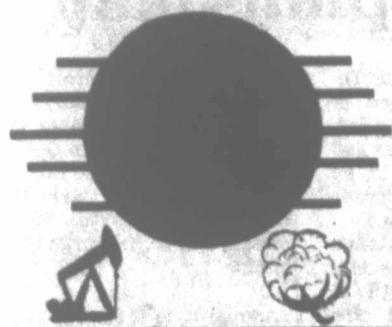

Finch is interim city judge

Clayton Finch, 35, was named interim municipal court judge for the city during a called meeting of the Colorado City Council Tuesday.

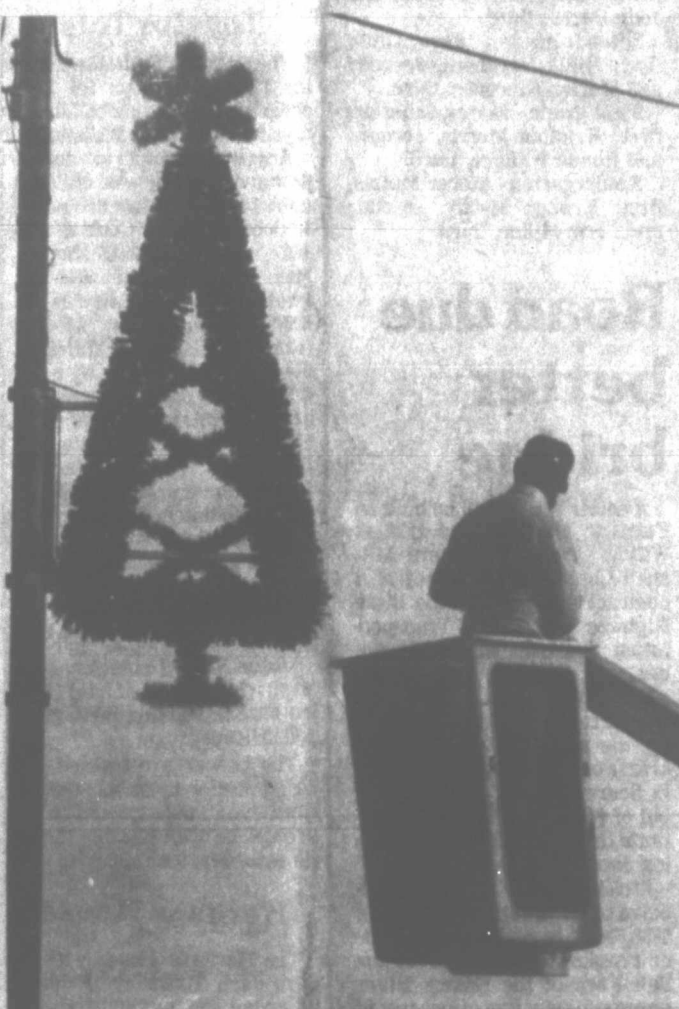
Finch, who owns a laundry and has experience as a part-time dispatcher for the Colorado City Police Department, was named following the resignation of Ben Costin who had held the position for 10 years.

In his letter of resignation dated Nov. 21, Costin said he was resigning because of statements made by City Manager Brenda Tarter in a radio interview in which she said that city revenues in all departments, including the municipal court, need to be increased.

City council member Dee Hearn commended Costin for his dedication to the city and said a plaque of appreciation should be presented to him.

Finch, hired upon the recommendation of Mrs. Tarter, will make \$6.50 an hour for the 17 hours a week he presides as municipal court judge, said Mrs. Tarter.

Mayor Elmer Martin said applications for a permanent municipal court judge will be taken until Jan. 1 and that a committee composed of council members Robert Hoback and Phil Anderson will screen applicants.

Cool nights and warm, sunny afternoons must have been tailored-made for merchants hoping to entice shoppers in their stores filled with Christmas merchandise.

Woman conned out of money

"They were so nice" is how a Colorado City woman describes two people who later "conned" her out of \$800 during a recent pigeon drop scheme in Big Spring.

The victim, who asked that her name not be used, said she is willing to share her story in order to keep the same thing from happening to someone else.

The victim's case is a classic pigeon drop scheme, according to police.

As she was getting out of her car on the Big Spring K-Mart parking lot, a woman got out of her car next to the victim's, reached down to the ground and supposedly "found" a wallet containing \$21,000. About that time, a second woman came along, and the two convinced the victim that the three should divide the money because a note found in the wallet indicated the money was a political payoff for a well-known politician.

What followed was a series of trips to various Big Spring banks and businesses with one of the women explaining that her "boss" would know what to do with the money and the best way to go about dividing it. All the while, the two women were extremely nice to the victim, gaining her trust.

Before the day was over, the two women drove the victim to Colorado City where she could deposit a \$2,000 check at her bank. The women suggested that the victim keep \$800 out of the check and deposit the rest.

When they returned to Big Spring, one of the women took the victim back to her car still parked at the K-Mart parking lot and told her to meet them at a bank where the serial numbers on the \$800 would be recorded. They took the money with them and the victim drove her car to the bank to wait for them. She said it didn't take long to realize the swindlers and her money were gone.

The victim drove back to Colorado City and told her bank-

er what had happened. The \$2,000 check that she had deposited in her account was no good, and she was out the \$800 cash she had taken out of the check.

The victim said she never realized what was happening to her until it was too late. She said the two swindlers were good actors and seemed so kind and trustworthy that it never dawned on her that something could be wrong.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said the victims of pigeon drop schemes are usually older people, often women.

Sparks said that swindlers are often very intelligent people and they really use force or even threaten physical harm. Instead, they make their victims feel secure, intellectually or emotionally stimulated and "in on something."

Since many victims of such schemes are older, retired persons, the American Association of Retired Persons has distributed a pamphlet called "How to Spot a Con Artist". It describes the clever con artist as a good actor who disarms his victims with an affable "nice guy" approach.

The typical con artist is amoral - but seldom violent, and mobile, with an excellent sense of timing. He sincerely believes his victims deserve their fate. And, if caught, he'll probably strike again later. Con artists are seldom rehabilitated.

Anyone can be a victim - even a person who considers himself too intelligent or sophisticated to be "conned". During the 1920s, "Yellow Kid" Well routinely swindled bankers, saying "that's where the money is".

Many victims share certain characteristics. Often, but not always, they are older, female and live alone. They are trusting of others - even strangers - and may need or desire supplemental income. A willingness to help and a sense of charity are characteristics a con artist will exploit to gain a victim's cooperation.

Hospital looks at new doctor

Mitchell County Hospital Administrator Ray Mason told the hospital district's board of directors Tuesday that a physician has indicated an interest in moving his practice to Colorado City.

Mason said Dr. Paul Grandy, 51, of Austin has made an application for staff privileges at the hospital, but it will cost the district \$17,000 to secure the physician through an Austin-based physician recruitment firm.

Mason said Grandy has been in family practice for 12 years and before that was a psychiatrist with the U.S. Air Force.

The board gave Mason approval to begin a thorough background check on Grandy before the board begins any serious negotiations with the doctor.

In other business, Assistant Administrator and Comptroller Richard Murphy said that Medicare is in the process of issuing a check in the amount of \$316,899 for past disputed Medicare claims. The board commended Murphy for his efforts in securing the reimbursement.

Later, Murphy suggested that the hospital use part of the Medicare reimbursement to pay for the new computer system being currently installed. The board had authorized \$70,000 of the \$84,000 system to be financed with a bank loan. Murphy said

\$19,000 in interest can be saved by paying cash. Murphy said he will have a cost estimate for the computer system and a breakdown of the two purchase options at the December board meeting.

In his financial report to the board, Murphy said the hospital had a total net loss for October in the amount of \$104,893. There were 66 patients admitted during the month for a total of 406 in-patient days.

"October reflects an increase in revenues as compared to budget but a decrease as compared to last year," said Murphy. "Total revenues are \$17,353 above budget and \$4,934 under last year."

Valley Fair Lodge has begun the new fiscal year with a gain in operations, said Murphy.

"Revenues at the lodge are in excess of budget and last year's," he said. "The occupancy at the lodge is very close to maximum with 49 patients per day. Only one private room is left. This increase is reflected in the gain of revenues."

The board also gave approval to continue the swingbed program at the hospital. Mason said one to two patients a month utilize the program and described it as needed service to the hospital district.

Breast cancer screening set

According to the American Cancer Society, one of every 11 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year, over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer which is the number 2 cancer killer of women.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, Mitchell County Hospital will sponsor a mobile breast cancer detection unit on Wednesday, Dec. 3 from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. at the hospital.

Hospital Administrator Ray Mason said the unit is an extension of the Regional Breast Care Center of Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa.

The unit will be parked near the X-ray department of the hospital on Wednesday, and women who wish to have a screening mammogram should

call the hospital before that day if possible to schedule an appointment.

Mason said the test will cost \$50 cash and the results will be sent to the patient's physician who will go over the results with the patient.

Mason said it is not uncommon for women to pay up to \$200 or more for such tests and if residents take advantage of Wednesday's screening, the hospital will consider scheduling the mobile unit on a regular basis.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art X-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a

grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

Hospital officials say that women who wish to have the screening should report approximately 15 minutes prior to their appointment time for registration. Typically, the exam takes less than 30 minutes. A female technologist will perform the examination and teach women how to do breast self-examination.

The films will be returned to the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital where they will be interpreted by a radiologist from Odessa Radiology Group.

Raid nets one arrest

Bennie Whitfield, 49, of Colorado City was arrested for selling alcoholic beverages without a permit and for felony possession of a prohibited weapon during a raid conducted Wednesday night at Butler's Cafe, 504 East First Street.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said Whitfield is owner-manager of the cafe which was the site of a shooting death Nov. 7.

Sparks said a search warrant was obtained and the police department along with Deputy Sheriff O. D. Majors and an agent with the Alcoholic Beverage Commission conducted Wednesday's raid.

A sawed-off rifle was confiscated during the raid, said Sparks. Twenty-eight-year-old Robert Antonio Aguilar was killed during an argument at the cafe on Nov. 7. Arrested and charged with murder in that case is Felix Molina, 45.

FHA'ers adopt smokers

Road due better bridge

A better bridge will be built on Farm to Market Road 1229 at Willow Creek in northern Mitchell County as the result of a contract approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission in November.

Strickland & Knight, Inc. of Big Spring received the contract for the structure along with a bridge on FM 1606 at Deep Creek in Scurry County with the low bid of \$468,787. Traffic will continue through both projects, using detours at the work sites.

Strickland & Knight also received a contract on a low bid of \$238,630.82 to replace a low-water crossing on FM 2330 at the Salt Fork of the Brazos River approximately five miles east of FM 1081 in Kent County.

Supervising resident engineer Billy E. Vernon of Snyder said a previous low-water crossing, built by the county, washed out earlier this year. A temporary crossing for use by local traffic has been made by highway department maintenance forces.

Cowboy called me last week.

He's the guy who comes in from the range, has a few beers, loses his girlfriend to his best buddy, then calls up in a state of depression. We're not friends, really. We used to work together, though, and occasionally he'd ask me for advice, just so he could ignore it.

The truth is, the only ranch he comes off of is the one in his mind. When he called the other day he had resorted to washing dishes in a hotel. He is a cowboy though, and he's got the mud flaps and bumper stickers and tobacco-stained teeth to prove it.

Cowboy may only weigh 135 pounds, but he's got 250 pounds worth of kick in his heart. "You don't ever want to mess with a cowboy," he warns. "You could get hurt - real bad."

So could Cowboy, unfortunately. Cowboy's girlfriend not only messed with his heart - the one we've just been talking about - she gave the same heart to his best friend.

Cowboys aren't like the rest of us. If this was your girlfriend and she was taking up with your best friend, you might not have a best friend any longer.

Cowboys are different. Willie Nelson gave hint of this with his ballad, "Red-Headed Stranger."

"Well, you can't blame a man for killing a woman, who's trying to steal his horse," he told us, with enough conviction to get your sympathy, if not total agreement.

A cowboy's best friend is his best friend. Cowboys prop their boots on bumpers of pickup trucks and sandwich 25 words of speech into eight hours of spittin' and drinkin'. By slowing down speech patterns several RPMs, the dialogue has few conversational gaps. You don't lose a best friend for a girl. Any 8-year-old gunslinger can tell you that.

"I don't blame him at all," Cowboy said. "Shoot, he's my best friend. He can't help it if she starts coming on to him. It's nothing against me. I'm just worried she'll wind up doing him the same way she did me, and I don't want to see the guy get hurt."

Cowboy admits he'd like to have her back. "She just needs to get straightened out and realize you don't treat a cowboy that way. One of these days she's going to get into some real trouble doing that to somebody who's not as kind hearted as I am."

Why would Cowboy want his girl back when she's taken up with his best friend?

"Because I love her. I've always loved her - ever since we were in the eighth grade. She was going with my best friend then, and dumped him for me. I guess I should have seen it coming. But you don't think about those things when you're 13 years old."

Or 33.

Now that he knows his first love tends toward the fickle side, why doesn't he move on to more promising relationships?

"I'll always love her," he says. "And she'll always love me. She doesn't understand that right now because she's confused. Someday she'll understand and she'll feel terrible about all this. But I'll be there waiting, you can bet on that."

Even the best Shirley Temples among you must realize by now nothing you say is going to change this man.

Right or wrong, tough or easy, nobody changes the mind of the cowboy, bless his tortured heart.

Will power will help fight those extra pounds

Some advance planning and a good deal of will power may help you keep off extra pounds and still enjoy the holidays. The key is moderation. Think about the temptation to overeat before and after eating. Decide when you can eat less. Knowing ahead of time what and how much you will eat can make it possible for you to enjoy sweets and desserts without guilt.

Try these ideas for staying in control of your holiday eating:
-Allow yourself to enjoy holiday foods, but make it a rule to

turn down second helpings.
-If you have the will-power, avoid rich desserts and eat fresh fruits.

-When you can't avoid rich desserts, ask for half a serving instead of a whole one or eat only the filling of the pie and not the crust.

-At parties, carry on your conversation away from the snack table.

-Look for fresh fruits and vegetables rather than nuts and chips.

-Plan ahead to limit what you eat at home so you can enjoy holiday eating with your friends.

Immigration law could lighten burden

WASHINGTON-A legislative initiative announced by U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm aims to lighten the burden imposed on both employers and prospective employees by the new immigration reform law.

"Employers must be able to hire with confidence, and no American should be turned away from a job out of fear that he may be an illegal alien," Gramm said in describing the plan.

The senator's proposal would take a large step toward curing the problems caused by the immigration law's threat of fines and imprisonment for employers who unknowingly hire illegal aliens.

The plan includes three specific points:

-It requires the Social Security Administration to operate a telephone verification system which employers may use to check the authenticity of Social Security cards presented by prospective employees.

-It requires that tamper-proof Social Security cards be available to employees.

-It establishes new penalties for use of counterfeit Social Security cards-up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine-and for counterfeiting Social Security cards-up to 20 years and a \$100,000 fine.

"Too often, Congress passes laws and then allows somebody else to work out the details of how they will be enforced," Gramm said. "But there is too much at stake for Texas to allow that to happen with immigration reform."
"Making this new law work to

the advantage of Texas employers and Texas workers will be a high priority of mine during the 1987 session of Congress," the senator pledged.

Getting your signal straight on satellite dishes

If you are weary of poor television reception or if you live in an area without cable, you may be considering getting your own satellite dish. If you are, you should know that there is a wide range in quality and price. As with any major purchase, you should buy from a reputable dealer with a solid background, and avoid heavy sales pitches and gimmicks.

Satellite dishes, if installed properly, are calibrated to point in the direction of communications satellites that hover over the earth. These satellites travel through space at the same speed as the earth's rotation. That is why the dish can continuously pick up the satellite's signals by

being pointed in the right direction.

My consumer protection division has received complaints from a number of citizens who had trouble because their dishes were not properly installed. Improper installation can result in poor reception—or no reception at all.

My staff also has noticed a very wide range in prices for these dishes. Some advertisers claim they will provide all the necessary items for under \$1,500, while other systems may cost up to \$5,000. Although a consumer can generally expect to get better quality from a higher priced appliance, that is not always the case. We have received complaints about the highest priced systems as well as cheaper ones. The most important factor is the expertise and reputation of the company selling and installing the system.

Some consumers are purchas-

ing satellite systems in order to avoid paying fees to their local cable companies. Although it is perfectly legal to pick up such signals without payment (for cable) if you have a dish, you should be aware that the cable companies are fighting back. Some companies, such as those that broadcast movies, are scrambling their signals, so that only those who pay for cable can receive the signals.

Anyone who buys a dish only to receive "free" signals may find that he has to buy an expensive "unscrambler" in a few years in order to use the dish.

Sludge has potential for land application

COLLEGE STATION—Sludge, the solid material from wastewater treatment plants, is a growing concern with expanding urban development, and land application may be a partial answer.

Since sludge can serve as a cropland fertilizer and soil conditioner, land application makes the most sense from an environmental protection standpoint, says Dr. John Sweeten, agricultural engineer in waste management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The fertilizer value of sewage sludge from municipalities and subdivisions varies considerably, notes Sweeten. On a dry weight basis it generally contains 80-100 pounds of nitrogen, 100-120 pounds of phosphorus and 10-12 pounds of potash per dry ton. Where sludge is de-watered to reduce its volume, nitrogen content may be lower and phosphorus content slightly higher than in liquid sludge.

There also are many micronutrients in sewage sludge, and its organic matter benefits soil physical properties, Sweeten points out. However, in some cases sewage sludge can contain excessive concentrations of cadmium or other heavy metals that come from certain types of industry, says the engineer. These elements may require extra precautions or limitations on land application to prevent toxicity to plants or animals. Industries are being required to remove heavy metals from their wastewater discharges, and as a consequence the concentrations have shown dramatic reductions in many municipal sludges in recent years.

Nutrient content of sewage sludge is often sufficient to properly fertilize a crop without any supplemental fertilizers, notes Sweeten. In such cases, it can save a farmer \$25-\$50 per acre in fertilizer costs. On 500 acres of cropland, that can add up to a savings of \$12,500-\$25,000 per year.

As with all types of wastes,

state and federal regulations govern the management of sewage sludge to help prevent surface and groundwater pollution, soil contamination and nuisance conditions.

The Texas Department of Health is the primary agency in the state that regulates land application of municipal and domestic sewage sludge, says Sweeten. Two years ago, the TDH adopted a regulation that encompasses persons who generate, collect, transport and dispose of sludge from wastewater treatment plants, septic tanks and grease traps.

The regulation requires persons transporting and disposing of sewage sludge to be registered with the state and to comply with specific requirements.

The TDH requirements for land application allow operators and farmers to make "beneficial use" of sewage sludge by using it at low application rates to enhance growth of crops or pastures, to benefit soils and to reclaim poor quality soils, such as strip-mined lands, for agricultural purposes.

Sites where sludge is applied need to be registered along with the method of application, explains the engineer. Sludge has to be partially stabilized and samples analyzed periodically. Application rates for beneficial use are limited to eight dry tons per acre per year. However, this rate may supply more fertilizer than most crops and soils need, even though less than half the applied nitrogen may be avail-

able to crops the first year.

A lower application rate may be more desirable, says Sweeten, depending on the actual nutrient concentration, soil fertility status and crop nutrient requirements. If sludge contains normally low amounts of cadmium, the eight dry tons per acre rate or less will conform with the maximum annual soil loading rate for cadmium of about one-half pound per acre per year.

Most sewage sludge is made available to farmers at little or no charge through a contract company that supplies the hauling and spreading service, notes the engineer. Typically, the contractor is paid by the municipality or municipal utility district.

Farmers who use sewage sludge for fertilizer need to know their soil fertility status as determined by annual soil testing, state regulations, the source of sludge and its chemical analysis, and the compliance status of the sludge generator (wastewater treatment plant) and the sludge contractor. Farmers must have a sensitivity for neighbors who may raise questions about the environmental safety of sludge application, Sweeten points out.

All this means that farmers who live on the urban fringe can reap economic benefits from fertilizing their land with the by-products of modern society, but they must also be knowledgeable and alert to protect their own interests, adds Sweeten.

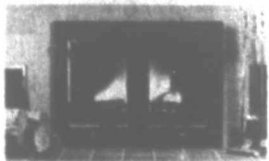
