BASIC EDUCATION PROGRAM

December Start Likely For Adult Schooling

Colorado Independent School District's first major attempt in the field of adult education is tentatively set from Dec. 5 through next June 30.

The tentative schedule was set at a meeting Wednesday of a county advisory committee which will work with school officials toward suc-

cessful activation of the program.

COLORADO CITY'S adult program will be in basic education with courses in (1) basic reading, (2) health, citizenship and social studies; (3) arithmetic and (4) language arts.

Surveys have revealed 47.8 per cent of Mitchell County

male population over 25 years of age have been to school no higher than the eighth grade, and 5.1 per cent of these have received no schooling.

Members of the advisory committee, who will assist in locating and informing adults who are interested in participating in the basic education program, include

Rev. C. C. Beck, Supt. J. B. Cushing of Lorraine, Supt. Herman Parsons of Westbrook, Trelyn Kelley, Benie Franks, Mrs. Don Giltar, Mrs. Kenneth Cowan, Sister Florentine, Larry Kinard and Joe Bell.

SPECIAL PRINTED forms are being prepared now for distribution among interested persons to determine what courses and at what grade level they would like to enroll.

These forms will also provide information concerning whether or not an interested person can speak English and whether job or family responsibilities would conflict with night classes.

Classes are planned Monday and Thursday, 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., during the Dec. 5 - June 30 period. Each class must have a total of 120 hours of instruction.

COURSES WILL be free since costs will be paid by the Office of Economic Opportunity under supervision of the Texas Educational Agency.

Application for federal funds for the adult program is being prepared now to be submitted for approval in time for the December opening.

Sign-up dates for those interested will be from Nov. 7 through Nov. 11, at any school building within Mitchell County, according to Supt. James G. McMath.

COLORADO'S FIRST 5-AA LOSS

Anson Dims Wolves' Title Hopes, 20-15

Cochran Truman Nix came out of the hospital with an aching ulcer to lead his Colorado High Wolves into a crucial 5-AA District football game Friday night.

A couple of hours later, even after nipping regularly from a bottle of milk mixed with medicine, the pain was agonizing.

No wonder, either, as he headed back for his hospital bed.

HIS WOLVES, despite a bruisingly determined effort, walked off the field on the short end of a 20 to 15 count. And the pain worsened as the fact soaked in that this loss — not exactly expected in 3-AA circles — seriously

deflated the Wolves' title hopes.

It didn't help, not the least, to count the times his footballers came battling back to the brink of victory, only to fail in the final minutes... cranked up jarring effective offense at critical periods only to kill their drives with failure to make short yardage on fourth down tries... jarred Anson punchy with tremendous defense play only to lapse a few times with costly leaks to passes and to "trap" runs up the middle.

SLOPPY OFFICIATING didn't coat that ulcer, either, with any balm.

But don't take anything from Anson, for the Tigers produced when the chips were

down — outgained the Wolves on ground and in the air.

In other words, they aren't sitting up there in No. 2 place, tied with Winters just behind unbeaten Stamford, because they are patsies.

No sir. They scored first Friday, came from behind with effective play and stayed off a courageous Colorado attack in the final two periods.

THAT FIRST series of plays after the opening kickoff was the omen. For Colorado took the opening kickoff and marched to two quick first downs with Fullback Donnie Hugginsbotham and Halfback Dan Steakley doing the chores.

150,000 Sterile Flies Released

Second Screwworm Case Strikes County

Soil Supervisors Name Chairman, Add Member

Mitchell County Soil Conservation District's board of supervisors has a changed look with a new chairman and a new addition to its board.

Morgan Wright, who lives in North County, is the new board member, succeeding long-time supervisor M. A. Dunnahoo.

Moving into the chairmanship with Dunnahoo's departure from the board is A. K. McCarley Jr., whose farming operation is centered north and northeast of Colorado City.

conservation and ASC work, he is a director in the Roscoe Telephone Cooperative.

McCarley, prominent in local civic projects and vice president of the board at Long Wolf Electric Cooperative, was elected president of the soil district's board in a special meeting held to name a successor to Dunnahoo.

A supervisor for Zone 2, McCarley now heads the board which supervises soil and water conservation pro-

gram for the district's more than 643 cooperators.

This program, now including 800,000 acres with about 240,000 acres of cropland and 560,000 acres of range, is aimed toward the best possible method for preservation of natural resources.

McCarley has a Great Plains conservation program in progress on 373 acres he owns north of Colorado City. His farming operations include leased acreage and

Mitchell County's second confirmed case of screwworm sharpens the warning to farmers and ranchers to be especially alert for possible screwworm cases.

County Agent Bobby Lemons emphasized the necessity for a close watch Saturday and urged farmers and ranchers to collect specimen worm samples.

The county's second screwworm case within a week was confirmed on the Ellwood Ranch south of Colorado City.

INITIAL CASE was reported on the H. C. Taylor farm, four miles northeast of Lorraine.

Confirmation of the Ellwood case came as 150,000 sterile screwworm flies were released in a two-day period in the area north of Lorraine. Additional sterile flies will be released in the second infestation area, according to Lemons.

THE FLIES WERE released from 225 small boxes instead of usual air-drop method. However, the flies probably will be released from a plane in the southern area of the county.

"It is vitally important," the county agent said, "that livestock producers collect worm samples and mail these samples to the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory in Mission."

"A build-up of screwworm infestation can result if we don't get every possible sample and take immediate action in every area where there is a confirmed case."

LEMONS SAID that vials for submitting specimens to the Mission laboratory can be obtained at the county agent's office in Mitchell County Courthouse or at the following firms — Colorado Feed & Seed and H. A. Moore's Feed Store, both in Colorado City, and Lorraine Feed & Seed in Lorraine.

Lemons said the screwworm cases must be fought effectively now to prevent build-up of infestation.

"This gets out of hand in a hurry," Lemons said, "and we must not allow a next generation to develop from these few cases which have confirmed."

"From one generation to another the built-up multiplies from 500 to 600 more than the previous."

THE COUNTY agent said confirmed screwworm cases are on the build-up throughout Texas. Cases have spread quickly toward this area, then in Mitchell County and now in Scurry County.

In one week last month 48 confirmed cases were reported in Texas from 22 different counties.

"This was more confirmed cases for a one-week period than has been reported since the last week in November 1963," Lemons said.

IN SPILLWAY AREA

Work to Start For New Dam

Construction work on the new Colorado River Municipal Water District dam near Robert Lee will begin this week with workers already in the area.

Initial project will be excavation of the spillway area. Contractor for the \$8,969,000 dam and reservoir is Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C., with Charlie Atkins as job superintendent.

Project manager for the contractor will be Rufus Turner and Leo Willis will be resident engineer for Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth, project engineers for the water district.

More than a dozen earth movers with 40-cubic-yard capacity level and 55-yard capacity heaped have been moved to the construction site in Coke County. This fleet of vehicles will be increased to 21 to move approximately 40,000 cubic yards of earth every day.

Engineers report that five million cubic yards of dirt will be moved in the area of the core trench and emergency spillway — about half of the total earth work at the dam.

Initial work will be south of Colorado River and approaching the emergency spillway area. Crest of one hill will be cut down almost 200 feet from an elevation of 1,983 to 1,808 feet.

Offices for the dam construction have been set up in the Kresta residence, about 1,000 yards down the Colorado River from actual dam site.

Clement Bros. announced the project will begin with a 10-hour work shift five days per week, plus one 11-hour shift. However, this may be increased to two 10-hour shifts during peak construction periods.

For the last couple of weeks persons seeking employment at the dam have been in the Colorado City area as well as in Coke and Howard county communities with proximity to the construction.

One Listens While Two Go To Prison

Courtroom Scene: — Odds Against A Second Chance

Harold McCullough, a tow-headed youngster who should have been in class at Snyder High, stood up in 32nd District Court here Friday.

A few minutes earlier he had admitted, while in the witness chair, to passing a \$39.50 forged check at Colorado City's Safeway store last August.

His two companions — with whom he split the money — are juvenile age under the law and face delinquency hearings in Juvenile Court.

But McCullough, who completed the ninth grade, is over 47 years and was before the court as an adult — charged with felony. In other words, he can be sent to the state penitentiary.

District Judge Austin McCloud told the muscular youth punishment for forgery would be two years in the penitentiary.

Then, the judge — calling attention to the fact that the kid had never been in serious trouble before — probated the sentence.

Probation is new in Texas criminal law and allows a judge to "take a chance" with a convicted law-breaker when there is possibility for rehabilitation at home under closely supervised restrictions.

Judge McCloud explained it this way to the youth:

"I want you to fully understand this probation order and will receive a copy of it her today."

"It states," the judge lectured, "that you shall not violate any laws of this state or of the United States."

This means any laws. Do you understand this?

The kid raised his face up from looking at his white sport shirt and replied quietly... "Yes, sir..." and the judge resumed.

"You see, this is a very valuable sort of procedure — something this court believes should be used in circumstances such as yours."

"You are a young man and I don't know why you made this mistake. I surely hope you realize how close you have come to completely wrecking your life."

"This court," Judge McCloud explained, "will give you an opportunity to straighten your life if you will take advantage of it all."

"I think you should fully understand... that although I do not hesitate to grant a probated sentence, neither do I hesitate to revoke it."

The defendant looked down and then up again as the judge emphasized the responsibility for the future was being transferred from the court to the youth.

"If you want to be the

kind of a man you should be," the judge stated, "this is your chance."

"You can come back in this court after you have fulfilled this probation... and, at that time, your indictment can be dismissed and the judgement can be dismissed against you."

"It is a very valuable opportunity. Take advantage of it."

What happens if McCullough doesn't take advantage of his second chance? What happens if he fouls up again, doesn't obey law and

provisions of his probation?

Well, two other young men preceded the Snyder youth into 32nd District Court Friday. This is their fate.

Kenneth A. Mills, who received a 4-year probated sentence last April for burglary of Westbrook School was quickly ordered to state penitentiary.

He returned to face Judge McCloud after being arrested for burglary of three schools in Johnson County — Alvarado, Keene and Grandview.

Johnny Selvera, 19-year-old Colorado City youth charged with driving while intoxicated in connection with a downtown auto collision Sunday, was ordered to the state pen to begin a two-year sentence.

Selvera was under a 2-year probated sentence for assault with a pistol when he was arrested following the Sunday accident.

"You see," Judge McCloud made it plain to McCullough in an effort to influence the Snyder youth toward law.

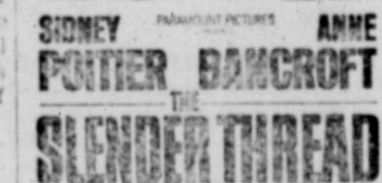
