# Taylor named new police chief

Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery officially resigned Monday and Patrick Taylor, 15-year veteran police officer, was appointed the new chief of police by the city manager.

City Manager Steve Shutt announced the resignation and Taylor's appointment during Tuesday night's city council meeting.

Montgomery's resignation will be effective January 31 and Lt. Taylor will assume the police chief post January 31 at midnight, Shutt said.

Montgomery has accepted the

position of police chief in Groesbeck, Texas.

The city council approved Taylor's promotion following an hour-long executive session at the beginning of Tuesday's meeting. The city charter requires the city manager to appoint all department heads subject to the approval of the city council.

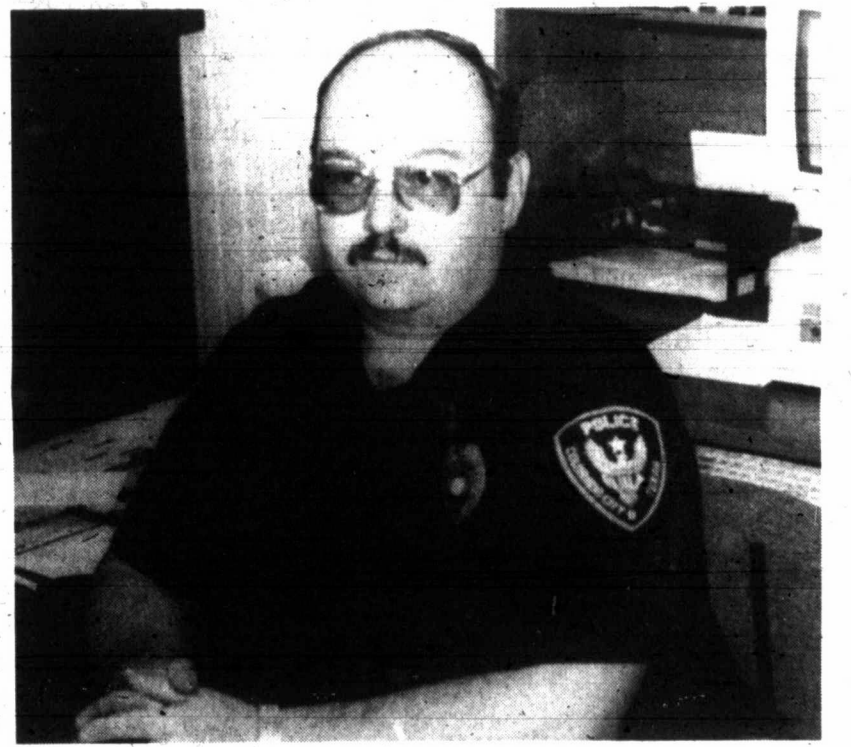
Taylor, who has been with the Colorado City Police Department since July 1982, started as a patrolman under Police Chief Ed Wheat and worked his way up through the ranks of the Colorado City

Police Department. He was promoted to sergeant and in 1986 was promoted to police lieutenant by Police Chief Bobby Sparks.

Taylor is originally from Colorado. His brother is a retired police lieutenant in Colorado. Taylor's wife, Brenda, a native of Colorado City, is a teacher's aide at Colorado High School. The couple have two children, Bethany, 13, and Rick, 12.

He graduated from the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Academy in Midland and has

# Overcrowded jail causes problems with certification

Too many prisoners and too few jailers for a two-floor jail are adding up to problems for Mitchell County.

The state's Jail Commission failed to certify the Mitchell County Jail during an inspection Jan. 8.

According to the inspector, the jail did not have an adequate number of jailers to cover the prisoners housed on the two floors of the county jail.

From June 1996, the prisoner population at the county jail has jumped from an average of 13 prisoners at a time to 16 to 22, said Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs.

The jail can hold a maximum of 27 prisoners, so the increased number of prisoners would not be such a problem if the jail were on one floor. According to the state's Commission on Jail Standards, a jailer is allowed to supervise as many as 48 prisoners if they are all on the same floor. However, the two-story county jail was built in 1957 before regulations stated that one jailer could not watch prisoners on two floors at a time.

Gradually, small towns around the state that also built two-story jails are replacing them with modern one-level structures.

Sheriff Toombs discussed the problem with Mitchell County commissioners during Monday's court meeting and was advised by the commissioners to allow the county jailers to work overtime rather than hire another county employee.

During the county budget workshop in August, the commissioners had told the sheriff to hold down the amount of overtime being worked by sheriff's deputies.

The commissioners noted Monday that eventually it would be necessary to replace the current jail facility.

There were 90 deaths, 74 births and 61 marriages in Mitchell County in 1996, according to Mitchell County Clerk Debby Carlock.

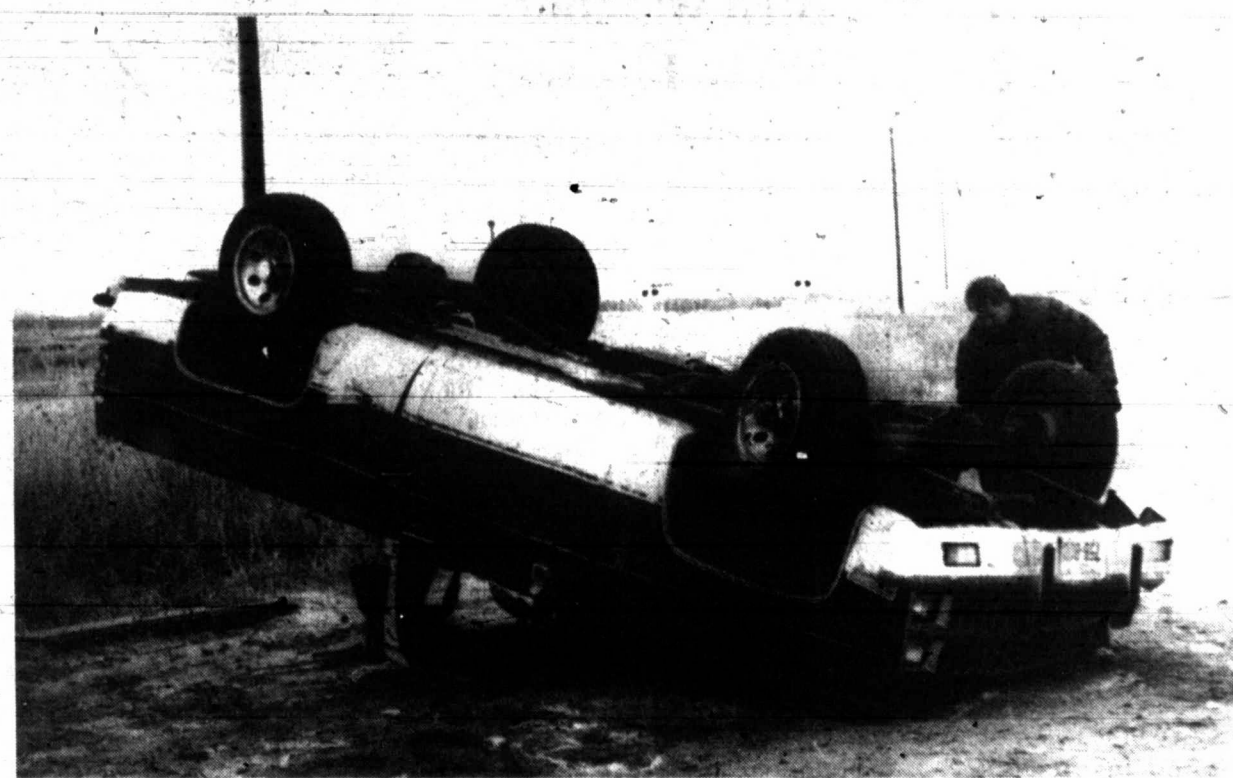
A committee made up of representatives from the city, county, school district and chamber of commerce has been proposed, Anderson said.

# Icy road conditions keep officers busy

A 22-year-old Colorado City man suffered minor injuries in the accident Tuesday. Driving was very hazardous throughout the county after a light mist fell Monday night on snow covered streets and roadways. By Tuesday, Mitchell County had had four days of sub-freezing temperatures.

Deceptively, icy roadways throughout the county led to a rash of traffic accidents during the day Tuesday.

A total of three people suffered minor injuries from five accidents that occurred from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Russell Conkling, who worked four accidents during that time period, said, "Every accident today has been due to the icy conditions. People see that the roadway is black and they can't see that there's a sheet of ice over it. Some people aren't slowing down at all," he said.

Mitchell County Sheriff's department and Department of Public Safety Troopers worked the following accidents during the day Tuesday. Three of the accidents occurred almost simultaneously around 11:30 a.m.

"A pickup ran off CR2836 in the Lake Colorado City area and rolled over. Gene Roy Rogers, 22, of Colorado City was treated for minor injuries at Mitchell

# Wood's Boots leads the way on the World Wide Web

This is the first in a series on how the Internet, the World Wide Web and e-mail are impacting Mitchell Countians—how the new technology is dramatically changing the way people conduct their business and personal lives.

The series will look at some of the different routes local people are taking on the information superhighway. For some, the Internet is enhancing and changing the way they do business. Others are connecting with people from around the world while others are finding a number of uses for the wealth of information that's now available.

## WOOD'S BOOTS LEADS

Wood's Boots is way ahead of most retail businesses in the country and the world with one of the largest commercial sites on the Internet. They're leaders in Shopping Cart technology with a total of almost 150 pages on the Internet. Of the pages, 138 are catalog pages enabling shoppers from around the world to choose and order not only boots but the many types of western wear they carry such as hats, belts and buckles, jewelry, etc.

Their boot store in Lubbock has a Web site and a site for the Odessa store is under construction. Wood's Shoes will also eventually have its own site.

"By starting now, we have the jump on everybody," said Jeremiah Wood, who is in charge of the Internet aspect of the family-owned and operated business.

The large boot manufacturers, such as Tony Lama, are beginning to have their own Home Pages and currently there are only a few boot companies that have gone online. Wood's Boots' competitors are nowhere near the size of the Wood's Boots site. For example, Allen's Boots, based in Austin, only has three boot brands at its site.

The Wood's Boots catalog is entertaining reading as well as being convenient shopping. Graphically, the pages have a western flair and are interspersed with tidbits of information about Texas.

The Texas trivia is taken from the book "Life is Tod Short Not To Live it As a Texan" and includes everything from Texas bumper stickers, to favorite Texas pastimes. An example of one of the pastimes is "driving around back roads to see the hills covered with bright spring bluebonnets."

There's a page on the fascinating history of the state capital, Austin.

Wood started by traveling around West Texas for seven years in an old school bus filled with boots and how the original Wood's Boots store began in a modest 30' x 50' building handling less than 500 pairs of boots. Thirty-two years later, they now have four stores.

One of the pictures at the site is of Billy Joe Wood with one of his famous customers, former Texas Governor Ann Richards. As noted in the text, their merchandise has been worn by many celebrities. For instance, the hats in the movie "City Slickers" came from Boot City.

Wood's Boots is linked with other sites such as the one for "Texas Monthly" magazine. While reading "Texas Monthly" on the Internet, readers can click on the link that takes them directly to the Wood's Boots site.

Wood's Boots first went online about two months ago. Since then, they've had 70 people from all over the U.S. and the world register that they've visited the site—people from Germany, Brazil, Japan, Mexico, Canada and the Bahamas as well as various states in the U.S. including South Carolina, Oklahoma, Ohio, Kentucky, California, New York, Ohio, Minnesota, Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas and all over Texas.

Although Nadine Pierson's business has her traveling a lot, she still finds time for cooking. She baked her first cake from scratch at the age of nine and has enjoyed making desserts ever since. Because she married when she was 15, her knowledge of cooking was put to use at a young age.

### So Easy Peanut Butter Cookies

- 1 egg beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup peanut butter

Scoop up with spoon and form into ball. Put on ungreased cookie sheet and flatten with tines of fork to make design. Bake at 400° for 8 minutes. Remove from cookie sheet while warm.

### Brownie Cake

#### CAKE:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 sticks butter
- 1 cup cocoa
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 2 eggs beaten
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

#### ICING:

- 1 stick margarine
- 6 tablespoons milk
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 pound powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix 2 cups flour and 2 cups sugar in large bowl. In saucepan, melt 2 sticks butter and 1 cup plus 4 tablespoons cocoa. Pour over flour mixture and stir. Next, beat 2 eggs and add to 1/2 cup buttermilk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add to flour mixture and stir. Stir in 1 teaspoon soda and pour into 9"x13" pan. Bake 25 minutes at 425°. 5 minutes before done, melt 1 stick margarine, 6 tablespoons milk and 4 tablespoons cocoa. Add 1 pound powdered sugar and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour over cake as soon as it comes out of oven. Sprinkle with chopped pecans. Keeps very well but is wonderful warm!

### Buttermilk Pie

- 1 9" pie crust
- 4 eggs beaten
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup butter melted and cooled
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat eggs in bowl. Add other ingredients. Mix well. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

## Bird watchers brave blustery winter weather

The Big Spring Bird Watchers recently weathered the cold blustering winds to work on the 97th Christmas Bird Count for Howard County. Nine observers spent the day counting and looking for birds, seven from Big Spring and two from Midland.

According to Big Spring resident Pat Simmons, there were 93 species recorded with a total of 16,838 individual birds counted. The majority of those were Sandhill Cranes, which, along with waterfowl, have been exceptional in number this year.

Ten Evening Grosbeaks, a variety not usually found in this area, were spotted at the Country Club golf course, and 272 Mountain Bluebirds were counted.

Each group covers as much of a designated circle 15 miles in diameter as possible within a 24-hour period.

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

I don't collect autographs but I do have two of them. One is that of Dallas Cowboy great Roger Staubach, the other was given to me by George Mahon. Staubach autographed a photograph which was mailed to me by a mutual friend, but I never got to meet the football star.

Mr. Mahon signed a book for me ("to Jim Baum with every good wish, from George Mahon, July 2, 1985"). I almost didn't get to meet him.

This story starts in church one Sunday in March of 1981. Because the building was a little warm, I may have been dozing. That is, until I heard the minister say, "It's good to have George and Helen Mahon back in Colorado City worshipping with us today."

Now wide awake, I looked in the direction of the Mahons and made a mental note to contact him the next day for an interview. Easier said than done. Finding the retired congressman was no problem; getting him to agree to an interview was something else.

"Well now, I really like to let those other fellas up there take the spotlight," I heard Mr. Mahon reply over the phone after I had asked for some of his time the next day. The "other fellas" were the men he left behind in Congress when he called it a career in 1979.

"This is just a little bull session," I persisted. "Just some of your recollections of the 44 years you served in Congress." He hesitated. Then said haltingly, "How long will this take?"

"Not more than twelve minutes," I replied, knowing I had fudged 30 or 45 minutes.

"And this is what radio station? KVMC?"

"Yes sir, KVMC here in Colorado City."

Another pause. Then, "Well, if it's the local radio station [emphasis on local], come on over," he said. But not with much enthusiasm.

Nominated students will be screened with special testing for which parents are required to give their consent.

Ten minutes later we were eyeball-to-eyeball with only a tape recorder between us. This was my introduction to George Mahon, elected 22 times to the U.S. Congress, former chairman of the power House Appropriations Committee and at one time, fifth in line for the presidency!

Mr. Mahon was raised in Mitchell County and served as district attorney for this 32nd Judicial District before running for Congress. He and his wife, Helen, eventually retired in Colorado City after he had served 44 years in Congress. (They owned their home at 1341 Chestnut throughout that time.)

As he and I began recording the interview, I think he may have suspected I was a newsman trying to come up with some sort of scoop. He could have relaxed. I was more fan than newsman.

At first he was slightly uneasy, but soon the answers were coming easily and quickly. He talked about serving with eight different presidents! ("I was once asked what's it like to serve under eight presidents. I said, I never served under any president. I served with eight.")

He was proud his name is on the moon. As chairman of the Appropriations Committee, he was cited on a plaque left on the moon by astronaut Neil Armstrong. He talked about supporting President Truman's decision to end World War II by dropping the atomic bomb on Japan. (Mr. Mahon was only one of a handful of Americans who knew we had the bomb!) All pretty heady stuff for a guy from Loraine, Texas.

By the time we wrapped up the first interview he was enjoying the reminiscing. After I turned off the tape recorder, the two of us leaned back and just talked about politics. Several minutes later he started telling about a time in the 1950s when he and some other congressmen made a trip to Communist China, as it was known then.

"Do you want to hear this story?" I was startled to hear him ask. Fearing I hadn't been paying enough attention, I stammered, "Well, y-y-yes."

"Then turn on your tape machine," he said with a smile as he pointed to the recorder. We were off and running with more priceless firsthand memories from the man who "walked with presidents and kings, yet never lost the common touch," as one person said in describing Mr. Mahon.

We talked about the Kennedy assassination (he came to Texas on the same plane as the Kennedys), he discussed his relationship with President Eisenhower ("it was wonderful") and he answered the question, would he change anything he did if he could go back and do it again.

"I know I did the best I could under the circumstance," he replied. "I don't know that I would want to re-write my part in the history of that period."

During that recording session he told about securing funding for a veteran's hospital in Big Spring. President Truman had cut out the expenditure and Mr. Mahon made an appointment to talk with his longtime friend. (The Mahons and Trumans were family friends dating back to the 1930s.) Now, shortly after Truman became president, Mr. Mahon visited the oval office.

"Harry," the congressman began. "Excuse me, Mr. President, we need that veterans hospital in West Texas," he continued. When Mr. Mahon had finished, he said the president looked at him and said, "George, when you tell me you need something, I know it's a necessity. I'll put the appropriation back in the budget." And he did. Through the years, the Big Spring V.A. Hospital has been a godsend for veterans throughout this area.

I'm glad I asked George Mahon to autograph the book, *One Honest Man*. It was a pleasure to get to know him, as I later did, and it's made for pleasant memories to know a man whose performances equalled, or exceeded his stellar reputation.

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

"Eventually it will be like having another store," Wood said. He noted that the merchandise on the Web site is slightly different from what's in the local store. For instance, there are more pointed toe boots on their Web site since that style is preferred by customers who live outside West Texas.

Although the Internet aspect of their business is very new, Wood said it's already enhancing their mail order business and bringing in new customers. At least 10 new customers have made purchases from the Internet catalog since the catalog went online.

**SHOPPING CART TECHNOLOGY**

A recent study by MasterCard found that approximately 75 percent of the 19 percent of U.S. consumers using the Internet are male and those males are living in households where the income is \$50,000 and above.

The studies are showing that convenience is the main reason people are shopping on the Internet. Shoppers may purchase from retailers anywhere in the world, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. They can shop in the privacy of their homes and can easily compare prices of one item to another.

A noted futurist with SRI International, Watts Wacker, said "Internet commerce is clearly in its infancy since only one percent of U.S. consumers are currently purchasing items online. However, with approximately one-third of American consumers planning to access the Internet over the next year, online shopping is likely to grow significantly and have a major impact on the retail industry."

To shop at Wood's Boots on the Internet, visitors to the site click on either boots, hats, belts and buckles, jewelry or workboots, etc. If they click on boots, they can then click on the various manufacturers such as Tony Lama, Justin, etc., which will then list the types of boots available. Each different type has its own page with colors, sizes, description and price.

Once someone has finished shopping, they can click on "checkout stand" and they're given various options for ordering either directly on the Internet by providing their credit card number, by faxing an order, or calling their 1-800 phone number.

While this type of shopping is a new concept, people who have access to the Internet are comfortable with it, said Wood. Those who are unfamiliar with the technology are the most apprehensive about using their credit cards for Internet shopping.

"It's said that it's about as difficult to tap into a phone line as it is to illegally get credit information from the Internet," said Wood.

**DESIGNING A WEB PAGE**

Jeremiah Wood first started thinking seriously about moving the family business online last year. While on a honeymoon cruise, he sat next to a man in the dining room whose business was designing Web pages. They talked at length about the commercial benefits of the new technology. Wood's Boots later got Internet service, but it wasn't until CyberTex began offering local service this summer that Wood's ideas about a catalog began to take shape.

The CyberTex owners, Coalen Swann and Kirby Scott, arranged a meeting between the Woods family and people from Leapfrog, Inc., an Abilene-based company that designs Web pages.

It took about two months to get the Web site designed. "The original one was very different from what we have now," said Jeremiah Wood. "We picked out the merchandise we wanted on the catalog. They designed the pages and came back to us for approval. We had lots of corrections and changes. Then we proofed the final pages."

Wood said that designing the page was the biggest cost of the endeavor. The business is charged by the number of megabytes used, averaging about \$100 per page. Once the page or pages are designed, then the business is charged a per month fee which is about \$75, Wood said. Leapfrog, Inc. offers classes so their customers can design their own pages. Jeremiah Wood is designing the page for the Wood's Shoes business and updating the Wood's Boots catalog which will be expanded to include moccasins, clothes, more belts and boots.

He's found that he can download clip art from the Internet to use for the page graphics.

"You can design Web pages on the computer, upload it on the Internet host's server with a file transfer program and then it's there for the world to see," said Wood.

Jeremiah said he spends about two to three hours a day on the Internet for business and personal use. Most of his time is spent updating the catalog and checking out competitors.

Wood has found that the Internet catalog has many advantages over the regular print catalog.

"A print catalog is said to have a shelf life of seven to ten days, and once it's printed, you can't easily make changes," he said. "If we got a boot in today, we can have it on the Internet in two to three days; whereas to put it in a print catalog would take at least several months."

Actually deciding to put the catalog on the Internet was a joint family decision, said Wood.

His grandfather, Billy Joe Wood, who founded the company with his wife Berniece, had never used Internet. However, he was more excited about the possibilities than anyone.

"He could see that it's the wave of the future," said Berniece Wood. The state-of-the-art technology of the Internet is changing rapidly.

"We want to keep up and stay on top of this new technology. We're competing in the world wide market now," said Wood.

acquired almost 500 hours of miscellaneous in-service training during his 15 years with the department. He completed all three levels of law enforcement management training through attending Texas A & M, Sam Houston State College and Texas Women's University. According to the report, 87 births were recorded in Mitchell County in 1995. During that year, 56 of the births were in Colorado City and 31 from the remainder of the county. The report showed that 44 of the newborns were Hispanic, 41 were white and two were black.

According to the report, in 1995 there were no infant or maternal deaths in Mitchell County. There were two fetal deaths and two perinatal deaths. According to TDH, fetal death registration in Texas is required only for those cases with a gestation of 20 weeks or more. Perinatal is the period from 20 weeks gestation through 27 days after birth.

There were 131 deaths in 1995 in Mitchell County. Colorado City had 81 deaths while the remainder of the county had 50. In the county, 115 of those who died were white, nine were Hispanic and seven were black.

Marriages in Mitchell County outnumbered divorces in 1995. According to the Texas Dept. of Health report, there were 61 marriages and 50 divorces.

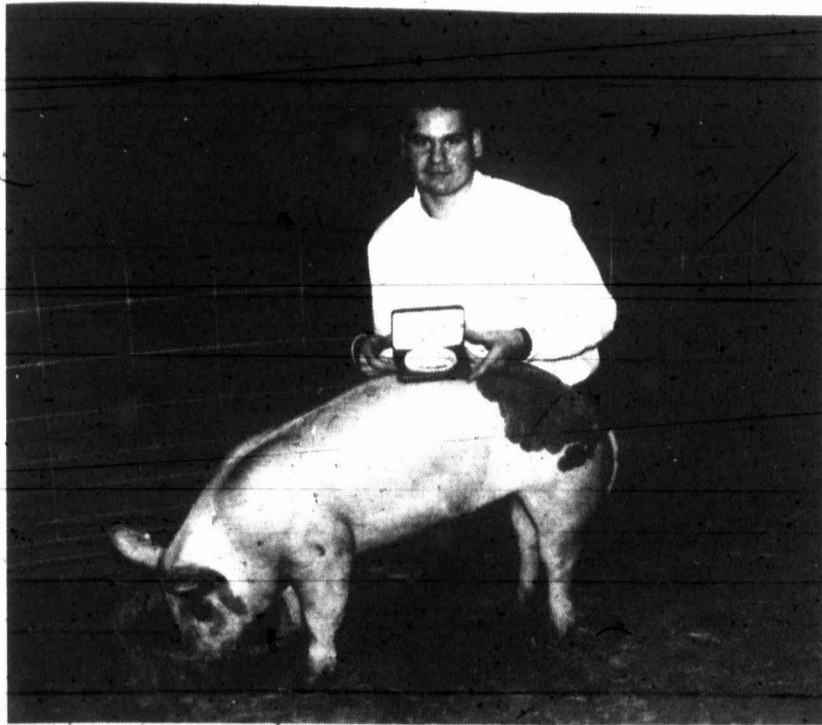

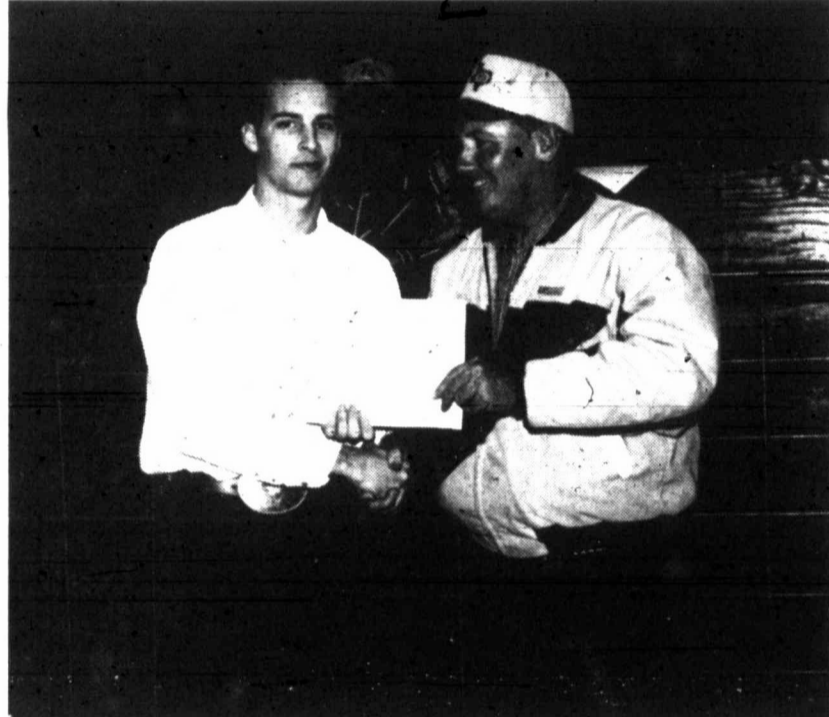

## Driver's education fees to increase at CISD

Fees for the Colorado driver's education class at the district high school will increase following school board action Monday night.

The Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees unanimously voted during the regular monthly board meeting to increase tuition for the course from \$140 to \$155.

The driver education policy,

was amended because of a report that the program had a loss of \$3,179 during the 1995-96 school year.

Revenues last year totaled \$7,135 while expenditures totaled \$10,314.47. Expenditures included \$6,000 for salaries; \$3,285 for rental of a vehicle at \$15/day; gas-\$306; parts-\$21, supplies \$224 and insurance \$376.

The classroom phase of the driver education program begins January 20 and ends no later than February 28. Instruction includes 34 hours of classroom instruction, seven hours of in-car instruction and seven hours of in-car observation.

The fees paid to instructors teaching in-car instruction will increase from \$65 to \$75 per student completing the course,

according to the new policy.

In other business, the board extended CISD Superintendent Russell Merket's multi-year administrator contract for one year with an expiration date of June 30, 2000.

The board also discussed the CISD building programs and approved calling for bids for renovations at Kelley Elementary and Hutchinson Elementary.

At Kelley, further renovations are planned to make the restrooms handicapped accessible, on the heating system to the restrooms and the addition of handicapped ramps.

Renovations last year have focused on Kelley and construction of the activity building is expected to be completed within 60 days, Superintendent Merket said.

Planned renovations at Hutchinson are divided into three phases. Following board approval Monday, the district will seek bids for phase one which includes restroom renovations as the heating and air conditioning to the restrooms, floor tiles and handicapped accessibility. Landscaping, including the addition of trees, is planned for phase one.





## First sales tax rebates for 1997 received

Sales tax rebate checks were received this past week by the local sales taxing authorities.

Colorado City received \$25,353.85 this month, a decrease of 5.23 percent from the \$26,753.58 received in January 1996. Loraine saw the largest decrease in rebates made to Mitchell County towns, receiving \$118.44, a 69.64 decrease from the \$390.12 received last year.

The January 1996 payment of \$11,548.61 Snyder, Sweetwater and Big Spring saw little change this year from rebates received last January. Snyder received \$111,463.41, a gain of 1.21 percent from last year.

The rebate sent to Sweetwater was down 2.96 percent from last year's, totaling \$115,976.87. Big Spring's rebate of \$240,941.09 was a drop of 4.27 percent from last year.

Westbrook's sales tax rebate of \$625.64 was \$412.68 less than the payment of \$1,038 received last year at this time and represents a 39.74 percent decrease.

Sales tax rebate payments to cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly filers in November at the beginning of the holiday shopping season and reported to the state comptroller's office in December.


