Dockrey's Conservation Pay-Off

District's Top 'Comeback'

A 37-year-old stock farmer, whose career path leads him back to country, is "Comeback" Conservationist of the Year," for Mitchell Soil Conservation District. He is Charles Dockrey, father of a daughter and two sons, who has 1,329 acres 11 miles southwest of Colorado City for his sole business.

Dockrey was selected by a committee of active award-winning conservation farmers and ranchers who know first-hand the soil and water problems of this district.

COMMITTEE STUDY

In the final judgment, the study judged it to be poor, and 18 answers did not try to evaluate it.

Court services replies read like this: 7 excellent, 31 good, 37 average, 4 below average, 2 poor, and 87 no response.

Zoning ordinances likewise drew 64 no response checks. Other attitudes were 6 excellent, 44 good, 29 average, 9 below average, 1 poor, and 20 no response.

Legal services won 8 answers of excellent, 65 good, 11 average, 11 below average, 1 poor, and 20 no response.

Welfare Services

Welfare services (aid to families with financial and marital problems, etc.) are not, the survey seems to show, included in the general knowledge of the average citizen in Colorado City. An overwhelming number of 82 checked "no response."

Winding up the various services as judged in the sample citizens surveyed by Jaycox and the Zora Delta Study Club, were questions regarding public transportation, parking, street layout, traffic signals, maintenance and cleaning of streets, and sidewalks.

APPLIED PRACTICES

Here are the practices he has applied in recent years in his community effort:

Diversions more than 16,500 feet at cost of \$3,200; Trenches 3,105 feet level standard and 1,125 feet of parallel at total cost of 27,796; Brush control 211 acres of fuel piling at \$2,951 and 310 acres of brush spray or grubbing at \$3,100 plus 900 acres of aerial chemical crown treatment at cost of \$2,205.

Raise seedling 200 acres; planted pasture from 100 acres from land in blue panicum grass.

DIFFICULT JOB

Grass was in poor condition overall, with the best grass no better than "very low fair." Bare ground spotted throughout the pasture.

Brush, mesquite and cedars were a serious problem. In the crop-land, Dockrey reported that he had his workers remove 1,000 cubic yards of brush and 1,000 cubic yards of cedar from the pasture.

When Dockrey began his conservation work in 1965, the stock farm had no permanent water, usually drying out every year. A gully erosion extended about 1.25 mile through the north section to Wild Horse Creek with a deep gully 12 to 13 feet deep and more than 20 feet wide.

CONSERVATION STOPPING SYSTEM

By rotation — 370 acres; contour farming — 370 acres; crop residue use — 370 acres; adopting cover crops to help prevent soil erosion — 370 acres; deferred grazing practice — 900 acres; pasture management for using blue panicum grass — 22 acres.

Construction of ponds for livestock water and net her range use — 3 for total cost of \$7,000; also planting in bald pasture areas with overseeding of native grasses — 35 acres at \$220 per acre — 10,950 feet at cost of \$1,912.

Services Rate Good Community Survey Reveals

Community Attitude Survey results were too heavy with the reply "good" when the question concerned fire protection here.

A total of 89 needs of households graded fire protection as excellent, 26 as good, 24 as average, 10 as below average, and 19 as poor.

Law enforcement and police protection fared this way: 81 surveyed citizens said good, 13 excellent, 43 checked the average answer. Six people described police protection as below average.

Medical, dental and hospital services

Medical, dental and hospital services in this community did all right with the survey, tabulation shows.

Medical services tallied 20 excellent replies, 96 good replies, 48 average replies, a high percentage, considering that only 11 replies came up with below average only seven replies checked poor, and only three had no opinion.

Public transportation

Public transportation to other communities in the community Attitude Survey strongly hints is poor. A total of 41 citizens rated it as poor, with only 3 calling it excellent, 26 calling it good, 30 calling for average, 26 disagreeing with below average, and 30 marking the no response column.

Street layout

Street layout was approved as good by 51, average by 48, and then blasted as poor by 52 others, below average by 14, excellent by 4 and not evaluated by 15.

FULL TWO YEAR PROGRAMS LEADING TO THE ASSOCIATE IN APPLIED ARTS DEGREE:

REGISTRATION BEGINS WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 31

Electronic Data Processing Technology
The Electronic Data Processing curriculum is designed as a two year program to equip the student for employment as a computer programmer in business. Experiences on electronic data processing equipment will be supplemented with technical information and study designed to give the student an understanding of his civil responsibilities and the occupation skill necessary for today's society.

Drafting and Design Technology
The Drafting and Design curriculum is a two year program that will develop the necessary knowledge and skills for the student who plans to enter the construction or manufacturing industries. Drafting skills will be taught in the program in order to equip the student to become employable as a technician in design or as a draftsman in industry.

Electrical Technology
The Electrical Technology program provides the student with a background in applied physics, technical mathematics, principles of technical writing, and broad economic concepts. The course places special emphasis upon specific training in the electric theory, circuitry, power and distribution, measuring instruments, and test equipment.

Machine Tools Technology
The Machine Tools Technology curriculum is a two year program designed to develop knowledge and skills that the student will need to enter the construction, manufacturing, or design industry. After having completed the program, the student will be equipped to work as a machinist, or in a related technical field.

Vocational Office Occupations
Vocational Office Occupations is a one or two year curriculum designed to prepare young men and women with knowledge, skills, and attitudes necessary to obtain employment in office occupations; and to progress, through normal promotional procedures, in that employment.

ONE YEAR NON-DEGREE PROGRAMS

Vocational Nursing
The Vocational Nursing Program, in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency, offers a twelve month course of preparatory instruction in related subjects for a total of 540 clock hours and of clinical training in co-ordination with affiliating hospitals for a total of 1400 clock hours.

The Howard County Junior College School of Vocational Nursing is accredited by the Texas State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Upon completion of the twelve months course, a student is eligible to take the State Board examination in order to qualify as a Licensed Vocational Nurse.

Welding Technology
The Welding curriculum is a one year program to develop knowledge and skills that the student will need to enter the construction or manufacturing industry. Areas of study will include basic mathematics, theory or welding, metallurgy, drafting and layout, and fabrication of metals.

EVER consider how important is the little prefix? Now you take the simple word traction, meaning pulling or drawing. Add a little prefix and you can change the meaning all kinds of ways.

Attraction can mean charm or sex appeal — you either have it or you don't — or it can mean a show, as in "coming attraction."

Contraction does double talk. It's the drawing up of a muscle or it's the shortening of a word by leaving out one or more letters as in can't for can not.

Distraction could be confusion, an amusement... or what little kids sometimes call their mama-to.

Distraction, when it means taking away, belittling in slang terms, to run down or "had mouth" something of some body.

ABSTRACTION has about seven meanings including absent-mindedness, an immaterial notion, an art form, a quality as in "The quality of mercy is not strained."

Subtraction is taking away, deducting as in income tax. It's a mathematical process somewhat less fun than addition and more fun than the multiplication table.

Extraction is a tricky one. Sometimes it denotes origin, lineage, descent. Other times it is what is known in dentistry as pulling a tooth.

FINALLY, at least for the purpose of this discussion, there comes up the little old word **retraction**.

It is particularly repulsive word in the fourth estate (newspaper world).

Retraction means literally to draw back and is usually defined as taking back of a statement, charge, or promise.

Reporters hate the word. Editors hate it. And columnists hate it too. It makes of mistakes which reporters, editors, and columnists like wise — hate like the pox. And hate even worse to admit either out loud or in print.

THAT IS WHY this column refuses to print a retraction.

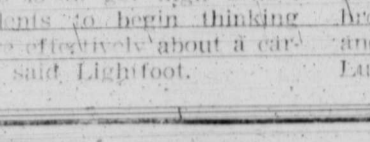

WORKABLE PLAN
Dockey has accomplished it all with a practical, workable manner.

"He handles the entire operation himself. He admits it is a tough, hard racket he is trying."

"But I haven't had a borrow very much money as I have moved along," he says proudly, "and I'm spreading it out... not doing it all in one year."

"I'm looking toward the goal when this place will run 100 head of cattle."

PROGRESS SHOWS
The conservation-farmers and ranchers, who selected him for the district's comeback award believe his progress shows plenty.

"They not only see conservation practices on the ground, but the post hole digging, the wire stretching and all the rest Dockey has accomplished with his own bare hands."

"He has done this himself," he said, "and when he is hiring hands, he was there to see the work was done the way he wanted it."

"His personal attention to the jobs has kept the supplies moving and those hourly workers on the job at a minimum expense. And this is important."

GRASS RECOVERY
His grass has made splendid recovery, and utilization of rainfall has benefited both crop and range. The use of iron sulfate for the blue ice has paid off handsomely.

In order to keep livestock in balance with feed, Dockey is using a key grass - (side oats gramma or plains bristle) - in particular pasture. He attempts to have 50 per cent of that key grass left by April 1, and when he does, the other grasses will take care of themselves.

He utilizes a summer supplemental and winter annual forage crop with small grains and sorghums. This is a key point for surviving "drought" periods, just as his herd development so that he has the flexibility of disposing carcasses. Livestock in hardship periods instead of losing key herd animals.
