Navy Recruiting Officer Coming Wed., April 8

Construction Wolf Creek Bridge Begins

Contractor M. R. Todd In Charge of New 75 Ft. Span on Lake Road

After several weeks delay on account of slow delivery of materials, actual construction on the new bridge across Wolf Creek on the highway to Lake Fryer was expected to get under way today. Contractor M. R. Todd of this city has charge of the building of the bridge, employment of labor and all other details.

The bridge is located about a quarter of a mile from Highway 83 on the road to the lake. It will replace the low water concrete dip now used at this crossing. However the concrete dip will be left in place for use as an emergency crossing and while the new bridge is under construction.

The new bridge will be of heavy timber construction, resting on concrete piling on concrete foundations. The floor will be of three inch treated lumber laid diagonally.

It will be 75 ft. in length in three spans. Estimated cost is approximately \$6,000.

Officials call attention to the fact that it is unlawful to operate a motor vehicle of any kind on any public road in Texas now without 1942 plates. Cars operated after April 1 without 1942 plates are subject to penalty when 1942 plates are purchased. Cars without 1942 tags and not operated on the highways can be licensed at any time by the payment of the license fee for the remaining part of the year beginning April 1, 1942.

Bond, Stamp Sales Under March Quota

For the first time in 1942, Ochiltree county folks failed to buy the quota of Victory Bonds and Stamps assigned by the government to this county, so reports Carl Ellis, county bond sales chairman. The county's quota is \$25,525 per month. March sales were \$16,779.

While total sales for the year to date are about the three months quota, Mr. Ellis reminds us that it is the duty of every man, woman and child in Ochiltree county to make sacrifices, to save and scrimp and invest every possible dollar and penny in stamps and bonds. Ochiltree county has a quota of \$306,300 for the entire year.

It has been hoped that Ochiltree county would carry its part of the expense of this war by voluntary purchases of bonds and stamps. If the quota is not reached, it means that bond sale campaigns will have to be launched, with committees calling on you and you, obtaining pledges to buy, selling bonds. It is hoped that this will not be necessary in Ochiltree county.

Sales for the year are as follows: January, \$30,705; February, \$34,517; March, \$16,779. Total for first three months, \$82,001. Quota for first three months, \$76,575.

Two-thirds of Texas '41 Wheat Crop Went Into Government Loans; Due on April 30th

Reports from the Ochiltree County AAA Office show this county very definitely to be the leading wheat and barley producing county with 1,337,226 bushels of warehouse loan wheat or eight per cent of the total for the state stored in elevators and terminals; 483,270 bushels or 32 per cent of the total loan wheat for the state that is stored on farms; 8,916 bushels of barley or three per cent of the total stored in elevators; and 222,417 bushels of barley or 23.3 per cent of the total barley for the state under farm storage loans.

City Election April 7 for 3 Aldermen

The present outlook for the city election scheduled for Tuesday, April 7, is that a handful of eligible voters will go to the polls and elect three aldermen to serve for two year terms.

G. T. Leatherman, Sam Hergert and J. A. Graves, whose terms as aldermen will expire, have filed as candidates for reelection. As no opposing candidates have filed, the above three names are the only ones that will appear on the official ballot.

Holdover aldermen with one more year to serve are Howard Holt and Rufus Bolerjack. Mayor W. H. Lance.

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JUST HERE AND THERE

All loans become due on April 30 this year, and all wheat under warehouse loans will be taken over by the Commodity Credit Corporation unless paid off by the producer before that time. Wheat under farm storage loans may be sold and the loan paid off; the loan may be renewed for another year and the bins resealed or the wheat may be delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

More than two thirds of the 1941 Texas wheat crop went into Government loans, according to P. C. Colgin, state commodity loan supervisor.

Grain sorghum and barley producers, taking advantage of loans offered in 1941, placed more than a million bushels in warehouses and on farms and were advanced more than a half-million dollars.

Grand totals on all wheat, barley and grain sorghum loans for the state included 26,179 applications covering 21 million bushels on which nearly 20 million dollars was advanced.

Included in final tabulations are 16,778,646 bushels of warehouse stored wheat, 1,508,144 bushels of farm stored wheat, 131,463 bushels of farm stored grain sorghum, 294,450 bushels of warehouse stored barley, and 864,981 bushels of farm stored barley.

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Plan for Child Health Day-Clinic

Plans for observance of the National Child Health Day in Ochiltree county were discussed by a group at a luncheon at the Hotel Perryton, Wednesday noon. This day has been set apart by proclamation by President Roosevelt, who called upon the people of each community to contribute to the conservation of child health and the reduction of illness among children by exerting every effort to the end that before May 1, Child Health Day, children over nine months of age be immunized against diphtheria and smallpox, the two diseases for which we have the surest means of prevention.

In the local group meeting were C. Wedgeworth, County Judge Dave Shanks, Mayor W. H. Lance, Dr. G. L. Kengle, Dr. H. M. Sanford, Dr. Manse Wood, Dr. E. R. Jarvis, J. H. Brashears, R. T. Shindler, H. C. Sanford and Van W. Stewart.

It was decided to make a survey of the children of school and preschool age in the county so as to arrive at an estimate of the cost of the immunization.

Details for making the annual medical and dental examination more thorough were also discussed. It seemed to be the general opinion that mass immunizing of children under age five might not be practical in this locality.

The group will meet again on Friday, April 10 to make final decision on all phases of the child health program.

April Tire Quota Lowered For County

Ochiltree county owners and operators of vehicles of all kinds requiring rubber tires will have to do with less new tires in April than during March. There is an ever diminishing supply of rubber for civilian use.

The April quota for Ochiltree county is as follows: for passenger cars; six new tires, 21 retreads and 13 tubes; for trucks, pick-ups, tractors and farm implements: 40 new tires, 35 retreads and 37 tubes.

This is a decrease from the March quota which was seven tires and six tubes for passenger cars; and 40 new tires, 21 retreads and 35 tubes for trucks, tractors and farm implements.

On the Home Front of World War II

(A weekly summary of developments in the Victory Program, prepared by the Regional Information Office, OEM)

Our big "home front" offensive, the War Production Drive, this began to make its effects felt on the dinner table, in the living room, the bedroom and the rest of the average citizen, and on the shelves and in the show rooms of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and the other states.

Production has been halted on a lot of American household products that grow longer and longer. That is, of course, that most of us are going to have to work and eat differently. Our way of life must change—and change quickly.

As production and the accompanying drain of materials and labor increases, the Office of Administration continues to issue orders fixing maximum prices for materials, products and household articles, as part of its mission that "the public shall be compelled to submit to unavoidable and inflated prices, since supplies are short."

a good fight to keep prices down, but as Dexter M. Keezer, assistant OPA administrator, told the National Conference of Business Paper Editors a few days ago, these retailers must have allies if the war against the terror of inflation is to be won.

"The simple fact is that today we are losing the battle against inflation," Mr. Keezer emphasized. "Prices are going up all along the line—and at a dangerously accelerated pace."

Butcher shops and retail meat markets, for instance, were called upon by OPA not to raise prices of ham, bacon, pork chops and other pork cuts above mid-March prices. Dan West, director of the OPA Consumer Division, pointed out that OPA put a ceiling on wholesale prices of pork products on March 23, and it is now up to retailers to boost prices to consumers. He advised consumers to question any price increase above that level.

The War Production Board has placed restrictions on distribution of the country's entire tea supply,

and has called upon grocers to limit tea sales to each family so that available supplies will be distributed evenly and won't be bought up by hoarders. Moreover, the WPB forbade tea packers from selling more than 50 per cent of their monthly deliveries in a corresponding quarter of 1941, while wholesalers and retailers were prohibited from accepting more than 50 per cent of their average monthly purchases during 1941. Thus consumer purchases of tea are automatically cut in half, and the six months' supply is stretched to a year's supply.

WPB also acted to conserve present stocks of honey for household consumers, for military purposes, and for industrial users. It found that some manufacturers of honey as a sugar substitute, 80 WPB ordered that manufacturers of such products as ice cream, candy, soft drinks, bakery goods and medicines may not consume more honey than they used during corresponding periods of 1941. 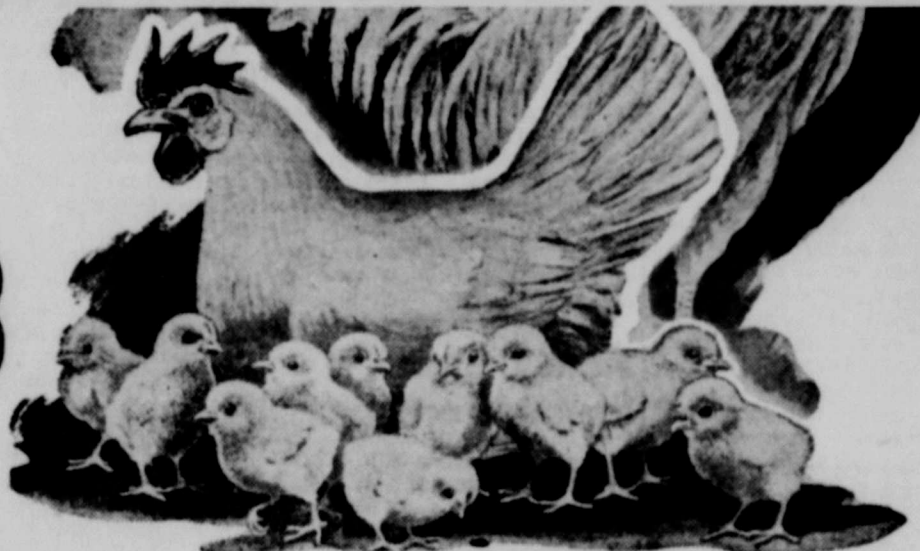

Creams in Tubes
Require Trade-in

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31. (AP)—The War Production Board today prohibited retail merchants from selling toothpaste or shaving cream in tubes to any customer who fails to turn in some type of used collapsible tube for each new one purchased.

The provision, first of its kind and effective immediately, makes retailers responsible for the trade-in transaction and directs that the used tubes thus collected be held subject to WPB orders.

At the same time, the board placed drastic restrictions on future use and production of collapsible tin tubes and prohibited their use entirely for foods, cosmetics and most toilet preparations.

Under the terms of the trade-in provision, a WPB spokesman declared, retailers are liable to penalties prescribed under the second war powers act—a maximum of \$10,000 fine and a year's imprisonment—if the sales of toothpaste or shaving cream are made in violation of the order.

Purchasers will not be required to exchange a used tube of the same type as the tube being purchased. It was understood that the used tubes eventually would be reprocessed and allocated back to the tube manufacturers—possibly representing the entire supply of tin they can expect for the duration of the war.

The order provides that tubes containing 100 per cent tin may be used only for certain medical ointments and pharmaceutical preparations, while uncoated tubes must be used for toothpaste and shaving cream.

Plant Gardens Now

This week is the time to plant the following seeds: lettuce, English peas, spinach, turnips, lettuce and radishes. Cabbage plants, onion sets and potatoes should also be set out in the garden by that date. These plants are in most cases resistant to frosts that are not too severe and by early plantings will mature before the time of the hot summer winds.

In planting seeds remember that nearly all gardeners waste seed by sowing too thickly. This also wastes labor as seedlings must be thinned by hand to a spacing that will allow for proper development. Poor growth and poor quality vegetables are obtained if the seeds are sown too thick and not thinned out to the proper spacing to the row. Don't plant more seed than you need to plant and don't plant more seed than you need to get a stand.

English peas should be planted as the plants should stand. This vegetable should never be thinned in the rows. About 12-15 seeds to the row foot is good spacing between seeds and they should be planted 1 to 1½ inches under the soil. Laxton's Progress and Little Marvel are recommended varieties.

Turnips and spinach may be sown three to four times as thickly as they are to stand since many seeds fail to produce strong plants. They should be planted to a depth of ½ in. and should be thinned to a distance of 2-4 inches when they are young. This thinning will provide the first table greens of the season.

Cabbage slips should be set out about 30 in. apart and in rows from 15-20 in. apart. Early Jersey Wakefield and Chas. Wakefield are good varieties for this country.

If tomato seeds are not already growing they should be planted at once in a box and kept inside at night and on cold days. The selection of variety is important and if plants are purchased it might be difficult to secure the right variety. The Earliana seems to be the best adapted of the large varieties.

I. F. Locke, Horticulturist for the Great Plains Experiment Station, Woodward, writes as follows about the Porter tomato.

In the Southern Great Plains area during favorable years, almost any variety of tomato will produce some fruit. In bad years, with high temperatures and hot winds, almost none of the ordinary commercial varieties will make profitable yields and many of them sometimes will mature no fruit at all, even if plentifully irrigated. The Porter tomato has been grown in the tomato variety tests at the Southern Great Plains Field Station, Woodward, Oklahoma during the last six years and in five of these years has made the highest yields.

During the period from 1938 to 1941, the Porter has been grown by nearly 400 farmer co-operators in the Southern Great Plains area. This area includes western Texas and Oklahoma, eastern New Mexico, southeastern Colorado and southwestern Kansas. These co-operators were requested to grow other varieties with the Porter, giving all the same treatment. During the past three years over 70 other varieties have been grown by these co-operators.

The two most frequently grown varieties are the Earliana and Marglobe. The latter, though a good tomato in other regions, was dropped from variety tests at this station years ago because of poor fruit setting and yielding ability. From 1935 to 1941 when Porter and Earliana were both included in station tests, the average yield of Porter was more than double that of the Earliana. In the year of lowest yields the yield of Porter was five times that of the Earliana.

The Porter is elliptical in shape, deep pink to almost red in color, small in size, though somewhat larger than the commonly known pear tomatoes. It is excellent for juice, preserves, salads, canning whole, high in quality for eating out of hand, or for table use, and in a few cases special markets for it have been developed. It produces heavily but because of the small size it is tedious to pick. It will not be popular with people who want tomatoes that will produce two and one-half to four inch slices, but some seasons and during parts of most seasons, they can have plenty of Porter when no large varieties are available at all. With average care it will produce any year, and often when other varieties are failures or near failures, will furnish plenty of tomatoes for home use over a long period.

While other varieties should also be planted, the Porter because of its many desirable qualities should be included in all Victory Gardens where tomatoes are grown in the Southern Great Plains area.

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Ample Farm Income Record

COLLEGE STATION, April 1.—It may seem a little early—or a little late—to be talking about income taxes, but T. R. Timm, economist in farm management with the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, has income taxes on his mind. Not for himself as much as for farm and ranch people.

Timm estimates that 65,000 Texas farmers and ranchers filed out income tax returns for 1941, most of them for the first time; and if the 1942 tax level is placed where he thinks it will be, he figures that around a third of Texas' 418,000 farmers and ranchmen will file returns next year.

Timm, together with D. U. Emerett, Deputy Collector of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, held 11 major meetings prior to March 15 to help farmers get the income tax business straight in their minds, and county agents held hundreds of similar meetings with farm groups.

He plans a year "round program on income taxes from now on. His program includes pointing out the facts as to why greater income taxes, as well as other taxes, are being levied on farm people.

Record forms which will help farmers provide the information needed for their returns will be provided.

Farmers will be reminded of investment items which may be depreciated.

Information as to who must make returns, and when and where, will be issued. So will information as to just what taxable farm income is.

Through county agricultural agents, he said, farmers will be promptly advised of changes in the income tax laws as they affect agriculture.

"The farmer or rancher who keeps an adequate record of his business is going to be mighty proud of it come next March 15," Timm declares.

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More Flax is Planted Here

Flax is being tried out on a scale considerably more extensive than the trial planting made last year by Galen Murphy, Mr. Murphy has 100 acres sown and up to a stand on his farm seven miles east of Perryton and will sow about 18 acres more.

C. A. Zirkle has sown 12 acres on his farm in the same community; Arthur Ganz, Chas. Brown and Earl A. Clark will have 62 acres between them on farms south of Hunton. This makes a total of approximately 180 acres.

Last year Mr. Murphy planted seven acres which yielded about 20 bushels per acre in spite of the fact that it was planted late, was badly infested with weeds and shattered badly before being harvested.

Volunteer wheat pastured will be considered as a conservation practice under the AAA program but volunteer acreage cut for hay or harvested for grain cannot be included under conservation acreage.

Where stands are sufficient for harvest, regulations provide for conservation of volunteer wheat in orderly fashion without glutting already crowded terminal storages.

Pasturing or cutting for hay is encouraged on farms where volunteer wheat can best be used in livestock production.

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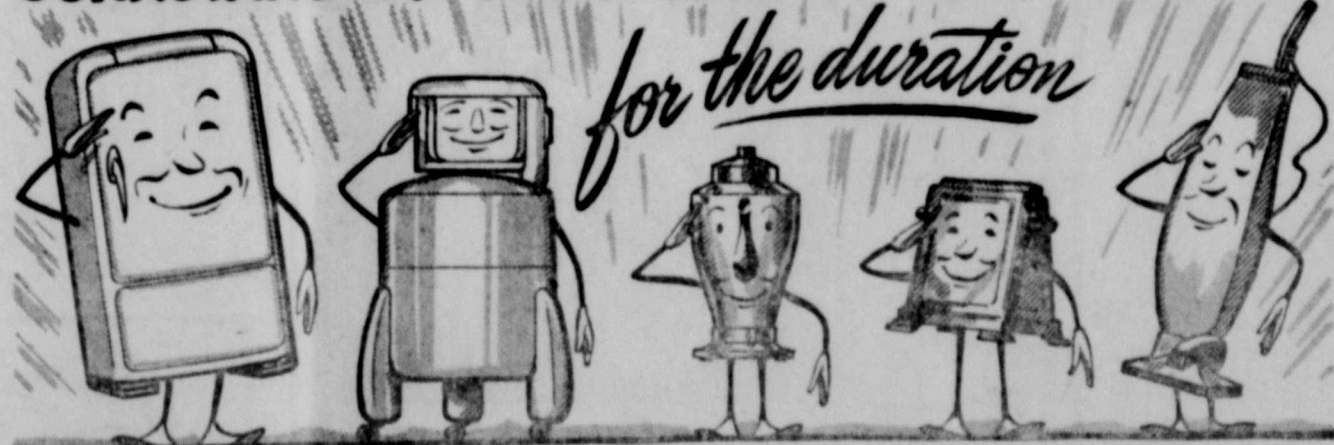

amounts may consume up to 60 pounds without restriction.

New OPA orders have fixed retail price ceilings on new mechanical refrigerators, new vacuum cleaners and attachments, new heating and cooking stoves and ranges, new radio sets and phonographs, new typewriters—in addition to the orders already in effect on automobile and tires. Moreover, gasoline prices have been pegged in 19 States.

Thus price control becomes this week a matter of direct and personal interest to millions of citizens.

Inside and Out Changes: All of us know by now that we cannot have "business as usual" and beat the Axis, too. So one of the expected changes is that all new civilian buildings, including residential construction and remodeling, will be placed under strict control very soon, for all projects that cannot be classed definitely as bearing directly on the war effort, or as being essential to civilian health and safety.

On May 1, the manufacture of portable electric lamps and shades for them, of electric light bulbs, switches, sockets and cords will be cut 60 per cent of the 1940 output.

Metal furniture such as beds and bathroom medicine cabinets will become harder to buy. There will be no more metal frames for windows, iron and plastic won't be available for the bathroom, and plumbing and heating installations will be different. Wood is expected to remain its popularity and utility in the making of home furnishings.

Yes, the war is changing life rapidly for Americans. Already they're working longer and staggered hours, using new methods and new machines. At play they're beginning to find that tennis and golf balls don't have the bounce and zip they used to have. The juke box in the corner drug store may soon go into the making of machine gun bullets.

With warm summer weather coming on, the tea drinkers may have to fall back on that old pioneer favorite, sassafras tea—drunk with ice in it. Even at that, there won't be as much sugar to put in it. Apple and pumpkin pie may not have as many spices in it. But in spite of these little inconveniences, there still will be plenty of food necessary to maintain health—and there'll be food in abundance.

Men's trousers will be cutless, like those of the men in military service, and women will have to dress more simply and get along with not such a variety of colors.

Moreover, as many persons already are beginning to find, we'll have to travel more slowly in automobiles, to save tires, or else go afoot or on bicycles or use the public buses and trains.

Business as usual? Not for the duration—because the Production Drive is on!

Razor Blade Cut: Whiskers may come into fashion again as a result of the WPB action ordering the production of safety razors restricted to 30 per cent of the 1940 average monthly output, and the output of safety razor blades held to 100 per cent of the average monthly production of 1940. This is expected to allow most men only one safety razor blade per week.

Another WPB order prohibits the use of aluminum, crude rubber, chromium or nickel in the production of flashlight cases and batteries. Tin may be used only in solder, and brass and copper only for electrical contact fittings.

Cigarette Prices Continued: In continuing its ceiling over cigarette prices at manufacturer's levels, the Office of Price Administration has announced that manufacturers will be permitted to adjust prices in the event the present federal internal revenue tax on cigarettes should be raised. Action of the OPA in continuing the cigarette price schedule was based on a cost and profits study.

quit high school for any purpose. But if he is 18 or more, and has graduated, or if he is 18 and has quit for some other reason, then it seems to us that he is a man in a man's world—and one that recognizes that a man of 18 is better able to do a lot of work in this war than an old timer. And that a good place for him is in the Army as a Volunteer, taking advantage of the opportunities open to him, to rise as high and as fast as his own abilities and hard work will take him.

West Texas has always been air-minded. But it will bring a glow of pride to every West Texan to learn that at Lubbock, Texas, in the month of March, 240 qualified young men have been appointed to the Air Corps, preparatory to being Aviation Cadets.

These young men get a break at that. They are certain to be at an air-field learning to fly in a month or so. But, to avoid congestion, the Army has enlisted them as Privates, Air Corps, Unassigned, and then has turned them loose on a 30 day furlough—with pay—with orders to report back to Lubbock at the end of their furloughs. Then they will be appointed Aviation Cadets and sent to Air Forces training fields.

We are glad that the restrictions on printing recruiting results have been partially lifted. We know it will not give Hitler, Hirohito and Mussolini any comfort to know that in one month West Texas sends 240 men to make crack Pilots, Navigators, Bombardiers.

With no animosity whatsoever toward Amarillo and fully realizing that it has never occurred to a single promoter of Amarillo's Army Day parade that such might be the innocent cause of a single Panhandle citizen spending a penny in Amarillo's stores, we say without backing up one inch that Ochiltree county citizens can show a greater patriotism by staying at home on that day.

Instead of going to Amarillo, invest the money you would spend for gasoline and precious tires, meals and what-have-you, in Victory bonds and stamps. You'll be better off by increasing your savings and Amarillo will benefit in the end for your savings are helping to provide the millions that are going into defense projects in the Amarillo area.
