Board Studies Plan For School's Future

School board members discussed the school plant and faculty needs for the next five years in Monday evening's regularly scheduled meeting. The improvements are a part of the accreditation self-study process in which the local schools are involved for the 1976-77 school year.

Top priorities discussed for the next five years included a new auditorium, new lights for the elementary classrooms, enlargement of the school tax office, re-surfacing of the street in front of the elementary and high schools, bricking the enclosed windows of the front of the elementary building and building and re-surfacing a new track field and replacement of bleachers for the "visitors" at the football field.

Resignation of Lulu Perez as teacher's aide was accepted.

Board members employed Mary Cariker and Susie Gonzales as teacher aides in Hart Elementary School. An extra teacher aide position was approved for the remainder of the school year through the migrant program.

In other action, board members extended Superintendent Ted Averitt's contract to extend through July 1, 1980.

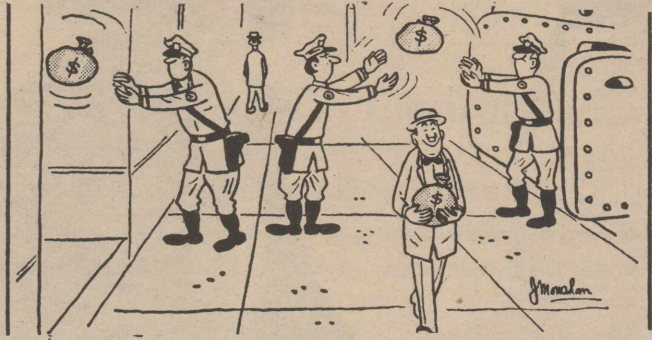

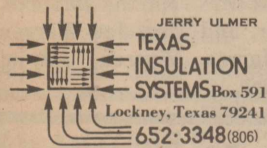

Funk's G-4507. It was adjusted to No. 2 corn at 15.5 percent moisture from 125 acres. To qualify as an official entry, Brantley had to harvest shelled corn from not less than four adjacent rows running the full length of the field.

Brantley's crop was planted April 20, April 21 and April 22 in 40-inch rows at 29,000 seeds per acre. (His crop was irrigated 4 times.) It was harvested on Oct. 18 through Oct. 26.

Brantley applied a total of 221 pounds nitrogen, 100 pounds phosphorous, and 36 pounds potash in his fertilizer program. The yield was verified by a disinterested witness.

More than 30,000 corn growers have entered Project: 200 over the past 5 years. Each year the Producers of Funk's G-Hybrids publish computerized summaries of the management methods employed by the Project: 200 entrants, giving the nation's corn growers a comparison of their own corn growing methods with those of other top producers in the country.

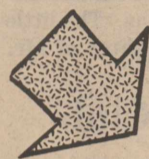

Branch Opens In Plainview For Morton Buildings, Inc.



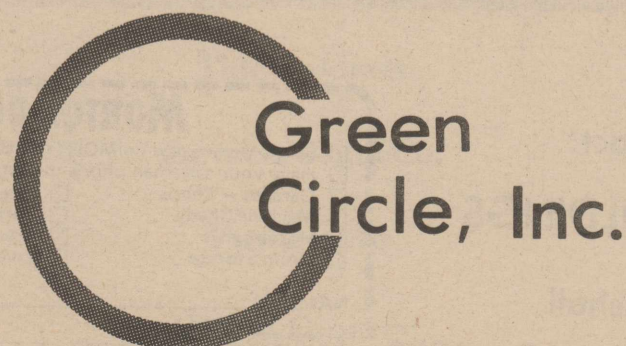

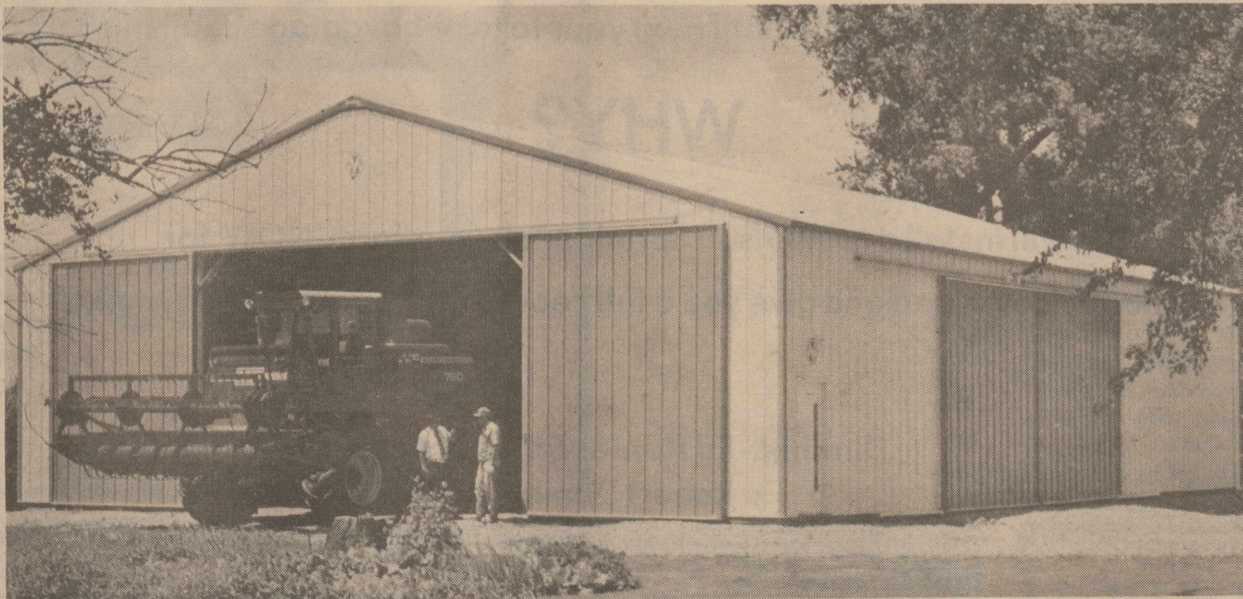

"I can't hold my hands," she exclaims. As a result, she is usually found piecing quilts, embroidering, making many varied works of needlecraft or

just sewing. She cut her first quilt pieces when she was nine and has been making quilts since that time.

In November, Mabel began making pretty yarn-tufted pom pom pillows as Christmas gifts and by holiday giving time she had completed 22. In her spare

time, she made herself some new dresses and sewed some for a small great-granddaughter.

"If I'm not reading or cooking, I'm doing some kind of handwork," she says. She also has a keen appetite for reading.

Mabel met her husband, the late Lester Aven, in Baylor County while she was picking cotton. They lived "in a little place on the Brazos River" until moving to the Plains in 1916. They came to Hart in 1928.

Mabel has three sons, Buster, Leroy and Hilrey, and five daughters, Ila Ruth, Lila Pearl, Lillian, Geneva and Maurice.

The recipe she shares for apple dumplings is one she got from a friend. The tuna patties' recipe is a good extender recipe for tuna which has soared in cost along with all other groceries.

TUNA FISH PATTIES

(For the morning meal)
1-can med size tuna fish
1-egg beaten well
1/2 med cup whole sweet milk mixed well with tuna fish milk and egg.
4-tablespoons yellow meal
2-tablespoons flour mixed well.
Fry in butter, if too thick add 3-tablespoons milk. Yields 4 to 6 servings.

OLD FASHIONED APPLE DUMPLINGS

2-cups of all-purpose flour
2-teaspoons baking powder
1-teaspoon salt
1-tablespoon butter or margarine, softened
1-tablespoon shortening
1-cup of milk
About 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine
1-teaspoon ground cinnamon

4-tablespoons brown sugar
6-tart apples, peeled, cored, and chopped

2-tablespoons dark raisins
2-tablespoons chopped walnuts
Combine flour, baking powder and salt in a large mixing bowl. Cut in butter and shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Gradually add milk to make a soft dough.

Roll dough into a 1/4 inch thick rectangle on a lightly floured surface. Brush with melted butter; sprinkle with cinnamon and brown sugar. Spread walnuts and raisins over dough. Spread apples over pastry. Roll up jellyroll fashion; cut into ten slices. Place flat in a greased 13 X 9 X 2 inch baking pan: bake at 350° for 20 minutes. Pour apple dumpling sauce over top, and continue baking 20 minutes. Yield about 10 servings.

APPLE DUMPLING SAUCE

1-cup sugar
1-tablespoon all-purpose flour
Dash of salt
1-tablespoon butter or mar-

garine
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
1-cup hot water.

Combine all ingredients in a saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a boil; cook 2-minutes, stirring constantly. Yield; about 1 1/2 cups.

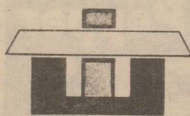

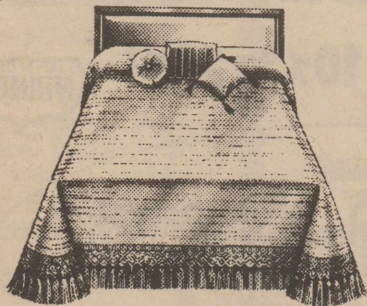
