DIRT STORMS RAGING OVER SOUTHWEST AREA

Clouds of choking dust, swept before constantly shifting March winds have succeeded in making life miserable throughout the Southwest during the past week, further damaging crops in this drought stricken area.

While fields in this particular section have been blowing badly it is thought that most of the fine dust has been swept in from other parts. Several deaths, none however in this locality, have been attributed to the storms that have swept parts of six states in the southwest.

Old timers declare that without question the storm is the worst in their memory. While dirt storms have been common here in the past two years, and a few have been more intense for a short period, none have been known to last as long as the one that has been raging for the past week.

JUDGE EWING IS KEEN JUDGE OF CRIMINALS

Judge W. R. Ewing, Pampa, who substituted for Judge E. J. Pickens during the recent term of the district court, evidently knows his criminals. One David Ash was tried at the last term of the Ochiltree district court on a theft charge. When the jury reported that they had found him guilty and assessed a five year suspended sentence, they, the jurors, were censured by Judge Ewing, for letting Ash go free on a suspended sentence when the evidence so clearly showed his guilt, and the prisoner, his criminal nature. Just a few months has proven that Judge Ewing was right and that Ash is a professional criminal. County Attorney Max Boyer was notified last week by the Department of Justice at Washington that Ash had been found guilty and sentenced on two charges at Amarillo. On a charge of tampering with an auto, he received a \$225.00 fine, and on an affray charge, he got off with a fine of \$39.10 and 115 days in jail. It will take over a year in the Potter county jail for him to serve out his sentence and lay-out the fines at the rate of \$1.00 per day. Courts are entirely too lenient with law violators and this is especially true of juries. The average judge, in most instances can be depended upon to render a much more intelligent verdict than any jury. Judges are not influenced by the showmanship and hair-tearing arguments and pleas, so oft resorted to by attorneys in their efforts to get what they call justice for their clients, but which in many cases is a miscarriage of justice.

Owners of automobiles and trucks in Ochiltree county are slow in obtaining 1935 license plates, so states Sheriff J. S. Talley. To date, only 166 passenger car tags have been issued. In 1934, 1329 passenger cars were registered.

Sheriff Talley asks that car owners obtain their plates at once in order to avoid the last minute rush. April 1, 1935 is the dead line and the 20 per cent penalty is added on all cars and trucks operated on the highways after the above date.

Many people doubtless are delaying purchase of new tags in the expectation that extension of delinquent date will be made. It is certain that such will not be the case this year. Get your 1935 plates before April 1, 1934, if you expect to operate your cars and trucks. All revenue for the registrations goes into the county road fund. All car tag receipts up to \$50,000 go to the county in which they are collected. Where receipts run over \$50,000 and not more than \$175,000, all over the minimum amount is divided equally between the county and state highway department. All over \$175,000 goes to the state.

PAIR ATTEMPTS STORE ROBBERY

CHARLIE TAYLOR NABBED AFTER CHASE BY CITY OFFICERS TUESDAY NIGHT

Charlie Taylor, 27, Balco, Okla., is being held in the county jail awaiting grand jury action in connection with the attempted burglary at the W. C. Bryan & Son store, Tuesday night at about 10:00 o'clock. A fleet-footed companion escaped from the city officers making the arrest.

Eddly attempting entrance at the door on the north side of the building, the burglars pried the handle off and broke the glass but were foiled when they reached through the bars to release the lock. Unable to gain entrance they left.

Taylor and a companion were accosted by City Marshal Leonard Robertson and Night Marshal R. H. Gamel on the outskirts of the city, the pair making a break for liberty by running across an open wheat field with the officer giving chase. Officer Robertson overtook Taylor but his companion outdistanced his pursuer. It is alleged Taylor confessed participation in the robbery before County Attorney Max Boyer and he is being held, charged with attempted burglary, for the grand jury which convenes next week.

STATE RACING PAYS \$721.00

COUNTY TREASURER SLAVIN GETS FIRST PAYMENT OF \$200 FROM STATE RACE REVENUE

Ochiltree county will receive \$721.00 from the revenue received from legalized state horse racing in Texas. The first installment of \$200 was received last week by Mrs. Arthur Slavin, Ochiltree county treasurer.

The money made by the state on horse racing has been divided as follows: Free school fund, \$132,642.59. State Department of Agriculture, \$111,640.

Jack and stallion fund, \$100,000. After deducting these and deducting for the maintenance of the racing commission, the excess is divided among the 254 counties of the state.

The \$721 is a division of the excess. A letter from Charles Lockhart, which accompanied the check for \$200 stated:

"In compliance with the provision of House Bill No. 12 . . . creating the horse racing commission for the state of Texas, I am herewith enclosing special Fund Warrant . . . in the sum of \$200, payable to you as county treasurer and representing the first installment of an amount to be allotted to your county from funds deposited in the state treasury by the Texas Racing Commission. . . .

"Disbursement of this fund has been held up somewhat, waiting for an audit of the racing commission's account, which has not yet been completed and for a legal opinion of the construction to be placed on the various provisions of the act, which would enable the disbursing official to fully carry out the purpose and intent of the law."

DISCUSS WIND EROSION CON- TROL MEASURE

Sixteen From Ochiltree County In Fifty-one County Meeting At Dalhart Monday

Visit At Erosion Project

Request Federal Aid In Fighting Destruction of Farm Lands By Shifting Winds

Faith in the future of these broad, fertile wheat fields of the Southwest was renewed to a delegation of sixteen Ochiltree county men who drove through a blinding dust storm Monday, to inspect the Dalhart emergency wind erosion experiment project and attend a 51 county meeting at Dalhart, called by the Dalhart Chamber of Commerce to discuss plans for combating the destructive winds that are fast turning the plains into a desert.

Leaving Perryton early in the morning, the party composed of County Agent J. T. Stovall, Judge Dave Shanks, County Commissioner Fred Tarbox, FERA Administrator H. Shindler, L. R. Conner, president of the Ochiltree County Wheat Control Association; and W. M. Deck, president of the County Agricultural Association; Sam Hergert, Dave Wilson, Galen Murphy, Van W. Stewart, A. E. Devers, A. C. Emberson, O. A. Schuster, Sam Handly, Roby Bollinger and Forest Foregy, were in the "dust" before reaching Spearman.

On to the west, the wind, dust, and destruction grew greater, and they wondered if it were possible for any method of control to check the swirling top soil. And then a few miles into Dallam county where thousands of acres have been abandoned, where families have been forced to leave their farm homes by the choking, killing dust storms, they were met on the highway by H. D. McGinnis of the Department of Interior, who conducted the party through the experiment lands.

Here was found farms that had been abandoned, and here in this project was also found green fields of wheat, and although the dust was so thick that it was almost impossible to see on the highway, they found that H. H. Fennell, regional erosion director, and his men, had stopped the soil from blowing on their lands. The change was almost unbelievable.

The Ochiltree county party was shown through the project, they saw terracing, contour plowing, contour listing, tree planting, heard plans for strip cropping, and became convinced that a successful plan for stopping blowing soil had been found.

Here in this Federal project, hope was born anew. Some of those in the party had become disgusted with the seemingly never ending wind, whipping and blowing out crops year after year. They were ready to leave, abandon their once productive lands to the ravages of nature. Now they were converted and are spreading the gospel of wind erosion control throughout the county. They see in the "Dalhart" plan, a method of farming which, if followed on our much richer and more productive soil, would mean crop insurance.

Finnell At Meeting

At the Dalhart meeting on Monday afternoon, 700 citizens from all sections of the plains gathered to hear Mr. Finnell explain his plan for combating wind erosion. The mistake of Panhandle farmers, paying the way for wind erosion, was failure to provide a protective cover for the soil when sod was turned under, Finnell said. Two of the worst offenses were burning wheat

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possess this wonderful trait must not expect it to come drifting to him. The man who always waits for opportunities will not have many. They must be made. Peace must be sought. There must be hunger for it. A deep appreciation for it must possess the man or woman of God. Of course this is not peace at any price. Peace at the sacrifice of truth is no peace. When truth must be crucified in order to bring about peace, how dear is the purchase? Neither will consolidation of errors make peace. Fallible creeds and dogmas will never unite in the world for Christ.

There is a reward for this effort on the part of the disciple. God will hear his prayers. Jehovah will watch over his footsteps. When the soul is in tune with its Maker, what wonderful melodies can be made up in its vibrant heartstrings.

III. Suffering For The Right (3:14)
 It seems hard for us to understand why anyone should suffer. But this word is common to us all. Does it have a silver lining? Can it be possible that after it has been endured, that there is a reward? The answer to these queries lies in determining whether the suffering is for evil or good. A criminal gets no relief nor consolation from his punishment in prison. We would hardly expect a man to look with affection upon the electric chair to which he has been condemned. But when you suffer for something good you are doing, then there is the assurance that you will be rewarded in due time, and that heaven will brush away your tears—change them to pearls. Then we learn to love that for which we have sacrificed and suffered. No man loves a community greater than some pioneer who has endured great hardship for it. One reason why the apostles loved the gospel and the Cause of Christ so much was surely because they suffered so much for it. When the shepherd had gone into the mountains looking for the lost sheep, methinks he had an added appreciation for the bleating little creature borne triumphantly upon his shoulders back over the trail that had meant suffering for him. Sacrifice is inseparable with true service.

IV. Sanctification of Christ (3:15)
 Perhaps there is no word in the Bible that has been more misused than sanctification. The idea that we inherit Adam's sin and are born into the world in a state of depravity gave rise to another error. It was thought that at justification we were delivered from the sins we committed, and at sanctification we were cleansed of the Adamic inbred sin. Both these errors have led to no small bit of confusion and religious speculation. In the first place, the Bible does not teach that we

inherit a depraved soul, for the soul comes from God. Men and women will be judged for what they do, not for what Adam, Eve, or any other ancestors have done.

What then is sanctification? Is it sinless perfection wrought by some spectacular abstract act of the Holy Spirit? Surely not. We must remember that the vessels of the temple were sanctified. Were they cleansed from sin? We read of Jesus' request to the Father to sanctify His disciples through the truth (Jno. 17:17). Hence the gospel was to set them apart, dedicate them to the new work of preaching in the name of Christ.

Our present lesson treats of the sanctification of Christ. This was not the purifying or cleansing of the Savior. He had no sin. What, then, can be the only solution? The Bible one. Christ is to be set apart in our lives as the object of our worship, service and adoration. He is our King and Savior. As such He is dedicated or set apart for this great exclusive field.

The suffering of Christ was for us. His life was for us. The gospel is for us. To sanctify Jesus in our hearts is to appropriate to proper use these wonderful provisions that we may truly render service that will reflect the work of the sanctified Christ in sanctified hearts.

Grow Healthy Chicks For Poultry Profit

II. HATCH CHICKS EARLY
 By
H. O. Ware, Extension Poultryman
 Oklahoma A. & M. College

Chicks should be hatched early enough to give them proper growth and development for fall production. It takes approximately six months from the time Leghorns are hatched until they begin to lay, and it takes Rhode Island Reds, Plymouth Rocks, Wyandotte and Orpingtons approximately seven months to lay after hatching date. It is necessary to allow a few weeks after date of first egg for marketable egg size to be reached.

Egg prices are usually the highest in October, November, and December each year; therefore, the pullets should be old enough to be laying in early September if they are to give the greatest return on their investment.

R. B. Thompson and Charles Upp, in 1927, at the Oklahoma Experiment Station made a series of 26 hatches of white Leghorns, at two week intervals from December 1923 to 1924, and carried several of the lots through a year laying period. They found that the best hatches were secured between December 31 and April 7. Summer and fall hatches were poor and chick mortality was heavier in the summer and fall.

Mr. Berry and Mr. Walker at the New Mexico station found that chicks hatched in February and March weighed about twice as much at the end of a 56-day brooding period as chicks hatched in June and July. Considering all factors, March and April are recommended as being the most desirable months for hatching in New Mexico. One month earlier should be all right in central and eastern Oklahoma, and probably about the same as New Mexico in the western section.

Fall moult among white Leghorn pullets has caused trouble to some flock owners. Moult in the fall, however, can usually be controlled by the proper feed, range and management. Early hatched pullets that have access of plenty of yellow corn, range where there is an abundance of shade, green feed, and water, rarely ever moult to any great extent.

Place Chicks Orders Early
 It will pay flock owners to locate where the chicks are to be bought and place their orders for early delivery. There will be little cutting in prices due to the ruling governing the Breeder and Hatchery Code that is now in full force. Even though your chicks may cost a little more than they did last year, the quality will offset the difference.

Flock owners should keep in mind when making purchases that egg

hens should bring more money than chicks from flock mated hens.

The Grow Healthy Chick campaign is going along in full swing, and any flock owner who has 200 or more chicks to raise, is eligible without cost, to receive the Grow Healthy Chick mortality record blank, and news letters, if he will send his name to the county or home demonstration agents of the respective counties or to the Extension Division, Oklahoma A. & M. College, Stillwater, Oklahoma.

ORDINANCE 144

"ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ELECTRICAL INTERFERENCE WITH RADIO RECEPTION IN THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR PUNISHMENT FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS: Section One That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, co-partnership, Association, or corporation knowingly or wantonly to operate or cause to be operated any machine, device, apparatus or instrument of any kind whatsoever, within the corporate limits of the City of Perryton, Texas, the operation of which shall cause reasonably preventable electrical interference with radio reception within the municipal limits; provided, however, that such machine, device, apparatus or instrument may be used at any time if the machine or apparatus used are properly equipped to avoid all unnecessary or reasonably preventable interference with radio reception, and are not negligently operated.

Section Two That every person, co-partnership, association, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), or by imprisonment in the city jail for not less than three days or more than ten days, or by both fine and imprisonment. PLANT TREES AND SHRUBS AS WINDBREAK FOR GARDEN

Chinese elm, Russian mulberry, American elm, Red Cedar, iris, flowering willow, red buds, honey suckle and grapes are some of the three hundred and fifty trees and shrubs put out for windbreaks for the garden by Mrs. Curtis Roach, farm food supply cooperator of the Missouri Avenue Home Demonstration club.

Mrs. Roach has tiled her garden and has it spaded and fertilized. An asparagus bed has been prepared and crowns set out. To insure plenty of water for her garden Mrs. Roach is having a one thousand barrel tank installed.

Mrs. Roach has completed her meat canning and has eight varieties of meats making a total of nine hundred pounds. She also has sixty pounds of soap and three hundred and twenty pounds of lard. Mrs. Roach is also planning a supply of poultry products for her family. If she has good luck with incubators and eggs, she will have 1200 baby chicks by the middle of the week.

INCREASE STORAGE SPACE

To replace boxes and floor space used in storing products in her cellar, Mrs. J. M. Blodgett, farm food supply cooperator of Blodgett Home Demonstration club has added sixty feet of shelving. Mrs. Blodgett has taken inventory of her cellar and finds that she has several varieties of fruits and vegetables, eighty pounds of cured meat, forty-eight quarts of canned meat, 200 pounds of lard, and one hundred and twenty five pounds of soap.

Mrs. Blodgett has also begun her poultry raising. She has fifty chicks, six weeks old.

Secretary Of Agriculture Wallace Report

There are a number of excerpts from the annual 1934 report of Secretary of Agriculture Wallace covering subjects that are of particular interest to the farmers of the great West of the Southwest.

Emergency Adjustment Period

None had and of our period of emergency adjustment, of drastic reduction in the farm output, is coming. In the case of some crops, such as wheat, corn, and soybeans, the domestic surplus has disappeared, and of crop control and partly of conditions. As we advance adjustment of supply to existing demand, the basic principle of agricultural adjustment Act, and more clearly. It is production, which does not reduce the production of crops, but producing different crops in the proper amounts. Sometimes we have expansion, sometimes contraction, and farmers must increase their output. In 1934, however, they must keep ahead of the growth of demand and ahead of it. They must be against piling up new surpluses. Cooperative action as prescribed in the Agricultural Adjustment Act affords the means.

A balanced abundance of farm products might be achieved by restricting domestic production along the lines of "economic" it is doubtful that would appreciably raise prices. One of the major problems in the restoration of agricultural parity is an increase in the purchasing power of the industrial population. A second major problem is a reduction in the prices of industrial products that have advanced so far. When the industrial on and pay rolls are in the industrial population is able to buy more food at lower prices. When industrial prices are low, the farmer is in a position to buy more industrial goods at lower prices. This high income and a higher standard of living for the industrial population both turn on the purchasing power of the industrial population. The great need now, as he considers efforts to produce a balanced output, is that of getting full value for the industrial population. In order that consumers may pay fair prices for higher quality products. The farm recovery of the past was little or nothing to in the world market. It is mainly of domestic change which the activities of the Government have been the important element.

World Wheat Cooperation by putting our wheat industry on a domestic basis farmers get permanent price through acreage restriction. Putting it on a domestic could be very difficult; for price gains would tempt back into large production. Lasting world cooperation United States will have to

reconsider its whole wheat program, and possibly to contemplate renewed production for export at highly competitive world prices. Within the United States returns to wheat farmers could be maintained above the world level, through making adjustment payments under the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Now that the wheat surplus of the depression period has disappeared we must adjust the production with an eye to the whole situation, both foreign and domestic, and should not commit ourselves to a program of indefinite restriction, regardless of conditions abroad.

Reciprocal Benefit of Export Trade

Europe needs the farm goods we have to sell, and forgoes them only from necessity. The advantage to the American farmer of enabling Europe to buy here once more would be enormous. American agriculture depends far more on foreign trade than does American industry. From 1921 to 1930 this country exported more than 13 percent of its farm production, and the trade constituted about a third of its total exports. Moreover, this third represented only primary agricultural products such as wheat and flour and cotton. It did not include many agricultural products elaborately manufactured and exported as manufactured goods. Since 1929 our farm export trade has declined in value nearly 60 percent. Restoring it substantially, through some increase in industrial imports, would give agriculture new life.

There would be no countervailing penalties upon industry. Broadly agricultural trade can increase only through an increase in the number of consumers. This is a consequence of the often-mentioned limitations of the stomach. Hence the only feasible alternative to the recovery of the agricultural export trade is the contraction of agriculture. No similar contradiction of industry would result from an increase in industrial imports. For many industrial products the potential demand is boundless. Upon agricultural consumption the final limitation is physiological. Upon industrial consumption the final limitation is simply purchasing power. Whatever increases purchasing power increases the manufacturer's market. Hence the admission of foreign goods into the American market, since it would be accompanied by an increase in the purchasing power of the farmers, would handicap industry far less than the alternative policy of enforced farm contraction would handicap agriculture.

Part-Time Nonfarm Work

Established farmers have a right to insist that nonfarm sources of cash income be made available when the country establishes unemployed people on the land. Placing thousands of families on the land, with no other source of income, drives them into commercial farming. They may not produce any great quantity of goods for sale, but what they do produce will be sold at distress prices. Such restricted marginal production can do great harm. So far the movement to put city people on the land has run ahead of the provision for supplementary employment. People have been decentralized faster than industry, and established farming suffers. Part-time nonfarm work must go along with so-called "subsistence farming."

Cash Income From Marketings

In 1932 the average farmer, after paying interest, taxes, and the expenses of production, had nothing left as a return for his capital and management. In 1933, for the first time since 1929, he had left a small net balance after writing down his capital structure. Income from marketings in 1933, with benefit and rental payments added, exceeded

that of 1932 by 16 per cent, and prospects are for an additional gain of 19 per cent in 1934.

The total cash income of farmers from the sale of farm products for the calendar year 1934, including rental and benefit payments and income from the sale of cattle, sheep, and goats to the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, is estimated at approximately \$6,000,000,000. This estimate is based upon an analysis of farm production in 1934, probable prices and marketings of farm products during the last 5 months of the year, and cash income during the first 7 months of the year as previously estimated. The estimated cash income for 1934 is 19 per cent larger than in 1933 and 33 per cent over 1932.

Shift To Grass And Forage

Neither from any quick improvement in the demand, nor from the withdrawal of land from agriculture, are we likely to reach quickly a point at which capacity production will be continuously profitable. Necessarily, therefore, we must consider a major shift from excess acreage of surplus crops back to the balanced condition between cultivated and grass acreages which existed before the war. Naturally, the plan cannot be put into effect to the same extent on every farm. Farmers with heavy fixed costs and with no chance to farm more acres as an offset to decreased production per acre would have legitimate objections. Generally, however, the shift would reduce the pressure of supplies on the market without throwing farm land totally out of use. It would advance the farm-readjustment program as a whole, with some advantage to every farmer. In order to square the general with the individual interest and to overcome difficulties on individual farms, it may be necessary to arrange for collective action under Federal guidance, in harmony with principles already familiar to the country through the A. A. A. adjustment programs. There is no reason why collective voluntary adjustment should not work as effectively in promoting a shift to grass and forage as it does in other directions.

New Paths In Agricultural Research

The crisis through which American agriculture is passing gives a new direction to agricultural research and a new importance to certain kinds. Especially it emphasizes the worth of investigations having an immediate social application. In shaping its research to meet the emergency, the Department has kept this principle firmly in mind. It has strengthened various studies promising wide social benefit, not only to farmers but to other economic groups. Examples are the economic investigations that furnish a basis for crop adjustments; the soil surveys and land classifications that influence subsoil erosion; and diet studies that serve to guide public agencies in dispensing relief. We need technical progress in the distribution as well as in the production of wealth. Research devoted to that end joins economic science to production science without detracting at all from the value of the latter. It produces benefits that cannot be monopolized. Much research of this kind we have had, of course, for a long time. As we move away from ruthless competition toward efficient social cooperation, the scope and the need for it increase.

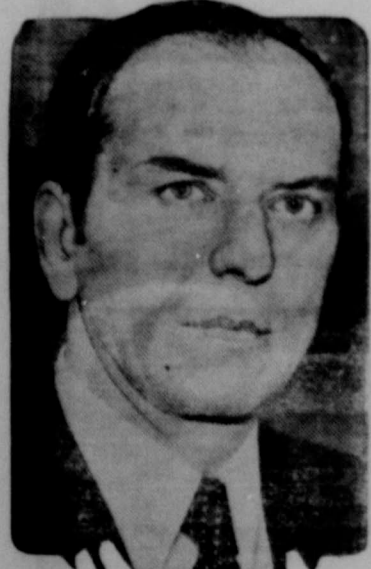

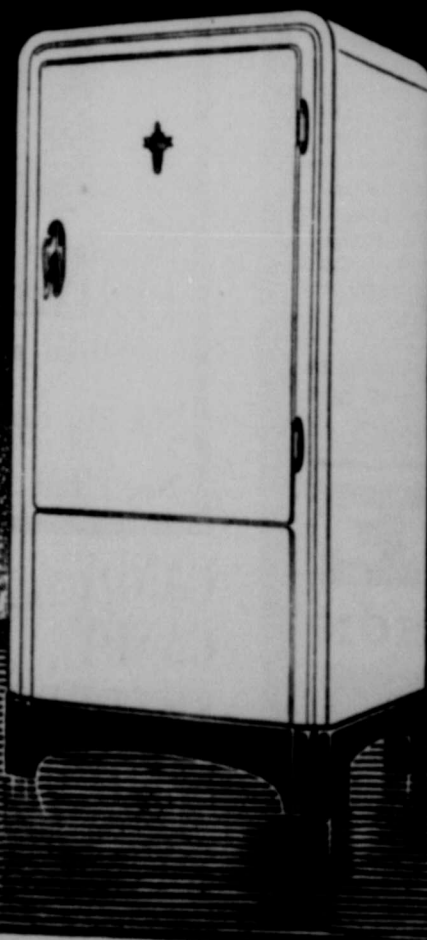

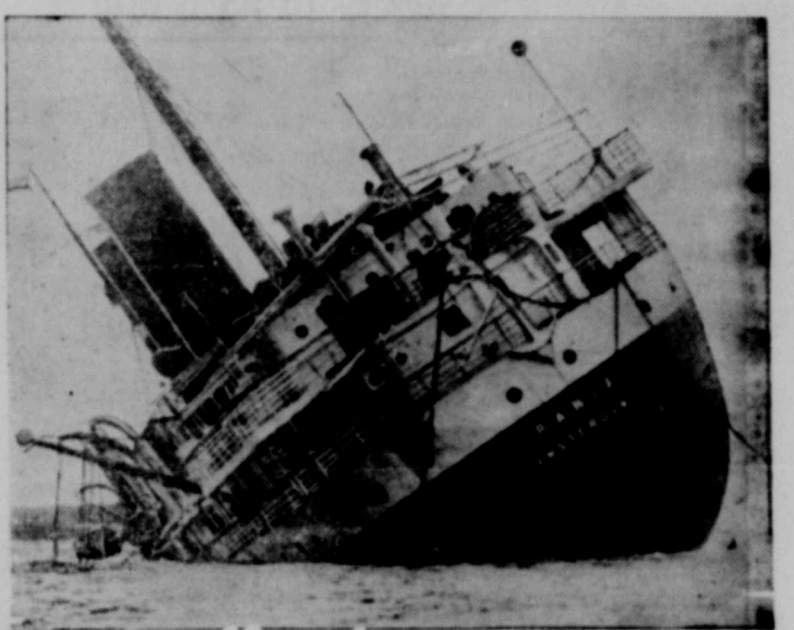

stubble and grazing stalk fields clean, he declared.

Finnell, in charge of the 25,000-acre Dalhart Wind Erosion control project, 20 miles east of Dalhart, is intimately familiar with High Plains conditions and has studied erosion carefully for years. The first four defenses against wind erosion, he said, are proper utilization of crop residue, moisture conservation, terracing and contouring, emergency cover crops. Cover crops, if proper, will not exhaust soil moisture, he stated, and will permit fallow benefits, if desired. Special tillage methods are a last resort, he declared. They are expensive and give no return beyond whatever measure of temporary protection they afford. He urged planting of trees.

Resolutions Ask Aid

John E. Hill, Amarillo, president of the Panhandle League and the Panhandle Agricultural Assn. was chairman of a resolutions committee which drew a resolution essentially as follows: That rainfall in the Panhandle of the five states for 1933 and 1934 has been only 50 per cent or less of normal; that in the same period erosive winds have incalculably damaged the soil; that four consecutive crop failures, in addition to the depression have depleted financial resources of the people to the point of exhaustion; that practical methods of wind erosion control have been worked out; that their broad application would furnish badly needed employment; taking farmers off relief rolls and preventing others from having to ask relief; that it is imperative for immediate action in order to save the area already eroding and preventing the spread of "blowing" to adjacent lands and that federal authorities approve the Dalhart Plan at once with modifications necessary and allocate sufficient funds to get it started now.

The plan briefly is for the government to furnish gasoline for tractors, and seed and pay farmers for wide row sorghum planting in denuded areas.

Terracing Benefits Shown

By slides Mr. Daniel of Goodwell, demonstrated benefits of terracing. It costs \$1 to \$1.50 per acre, he said, (quoting experiments by Mr. Finnell) and will increase wheat yields three bushels per acre.

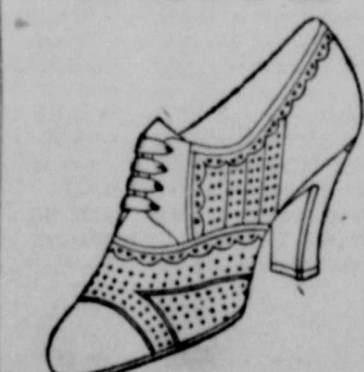
