Around 2 Million Workers Are Building Social Security

Almost 2 million hired farm workers are now building social security credit toward future benefits for themselves and their families. But, according to Erven Fisher, social security district manager, many others who should be getting credit toward old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits, are failing to do so.

Mr. Fisher said that a farm worker is covered by social security if he is paid \$150 cash wages or more in a year by an employer, or if he works for an employer on 20 or more days on a time, rather than a piece work basis. In either of these two situations, the employer is required by law to report the worker's earnings and pay the social security taxes due.

These reports are due in January of each year, Mr. Fisher said. But, right now, in the growing season, the farm employer needs to make sure that he is keeping a record of the people he hires so that he will be in a position to make his report when January rolls around.

HERMLEIGH BOY CROSSES EQUATOR

USS Providence (FHTNC) - Michael F. Fuller, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lest T. Fuller of Route 1, Hermleigh, Texas, was among 1,000 crewmen of the guided missile light cruiser USS Providence who were initiated into the "Shellbacks" league upon their first crossing of the Equator.

The Providence crossed the Equator at 105.5 degrees east longitude, west of Borneo and east of Sumatra and enroute to Singapore and the Federation of Malaya.

The custom of initiating "pollywogs" into "shellbacks" is an old Navy tradition. The story goes back to the time of Lord Ericson and his Vikings, when the crew members were harsh and painful and designed to test a man's ability to withstand the hardships of life at sea.

As time passed the ceremony changed to an elaborate ritual into the mysteries of the deep and presentation of the novice to King Neptune and his court. This is usually followed by the trial of the "pollywog" for his numerous shortcomings. Punishment is meted out for the offenses. The ceremony is climaxed when the "pollywog" is tossed into a salt-water tank to learn proper respect for King Neptune and the traditions of the sea.

Oldest "shellback" aboard for the ceremonies was VADM. T. H. Moore, USN, Commander Seventh Fleet of which the Providence is the flagship. He was initiated in 1935.

The Providence is currently operating with the Seventh Fleet in the Far East.

County Soil District Enters Competition

Mitchell County Soil Conservation district has entered the 17th annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 52 conservation districts, according to M. A. Dummahoo, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio.

CONSERVATIONISTS HOLD FIELD MEETING AT PECOS

Thirty members of the Texas Great Plains Conservation Program Committee, representing most of the agencies, groups and associations working in the field of soil and water conservation, met in the Pecos area June 26 and 27, reported H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

The occasion was the annual field meeting of the committee when results and experiences of the past year are discussed and recommendations for improvement of the program are made.

George Skeete, rancher near Water Valley and director of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts explained that the principle of the GPCP, where cost share assistance is provided in accordance with a complete conservation plan developed for the entire operating unit and scheduled for application on a systematic basis, has proved to be the best demonstration and educational tool for soil and water conservation to date. Skeete explained that management must accompany any treatment applied if it produced the greatest return and was to be maintained over a long period of time.

Jack Stone, supervisor of the Toyah-Limpia Soil Conservation District, talked to the group and showed pictures of the work done on his ranch with Great Plains Conservation Program assistance. Stone explained how he spread runoff water over flat draw-type ground that had been rootplowed and seeded to such grasses as Johnson and blue panicum. Stone stated that he was very proud of the results and invited the group to tour his ranch.

E. L. Thaxton, head of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Pecos, explained the research work being carried on there and conducted a tour of the station for the committee.

James Abbott of the Soil Conservation Service reported on progress and accomplishments of the Great Plains Conservation Program. He said that approximately 900 contracts had been signed since July 1, 1962, obligating just under three million dollars on over a million acres of farm and ranch land. It was also noted that the Soil Conservation Service had about 300 proposed contracts on hand for which cost-share funds would not be available before July 1. This backlog of contracts illustrates the tremendous build-up in interest in the Great Plains Conservation Program that has taken place in the past four or five years.

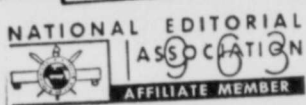

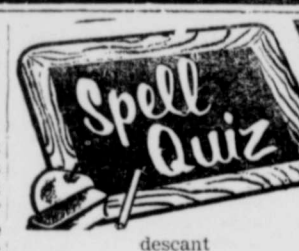

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. A veteran has asked me as
his personal physician to get a re-
port of the VA x-ray and labora-
tory studies made at a recent ex-
amination. How can I get this
information from the VA?

A. You may secure Form 3288
from the Veterans Administration
which will authorize the release
of information from the veteran's
records. Or the veteran concern-
ed may send to the VA a written
statement granting permission to
release the information to the
doctor.

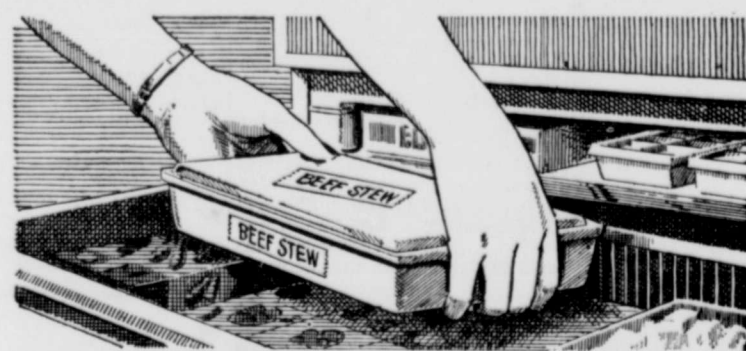
Q. Are members of my immedi-
ate family eligible for VA hospi-
talization?

A. Veterans only are eligible to
receive care in a VA hospital.
First priority goes to veterans
with service-connected disabilities
after that service men without
service-connected disabilities who
are unable to pay for hospital
care.

Q. Can I make a reservation for
burial plot in a national ceme-
tery?

A. Burial plots are assigned at
the time of the funeral. No ad-
vance reservations are made.
Once the plot has been assigned it
is understood that the wife (or
the veteran if the wife is already
buried there) will be buried there
when the later death takes place.
In certain cases a child may be
buried there.
