THERE'S A NEW tip for you on the rain situation. Dr. J. H. OLDEN AND CISCO BOYS TAKE OPENING TOURNAMENT GAMES

The Olden and Cisco boys and the Moran and Putnam girls advanced to the quarter finals of the Cisco Junior High School invitation basketball tournament Tuesday night by virtue of taking their first round games.

In the opening contest at 6 p. m. the Moran girls downed the Olden team 18-8 and at 7 p. m. the Olden boys evened the count by eliminating the Moran boys 32-9. At 8 p. m. the Putnam girls defeated the Cisco "B" team 14-6 and in the final game of the evening the Cisco boys ousted the Putnam boys 44-20.

In the Cisco-Putnam girls game the locals held the visitors to a 0-0 score for the first quarter but weakened in the remaining three quarters to drop the contest. In the Cisco-Putnam boys game Bill Smith came through to make 14 points to lead in the scoring. It was the first time this season that Smith had tried many shots and he was sinking them from every angle to gain a lead in scoring. Jim Branton had a good eye for the basket in the short time that he played and made six points. The remainder of the squad all accounted for a number of points to score the 44 points in the four short quarters.

Play in the tournament will be resumed Thursday night when the remainder of the first round games will be reeled off. The Cisco girls "A" team will play the Eastland "B" team at 6 p. m. and the Cisco boys "B" team

will play Albany at 7 p. m. At 8 p. m. Eastland and Scranton girls will play and in the final game of the first round the Eastland boys will play the Scranton boys.

Friday afternoon the consolation matches will begin with the Cisco "B" girls playing the Olden team at 2 o'clock. At 3 p. m. the Moran and Putnam boys will play. At 4 p. m. the first quarter finals game will be played with the Moran and Putnam girls taking the court. At 5 p. m. Friday the Cisco boys and the Olden boys will play. There will be no games Friday night. The remainder of the games will be played Saturday afternoon and night.

Legion Chief Calls Conflict In Korea 'A Full Scale War'

The Korean conflict is nothing short of a full-scale war, State Commander Charlie Gibson of the American Legion told interviewers here Tuesday. He was in Cisco between meetings in Rising Star and Abilene.

"There have been 100,000 casualties in Korea, including 20,000 dead," Commander Gibson said. "Call it a conflict if you like."

Mr. Gibson noted that in past wars, "we hit and hit hard at the weak points." He charged that "we are fighting with one hand tied behind us" in not following the enemy into Manchuria.

Since his election to the top Legion post in Texas last August, Mr. Gibson has been on a continuous tour of the state. He was asked if he had noted any significant trends in political thinking. He said that the Legion steers clear of politics, but that there appears to be a growing interest in all levels of politics.

The American Legion, he noted, played a big part in urging Texans to pay their poll taxes. The fact that tax payments were made in record numbers was regarded by the commander as evidence of a new trend. He said that Legion posts would urge the people to vote but would make no effort to influence the vote.

Mr. Gibson, a native of Rising Star, was honored there Monday night in a home-coming celebration. Visitors were present from throughout this region. District Commander E. L. Jackson of Cisco appeared on the program.

During his stay here, which included Monday afternoon and night and Tuesday morning, Mr. Gibson visited Lake Cisco Park, operated by Cisco Legionnaires. He complimented the Post on its program.

Water Situation Studied At Meet

A resolution ordering a city election to select three city commissioners was passed Tuesday night at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the city commission. The election will be held the first Tuesday in April — on April 1.

Under the election laws, candidates for the vacancies must file application for places on the ballot 30 days prior to the election. City officials said March 2 would be the deadline for candidates to file for the office.

The terms of Commissioners Joe Britain, J. W. Slaughter and J. L. Stafford expire this year. Mr. Britain and Mr. Slaughter have announced for re-election, and Mr. Stafford has told friends that he will not be a candidate.

In addition to ordering the election, the council attended to regular first of the month business.

The water situation was discussed and the commission decided that oil well drilling contractors would be sent to Lake Birnie for water after March 1 unless there is a rain. Lake Birnie has not been used for city water for many years.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal told the commission that if it might become necessary to consider something unusual for Cisco later in the year — water rationing. He noted that "we have plenty of water for our needs at this time, but the lake is getting low and it hasn't been raining." The city has had plenty of water, he added, since Lake Cisco dam was built some 29 years ago.

The commission agreed to write the Texas Railroad Commission a letter in support of an oil drilling program of one well to the city block, a spacing plan adopted unofficially for south Cisco town-site drilling.

A proposition to buy several city lots in the south part of town was studied and taken under advisement.

Social Security Man Is Due Here

Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2 p. m. on Thursday, February 14, and 28. Persons needing information or assistance in connection with old-age and survivors insurance matters are invited to call to see him at that time.

Mr. McNatt called attention to the fact that persons who are receiving old-age and survivors insurance payments, and who have earnings from their own businesses must make an annual report to the Social Security Administration showing net earnings for the year. This applies to all persons who are under the age of 75, who are drawing retirement or survivors payments, and who have net earnings from self-employment averaging more than \$50 a month for the year. These reports are in addition to any income tax returns or other tax returns that are due; in most cases they must be filed before March 15, 1952.

Further information about these annual reports, and blank forms for their preparation, can be secured from Mr. McNatt, or by writing the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas.

LEARNING TO FARM

Ever since there has been an agricultural college, people have been asking these two questions:

1. "Why go to college to learn to farm?"
2. "Why do agricultural graduates not go back to the farm?"
For the first time an attempt has been made to find a reasonably accurate answer. That answer is contained in a bulletin of Texas A. and M. College entitled "A Study of the Agricultural Graduates of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas." Its author is Dean Charles N. Shepardson of the A. and M. School of Agriculture.

To ferret out the facts and graduates whose current addresses, Dean Shepardson mailed dresses were available. By Sept. a questionnaire in April, 1936, to 1 replies had been received from the 4,702 A. and M. agricultural 1,927 graduates — about 41 per

cent of those to whom the questionnaire was mailed. The replies seem to constitute the best answers available to the age-old questions. The answers are:

1. It is profitable to go to college to learn to farm. A. and M. graduates now engaged in full-time farming reported an average annual income of \$8,450 as compared to the \$2,800 average for all Texas farmers.

2. The majority do go back to the farm as owners or operators as soon as they can accumulate sufficient capital to make this possible. Of the group answering the questionnaire, 44.1 per cent are farm owners or operators. The percentage is lower in the group of recent graduates and increases to 68.2 per cent in the group who graduated before 1920. Not taken into consideration in the figures, but possibly having some significance thereto, is the fact that several of the courses offered in the School of Agriculture are not designed primarily to prepare young men for farming.

This is apparent from the list of courses offered: Agricultural administration, agricultural education, agricultural engineering, agronomy, animal husbandry, dairy husbandry, poultry husbandry, entomology, floriculture and landscape architecture, horticulture, range and forestry and wildlife management.

However, 78.5 per cent of those included in the study are engaged in some phase of agricultural work or related business. Of this group 18.6 per cent are engaged in full-time farming, 28.1 per cent in full or part-time farming.

Forty-seven per cent are engaged in professional agriculture 12.9 in business related to agriculture and 21.5 in fields of en-

Clevelands Will Attend Program

Dr. and Mrs. Charles M. Cleveland of Cisco plan to attend the next meeting of the West Central Texas Optometric Society on Sunday, February 17, in Abilene. An open panel discussion of the increase in visual problems among school children is the program.

The American Optometric Association in a recent statement to the profession revealed that of the 30,000,000 school children in America, 6,000,000 are in need of visual care. One in every five school children is a visual problem, and the number is on the increase!

Since 33% of a child's knowledge is gained through use of his eyes, it was found these same visual problems contribute greatly to poor scholastic achievements, even failure, poor reading ability, faulty visual habits and posture, and inability to get along with other children.

A visual problem can contribute to or even create delinquency. Since a child cannot achieve in school because of faulty vision, he often seeks some other means to command recognition.

A panel discussion will also reveal the latest techniques and aides of modern visual care to restore classroom efficiency and visual achievement to these stricken youngsters.

deavor unrelated to agriculture, including those serving in the armed forces.

Some 56.3 per cent of the graduates included in the study still anticipate farm ownership or operation at some future time, while only 15.6 per cent do not intend ever to farm.

More graduates have become farmers, or still intend to, than planned to do so at the time of graduation.

Of the group which still anticipates farming 80.5 per cent gave lack of capital as their reason for delay. Other reasons included military service and lack of experience.

The interval since graduation and the economic conditions at time of graduation appeared to have an influence in whether a man is now engaged in farming or related business, or in professional work. In general the longer the interval since graduation the larger the percentage now engaged in farming. The depression groups of 1920-24 and 1930-34 show somewhat lower percentages of farmers than those graduating in more prosperous years.

Those graduates who now are farming appear to be farming better than those in other occupations. While the average income of all agricultural graduates is approximately \$6,000 per year, the average for the full-time farmers is \$8,450.

This compares with an average income of \$2,800 for all Texas farmers; \$7,650 for those graduates who are land owners, including the part-time farmers; \$6,750 for those in non-related business; \$5,900 for those in business related to agriculture, and \$4,800 for those in professional agricultural work.

The graduates report their greatest hinderances to progress as being lack of capital, lack of experience and inadequate training and vocational indecision, in that order.

The greatest benefits received from their college training were listed as technical foundation, ability to find information, practical training and development of self-confidence.

A large percentage of the agricultural graduates of A. and M. College continue in some phase of agricultural work, with more than two-thirds of them ultimately becoming farm or ranch owners or operators.

The mitral valve of the heart works pretty much on the same principle as those overhead garage doors that open automatically when you honk your horn. Actually, in the mitral valve you have two doors which overlap a bit, so if you would swing your garage doors from the side instead of overhead, you'd get a more accurate picture of the mitral valve action.

The springs that work those garage doors are behind the doors, just like the tendons that open and close the mitral cusps. If those springs get jammed, the doors don't respond to the "honk" and you can't get the car into the garage. The jamming of the spring is like unto the condition known as mitral stenosis, when the blood can't get from the top of the heart (atrium) into the "garage" (ventricle), there is a jam in the flow of the blood.

If those springs don't work at all or are too loose, the doors probably don't close or they slam shut out of rhythm; at any rate, the doors are not sufficiently timed to do a good job, and in the

heart that is known as mitral insufficiency.

The blood flows downhill under pressure from the left atrium to the left ventricle so if the mitral valve doesn't close completely there is a constant flow or drip of the blood which interferes with the blood pressure all along the line throughout the body. Not only that, but when those doors swing open, the blood rushes into the ventricle with some force, hits the bottom of the basin and bounces up, some of it re-entering the chamber it just left because that valve hasn't closed like it should. Since the bottom of the basin is elastic, that rebound stretches the ventricle muscle more than normal conditions would and the ventricle becomes enlarged, one of the significant signs of mitral insufficiency.

There is a special type of murmur accompanying mitral insufficiency which gives your doctor

a clue to follow and arrive at a correct diagnosis.
