It is no news to say that this section of Texas—and I speak of all west Central Texas—is at a critical period in its economic life. It presents a challenge to faith, resourcefulness and ingenuity. What are we going to do about it? Take what little we have and run, or face up to its challenge? It does no good to "cuss and rare" about conditions. Either we quit or do something about it, and I don't believe that the Lord made any country that he intended to be thrown into discard.

Phone System Engineering Work Begun

Winer and Associates, Dallas engineering firm, this week began what is expected to be a four-month project of planning the improvement and expansion of the Kizer Telephone Company's system under the REA financing program which was approved for the system a few weeks ago.

In charge of the work is George Crawford who brought a crew here and Monday began the work of laying out all existing lines, city and rural, 90 per cent of which will be rebuilt, and staking extensions on rural areas about Rising Star now without telephone service.

About 300 miles of line will be built in the new program, Mr. Crawford estimated. E. O. Kizer, president of the company, urged all prospective subscribers to notify the company office of their intention to apply for service. With this information at hand the engineers will be able to plan the new lines more efficiently, he said.

The program will bring the present system — which was changed over to modern dial telephone service two years ago — up to the highest standards, Mr. Crawford said. The number of miles of new lines to be added is yet undetermined, he said.

Mr. Kizer said eventually the company hopes to add from 300 to 400 new subscribers to the system, which serves Rising Star, Cross Plains and other outlying communities.

Total cost of improvement and refinancing will be in the neighborhood of half a million dollars.

Peanut Price Pegged at \$3.27 Per Bushel Here

A peanut support level of \$218.33 for Spanish type peanuts in this area was announced by the Department of Agriculture this week. According to peanut buying houses, this means that the price for standard grade peanuts here has been spiked at \$3.27 a bushel.

The benefit of the good price level however, is overshadowed by the continued lack of rain which if realized in appreciable amount now, would insure a better than average yield.

Scattered showers about the territory have made the prospects for a good yield bright in spots, but the overall outlook is still uncertain.

Experienced peanut observers say that there will be a crop of sorts whether or not there is any rainfall of consequence, but a two-inch general shower at this time would insure a yield of 25 to 30 bushels per acre in most areas.

There is still time for rainfall to be of great benefit, they assert hopefully. But the prospects for the next few days were less than encouraging.

Funeral services for Dr. Eli Powell, 82-year-old Cross Plains physician who died in a Cisco hospital on his birthday Monday, were held at Cross Plains at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The services were held at the First Baptist Church and burial was in Cross Plains cemetery.

Dr. Powell was born August 12, 1875, in Calhoun County, Miss. He received his degree from the University of Tennessee in 1906 and went to Cross Plains in 1931.

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A Pole Looks at "People's Capitalism"

In certain communist countries, there has been some relaxation of the controls on what magazines and newspapers may publish. They have been granted a modicum of freedom in that regard.

Poland is one of these countries. A short time ago a well-known Polish writer produced an analysis of what we now call the "people's capitalism" of the United States, and a Polish publication printed it. The gist of the analysis is that American capitalism, as now constituted, is a very different sort of thing than that described and reviled by Marx and other communist thinkers.

There is nothing startling in this Polish writer's discovery—indeed, it amounts to a monument of understatement. For Marx and Engels and Lenin and others argued that under capitalism the rich always get richer and the poor poorer, and the few always mercilessly exploit the many. Yet the undeniable truth is that American capitalism has given more of the good things of life to more people than any other economic system ever devised—and also has done more to narrow differences in living standards.

That is not all. The communist thinkers also said that under capitalism a small rich minority would always own the instruments of production and distribution—that is, the corporations—and reap and keep all the profits. But what has happened under people's capitalism here? Millions upon millions of Americans of small and moderate means are now shareowners in American corporations—and large numbers are added to this list every year. Capitalism has gone a long way toward achieving social and economic goals that, in the false, warped view of Marx, could be achieved only under a socialistic dictatorship. And, at the same time, it has maintained the freedom of the individual—a freedom which socialism and communism inevitably destroy.

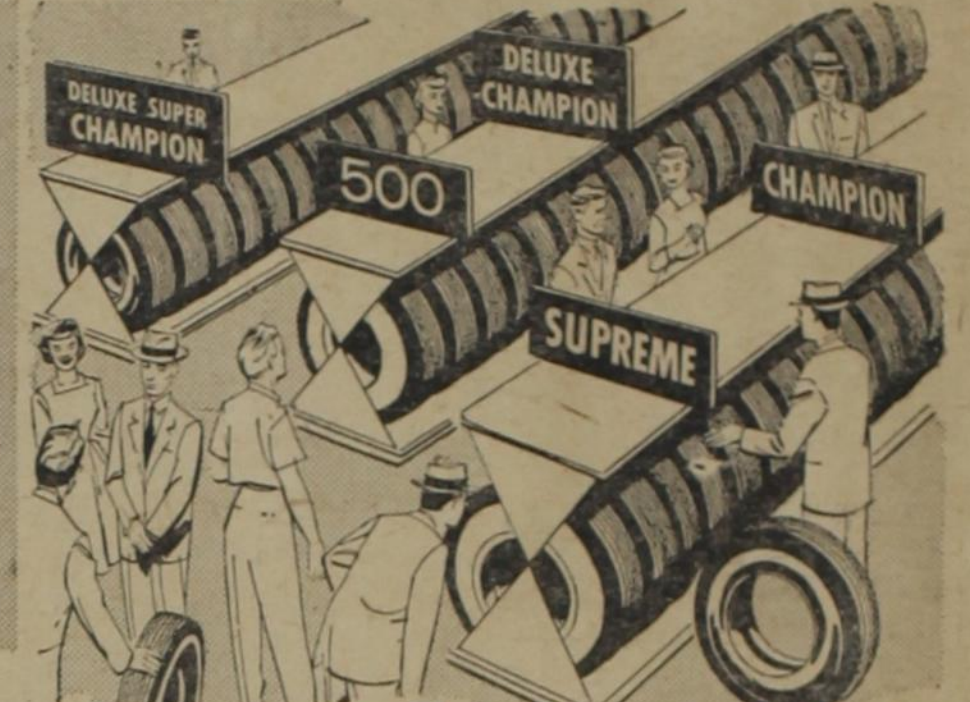

How to Pick a New Refrigerator



What should you look for when you set out to buy a new refrigerator? First of all, you want one big enough for your family's needs, and with an ample, separate freezer section that provides true zero degree temperatures.

You certainly want the refrigerator section to defrost automatically. Who would spend time and energy scraping off the frost, using pans of hot water to melt it, or emptying drip pans, if she didn't have to?

Revolving shelves like those of the new General Electric refrigerators are a big help, for they bring everything within easy reach. Items you need don't get hidden in hard-to-get-at corners. It's also a big help if the refrigerator has shelves that can be easily adjusted for more or less space between them, as any woman knows who has tried to put a watermelon or large ham in her refrigerator.

A magnetic safety door that can be opened by a push from within, helps safeguard children against being trapped inside. By the fall of 1958 all new refrigerators will have to have safety doors—that's the law—so it's wise to buy a refrigerator that has a safety door now.

If you are aiming at the popular built-in look for your kitchen, be sure nothing protrudes from the back of the refrigerator you buy. Otherwise, you won't be able to set it flat against the wall with the front flush with other appliances and cabinets.

Suppose you want to place your new refrigerator in a corner? In that case be sure to choose one with a door that can be fully opened without allowing clearance for it. Clearance space is waste space, and often hard to keep clean.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

AUSTIN.—One of our most important public health enemies in America today is tooth decay, a virtually incurable chronic disease which must be prevented if it is to be conquered at all. The ailment is so widespread that it involves 95 of every 100 persons and is still increasing.

It is estimated that there are now one billion cavities in the mouths of Americans, mostly children of elementary school age. And for every cavity a dentist fills, six are left unfilled because of failure to visit a dentist.

Dental authorities say the situation is now so acute that at its present rate of increase, within 10 years decay will have turned us into a nation of dental cripples.

Children develop cavities at about the same ratio as do adults—approximately one per child per year. But whereas one-third of the adult need for fillings is being met, only one-fifth of the cavities in children's teeth are being repaired.

Perhaps the reason is that so many parents still cling to the totally false notion that so-called "baby" teeth are unimportant because they are temporary. The frequent result is that good dental health for children is still a relatively scarce commodity.

There is one positive step all parents can take to avoid a fate of toothlessness among their children. It's a simple step, requiring only that the youngsters be taken to a dentist for tooth and gum inspection before being enrolled in school each fall.

The dentist will follow a careful routine in making the inspection. He will painlessly probe all tooth surfaces, looking for signs of impending trouble. Using an ingeniously simple little mirror, he can check even the most difficult-to-get-to corners, removing accumulations of "tartar," the name given to incrustated salivary mucous and food residue.

If spots of decay are found, he will remove it and fill the

cavity with a material called "amalgam," a combination of mercury and bits of silver. Or perhaps he will choose a porcelain cement, also in use as a filling material.

Before the visit is concluded the dentist will have tutored the youngster in good dental hygiene at home—such things as when and how to brush his teeth, and how to make an excellent dentifrice from baking soda or table salt.

When enough children have received such instruction, and are encouraged by parents to follow them, we will be well on the way toward avoiding the fate predicted for us: that within a decade we will be a nation of dental cripples.

Were it not for the multitudes of unpaid volunteers, whose only reward is to see our boys become tomorrow's men, Scouting would be far from what it is today. Let us all offer our thanks to these men who do so much for our boys.

Texas Egg Law Have Big Impact on Texas Citizens

EGG STATION. — The Cardew, just recently passed by the Texas Legislature, will have a widespread impact on Texas citizens. It will affect egg producers, dealers, retailers, wholesalers, brokers and processors as well as consumers.

But just what does this law do? How will it affect those people just listed? F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, lists a few of the law's highlights.

(1) It provides for the establishment of standards of size and quality of eggs. The standards of quality as determined by candling and conditions of shell, the grades and standards of size as determined by weighing shall be the same as the standards and grades prescribed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for shell eggs.

(2) The law provides for proper grading and labeling. The eggs are inspected primarily at retail outlets and labeled according to grade, which includes size and quality. Unless the grading is under USDA supervision, it shall be unlawful to use the prefix "U. S." on grades and weight classes.

(3) Provides for licensing of egg retailers, dealers, wholesalers, processors and brokers. There is no licensing fee to any retailer as defined by law—that is, any person selling or offering for sale, eggs to consumers only in this state. All retailers must have a license even though there is no fee.

(4) Provides that the law will be self financing through the fees collected.

(5) Provides penalties for violations. Any person convicted of violating this act is subject to a fine. The license of a violator may be suspended for a period not to exceed 90 days.

(6) Gives exemption to producers selling eggs from their flocks unless a grade is claimed. But if they wish to claim a grade, their eggs must meet the standards specified by the law.

(7) It establishes an Egg Marketing Advisory board to be appointed by the governor. This board will be composed of the Commissioner of Agriculture, who will be chairman, and nine other members, all from Texas, who will serve six year terms.

Earl Rudder, Texas Land Comm'r Is Now Major General

AUSTIN.—Earl Rudder, commanding general of Texas' 90th Infantry Division, has been notified by the Department of the Army of his promotion to major general.

His promotion was dated May 7. It was approved by the U. S. Senate Monday (5 August).

The 47-year-old general, who is a civilian life, is a decorated veteran of World War II.

On his combat record, he is best known for leading his rangers up the chalk cliffs of Pointe du Hoc, France, on D-Day, June 6, 1944.

Later, a regiment under his command helped turn the German attack during the Battle of the Bulge.

Gen. Rudder was graduated from Texas A&M in 1932. He went on active duty in the Army in 1941 as a first lieutenant, and he was a colonel when released from the service in 1946.

He has since served as mayor of Brady, vice-president of Brady Aviation Corporation, and on the State Board of Public Welfare.

In January, 1955, he was appointed Land Commissioner. He was promoted to brigadier general in December, 1954.

Gen. Rudder is married to the former Margaret Williamson of Menard. They have five children.

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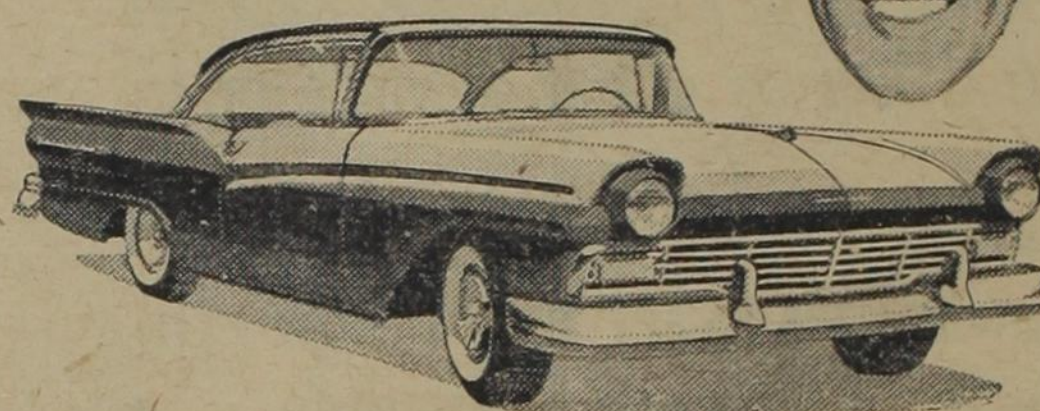
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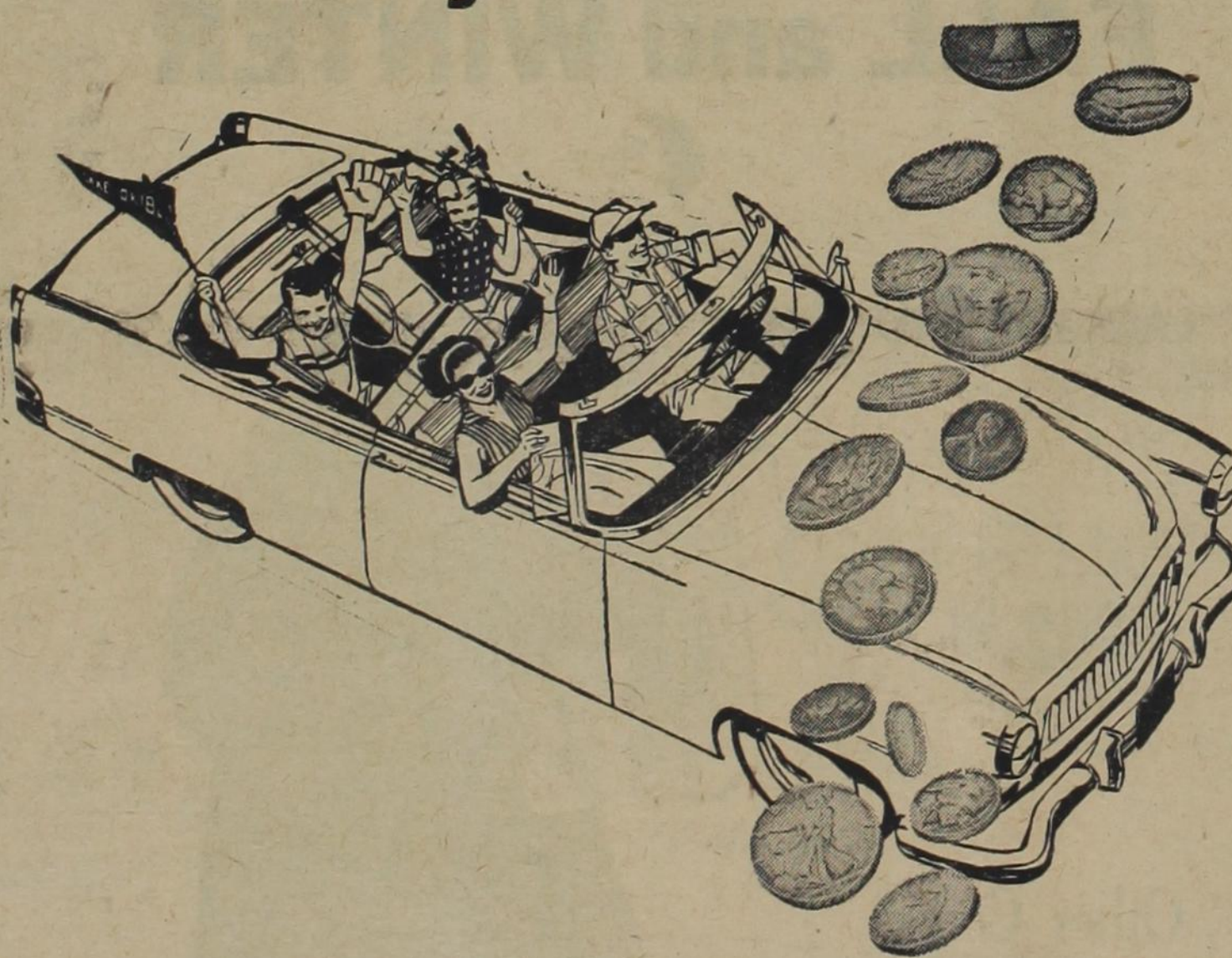
