Board adopts discipline policy

The Dimmitt School Board adopted a system-wide, discipline management system at their regular meeting Monday.

The board decided to use the Lee Cantor Assertive Discipline Plan, which was chosen two years ago as an optional discipline system in grades K-8.

The plan was adopted in order to comply with House Bill 72 which mandates that each school district adopt a discipline management system.

In addition to the discipline system, the board revised the school calendar so that students will be given both Good Friday and Memorial Day off. The board members decided that those holidays would be used to make up any days missed. The contingency plan the board adopted states that if school is closed for any reason, students will attend classes Good Friday to make up the first missed day, and Memorial Day to make up the second missed day.

Teachers will be taking their competency tests on March 14, which falls on the Friday of Spring Break. Students will also be out of school April 21 to celebrate the Sesquicentennial.

In other business, the board approved food service bids from Plains Dairy and Rain-

bo Bread. They also approved a bid from First State Bank for their bank depository. State law requires each school district to accept bank depository bids every two years.

Upper and lower reserved football seating will be \$4. The board decided to standardize the price for both after the District Executive Committee raised the price for general ad-

mission to \$3.

The board accepted resignations from Linda Bonds, Marka Herbert, Mary Nell King and June Parker.

The board hired Cindy Ashmore, Judy Nelson, Richard Wood, Kathyna Wiseman, Laura Carter, Karrie Maddin, Debbie Wood, Glenna Cornett, Beth Buckley, Rebecca Garrison and Lynn Collier.

Commissioners get budget homework

Castro County's commissioners got a homework assignment Monday — the county's proposed \$1.63 million budget for the 1986 fiscal year starting Oct. 1.

The budget includes proposed raises averaging five percent across-the-board for most county employees. The county budget is up about \$50,000 from last year if the proposal is approved.

Commissioners are expected to discuss the budget further at their July 22 meeting, and will also discuss what they will do to meet the overtime payment sanctions imposed by the Fair Labor Standards Act and a recent court decision bringing cities and counties under FLSA.

Commissioners learned Monday the county, under the present salary structure, owes \$8,095.46 in overtime accumulated since the court ruling took effect April 15, including \$7,302.01 to deputies and dispatchers in the county sheriff's office, and \$793.45 to janitor Coy Dunn.

"We think there may be another ruling on this," County Judge Polly Simpson said Monday. "Let's hold up on the checks (for overtime) and see what happens. We may not have to pay it."

The commissioners also heard a report from Seth Halpern of Central Plains MH/MR in Plainview on what the center has done in the county over the past year, and requested \$3,900 from the county to continue providing services.

Halpern told the commissioners that 168 county residents used services provided by the center last year, including 122 mental health, 14 mental retardation and 28 alcohol-related cases.

The commissioners also approved the recommendations of County Democrat Party Chairman Oscar Wylie and County Republican Party Chairman Deanne Clark for election judges for the eight new voting boxes in the county.

There will be one Democrat and one Republican at each box.

Auction may settle Oles Grain dispute

A liquidation auction is expected to be held sometime in August to pay more than 200 depositors, including several Nazareth-area residents, who have grain stored in facilities leased by David Oles.

Over \$3 million is owed to depositors by Oles, who is leasing the former Star Grain facility just north of Nazareth. Oles leased eight other grain elevators and has mortgaged a facility near Spearman.

Oles owes more than \$8

million in debts, with most of the debt stemming from two loans totalling \$13 million from Republic Bank in Dallas.

All of Oles' facilities were closed by the Texas Dept. of Agriculture on May 31 after Oles failed to renew a \$500,000 licensing bond. Two facilities in Perryton and Spearman, were closed after TDA inspectors found an 8 to 10 percent shortage of grain, while the others were padlocked because of Oles' failure to renew the bond.

Sanchez sentenced in Garibaldi death

Primitivo Sanchez, 30, of Dimmitt, was sentenced to 180 days in jail and fined \$1,000 last Tuesday in 242nd District Court following his conviction on charges of criminally negligent homicide in the May 13, 1984 death of Douglas Garibaldi.

Garibaldi was a passenger in Sanchez' 1979 Chevrolet pickup as they were traveling

westward on a dirt road 3.5 miles southeast of Dimmitt.

Police reports at the time of the accident indicated Garibaldi was thrown from the pickup as it careened through a bar ditch. Garibaldi died of head and neck injuries.

Rabies clinic is Saturday

A rabies shot clinic will be held Saturday from 9 a.m. until 12 noon at the Dimmitt Fire Station.

Rabies shots, usually \$9, will be available for \$7 at Saturday's clinic. Other shots will also be discounted \$2.

"We want to urge everyone to bring their dogs and cats in, and take advantage of the clinic," said City Animal Patrol Officer Charles Whitman.
