## PLAGUE AND STARVATION IN MEXICO

JUAREZ, Mexico., Oct. 17.—Death and starvation threatens the Mexicans living in towns in the state of Zacatecas, unless immediate action is taken, it was learned today from reliable sources.

According to circulars sent out by aid societies to Juarez, it was stated that two thousand people died of starvation in the capital of Zacatecas since the last four months. Typhoid fever and yellow fever are raging among all classes of Mexicans it was further announced.

## VILLA AFTER WAR SUPPLIES IS REPORT

EL PASO, Oct. 17.—Carranza officials today announce that Pancho Villa, with an army of eighteen hundred men, composed of eight hundred Villistas who are regular fighting men and one thousand new recruits, is camped near Temoac. The point where the bandit leader is said to have made a stand is one hundred and fifty miles west of El Valle, the southernmost outpost of the American expeditionary force.

Villa has dispatched a body of men into the foot-hills of the Sierra mountains to recover a quantity of munitions hidden by him months ago, according to official advises received here from Gen. Trevino.

## WATSON IS DENIED CHANGE OF VENUE

WACO, Oct. 17.—Judge Monroe overruled the motion for a change of venue in the Watson murder trial here late yesterday afternoon and announced that the case would go to trial. Court did not adjourn until seven o'clock last night, after a seven days attempt to get a change of venue. More than 100 witnesses were put on the stand, and of this number about seventy-five per cent swore that they believed Watson could get a fair trial in this county.

In ruling on the case Judge Monroe said "the evidence does not indicate that a dangerous combination headed by Gov. Ferguson exist here, and the evidence is insufficient to warrant taking the trial to another county."

## DALLAS DAY AT FAIR IS RECORD BREAKER

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 17.—Today is Dallas Day at the thirty-first annual State Fair of Texas. It is expected that a new attendance record for the day will be set, as other records have been set for almost every other day of the fair. The general prosperity of the state has caused thousands of visitors to flock to the fair.

A committee of young business men has been at work for a week, arousing interest in the Dallas Day celebration. Practically all stores, banks and other business houses have closed, and the mayor has proclaimed today a general holiday.

The city has been divided into sections, and each section will use a turnstile at the grounds. A hot contest as to which section will have the greatest attendance at the fair is on. Prizes have been offered to the business houses which have the greatest per cent of employees present today.

Members of the committee have toured the country around Dallas, urging visitors to visit the Fair today.

## RAINS GENERAL; STREAMS ARE UP

Forecast—Tonight rain and cold; Wednesday unsettled, occasional rain.

Seven-tenths of an inch of water fell in Ballinger between eight o'clock and noon Tuesday morning and reports from over the county indicated a general rain with a much heavier fall in some localities.

Elm Creek is up with a pretty good flow of water, and other streams in the county that have been dry for several months are beginning to run, and stock water promises to be plentiful with a ample rain for the small grain crop.

The rain fell slow and little damage will result to cotton, as any kind of cotton is good cotton now. Travelers report roads rotten, and autos are stored away for the time being, except the Brooks jitney line to Winters, which manages to get through the mud with the usual run of passengers.

SHADOW LAWN, Oct. 17.—President Wilson announced today that he has "not yet been successful in inducing the European powers to conclude a definite settlement of the proposed plan of Americans to ship food and clothing to Poland." Mr. Wilson says important differences still exist between the allied powers and the Teutonic states which debar any hope of direct negotiations.

## YOU CAN'T STOP AN AMBITIOUS BOY

Among the students of the University of Texas for the present session is one young man who walked a hundred and fifty miles to Austin, arriving at the University with only \$8 in his pocket. He has already enrolled in the University and has secured a position where he is earning his board and other expenses. Another young man is living in a shack near the University which he erected at a cost of \$14, and here he intends to spend the entire school year. In recent years students have been known to ride into Austin on the bumpers of freight trains. One came four hundred miles on horseback. Two others floated down the Colorado River four hundred and fifty miles in a canoe; and still another rode a hundred and fifty miles on a motorcycle. Nearly fifty per cent of the students belong to the self-supporting class, and more than one hundred during the present session have secured employment through the bureau run by the Young Men's Christian Association of the institution.

## WOUNDED NEGRO DIES; MURDER CHARGE FILED

Sam Montgomery, the negro who was shot by Charlie Ellis on the Embury farm eight miles south of Ballinger Sunday afternoon, died at three-thirty Monday afternoon and was buried in City Cemetery Tuesday. The charges against Ellis, who was placed in jail following the shooting and held on attempt to murder charge, were changed to murder and the facts in the case were placed before the grand jury Tuesday, and it is probable that body will return an indictment against the negro Ellis before this is in print.

A number of other negroes were present or near when the shooting took place and these are being examined by the grand jury and will be witnesses in the case. It is probable the case will be called for trial at the present term of court, as the negro will not be able to make bond, and it would be an unnecessary expense to continue the case and keep the prisoner in jail, if he can be given a fair trial at this time.

### GRAND JURY RETURNS NINE BILLS.

The grand jury returned nine felony indictments Monday afternoon just before taking recess until Tuesday morning. Most of the parties indicted were either in jail or out under bond, and it is probable that most of them will be disposed of at the present term of court.

## CLERK RECORDS 60 YEAR OLD DOCUMENT

County Clerk Parish had presented to his office this week an instrument in writing bearing the signature of Gov. E. M. Pease, and dated in July 1856. The document was a land patent granted to Henry Volcker on 320 acres of land now known as the Laxon farm located eight miles south of Ballinger.

The land patented by this instrument has changed hands many times since the state granted it to Volcker, but the original patent had never been recorded on the deed records of Runnels county.

Gov. Pease was the fourth governor of Texas, serving from 1853 to 1857, and also served again ten years later from 67 to 69, as the twelfth governor of Texas. Hattin Laxon had the original patent recorded this week.

## 17c COTTON IS MARKET HERE TODAY

The highest price paid for cotton on the Ballinger market was paid on Tuesday of this week, and in paying this the local buyers maintains for Ballinger the best cotton market in this section of the state, and as good market as there is to be found in any inland town in the cotton growing south and southwest.

LeRoy Nicholson, a local street buyer, has perhaps the distinction of paying the first 17 cent price ever paid on the local market. He purchased a bale of cotton graded as number two and weighing 583 pounds from W. O. Wood, Tuesday morning, on a 17 cent bid, the check received by Wood for the one bale of cotton amounting to \$99.11, exclusive of the seed, which were valued at about \$30.

John Crockett sold twelve bales of cotton, some of which was picked after the recent storm, for 17 cents around Tuesday morning. On account of the rain no new cotton was on the market Tuesday, and the man who was holding seemed to be satisfied to hold a while longer.

## SPANELL'S FRIENDS TO ASSIST HIM

(San Angelo Standard)

Information has been received here that the people of Harry J. Spannell's home town, Hazelton, Pa., are going to interest themselves in a material way in his defense, indicating that this will be one of the hardest fought legal battles in the history of the state. Spannell, who is now in jail here pending trial at the December term of the district court, is charged with having killed his wife, and Col. M. C. Butler, of the Sixth Cavalry, U. S. A., while taking them for an automobile drive at Alpine.

John R. Holland, father of Mrs. Spannell, resident of Alpine, is interesting himself in the prosecution and has already engaged a corps of lawyers to assist the state.

The chief effort in Spannell's behalf originated at Hazelton, Pa., his old home and still the home of his father. At a mass meeting a committee was appointed to solicit funds to hire attorneys to see Spannell has a "full, fair and impartial trial." Many copies of the printed appeal of this committee have been received here.

It was in Waco that the romance of Spannell and Crystal Holland began. He was a teacher of music in Baylor University and she came from her father's home at Alpine to be one of his students. It was not long until they were married.

Afterward Spannell gave up teaching and went to Alpine to manage a hotel owned by his father-in-law. He became very popular there and his wife was a social leader in the town where she had lived as a girl. When the troops went to the border town, Col. Butler lived at hotel Spannell managed, and he and his wife became close friends of the Spanells. On July 20 Spannell invited his wife and Butler into the back seat seat of his automobile and after driving a little way turned and shot both to death. He said afterward he intended to kill only Butler, but his wife jumped in the way.

Among the counsel engaged by Holland are Walter Gillis of Del Rio, Judge W. Van Sickle of Alpine and Judge William A. Wright of San Angelo. Friends of Spannell, who is in jail, have not announced who will assist Judge L. A. Dale, of El Paso, for the defense.

## AUSTRIAN SHEEP MAN COMING TO TEX.

The Extension Service of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College co-operating with the Animal Husbandry Division of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, has urged Professor W. T. Ritch, the Australian sheep and wool expert, who is at the present time employed by the American Range Wool Improvement Association, with headquarters at Salt Lake City, Utah, to address the sheepmen of Texas upon the subject of "Better Methods of Shearing and Preparing Wool for Market."

It will be recalled by those interested in sheep production that Professor Fitch was scheduled to visit Texas during the fall of 1915, but owing to the great demand upon his time in the supervision of the construction of several modern shearing sheds in the intermountain region he at the last moment found it impossible to lecture to Texas sheepmen at that time. Professor Ritch is lecturing to the sheepmen of Arizona at the present time upon the subject of "Improved Methods of Preparing Wool for Market," and upon the completion of his lecture tour in that state he will come directly to Texas where the following program has been arranged.
