TWO DELEGATES RETURN TO MEET

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, July 27.—W. C. Bridgeman, first Lord of the British Admiralty, and Viscount Cecil left for Geneva today to participate in the resumption of the naval conference with representatives from the United States and Japan.

They have been in London one week, having come from Geneva to place before the cabinet a report on the status of the naval arms reduction parity.

They also received further instructions for their continuance.

LONDON, July 27.—Sir Austen Chamberlain, foreign secretary, in a statement regarding the tripartite naval conference, today said in the opinion of the British government there need be no difficulty arriving at a temporary arrangement regarding immediate and future building of cruisers.

He added, however, that the British empire could not be asked to give to any such temporary arrangement the appearance of an immutable principle which might be treated as a precedent.

RAIL RATES TO BE READJUSTED

WASHINGTON, July 27.—After an investigation of proposals of certain Southwestern railroads to readjust rates on cotton to Eastern trunk lines' territory, the Interstate Commerce Commission experts today recommended that the railroads concerned be generally permitted to make the changes desired.

Railroads concerned are those operating throughout the Southwest on more circuitous routes than their competitors.

Queen Marie Will Again Visit in the United States

(By Associated Press)

BUCHAREST, July 27.—Queen Marie of Rumania has decided to visit the United States again. She hopes to start soon after the period of mourning for King Ferdinand is over, she told a correspondent of the Associated Press today.

In the conversation with the news service man the queen said she wished to travel next time as a private person so she could go where she pleased and do as she wanted to, as she did not care to burden state and municipal authorities and to avoid quarrels among her followers.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 27.—At the age when most youngsters are learning to put their blocks together to spell

words, five-year-old Michael of Rumania has been made the ruler of his people.

The lad is the youngest king a European nation has had in recent history, but for the present the duties of the crown will not call him from his toys, for a regency council has been chosen to guide the nation until the infant King Michael is 18.

Michael is a grandson of the late King Ferdinand, whom he succeeds, and Queen Marie. His father is Prince Carol, who forfeited the crown by deserting his royal wife, Princess Helene of Greece, Michael's mother, to wed a commoner.

MOONSHINERS MURDER A DRY INVESTIGATOR

(By Associated Press)

HAGERSTOWN, Md., July 27.—Ambushed by moonshiners last night, R. Stotler, 52, of Keyser, West Virginia, head of the dry enforcement bureau in Washington, Allegheny and Garrett counties of Maryland, was shot to death.

Stotler's companion, R. E. Walters, of Hagerstown, another prohibition investigator, escaped. Walters notified authorities here this morning.

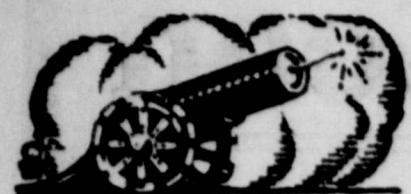

GIVE VIEWS ON TAX REDUCTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 27.—While in accord on the necessity for tax reduction, a Republican and a Democrat, leading members of the House ways and means committee, Representative Green, of Iowa, its chairman, and Representative John Garner, of Texas, ranking minority member, in published views show wide divergence of opinion on the amount and the methods for cutting the lists.

The congressmen in articles in the Nation's Business Magazine concurred that the corporation tax should be reduced but Green believed the important cut should be on incomes under \$5,000, while Garner stressed the repeal of the nuisance and automobile levies.

Woman Ichthyologist Saves Baby Trout from Disease

ALBANY, N. Y., July 27.—Many an angler thinks that women are people who like to keep fishermen from their favorite form of recreation.

But Dr. Emmeline Moore is a friend of fishermen. Furthermore, she can outfish almost any angler and knows more about the habits, the habits and the flavor of fish than most men.

Dr. Moore is an expert ichthyologist and is an investigator in fish culture for the New York state conservation department. Her interest in fish does not end with the laboratory. She puts on waders and ploughs through streams and swamps with her assistants as they wrest from nature the secrets of the water folk.

Dr. Moore likes to lay aside official dignity occasionally and go fishing "for the fun of it." "It's the best sport there is," she says, "but I can't find much time for it."

She has solved many problems,

Peevish? Blame The Weather, Says Observer



D. S. LANDIS

FT. WORTH, July 27.—When things go awry, blame it on the weather, says D. S. Landis, poet, philosopher and for 25 years weather observer here for the United States Weather Bureau.

Temperature and humidity affect the human nervous system, and fluctuations, creating nervous activity, are reflected in the actions of people over a large area, he believes.

A bright day cheers, raising the spirits of the people, making everyone more congenial and reducing likelihood of friction.

A cloudy day, on the other hand, while a sedative for people of a phlegmatic type, is an irritant to persons of a more vital nature and causes unrest and brittleness of temper, according to Landis. He says that police records show that crime, especially suicides, increases on gloomy days.

Periods of drunkenness, brawls, assaults, murders, arson and the like will be found segregated under abnormal barometric pressures, which in turn are the offspring of temperature and absolute humidity, Landis believes.

Although hot weather generally causes crossness and irritation where humidity is great, there are sections in the Southwest where the mercury reaches 120 degrees, and the dry heat becomes actually exhilarating, in Landis' opinion.

"A mean temperature of 70 degrees is the best for normal living conditions with an average amount of moisture," Landis

said. "Fluctuations from this causes nervous activity. "It's not always intuition that causes us to do the things we do. Often it's the weather working on our neutral make-up."

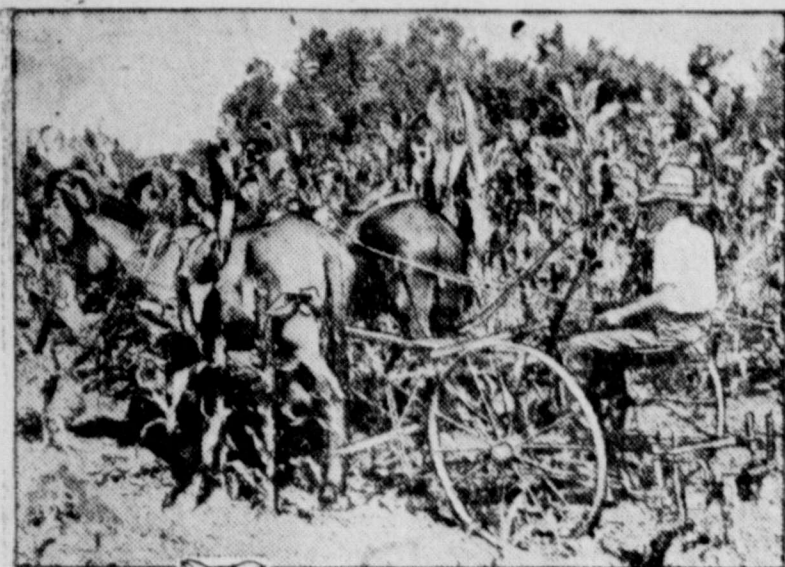

Kirkpatrick believes in diversified farming. He has one bale of cotton in the cotton association, 109 Rhode Island Red chickens, eight registered Poland China hogs, seven grade Holstein cows, four calves and one registered bull. In addition, he is the youngest member of the Alabama Cotton Association and champion debater in the high schools of Seima.
