

New Deal Sales Total \$24,132

A total of \$24,132 worth of war bonds had been sold by the New Deal schools on Wednesday last week when its bond-selling contest was brought to a close with a commendatory address by Roy Boyd, county superintendent.

The schools had been divided into three groups for the purpose of contests. In the high school, sophomores won with a total sale of \$4,715.25. Freshmen were second with \$2,240.85 and seniors were third with \$1,064.25 and juniors were fourth with \$778.55. The high school's total sale amounted to \$8,798.90.

Intermediate Grade Results

In the intermediate department, the Sixth grade won with \$6,383.45. The fifth grade was second with \$3,662.85. The eighth grade was third with \$2,994 and the seventh grade was fourth with \$411.60. Total sales of this group was \$13,456.90.

In the primary department, fourth graders won with \$951.15, the second grade was second with \$391.90 and first graders were third with \$277.10. Third grade was fourth with \$256.10. Total sales of this group was \$1,876.25.

The Community club entertained the grade school winners, the 4th and 6th grade groups, at the school Monday afternoon.

A lawn party is to be given Friday night at the school honoring the freshman and sophomores, winners in high school. Juniors and seniors are to be hosts to the winners.

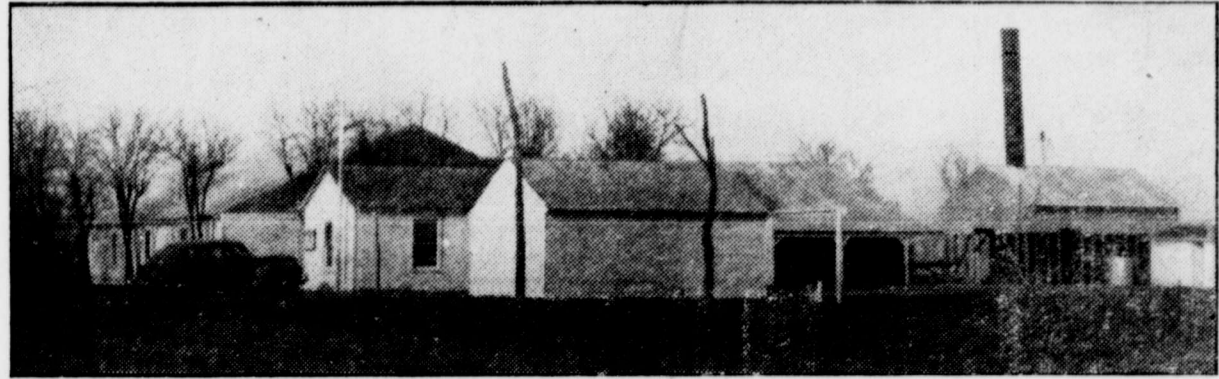

Last Rites Held Here for C. W. Beene, Former Resident

Chas. Wm. Beene, 49 years old and well-known Panhandle band director died Monday afternoon in an Amarillo hospital. He was widely known for his celebrated high school and community musical organizations. For the last four years he had been a director of Dalhart High school band and the XIT re-union band in Dalhart. Eight years prior to moving to Dalhart, he was band director at Panhandle. He had been a pioneer in musical organizations in Texas most of his life. Before moving to Panhandle, Beene was a lawyer, school teacher and band director at Abernathy. He aided in organizing the chamber of commerce, here, also.

Burial was in Abernathy cemetery Wednesday afternoon. Graveside rites were held here, and also, services were conducted in an Amarillo funeral chapel Wednesday morning.

Rev. Frank Beauchamp, Methodist pastor, and Rev. H. E. McClain, Nazarene minister, had charge of rites here.

Pallbearers included prominent Dalhart, Panhandle and Amarillo men.

Survivors are the widow; two sons, Elton Beene of White Deer, and Rex Beene, Altus, Okla.; a brother, Henry A. Beene, Gilmer; a sister, Mrs. G. W. Conn, Lubbock; and a granddaughter, Carol Anne Beene, White Deer.

Mr. Beene, who resided here for nearly eight years, from 1924 to about 1931, was practicing attorney and directed the city and school band. He was active in civic affairs here, serving as secretary of the chamber of commerce for a while. Under his direction, the Abernathy band at tended concerts and conventions over the state, and some of his students won honors in out-of-state band contests.

The Beene family moved here from Crosbyton. Mrs. Beene died shortly before Mr. Beene and their two sons moved to Panhandle. She was buried in the Abernathy cemetery.

After leaving Abernathy, Beene married again.

One of the sons, Rex, is serving in the armed forces, and the older boy, Elton, is director of the band at White Deer.

WAR BOND QUIZ

Q. May I have a Bond reissued so as to include the name of a coowner?
A. Yes; if the Bond is registered in your name alone, and if an excess holding does not result. The reissued Bond will bear the same issue date as the original Bond.

Q. May a creditor obtain information as to a debtor's ownership of War Savings Bonds?
A. The Treasury gives no information about the holdings of any person in War Savings except to that person or to such persons as have clearly established a legal right to the information.

Q. What will the Government do with money I pay for my Bond?

A. Your money will be put to work at once to help the Nation's war program.

Q. When will I make my income-tax report on the increase in the value of a War Savings Bond?

A. You may do either. You may report the increase in value of a War Savings Bond on your income tax report each year that you hold the Bond, or, you may wait until you redeem the Bond and then include the increase (the amount received over and above the price you paid for the Bond) as income for that taxable year.

Remember—the longer you keep War Bonds, up to 10 years, the more valuable they become.

A Statement by Santa Fe



United States facing most critical "crop year" in its history.

During the coming months, the need for more food may be greater than the need for more guns, tanks and planes.

Serving, as it does, "the breadbasket of America," the livestock and meat industry, and the great fruit and vegetable areas of California and the Southwest, Santa Fe pledges its all-out effort in the production and mobilization of food.

What Santa Fe Is Doing

Santa Fe employees are planting Victory Gardens along their railroad's 13,199 miles of right-of-way.

Everything that rolls on the Santa Fe is being kept in fighting trim.

Old cars with good running gear are being rebuilt into sleek new gondolas.

Many Santa Fe refrigerator cars that used to go back "dead-head" now hurry back loaded with other freight.

Cars are few and hours are precious. Every hour a freight car stands idle holds back food or other vital war freight from folks who need it. Every unused cubic foot squanders vital space.

The supply experts of the Army and Navy, the ODT, and the Interstate Commerce Commission Bureau of Service are all focusing on this problem.

How Shippers Are Helping

Shippers are helping and can continue to help (1) by maximum loading; (2) by quicker loading; (3) by quicker unloading.

More than 57,000 Santa Fe folks join with the farmers, the livestock producers, the shippers, and the consumers of all America to help meet the greatest food crisis our nation has ever faced.

They're On The Job, Too!

For years the Agricultural Development Department of Santa Fe has cooperated with growers all along the line, for greater production per acre, through better seeds and better cultural methods. For example:

The people of the middle Rio Grande know how the desert has been converted into paying crops.

The folks in Blue Water Valley of western New Mexico know how the production of vegetables has increased from 86 to 1076 carloads in the past three years.

The potato growers of Kern County,

California, know how Santa Fe cooperated in stamping out ring rot and blight.

This year, the people in the Texas Panhandle are bringing in their first harvest of waxy kaffir which promises to produce the starch for tapioca and other important products that formerly came from the cassava roots of Java.

In the present national food emergency, these people of Santa Fe's Agricultural Development Department are working harder than ever, doing everything they can to help food growers all along the line.
