Profiles of Floydada school board candidates

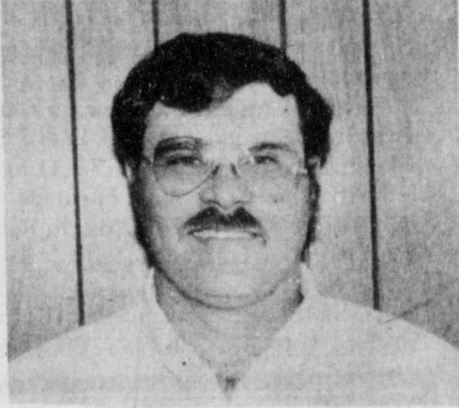


Bud Rainey is a Career Agent at Farm Bureau Insurance Agency. He is married to Sandra Rainey, who is employed at the Floyd County Sheriff's Department. They have three children — Jeff Rainey, a sophomore at Angelo State University; Kristi Rainey, a junior at Floydada High and Rusty Rainey who is in seventh grade at Floydada Junior High. He is a member of the First Baptist Church in Floydada; a member of the Masonic Lodge number 712; a member of the Rotary Club and on the board of directors of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce.

"I have been a member of the education field, having taught in the Texas A and M University System and also at Wayland Baptist University and serving as assistant chairman of the business division at Wayland," Rainey said.

"My desire is to have the best school system Floydada can possibly offer to its students, faculty and an administration, and to this endeavor I would strive to have an open mind to all decisions concerning the above."

Hulon Carthel, is a self-employed farmer. He has a bachelor's degree in agriculture economics from Texas Tech. His wife, Anne, has a bachelor's degree in physical education and English. She formerly taught in the Lockney and Floydada school districts. They have two children, Casey and Corey.

"I feel that I am a fair and open-minded individual with an optimistic attitude," Carthel said. "I feel that a school trustee has two primary obligations to the community. The first obligation is to the students. They need to be given the opportunity to receive the best education possible. The second obligation is to the taxpayers. They need to know that every effort will be made to spend the tax dollars efficiently while providing a quality education."

"I think we need to strive to present a total education program which will help to prepare the individual to be a responsible, well-educated citizen. I also think we need to encourage more communication between the community and the schools; and finally I think we need continual maintenance of our educational facilities. If I am elected, I intend to do the best job I possibly can do to represent the community."



Craig Edwards is a farmer and has lived all of his life in Floyd County. He graduated from Floydada High in 1963, where he participated in FFA and other activities. He began farming after graduation. He is a member of the First Baptist Church and has been teaching the 11th grade boys Sunday school class for several years. He has also worked with the 4-H's. "I have had experience in financial management through my farming operations -- from a small renter to having acquired land of my own," Edwards said. "As a taxpayer, I feel I would be very aware of how tax money is best used for the betterment of our schools."

"I do not intend to let my personal feelings effect my judgements, and I will work with other school board members."

"One of our goals should be to raise our academic standards, where our students will be better prepared for college and vocational schools. Another goal should be to produce more rounded students."



Fred Zimmerman III attended the Floydada Public Schools, Southern Methodist University, Dallas and graduated with a degree in business and finance from the University of Texas in 1965. He did graduate work at the U.T. law school in Austin.

-Support our Administrators and faculties in their efforts to create the best possible classroom atmosphere for teaching/learning.

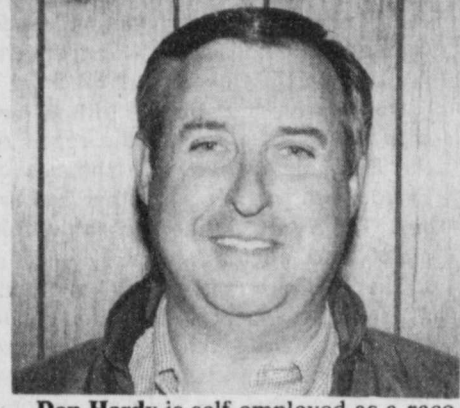
-Assist in the sound financial management of the huge \$3.7 million budget which can provide for the needs and opportunities of the school district without a tax increase.

Lake Mackenzie Water Project in full swing

An estimated 60 men working for various contractors and subcontractors were working at five different locations as work got into full swing Monday on the Lake Mackenzie Water Project.

Initial work had begun shortly after the first of the year at the lake, but extended bad weather with usual amounts of moisture slowed the progress crews were able to make until recent weeks.

A new road was built to a site west of the dam on the south side of the lake large enough to accommodate offices, storage tanks, 16 feet deep fockalators, and a pump station.

By the beginning of this week forms were already set and concrete pours were being poured for the floors of some of the huge tanks.

Settlement tanks will be used so there will be no wasted water.

The facilities at the treatment plant will be open to the public upon completion. Walkways will make it possible for guests to observe the complete treatment process.

In addition to the office and plant facilities, the water superintendent's home will be built facing the plant. Bud Moore of Coahoma, Texas, who is now serving as one of the three inspectors on the project, will be the water superintendent when the system reaches completion, approximately April, 1984. He has come highly recommended for his experience with water plants in the past.

The \$12 1/4 million dollar project was put up for bids last fall at a saving of over \$2 million over the projected cost due to the slump in the economy.

Regional Construction Company of Irving, Texas, won the contracts for the raw water and transfer pipelines. A tower at the base of the dam, which shows water at the 105 foot level, makes it possible to take water from whatever level of the lake desired. Raw water will be pumped through a 24 inch concrete steel pipeline under the dam to the plant site.

Godbe Construction Company of Rockwall, Texas, is the contractor of the three million gallon a day treatment

plant. Virgil Talbert is general superintendent for Godbe.

Treated water will be pumped from the treatment plant to the Tulia pump station, located about two miles west of Rock Creek on Highway 86 in a 20" line. That nearly 5-mile transfer line is almost complete. Regional will also bury the transmission lines from the Rock Creek Station to Lockney, a distance of about 25 miles, and the transmission line from the Tulia station to Tulia.

Novak Construction Company of Amarillo will be contractors of the 12" line from Rock Creek to Silverton and the Floydada line from Lockney. The Rock Creek pump station will be built by West Texas Mechanical.

Tank Builders, Inc. of Euless, Texas, will construct the 625,000 gallon storage tanks at both the Tulia pump station and the Rock Creek station. Construction of pump stations and storage tanks will begin in the next few days. One million gallon storage tanks will be built at Lockney west of the fairgrounds and at Tulia.

The systems will allow the lake water to be pumped into the respective water tanks where there will be no loss of pressure or lapse in service. When the water level drops in the cities' water tank (towers), the pump will be automatically activated. Each town will be allowed to operate their pumps and add any additional chlorination desired. Controls at Lake Mackenzie can override any of those at the four towns.

The gigantic digger used for removal of dirt and stringing tracing cable in the 6-foot ditch can lay 3,000 feet of pipe a day. The 32-foot links of concrete steel pipe are sealed with a wrap sealed with concrete at the joints to make a water tight bond.

With a three foot rise in the water level from the winter snows and many improvements made in the recreational facilities the staff at Lake Mackenzie is looking forward to a good summer. Five more picnic tables with shades have been installed on the south side of the lake and barbecue grills have been placed at all 18 picnic tables. All roads have been reworked with caliche on

some roads. The two boat ramps and the all-weather parking areas are in good shape and ready for use.

A 26 by 50 foot group shelter with tables, electric outlets, water, barbecue grill and restrooms is ready for use. An outlying area has more than 90 young trees for future development and playground equipment. Rotary clubs in Floydada, Lockney and Tulia have assisted in this project. Groups wishing to use this facility should make reservations now by calling the Lake Office - 806-633-4318. Individual electrical hookups for campers are available from \$2.50 a day to \$4.50 for refrigerated air.

There has been no change in the charge for the lake permits. Annual entry and boating permits are now on sale at the lake office and the marina. Residents living in Floydada, Silverton and Tulia and who have paid their Mackenzie MWA taxes can purchase their annual entry permits at a discount by getting them at the County Appraisal District Tax Office in their respective town. Residents in Lockney can purchase theirs at the City Hall in Lockney. All permit money is used for the up-keep and improvement of the recreational facilities at the lake. Tax money cannot be used for these purposes.

The lake water is beginning to warm up, and bass and channel cat are now moving into shallow waters. Several large mouth bass and channel cat have been caught during the past few days. A program for improving the fishing has been recommended by Parks and Wildlife and the program was adopted by the Directors of the MMWA. The study and recommendations made by Parks and Wildlife will be released to the public in the next few days.

Lake Mackenzie is located in some of the most picturesque scenery anywhere around our communities. This is our facility. Let's make the most of it! If you have not been able to get out of town during spring break, take a day or two and discover the wonders that nature has wrought for our pleasure.

Neil Taylor, in his sixth year as lake manager, extends an invitation to all area residents. "Enjoy an outing by visiting beautiful Lake Mackenzie."

Proceeds from the commercials will support local scouting programs and youth activities, eyeglasses for needy children, construction of additional

wheelchair ramps in the downtown area, the Lions crippled children's camp, the Lions diabetes camp, and the Lions eye bank.

In conjunction with this an Operation Identification program will be conducted in front of the radio station for bicycles. Owners are asked to bring their bicycle with a driver's license, numer, preferably to be engraved on it.

"We urge you to listen in on the 26th. From past experience, there's no telling what may happen," said Seay.

The Commissioners' Court of Floyd County met in regular session March 11, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

Motion was made and seconded that all bills properly presented be approved and paid. Vote: All in favor.

Motions were made and seconded to approve the following requests and contracts for the use of county equipment and machinery: M.E. Florida, Mrs. Maurice Campbell, Travis Jones, Elmer Sandusky by Red Archer, Durward Jack, J.A. Welch, Jack Yeary, Richard Lambert, and Doris Jones. Motions were unanimously carried.

Court approved the following Order concerning Bush v. Vitera:

Motion by Jack Lackey and seconded by Sam Spence that Angie Anderson be allowed to work in the Tax office from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for the period of one week, March 14-18, 1983. Unanimously carried.

Taxpayer met with the court to discuss the dismissal of his personal property delinquent tax charge. The court referred to the motion made during the Commissioners' Court meeting held on December 13, 1982.

Don Marble and Doodle Milton met with the court to discuss the repair of the Floydada Airport with the use of Floyd County funds and other resources. The court decided to table this matter until a later date.

The Soil Conservation Board met with the court to request their portion of the Revenue Sharing funds. Motion was made by Bob Jarrett and seconded by Jack Lackey that the Soil Conservation and Child Welfare's appropriated funds

County Judge, Choise Smith, informed the court of the Appraisal Hearing that will be on April 6, 1983 from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. The hearing will be in reference to the 1983-84 proposed budget.

The Court drew Jim Crawford to serve on the Grievance Committee and Orval Newberry as an alternate.

Motion was made by Bob Jarrett and seconded by Sam Spence to accept the proposal from Blue Cross Blue Shield. Motion was carried unanimously.

Due to latter notice received; the Revenue Sharing audit is not required. Motion was made by Thomas Warren and seconded by Jack Lackey to rescind the motion that was made during the February regular meeting concerning the audit. Vote: Unanimous.

June Ware met with the court to present two new names for the Library Board. Motion was made by Sam Spence and seconded by Bob Jarrett that Kay Williams and Jim Word be approved to serve on the Library Board for a three year term. Vote: Unanimous

The court discussed the Lockney JP office and decided to notify the JP and have him clear out the back room. The room shall be available to police officers.

Motion was made by Sam Spence and seconded by Jack Lackey to authorize the County Judge to check into the proposals to repair the courthouse roof. Vote: Unanimous.

Motion was made by Sam Spence and seconded by Jack Lackey to transfer \$60,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund. Each precinct will receive \$15,000. Vote: Unanimous.

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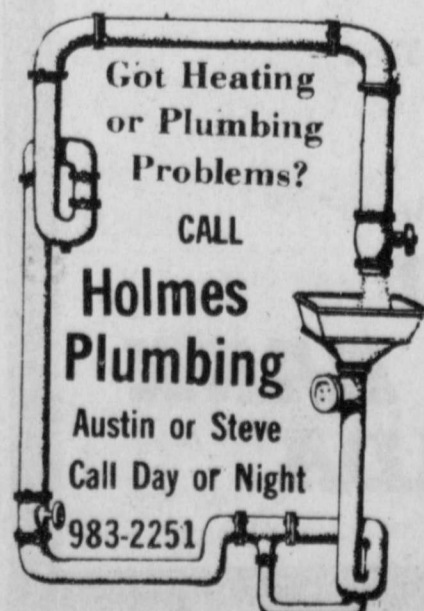

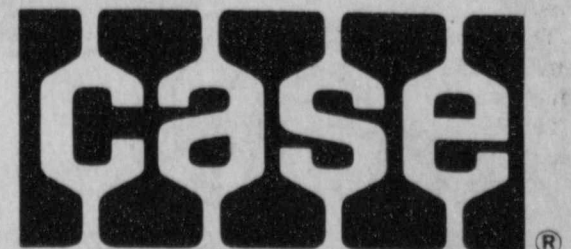

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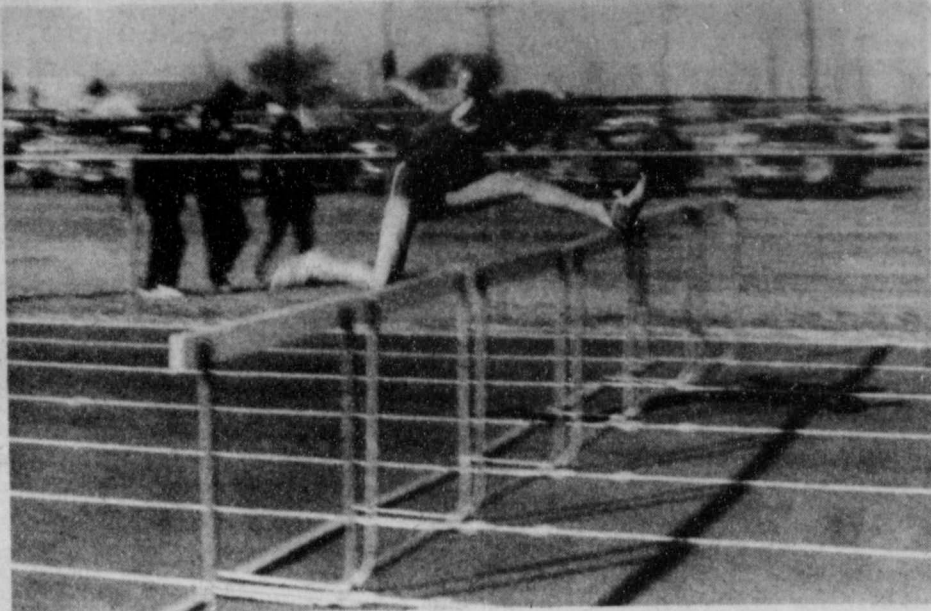
