humble Station and end at the post office.

All interested students are invited to participate in the parade.

Skelton, Carlton New Trustees

Russell Carlton and Glenn Skelton were appointed trustees for Bronte Independent School District by the school board in a meeting last Thursday night. Carlton and Skelton will succeed Conda O. Richards and Harold Moon who resigned a few weeks ago. They will fill the remaining terms of their predecessors, which expires next April.

Joe Rawlings, who has been vice president of the school board, now is president, replacing Moon in that position.

The superintendent said both reports were quite satisfactory, but recommendations were made that the school secure some additional rinsing equipment for use in washing dishes.

Chartered Bus, Maybe

At the request of local fans, The Bronte Enterprise has checked into securing a chartered bus for those fans who want to ride it. Approximate cost for a 46-passenger Continental Trailways bus is \$306 for the round trip. Continental will take as few as 33 on the bus, which would make each seat cost a little more than \$9. However, if the bus is filled to its 46-passenger capacity, the cost would be approximately \$6.75.

The bus company will have to know by Monday if Bronte fans want to charter the bus. Consequently, Monday noon has been set as the deadline for making reservations. If as many as 33 persons have their money in at The Enterprise office by that time, the bus will be reserved; otherwise it will not.

In order to reserve a seat on the bus, a person will have to leave a deposit of \$9.50 at The Enterprise office. If the load is sufficiently large to bring the cost of the seats below that figure, a refund will be made to each passenger. There will be NO RESERVATIONS ON CREDIT. However it will be appreciated if persons who are nearly sure they will ride the bus will call the Enterprise office so that some idea could be gained about the cost.

Anyone who is interested is invited to come by The Enterprise office and leave his deposit.

No definite time of departure is known, but it is thought the bus will have to leave here sometime between 1 and 2 p.m. in order to allow passengers time to eat before the 7 p.m. kickoff.

Bus for Players

According to Martin Lee, president of the Longhorn Booster Club, a chartered bus has been secured to take the football team to Fort Stockton. The team will be taken to San Angelo on a school bus and will board an Oil-field Bus Line vehicle for the remainder of the trip.

Supt. Barbee received a phone call Wednesday afternoon which stated Bronte would be the home team at the bi-district game. Bronte fans will sit on the west side of the stadium. The gates will open at 6 p.m.

Horns Cinch Play-Off Spot With Easy Win Over Trent, 53-8

The Bronte Longhorns had an easy time of it Friday night when they hosted the Trent Gorillas and came through on the long end of a 53-8 score. The Horns had all their 53 points before Trent got on the board and ran counters over the double stripe in all four quarters. The win cinched the District 7-B title for the local lads.

First Quarter

The Longhorns had to kick off and Willie Zuniga's kick went to Bill Hamner who made a nice return to the 35. The Gorillas gained a total of 2 yards in three tries, so Roy Sharp went back to punt. He got a high snap from center and couldn't get off the kick. He was downed on the Trent 30 giving the Horns excellent position on their first possession.

Nicky Arrott went for 3 followed by a 6 yard gain by Randy Barbee. Arrott then went for 6 and a 1st on the 15. Barbee picked up 4. Bronte was penalized 5 for illegal procedure, bringing up 3rd and 12. Quarterback Keith McCutchen thought the situation called for a pass, so he found Zuniga in the end zone for the first score of the game. Conversion failed and the score was 6-0.

Joseph Beaver took Zuniga's kick and was tripped on the 28. Trent drew a clipping penalty and Bronte was penalized for off-sides. All this gave Trent a 1st and 22. Hamner and Si Acuna tried but couldn't make the yards, so a punt was called for. It went to Arrott on the 50, and he got loose and went all the way for the second TD. Arrott carried over the conversion, making the score 14-0.

Line of scrimmage was the 29 after Zuniga's kick to Beaver. Beaver went for 7 and Hamner made another, but the 3rd down was not so good for the Gorillas, as Keith McCutchen intercepted Dickerson's pass to give Bronte the ball on the Trent 39. Arrott went for 6 and Barbee added 7 more for a 1st on the 28. The next series was not so good for the Longhorns. Trent recovered a fumble, and Acuna went for a 6 yard gainer, as the 1st quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Beaver lost 2 and an incomplete pass called for another punt. It went short and took a Bronte bounce to give the Horns the ball on the Trent 33. Arrott and Bobby Skelton both made 3 yards, then Arrott decided short gains were not for him, as he circled left end, behind good blocking, and went the distance to the double stripe. A pitch-out to Barbee sent him around right end for another 2 points and the scoreboard said the count was 22-0.

Beaver took Zuniga's kick and was downed on his 21. Hamner made 3, Dickerson failed to gain and Beaver lost a yard to bring up 4th and 8. Sharp's kick went short to the Trent 44.

McCutchen made 3 on the keeper, Skelton added a yard and a pass to Barbee was good for 11 and a 1st on the 29. Skelton went for 2 and Arrott picked up the 1st with a 22 yard scamper to the 5. Skelton made 4 yards, then McCutchen kept the ball and went through the middle for the next touchdown. A pass from McCutchen to Donnie Thompson was good for 2 points and the score was 30-0.

Beaver was downed on his 11 after the kick. Dickerson was trapped and lost 5, but Beaver gained 3 of it back on 2nd down. Bronte drew a 15 yard fine on

3rd down and it gave the visitors a 1st on the 29. The Gorillas didn't have any help on the next series of downs and after three plays were faced with a 4th and 19. The punt was killed on the Trent 39.

Skelton went in as quarterback and handed to Jerry Graves for a 4 yard gain. A fumble was recovered by Mike Arrott. Danny Cooper went for a 1st on the 29 and J. Graves made a couple more to end the half.

Third Quarter

The onside kick didn't go 10 yards, and Bronte took the ball on the Trent 48. On the first play from scrimmage, Arrott took the ball and went around left end for the entire 48 yards needed for a Bronte touchdown. Barbee went around right end for the extras and the score was 38-0. The clock showed 9 seconds gone in the third quarter.

Dickerson tried a pass after the kickoff, but it was ill fated, as Thompson intercepted it and went all the way for a TD. Zuniga's kick was good for the PAT, and the scoreboard read 45-0, while the clock showed the Horns had made 15 points in the first 27 seconds of the second half.

Beaver handed Zuniga's kick to Hamner and he was tripped up on the 35. A fumble on 1st down was recovered by Lynn Lawhon and the Horns had the ball on the 36. Arrott picked up 2, then Bronte was penalized 5 for off-sides. Cooper went for 3 and the next play ended in no gain. The situation was 4th and 10 on the 36, so Zuniga was sent in for a field goal attempt. It was short and the Trent lads took over on their 20.

Acuna went for 8 and Hamner added 6 more for a 1st on the 34. After two incomplete pass tries and a 15 yard penalty against the Horns, the visitors had a 1st on the 50. Hamner went for 5 and Acuna made it a 1st on the Bronte 40. Short gains and a trapped quarterback left the Gorillas with a 4th and 18 on the next series. Sharp went back into punt formation, but passed the ball to Hamner who was nailed on the 42, short of the 1st down.

Two plays later Trent recovered a fumble on the Bronte 46. Hamner and Acuna moved the ball 11 yards for a 1st on the Bronte 35, as the third quarter

ended. Score: 45-0.

Fourth Quarter

The Gorillas appeared to have something going for them as they moved on down to the Bronte 24 and a 1st down. That was all, however, as the Horns tightened up, and held the Gorillas for a net of 2 yards lost on the next four downs. Bronte took over on their 26 yard line.

After an unsuccessful pass try, Arrott got loose and ran 40 yards for a 1st down on the Trent 34. Barbee picked up 8 to the 27, and the next play was a toss from McCutchen to Zuniga in the end zone for the final Bronte touchdown of the night. A pass to Barbee was good for 2 and the score was 53-0.

Beaver fumbled Zuniga's kick but Hamner recovered on the 28. Lathan Henager went for a 1st on the 38. Acuna carried three times for a 1st on the Trent 49. Beaver moved to the Bronte 40 for another 1st. Bronte drew a 15 yard penalty two times in succession, and this might have been an advantage to the Gorillas as they moved to the Bronte 8 for a 1st and goal.

Hamner moved 4 yards, then Acuna went over for the lone Gorilla TD of the game. He also ran over the PAT. Score 53-8. J. Graves made a nice return to the 44 after taking the kickoff. The Horns suffered a clipping penalty in the series and were unable to make their 1st. The ball went over at midfield, and the Gorillas got off a couple of plays before the final gun sounded.

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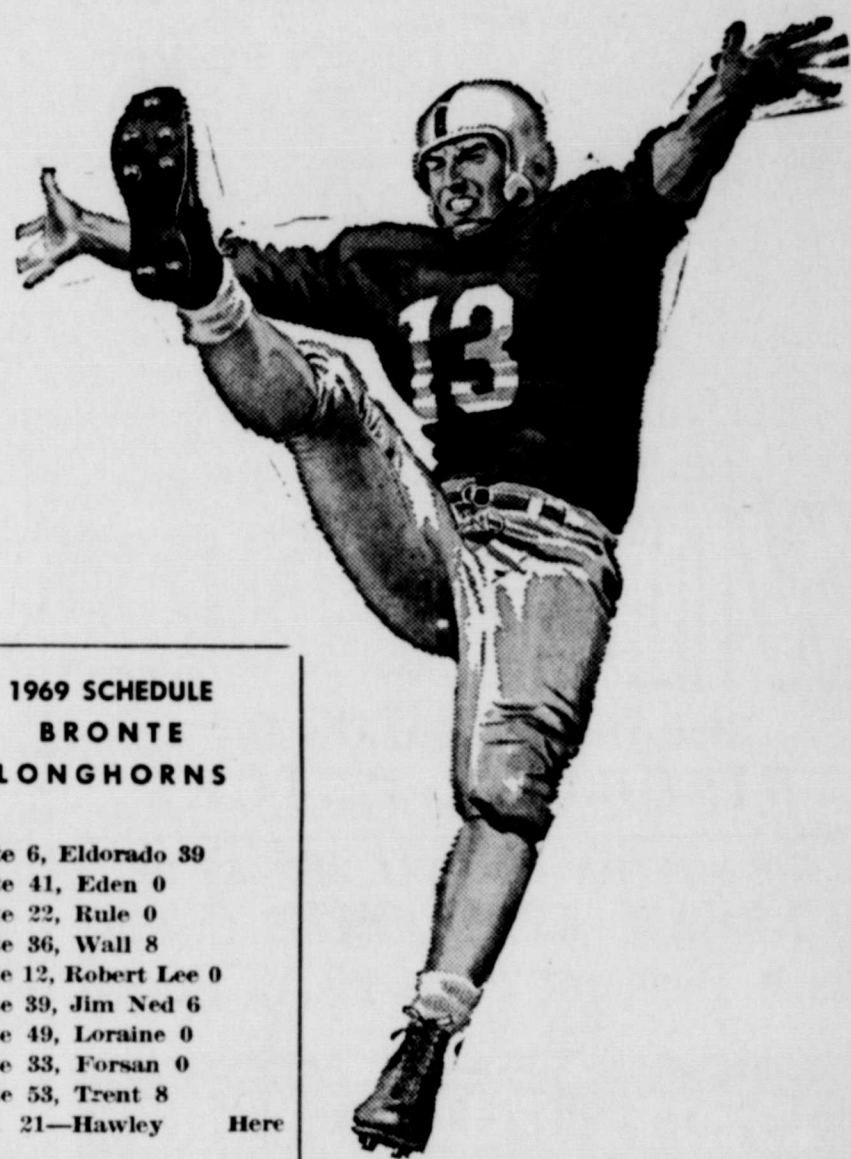

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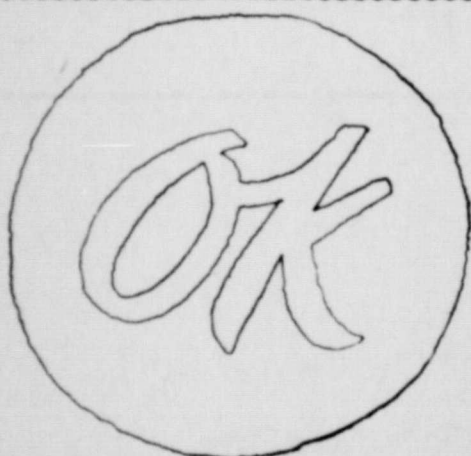
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FFA Teams Take 1st in Four Out of Five

Austin — Gov. Preston Smith turned from reading political polls to Indian signs last week and came up with a proposal for a new park in the Amistad Reservoir area near Del Rio.

Smith made a day-long tour by air, car and boat, primarily to view 8,000 year old Indian pictographs in Seminole canyon.

Impressed, the governor said the area must be developed as a recreation site and necessary steps taken immediately to protect primitive art from elements and vandals.

Smith said he personally favors state park development but noted that legislation already has been introduced to create Amistad National Recreation Area covering some 63,000 acres of land and water.

Parks and Wildlife Department Director J. R. Singleton said state funds could come from future sale of bonds from the \$75 million Texas recreation and park development bond program. However, Singleton favors waiting on federal action to establish a national recreation area and detremination of funds that U. S. agencies will provide for access roads and other facilities.

Smith said he plans to consult with Singleton and request the PWD chief to call all appropriate state department heads together at an early date to explore the state's role in area development.

CRIME AND NARCOTICS — An anti-crime and narcotics education package is being drawn up by the Texas Education Agency for classroom use beginning in September 1970.

Detailed proposals for a state-wide attack on crime and narcotics will be drafted. State Board of Education has authorized the agency to develop proposals requesting funds through the federal Juvenile Delinquency Prevention and Control Act of 1968, plus state and private sources.

Program was initiated by the 61st Legislature, which directed the agency to develop "a course on the evils of crime and narcotics" which will be required of all students.

Next planning step will bring 100 educators and other interested persons together in Austin for the first National Leadership Methods Laboratory on crime and narcotics. Laboratory will be directed by R. T. "Sonny" Davis, Austin attorney.

Scope of the problem the legislature is trying to solve is illustrated with the latest figures compiled by the Department of Public Safety. During February through August 1969, a total of 1,035 students in Texas in the 11 to 18 year old age bracket were arrested on narcotics and drug charges. This includes 519 arrests for possession of of marijuana, 243 for dangerous drugs and 273 for narcotics.

COURTS SPEAK — Harsh editorial criticism of a university professor's anti-war demonstration activities did not constitute libel, since the man was a public figure subject to criticism, Supreme Court has held.

A Corpus Christi contractor must pay \$127,700 damages to the widow and children of a man killed in collision with one of the firm's heavy highway construction machine units, high court said.

In other recent decisions, the court concluded that:

* A new hearing should be granted in the state's suit for

more than \$10,000 in telephone taxes from a McAllen firm which installs and services auto telephones.

* No commission is owed a newspaper broker who said he had arranged for the sale of two Corsicana newspapers, since he had no written contract.

HOSPITAL FUNDS APPROVED—Texas' Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has approved more than \$6.3 million in new construction projects.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES—Deposit type accounts may be accepted by state-chartered savings and loan associations under the Texas Savings and Loan Act, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions Martin ruled that:

* A county depository contract is not assignable by a liquidator of a defunct bank to a successor bank, and successor First State Bank of Aransas Pass, therefore, is not subject to terms of a depository contract with a defunct bank.

* Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators consists of seven appointed members and two ex-officio members, completing nine-member board. Members appointed to this board and the State Board of Examiners for Psychologists serve for two years except for initial appointees.

* Ex-officio members of the Texas Civil Judicial Council do not hold separate and distinct offices. Terms of appointive members are six years, one-third appointed every two years.

MILITARY LIQUOR SALES EYED—Liquor Control Board is reassessing its tax collection enforcement limitations on federal military posts, apparently with intentions of increasing state revenues.

LCB ordered a staff study to determine those posts on which state jurisdiction has been yielded and those which have not. Members seemed to have an eye on collecting the state's new five cents a drink service charge at clubs on military bases.

At the same meeting, Board turned down for the present the idea of a master club card which would create a system of guest reciprocity in participating private clubs. Proponents were offered a chance to get an attorney general's opinion on the subject, however, if they would officially request a permit in writing.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE UNIT TO FUNCTION — State Department of Public Welfare's first medical assistance unit will begin field operations from San Antonio Dec. 1, serving a vast 48 county area of South Texas.

Team, headed by a doctor, will have responsibility for medical review and utilization review of services provided by physicians, nursing homes and state institutions participating in Medicaid. Unit will also offer consultation to nursing homes on patient care and social services and medical record keeping. Its consultation services will be available to state mental hospitals and schools for retarded.

Unit is due to be the prototype for similar services in 16 welfare regions.

SHORT SNORTS — Lt. Gov. Barnes recommends creation of a new state department of urban affairs to help cities with their problems.

State Board of Education upheld the firing of a Wichita Falls coach who would not ride a bus with players on the way to practice.

Texas beer sales rose 6.7 per cent for the first nine months of 1969, but the Liquor Control Board reported an October decline in its overall tax take from \$5 million to \$4.1 million for the month.

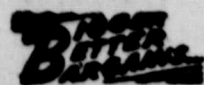
