Questions and Answers

Q. I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I'm drawing Civil Service retirement benefits based on my husband's employment in the Government. Am I supposed to count this money, in figuring my annual income for the purpose of getting a VA pension?

A. Yes. The retirement benefits, which you get on the basis of your husband's employment, must be considered in determining whether your annual income comes within the ceilings set by law for VA pension purposes.

Q. I've just gotten out of service and I've gone to work with an aircraft company as a test pilot. I plan to take out the special term insurance for Korean veterans, but first I want to know if the policy contains any restrictions as to hazardous occupations.

A. Your GI insurance policy contains no restrictions as to hazardous occupations. You may engage in any job without altering the terms of your contract or the amount of your premiums.

Q. I understand that under the Korean GI Bill night law courses are counted as part-time training, and may not be measured as more than three-quarters time. Are there any exceptions?

A. Yes. Night law courses approved as full-time courses under standards set by the American Bar Association may be considered as full-time training for purposes of the Korean GI Bill.

Q. How much money will VA pay a veteran taking correspondence training under the Korean GI Bill?

A. VA will pay the established charge which the correspondence school requires nonveterans to pay for the same course.

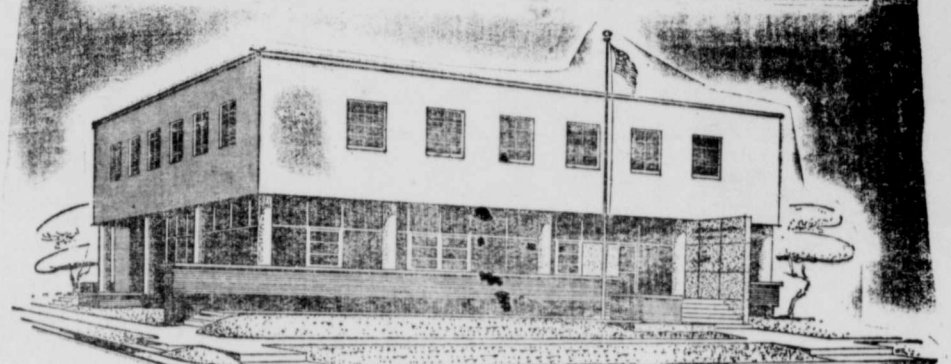

Revenue Chief Joins Dallas Bank



John B. Dunlap, former Commissioner of Internal Revenue of the United States, has been elected vice-president of the Dallas National Bank, president Blagden Manning has announced. While Commissioner, Dunlap directed the nation-wide reorganization of the Internal Revenue Bureau and the streamlining of the country's tax collection methods. More recently he served as Revenue Commissioner of the Dallas District and resigned that post to accept the Vice-presidency of the Dallas National Bank. A life-long resident of Dallas, except for periods of military and government service, Dunlap was honored by Southern Methodist University in 1953 with its Distinguished Alumni Award. He rose through the ranks from a private in the Texas National Guard to Brigadier General and served in World War II.

The Horror of Famines

There is nothing new under the sun. History can be rightly called "a study of parallels" and particularly in regard to the present record-breaking drought. Bad as the prolonged dry spell has been, we can take refuge in the fact that disasters, either local or national, bring out the humanitarian instincts of the more fortunate. As a result, tragedy is averted through gifts, loans and other economic means. But this was not always so. Recent studies show that man has sometimes had to resort to cannibalism in order to live through the famines following great droughts.

In a story released by the Associated Press recently, Arthur Edson reports on a study of age-old droughts made by Julius Allen of the Library of Congress. Edson quotes Allen as saying famines also have been the cause of wars, migrations, revolutions and Communism.

"India and China, near starvation level even when things are at their best, have been hardest hit," Edson writes. "The University of Nanking figures that China has had 1,829 famines in the past 2,000 years. 'Famines have been no respecter of geography. Some 650 famines have been recorded in Europe. In 936, in Scotland, people began to devour one another.' During that same time, the Irish sold their children for food."

the Egyptian famine of 1664-1672, according to Edson.

"The wretched resorted to cannibalism, and organized bands kidnaped the unwary passenger in the desolate streets, principally by means of ropes furnished with hooks and let down from the latticed windows." "Even the more statistics are awesome: five million dead in the Indian famine of 1876-78; 9½ million dead in North China in the same period, and 12 million dead of starvation during the Russian Revolution.

"The first written account of a drought remains one of the best. Two thousand years before the time of Abraham, a drought struck Egypt. The king, Toserthus, left his report on it, and any Texas or Oklahoma farmer will know how he felt. 'I am mourning on my high throne for the vast misfortunes because the Nile flood has not come for seven years. Light is the grain; there is lack of crops and of all kinds of food.'

"Each man has become a thief to his neighbor. They desire to hasten and cannot walk. The child cries, and the youth creeps along, and the old man; their souls are bowed down." Edson ends his story with Toserthus' note of almost complete desperation: "'Torn open are the chests of provisions, but instead of contents there is air. Everything is exhausted.'"

Mitchell County Soil Conservation News



Review of Terrace Systems in Lorraine-Hermleigh Area After 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 Inch Rain

Technicians from the Soil Conservation Service stationed at Colorado City reviewed 90 to 100 terrace systems in the Lorraine-Hermleigh area last week after the heavy rains which fell in that area July 15th. The rainfall varied from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 inches and fell in less than one hour's duration. A summary of this review showed that a number of terraces were over-topped, some suffered breakage around ends, others lost most of the rainfall because of the terrace ends being wide open, and still others held all the rainfall without any damage to the terrace system. In all cases these terrace systems experiencing damage were a result of inadequate terraces both from the standpoint of base width, effective height, fills across low places, filled in channels above the terraces, and inadequate end blocks and closures. A few systems were damaged because the overhead water had not been taken care of.

On the other hand, those terrace systems which held the high intensity rainfall had good base width of 20 feet or more; they had sufficient effective height of 15 inches or more; they had ample terrace channel capacity of 12 to 15 square feet or more; they had all fills across low places up in good shape and level with the remainder of the terrace line; they had good end closures about 2 1/2 as large and high as the remainder of the line; and they had been well maintained through the years. This analysis showed that terrace breakage is caused by inadequate, improperly built and poorly maintained terraces rather than partial end closures. Several farmers had turned extra water into their terrace systems from adjoining road ditches. With proper terrace size and construction they were able to hold the 2 inch rain which fell and they added to this another inch or more which would have been run-off otherwise. The old proverb that states that a chain is no stronger than its weakest link is certainly true in regard to a terrace system. Any weak terrace or weak place in a terrace, places an undue hazard on all lower lying terraces.

There is a great need in this soil conservation district for all old terraces to be corrected in such a manner that they will be brought up to the soil conservation district standards. The following standards are recognized as being the minimum requirements for a sound terrace system:

1. That all outside water entering the field be properly taken care of.
2. That terrace lines be properly surveyed by a competent engineer with dependable surveying equipment.
3. That the terrace lines be spaced at an approved spacing distance based on land slope, preferably the spacing formula should be average slope plus two divided by two.
4. That terrace lines be constructed exactly as the line is marked on the ground without undue cuts in the line to take out crookedness.
5. That the construction work be of first quality workmanship and that no weak places be left in the shoulders of the terraces.
6. That all low places be filled full bodied and the finished height in the low places will be above the height of the remainder of the line.
7. That proper end closures will be made on the terrace ends depending upon the slope of the land and permeability of the soil ranging from full end closures on flat land to 1/2 end closures on steeper slopes up to 3%. Channel type, open end terraces, with grassed outlets should be provided on land with slopes greater than 3%.
8. That the completed terraces have a base width of 20 feet or more above natural ground and an effective height of 15 inches or more above natural ground. The effective height is not checked from the center peak of the terrace but from a point 2

feet off center.

9. That the terraces be farmed followed a true contour of the land and that they be maintained from now on to the above standards or above.

It is estimated that there are at least 7000 miles of terraces needed to be developed to the above standards in the district. This figure represents 2 to 3 thousand miles of new terraces on land not previously terraced and 4 to 5 thousand miles of old terraces which need major overhaul corrections.

Guar Can Still Be Planted

With some rainfall in the district and prospects for additional showers it would be timely to plant some of those unplanted areas to soil improving crops and improve the land for next year's crop. Guar can still be planted with a good chance for it making seed as it matures in 120 days. If we should have an early frost and it failed to mature it would still be a wonderful help to the soil in adding nitrogen and humus to the soil for later crops. Guar can be planted as late as August 1st and still have time to make a good growth. This summer legume is well adapted to hot dry weather and can be planted with regular farm equipment in regular width rows at the rate of 6 to 7 pounds of seed per acre. Cotton and grain sorghum yields following guar in this same type of country have increased from 25 to 50 per cent. A local seed source is available and this crop can be planted for less than a dollar per acre. Would an extra 50 pounds of lint cotton per acre next year be worth investing a dollar per acre this year? Everyone with bare unplanted cropland is urged to plant some guar this week for soil improvement.

Irvin and Artis Grant, district cooperators in the South Butte area, are doing some good conservation work on their mixed sandy loam farm. They operate two quarter sections which is predominately a mixed sandy loam soil with some deeper sand. They planted a 5 acre dryland patch of alfalfa in the

fall of 1948. Through the years they figure they have averaged about 3 cuttings per year with an extra cutting in the more favorable years. The stand is weakening on this patch and they plan to follow this alfalfa with cotton next year to test the benefits of the alfalfa to the soil. They also seeded another 5 acre patch last fall to alfalfa using abuzzi rye as a nurse crop. This rye not only protected the alfalfa while it was getting established but it produced 250 bales of hay about the first week in May. The alfalfa is now in good production. They have a low seepy drainage way thru their farm which primarily grew up in weeds and trees. They have grubbed the trees and shaped the waterway and have seeded this area to alfalfa. This area is now being utilized for hay and will ultimately be used for grazing. They drilled an irrigation well late last summer and have been putting it to good use this dry year. This is a small well pumping about 250 gallons per minute but they have been able to irrigate the 10 acres of alfalfa and have a good start on 30 acres of cotton. They are having a soil analysis run on their cotton land to see if any minerals are needed in the soil in order to get maximum production. They plan to plant another 10 acres to alfalfa this fall along with some rye and other winter cover crops.
