Studies For Two New West Texas Dams Authorized

Water plan studies for dams at Aspermont and Breckenridge had been authorized today by the directors of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District in line with the district's policy of furnishing engineering and legal aid to communities which have flood and water supply problems.

S. W. Fresse of Fort Worth has been authorized to make the studies. The Aspermont dam is due to cost \$52,000, and the Breckenridge structure \$225,000. Studies are being made of the Aspermont project, a \$500,000 program to service Roby, Rotan and Sylvester and a \$1,823,000 project for Eastland, Ranger, Comanche, Dublin, De Leon, Guadalupe, Hamilton, and Gatesville, Milton E. Daniel, Breckenridge member of the board announced.

Next meeting of the board has been set for July 15 at Mineral Wells.

House Passes, Sends Price Bill To Senate

TRUMAN CALLS HOOVER HOME FROM TRAVELS

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman today asked former President Herbert Hoover to interrupt his world-wide famine inspection trip and return immediately to report his "eye witness account of the necessity for greater assistance from this country" to starving nations.

Mr. Hoover is now in Cairo. He will speak from there tomorrow night on a radio program with the President in a worldwide broadcast about the acute international food situation.

Mr. Truman today asked the honorary chairman of the Famine Emergency Committee to return home immediately.

"An urgent need has developed in this country," Mr. Truman said in his message to Mr. Hoover, "to bring forcibly and dramatically to public attention, as a spur to the food-for-famine effort, the facts about conditions in Europe which your visit and inquiries have brought to light."

Iran Challenges British Rights In Bahrain Island

TEHRAN (UP)—Iran today challenged the British protectorate over the oil rich Bahrain Island in the Persian Gulf and asserted that she considers the island an integral part of Iran.

The oil production of Bahrain is shared by Standard Oil of California and the Texas Company. In addition to oil Bahrain—a low lying sandbar 27 miles long and 10 miles wide—is the center of the rich Persian Gulf pearl industry.

The government announcement did not indicate what means Iran proposes to employ to enforce its decree. Bahrain now is administered by an Arab sultanate under British protection.

League To End At Midnight

GENEVA (UP)—The League of Nations today voted its dissolution, effective at midnight tonight.

The action took only a few minutes.

Pres. Truman To Take Cruise In The Atlantic

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman will leave Sunday for a brief cruise in the Atlantic to observe maneuvers by a navy aircraft carrier task force, the White House announced today.

Mr. Truman and members of his immediate staff will leave here at 4 p. m. Sunday aboard the presidential yacht Williamsburg.

Monday morning at Hampton Roads, Norfolk, Va. the President will board a big new carrier, the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt, and sail about 8 a. m. into the Atlantic. He will spend Monday and part of Tuesday witnessing maneuvers.

L. R. PEARSON TO RUN FOR RE-ELECTION

L. R. Pearson, representative for the 107th Legislative District, has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election to the office in the coming primary.

Pearson who served the district as representative in the 49th Legislature sponsored some of the most important legislation of the session, and truly represented the interests of the district.

In Ranger since 1919 he has taken a lead in civic betterment and has served in many civic capacities. His reputation for straight thinking and understanding of the operations of state, as well as national, government is well known to all who know him.

In the 49th Legislature, Pearson was a member of five major committees, including the Committee on Revenue and Taxation. This committee held the line on new tax bills and defeated every tax raising measure submitted.

Also, Pearson introduced and piloted through the Legislature House Bill 110, giving the District Court authority to appoint a receiver for unknown and non-resident mineral and royalty interests in land for the purpose of executing a lease for oil and gas development. This legislation has already resulted in the drilling of a number of wells in the oil belt which otherwise could not have been drilled due to the inability to locate the royalty or mineral owners.

When asked by the Ranger Times if he expected to announce a platform, Mr. Pearson replied:

"I think the people are fed up on political promises. The 50th Legislature will probably be the most important in 100 years of Texas statehood. It will be reconstruction session—the first since 1876 and 1934. A wide variety of legislation will no doubt confront the next Legislature. It is next to impossible to embrace it all in a so-called platform. With a healthy balance now in the general funds—the first in 20 years—I see no necessity for any new tax bills. My only promise is, if re-elected to a second term, I will make a desperate effort to be reasonable and sensible, supporting all measures which are beneficial to Texas and the 107th District and opposing legislation which I conclude is not for the best interest of my state and district. If in doubt, I will resolve the doubt against the bill, that, or, ety, will on my policy."

The song, dedicated to Mrs. M. E. Williams of the Hobbs community in western Fisher County, will be the 12th published composition of the two men.

BOWLES LABELS BILL JOY RIDE TO DISASTER

WASHINGTON (UP)—A rebellious House today passed and sent to the Senate an amendment-riddled price control bill despite warnings by Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles that it would start the nation on an inflationary "joy ride to disaster."

The final vote passing the battered bill was 355 to 42.

It was one of the worst legislative defeats suffered by President Truman, who had requested a one year extension of price control without crippling amendments.

The measure would extend the price control act only until next March 31. It carries a series of amendments which administration supporters said would "wreck" price control.

The amendments provide for elimination of meat subsidies on June 30, with a corresponding rise in prices, termination of all price rollback subsidies on farm products next Dec. 31, and a guarantee of cost-plus-a-reasonable profit to producers, distributors and retailers on all items.

A spokesman for the office of economic stabilization said that if Congress enacts the House version or similar "unworkable" legislation before June 1, there is a "damned good possibility" that Mr. Truman will veto it and ask Congress to start over again on a bill more acceptable to the administration.

But if Congress sends a bill to the White House after June 1, it was said, there would not be time enough for Congress to work on a new stabilization bill because the present act expires June 30. In that case, Mr. Truman would be faced with the difficult choice of being compelled to accept what Congress offered or letting the price control law expire.

The votes for a decisive modification on price control were taken by a coalition of Republicans and farm bloc Democrats who turned a deaf ear to warning by OPA Administrator Paul Porter that the action amounted to "repeal of price control." The majority of the House, however, felt it was time for a lot less price control.

Administration leaders looked to the Senate to eliminate some of the drastic House provisions and salvage price control legislation in something nearer the form sought by Mr. Truman.

Greeks Demand More Territory In Memorandum

LONDON (UP)—Official Greek sources said today that Greece has demanded of the Big Four in the peace settlements an area of 4,150 square miles of Bulgaria, about one-tenth of that country.

In a memorandum to the Big Four on territorial claims, Greece also asked for 950 square miles of Albania, an official source reported.

This was the first revelation of Greek territorial claims.

Tyler Celebrates Anniversary

TYLER, Tex., (UP)—Tyler, named for the tenth president of the United States, marked its 100th anniversary on April 11.

The city that today boasts a population of 40,000 persons numbered a few score persons in April 1846.

LAST RITES FOR THE LEAGUE

The League of Nations, feeble and forgotten these last 10 years, is about to die and pass forever into history. A final session has begun in Geneva for the purpose of giving the organization as decent a burial as circumstances permit.

The sad ceremony should not pass unnoticed and un-

noticed. For one of the landmarks of the League has been its failure. A congenital taint was present in the younger organization at its birth, and developing symptoms are now evident.

That weakness is the domination of the organization by its most powerful member. The League had its Big Four—the United Kingdom, France, Italy, and Japan—as the UN has its Big Five.

In its early years the League of Nations settled some minor disputes between minor powers with considerable success. It was less fortunate in dealing with differences involving a larger nation. But hope persisted until 1931, when Japan's defiance of and departure from the League exposed to the world the organization's fatal vulnerability.

Only two more blows were needed to dispatch the tottering League and set the stage for World War II. Another defiance and departure occurred in 1932, when Germany was denied arms parity in the League disarmament conference. Then came the Italian invasion of Ethiopia in 1935. The big powers, more concerned with their mutual relations than with peace and justice, refused to impose sanctions.

Today defiance and departure are again alarming symptoms of what might be a fatal weakness. The right of defiance by the Big Five is written into the United Nations Charter. The technique of departure has already been tried on a limited scale, and has achieved a limited success.

We may mourn the League today with the sort of grief we feel for the passing of a brave, well-intentioned, but frustrated individual. But at the same time we may take hope lies with the peoples of the world, who are more active than they were 25 years ago.

The preamble to the UN Charter speaks of "faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small," and of a determination "to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another."

This is a considerable departure from the thinking of the world's statesmen in 1920.

WITH the customary greed of those who can't see beyond their noses, with one fell swoop Mike Jacobs did more to add impetus to inflation by announcing a \$100 ringside price for the Louis-Conn fight than all the nylonleggers put together. And at a time when the government is striving desperately to control prices.

Little wonder that Promoter Jacobs' announcement drew a speedy blast from Representative Spence (D., Ky.)

"It is extremely inflationary when a man will pay \$100 just to see a prizefight," says the chairman of the House Banking Committee, putting it mildly. It is astonishing that the outlandish tariff did not draw more and stronger criticism from the higher places.

As Representative Spence points out, it does seem incongruous that a second-hand article should be worth four times the original cost five years before.

Especially when there's no indication that this edition will be anywhere near as good as the original. Louis and Conn undoubtedly have gone back considerably, and without any test of their ability, a C-note is exorbitant to pay for what amounts to a pig in a poke.

JACOBS is the least sure that Louis and Conn are the same two young savages that they were in 1941. For the old Broadway ticket-scalper forbade anything in the nature of a warm-up.

It's rather surprising that Uncle Michael didn't put the parties of the first and second parts in secret training, a la Georges Carpentier when the undersized Orsini Man came over to be whacked by Jack Dempsey in 1921.

Jacobs does as he pleases, despite boxing commissions.

After all, he has a production

that will sell under any circumstances, and everybody who can possibly cut in wants a piece, including the Treasury Department. Commercialism has long since come first.

Even ballplayers who were veterans of the armed forces had to prove themselves in competition to keep a prewar contract or obtain a new one. Old Red Ruffing of the Yankees was suspended for refusing to fly to Panama for the purpose of demonstrating that he could still pitch.

IN his wildest imagination, Tex Rickard never dreamed of charging more than \$50 for a seat, and the most spectacular of the promoters had a fair sort of an attraction in Jack Dempsey, who took them as they came—even in workouts.

There are those who would pay \$1000 for a ringside seat, but how about the bloke who can't afford to? He'll require a pair of binoculars with his \$6 perch in some distant precinct of The Bronx. Indeed, field glasses will go pretty well with the great bulk of the \$100 ringsides, not to mention the \$50, \$30, \$20 and \$10 pews.

You are tempted to write that saps are entitled to some protection against themselves, and to wonder whether Jacobs ever heard the story of the goose that laid the golden eggs, but—

Nobody is going to be hit over the head until he buys a ticket, and I'm going to be inside early at Yankee Stadium, June 19, and escape being killed in the rush.

Last fall we were told there would be a surplus of eggs in December. Most housewives cannot remember when they paid more for eggs than they did this past winter. Every means of publicity has again been used to talk about the terrific flood of eggs that would be upon us this spring. Has there been a surplus? You answer that!

During the past few years Texas Turkey Producers have led the nation as far as real poultry improvement work is concerned. A tremendous hatching egg business has been developed. Growers have invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in breeding stock. Many of them, due to the heavy cancellation of hatching egg orders, stand to lose everything they have. Why? The Poultry and Chick buyers are taking this Washington propaganda too seriously and in too large doses!

Everyone who reads the newspaper, has read about the Hatcheryman who in desperation sent a thousand chicks to President Truman; a thousand to U. S. Sec. of Agriculture; and a thousand to the Governor of Indiana. The Governor was the only one of the three who accepted the chicks. The Sec. of Agriculture was supposed to have remarked that the Hatcheryman had over-estimated his demands. I am sure that thousands of hatcherymen in the U. S. would like to ask the Sec. of Agriculture how anyone could correctly estimate a demand and base his estimation on the kind of propaganda that comes out of Washington. Why all of this MEDDLING? Could it be that the war-time bureaucrats are afraid they will get out of a job if things run too smoothly?

BLACKSMITH'S CHURCH ENDS ON HIS DEATH

STOCKPORT, England (UP)—An eccentric blacksmith's dream of promoting religion in a troubled world has been shattered by two spinsters with whom he lived until his death 18 months ago.

Ten years ago Isaac Bennett began to pour his lifetime savings into building singlehandedly a church which he called the "Harvest Home." While Bennett labored—sometimes through the late night hours—local people assumed he was building a garage.

Employing elaborate improvisations, the elderly railway blacksmith gradually constructed an 80-pew church with wood carvings, pulpit, harmonium and reading desk. The pews were converted bus seats and some of the decorations for the church were vest buttons and tin can lids expertly turned into decorations.

Heartened by the friendship of Betty and Florence Marsland in whose home he lived, the painstaking builder and would-be contributor to world reform provided in his will that in case of death, "Harvest Home" would become the property of the elderly sisters.

Petty Marsland recently said, "He intended it for use as a mission church but it is impossible to carry out his plans."

The spinsters have sold the pews as garden seats and given away the harmonium, pulpit and reading desk. They have not decided what to do with the building.

"We may sell it," they say.

Menu Suggestions To Aid You In Selecting Week-end Groceries

QUICK frozen chickens are returning to civilian tables. Most of them are ready-to-cook frys in 8 pieces; two drumsticks, two portions each, of breast and back and two wings, plus neck and giblets neatly tucked in. Four plants are now in production.

They move the chickens from feeding to shipping on a modern endless conveyor system on which they get washed, defeathered, eviscerated, inspected by government inspector, cut up, packed, weighed and then quick-frozen. It takes only a minute to move 40 birds through the killing and dressing operations. Ordinarily 45,000 birds are processed in two days. While waiting for processing, the 45,000 chickens eat 250 gallons of buttermilk and more than 7000 pounds of prepared mash every 24 hours.

Big Squeeze Ahead
Although grapefruit originated in the Orient, practically all the grapefruit in the world is now grown in the United States. So are about half the lemons and approximately 45 per cent of the oranges. The world citrus crop for 1945-46 is the largest on record. The 36 major citrus-growing countries will have produced 335 million boxes. It is estimated,

NEXT Saturday, the 27th, National Baby Week begins. May 1st is celebrated as Child Health Day.

Children need many food elements for healthy growth. These indispensable nutritional elements, listed with the foods in which they are found most plentifully and with the functions they serve, are:

PROTEIN: Milk, meat, fish, eggs—To repair worn out tissues; to build new tissues.
MINERALS: Milk, green vegetables, fruit, egg yolk, meat, fish, whole-grain cereals—To maintain body processes; to build bones, teeth, blood and other parts of the body.

There are four nutritionally-important **VITAMINS:** **VITAMIN A:** Whole milk, cream, butter, egg yolk, cod liver oil, liver, dark green leafy vegetables. (Vitamin A is lacking in margarine except that made from beef fat.)

Hour and a Half Rolls
1/2 cup of water
1/2 cup of sweet milk
3 tbsp. melted shortening
1 tsp. salt
yeast cake

Have water and milk lukewarm. Mix all the above ingredients together and add 1 1/4 cups of flour. Let this mixture stand 40 minutes then add enough flour to make it stiff enough to roll but be careful not to get too much flour.

Cut and put in greased pan. Allow to rise an hour then place in a slow oven for five minutes. Turn the oven up high to brown.

Peanut Butter Cookies
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup white sugar
1 1/4 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 egg
Cream butter and sugar together thoroughly. Add beaten egg, peanut butter, flour and soda. Mix well. Roll out in pieces about the size of a marble, then press flat with a fork. Bake in a slow oven.

CHILDREN'S food must be simple, yet it must have a high nutrition value. A quart of milk every day is required for optimum growth, as well as an egg at least four times a week, and fruits and vegetables, both cooked and raw, daily.

Butter or fortified margarine supplies the important Vitamin A, which is necessary to help fight disease, especially the common cold.

Eggs a la Goldenrod

(To serve 4)

One cup cream sauce, 1 tablespoon fortified margarine, 1 teaspoon minced parsley, 1/2 teaspoon onion salt, 4 slices hot toast, 4 eggs, hard-cooked.

Mix together the margarine, the parsley (very finely minced), and the onion salt. Spread on the hot toast. Arrange toast on serving dishes.

Over the toast, slice the hard-cooked eggs, saving out the yolk of half an egg. Pour the cream sauce over the eggs.

Garnish plate with watercress. Serve with curls of celery and matchstick pieces of carrot.

Cream Sauce

Two tablespoons fortified margarine, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup hot milk, salt and pepper to taste. Melt the margarine, add the flour, and mix to a smooth paste.

BREAKFAST: Stewed prunes, crisp bacon, corn bread, butter or fortified margarine, jelly or marmalade, coffee, milk.

CHILDREN'S LUNCHEON: DINNER: Eggs a la Goldenrod on toast, celery, carrot sticks, molasses milk shake, raisin drop cookies, tea.

DINNER: Broiled shad with rice, new potatoes, broiled tomatoes, spring salad, strawberry shortcake, coffee, milk.

Add the hot milk and stir over hot water or a low heat until creamy. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Molasses Milk Shake

One cup milk, 1 tablespoon molasses, 1 teaspoon cocoa, 1/2 teaspoon salt, a shake of nutmeg. Mix a little of the milk with the cocoa, slowly, to make a smooth mixture. Add remaining milk and ingredients.

Pour into mason jar, supplied with a rubber ring. Cover tightly and shake until frothy. Serve at once.

(Mixture may also be beaten in a deep bowl with a rotary egg-beater.)

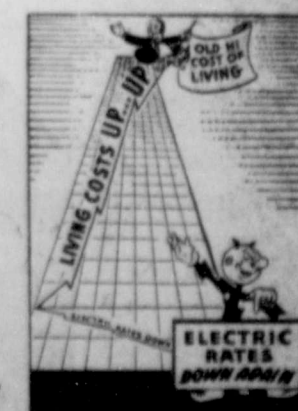

Ranger Day At Art Exhibit, Monday 22

"Ranger Day" at Mineral Wells is being planned for Ranger when a large group of local citizens go on Monday, April 22, to visit the Exhibition of Paintings by Simon Michael at the new Community Center, North Oak Avenue in Mineral Wells.

Approximately 50 canvases will be shown, 15 of them Texas subjects painted in this locality. Scenes from ranches and paintings of individual animals common to the area—the thoroughbred Hereford, the Purebred pig, are among his subjects but the majority of the canvases are landscapes many of them showing scenes at Fort on Kingdom, and along the Brazos.

Included in the exhibition also are the four decorative panels by Mr. Michael which formerly hung in the Officers Club at Camp Walters and were later presented by the artist to the City of Mineral Wells for permanent installation in the new Community Center. After three years of distinguished wartime service at Camp Walters for which Mr. Michael—then Sergeant Michael—was awarded the Medal of the Legion of Merit recently, he returned to Mineral Wells after the war and is now making it his permanent home.

One of the panels in the mural, "Peace," is shown here, and other subjects of the series are "Alertness," "Action," and "Caution." When requested by the army to paint the decorative panels he was given a free hand and instead of the conventional wartime symbols, he employed birds and fish, producing an extraordinarily vivid and convincing expression of the ideas.

Mr. Michael will speak briefly to Ranger visitors and will meet guests informally during the afternoon. The exhibition will be open from 1 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon and from 7 to 10 in the evenings throughout the week, and from 3 to 7 on Sundays. The opening reception will be held April 21 from 3 to 7 to which all out of town visitors are also invited.
