Statistics Prove Seniors 1958-59 Superior Students

Approximately 37 per cent of the Senior Class of 1958-59 are above average in I. Q., as based on statistics compiled in C. A. Carroll's office.

One hundred per cent of this class will have graduated with four years of English, which is far above the national average.

Sixty per cent of the seniors have taken social studies for three years.

Forty per cent of the Senior Class have taken two years of social studies.

Only five per cent of the Senior Class have taken four years of science.

Forty-five per cent of the seniors have taken three years of science.

Two years of science have been completed by 30 per cent of the seniors.

One year of science was completed by 20 per cent of the Senior Class.

Thirty-five per cent of the Senior Class have taken four years of math.

Three years of math have been completed by 60 per cent of the seniors.

Only five per cent of the Senior Class have taken two years of math.

Ninety per cent of these students will graduate with 19 or more credits, 18 are required for graduation.

Sixty-five per cent of these students are on the Honor Roll for the first six weeks of the present semester.

None of these students has failed a subject while in high school.

Twenty-five per cent of these students are on the football team, and all made the Honor Roll for the first six weeks.

There are 55 members of the Senior Class.

Spur Rakes Crane 30-8 For Bi-District Crown

The gallant Golden Cranes fell beneath the powerful paws of the big Bulldogs of Spur 30-8 here Friday night before an estimated crowd of some 3,000 fans, thus bowing out of the race for renown.

Even so, the Cranes had withstood four more district foes than the experts had predicted, coming out with the championship of District 4-AA, plus a 7-2-2 record.

Crane's only score came on a keeper by quarterback Scott Coffield who tallied from four yards out. Despite stout play and even bursts of brilliance on both offense and defense by all Cranes concerned, big Joe Copeland, bolstered by a still bigger forward wall, proved it was the Bulldogs' night to howl. Furthermore the Bulldogs kickoff return touchdown opening the second half proved

a shocker from which the Cranes didn't completely recover. This puts Spur in the play-offs for Regional against Abenathy next week.

The game was distinguished by clean, hard football played by two excellently conditioned teams, with the bigger one getting the edge.

Rounding out their high school careers, and brilliant ones, were co-captains Larry Stiger and Tom Coffield Jerry Mills, Winston Freeman, Leonard Ivy and Johnny Griffin.

State Supervisor Here Compliments Food Highly Requests Milk Over Tea

The State Supervisor from Austin visited the Crane Public Schools November 13. She complimented the food very highly. She also complimented the orderly manner in which the students went through the cafeteria lines.

Students are requested to drink more milk. One objection made by the supervisor was that high school students drink more tea than milk. In fact, Crane school is the only school in Texas that offers tea to high school students. Students are recommended to eat more variety of food instead of eating the same thing.

The government furnishes five cents for each plate with milk and frozen turkeys and such commodities as canned apples, flour, sugar and etc. During the year 1957-58 the government subsidized \$6,325.98, over and above the commodities to the Crane cafeteria. The government also pays four cents on each second carton of milk bought by students while the school pays 6 cents and students pay three cents apiece or five cents for two cartons.

The Crane school cafeteria spent from \$2,500 to \$3,000 last year for food served.

Orange Juice and milk are served to approximately 20 to 40 grade school students who ride buses on long runs.

Journalism Staff Gets Addresser

The machine will use the same tape all year long which will eliminate loss of addresses.

The next problem facing the staff is to learn how to use the machine. Paul Patterson has been practicing, but the addresser still has him stumped. Maybe he will catch on how to address it after experimenting on 250 papers.

The Master of Ceremonies was Jerry Swift Chairman of District 6 4-H Council.

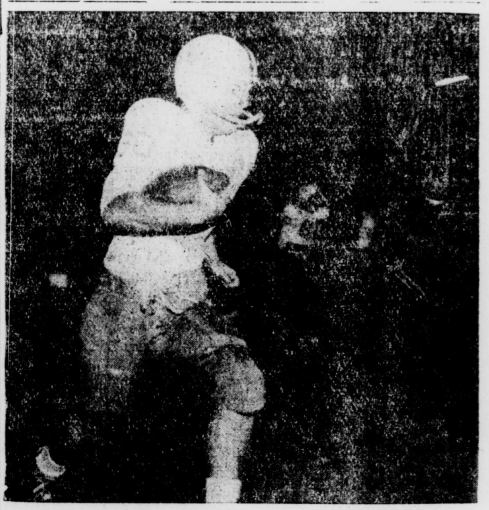
