The annual encampment of the home demonstration clubs of Knox, Haskell, Baylor counties was held in the Lea grove west of this city Monday and Tuesday of this week. 200 members registered during the forenoon and the program for the two days was begun.

In the club dress display there were 23 entries and Mrs. L. P. Jones, of the Munday club won first prize which was a scholarship to the A. and M. short course.

Mrs. R. M. Allmonroad of Gillespie club won second place and was given 100 No. 2 cans by the Jamison Clonts Hdw. Co. of this city.

Mrs. Oral Patterson of the Benjamin club won third place and received 100 cans from the firm of A. A. Clark of Truscott.

Mrs. C. M. Matlock of Munday also received honorable mention in the display. The dresses were all well tailored and scored high in workmanship. They were all made of cotton goods. The judges in this contest were the Misses Bess Edwards and Minnie Mae Grubbs of College Station.

Miss Edwards who is assistant State Demonstration Agent then gave a talk on the making of dresses and discussed the good parts of the ones displayed. Singing was also interspersed with the program all joining in the songs of Swing Low Sweet Chariot and Old Black Joe, which caused some mirth as well as relaxation. Miss Edwards also gave an interesting talk on the subject of "Leadership."

Mrs. Ike Simpson of the Blue Bonnet club, Haskell Co., Mrs. I. T. Wright, of Benjamin club, Knox Co., and Mrs. Russell Morris of Red Springs club, Baylor Co., winners in the Living Room Improvement contest were present and gave an account of the work done and the amount of money spent.

At the business session Mrs. Roy Jones, newly elected chairman of the encampment presided and Mrs. J. B. Smith, retiring chairman was also present. Mrs. Ernest Boss from the Post club, Haskell Co., was elected Secretary. Miss Grace Nelson, Knox Co. Home Demonstration Agent was also in attendance. Games and recreation were greatly enjoyed by the young folks.

A basket dinner was served Monday noon.

On Tuesday the program opened with songs and games, followed by a discourse by Miss Bess Edwards instructing and encouraging the club members in their work. Everyone was then given an opportunity to tell of the progress of their respective clubs in one-minute talks, in which it developed that a fine grade of cheese was being made by most of the clubs, also many beehives, some pork and mutton had been canned.

At noon a luncheon was served to about 300 by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce. Talks were made in the afternoon by Mrs. Frank Patton of Benjamin, Mrs. T. S. Edwards and Dr. Edwards of Knox City. The body then voted to hold the next years encampment in Baylor Co. with Mrs. W. E. Harrison, president and Mrs. Russell Morris, Sec'y.

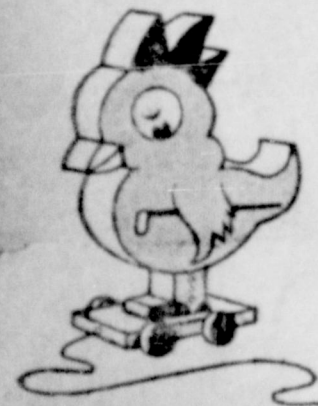

County Health Work

Never in history has there been such wide-spread interest in health work. The demand for biological products has far exceeded the expectation of the state department of health. Hence, many requisitions have had to be cut down, however we hope after the first of July we will have an ample supply.

I have spent the month of May getting publicity and helping to organize the health committees in some of the counties which are ready for some real work. I am proud to mention the fact, one of the counties hold educational meetings in the rural district on every Sunday afternoon. I venture to say this credit is due to the doctors. This same county had a county-wide meeting, the doctors gave their time to make talks on health problems and especially stressed the important of immunization against these diseases. At this time all of the sub-committees were elected and the county health officer was appointed to do this work in the rural districts and the doctors in town would work in relays and give their service free. This is what I consider "good fruits" from a well organized health committee.

I suggest that each chairman should acquaint herself with the different phases of the program the nurse is carrying on and also with the literature that the nurse and the state health department are distributing. It is suggested that the chairman have at least one copy of each of these pamphlets on hand and "order forms" that she may give to any one in her district desiring to secure any of them.

In order to be able to assist in putting on a constructive health program in each district she has in charge, before outlining any specific program, after this study has been made she will have a fairly accurate understanding of the outstanding need in her district. She will also know what particular phase of the program the community is ready for.

As one of the "big nine" of Texas industry is found the name of J. Lancaster, Dallas, President of the Texas & Pacific railroad. It is the earnest prayer of the leaders of the Layman's work of the Methodist church as well as of the officials of the local

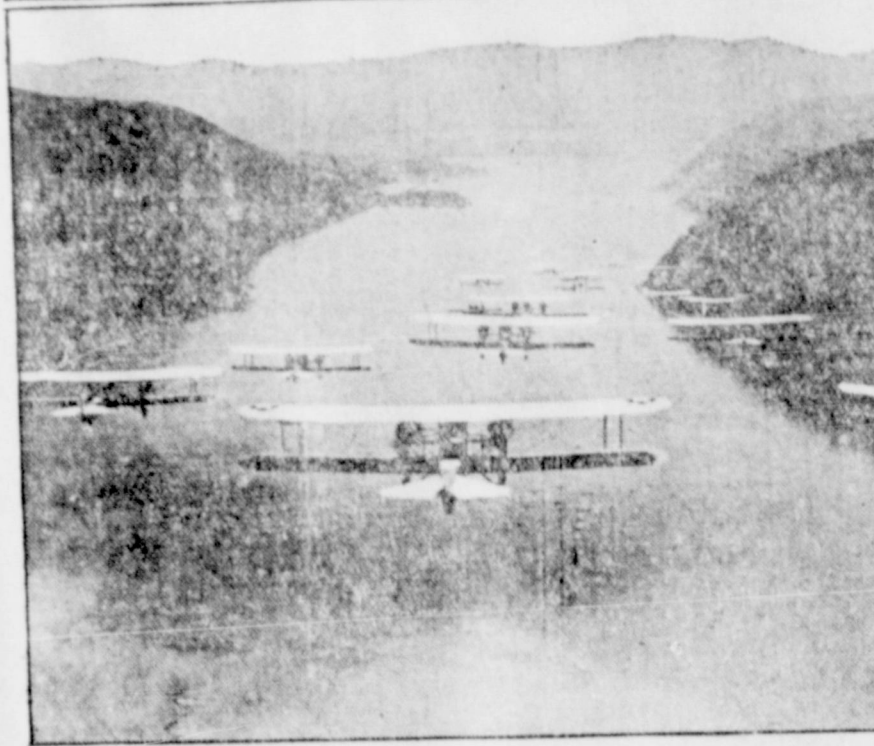

OTHER PEOPLE'S SUCCESS

We went to the opening night of a play. Between the acts we were talking with the author when a friend rushed up. "It's going to be a great success, old man," he cried and congratulated you.
Then his expression suddenly changed. Jealousy shot into his eyes. "I wish I knew how you got away with it," he exclaimed. "Why in the world can't I write a play?"
As we walked away we looked after him with pity. We know him well. We have seen him act the same way before. His whole attitude is introspective. Envy gnaws forever at his soul.

One of the most pathetic figures in the literary history of England was the author George Gissing. What was the secret of his constant unhappiness? He reveals a part of it in presenting the hero of one of his own novels:

Intensely self-conscious, he suffered from a habit of comparing, contrasting himself with other men, with men who achieved things, who played their part in the world. He could not read a newspaper without reflecting, sometimes bitterly, on the careers and position of men whose names were prominent in its columns.

Philosophers and religious teachers have attempted in various ways to account for the gross inequalities of life, and to hold out future hope to those who seem to have received only a meagerly portion of happiness.

Christian theology presents the promise of another world where reward will be distributed in proportion to sacrifice, courage and fidelity to truth.

The deincarnationist holds that the soul is but a short time tenant in any human frame; that if I make spiritual progress in this incarnation I shall reappear in happier form, or, failing to progress, will be denoted to work, my way painfully up again.

Until we have passed across the River we shall not know which, if either, of these philosophies is true.

Meanwhile, the sensible man is not afraid to face frankly the facts about life and about himself. He recognizes that he was born with certain limitations; that, however strong the desire for brilliant achievement, he has neither the talent nor the opportunity. He recognizes further that success, as he world views it, contains a very appreciable element of chance.

He surveys his own equipment and tries serenely to do the best he can with whatever he has. As he grows older and more mellow, he recognizes that every minute of jealousy poisons his own soul.

And that he can vastly increase his own pleasure by the habit of enjoying other people's success.

South Encourages Use of Jute

Austin, Tex., March 12.—The cotton-producing south is also one of the principal consumers of cotton's chief competitor in the bagging field jute. J. M. McDonald, agricultural commissioner, pointed out today in urging south-wide cooperation toward the substitution of cotton bales, for fertilizer sacks, and for various containers used in the whole-sale grocery trade. The south wraps most of its cotton in jute, manufacturers and uses a large part of the fertilizer, and sacks it in jute, and has its quota of wholesale grocers.

"It is a disappointing comment," he said, "that the south should work against itself in this fashion, especially at a time when cotton sells below cost of production and the south faces an enormous surplus."

Surveys by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in the U. S. Department of Agriculture indicate that general substitution of low grade cotton bagging for jute in these three fields alone would open a market for at least 650,000 bales of cotton a year. Successful substitution depends upon whether proper economies can be effected.

The bureau estimated that cotton bagging to wrap the cotton would consume a minimum of 125,000 bales annually, cotton bags as containers for wholesale grocery shipments would take another 180,000 bales; and fertilizer bags alone would take another 165,000 bales. McDonald said he believed these figures unusually conservative. It was estimated that 200,000 bales would be used in making wrappers for cotton the first year, and 125,000 bales a year thereafter, taking re-use into account.

Sale of cotton on the basis of its weight in the world's markets, including local markets, would oblate losses which would result from the use of a light weight bagging, thus doing away with the principal objections to the use of cotton bagging.
