TOKYO, Aug. 23.—The position of the trans-Pacific dirigible Graf Zeppelin at 12:45 p. m. today, Tokyo time (10:45 p. m. Friday, eastern Standard Time) was given in a message from the airship intercepted by the Ochikishi wireless station at latitude 40 degrees north, longitude 163 degrees east. The dirigible was flying at an altitude of 350 meters (slightly over 1,100 feet). The expedition given was approximately 1,300 miles east of Kagura naval station. The elapsed time of 21 hours and 32 minutes indicated an average speed of 65 miles an hour.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—(AP) The radio marine corporation station at Marshall, Cal., established direct two-day radio communication with the dirigible Graf Zeppelin at 9:30 o'clock (Pacific Standard time, equal to 12:30 a. m. Saturday eastern Standard time, 2:30 p. m. Saturday, Tokyo time) tonight.

Position Given.
Messages from the airship gave her position at 2:40 Greenwich meridian time (7 p. m. eastern Standard time) as latitude 39 degrees 20 minutes north and longitude 161 degrees 25 minutes east, and her position at 04:00 G. M. T.

State's Tax Rate Set At 68 Cents

Four Cent Increase Made Over Levy Of Last Year By Automatic Tax Board; School Rate Is 31 Cents

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—The state tax rate today was fixed at 68 cents when the automatic tax board set the school tax at 31 cents after previously having decided to levy a 30 cent ad valorem tax for general fund purposes and a seven cent confederate pension tax.

The new rate is four cents higher than that which has been in effect during the past year.

During the past year the rate was divided as follows: Ad valorem 22 cents; pensions 7 cents; and schools 35 cents.

Contempt Charged Mayor Waddy Tate

DALLAS, Aug. 23.—Mayor J. Waddy Tate was ordered tonight to show cause why he should not be held in contempt of court, as a result of the city's battle to install a pound system to enforce traffic and parking laws.

Chief of Police Claude Trammell, police Commissioner W. C. Graves, and assistant chief of police and the poundmaster also were cited.

The officials are alleged to have obstructed a district court process when J. E. Philpot, the poundmaster, refused to turn over to deputy sheriff an automobile belonging to K. Irwin, an attorney, under a writ of sequestration.

Towed To Pound.
Irwin's car had been towed to the pound for an alleged parking violation. In obtaining the writ of sequestration he alleged that his property had been confiscated without a legal execution of court order and that the policeman in such a case constitutes himself a judge and jury.

The mayor and other officials are ordered to appear before district Judge Claude McCallum tomorrow morning for a hearing.

Woman Is Robbed And Beaten When She Accepts Ride

Beaumont Carpenter's Wife Left Semi-Conscious On Side Of Road After Her Purse And \$40 are Taken

BEAUMONT, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Sadie Kiniment, 35, wife of a Beaumont carpenter, was beaten in a semi-conscious state, robbed of \$40 and thrown from her automobile five miles west of here today after she had accepted a ride from two men in an automobile.

Mrs. Kiniment, who came here about three months ago with her husband, had been to a library. On her way home, she told hospital attendants, she stopped at a point about five miles from Beaumont.

Knocked Unconscious.
She said she refused to give the men her purse, whereupon they struck her. She said she remembered nothing more until regaining her senses in the hospital.

Examination showed Mrs. Kiniment received a broken jaw bone and severe cuts and bruises about the head and face.

Two ambulance companies received calls. Police later traced the calls to a garage near the scene of the attack.

Accident Victim Slightly Better

A drop in the temperature last night of Alvin P. Ridinger, 20-year-old Texas Tech student, critically injured last Sunday night in a motorcycle accident, strengthened hopes of hospital attaches for his recovery. He was said to be resting well and his general condition one of encouragement.

Though his strength has been sapped to great extent by the strain of fever in the last 48 hours, attendants declare that he is displaying phenomenal courage.

Ridinger's skull was crushed when he plunged into a curb in the 1900 block on 19th street after his motorcycle had struck Joe Lowmire, 23, whose leg was broken in three places.

OFFICERS JAILED

Tulsa Pair Charged With Dry Killing

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Following their arraignment on a charge of killing Charles Jenkins in an attempt to arrest him on a liquor law warrant, G. Alfred Demoss, deputy sheriff of Pryor, Okla., were rushed to the Tulsa county jail here today for safe keeping.

The officers believed not guilty and were held without bail.

Judge A. E. Robertson, of Cherokee county, before whom the men were arraigned at Tahlequah, Okla., ordered the transfer in the belief, he said, that intense feeling had arisen at Tahlequah against the men.

Spokane Is Swept By Raging Blaze

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 23.—(AP)—A great conflagration which started in the J. P. McCallum Lumber company yard early tonight, at 9 o'clock had destroyed the yard, a sanatorium, five dwelling houses, an apartment building and was sweeping in the Cascade Laundry company plant. Only five pieces of fire fighting equipment were left in the city for emergency, the rest being massed in an apparently futile effort to check the spread.

Pilot Burns Fatally And Four Passengers Receive Injuries As Planes Hit

Now We Know Where To Put Old Razor Blades

AMARILLO, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Bozo, a chocolate colored human being of uncertain nationality, ate 150 razor blades and 24 electric light globes at a carnival here yesterday and as a result Gene Howe, editor of The News-Globe and known as Erasmus Tack, was out \$200.

"Tack," in his personal column, had criticized the management of the show for permitting what he hinted was a fake attraction. Three newsboys, however, who had seen the performance came to Howe and insisted Bozo actually ate the blades. The editor then offered Bozo \$200 if he actually performed the stunt. In the presence of the boys and a number of others, Bozo started to work on his task, chewing the steel and glass into bits before swallowing them.

An x-ray photo today showed that Bozo ate the blades and globes, and Bozo and his manager were enriched by \$200 from "Tack's" pocketbook.

Four Jump To Safety As Two Ships Burn In Collision

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 23.—One pilot was burned to death and another pilot and four passengers narrowly escaped death late today when two airplanes collided at Metairie airport and were destroyed by fire.

Both ships were on the ground. Elliott D. Coleman, Jr., of Waterproof, La., was killed and Dan E. Thomas, 26, mail plane pilot, received lacerations on the head. The latter, and four passengers, jumped to safety as their plane burst into flames.

The mail plane was taking down the runway preparatory to taking off. Witnesses said Coleman taxied his plane across the runway directly in the path of the mail plane. The crash was followed immediately by fire.

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Dallas Woman Is Robbed Near Roby

SNYDER, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Lena Allen, of Dallas, was held up and robbed near Roby this afternoon by two men while she was enroute to her home after a visit in this city and at Gal.

A description given by Mrs. Allen stated both men were wearing overalls, were badly in need of shaves and were driving an old car, with the license plates turned upside down.

Following the hold-up the car turned west.

A report of the affair was made shortly after and the sheriff of Brownfield took up their trail through more than an hour behind.

Reports Of Soviet Invasion Denied In Moscow

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 23.—China continued today intensive preparations for any eventuality in Manchuria, while official denial was made in Moscow of any Soviet invasion of that territory.

The foreign relations committee of the nationalist government met in Nanking and in secret session drew up proposals for defense which were submitted to the state council. A Japanese dispatch from Nanking said \$2,000,000, Mexican, had been placed at the disposal of Marshal Chang Hsueh Liang for purchase of war materials and other military costs by the central government. This marked the first time credit had been extended the Manchurian government by the Nationalist government.

Despite the Russian denial that its troops had crossed the Manchurian border, Chinese unofficial sources maintained that the Russians still held Tungning, near the eastern border, over which a severe battle was reported to have been waged several days ago.

An Associated Press dispatch from Peking indicated Soviet border raids both east and west probably had as their purpose stoppage of coal supplies for the Chinese Eastern railway.

FOREST FIRE SPREADS

Several Houses Destroyed In Montana Woods

KALISPELL, Mont., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Most of the buildings at Aggar, just north of Belton, and several houses at Coram and Lake Five, a few miles southwest of Belton, were destroyed this afternoon by flames of the Half Moon forest fire, reports received at the Great Northern station here said. No loss of life was reported.

The 75,000 acre blaze which previously had been threatening Belton and rushed northward to mountain tops along the east side of Lake McDonald and near Lewis Hotel in Glacier National Park.

The "sick son" now is at work following an ultimatum delivered him—"If you can't find a job then I'll put you to work." The judge has a hand.

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 23.—(AP)—John Doyle Turner, 19, Tulsa, was shot and killed in a busy street intersection here late today by Jack Bowlin, driver of a gasoline truck, who told the police Turner attempted to rob him yesterday.

Bowlin followed Turner to a gasoline filling station at which the shooting occurred. Two bullets struck Turner as he fled with his hands in the air, on seeing Bowlin the police said, when he refused.

Bowlin said Turner entered a filling station where Bowlin was employed yesterday and, brandishing a pistol, ordered Bowlin to hand him the filling station money. Turner fled, Bowlin said, when he refused.

NINE JEWS KILLED

110 Injured In Outbreak In Jerusalem

Flames Raze New Home On Highway North Of Lubbock

Before residents of the home knew that anything was wrong and while they were working in another part of the house, fire enveloped the rear section and rapidly spread to destroy the new home of W. C. Beatty, living 10 miles north of this city on the west Plainview highway, last night about 8 o'clock.

Nothing was saved though approximately 75 persons were on hand, all of them organizing a bucket brigade. Mr. Beatty carried no insurance on the building.

The home had just been completed, a seven room affair, and painting was started yesterday. Mr. Beatty had been working in the northeast room and had gone to the bathroom. When he returned the whole interior was afire and making good headway. It was thought the flames started from lined rags.

Hague Conference Deadlock Appears

Four War-Time Allies Are In Fear Of Crisis After Philip Snowden Rejects New Four-Power Offer

(By Associated Press)
THE HAGUE, Aug. 23.—Great Britain and its four war-time allies, France, Italy, Belgium and Japan, faced each other at the Hague reparations conference tonight in their second serious deadlock after Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, rejected the new four-power offer to make up part of England's claims for additional payments in the Young plan.

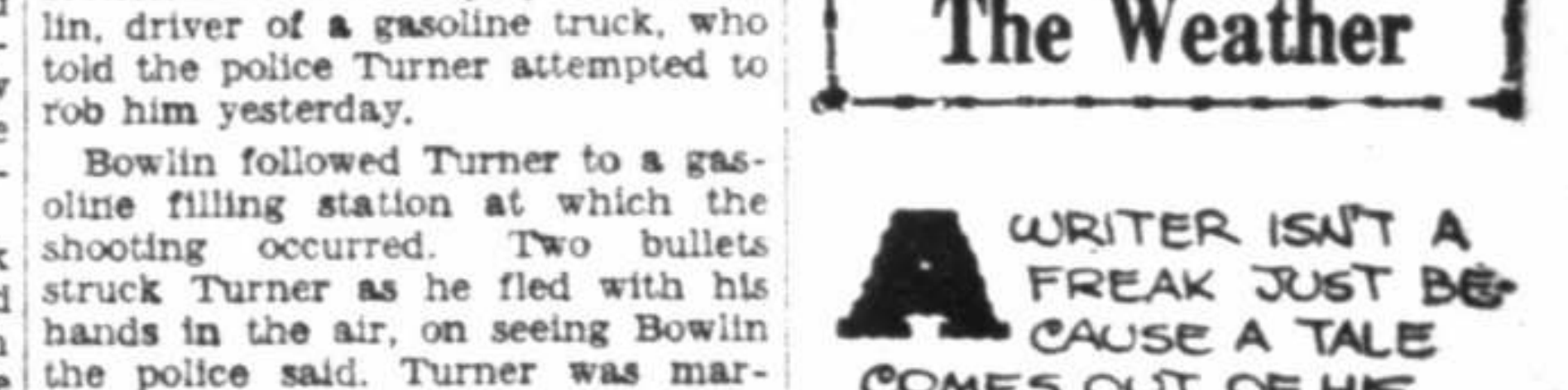
Snowden decided, after considering verbal proposals by Premier Jaspard of Belgium last night and another detailed offer this morning, that the offers represented much less than the 75 per cent of the British claims they purported to satisfy.

Hopes Dashed.
Hopes that the present conference might finally agree on adoption of the Young plan were dashed.

The plenary session fixed for tomorrow has been postponed to Monday.

Lynn County Will Have Registered Imported Jerseys

Impetus Given To Rapidly Growing Dairy Industry In Section; Chamber Of Commerce Aids Project

(Special To The Avalanche)
TAMOKA, Aug. 23.—Lynn county is to have a number of newly imported registered Jersey cows and bulls to give impetus to the rapidly growing dairy industry of this section, through the cooperation of C. C. Williams of the Tamoka chamber of commerce, and R. E. Shaver, county agent.

Much excellent stock has been imported to this county this year and last, but this is the first organized effort that has been made to secure desirable grade stock in large quantities. These two local men will take orders from farmers for the class of bulls and cows they desire and make the purchases, shipping them here in carload lots at a large saving to the farmers. The animals will be brought about November 1st.

Bull Circles Formed
Several bull circles are also being formed in the county.

Farmers here are manifesting much interest in the raising of more and better dairy stock. The three produce houses here buying cream report that business has more than doubled in the past twelve months. Plans are being made for the establishment of a milk cooling station at this place from which milk routes will be operated to all parts of the county, as a feeder to the new \$200,000 powdered milk plant to be erected soon at Lamesa.

Reparations Fate Is Determined By Public Sentiment

Ambassador Charles Dawes Says Attitude Of Nations Involved Predominate In Reaching Agreement

ELGIN, Scotland, Aug. 23. (AP)—Ultimate fate of the naval disarmament negotiations rests in the public sentiment of the countries concerned, said Ambassador Charles G. Dawes, today in proposing a vote of thanks to the lord provost here at a ceremony in which the freedom of the city was presented to Premier MacDonald.

"It should be remembered that naval negotiations may have favorably advanced although they may not have reached necessarily the proper stage for useful discussion in detail by the press," the American ambassador declared.

Most Simplify
The arbitrators of the ultimate fate of this naval effort will be the respective public sentiments of the naval powers, and time must be taken to reduce them to the simplest terms before any publication of the problems involved, so that the average man can understand better what it is all about.

Texas A. And M. Problems Shown Governor Moody

State Institution Head And Other Officials In Conference With Chief Executive Over Slashes

AUSTIN, Aug. 23. (AP)—Problems faced by A. and M. college as a result of slashes made in the educational bill by Governor Moody were presented today to the governor by Dr. T. O. Walton, president of the board of directors and members of the executive committee.

No request for aid through a deficiency appropriation was made. Law said after the conference.

Made No Request
"We made no definite requests merely discussing the situation," he said. "We found the governor sympathetic with our problems, and he assured us he desired to cooperate fully. The conference resulted in a clearer understanding on the governor's part of the situation."

A statement was presented the chief executive showing a decrease in salaries of \$50,125 for each year of the next biennium as compared with the closing fiscal year, a cut of \$5,400 for departmental maintenance and \$8,750 less for the operation of miscellaneous departments.

In the face of reduced appropriations an increase in enrollment of 750 students is anticipated this year. Dr. Walton advised the governor.

This final effort to finish it has lasted nearly four and a half years. The foundation had been laid twenty years before.

The Second Temple
Zerubbabel's temple was sixty cubits broad and sixty cubits high. Solomon's temple was only twenty cubits broad and thirty cubits high. Solomon collected for his temple an immense sum; Zerubbabel's means were slight in comparison. This second temple lasted a little more than five centuries and was followed by the more splendid temple erected by Herod the Great, begun B. C. 19. This was the temple of Christ's birth. It was destroyed by the Romans in A. D. 70. The present building is a Moslem church called "The Dome of Rock" or "The Mosque of Omar."

"The Pearl of Pearls," Ps. 84:1-12.
"This sacred ode has a mild radiance about it, entitling it to be called the Pearl of Pearls. If the twenty-third be the most popular, the one hundred and third the most joyful, the one hundred nineteenth the most deeply experimental, the fifty-first the most plaintive, this is one of the most sweet of the Psalms of Peace."—C. H. Spurgeon.

Some have thought this was one of the Psalms that were sung at the dedication of the second temple.

The Courts of Jehovah, vs. 1, 2.

"My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of Jehovah." The temple courts, surrounding the central sanctuary. "My heart and my flesh cry out unto the living God." Soul, heart, flesh, reason and will, the emotions, all that makes up the psalmist's being—cry out—not to the temple, but to the God who dwells in the temple and gives it all its significance. A day in thy courts is better than a thousand elsewhere. I had rather hold the most menial position in God's house, than be an honored guest in the evil dwellings of the heathen.

"What This Country Needs Is A Place To Park"; So Air Pioneer Turns To Making Smallest Auto

NEW YORK, Aug. 23. — Honk!

"That's Papa, dear. He's bringing home the new car. Open the front door so he can drive in. My, I hope he doesn't drip oil on the living room rug!"

"Why, hello, Wilbur. Say, isn't it cute? What? You bought a half dozen of them today? Why, you darling! Let's see—we'll put one under the kitchen sink, one out on the back porch, another up in Aunt Elsie's room and—"

Nut stuff! No, but it's the latest nut and bolt stuff in the motor industry—a four-cylinder, 60-mile-an-hour, \$200, mail order automobile that's the thinnest ever made.

Sixty inches long and 47 inches wide, it can be parked on the back porch with the kiddie cars, or even driven into the house. But the builders are planning to sell it in weatherproof crates which themselves can be used as garages!

New in Manufacture.
This dwarf of the automotive world, designed by James V. Martin, famed airplane builder of Garden City, Long Island, looks like a vest pocket edition of other cars on the road, but actually it is a radical innovation.

The car has no chassis, no frame and no axles. Instead, the wheels are independently attached to the body of the car itself—and the floor of the body is the bottom of the car.

Neither are there any springs. The wheels are suspended much like airplane wheels and are set in aviator cord, which is made of rubber under high tension. In this way each wheel absorbs the shocks of "the road" independently of the others.

Sixty Miles An Hour.
This motor midget will step out, too. Sixty miles an hour on a smooth pavement—and up to 50 on a rough road. Fifty miles on a gallon of gasoline. Two cents a mile driving cost.

Tires will last 25,000 miles, and their running cost is only about one-eighth that of tires on standard light cars.

A four-cylinder, air-cooled motor, and bad news for garage men—there'll be little "servicing" necessary. For the car can be lubricated almost for its lifetime when it's shipped to the buyer, and the average experienced motorist should be able to give the motor most of the attention it would require, the builders claim.

"I've tried to answer the American motorist's cry for a place to park by building a car that can be parked almost anywhere," said inventor Martin. "We've made only three cars to date—each a two-passenger model that will accommodate three without too much crowding. Four-passenger models and light trucks are coming up soon."

Martin now is negotiating with Wall Street bankers to finance a manufacturing company for the car and he expects to market his automotive prodigy through a large mail order house.

Midget In Weight.
"The car weighs only 600 pounds—look at the savings on the cost of license tags," Martin pointed out. "And we haven't ignored the usual extras, either. There is comfortable, attractive upholstery, an electric starter, speedometer, ammeter—even a windshield wiper!"

"The car is less than half the size and one-third the weight of the Ford Model A, the smallest American-made car. It has a smaller wheel-base by 15 inches, too, than the British-manufactured Austin Seven which will soon be introduced to the American market."

It is easy to understand why the cars can be produced so cheaply. The various parts are extremely simple in construction, and there are less than half as many of them as the standard coupe contains. The small four-cylinder motor is air-cooled, so there is no radiator. The ordinary type of differential on the rear axle has been eliminated. The light torque shaft requires no bearings.

It's Easily Parked.
With its five-foot wheel base and reduced width, Martin's midget can park in half the space required by the next larger car.

Until now, Martin always has been of an airy turn of mind—for he's famed as the inventor of more than 40 patented devices applicable



You can drive right into the parlor in this tiny new motor car, as the upper photo shows. James V. Martin, the designer, is pictured in the inset, and below is a side view of his midget motor. Only 66 inches long, its wheelbase is less than half that of many automobiles, and although the body design retains most of the ordinary characteristics, there is plenty of room for two persons inside.

to airplanes and as the builder of the Martin bomber plane and the first light scouting plane.

Martin staged the first aviation show in this country—the Harvard-Boston Aero Meet in 1910. He organized England's first aviation school, made the first flights over London, and trained the first pilots of the Royal Naval Air Service.

When London was being terrorized by German air raids, the British Admiralty called on him to plan methods of resisting marauding enemy flyers. He was in London during 17 air attacks by Germans. As an executive in post-war relief work in Europe, working with Herbert Hoover, he won decorations from the United States and foreign governments.

Highest Authority To Sit In Hearing

TEXARKANA, Aug. 23. (AP)—The highest judicial authority short of the United States supreme court will sit in judgment on the embattled new Texas anti-cattle tick law at New Orleans, August 31. An attack on the statute gained standing in court, at least here yesterday when Federal Judge W. L. Estes granted a temporary restraining order suspending its operation, as it affects Charles M. Armstrong, a Kennedy county rancher.

The temporary writ, which restrained the Texas Livestock Sanitary commission and Kennedy county officials from interfering with shipment of the rancher's cattle, bringing criminal action against him or taking possession of property without due process of law, will be heard finally by Judge Estes and two companion jurists in New Orleans, August 31.

In his petition, Armstrong contended the regulations authorized by the act conflicted with those of the United States department of agriculture and would operate to force confinement of his cattle in spite of the fact they were tick free.

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—September travelers will spend much of August shopping for clothes. Of first importance is their choice of costume for steamer, train, automobile or airplane.

Straight Line Passes

Dr. Paul W. Horn Talks To
Graduating Class Friday
Morning In Archway Of
Administration Building

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, in addressing the graduating class of the 1929 summer session of the institution Friday morning declared that "A diploma is not the evidence of an education, but the evidence of a probable education."

The fourth summer commencement exercises were held in the archways of the Administration building and preceding the address by the president the audience sang "How Firm a Foundation." The invocation was given by Dr. Mordecai P. Ham, of Oklahoma City. Mrs. Carl E. Scoggin sang "Sunlight and Song," by Hammond.

The graduate address was given in much the form of a questionnaire. Dr. Horn stating that if the questions could be answered satisfactorily the students might be assured of an education of the right sort.

The questions were:
"Do you habitually read, write, and speak English?" "Can you tell the difference between the shades of good and better?" "That is, can you discriminate in your taste between classical music and jazz, or between a good painting and one which is not so good?" "Can you make allowances for the other fellow's difference in opinion and still retain your own?" "Do you have a general acknowledgment of important historical figures?" "Do you have a good ability to adapt yourself to the science of the present day?" "Do you read the daily papers and current literature?"

Other questions were: "Do you like a wide variety of folks and can you see good in them all?" "Do you have the faculty of making friends of all walks of life?" "Can you when necessary enjoy your own society?" "Can you put your mind on the thing that you are doing?" "Can you make yourself do the thing that ought to be done at the time that it should be done whether you want to do it or not?" "Have you a scientific spirit, and can you pass judgment?" "Have you reverence for that which is greatest and best?"

The conferring of degrees followed the talk. Mrs. Mary Dale Buckner has the distinction of being the first person to ever receive a Bachelor of Arts degree from Tech college, and was the first person to have a Master of Arts degree conferred upon her this morning.

Following the singing of the college hymn, "O College Mother, Beautiful," the benediction was given by Rev. E. E. White, of Abilene.

Roscoe Wilson, new local member of the board of directors of the college, was introduced during the program and pledged his wholehearted support to the interests of the Tech.

Overproduction In Oil Is Announced

PAMPA, Aug. 23.—A decision to shut down 35 test wells being drilled in Gray county was made today after representatives of 20 operating companies discussed overproduction.

Gray county's production has jumped from 20,000 barrels daily to more than 90,000 in three months. The operations decided that all wells now drilling should be shut down, except those which offset producers, which may be drilled to the top of the lime, but no farther. Proration was discussed, but was not considered advisable. Present storage facilities in the Panhandle will care for 17,000,000 barrels and space for an additional 2,000,000 is available. Pipe line companies can handle no more under present conditions.

SETTLING THE POINT IN GOLF

PRACTICE SWINGS

A player may take a practice swing a club length or more away from the ball without penalty. There is no penalty for the simple act of swinging the club in practice.

In practice swings, however, the player must accept the liability of a penalty if he breaks the rule by bending or breaking anything in such a way as to improve the lie of the ball.

Where the player makes a practice swing less than a club length away from the ball and grass or weeds the turf, the action is a technical violation of Rule 15 and entails a penalty of loss of the hole in match play or two strokes in stroke competition.

America's Huge New Airships To Be Bigger Than Graf Zep

AKRON, O., Aug. 23.—As the globe-circling dirigible Graf Zeppelin continues on its record-breaking flight around the world, workers at the great Goodyear Zeppelin plant here are going steadily ahead with plans for two dirigibles that will be even larger than the mighty German air liner as the great hangar now being erected for their construction nears completion.

In addition, executives of the same plant are now working on plans for two commercial dirigibles which will be even larger than the pair now under contract, which are being built for the U. S. Navy.

These commercial air ships, under plans that are now being matured, will be used in trans-oceanic passenger and mail service. It is tentatively planned to put them on a regular schedule between Los Angeles and Hawaii, and Commander Jerome C. Hunsaker, vice president of the Goodyear Zeppelin Corporation, is now in Honolulu in the interests of this proposed line, and making plans for establishing a dirigible base in the island city.

These developments, coming at the height of the Graf Zeppelin's amazing feat, indicate that America is about to assume unquestioned leadership in the lighter-than-air field of aviation.

Other Trans-Oceanic Services Being Studied
In addition to the Pacific line to Hawaii, Goodyear Zeppelin officials are known to be studying the establishment of a trans-Atlantic service with other huge air ships. The enormous Akron hangar erected for building the navy ship probably will be maintained for use as a reserve airport where a trans-oceanic Zeppelin could dock when weather conditions along the Atlantic seaboard were unfavorable.

Huge and modern as the Graf Zeppelin is, it will be outclassed by the United States naval dirigibles. The Graf Zeppelin is 766 feet long, 113 feet high and has a capacity of 3,707,970 cubic feet.

Each of the navy dirigibles will be 780 feet long, 145 feet high and will have a capacity of 6,500,000 cubic feet—nearly twice that of the German liner.

When the navy dirigibles take the air the familiar gondolas that line the hulls of all other big dirigibles to house engines and propellers will be gone. Engines will be inside the envelope; only the propellers will emerge on extended brackets. Below, living quarters will be similarly be enclosed in the envelope. Nothing will project outside the skin from stem to stern, except the control car, which must necessarily have observation windows.

Learned Lesson From Shenandoah
This represents one of the lessons taught by the wreck of the navy's Shenandoah in 1925.

The Shenandoah, caught in a cyclone over Ohio, broke in half. Parts of the ship that hung below the envelope broke off and fell, and the occupants were killed. Officers and members of the crew who were inside the envelope at the time of the disaster, however, came down safely, as the broken portions of the envelope, still containing gas, drifted slowly to the earth.

One of the most striking features of each new ship will be the presence inside of the envelope of a complete airplane hangar. Each ship will carry five scouting planes, so devised that they can be launched and taken aboard while the dirigible is in flight. The cruising range of each dirigible, incidentally, will be approximately 9000 miles without refueling.

Naturally, all of these new features will be incorporated in the commercial ships which are now merely in the blue-print stage.

Glossed-In Decks For Passengers
The commercial ships, it is reported, will carry the streamline principle even farther than the new naval dirigibles.

Their cabins, instead of being built at the bottom of the keel, will be built higher up along the sides of the unbroken skin of the envelope completely enclosing them. Glossed-in promenade decks will provide passengers with room to walk and relax and view the scenery below.

In addition, even the propellers will be inside the ships. Wind tunnels will lead to each propeller, and the ships will move through the air without a single whirling wheel being visible.

Each of these new dirigibles probably will carry about 100 passengers, spacious dining rooms, comfortable staterooms, wide lounges, roomy promenade deck will be available for travelers.

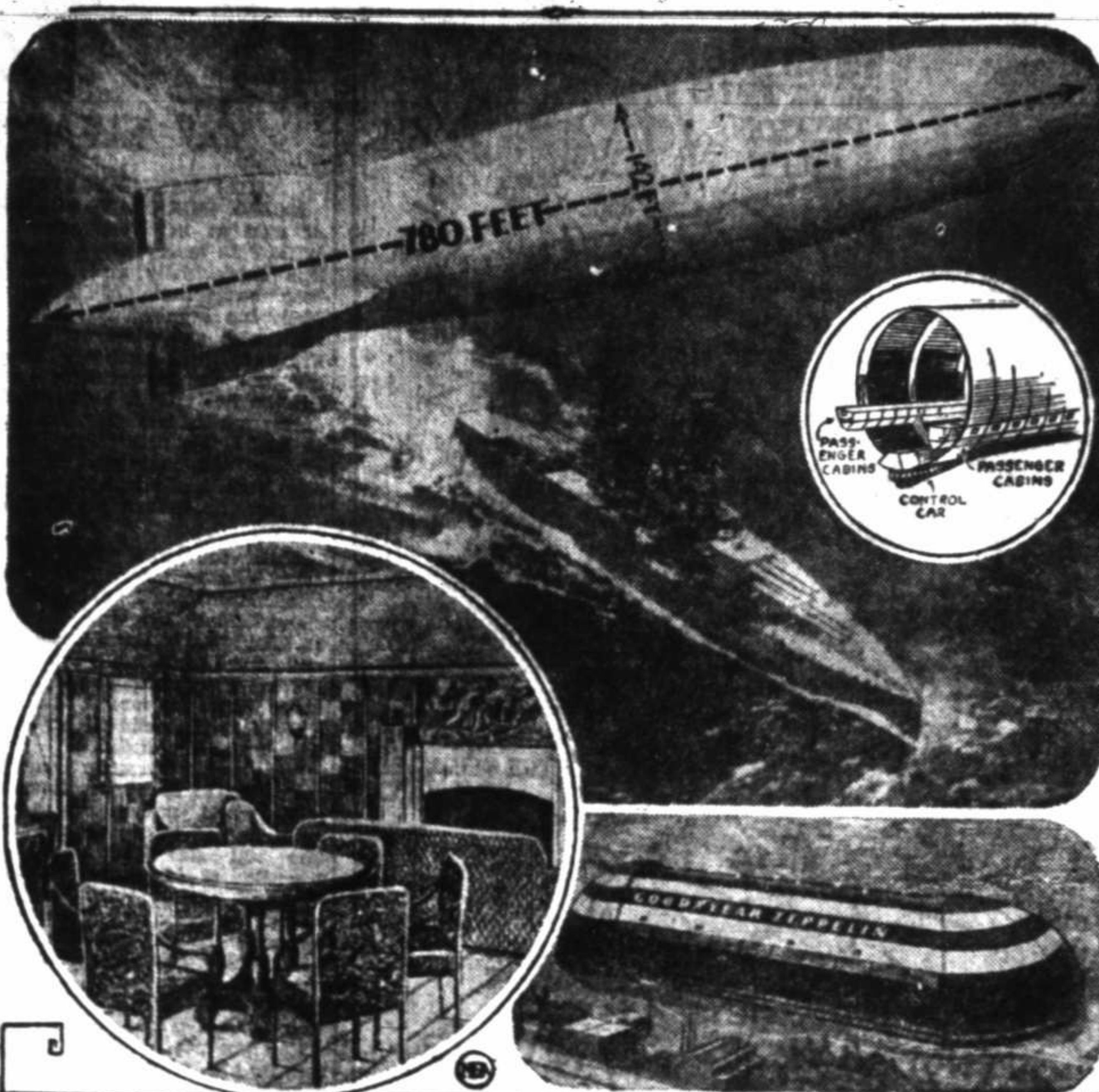

WELL, WELL! HE'S BACK AGAIN!

NOT so long ago The Morning Avalanche enjoyed an editorial chuckle regarding the entrance of Col. William F. Easterwood, Dallas aviation enthusiast, into the 1930 gubernatorial campaign.

Basing its conclusion upon past antics of the Colonel, this newspaper opined that the publicity entailed appealed to him more than his actual chances of being elected. In other words, we didn't think he had a chance, but that he thought he had but had some newspaper opportunity to hop into the middle of the newspapers front pages.

Now, it appears the Colonel has decided to withdraw from the race. The American legion in Texas needs him as its commander and he has been besieged by so many ex-soldiers that he has decided not to be governor of this state but instead to be state leader of the war veterans.
Texas' loss, then, is the legion's gain—maybe. That is, providing the Colonel is placed in the saddle as state legion commander. In the meantime The Avalanche is enjoying another chuckle as the Colonel marches militantly along on the front pages of the papers!

BACKING UP THE PRESIDENT

Senator King's declared purpose to introduce a resolution approving President Hoover's temporary suspension of cruiser construction and giving him authority to suspend the 15-cruiser plan altogether if oceanic warships have the right ring.

The nation wants a navy adequate for defense, and party with the navy of Great Britain is accepted as an essential for that definition. But it has not the slightest fear that President Hoover will endanger the defensive power of the nation or that he will do anything to subordinate its naval prestige.

National opinion is in full agreement with the president in his desire to reduce naval expense, so far as such reduction is compatible with national welfare. Ultimately we may have to build five or 15 new cruisers to maintain parity with Great Britain. President Hoover, with the nation behind him, will go ahead with whatever construction program shall prove to be necessary when the basis of such parity has been determined.

But until the coming conferences with the British premier have been held and negotiations have achieved an agreement as to this parity, no national interest will suffer if naval construction shall be suspended. The British government, for the example in making its naval plans, President Hoover promptly followed.

And the nation believed and still believes that the desire for the reduction of unnecessary naval armaments inaugurated at the Washington conference, where the first steps toward outlawing war were taken, was furthered by such action and that ultimate success for the world's great hope is more likely if reciprocal confidence, rather than envy and fear, shall continue.

CENTURIES OF HATE

Americans look upon Europe as a complete failure so far as political and economic organization is concerned. They cannot understand why European states do not unite in a "United States of Europe" and seize for themselves all the advantages that have accrued to the American states through union.

While this attitude often indicates too superficial an appreciation of the problems involved, and Europe's historical background makes union there a remote possibility, there has long been in existence a movement for a "United States of Europe."

The movement toward commercial organization and union in Europe is almost entirely motivated at the present at least by a desire to meet American competition on a plane somewhere near equality. Organized competition from the United States is forcing the present European cooperation, which in turn makes the present the most opportune time for political union of the continent has found in centuries. But not even economic necessity can erase international fears, hatreds and jealousies that were centuries in the making.

Therefore the United States has nothing to fear from the movement toward Europe is divided, and will remain divided far into the conceivable future.

POOR POLICY

The federal radio commission, according to Commissioner La Follette, is making an effort to check the use of mechanical reproductions in broadcasting programs without announcing their source. A general order has been issued requiring broadcasting stations to describe the character of all "canned music" that is put on the air, such as phonograph records, player piano rolls or what have you.

It is of course recognized that such reproductions have a legitimate use. They are necessary for the chief reliance of small stations, which do not have the money to hire expensive, special talent. But the use of "canned music" without describing it as such is condemned as a fraud upon the listening public.

Mr. La Follette points out that the chief evil resulting from this practice is that stations whose programs consist largely of mechanical reproductions have lower advertising rates, which cut into the business of high-class stations. To meet the competition, the latter may also have to substitute reproductions for original programs given by high-priced artists.

Mr. La Follette believes that "unless this situation is remedied, broadcasting programs will rapidly deteriorate in this country." It is the poorest sort of policy to attempt to deceive the radio public about the quality and source of broadcasting programs.

STEWART FINDS UTAH'S SENATORS HAVE ONLY ONE THING IN COMMON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—"Yes" and "no" are no more contradictory terms than Sen. Reed Smoot, republican, and Sen. William H. King, democrat, but both from Utah, are politically contradictory.

Not that the combination of a republican and a democratic senator from the same state is any curiosity.

Around a dozen states mix their senators to that comparatively trifling extent. An off-color senator can easily get in on a landslide. In more or less doubtful states it happens frequently. Besides party labels have ceased to mean so much recently.

A republican state often—and quite properly—elects a candidate who describes himself as a democrat because it considers him a better G. O. P. than his rival who claims to be a republican. And vice versa.

Senator Smoot's republicanism, however, would rate 100 per cent if Alexander Hamilton, himself, who took out the original basic patent on republican principles, examined him.

Alexander Hamilton had a poor opinion of the "common people's" so-called intelligence. (Sometimes I suspect he was right about it.)

His theory was that the select few, with sense enough to do a good job of governing, ought to be left to run the country—and be depended on to give as fair a break to the hot polli as they deemed them entitled to, and their consciences dictated.

So Senator Smoot's motto is—
The highest kinds of high protective tariffs—well-regulated trusts and mergers and lib-lots of prohibition to make the workmen save their money—plenty of imperialism—a good strong army and navy—and hurrah for the rights of property.

Senator King on the other hand is a democrat to warm the heart of Thomas Jefferson, who invented that political creed.

Senator King lifts up his voice for—

The rights of man first, last and all the time, and property's rights as a distinct afterthought, so long as they don't interfere with human rights—short shrift for anything that threatens free competition—a wide open door to world trade—Christian charity in international affairs, in preference to armaments—state prohibition if the individual states so decree but never on an interstate basis—Philippine independence and no interference with any of our smaller neighbors—all the altruism that the law allows and as much more as we can bootleg.

How under heaven can such a condition exist in Utah as to enable one and the same electorate to send two individuals of such widely divergent political faiths to the United States senate?

It cannot be attributed to accident, for Senator Smoot is on his fifth term, while Senator King—why, considerably Senator Smoot's junior, got a later start—is on his third. It evidently is a fixed policy on Utah's part—or a habit.

The two statesmen never forget their difference of opinion for a minute. The virtually offset one another. What one votes for his colleague invariably opposes. Utah might as well not have a senate.

Both senators, as it chances, are members of the senate finance committee—now up to its elbows in the task of framing the new tariff bill.

All through this hot summer they have been telling side by side—Senator Smoot, the committee's chairman, to turn out the highest schedule of tariff rates in world history. Senator King to pare every item down to its irreducible minimum—of course they will all be boosted in spite of him, but nobody has striven harder to keep the boosts as small as possible.

Utah is a republican state.

That, obviously, is why it continues to elect Senator Smoot—that and because he is a mighty effective republican senator.

The only apparent explanation as to Senator King is that Utah likes him.

They have only one thing in common. Both are Mormons.

Your Health

POOR VISION RETARDS EDUCATION; MAY EVEN CAUSE DELINQUENCY

This is the second of two articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein in which he discusses the cause and effect of defective vision among school children.

One of the most serious handicaps to education of the school child is defective vision.

Dr. Frank H. Rodin recently disclosed the results of study of the eyes of school children in San Francisco, pointing out that poor vision may result in mental retardation, the development of an inferiority complex and even in juvenile delinquency.

A study made by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness of school children in the United States in 1922 and 1923 showed defects of vision among them varying from 6 per cent in Tennessee to 12.4 per cent in Virginia, and averaging about 12 per cent for 3,000,000 children.

Practically all schools make arrangements for regular tests of the eyes of the children with the Snellen chart, which contains letters of various sizes which the child is asked to read at a distance of 20 feet. Young children are asked to identify symbols instead of letters.

In the study of a great many children in San Francisco schools, cases of cross-eyes, cases of cases of poor vision with crossed eyes, cases of trachoma, cases in which children had foreign substances in the eyes with infection for long periods of time. In the San Francisco schools, 123 per cent of the children had defective vision. Many children were using eye-glasses which were not in any sense of the word suitable to the conditions of their eyes.

It is important that any condition of the eye resulting in defective vision be given prompt attention and that children with very seriously defective vision be put in special classes which will educate them and at the same time save as much of their eyesight as is possible.

WASHINGTON BURNED

On the evening of August 14, 1914, British troops entered Washington and burned the United States capitol, department buildings and White House. The vandalism was made possible by the ridiculous preparedness for defense of the administration in Washington.

Landing of 4,000 British troops under General Ross at Benedict, Maryland, created a panic in the nation's capitol.

Requisitions for militia were hastily sent to neighboring states and all the troops in the vicinity were mustered out. The Americans selected Bladensburg as the place to meet the enemy, and toward this spot there flowed an absurd array of clerks, secretaries, cabinet officers, the president himself, militia, the regulars and 400 sailors.

It was the presence of these fighting sailors alone that made the conflict worthy of the name of a battle. Undelayed by the flight of their friends the sailors made a firm resistance until the British gave in their rear and they were compelled to give up the struggle.

The British marched directly from Bladensburg to Washington burned the federal buildings and left soon after, completing their campaign in less than a week.

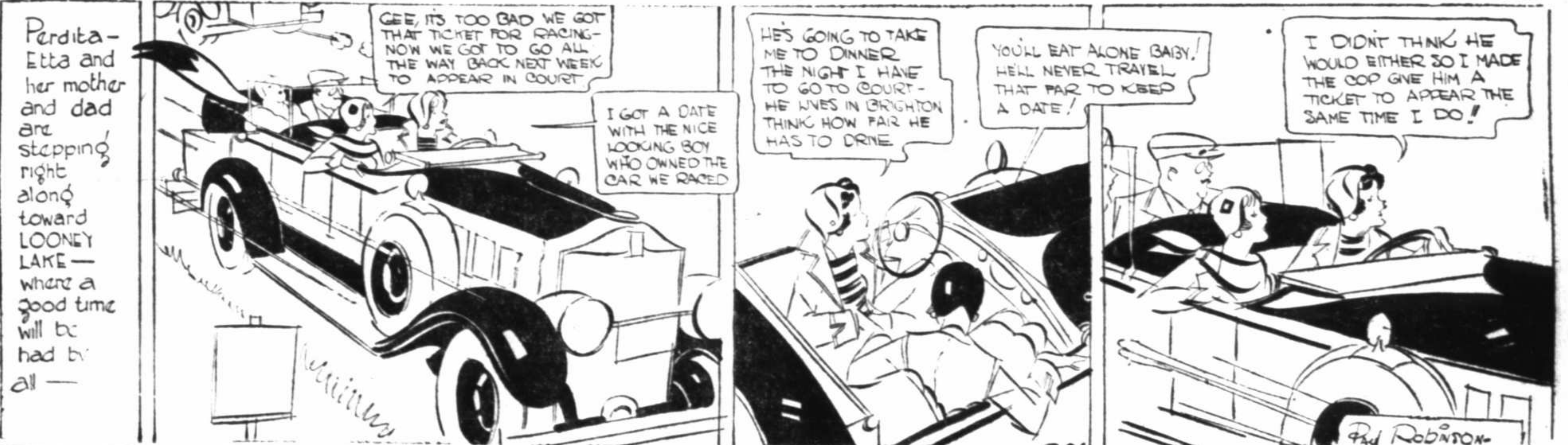

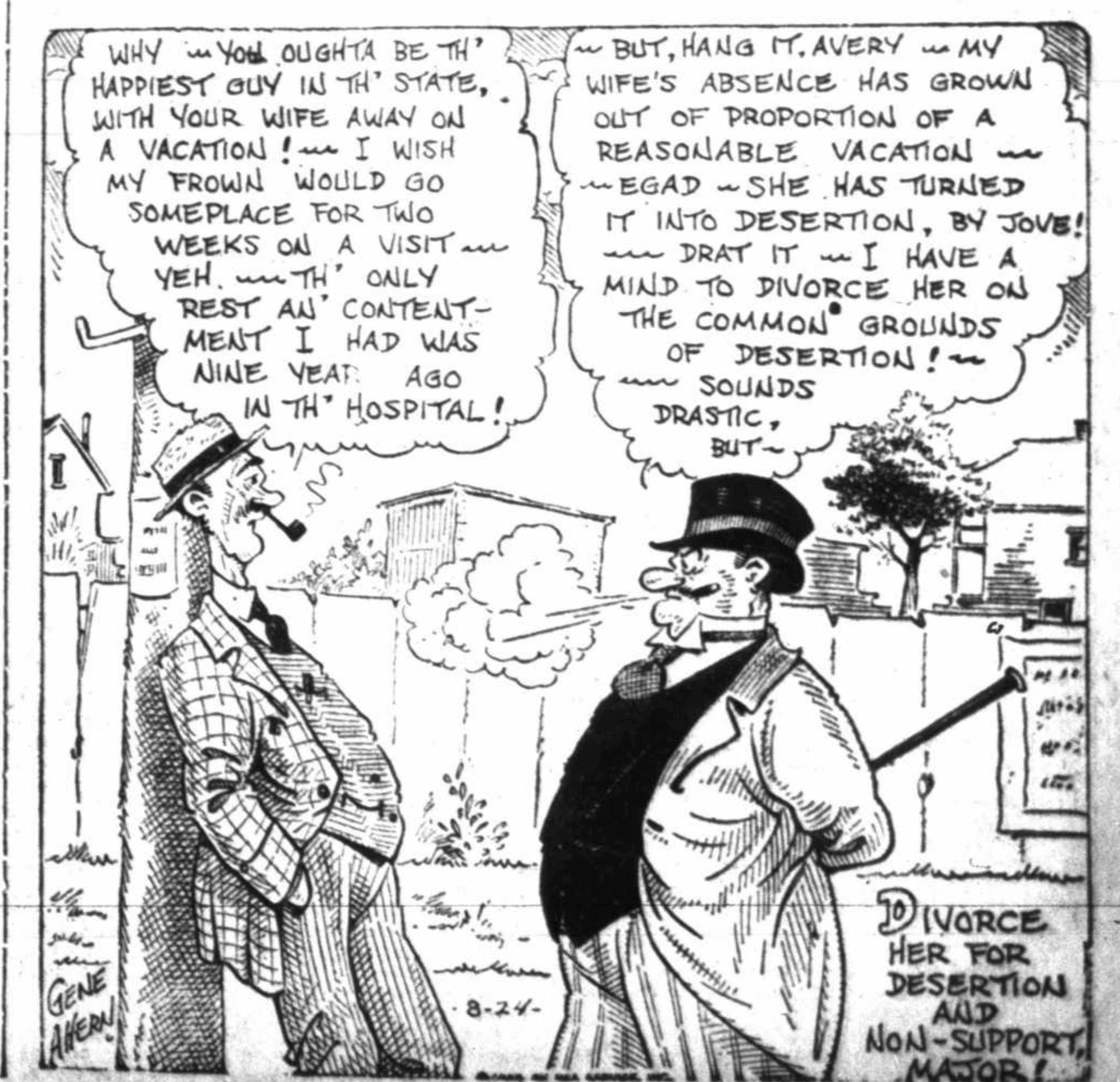

This genius for success must be just an old family custom.

Unlike traditional playboy sons of the rich, the sons of many of today's leaders in industry, finance and invention are following in the footsteps of their illustrious fathers.

Ability for generalship of vast enterprises seems to have been visited upon the sons and the famous names of Rockefeller, Ford, Edison, Firestone, Inoué, Baker, Cudahy, Wrigley and Morgan at least as the forceful captains of "big business."

Labored under the handicap of being the son of a great man, Edward Ford is upsetting tradition by becoming something of an industrial wizard himself.

At 35 he is the able president of the Ford Motor company, with which his renowned father put America on wheels. The younger Ford is now completing a huge European organization to compete with other manufacturers in the foreign field. He is destined to succeed his father as czar of the

wide-flung Ford interests ranging from rubber plantations to coal mines and airplanes.

Young Firestone succeeds. The phenomenal success of 31-year-old Harvey S. Firestone, Jr., in the rubber industry in the last four years rivals his father's record of accomplishments.

Young Firestone is credited, in a large measure, with breaking the British "rubber trust" by his handling of the father's vast projects in Liberia.

As president of the Firestone Plantations Company, the youthful executive has been the personal cause of rubber concessions in Liberia of 1,000,000 acres representing an investment of \$100,000,000.

When he took over the Liberia project in 1926 he accepted the responsibility of building harbors, establishing steamship lines, laying roads and modernizing a nation of natives with a population of 3,000,000 scattered over an area the size of Ohio. Another son, Russell Firestone, is also succeeding.

John D. Rockefeller Jr. is a fi-

The House of Morgan and big financial deals have been synonymous for years and now there is another Morgan on Wall street. He is Junius Spencer Morgan, son of John Pierpont Morgan. The younger Morgan is holding his own among the family of financial giants who have preceded him, and already has been credited with several large ventures.

George F. Baker, Jr. has a rich daddy, who, at 88, is still active in Wall street. But he has cut a wide swath of his own in the field of American business. In his 20's he became a major officer in the First National Bank of New York City. He headed the American Red Cross commission to Italy during the World War. He is 51 years old.

Wrigley Succeeds Dad. Philip K. Wrigley, son of the chewing gum magnate, is 34. Had he desired he could have been a gay spendthrift. But at 20 he got his chance when a new factory opened in Sydney, Australia, and decided that was the place for him.

About four years ago, the elder Wrigley stepped out of the president's chair and young Wrigley took his place at head of the \$100,000,000 business.

Thomas A. Edison is known throughout the world as the inventor of the electric light, the phonograph and other things, but it is his 39-year-old son, Charles Edison, who is the business man at the head of the various Edison enterprises. He succeeded his dad some time ago as president of the Edison Industries and is somewhat of an inventor himself.

Edison's three other sons also are winning names for themselves in the scientific world. Theodore Edison invented a powerful war weapon when he was 21. William L. Edison is widely known for his radio ex-

periments and other inventions, and Thomas A. Edison, Jr., has exceptional talents in music, sculpture and painting.

Samuel Insull, Jr., son of the public utilities magnate, is an officer in many of his father's companies and is well on the way to becoming a powerful figure.

At 44, Edward A. Cudahy, Jr., heads the Cudahy Packing company. He started at the bottom at 19 and rose from the ranks to achieve a brilliant success by his forceful management.

And so it seems that, far from being spendthrift "play-boys," these sons of the rich are setting examples that might well be followed by those young men less fortunate in heritage.

COULD MAKE \$30,000

District Attorney Tells Of Delinquent Tax Fees

HOUSTON, Aug. 23. (AP)—O'Brien Stevens, Harris county district attorney, told the legislative fee investigators today he could make from \$20,000 to \$30,000 annually by prosecuting 80 or 90 per cent of delinquent tax suits filed. He said his average annual income was between \$12,000 and \$15,000.
