Wildflowers Blanket Area With Profusion of Beauty

It's that time of year when wildflowers of all descriptions burst out in a profusion of color along the highways and byways of South Texas.

There are bluebonnets, of course. They are the state flower. And, there are primrose, yellow daisies, white daisies, thistle, Indian paintbrush, Indian pinks, wild phlox, daggers, bluegrass, native clover and many more.

But you don't have to know their names to appreciate their beauty and color -- blue, pink, yellow, red, lavender, you name it.

All you have to do is to take a drive into the country, and

you're bound to see some. They are not everywhere, but usually you can find them in the highway right-of-way and in pastures along the road.

Texas Highway Department maintenance personnel who keep the highway right-of-way in shape usually keep their eyes peeled for wildflowers and keep their mowers away from them until the blooms are gone. They also report the best looking patches they see.

Some have reported that the wildflower crop is not as good this year because of the relatively dry winter.

Nevertheless there are plenty of wildflowers to see.

Easter Sunrise Service is Set

The Aransas County Ministers Association will sponsor the traditional community Easter Sunrise Service on Sunday, March 30. The service will begin at 7:00 a.m. on the Bayfront.

The location of the service has been changed this year due to a construction project near the Navigation District building. The new site, just a few yards away from the old, is between the Navigation District Office and the Parks and Wildlife Marine Lab and Aquarium.

In past years seating has been provided; this year, however, the Ministers Association requests that you bring your own folding chairs or blankets.

The service is scheduled to last approximately a half hour to avoid conflict with early services in various congregations.

CPL Announces Scholarships

Application deadlines for Central Power and Light Company scholarships in home economics, electrical engineering and business administration are rapidly approaching.

The scholarships are available to high school seniors and junior college graduates. The applicant must be a resident of the general area served by CPL and must have resided in this area for the last three years.

CPL serves a 44-county area from the Rio Grande Valley up to the Bay City-Palacios area in southeast Texas and across to the Del Rio area in southwest Texas. CPL does not serve the San Antonio area.

A total of 12 scholarships will be awarded for the fall term of 1975 in six South Texas colleges and universities. The colleges included in the program are Texas A & I University at Kingsville, Pan American University at Edinburg, Del Mar Technical Institute in Corpus Christi, Victoria Junior College, Bee County Junior College in Beeville and Laredo Junior College.

Electrical engineering scholarships at the university level are available only at Texas A & I and are valued at \$2,700, payable at a rate of \$300 per semester. Application deadline is April 15.

Business administration scholarships at the university level are available at Pan American and Texas A&I. April 1 is the deadline at A&I while April 20 is the deadline at Pan American. These have a total value of \$2,400, payable at a rate of \$300 per semester.

A home economics scholarship valued at \$2,400 is available at Texas A&I. Application deadline is April 1.

Scholarships in engineering or business administration are also available at Bee County, Victoria and Laredo Junior Colleges.

The junior college scholarships are valued at \$600 and are payable at a rate of \$150 per semester. Laredo has an April 29 deadline, Bee County's deadline is May and Victoria's deadline is July 1.

An electrical power technology scholarship is available at Del Mar Technical Institute in Corpus Christi. The maximum value of the scholarship is \$1,000, payable at a rate of \$250 per semester. Application deadline is April 1.

Application blanks for the scholarships may be secured from high school principals and counselors and by writing the registrar's office of the chosen college.

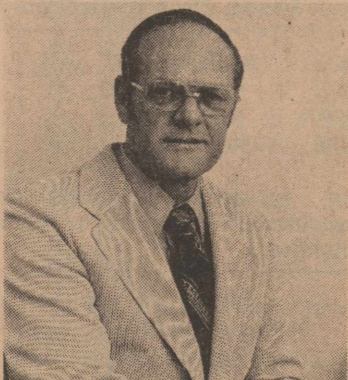
Methodists Set Service

The work of ordained deacons in the Evangelical Methodist Church in Bolivia will be highlighted this Sunday in First United Methodist Church, with Jim and Annette Morriss of Austin speaking at both worship services. They will be the last in a series of five speakers in the church's "Alive in Mission" emphasis.

Annette and Jim Morriss returned to the United States in July, 1973, after serving four years as workers for the Bolivian Methodist Church. They are lay persons who decided to apply to the World Division, Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church after Jim made a trip to Bolivia where he learned the need for personnel to work in the eastern tropical lowlands of that country. The Bolivian Methodist Church administers extensive work in that area in the fields of education, medicine and public health, agriculture and community development.

Following a six-month orientation period at the Missionary Orientation Center in Stony Point, New York, Annette and Jim and their two children spent five months in language school at Cuernavaca, Mexico. They arrived in Bolivia in 1969 to take up their assignment in Montero at the Methodist Rural Institute where Jim served as District Administrator, Treasurer and District Superintendent. Annette spent much of her time teaching missionary children and coordinating women's work in the district. She also was busy with the guest center and home activities.

The Morriss family is now on leave of absence from overseas service to give their children a chance to catch up on their education. They live in Austin.

where they resided for seventeen years before going to Bolivia. Annette is working as a teacher's aide in an elementary school and Jim has returned with his previous employment with the statewide association of Texas Electric Cooperatives in the field of information and rural development.

Fulton area, Place 6, one-year unexpired term to succeed Monte Rouquette who resigned; L.M. Dyson, Jr., Deedee Critz and H.D. Heasley.

Absentee voting will continue through April 1 in the School Administration Building from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, except for the period March 26-31 when the school system will be closed for the Easter holiday break.

Scoutcraft Fair a Success

On March 15, there was presented a scoutcraft fair that exemplified scouting.

Scout troops participating were Troop 280, of Rockport; Troop 2, of Aransas Pass; Troops 27 and 26 of Ingleside; and Troops 349 and 345, of Portland.

Cub Scout Packs participating were Pack 49, Rockport; Pack 27, Ingleside; Pack 341, Aransas Pass; Pack 20, Portland; and Pack 29, Port Aransas.

From these groups ribbons were awarded. There were eight first place Awards of

Merit and Honor; and three second place Awards of Merit.

Pack 49, of Rockport, sponsored by the Rotary Club, received a first Award of Merit and Honor. Not only was this a first in an award for Pack 49, but also a first time to be involved in a scoutcraft fair.

During the entire fair, Pack 49 had a den involved in doing a scout project pertaining to conservation. The Webelos den made bird feeders from coffee cans and plastic milk jugs. Den 2 made original scenes from oyster shell clusters, clay, ceramic animals and twigs. Den 3 made hanging baskets from plastic butter tubs and potted a small plant in them. They also planted flower seeds in egg cartons to later be transplanted. Den 1 made wooden and glass bird feeders.

The cubs did the entire decorations for their booth. A banner declaring Pack 49 was across the back of the booth. Den flags and achievement charts were on display. Projects that the cubs had done in den meetings, or at home, covered an entire table. Also on the walls of the booth were silhouettes of the bobcat, wolf, bear, silver and gold award points that the cubs had done for their booth.

Bond Sales Total \$2,578

According to Fred Bracht, Sr. chairman of the Aransas County Savings Bonds Committee, the 1975 Savings Bond goal for the County is \$60,000. January sales of E and H United Savings Bonds totaled \$2,578.00 for 4% of the sales goal.

The 1975 sales goal for Texas is \$234.3 million. During the month sales were \$23,290,606 compared to January 1974 sales of \$21,189,711.

County-wide Sanitary Sewage System Under Consideration

Exploration of the feasibility of a county-wide sanitary sewage system will be resumed, it was decided at a meeting of trustees of Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District in the county courthouse March 11.

Renewed interest and activity by the District board followed a recently published Associated Press news story from Austin to the effect that federal funds to help with sewage disposal plant costs have again been made available by a U.S. Supreme Court decision. The story stated that Texas cities would share in a total of \$64,193,850 in federal funds. This is in addition to some \$111 millions released earlier.

Because the proposed Aransas County sanitary sewage project would require that more than 50 percent of its funding come from federal funds, consideration of such a plan was halted when funds were cut off.

Renewed availability of federal funding makes it feasible to resume active consideration of the problem, according to Jack McDavid, president of the Conservation Board. However, he pointed out that the plan is far from an accomplished program.

Consideration of a county-wide sanitary sewage system was undertaken actively by the District board about two years ago. At that time interested engineering firms were asked to prepare preliminary feasibility plans on a speculative basis because the Board has no

plans with which to pay for an exploratory study, according to McDavid.

Three firms -- Naismith Engineers, Inc., Urban Engineering and Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam -- expressed interest and offered guidance on the feasibility of a county-wide sewage system and assistance on where to seek funds to pay for a preliminary study on which to base a request for federal and state funds.

It was recommended that first of all support for such a program should be obtained from the Coastal Bend Council of Governments which already had completed an extensive survey of sanitary sewage needs for this area.

This step was taken last April when COG gave its approval for Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District to apply for federal funds. Previously Rockport and Aransas County officials had endorsed the District's decision to pursue the matter.

Next it would be necessary to obtain funds, possibly about \$10,000, to pay for an engineering feasibility study to be used in submitting a request for federal funding. About this time, previously appropriated federal funds were frozen.

Tax Relief For Over 65

One of the first objectives of the A.A.R.P. organization when it came into being in June, 1973 was to do everything in its power to secure for those over 65 that had a homestead, the \$3,000 exemption that had been proposed and suggested by the state legislature.

First of all, the County and County Commissioners voluntarily made this grant possible. Just recently, the City Council of the City of Rockport followed.

Then on March 10 the Aransas County School Board granted this exemption.

Members and officers of the A.A.R.P. organization, on behalf of the many in this community who live in a homestead and are over the age of 65, wish to thank publicly the local governmental leaders for taking this step which will mean much to many members who are on fixed or low income.

To those who are entitled to this exemption, please remember that you must file an application and prove that you are 65 or older with (1) County Tax Assessor's office not later than April 30th, (2) the Aransas County School Board tax collector, not later than April 30th and (3) the City Hall not later than March 31st.

Please check these dates and make your application so you will not lose out on this.

Goliad Horse Races Start March 22

Race horses from twenty-five states are beginning to descend on historic old Goliad in preparation for their annual Spring Race Meet. The Meet, scheduled for three consecutive weekends, begins March 22 through April 6. La Bahia Downs officials are predicting a record breaking meet with Stake entries running ahead of 1974.

The opening weekend will find trials in the Anticipation Derby on Saturday, March 22, and in the South Texas Derby March 23. The South Texas Derby has an estimated purse of \$30,000 and will feature some of the country's top 3 year olds at 350 yards. The Anticipation Derby has an estimated purse of \$7,500. This graded Derby will be run at 300 yards.

Several additions are being offered at the Spring Meet. Barbecue beef, which was famous for years at the Goliad track, will be offered each Sunday and on the Saturday of the Futurity trials March 29. A second bonus for visitors is the special Program Coupon drawing which will be held each day. Numerous prizes will be awarded to the lucky winners.

Saturday, March 22, will be Kiddy Day and all children under 12 will be admitted free. Sunday, March 23, will be Corpus Christi Day. Special guests from that sea shore city will be recognized.

Dr. Shellenberger reported that 490 of the children examined needed dental work, mostly repair of cavities. Parents were notified through the school nurse. He said the decay problem among local school children was serious but there was little evidence of disease or mouth tumors.

Dr. Shellenberger said there appeared to be little difference in the decay problem percentages in the three school areas - Rockport, Fulton and Live Oak. In each instance about 50 percent of the children examined had cavities which needed attention.

Both he and Dr. Levy were agreed that many parents are too little concerned about the fate of so-called baby teeth. They pointed out that presence of these teeth is essential to proper development and spacing of adult teeth. In some instances decay and abscessing of baby teeth may actually prevent appearance of adult teeth, the dentists asserted.

It is the hope of the dentists that this examination can become an annual event and that their reports will stimulate better teeth care, including proper cleaning, among Aransas County children. Dr. Levy started the program alone last year before Dr. Shellenberger opened an office in Rockport.

Dental Exams For Students

A progress report on a voluntary dental examination program for Aransas County elementary school students was made by Dr. Ronald D. Levy and Dr. J.M. Shellenberger at a luncheon meeting of Rotary Club March 12 at Ramada Inn.

The local dentists examined approximately 1,000 pupils as a contribution to improved dental health among school children of the county. They conducted simple examinations to reveal cavities and any possible abnormal or diseased mouth conditions during the dentists' days off from office routine. The second week in February was designated as Children's National Dental Health Week.

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Car Wash at Church Mar. 23

The Senior High Class of First Presbyterian Church will have a car wash on Sunday, March 23.

The class is trying to raise money to pay for a camping retreat in April.

Anyone interested in having a clean car for the Easter season is encouraged to bring your car to the church on Sunday, March 23.

The cost will be \$2.50 for the car wash and only 50 cents more for a vacuum.

Consumer Market Report

College Station -- Beef is plentiful at reasonable prices, with no major changes in sight for awhile, one observer predicted this week.

"The nation's beef herd is at an all-time high with beef and calf supplies well above last year's level—a trend which is expected to continue," Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt said.

"For economy, look for pot roast specials at bargain prices.

"Also, check values on round steaks and roasts, ground beef, arm and blade pot roasts and steaks," the consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System, advised.

Vegetable news this week centers on potatoes and onions, while fruit bargains are grapefruit and oranges.

"Potatoes are at record levels with substantially lower prices, and best grapefruit economy is by-the-bag in medium sizes," Mrs. Clyatt said.

Other vegetable buys are broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery and some squash, particularly hard-shell varieties. Also cooking greens, turnips and rutabagas.

Fruit buys include pears, bananas, pineapple, tangerines and strawberries.

"Pork values focus on loin roasts and chops, shoulder roasts and steaks, while fryer chickens remain a bargain in most meat departments," the specialist added.

"Retail prices on fluid milk will continue edging upward to reflect high feed prices, but supplies of manufactured dairy products, especially butter, cheese and nonfat dry milk, are plentiful.

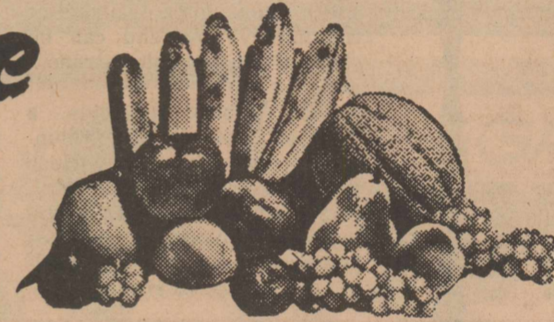

PURPLE MARTINS WILL COME SOON

Austin -- Purple martins are ideal tenants who pay their rent in an unusual way -- each bird eats thousands of mosquitos.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials say it is not too late to prepare for these helpful birds although, ideally, martin houses should be put up or cleaned in the fall.

The birds are presently winging their way back from South America to look for honeymoon cottages. Some already may have arrived. Their requirements are rigid, so any old bird house won't do.

If you already have a martin house, give it a good cleaning with soap and water, and make sure it is securely fastened to the pole.

If you don't have a martin house and would like one, they are available commercially, or you can build one yourself. Most libraries have house

plans, and the completed structure should cost less than \$10.

Although some bird lovers have had good success attracting martins with hollowed, long-necked gourds and plastic milk cartons, a house with at least six compartments for nests seems to be the best bet. Each compartment should be at least 6x6x6 inches, and the openings should be round and not more than 2 1/2 inches in diameter.

The house should be placed in an open area at least 15 feet above the ground. Martins like lots of wide, open spaces free from obstructions such as trees and buildings, and many times failure to attract martins can be attributed to the tight conditions around the house.

Once the nesting season is over, the house should be taken down and cleaned to prevent its use by sparrows or starlings.

In the fall the house should be put back up with the openings closed with tape. The tape should be taken off around the first of March.

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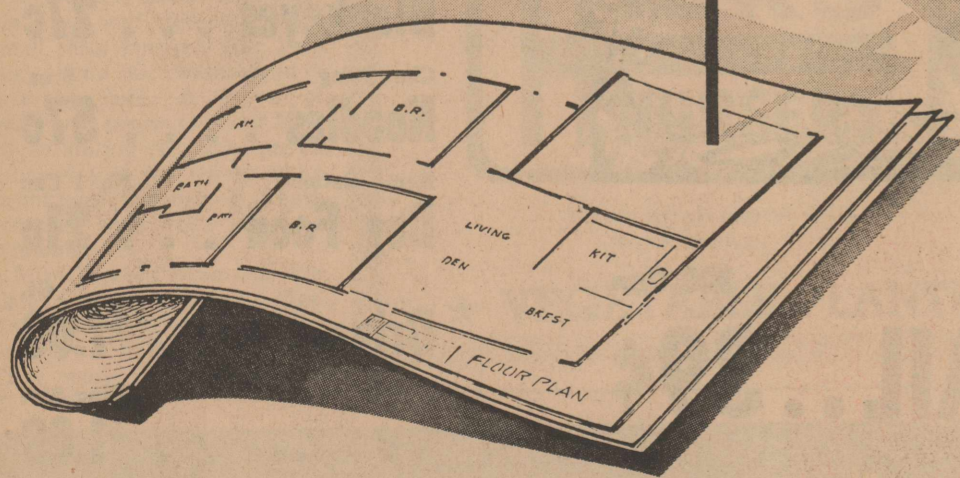
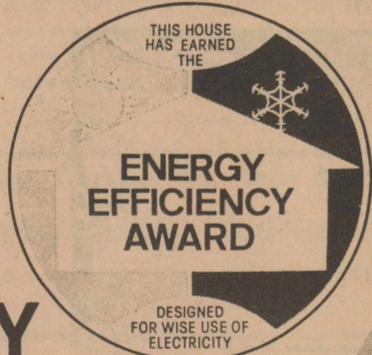

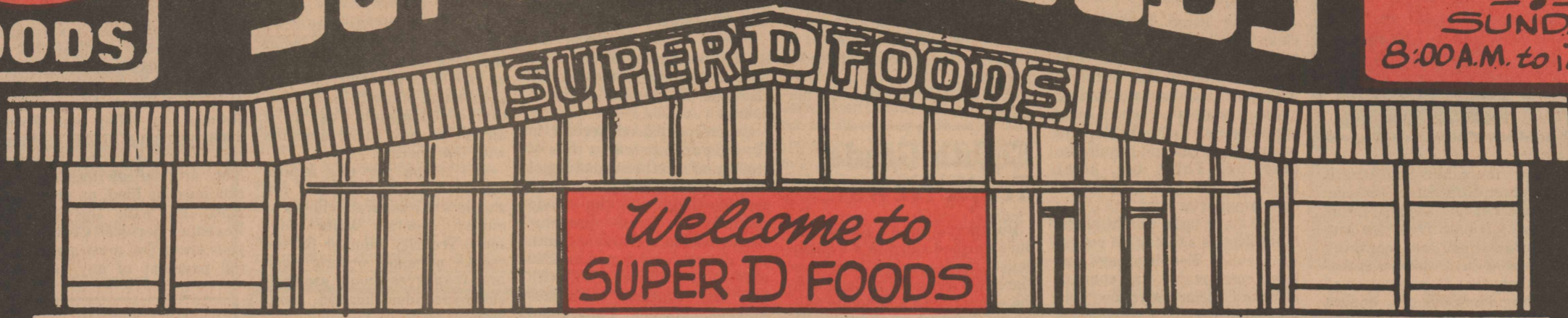

There was a time when camping out was strictly for small boys and rugged men. Women wanted no part of it, and I can see why - camping out in those days was really roughing it. It took some kind of genius to build a camp fire to cook over that didn't keep your eyes stinging from the smoke. Just as it got burned down to a nice bed of smokeless coals which were nice to cook on, it got too low and you had to add more wood, which, of course, created more smoke.

All the chores had to be finished before dark unless you wanted to stumble around doing them by the light of a smoky kerosene lantern. When you went to bed it was right out under the sky, or, if you were lucky enough to have a tent, the dirt floor left a lot to be desired. For small boys this was a form of paradise. They could run and play, fish and swim all day and a little sand in their beds just made them sleep better, but for women this was another matter.

Now, the camping picture is altogether different and women are really taking the lead in the camping boom. One leading manufacturer of camping equipment says that his statistics show that 85 percent of all camping equipment is bought by women. The man of the house may have brought up the subject of camping, but, once he convinced her it was the thing to do, she took over and selected the equipment.

Today there are about 55 million campers in America. One out of every four people in the United States is a camper, and we get about five million new campers every year. Of course, one reason for this is the equipment available today makes camping FUN for the whole family.

Tents come in all sizes and shapes from the multi-room family models to the little one-man, fly-weight nylon tents designed for the backpackers, but some things they all have in common. If they have any frame it's a convenient, light

aluminum frame that fits outside the tent. They all have nylon screened openings, waterproof floors, and zippered doors and windows - a far cry from the old greasy tarp thrown over a pole between two trees.

Folding camp stoves burn clean butane gas, light at the touch of a button, and have completely adjustable burners. Many of them also have folding ovens, complete with oven thermostats. Camp lights also burn butane gas and require no pumping. They, too, light instantly and give a tremendous amount of light.

Cots have light-weight aluminum frames and can be set up by a child. Sleeping bags are light, comfortable, and come in all colors, including yellow, pale pink, and orchid. Freeze-dried foods, instant mixes, aluminum foil, and easy to clean teflon lined utensils make cooking a snap.

Camp ice boxes are light, strong, and hold ice for days. They make keeping things like milk and crisp lettuce easy, and they double as a comfortable seat. These ice boxes have come a long way from the old wooden apple box with a block of ice wrapped in newspapers and tow sacks - and the ice all melted the first night anyway.

With today's transportation, wherever you camp, you're just a hop-skip and a jump from a roadside drive-in that sells just about everything that a camper needs. Five million new campers this year? I'm surprised that there are not three times that many.

Construction Hits \$500,000

Construction in Rockport in 1974 amounted to nearly \$500,000.

City records show 56 residential permits issued for \$407,055. Another four commercial permits amounted to \$66,500.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q - I want to pay two installments of federal taxes at the same time - the balance due on my 1974 tax and the first installment of my 1975 Declaration of Estimated Tax. Is it alright to pay these amounts with one check?

A - If you pay two federal taxes at the same time, you should write separate checks or money orders. Write your social security number on the checks or money orders. Business taxpayers should use their employer identification numbers.

Q - I work full time, and make a little spending money from doing hairdressing at home. Do I have to pay self-employment tax on the income from hairdressing?

A - You must file an income tax return and pay self-employment tax if you have net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more. This is true even if you are 65 or over and are receiving social security benefits. Also, you may be required to pay social security tax. If you had wages in 1974 that were subject to social security tax, you must subtract them from \$13,200, the 1974 social security tax wage base to determine the maximum amount subject to self-employment tax. If your wages subject to social security tax are at

least \$13,200, none of the net earnings from self-employment as a hairdresser is subject to this tax. In 1975, the amount of wages subject to social security tax will increase from \$13,200 to \$14,100, but the rate for computing the tax will stay the same at 7.9 percent.

Q - How can I get an extension of time to file if I can't file my tax return by April 15?

A - You may receive an automatic two-month extension of time to file your tax return by filing out in duplicate Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return. In filling out Form 4868, you must make a tentative tax estimate for the year. The original of the application must be filed, on or before April 15, with the Internal Revenue Service Center for your area. You must also make full payment of any tax due

with the application. The duplicate Form 4868 should be attached to the completed tax return when it is filed as evidence of the extension. You may not use short Form 1040A or elect to have the IRS compute your tax if you apply for an extension of time to file.

Q - When am I supposed to file and pay my estimated tax for 1975?

A - Your declaration of estimated tax for the calendar year 1975 must be filed on or before April 15, 1975, the same date your income tax return for 1974 is due. Use Form 1040-ES, Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals. You may pay the estimated tax in four equal installments if you do not wish to pay the full amount when you file your declaration. The dates for paying the installments are April 15, June 16 and September 15 in 1975, and January 15, 1976.

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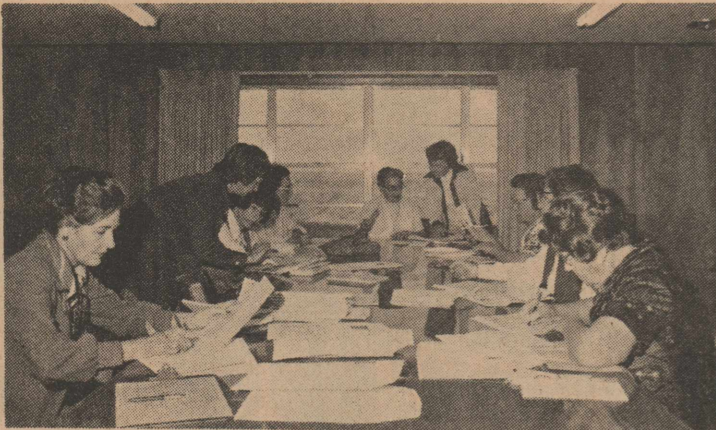

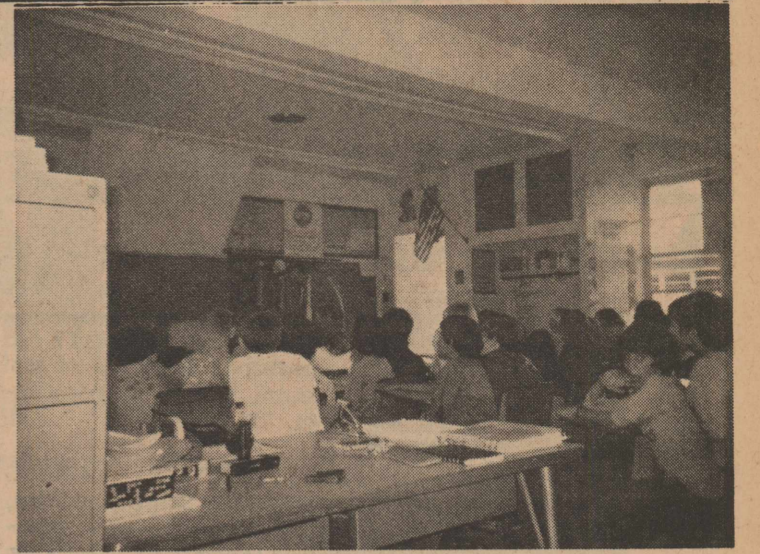

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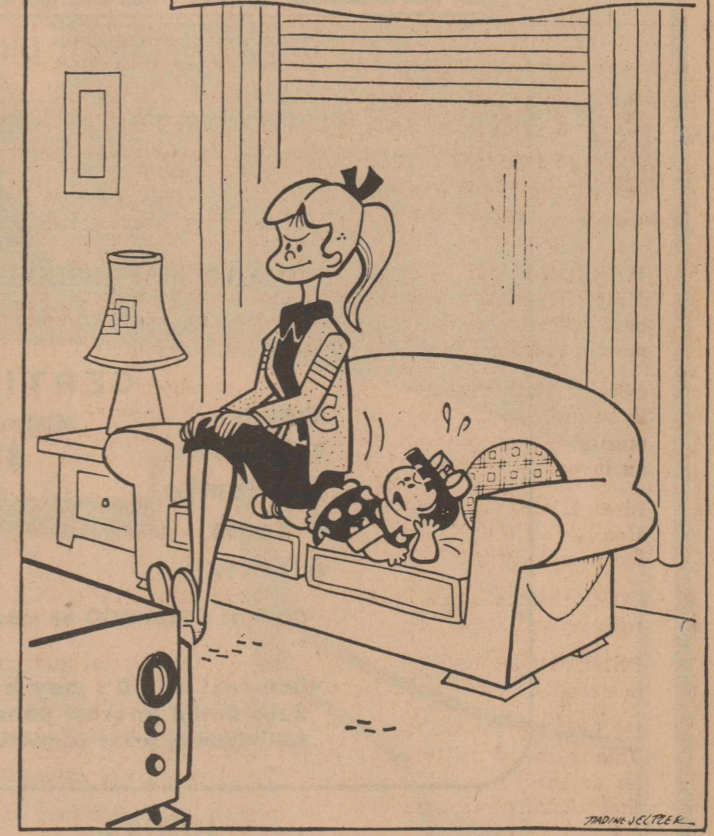
Do you know why the first big drops of a thundershower are usually so widely scattered? Have you ever noticed this at the beginning of a thundershower?

The first drops of a thundershower, falling from the summer cumulonimbus, must fall through a very strong updraft, which is always present in the leading edge of the thunderstorm. Most of the drops are caught up in this updraft and carried far aloft.

The bigger, heavier raindrops fall through the rising wind currents, but only the largest are heavy enough to maintain their downward fall against the wind. Therefore, standing on the ground, or pavement, you will notice that the first big drops are widely scattered and probably the largest raindrops which will fall during the thunderstorm.

Many of the others are carried upward to the freezing level and frozen into hail. Only occasionally does this hail survive in frozen form until it strikes the ground.

WIETING'S CAPITOL REPORT

This Week in Austin:

As always, school finance is of great importance to everyone. The House Committee on Public Education, with the Senate Education Committee, began hearings on the issue of public school finance on Wednesday, March 5th. There are four bills relating to school finance. The two most important bills are House Bill 1083, the Governor's bill, and House Bill 946 by Representative Dan Kubiak.

The first and most obvious difference between the Governor's plan and the plan proposed by Rep. Kubiak is the cost. The Governor's plan will call for an increased biennium expenditure of 590 million dollars while Rep. Kubiak's proposals will cost over an additional 1.2 billion dollars.

The great difference between the two plans is due largely to proposed salary increases for teachers. Both agreed raises are needed, but vary on how much of a raise. Under the Governor's plan, starting salaries would be increased from 6600 dollars to 7500 a year. The Kubiak plan calls for a starting salary of 8400 dollars a year.

Both bills call for more funds to be pumped into poor districts. This is one point of agreement. Both of the bills will supply more state aid to equalize the quality of education in Texas. Both have complex formulas based on density and size of the districts to determine funding for transportation. It is anticipated that either plan will bring an increase of around 100% in funds for transportation.

The Kubiak bill will increase the amount of state support to public education from 52 per cent to 80 per cent of total costs. This differs greatly from the Governor's plan in which the local districts will pay two thirds of the increased costs. Under the Kubiak plan, ad valorem tax rates would be lowered from \$1.50 per hundred dollars to \$.75. Property would be evaluated according to full market value rather than by the current economic index.

The Governor's plan would financially reward school districts for having a staff that is above average in advanced degrees, as does the Kubiak bill. However, Kubiak calls for shortening the school year from 180 to 171 days to allow teachers time to finish summer classes.

If passed, the Kubiak bill would lower the number of students per teacher. The bill would establish lower teacher/pupil groups. Under the plan, kindergarten through the fourth grade would have a teacher/pupil rate of twenty students per teacher. Fifth grade through twelfth would have a ratio of twenty four pupils per teacher. Overlapping or switching over between groups by teachers would be prohibited. The bill also stipulates that only full time teachers may teach, but teaching aides and central staff are provided. Kubiak's bill increases maintenance and operations funding from thirty dollars to one hundred and thirty dollars per student.

As always, Rep. Wieting is interested in how the people of his district feel on this subject. Anyone having an opinion on this crucial subject are encouraged to write, call or come to Austin and discuss this matter with Rep. Wieting.

Turkey Hunt In Kerr Area

Austin -- A sure sign that winter is almost over is the public drawing for spring turkey hunting on the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Kerr Wildlife Management Area.

This year's hunt is scheduled for April 26 - May 4 and 100 permits will be issued in a public drawing to be held at 10 a.m. March 27 at the department's offices in the John H. Reagan Building in Austin.

Deadline for receiving applications at Austin is 5 p.m. March 24.

Permits will be issued for a two-day hunt and one turkey gobbler limit.

To be eligible to participate in a state-sponsored hunt, an applicant must be 12 years of age or older. Those under 17 years of age must be accompanied by someone at least 21 years of age or older.

An adult may sponsor only one hunter under the age of 17. A \$5 fee will be charged for each permit issued.

The Kerr Wildlife Management Area is approximately 28 miles west of Kerrville in Kerr County on the north fork of the Guadalupe River and contains 6,493 acres.
