Perhaps another great man from the field of medical research will someday come up with the right answer to the killer cancer.

Mrs. Curtis Erwin assumed her duties Monday morning as assistant secretary - treasurer of the Stanton-Midland National Farm Loan Association.

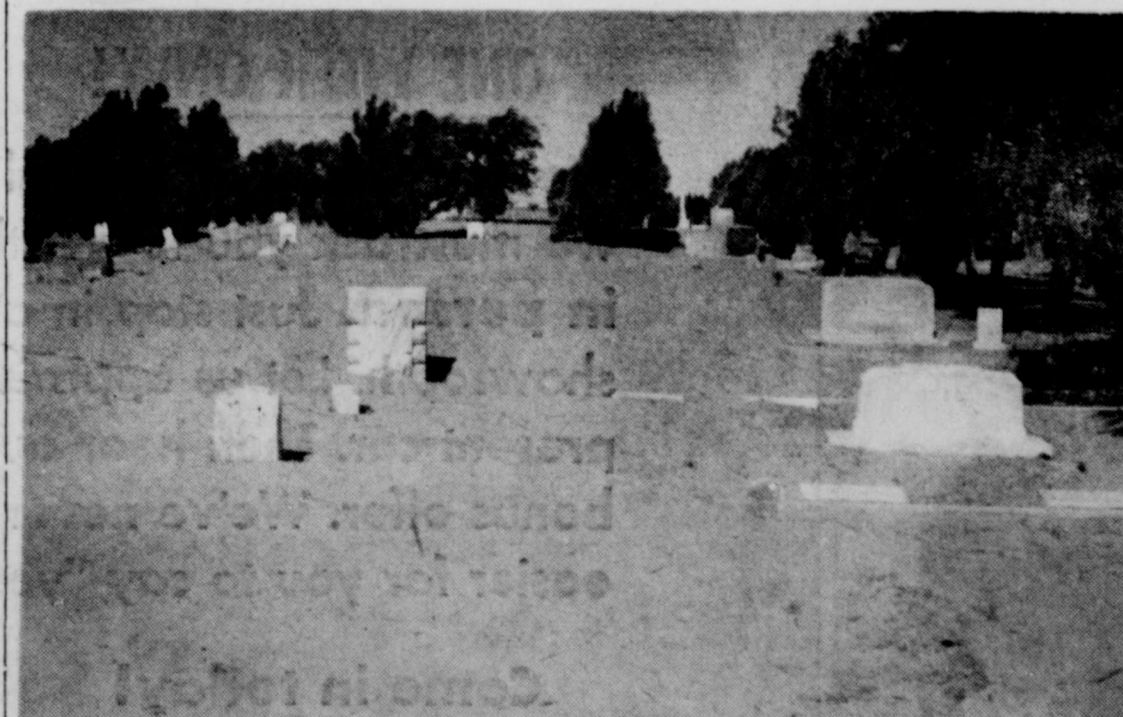
She takes the place of Mrs. Opal Keisling, who recently resigned from that position.

FARM POPULATION INCREASING . . .

Industry, as no one doubts, has drawn people from the farms. During the past 20 years this trend has cut in half the farm population in Texas. Few lamented the trend. Agriculture production certainly has not suffered from lack of numbers. Too, what town or city, regardless of size, does not want "another industry?" Industrially, Texas is booming as never before in its history. Thus, the recent report of Texas A&M College's annual farm population study must be startling news. Texas, they say, gained some 15,000 farm people during 1955.

This farm population gain in Texas last year was the first of any size since 1934. The reason was not evidenced but it seems to us that it well might be attributed to a comparative newcomer—the "part-time farmer." He is representative of both agriculture and industry and, in our view, is a credit to each.

Americans are a bustling, energetic people. With industry's shortened hours and work week, many business workers with their off-duty time have turned to agriculture. These part-time farmers are engaged in just about every kind of agriculture: cattle, truck crops, broilers, laying hens, bees and even major crops on large acreages. An influencing factor, of course, in the development of part-time farmers has been agriculture's tremendous mechanization. Many of these new farmers coming from industry are inclined to be perfectionists. They study their agriculture operations and seek counsel from County Agents, Soil Conservationists and other authorities. They make fine employees and good citizens. Rooted to the soil, they are concerned with the economic and social development of their localities.

In West Texas today it is estimated that 26 per cent of the farms and ranches are not commercially operated. In fact, over 40 per cent of the farmers in Texas in 1954 reported outside incomes in excess of the value of all their farm products sold. During the past six dry years in West Texas, "part-time farmers" have been the salvation of many farms. This partnership of agriculture and industry is paying highly rewarding dividends to Texas economy and portends an even brighter future. To us, it is a wonderful commentary that industry, which pulled farmers from the soil, is the very magic medium which today is keeping many of the farms and adding others.

Philosopher Favors International Money Lending Program

(Editor's Note: The Martin County Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Mustang Draw probably has his banking terms mixed up, his letter this week indicates.)

Dear editor:

I ran across an item in the paper the other day, well actually I didn't run across it, at the time I was sitting under a tree in the shade out here thumbing through a newspaper and it just showed up before me, which appeals to me.

According to it, a foreign affairs expert in Washington was arguing that the United States ought to get busy and loan some money to a list of countries he'd been investigating because, he said, if we don't Russia will. The fact that the loans might not be any good when the time came to pay them back didn't enter into it, the idea was to loan them some money before Russia did.

Now there's a type of banking I admire and I wonder why the banks in this country can't rise above their narrow, local viewpoint and get up on the international level.

Take two competing banks. If they'd practice international banking and try to beat each other to a shaky customer just to keep the other one from getting to him, you'd find the wheels of business around here beginning to spin.

Banking with an international flavor is what this country needs, or at least what I need. How much lending business do you think Washington would do if other countries if it applied the narrow rules private bankers use? Make the loan before somebody else does and worry about the paying back later . . . that's the system I'd like to see put into effect.

One week of this kind of banking and you'd see more merchandise moved off the shelves than you've seen in years, but most bankers just can't see it that way, and even if they could, their stockholders couldn't.

If you hear though of any banker getting up on the international level around here and trying to loan me some money before anybody else does, let me know. I'd like to get there before the money's all gone.

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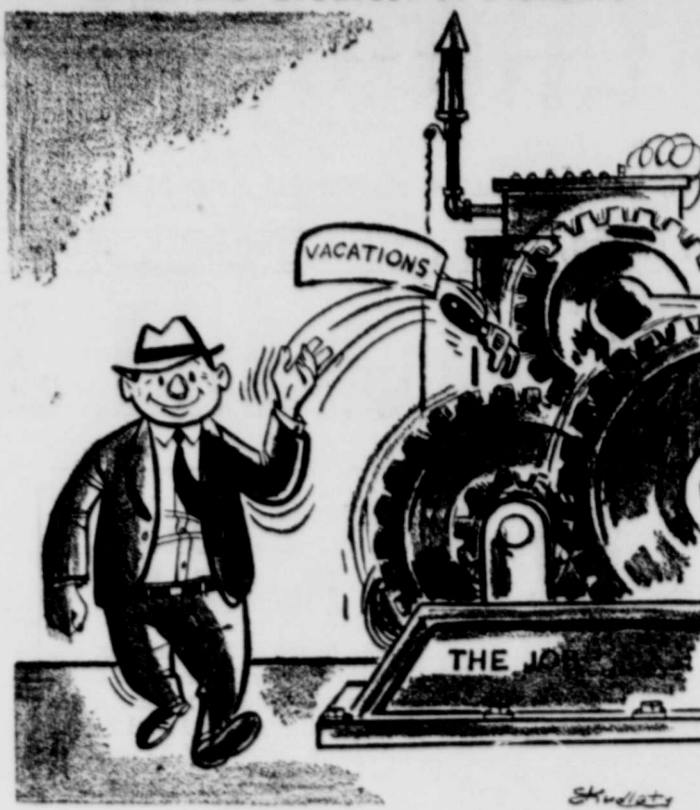
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BIBLE COMMENT

Ramsey Touring State Prior To Campaign Opening

Soil and water conservation and greater protection for Texas families through good services and stability in government are the major issues on which Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey will campaign for re-election this summer.

Ramsey, who is touring the state preparatory to officially opening his campaign, said, "Soil is the storehouse of agriculture and industry. Water is the key to both."

"People throughout Texas have made great strides in soil and water saving practices in the past 10 years." He added, "The state must give full assistance to equitable plans for conservation at the local level if we are to maintain a sound economy and reach our true potential."

On plans for protection of Texas families, Ramsey said the government must effect rigid rules of conduct and exacting controls over blind forces of influence. Ramsey cited the need for (1) strict curbs on lobbying; (2) stiff narcotic penalties, with life imprisonment or death penalty for the second conviction on charge of selling to minors; (3) eliminating loan sharks; and (4) an unceasing watch to assure families their insurance policies are sound.

Ramsey, who spearheaded the move to rid the insurance industry of "parasites" and eliminate fraudulent investment schemes, said the results have been tremendous.

"Time and experience," Ramsey said, "will determine whether the barricades in our new laws are high enough and solid enough to keep ruthless speculators from preying upon the public. The scavengers will be back at the next session of the Legislature in attempt to gain back their lost special privileges."

"My ambition," Ramsey said, "is to wage the fight through the complete assurance of full protection to the public in all phases of government."

Ramsey, a life-long resident of San Augustine, lives at his farm home three miles from town, with his wife, the former Florine Hankla, and their two daughters, Rita Rhea, six years of age, and Ann, three years.

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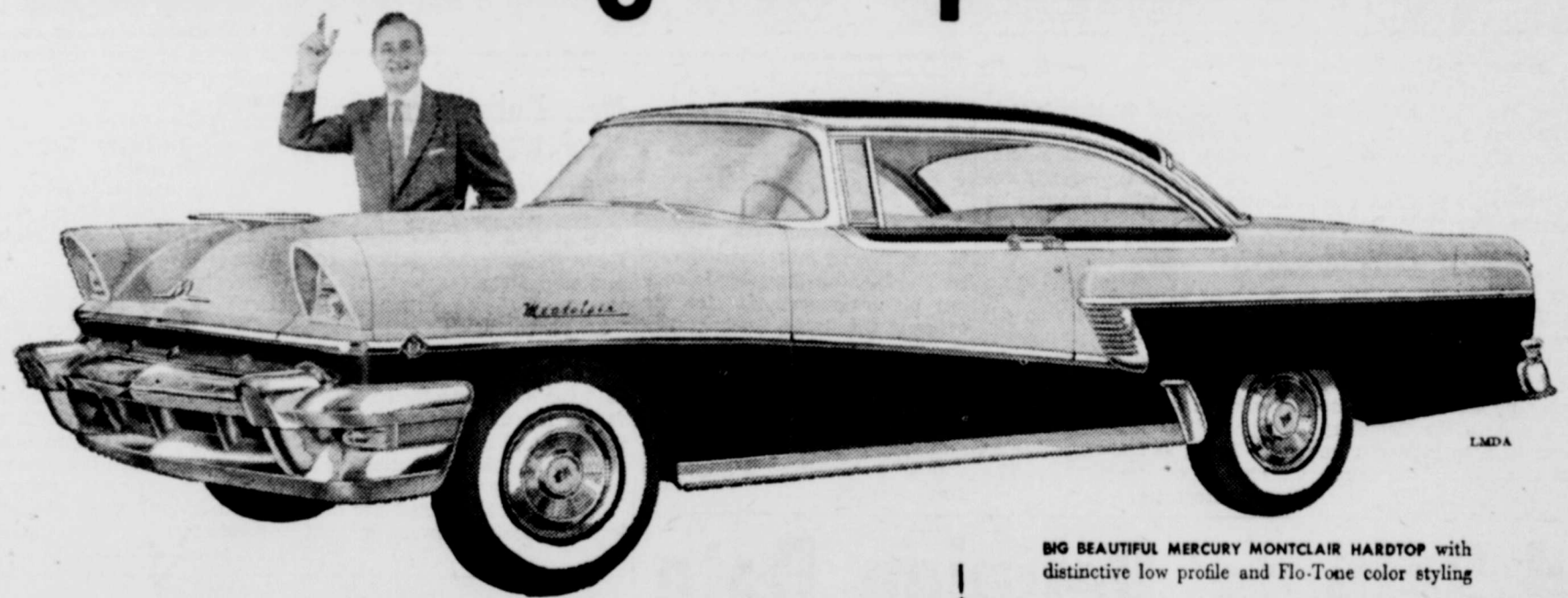

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



MARTIN-HOWARD SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

"Man can go broke by having too many cattle, but seldom is man hurt by having too much grass."—R. E. Dickson.

Leonard "Shorty" Langley who lives six miles northeast of Stanton on the Dr. Y. D. McMurry farm is planting 80 acres of blue panic and sand lovegrass in rows. There is 160 acres of this grass already established.

The old frontier is gone, but there is a new one—new land on our farms through soil conservation.

Edgar Phillips, a supervisor of the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District, who lives 7 miles north of Big Spring, has a field in which New Era cowpeas were interplanted with grain sorghum in the same row on dry land. His son, Fred, harvested the grain sorghum and he estimated the yield was over 1,000 pounds per acre. There was no indication that the yield of grain was reduced by the cowpeas, although the crop was not irrigated. An increased yield is expected from the crop planted this year due to the loosening effect of the subsoil and storage of plant food by the cowpeas.

Our soil is not just dirt. It is a factory, where everything needed to feed plants, animals, and human beings is made.

A good many Martin County farmers are planting cotton in four-row strips with guar, cowpeas and grain sorghums. An incentive payment by the Martin County ASC is offered to promote this soil protecting practice.

"When we sign our names on paper, few of us use the 'mark' made with two straight lines. Instead we write our signatures with lots of curves. We need more writing on the land and fewer marks."—George R. Free.

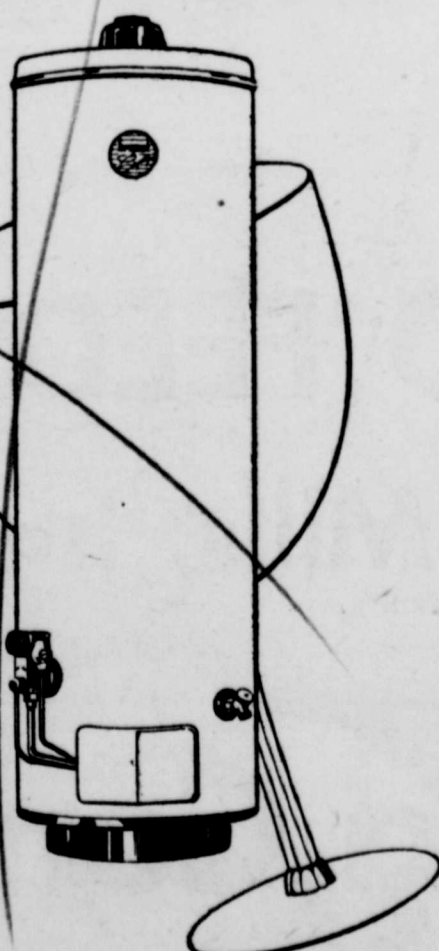
