Second Deep Test at Sulphur Bluff; Peveto Will Try East Mount Vernon

R. L. Peveto of Tyler, says that he is planning an offset to the No. 1 L. C. Moore discovery well which was brought in by F. R. Jackson and S. R. Killingsworth of Longview, the first part of April, east of Mt. Vernon.

Peveto said a definite location had not been staked but it is anticipated that it will be drilled on the W. F. Alexander land located north of the Cotton Belt railroad tracks on a farmout from Atlantic.

Peveto said it would probably take 30 days to clear up title work and surveys before a drilling rig would be moved in.

B. P. Sims with the Railroad Commission office in Mt. Pleasant said no application for a permit had been filed with his office but that statewide spacing rules would prevail since no field rules have been set up. Rumor has the location as being 400 feet northwest of the No. 1 L. C. Moore but a special permit application would be necessary if such a location is allowed as statewide rules call for something over 900 feet between wells.

Reports are that a road has been graded and location cleared for the Dick Scott No. 1 Raines test, second deep Smackover line try in northeastern Hopkins county, near Sulphur Bluff.

The new test is to be located

southwest of Nelita on a tract of land owned by the William Raines estate. The location is on the Balcones Fault about 3 1/2 miles southwest of the No. 1 O. M. Basham Smackover discovery well for the area.

The Railroad Commission office in Mt. Pleasant reported that Scott had a lease unitization agreement on 499 acres in their office awaiting checking and approval before a permit can be granted. Application calls for 9600 feet and is in the name of Dick Scott et al and indications were that the permit would be granted as soon as unitization agreement can be checked.

The Basham well was completed late in March for a daily potential of 13 million cubic feet of gas and 875 barrels of distillate.

The Greiling estate of Tyler, owner of the well, has been operating it on a limited basis the last few weeks under a special Texas Railroad Commission order authorizing the burning of 150 million cubic feet of gas.

Reports from the well indicate it is producing two million cubic feet of gas a day with about 160 barrels of distillate.

No change in the high gas pressure present in the well has been registered during the production period, local oil men report.—Mt. Vernon Optic-Herald.

Lake Texarkana Should Be Hot Fishing Spot

Ordinarily new lakes are very productive about the second year after they have been filled. Fishermen who are looking for a hot spot this year might well consider Lake Texarkana. This reservoir was created by a dam across the Sulphur River a dozen miles southwest of the Texas-Arkansas city. It is served by U. S. Highways 59 and 67.

This reservoir is the result of another flood control project. It was built by the Corps of Engineers. Recently the marginal land around the lake was licensed to the Game & Fish Commission. It will be developed as a wildlife management area.

Right now the lake is so new it lacks many facilities, but they are in the making. The main thing is that it is full of fish. Already some very fine bass have been taken in great numbers. According to biologists there was a fine spawn of blacks there last year and they are now keeper size.

Also below the dam the Sulphur River is a fine fishing stream. Thousands of persons line the banks of the river at the tail-races below the dam for sand bass fishing. Recently the Game & Fish Commission needed some sand bass for restocking some West Texas lakes. A half-dozen biologists with rod and reel took some 1500 bass there in a couple of days.

The Sulphur River flows on into Arkansas, good fishing all the way.

Lake Texarkana is a large lake, covering more than 20,000 acres at conservation level. It has drainage area of 34,000 miles, which assures ample water. The dam itself is earth filled and is 18,500 feet in length. There is a roadway across the dam.

The Chamber of Commerce at Texarkana can give you full information on tourist facilities in the lake area. And if you live within easy distance we certainly recommend it for good fishing.—Vern Sanford.

Cotton Acreage in Texas Reported Down From 1957

Austin.—Texas farmers had 5,650,000 acres of cotton in cultivation on July 1, down 505,000 acres from the same date last year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported.

Planted acreage for the 1958 crop year had fallen to 5,725,000 acres, off nine per cent from last year, and marked a sharp reduction from the 5-year planted acreage average of 9,917,000 acres, the USDA said.

Texas had a cotton acreage allotment of 7,500,000 acres, of which about 1,750,000 acres was placed in the soil bank, the USDA reported.

Acreage planted was maintained at about last year's level in the high plains and Trans-Pecos areas, increased plantings in the lower Valley 10 per cent over 1957 reflected adequate water supplies behind Falcon Dam, while improved moisture conditions favored an eight per cent increase in plantings in the Coastal Bend.

All of these are "relatively high yielding areas," the USDA said. In contrast, virtually all other areas of the state reduced acreage from last year—largely as a result of soil bank participation, a USDA spokesman said.

Cotton crop prospects continued "promising" over most of Texas.

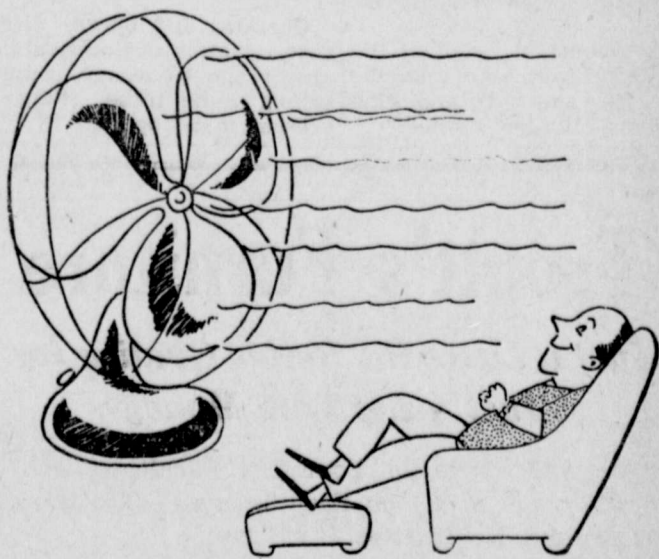

On this the 30th day of June, 1953, the City Commission of the City of Talco, Texas, convened in regular meeting, at the regular meeting place, with the following members thereof, to-wit:

Mrs. O. D. Welch, City Clerk,
and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum, at which time the following proceedings were had:

Commissioner Gauden introduced an ordinance and made a motion that it be passed. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Norwood. The motion carrying with it the passage of the ordinance prevailed by the following vote:

Ayes: Commissioners Norwood and Gauden and Mayor Jones.
Noes: None.

The ordinance is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE
Adopting a plan for the composition of obligations payable from the revenues of the Waterworks System and Sewer System of the City of Talco.

WHEREAS, the City of Talco, Texas, has outstanding the following described bonds:

City of Talco Waterworks System and Sanitary Sewer System Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1941, dated July 1, 1941, of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, due serially on July 1, of each of the years 1954 to 1969, both inclusive; and

WHEREAS, \$145,000.00 of said bonds are outstanding and \$22,000.00 thereof are delinquent, and approximately \$5,002.50 of interest coupons have matured and are delinquent; and

WHEREAS, said bonds and the interest thereon are payable from the net revenue of the Waterworks and Sewer System of the City of Talco, are secured by a pledge of said revenues and by a deed of trust lien upon the physical properties of said systems and said bonds do not constitute an obligation against the taxing power of said City; and

WHEREAS, with the exception of the amount due the Trustee under said deed of trust, said bonds and the interest thereon constitute the only outstanding obligations payable from said net revenues; and

WHEREAS, the net revenues of said systems are insufficient to pay said bonds and the interest thereon as they mature and accrue, the City has no other revenues which it can apply to the payment of said bonds, and said City of Talco is insolvent; and

WHEREAS, said City desires to effect a plan for the composition of said bonds and the interest thereon.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS:

Section 1. The City of Talco, Texas, proposes and hereby offers to compose the indebtedness represented by the bonds hereinabove described and the interest thereon in the following manner:

(a) The City will issue One Hundred Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty (\$108,750.00) Dollars of Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Refunding Bonds, dated January 15, 1958, bearing interest at the rate of three and one-half (3½%) per cent per annum. Said bonds shall be numbered from One (1) to One Hundred Forty-five (145), both inclusive, and be of the denomination of Seven Hundred Fifty (\$750.00) Dollars each and mature serially as follows:

(b) Said bonds shall be optional for prior redemption on any interest payment date after giving thirty days notice to the place of payment and thirty days notice by publication. Except as otherwise provided in this Plan, said bonds shall be secured the same as are the bonds now outstanding. Texas Bank and Trust Company, Dallas, Texas, shall be designated Trustee (hereinafter called "Trustee") in the new or supplemental deed of trust securing the new refunding bonds and the National Bank of Commerce shall cease to be such Trustee. The new or supplemental deed of trust shall be in the same form as the present deed of trust except as herein otherwise provided or it may adopt provisions of the present deed of trust.

Section 2. There shall be charged and collected for water and sewer service a sufficient amount to pay all operating, maintenance, depreciation, replacement and interest charges, and for interest and sinking fund sufficient to pay said bonds. Provision will be made in the ordinance directing the issuance of the bonds or in the deed of trust that so long as any of said bonds or any interest thereon remain unpaid, no discounts or free service shall be allowed. Bills for service shall become due on the 3rd day of the month following the month during which the service is rendered. If not paid on or before the 10th day of the month a penalty of 10% shall be added to the bill, and water service will be disconnected on the 1st day of the month in the case of each patron who shall fail to pay such bill either for water or sewer service.

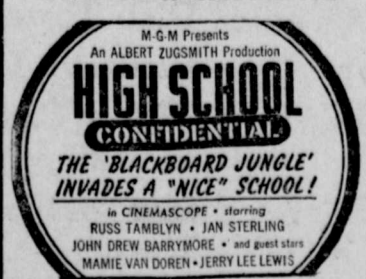
Section 3. (a) Upon the passage of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of said new Refunding Bonds, the City will transfer to the Interest and Sinking Fund to be created thereby an amount of money equal to the amount which would be contained in said Fund if the City had been making deposits therein of \$800.00 on the 15th day of each month beginning January 15, 1958. Thereafter, and as long as any of said New Refunding Bonds or any interest thereon remain unpaid, the City will deposit into said Fund \$800.00 on the 15th day of each month.

(b) All revenues in excess of reasonable allowance for operating expenses and the amount herein required to be deposited monthly into the Interest and Sinking Fund shall, on the 15th day of each month after passage of the ordinance authorizing the new Refunding Bonds, be deposited into a fund to be called "City of Talco Water and Sewer System Improvement Fund." (Hereinafter called "Improvement Fund.") Money in the Improvement Fund shall be used for emergency repairs and replacements and for improvements necessary to keep the System operating efficiently. After there shall have been accumulated in the Improvement Fund the amount of \$5,000.00 and as long as such amount remains in said Fund, such excess revenues shall be deposited into the Interest and Sinking Fund.

enues shall be deposited into the Interest and Sinking Fund.

(c) The ordinance directing the issuance of said refunding bonds or the Deed of Trust shall provide that each year when the City shall have on hand in the Interest and Sinking Fund as much as \$5,000.00, it shall be the duty of the City Secretary to publish a notice in the Texas Bond Reporter, or a similar publication, that on a definite date approximately thirty days after the insertion of such advertisement, the City will receive sealed offers or tenders of refunding bonds of this series from the holders thereof at prices less than par, and to the extent that funds are available in its hands, it shall be the duty of the City to purchase said refunding bonds at the lowest price or prices at which they are offered. In the event a number of bonds are offered at the same price, the amount of such bonds being in excess of the available funds, then the City shall determine by lot which of said bonds it shall purchase. Provided, however, if the bonds so offered are, in the opinion of the City Commission, in excess of the current market price, then such offers shall be rejected and the City may purchase bonds in the open market at prices less than such offers. To the extent that the City is unable to procure bonds in an amount sufficient to absorb funds on hand at discount prices it shall be the duty of the City immediately to call bonds of this issue at par plus accrued interest in their numerical order beginning with the lowest outstanding numbered bonds, thirty days' notice of such call to be given by publication in the Texas Bond Reporter or a similar publication, unless the names and addresses of the holders of the bonds to be called are known to the City, in which event such notice may be given by mail. Prior to calling for tenders or offers of bonds as provided in this subsection (c), the City Commission shall determine and specify the amount of money which

shall be used for the purpose of paying bonds at discount prices or for redemption at par and accrued interest, or both, and in determining such amount, the City Commission shall take into consideration the amount of interest and sinking fund on hand and the probable amount of monies which will be added to such fund prior to the next maturity of interest or interest and principal. Only the amount so specified by the City Commission shall be used to pay bonds in advance of their maturity.

(d) It is expressly provided that in the event there are insufficient moneys on hand available for the payment of interest and principal as it matures such monies as are on hand shall be distributed as follows: First, for the pro rata payment of matured interest coupons and interest on past due principal obligations at the rate of 3½% per annum and, secondly, the balance of such funds shall be used for the payment of principal in the order of its maturity, unless the funds remaining are insufficient to pay all of the past due principal, then in that event such funds shall be paid ratably to the holders of the first maturing bonds. The Trustee shall be furnished satisfactory evidence of the receipt of such partial distribution of funds.

Section 4. All money remaining in the interest and sinking fund of said original issue, in excess of the amount to be used for expenses in connection with this Plan of Composition, shall be transferred to the interest and sinking fund for the refunding bonds to be issued pursuant to this Plan of Composition or to the Redemption Fund.

Section 5. The City agrees to furnish the opinion of McCall, Parkhurst & Crowe, approving the validity of the refunding bonds issued pursuant to this Plan of Composition.

Section 6. All interest accrued to January 15, 1958, whether evidenced by coupons or not

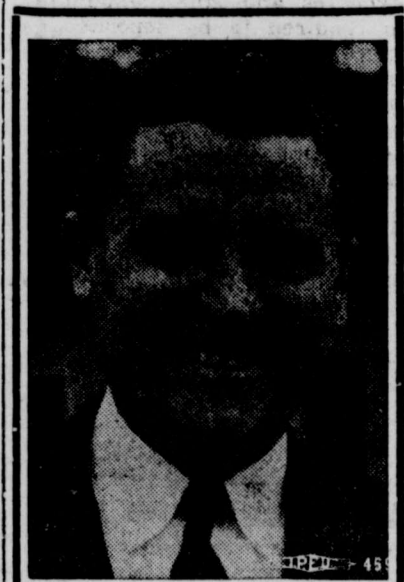

shall be paid in cash at the rate of 50c for each dollar of such interest.

Section 7. All expenses in connection with this Plan of Composition, the proceeding in the Federal Court for the confirmation of the Plan and the issuance of the refunding bonds shall be paid by the City of Talco from the interest and sinking fund of said outstanding bonds, or other available funds, which expenses are principally as follows:

(a) Legal fee due McCall, Parkhurst & Crowe, \$1,750.00 plus all expenses and a per diem of \$150.00 for each day one of such firm is absent from the City of Dallas in connection with said Plan of Composition, court proceeding or refunding, which per diem probably will not exceed three days.

(b) \$100.00 statutory court costs to United States District Clerk plus other court costs and expenses, if any.

(c) Printing refunding bonds approximately \$100.00.

(d) Amount of actual expenses incurred by Hamilton Securities Company in connection with this

composition and refunding, not to exceed \$800.00.

(e) Fees and expenses incurred by National Bank of Commerce, San Antonio, Texas, in the composition of \$1,212.32, which the City admits is a preferred claim and entitled to be paid in full prior to the entry of the Final Decree by the United States District Court confirming this Plan of Composition.

It is estimated that expenses above mentioned together with other expenses which might arise will not exceed 4% of the principal amount of outstanding bonds.

Section 8. The City has not and will not have during the prosecution of this Plan of Composition, any control over any of said bonds affected by this Plan, and the City does not own, directly or indirectly, any of said bonds.

Section 9. No holder of any of said bonds shall pay any fee or commission of any attorney or agent assisting or representing the City in connection with this Plan of Composition.

Section 10. This ordinance shall constitute the plan for the composition of all the obligations and indebtedness payable from the revenues of the Waterworks and Sewer Systems of the City of Talco, Texas.

Section 11. At such time as the holders of 51% of the aggregate amount of said Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Refunding Bonds dated July 1, 1946, have accepted this Plan of Composition, the Mayor of this City shall cause a petition for the confirmation hereof to be filed in the United States District Court and shall do all things necessary for the prosecution and completion of said proceeding.

Section 12. The City will pay to the Trustee Bank for its fees and charges as such Trustee the following:

Fees of Trustee's attorneys for examining this Plan of Composition and the deed of trust, \$100.00; Fee to be paid Trustee Bank each year while any of said refunding bonds are outstanding, \$100.00;

\$1.00 per bond for all payments made on the principal of said refunding bonds, \$5.00 minimum; .05 per coupon for all payments made on interest coupons pertaining to said refunding bonds, \$5.00 minimum.

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur reports on economics this week, without any affect on the situation.

Dear Editor: As I understand the reports from Washington, the recession, if we had one, has now hit bottom and things are picking up, though you've got to understand us economists speak only in general terms and it's possible to have a private recession in the middle of a boom, and I suppose a private boom in the middle of a recession.

I tell you, I don't like this theory of economics. It's like arguing the only way to end a rainy spell is to have a drought, or the only answer to a drought is a flood. It's sort of like blaming war on too much peace, or divorce on marriage.

Generally you might be able to argue that too many Democrats too long in power will bring on too many Republicans too long in power, with the thing switching back and forth every few years, and that might be right, but I'd just as soon have some other arrangement for the economic system. Politics is all right for entertainment, but economics is where your bread and butter is.

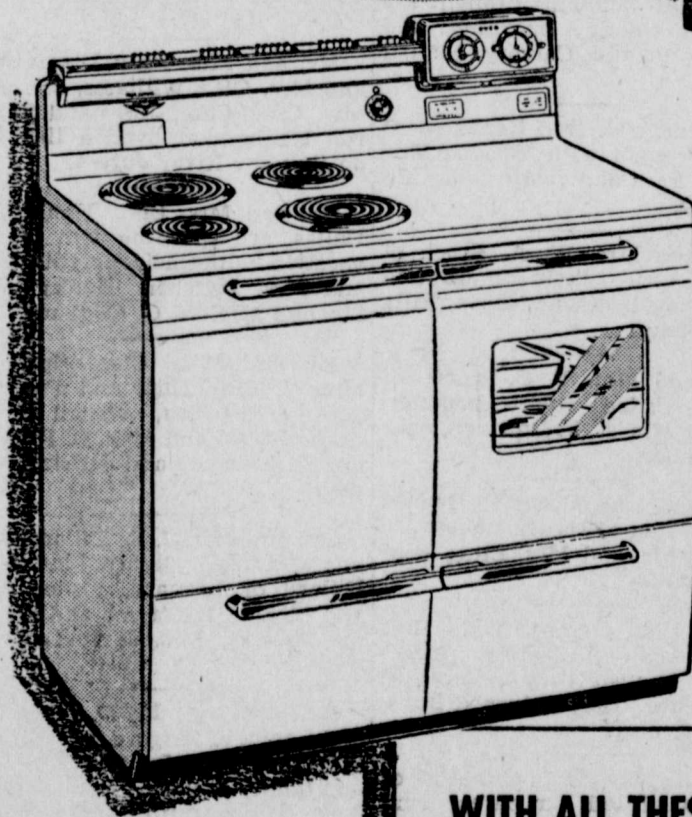
