#### CARS MUST DISPLAY NEW TAGS APRIL 1

Motor vehicle licenses for 1939 are now due and must be paid between now and April 1. J. S. Talley, Tax Collector, and his office urge that car owners purchase licenses early and avoid the last minute rush. On Wednesday afternoon, Fred Huston, deputy collector, stated that licenses had been secured for 140 passenger cars, 17 commercial cars and 7 farm trucks. At the same date last year licenses had been purchased for 202 passenger cars, 26 farm trucks and 8 commercial. 1939 licenses must be on by midnight April 1 to avoid a penalty.

#### SCHOOL ELECTION APRIL 1

PERRYTON SCHOOL DISTRICT TO ELECT TWO TRUSTEES FOR THREE YEARS ON APRIL 1

The term of office of R. P. Garrison and Ollie Morris, members of the Board of Trustees of the Perryton Independent School District, will expire this year. An election will be held Saturday, April 1, to elect two members for three year terms.

It is not known whether either of the retiring trustees will be candidates for reelection. A petition has been circulated asking that the names of A. R. Hogland and H. I. Hudson be placed on the ballot. Other names may be filed with the Board.

The School Board has appointed J. N. Conley as judge of the election for the Perryton school box, and L. R. Conner for Farnsworth.

There are five hold-over members of the school board. One-year members are W. C. Bryan, J. H. Neufeld, and Dr. Manse Wood. A. J. Kelly and Mrs. R. C. Brillhart have two years to serve.

#### CCC FLAG POLE DAMAGED BY HIGH WIND SATURDAY

The wind during last Saturday's storm had enough force to break the pole wires and let the flag pole crash at the Perryton CCC Camp. This was a sixty feet jointed steel pole and when it crashed at 1:30 Saturday afternoon it caused considerable noise. Commanding Officer Captain G. W. Coffman Jr. stated that fortunately nothing was in line with the falling pole. Repairs were made Monday.

#### REELECT FIVE SCHOOL HEADS IN PERRYTON

Three Oklahoma Districts Appear Before Board On Tuesday

#### IMPORTANT MEET

At the regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening of the Board of Trustees of the Perryton Independent School District, five instructors were reelected for another year. Other teachers will be named later.

Reelected were O. A. Bush, principal of high school; E. D. Kelley, principal junior high school; R. L. Duke, principal of elementary grades; Otis E. Burk, athletic coach; C. H. Williams, vocational agriculture instructor. Supt. Roger A. Burgess was reelected at a prior meeting.

Trustees from three Oklahoma school districts in Beaver county met with the Perryton Board to discuss plans for bringing their pupils to the Perryton schools. The Perryton Board offered some propositions, which will be presented at school meetings in their respective districts.

Each Oklahoma district had three trustees present at the Tuesday meeting. A. R. Hawkins, Ray Y. Bowles and J. D. McDonald are trustees for Fairview district; Art Sager, Presnell and J. W. Caylor for Blue Mound; Sam Mounts, T. W. Gray and E. G. Pribble for Union.

At the present time Fairview district is sending all its pupils to Perryton. Union sends all high school students. Blue Mound only has three or four students enrolled in Perryton.

There are 106 students in these three Oklahoma districts. Approximately 46 are attending school here this year. With all their students coming to Perryton, it would make an additional enrollment of some 60 students.

#### OUTSTANDING INDEBTEDNESS OF OCHILTREE COUNTY IS REDUCED TO \$25,000; LOWEST IN STATE

County Commissioners Retire \$12,500 in Courthouse, WPA and County Park Warrants at Tuesday Meeting of the Court

#### COUNTY RANKS 1ST IN ENTIRE STATE

"Ochiltree County now owns her courthouse?" stated County Judge Dave Shanks following a meeting of the Commissioners Court Tuesday when orders were passed to retire \$12,500 in outstanding warrants. These warrants included the following items: Courthouse \$9,000; WPA work, \$1,500; County Park, \$2,000. This payment will clean up all indebtedness against the courthouse, which was erected 11 years ago at a cost of \$110,000 plus \$14,000 for furniture. At the time it was built, \$4,000 in cash was paid. All of the above indebtedness was not due, but the Commissioners had a surplus in the sinking fund, so they stopped interest payments.

#### SET DEFERRED GRAZING DATE

COUNTY COMMITTEE MET ON SATURDAY AND NAMED MAY 1 AS OPENING DATE; CLOSES OCT. 31

The county committee at a meeting Saturday in the courthouse voted to place the date for starting deferred grazing in Ochiltree county on May 1. The program will continue until October 31.

County Agent E. W. Thomas announces that a 40 per cent total allowance will be paid for deferring grazing on one-fourth of the land in the Range Program. This amount may be raised to 60 per cent where necessary to fence or where additional practices such as mowing weeds or eradicating prairie dogs are carried out. Under the deferred grazing program pasture land will be allowed to recover from overgrazing by the withholding of stock from the land for a period of six months this year.

Thrill Scene in New Film

Cagney Best Of Bad Men In "Oklahoma Kid" At Ellis

"The Oklahoma Kid" with James Cagney in the title role, is the gripping drama of an empire in creation and its dramatic, thrilling action will hold audiences spellbound when it shows Sunday and Monday, March 19-20, at the Ellis Theatre. Two matinees will be shown Sunday at 2 and 4 p. m. The new Cagney picture is a rousing melodrama of the open spaces laid in the days when homesteaders were erasing the last frontier in the United States. It is a semi-historic tale of the great land rush and other events which followed the opening up of Oklahoma territory to settlement in 1890, but it scores primarily as a thrilling entertainment—made memorable by superb acting by the star and such players as Humphrey Bogart, Rosemary Lane and Donald Crisp.

It is interesting to note that Jimmy Cagney is a dashing horseman, it is also interesting to observe him decked out in sombrero, buckskin jacket, high-heeled riding boots and with two old Colt six-guns on his hips instead of one automatic slung under his armpit; but all of that can't hide the fact that he's essentially the same Cagney who has long been recognized as the screen's foremost exponent of forceful action.

All his brilliant gallery of city-bred hard guys to the contrary notwithstanding, this picture proves that the elements which make Cagney such a compelling actor really fit better against the roomy background of the great outdoors than they ever did in the narrow confines of city streets. In other words, he's great as a rip-roarin', hell-for-leather, quick-trigger gunman of the plains.

Naturally, even a Cagney alone could not make "The Oklahoma Kid" the thrilling entertainment it is, but he has all the aid that is necessary—a swell supporting cast. Heading the supporting players is Humphrey Bogart, who outdoes himself in a portrait of ruthless villainy. He is not, it may be noted, a cowardly villain, but fully as courageous as the hero—a fact which helps to make the final encounter between Cagney and Bogart, which is a vicious hand-to-hand battle, one of the greatest fight scenes ever seen on the screen.

The romantic interest is beautifully sustained by the delectable Rosemary Lane.

Donald Crisp, as usual, is brilliantly effective in the sympathetic type of role for which he is so much in demand, he visits Harvey Stephens in a considerably more than adequate as Cagney's elder brother and rises to moving heights in a great death scene, and others who contribute polished performances include Hugh Sothern, Charles Middleton, Edward Pawley, Ward Bond, Lew Harvey, John Miljan, Trevor Bardette and Arthur Aylesworth.

Beery Stars Here

"Sergeant Madden" Brings Great Melodrama To Ellis Screen Thursday and Friday
