Three Trustees Are Re-elected Saturday

In the trustee election held last Saturday, three of the present trustees were re-elected. They were: W. D. Arnett, Fred Sanders and J. R. Flanniken. The trustee election now provides for three year terms for board members with over lapping terms, two members to be elected at the trustee election in 1935.

Elections were also held at each of the county schools on Saturday but the complete returns have not been received. These will be given in a later issue.

Special Cattle Feeders Meeting at Benjamin

On Friday, April 20th, there will be a cattle feeder's meeting on the League Ranch, two miles east of Benjamin, Texas.

About 100 head of calves have been divided into six lots. These different lots of calves have been fed different rations, to determine (1) the most profitable ways to carry calves through the winter and (2) the most profitable way to full-feed these calves.

This feeding test was started in November and will finish up on April 15. These lots of calves have been responding very differently to these rations and some are going to make double the return of others.

At this meeting the cattle will be shown, the method of feeding will be described and the results of feeding the different rations will be given.

\$7,000,000 to Texas From Corn-Hog Plan

College Station, April 11.—A total of 27,354 corn-hog contracts were reported signed by farmers in 199 counties up to Saturday night, March 24, with figure incomplete in 65 counties according to E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine specialist at Texas A. and M. College. The active campaign ended March 17th and the increase in total signers since that time represents farmers whose contracts were in process of making before the dead line was reached. When all returns are in it is expected that Texas will have about 30,000 contracts, making it the largest sign-up state outside the corn belt. Total benefits will probably amount to nearly \$7,000,000 this year.

On the basis of the contracts thus far reported, Texas has agreed to cut corn acreage 248,719 acres, and market hogs 328,816 head.

Local Pastor To Presbytery Meeting

The Rev. Eugene H. Surface left Monday for the regular semi-annual meeting of Abilene Presbytery, of which he is a member, and the local Presbyterian church is a part. The meeting was held at Breckenridge the tenth and eleventh. It is primarily a business meeting, pertaining to the work of the Presbyterian church in twenty-five counties, from the New Mexico line east to Strawn.

Rev. Mr. Surface will make his report to the Presbytery on Christian Education, of which Committee of Presbytery he is the Chairman. He will return today (Thursday).

Farmers of this territory are warned to inspect closely all seed that are purchased with a red tag on the sack. "A red tag does not necessarily mean that the seed are State Certified," said R. C. Miller, Chief, Division Field Seed Certification, who was in Lamesa this week. State certified seed must have the seal of the State of Texas with the signatures of both the Commissioner of Agriculture J. E. McDonald and R. C. Miller, Chief, Division Field Seed Certification on a red tag.

MAYOR LOWRIE IN FAREWELL ADDRESS

An impressive public installation of the newly elected city officials was held in the District Court room at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon, at which time W. L. Marr was installed as Mayor, W. B. McWhorter and Bernie Holt as commissioners.

Before the oath of office was read to the new officers, retiring Mayor J. R. Lowrie addressed the assembly of some 300 people including two grammar school classes of school children, on the principles of City Government. Lowrie stated that with the advent of automobiles and good roads small towns were becoming smaller and the larger towns larger. He said that Lamesa had held her own. He also said that there had been little development and improvement during the past four years of depression on account of the lack of funds. He compared city receipts before the depression with present receipts that showed some \$30,000 less annually at the present time. He stated that with the exception of the bonded indebtedness of \$341,000 the city was out of debt and that it had been able to pay all of its obligations up to the present time. He commended the incoming administration and pleaded with the people to give them their every support. In closing Lowrie stated that it had been a pleasure for him to have served the City the past two years.

County attorney Louis B. Reed administered the oath of office to the new officials which was followed by their solemn swearing and signing of the oath.

Following these ceremony an open house was held at the City Hall where a hundred or more people visited and watched Mayor Lowrie as he turned his office over officially to Mayor-elect Marr.

J. C. Billingsley Is Seriously Injured; Kicked By Mule

J. C. Billingsley was seriously injured on last Friday afternoon at his mule barn while at work.

Mr. Billingsley was in the pen with several mules when one of them kicked him on the right hip, breaking the pelvis bone. He was carried to a local hospital where he was placed in a cast. Hospital attendants stated Wednesday that he was still in a serious condition but was improving.

Transfer Bonds to State Board of Education

About \$30,000 will be saved by refinancing the Lamesa Independent School bonds. Culminating an intensive study of public expenditures, taxes, and a drive to collect delinquent taxes, the local school board has "cashed in" by being able to "sell" Lamesa and the school district to the State Board of Education and by doing so were able to transfer \$111,000 of the district's bonds from the Woodmen of the World to the State Board.

The School Board of the Lamesa Independent School District has been working for eleven months to take advantage of the bond refunding laws which enable the State Board of Education to purchase refunding bonds of worthy districts which have their bonds owned by out-of-state owners if the proceeds of the refunding bonds are used to retire the outstanding issue. This matter was consummated Monday afternoon, according to information telegraphed to Mr. W. B. Collins, president of the Lamesa school board.

The State Board voted unanimously to accept refunding bonds bearing five per cent interest to take up the \$111,000 worth of bonds bearing five and one-half per cent which were voted by the district in 1924 for the erection of the present high school building. The local board is required to issue \$101,000 refunding bonds and pay \$620 in cash to retire this debt. The discount amounts to \$8880 which with the cash payment brings the principal reduction to a total of \$9,500, on which is saved the interest at 5 1/2 per cent for 20 years. The lowered rate of 5 per cent instead of 5 1/2 per cent on the remaining \$101,500 brings the total annual interest saving to \$1030.00 and for a period of 20 years there is saved to the district a total of \$29,480.00. The school systems bonded debt principal will have been reduced from \$219,000 in 1925 to \$176,500 when this new refunding is completed.

Carl Rountree, local attorney, and V. Z. Rogers, represented the school board at Austin before the State Board of Education in Consumating the deal.

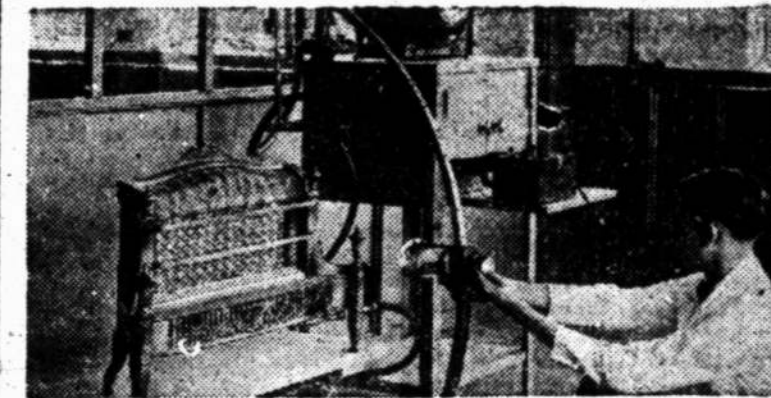

OUTLAWS of EDEN

THE STORY

Nate Tichenor returns after an absence of nine years. He goes to help Lorry in her car and finds her father has died of heart disease.

CHAPTER IV.—Silas Babson, from the Middle West, unscrupulous and grasping, controls the Eden Valley settlement through his bank. He schemes to build a dam and control the irrigation and hydro-electric possibilities of Eden Valley. He first aims to secure the heavily encumbered lands of Rance Kershaw. Nate Tichenor, Babson finds surveys already on Eden Valley lands owned by Nate Tichenor. The banker propositioned Lorry against Lorry, assuming that they are carrying on the old feud, in this way setting control of the key lands necessary to the project.

CHAPTER V.—Nate, however, has no intention of carrying on the feud. For Eden Valley buzzes with the news that the two survivors of the Eden Valley feud of bloodshed have buried the hatchet. "This portion of the valley," which is occupied by Tichenor and the Kershaw ranches, is usually referred to as the Pan," he explained. Retired Acres May Be Left In Terrace Strips

Cotton, corn and wheat acres contracted for retirement in Government contracts this year may be taken out of production in strips along terraces or contours, Joe C. Williams county agent, has been advised by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The contracted acres need not be in one solid block but may be scattered in these strips, he says. This gives the farmer the opportunity to lay out a complete terracing or contouring system for his farm, and to complete the work of building terraces in his spare time during the year. If there is no legitimate use for these strips within the terms of the contract, they may be left bare during the growing season and sowed down to small grains in early fall to prevent winter blowing, he adds.

A simple way of fitting the contracted acres to the terraced strips is to first measure the total length of the terrace lines. Multiply this distance left out along the terrace, say twice by the average width of the at least 30 feet. Divide the sum thus obtained by 43,560 (square feet in one acre) and you have the acres taken out by the terraced strips. If the farmer desires to take out more land than this, he may increase the average width of strips to suit. If these strips take out more land from production than he has contracted or can spare, he may plant enough of the terraced strips to get the desired result.

Up to 1930 I had paid this good school more than one thousand dollars special taxes on this tract.

The depression came, its products ceased to bring money enough with which to pay taxes, then a ruinous hail, then the drought.

Four years taxes accrued, but never a word of complaint did I hear from this community. They knew that long before there was a brick school house in the county that I had been the friend of themselves and their children. They knew that the cream of my life had been spent in aiding my community to keep up with the progress of the times. They knew that I was doing all that was humanly possible to survive the calamity that had come upon us.

They knew that to add interest, penalties and other burdens to my already heavy overload of responsibility, meant only injury to themselves as well as I.

Never did they attempt to coerce my lien holders and make them panic and make it so unpleasant that no one would care to invest in real estate. By that course, land is desired in the McCarty community.

In due season many of us have been able to refinance our lands and pay all delinquent taxes. On my tract alone it required \$302.13 which was a delight to me to pay. I do not begrudge the \$1500.00 that I have paid the McCarty school during the last eighteen years, notwithstanding I have never been a direct recipient of the benefits of their school, nor until recently have there been pupils from the farm referred to.

To McCarty school: "May it live long and prosper."

The local chamber of commerce is in receipt of a letter from Bert W. Self of the Self Grain Company of Crowell, Texas, with the reference to the locating of a mill and elevator at Lamesa. Negotiations have been going on for some time with Mr. Self who is a representative of the Burrus Elevator people of Fort Worth and it looks like these people have become interested in the location of an elevator here. Following is a copy of the letter from Mr. Self:

"Dear Sirs: Your letter with reference to the prospects on your wheat, and we are truly glad you have a good prospect, and we trust the wheat matures to an advantage because this will mean a start for you on wheat in your county."

I have had a talk with Mr. Roy Ayers with reference to going to Lamesa and running the business for us. Mr. Ayers is very enthusiastic over the proposition and feels as I do about it, that it is the thing to do. We have to come over to Lamesa in May to brand the calves so we will be over around the middle of May, and at that time we will bring Mr. Ayers with us, and visit the major part of your farmers that have wheat acreage. If the wheat still looks good, perhaps we will place our scales and office.

It is too late for this season to build the plant in time for the movement, but if your farmers plant the acreage this fall, we can then place the plant. Please be assured that we will do all we can to help them in every way possible to seed a good crop this fall.

You can also assure your farmers that we will be in position to handle their grain anyway they want it handled, either buy it outright at any time, storage, money to loan on storage, or —well, we want to be of service and help in every way possible.

We appreciate very much your spirit of cooperation, and we feel that with your help we can secure a good acreage this coming fall. In the meantime we are

Pink Boll Worm Claimants, Attention!

We realize that many Pink Boll-worm Claimants are wondering why they have not been paid, or wondering when they will be paid. The causes of the delay were explained at the public hearings held some time ago, but as only about ten per cent of the claimants attended these meetings, we are taking this means of making further explanations.

The meetings were held at the earliest possible date the law would permit in order to get this part of the work out of the way, so the work of adjustment could go on uninterrupted.

Immediately after the hearings were completed, we began checking the claims. This is very slow work on the average. There will not be less than ten thousand claims. Each claim must be checked against the records of from one to eight gins. The claims are often interlocked with tenants and sub-tenants. If there are no gin records, we must consider and pass upon such proof as the claimants offer. In many instances no proof is offered. In many other instances the claims do not correspond with the gin records. All this necessitates a great amount of correspondence, which means delay. If we average checking a claim every three minutes, and work eight hours a day it will take two and one third months to check ten thousand claims. This work cannot be avoided, hence the delay is unavoidable.

We wish to hereby advise all claimants that where the gin records do not substantiate the amounts claimed, additional proof, under the oath of claimants and witnesses, will have to be furnished or the claims will have to be adjusted to correspond with the gin records. We do not want any claimant to lose any money he is entitled to receive, because gin records may be in error or not available. But satisfactory proof must back each and every claim.

Proofs in addition to, or in lieu of gin records, may be made by neighbors, hired help, the ginners, sales tickets, bank deposits, etc. We will consider all such evidence upon its merits. Of course where claimants have gin tickets, no other proof is necessary, provided the tickets are sent in.

In conclusion we want to say that all this work is regretted by us, as well as a tax upon the patience of claimants who have long been waiting for this money. No time is being and no work is being done that is not absolutely necessary. All who are entitled to participate in this fund are warned they must file their names with us by the fifteenth of this month.
