Bike-hike-jogging path meeting topic

The Aransas County Commissioners agreed Monday to meet with the Town of Fulton and the Aransas County Navigation District on Friday to discuss the possibility of a coordinated group effort in planning the bicycle-hiking-jogging path on Fulton Beach Road.

Fulton plans to apply for a Texas Parks & Wildlife Department grant to fund the

project. The ACND has expressed interest in fixing up the beach and park areas around Fulton Harbor. Ken Pagans, an agent with the Texas A&M Marine Advisory Service has advised both Fulton and the ACND that their chances of obtaining a TP&WD grant are substantially better if they coordinate their efforts, and bring in the county if possible. Fulton Alderwoman Pat Loflin and ACND

commissioners Hillis Dominguez and Hal McKnight were present at Monday's commissioners court meeting and requested the Friday meeting. Fulton will need county cooperation to build the path on the county right-of-way.

The meeting will begin at 1:15 p.m. Friday in the Commissioners Courtroom of the Aransas County Courthouse.

Juanita Wagley approached the court with a request to close a portion of Egret St. in West Terrace. Wagley was representing Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Drake, who want to return their lots to acreage. Wagley presented photographs and a plat of the area and told the court that she and the Drakes would be the only property owners affected if the road were closed.

Aransas County Judge D. Wendell told Wagley that the legal procedure must be followed where a petition requesting the road closing signed by eight freeholders, preferably from the immediate area, be presented to the court. A public hearing will then take place where the court will hear comments from anyone in support of or opposed to the closing of the road.

When and if the road is closed, said Wendell, the Drakes can then request that the land be replatted and returned to acreage.

Wendell also read a letter from Naismith Engineers, who the county has hired to study the road situation in the Bahia Bay subdivision and make recommendations as to how those roads can be brought up to standards acceptable to the county.

The letter said that Naismith had examined areas of pavement and base failure on the streets deemed unacceptable by the county, Land's End and Estes Dr. The consultant reported that the areas of damp or very damp sand had been discovered eight inches below the surface in spite of the

Improvements ordered in Holiday Beach water system

HOLIDAY BEACH — Ernest H. Baumgart, owner of the private water system serving Holiday Beach, has been given 90 days to improve the system and has been ordered to make refunds to all customers overcharged on new tap connections.

Those orders, and others, are mandated in a Public Utility Commission examiners report delivered this week to Baumgart and to Kirby Roberts, local attorney representing several Holiday Beach residents. The report is based on findings in

a March 16 hearing before the PUC in Austin.

Dated May 5, the report gives Baumgart 90 days from that time to make a series of improvements to his system that were recommended last July by Robert Matthews, staff engineer for the PUC.

The examiners report also requires Baumgart to make refunds to approximately 29 customers who were charged a tap connection fee of \$175 instead of the \$125 approved by the PUC.

In the report, Director of Hearings Carolyn E. Shellman states, "While the examiner does not find a tap fee of \$175 to be unreasonable, because the fee was increased without prior Commission (PUC) approval, its implementation was unauthorized."

Baumgart has also been ordered to charge the approved (tariffed) rate to metered customers rather than the \$8.75 he has been charging all customers since 1979. Baumgart received approval from the PUC in 1979 to charge a minimum \$10 per month to customers on water meters but that rate was never put into effect. Baumgart instead charged all customers the \$8.75 rate approved for those who were not metered.

The examiners report commented, "By charging the improper rates Baumgart has effectually assured that no money would be available to complete the meter installation and/or to make system improvements." The examiners report also notes that an unauthorized 10 percent late payment penalty being charged by Baumgart "should be ceased immediately."

Improvements which Baumgart has been ordered to make within 90 days of the May 5 report date include the following:

--At least twice daily, operation of the

system chlorinator should be observed, "Proper operation," Matthews said in his July 6, 1982 recommendation, "includes performing chlorine residual tests at the booster pump station and at two usage points on each side of Hwy. 35."

--Sufficient additional ground storage capacity must be provided "to make use of the system's current water wells for the maximum portions of each day."

--A block by block survey must be made of the system for leaks, meters must be installed at all water use points and a record must be maintained of "unaccounted-for water."

--The channel crossing main must be replaced "as soon as possible."

--Baumgart should "consider obtaining facilities" for temporary ground or pressure storage on both sides of the valved-off channel crossing main.

--An engineering study must be performed and a detailed plan for system improvements developed.

Baumgart at the March 16 hearing testified he believed the present system manager is performing the necessary monitoring but that no written report is ever made and the manager does not follow a specific maintenance schedule.

He further testified, according to the examiners report, that he is in the process of buying an 84,000 gallon storage tank and that he believed the system manager performs surveys for leaks every week.

He told PUC officials at the hearing that approximately 150 meters had been installed to that time and that he put in "a few" meters every two weeks with the number varying according to available finances. He

ACISD honors state contenders

The Aransas County Independent School District board of trustees passed a resolution Monday evening recognizing 31 Rockport-Fulton High School students who advanced to the state level of competition in their respective fields.

The resolution is passed annually to recognize high achievers at RFHS. Three of the students, Jim Jeffrey, Lee Lytle and Steve Theodore Jr. went to state in more than one area of competition. Although not mentioned by name, the board also recognized the six RFHS students who were chosen alternates to state competition.

The board accepted bids on two summer projects: concrete work outside Rockport Elementary School and a new gym floor for the junior high school. The board decided at last month's meeting to pave the area in front of Rockport Elementary and remove the fence which is currently standing to allow the children to stand back away from the bus loading area.

Three firms bid on the concrete work, submitting one bid for aggregate concrete

and one bid for driveway concrete. Board members approved a motion to award the contract for aggregate concrete work to low bidder Steve Theodore Construction, who bid \$8,642. Shoreline Construction bid \$13,700 and George Miller Construction bid \$12,255 for the job.

The board also awarded a contract to replace the gym floor at the junior high school to Lee Lanphier Floor Co. of Corpus Christi. The floor was bid with and without an inlaid basketball court. The board accepted Lanphier's bid with the inlaid court for \$3,178. The other bidder, Fletcher Floor Co. of Rockport, bid \$5,185.85 for the same job. A Jerry Brundrett Jr.-Ottie Mundine motion to award the contract to Lanphier was unanimously approved.

The school district received an estimate but did not bid work on the bleachers in the high school gym. ACISD Superintendent E.J. Rando told the board that there are only four companies which even make the bleachers. A Dallas firm gave an estimate of

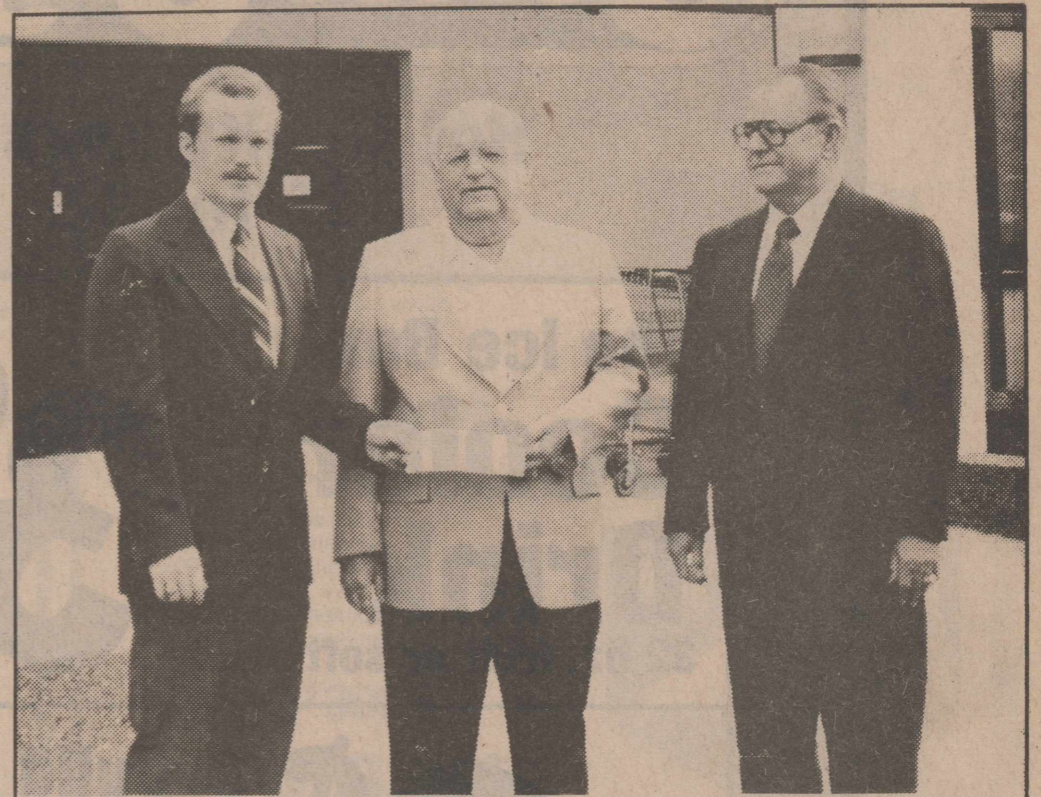

Auxiliary adds to Paws & Taws fund

The Ladies Auxiliary of the Fulton Fire Department has added another \$500 to the fund to help pay for relocation of the Paws & Taws Building to a new site near Fulton Harbor.

The building, now located on Fulton Beach Road, must be moved to make way for construction of Baker-Haldeman Development Company's Nautical Towers high-rise project. A committee consisting of representatives from the area civic and community organizations that use the Paws & Taws Building was recently organized, secured a lease on the proposed new site for the building and began efforts to raise the \$30,000 needed to pay for moving the structure.

At last week's meeting Paws & Taws Inc. (PTI), the Rockport-Fulton association of Ducks Unlimited announced donation of six

paintings that will be auctioned to raise money and two fund-raising projects — a dance on June 4 and a Mexican breakfast-lunch set for June 5 — were discussed.

So far four of the groups that use the Paws & Taws Building have contributed to the relocation fund. Earlier contributions were received from the Rockport Chapter of AARP, Oysterfest sponsored by the Fulton Volunteer Fire Department, and a group of Winter Texans whose activities in the area include bingo nights and weekly potluck suppers at the Paws & Taws Building which serves as headquarters for the Rockport-Fulton Tourist Association.

Juanita Wagley, who donated the Paws & Taws Building to PTI, termed the latest donation "a large contribution from a small organization," pointing out that the Ladies

Auxiliary of the Fulton Fire Department only has a current membership of 14.

The Auxiliary was organized April 11, 1966, with nine members under President Annie Cox. Current President Jerry Cox is Annie's daughter-in-law, Wagley pointed out.

The Auxiliary's primary goal is to provide support for the FFD, mainly by raising funds to buy needed supplies and equipment. Until recently, the Auxiliary's big money-raising event was the Tuesday night bingo game, with the Paws & Taws Building serving as game site for the past 11 years.

The Auxiliary recently discontinued the bingo games to concentrate their fund-raising efforts in support of Oysterfest — which launched the Paws & Taws fund drive with a \$1,000 contribution. The first three Oysterfests were held on the Paws & Taws ground and several events of this year's

Fest were held in the Paws & Taws Building.

Other services provided by the Ladies Auxiliary are supply of food and drinks to firefighters during a major fire and collection of food and clothing for families whose homes are destroyed by fire.

The Auxiliary's contribution to the Paws & Taws fund was presented by Pat Loflin, a charter member and past president of the organization. A director of the RFTA and Fulton alderwoman, Loflin is also a director and one of the incorporators of PTI.

The Paws & Taws Building was constructed in 1964, originally to be the home of the Paws & Taws square dance club. After the 42-member club was disbanded in early 1974, the building was taken over for civic and community activities.

Leonard says the show will stay at the bank for about two weeks.

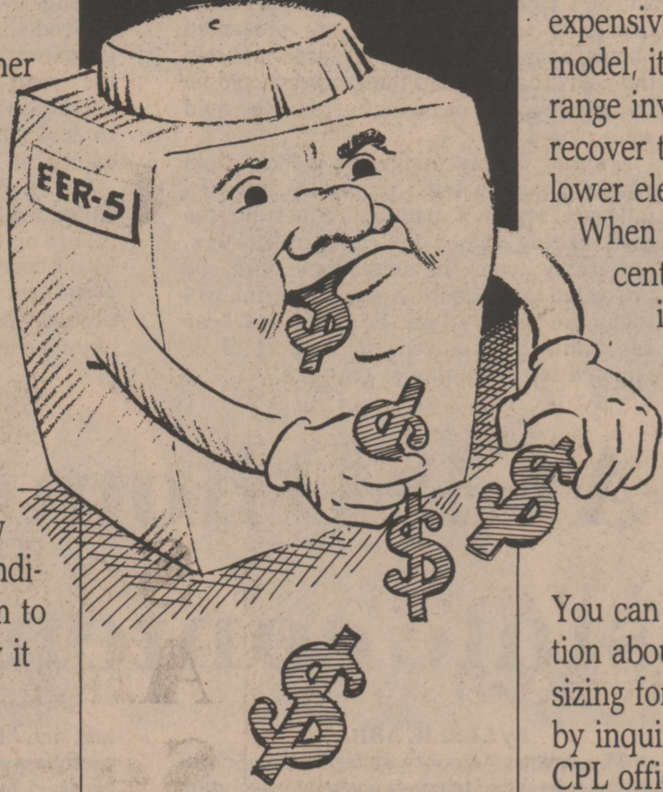

Natural causes likely in death

HOLIDAY BEACH — A woman found dead in her Holiday Beach residence

Carroll added an autopsy has been ordered to determine exact cause of death but said the woman, identified as Mariett Luce Stephens, "was elderly."

The 74-year-old woman was reportedly found dead in her Redfish Road residence by a neighbor who called county sheriff's deputies to investigate the incident.

The body was transported to Dr. Joseph Rupp in Corpus Christi for autopsy.

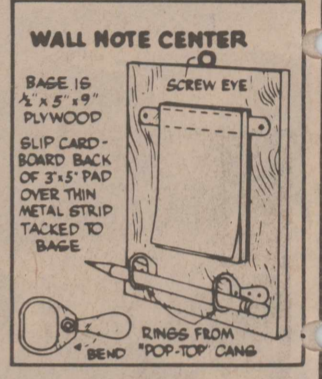


MAKING A WALL NOTE CENTER

Do you return from a shopping trip and realize that you have forgotten something? Or perhaps you didn't pick up that jacket at the cleaners. A little note center conveniently located on a wall or cabinet can be a great help in aiding an imperfect memory. With this note center and its handy pencil or pen, you can jot down a note for a purchase or an errand the moment it occurs to you.

This note center is made to accommodate a 3 x 5-inch pad, because this page size fits conveniently into a pocket, purse or wallet. The base is made of a piece of quarter-inch or half-inch plywood cut to a 5 x 9-inch size. This base can be painted or stained, shellacked and given a coat of wax.

Next, a thin metal strip is attached to the base, as shown, with small screws



or tacks. This allows the cardboard back of a note pad to be slipped over this strip to hold the pad in place. To hold the pencil, attach two rings from pop-top cans to the base with small tacks and bend them outward as shown. You could also use "L" screws for the purpose of holding the pencil or pen. Finally, attach a screw eye to the center of the top for hanging the note center on the wall or cabinet.

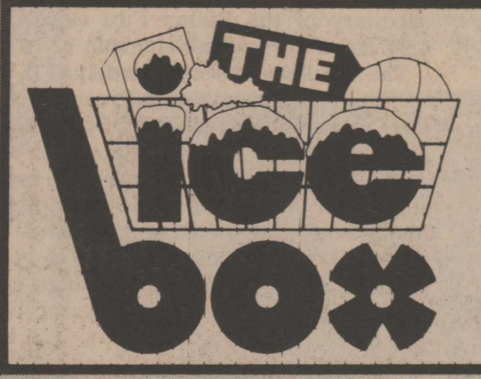

Pirates go to State Friday

Track team wins 2nd at Region

Three first places in events and a second overall in Saturday's Region IV-4A Track Meet in Gregory Portland earned Rockport-Fulton spots in five events at the state level.

Dwayne Walls in the 100 and 200 meters, Charlie Ochoa in the discus, Trinelle Walls in the long jump and the 400-meter relay team did well enough last Saturday to advance to the state meet this Friday in Austin.

"I thought the kids did

nothing but an excellent job," Coach Bill Daws summed up. "We got more points than I thought we would. We put a scare into Kerrville." Rockport's 66-point second place was only eight points behind Kerrville Tivy, the meet champ with 74. The two were tied going into the mile relay, in which R-F wasn't represented.

Dwayne Walls, Trinelle Walls, Doyle Parr and Steve Theodore — the ever-strong

400-meter relay team took a photo-finish win, with a time of 42:57, squeaking past South San West's 42:68.

Dwayne Wall's 100-meter performance set a new meet record. Wall's time of 10.45 was "about what he's been doing," according to Daws. "He wasn't pushed by anyone at this meet, though some guys were closer to Dwayne than normal."

Walls clocked in at 21.77 in the 200 meters almost a full second ahead of the second

place runner, Hernandez of Carrizo Springs.

In the long jump, Trinelle Walls jumped 21-10½ for a second place finish. Said Daws, "That's about what he's been doing. He hasn't really peaked yet, but with the excellent facilities in Austin this Friday, I expect him to perform even better."

In the discus, Ochoa, who also competed in shot put, took second with a throw of 153-8. Ochoa wasn't

performing up to par until his last throw, according to Daws. "His form was off and he just wasn't getting it and then on the last throw I guess his adrenalin got going because he did it." Of Ochoa's prospects at state, the coach says, "he still hasn't tapped all that he can. We're going to work with him this week."

Ochoa came in fifth in shot put with a 50-10¼ throw.

Darren Gurley was also a discus competitor, placing fifth with a throw of 152-10. David Ramirez also took fifth in the 800-meter man race with 1:59.2.

"It was all, even the fifth

places, a team effort. It was still all the way a team," said Daws, who offered "a big thank you to the people from the community who came to the meet. It was great to see that many people in green at the regional level supporting us. We hope they can come up to Austin."

Daws is cautious speculating about the team's chances at state.

"We have representation in five events and that's great. That's not done very often. They've got a shot at doing well at state, but they've got their work cut out for them."

The camp will feature hands-on experience in the UHV microcomputer lab, programming in the BASIC language, problem solving and game playing.

The microcomputer workshop for grades 10-12, will be held on three consecutive Tuesday evenings, 6:30 to 8:30, at Computerland, 3112-F N. Navarro. The dates will be June 7, 14, 21 and 28.

The course, to be instructed by Steve Groll, assisted by David Lack, is designed especially for students who have little or no microcomputer background. However, those with more experience should also benefit.

The problem will consist of hands-on experiences in programming the BASIC language.

"The World of Micro-computing", the workshop for rising 7th through 9th graders, will consist of lectures, hands-on experiences and demonstrations of fantasy simulation/adventures, computerized graphics and introduction to BASIC. It is intended for students with any amount of previous experience.

This seminar will be on Tuesday nights, June 12, 19 and 26, from 6:30-8:30 p.m., at Computerland. Groll and Lack will again instruct.

Logical thought may hinder creative process

Are students being hindered in school when they are asked to think in a logical manner?

That could be the case, according to one of the nation's leading experts on the human brain, writing in a recent issue of the "Bulletin," a monthly journal published by the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP).

"A great many accounts show that scientific, inventive and engineering solutions often come about the nonlogical fashion," writes Leslie A. Hart, author of the book, "How the Brain Works." He believes that forcing students to think in a logical, linear method may be hindering their learning.

"Today it is easier to see that logical approaches seriously interfere with schools' effort to bring about learning," he reports. "Having learned something in random style, such as how to drive a car, manage personal finances, or write an essay, we are likely to try to teach it in an order that we can claim is logical."

He also points out that schools may require a "logical lesson plan," and cautions that adults teach in just the opposite fashion of how they learned.

Hart fears that when students are given a problem in school it is unrealistic to true life. The basic information is neatly provided, there is normally only one right answer and a logical solution is most often sought.

"One does not try to teach the heart how to pump blood, the gut how to digest food or the brain to think," Hart writes. "The brain developed speech, the family, use of fire, clothing, shelter, dance, art, religion, hunting and a vast amount of technology many tens of thousands of years before anybody heard of logic or formal education."

Since the human brain builds on its own experience, Hart proposes that students be given as many sources of experience as feasible which are relevant and useful to them.

He suggests that a group could tackle a real problem, be given time to inspect it, discuss it and then work out a solution. Examples might

include designing a water table for experiments, a cage for animals, a format for a newsletter or a computer program.

He recommends that students be encouraged to examine all information, to deliberately consider a wide variety of approaches to avoid a too early fixation on any one, and to study any complex problem thoroughly and give the brain an opportunity to come up with a solution.

"When students object to doing stupid problems, they may have a point," Hart indicates. "The human brain is geared to meaningful matters and to reject and shut out that large portion of input that doesn't help 'make sense of the world'."

Veterans housing program passes state legislature

AUSTIN — Texas veterans will have the opportunity to purchase a home through the Veterans Housing Assistance Program if it is approved by voters as constitutional amendment in November, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has announced.

The legislature completed action Tuesday on a measure which will provide a loan of up to \$20,000 for eligible Texas veterans to purchase a house.

"The Texas Legislature, Governor Mark White, Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby and Speaker of the House Gib Lewis have shown the veterans and the people of this state that we need a modern housing program which will not cost the taxpayers of this state one cent," Mauro said.

The proposed constitutional amendment will allow for the sale of \$500 million in bonds for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and \$300 million for continuation of the Veterans Land Program. The election is set

for Nov. 8.

The measure was sponsored by Senator Lindon Williams (D-Houston) and Representative Frank Tejada (D-San Antonio). The program passed in the Senate unanimously and overwhelmingly in the House of Representatives.

"We will finance this program through the sale of general obligation bonds with the veterans themselves covering the costs through their payments. Taxpayers will not have to provide any tax money for the housing or the land program. More than 80,000 Texas veterans have participated in the Veterans Land Program since 1949. We want every eligible Texas veteran to have the opportunity to purchase land or a home," Mauro stated.

Mauro said private businesses and the entire state economy will benefit from the establishment of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

"Existing lending institutions will administer the housing program so we

will not have to create another state agency or bureaucracy. We also will stimulate construction of 25,000 new homes and provide another 45,000 jobs for people in Texas. This program is the best example of the cooperation between government and private enterprise which can work to the benefit of all people," Mauro said.

He noted Texas currently has more than 1.6 million veterans including 525,000 Vietnam era veterans.

"The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program has the support of our state leaders, veterans organizations, lending

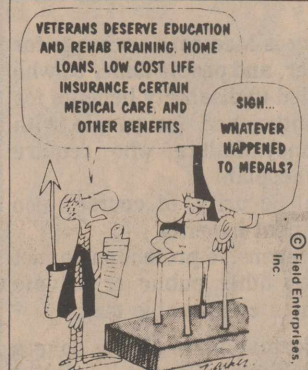
institutions and thousands of other Texans. I am hopeful Texans will agree with me in November in voting for the Texas Veterans Housing

Assistance Program and the continuation of the Veterans Land program," Mauro said.

"As I stated during the

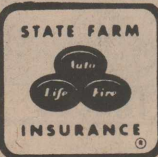

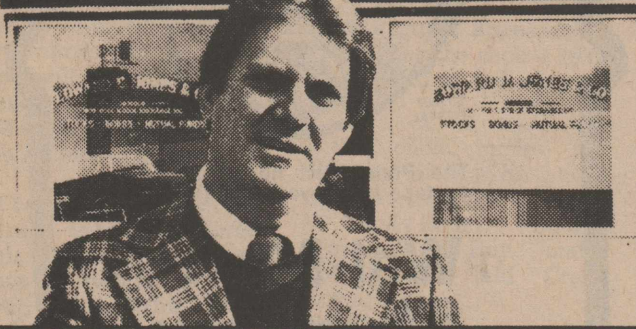
Patman was unable to attend because house sessions required his presence in Washington.

Social Security much more than retirement program

According to David Tutt, district manager of the Corpus Christi Social Security Office, many Americans think of Social Security only as a retirement program. While it is true that Social Security started as a retirement program — and a limited one at that — it is much more today.

— Today, more than nine of every 10 jobs in paid employment and self-employment are covered or eligible for coverage under the program.

— Ninety-four percent of individuals who were 65 years of age and older at the beginning of 1982 were receiving benefits or would be able to receive benefits when they or their spouses retire.

— Ninety-five percent of children under 18 years of age and their mothers and fathers (with children under 16) can count on monthly cash benefits if the wage earner dies.

— Eighty percent of men and women between 21 and 64 years of age can count on monthly cash benefits in the event the wage earner suffers a severe and prolonged disability.

In deciding on the future course of Social Security, it is important to be clear about what it is and what it is not.

— Social Security is not a savings account; it is not a public welfare program; it is not an investment to be returned with interest.

Keep watch for swarming termites

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites because winged forms appear and swarm.

Winged termites outdoors are a natural occurrence, so usually there is no problem. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill or in the bathroom, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures.

Termites have a broad waist — ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape — winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads) — ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should

be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home, anywhere that wood meets soil, (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-tunnels structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on pipes or piers that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is an insect that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer." Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

Two persons dead

Tick fever warning issued

Two Texans have died of Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever (RMSF) this year, an early and tragic warning to beware of ticks which carry the disease.

The two fatalities equal the number of fatalities from RMSF for all of last year, when 64 confirmed human cases were reported by the Texas Department of Health. The 1983 fatal cases include a 25-year-old woman from Williamson County and an 8-year-old girl from Johnson County.

The Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Laboratories operates a tick surveillance network which is designed to identify areas where ticks are infected with the bacteria that causes RMSF and to assist in the investigation of human cases. Through April of this year, 760 ticks have been sent to TDH laboratories for RMSF analysis, but this number will increase dramatically during the summer months. Last year, 4,603 ticks were sampled from 121 counties, and 132 ticks were found positive for RMSF. The infected ticks came from 44 counties, primarily from central, north and northeast Texas.

Ticks are expected to be plentiful this year because of a mild winter in most sections of the state, leading to a greater chance of tick exposure.

RMSF is characterized by

a sudden onset of fever, headache, chills and a rash. The rash normally appears on the second or third day of the illness, appearing first on the arms and legs and then spreading to the rest of the body. In up to 10 percent of cases, a rash may not be present, posing additional diagnostic problems for the physician.

Treatment is very effective in the early stages of the disease, and delays in diagnosis and treatment are the most important factors leading to serious problems with this infection. Persons exposed to ticks should be aware of RMSF symptoms and contact a physician if symptoms occur.

Since contact with ticks is a hazard faced by almost everyone who ventures into the woods, brush or grassy areas, steps should be taken to avoid tick infestations. Commercial repellents may help prevent tick

attachment, but it is wise to check your clothing and body often for ticks. Several hours of attachment is necessary to spread the disease to humans; therefore, prompt detection and removal of ticks are important in prevention efforts.

Care in tick removal is important. While the most common means of infections is through the tick bite, infection also can result while removing or crushing infected ticks with unprotected fingers. Use of gloves and/or tweezers is advised when handling ticks.

R&D bill being pushed

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Senator Lloyd Bentsen has introduced legislation designed to create new jobs without driving up the cost of living by encouraging private industry to spend more money on basic research and development.

Bentsen, in remarks accompanying his High Technology Research and Education Development Act, said an r&d tax credit enacted in 1981 is "inadequate . . . bound up too heavily in caveats and red tape."

"MIT President Paul Grey reported last spring, for example, that his school was negotiating only one research agreement as a consequence of the r&d tax credit provisions of 1981.

"Our spending on research and developments, as a share of Gross National Product, has risen slightly since 1978 but is still some 20 percent lower than it was in the 1960s, while such spending in West Germany is 15 percent higher and in Japan is fully one-third higher.

"In another disturbing trend, basic research — which has led to such things as the transistor and the integrated circuit — is giving way to applied research — in which products utilizing transistors and integrated circuits are developed.

"U.S. industry now spends only 3.6 percent of every research dollar on basic r&d, down from 7 percent in the mid-1960s," Bentsen said.

The Bentsen bill, recognizing a shortage of engineering instructors at U.S. colleges and universities, allows firms to claim the 1981 r&d tax credit for payments to supplement the salaries these schools pay to engineering faculty.

The bill also allows firms to claim the r&d tax credit for the full amount of basic research grants to universities and private, non-profit, research organizations. The 1981 law permits the credit to be claimed only for the amount by which a firm's total r&d

spending in a given year exceeds such spending in the previous year.

In addition, the Bentsen bill provides a charitable tax deduction to corporations that donate scientific and technical equipment such as computers, along with computer software and replacement parts, to primary schools, secondary schools, vocational education schools and colleges. Donors of computers must ensure that at least one member of the school faculty is proficient in use of the donated equipment at no cost to the school.

And, the Bentsen bill excludes basic research grants, for tax purposes, from the gross income of the graduate student receiving the grant.

Bentsen has also proposed other legislation this year to boost U.S. research and development. One bill would establish a Presidential-level task force to make a comprehensive, one-year study of what other

countries are doing to encourage r&d and recommend options to Congress. Another bill, responding to a shortage of math and science teachers in public schools, provides a \$1,000 tax credit to individuals who qualify to teach those subjects.

"Substantial r&d spending may well be the most efficient way for any nation to simultaneously achieve high employment and low inflation," Bentsen said.

"The legislation I am introducing has been developed with the close cooperation of the American Electronics Association, the American Association of Universities and the American Vocational Association," Bentsen said.

"They share with me a vital concern about our grim r&d picture and a desire to see the federal government help rather than hinder an expansion in our nation's commitment to research and development," Senator Bentsen said.

When will power turns to won't

HOUSTON — The 80 million Americans who are overweight will spend millions of dollars this year in the search for slimmness, most of it directed towards turning "will power" into "won't power."

However, a specialist in behavior modification at Baylor College of Medicine believes the overweight would be better off to forget about the concept of will power completely.

John P. Foreyt, Ph.D., associate professor of medicine and psychiatry, said that in today's society it is almost impossible to eat without gaining weight, particularly as people get older and their metabolism slows down. Rather than fight a constant state of self-denial, they should try to understand what causes them to eat too much relative to their exercise level. The key to losing weight is to expend more calories through exercise than are consumed in the food eaten each day.

Many things cause people to put on weight, including when they do most of their eating.

"Most people with weight problems tend to eat the bulk of their calories in the evening; they generally skip breakfast and eat a light lunch," Foreyt said. "People who tend to eat when they're bored, lonesome, anxious or depressed — they're not eating because they're hungry. The mood state is telling them 'I'm bored, what can I do?' Eating usually is the easiest thing to do."

Other major reasons why people eat focus on the role food plays in our society. People meet for a business lunch, or get together with friends for dinner. Foreyt also said that lifestyles are so built around labor-saving devices people simply don't burn off enough calories anymore.

"Most people who maintain lost body weight do it by exercising. Aerobic exercise (that which speeds up the heart beat for a sustained period of time) not only burns off calories while we're active, but it also speeds up the metabolism for up to six hours afterwards. That burns off even more," Foreyt said.

The Number One reason people give for not exercising is a lack of time, Foreyt said. "What we say is: the first priority should be exercise. Then find time for other things."

Also, too many people overdo exercises when they start. They wake up the next day and find their whole body hurts from strained muscles.

"You must begin any exercise regimen slowly and build gradually," Foreyt said. "Increasing the distance you walk each day is a good starting point."

Dealing with the moods behind eating is more complex.

"The only way to combat eating out of loneliness and depression is to get active," he said. "Take adult education classes. Get out with other people in the evening."

People who use self-denial to lose weight need to be realistic. The woman who gives up cheesecake until she loses 10 pounds needs to recognize she can never go back to her former way of eating, Foreyt said.

Despite the role that emotions play in dieting and the stress of obesity, many moderately obese people (no more than 120 percent of ideal body weight) do not need professional psychological help to lose weight, he said. Rather, it becomes a matter of examining what they eat,

translating that into calories, and then equating that with the calories used in exercise.

Foreyt recommends stepping up the level of exercise, rather than cutting back on food intake too drastically. A diet of no less than 1,200 calories a day is needed for a healthy lifestyle.

This type of analysis doesn't require

psychological counseling, Foreyt said. Individuals should first try to do it on their own. If that doesn't work, they should seek inexpensive weight control programs, such as those offered by church groups or Weight Watchers, before trying private practitioners trained in weight control or going to expensive clinics.

Research Produces

More Varieties

Many of the "expert" plant-growers keep themselves in business with continuous research on new and different varieties. For example, about the time you might be getting tired of mums—out comes one in a color or texture you've never seen.

Another good example is the caladium. Although originated in the Amazon River District of Brazil, most caladium bulbs are produced from Florida where research is done year round for new varieties. The most popular caladium is still the white with green veins, but even varieties such as Miss Muffet [white with red specks] are creating interest.

Caladiums like moist, warm, shady areas and should be fed with a balanced fertilizer that does not have too much nitrogen. The nitrogen puts too much green in the leaves.

Even the professional caladium-growers are divided over the question of whether to plant the tubers upside down or right-side up. Planting up-side down does delay plant growth by about ten days. To have short, bushy caladium plants—you can ream out the bulb's main eye forcing the plant's energy into the side eyes.

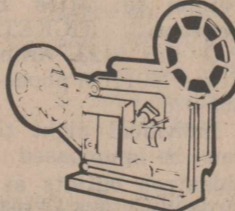
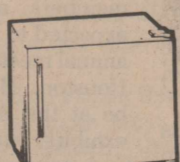
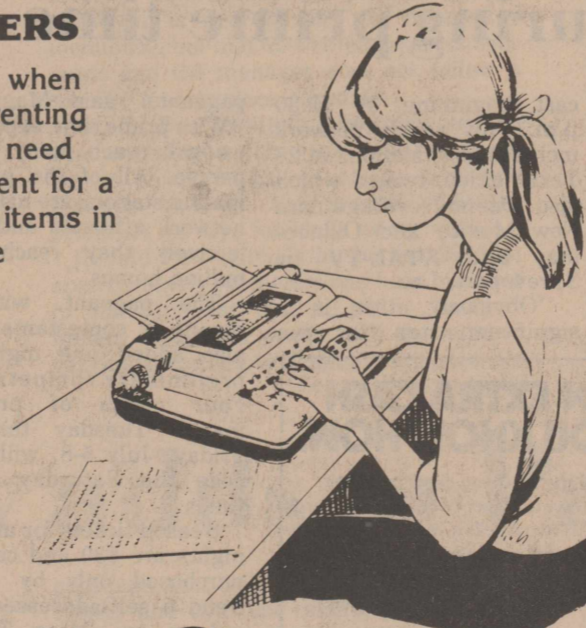

Expected to attend the session are coordinators and directors from Bee County, Beeville, Calhoun County, DeWitt County, Yoakum, Duval County, Jackson County, Alice, Karnes County, Live Oak

County Kingsville-Kleberg County, Refugio City-County, Nueces County, Bishop, Corpus Christi, Ingleside, Port Aransas, Mathis, San Patricio County, Portland, Jim Wells County, Sinton, Victoria City-County, Aransas Pass, Goliad and Robstown.

Representatives from the Coastal Bend Council of Governments, the Texas Department of Public Safety, National Weather Service and American Red Cross have been invited to the meeting to explain their roles in hurricane preparedness meetings.

rather dry weather. The report linked the distressed areas of the roadway to high moisture content in the base and subgrade.

\$8,840 to repair the bleachers of \$50,000 or more to replace them. No action was taken on the item.

The board heard information regarding the remodeling of the restrooms at Fulton Elementary School and approved a motion to purchase folding chairs and new tables for the cafeteria there. The board is considering adding on to the restrooms which would then provide facilities for 240 students of each sex. One wall would be knocked out and the restrooms extended eight feet. The district plans to do most of the work itself instead of let it out for bids. The board has not yet received a cost estimate on the work.

A Mundine-Brendrett motion to spend approximately \$3,400 on tables and chairs for the Fulton Elementary cafeteria was approved. The cafeteria presently seats 100 students. The new tables and chairs will provide seating for approximately 80 more students, which would help relieve the present overcrowding. The money to pay for the purchase will come out of the district's building and maintenance fund.

The board approved a motion to buy new textbooks and supplementary materials for the kindergarten through second grade reading and phonics program. The books currently used are the 1972 edition of the Economy Phonics and Reading program, a book that is now out of print. Although the state no longer adopts this book for its recommended program, the elementary

school teachers and principals of the ACISD prefer it. The district has used the Economy program since 1958. Purchase of an updated program will cost the district approximately \$18,588. The district has to order the books now because the price is due to increase by 6 percent as of July 1. The board will either amend the 1982-83 budget to pay for the materials or write it into the 1983-84 budget.

Board member William Buckley commented, "We seem to be able to find money for this but we don't seem to be able to find money for the computer program." Several other board members commented that the state guidelines regarding computer software have not yet been released so they are reluctant to spend money for equipment they may or may not need.

Mitch Ammons, a member of the audience, suggested during open forum that the board set up an advisory panel of teachers and administrators to study the computer problem in depth, determine potential applications and study the various types of equipment available so the board may draw upon their expertise when it comes time to select software and equipment.

Board members Brundrett and mundine thought it better to wait until the state recommendations come out in September, and told the audience that the Texas Education Association, the Texas Association of School Boards and the

Regional Educational Service Centers are studying these things at the present time.

Ammons and several other members of the audience expressed concern that ACISD students will be denied computer experience for at least a year after the state recommendations are released because it will take that long to implement any program in the schools.

The board said that it would consider their views.

The resignations of six teachers were accepted during the board's executive session. The resignations of Daniel Coplea, Jackie Richardson, Willie Richardson, Julie Bedford, Jimmy Jones and Claudia Nelson were accepted. The board approved employment of Blake Edwards and Roberto Pena. Edwards will be the defensive coordinator and first assistant coach for football and will be the in-school suspension coordinator at the high school. Pena will teach industrial arts at the junior high.

The board considered making a nomination to the TASB Executive Committee. Randow explained that the regional representative is no longer serving on the state board and that there are three candidates vying for the position. The board took no action.

Depository bids, which expire in August, were let for the coming two years. The board will receive bids from First National Bank and Allied Live Oak Bank and award the contract in June.

Early dismissal at 2:30 p.m. on May 18 was approved to allow teachers to gather and honor retiring teachers that afternoon in the high school auditorium.

Randow reported that 91 percent of the district's taxes have been collected so far. He also said that according to an estimate by Pritchard and Abbott Valuation Engineers, the school district is expected to lose approximately \$18 million in oil and gas valuations for next year. Increases in local valuations are not expected to offset the loss.

told PUC officials he had no written plan for orderly installation of meters.

Baumgart said he had not replaced the main crossing channel due to lack of finances and that he had not, as of March 16, retained engineers to perform a study of the system.

In the report Shellman states in her opinion lack of funds is a justifiable reason for not making improvements "only if an effort has been made to obtain the needed funds and has proven unsuccessful."

She charges that "insufficient evidence" was presented by Baumgart "to justify the continued poor service received by the Baumgart customers on the basis that no money was available for improvements or upgrading."

Customers of the water service - who entered the action as intervenors after the PUC filed an inquiry on Nov. 3 1982 into the quality of service provided by Baumgart - in the March 16 hearing charged the system with poor water pressure, frequent service outages, debris in the water and bad odor to the water.

Petitions filed against Baumgart by the PUC's general counsel alleged the water supply company to be in violation of seven utility regulations.

Baumgart and his family have been owners of the water supply company since 1969. At a May 2 meeting of the Aransas County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, a district established to try to obtain quality water service for Holiday Beach, Baumgart said he was interested in selling the company to the district.

Electrical hazards warned

"Consumers are often unaware of the hazards of electrical appliances," says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. To avoid potential danger, the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers and Underwriters Laboratories now warn consumers to always unplug any small electrical appliances after using them, says Granovsky. Don't assume that if the switch is "off" there's no danger of electrocution. This may not be true if the appliance comes into contact with water, she adds.

TMA to hear drug expert

This year's meeting of the Texas Medical Association promises a varied agenda including President Reagan's top policy adviser on drugs, a U.S. senator, some 600 other speakers and a wide-ranging scientific program.

An estimated 6,500 TMA members and guests are expected to attend the 116th annual meeting May 18-22 in Houston. Headquarters will be at the Astorhall, site of exhibits, scientific sessions, and general meeting luncheons. The House of Delegates will meet in the Shamrock Hilton on Thursday and Friday, May 19 and 20.

Dr. Carlton E. Turner (PhD), director of The White House Drug Abuse Policy Office, will address Saturday's general meeting luncheon. He has received worldwide recognition for his

research on marijuana. At Friday's luncheon, U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen (D-Texas) will speak.

The program also will feature 22 specialty section programs. Some of the topics to be presented include surgical treatment of obesity, farm and ranch injuries in West Texas, infections in the homosexual male, cancer quackery, Kaposi's sarcoma and acquired immune deficiency, leprosy, heart transplants, the newer venereal diseases in schools, infectious diseases in schools, and new antibiotics in obstetrics and gynecology.

TMA's Medical Student Section will hold a Saturday panel discussion on the ethics of high technology and maintaining the lives of critically ill newborns. In addition, topics of 10 "curbstone consultations" will include a breast cancer update; calcium blockers and other new agents of heart disease; and prostate cancer surgery and radiation. These are discussions of cases and problems of general medical interest.

Symposium topics will include quackery in children's cancer therapy, running injuries, strength training and injury prevention, and systemic lupus erythematosus.

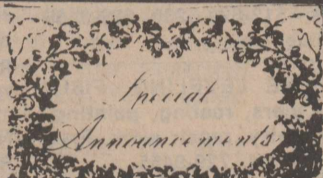

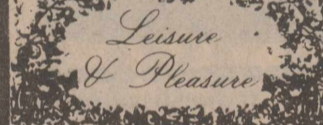

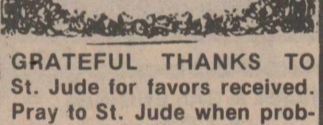

Support revisions needed

FORT WORTH — Even though there has been resistance to child support laws in Texas, a professor at Texas Christian University believes that the proposed revisions are necessary.

"I definitely think this new legislation leading to better payment of child support is a good idea," said Dr. Jean Giles-Sims, assistant professor of sociology at Texas Christian University.

"There is no question that court orders should be enforced," she said. "A judge has made that decision based on the well-being of the child and the income of both parents." One recent article noted that over half of the court orders that are enforced or set up by the courts are never paid.

"Under present Texas laws, there is no way the mother can make the father accountable for making child support payments," she said. In most states, her only option is to get a lawyer and to go through court." Meanwhile, child support is not being paid, and legal fees continue to mount.

"This is becoming more critical with the cutbacks in public funding for legal aid services," she said.

The constitutional amendment, sponsored by Rep. Rene Oliviera, D-Brownsville, would allow judges to order child support deducted from wages if a parent has missed payment. It also would allow employers to deduct child support when the wage earner asks that it be done. Only four other states besides Texas refuse to permit some form of child support withholding.

Sims said many people have been against this kind of legislation because there is "a lot of opposition to the federal government stepping into private lives. They see it in resistance to people becoming involved in family issues."

Don't pick the flowers

AUSTIN — This spring's profusion of bluebonnets and other wildflowers in many areas of the state has prompted numerous calls to state agencies about the legality of picking the flowers on public lands and state-owned highway rights-of-way.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said there is some justification for confusion, since state law on the subject is subject to interpretation. Officials said it is unlawful to pick, dig up or otherwise damage any plant found in a state or national park.

Although the bluebonnet has been designated by the Texas Legislature as the official state flower, the plant is not granted any more protection from picking under state law than any other wildflower.

A spokesman for the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation said state law declares it a misdemeanor to "recklessly damage or destroy" wildflowers along state-owned road rights-of-way.

However, he said although his department discourages the public from disturbing the flowers, law enforcement agencies' officials normally do not construe casual enjoyment of the plants, including picking, to be "reckless damage and destruction." State agency officials recommend that Texans and visitors enjoy this year's unusually lush offerings of wildflowers damaging or removing them, in order to allow more people the privilege.

Another recent topic of curiosity has been the availability of seeds for growing bluebonnets and other wildflowers. Officials said no state agency distributes or sells seeds, but some may be available from commercial seed firms, feed stores or plant nurseries.
