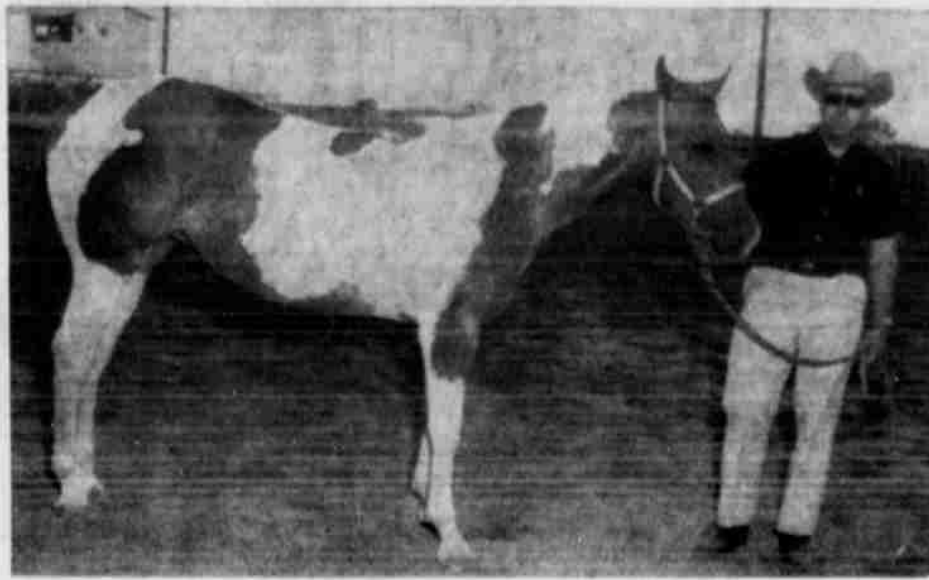


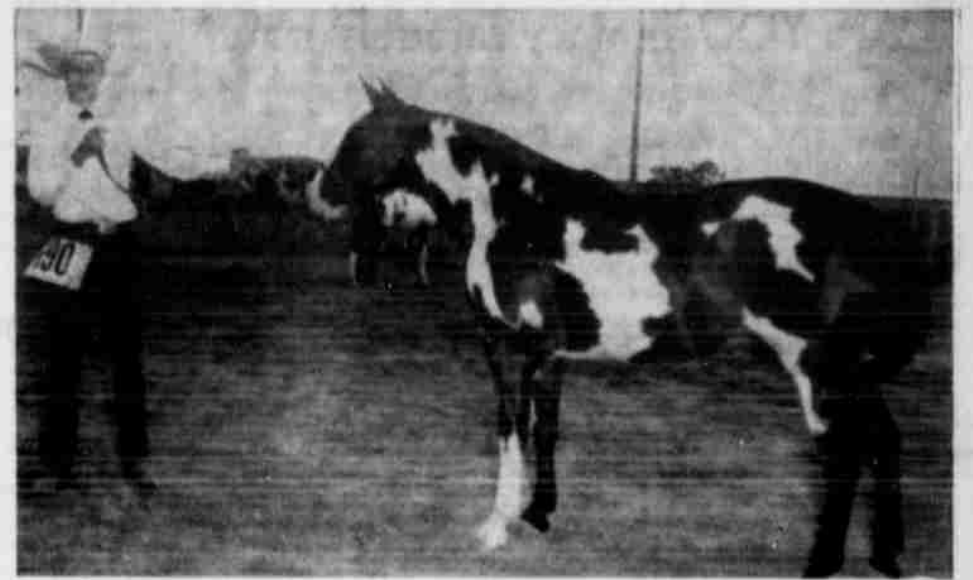
3 grand champions named in Paint Horse Show Saturday

Cash prizes offered rodeo parade floats

Float entries are being sought for the Post Stampede & Junior Rodeo parade to be held at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 10, Parade Chairman Bill Gordon said today.

Cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be awarded sponsors of the first, second and third place floats in the parade.

One club and other organizations and business firms wishing to enter floats in the parade are asked to contact the parade chairman at telephone numbers 2993 or 2994.

The parade, which traditionally includes a number of riding teams from throughout the area, will have first, second and third place prizes to be awarded the three groups.

With the Post Stampede, Inc., and Post Junior Rodeo Association have made further plans at recent meetings, and the juniors will have another meeting scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 26, in the district courtroom.

This year's rodeo, to be held Aug. 19-21, will include six events.

For senior contestants and seven events for juniors. RCA and GRA rules will govern each event.

The senior events are bareback bronc, calf roping, saddle bronc, barrel race, team roping and bull riding. The junior events are bareback bronc, calf roping, barrel race, ribbon roping, bull riding, pole bending and flag race for contestants 12 years of age or under.

Glenn Green of Amarillo will furnish the livestock for this year's rodeo.

Dances will be held at the rodeo grounds each night, with music by Hoyle Nix and his band.

Elaine Bland is in charge of junior rodeo entries and Donald Windham, senior rodeo entries.

The 50 horses entered in the show were judged by Pat Mays of Roscoe.

Warbonnet, ridden by young Vickie Adams of Gainesville, scored 19 points for high point honors in the show, placing first in junior reining, first in open barrel racing, second in pole bending and second in western pleasure.

Trophies were awarded grand and reserve champions, with rosettes going to first through sixth place winners.

Are YOU 'hungry enough' now?

It was all too obvious last Thursday afternoon to the small group who heard Harry Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission talk about industry-getting that Post has fallen two years behind many of its West Texas competitors in the search for payrolls.

Clark's five-point program to attract industry, which he brought here for the first time two years ago, fell on deaf ears then.

"It didn't take," said Clark Thursday. He pointed out that such towns as Abilene, Slatt, Littlefield and Muleshoe got the message at the same time and immediately got busy developing the recommended program.

It has paid off for all of them handsomely. "You haven't been as hungry as other towns because you already have the Postex Cotton Mills," is the way Clark explained the lack of local follow through.

Clark defined "community leadership" as "that quality of character which causes a man to give up \$1 today in the hope of making \$2 tomorrow."

"You can't have a better town without community leadership," Clark also said.

Right there is a lot of food for local thought. Community leadership requires giving of one's time freely today in the hope that it will prove of immeasurably more benefit tomorrow.

"It's a selfish definition, but a true one," Clark added.

Post needs a whole lot more men willing to take on the mantle of leadership on Clark's terms, working today for tomorrow's hope.

This is not to say that Post's Chamber of Commerce hasn't had an industrial committee which has worked on the search for industry.

But this is to say that we have made little

if any effort to enlist the aid which is offered us by the Texas Industrial Commission, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and our other "allies"—as Clark calls them.

This is to say that we have failed to take advantage of a lot of good and proven advice, which others have readily accepted and made to work for them.

As Clark says, Post has to "prove to us it can deliver the goods" before we can recommend it to industry on the prowl. And he added you have to "prove it" to all your allies as well.

This is probably "the last time around" for Post as far as helping hands are concerned. If we don't want to make the effort, we can expect nobody to help us.

Clark pointed out that when it comes to recommending Texas sites for industry we recommend only those we think can "deliver the goods." "If we don't, some other state lands the industry, when our job was to bring it to Texas," he added. "We have to recommend the best we have."

Post needs to completely revamp its industrial outlook, enlist its "allies," and start doing all the necessary groundwork for such a five-point program to seek industry. It needs, if it can finance it, to put a professionally trained man in as Chamber of Commerce manager. It needs to work out an industrial development corporation and plan an industrial park.

Clark points to the way. It is up to us—each and all of us—to determine whether we want to follow. It's a tremendous challenge, but no impossible one, because so many towns have already done it.

How's YOUR appetite for industry? Are you hungry enough now to get started?—JC

Nobody happy yet with Texas water plan

The Texas Water Plan, designed to "solve" the state's water needs for the next 50 years, appears to be under fire from every quarter—not just from ignored West Texas.

Everybody is after all the water they need for each area. That of course isn't possible. Some are raising "old Ned" because the wastes of Fort Worth and Dallas are going to be dumped into one river. Others contend East Texas has forecast water needs in great excess of requirements. Other areas say their projected needs are far too small.

But West Texas has the biggest gripe. They have simply been ignored.

The Texas Water Plan says quite simply that there isn't enough available Texas water to supply West Texas' lush irrigation areas so this part of the state is going to have to rely on water imported in a regional plan from out-of-state sources. Not mentioned is the fact that West Texas can expect no hope of relief from such sources for at least 30 years.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has leaped into the fray.

The most recent West Texas "ally" to take up the war club is the Plains Cotton Growers, which now has appointed a water committee to

study the state water plan and see what can be done in the "beck raising" field.

Lubbock has powerful political allies in state government and the legislature which no doubt are being quietly organized behind the scenes.

With the stream just starting to rise from West Texas over the first water hearing on the state plan in Lubbock, the water resources board is now busy with two months of intensive hearings in all other portions of the state.

They are finding that nobody seems very happy with the plan. Each section wants a whole lot more than has been provided.

The outcome may be some years away. They won't start building any of the 50 new reservoirs, canals, etc. this year or the next.

But Texas is coming to grips with its water problem. That is the important thing. A lot of wrangling is going to result in a lot of redrafting and a lot of compromises.

But from it will come what we all can hope will be truly a state-wide water plan which will be a salvation for Texas. With all our intramural skirmishes, Texas is now stepping out in the forefront of the nation in all-important water planning.—JC

Big season for Youth Baseball

With the exception of the district tournaments, the Little League and Babe Ruth League seasons have ended here, along with the Minor League. The only team still active in local play is the Teen-Age League team of older boys.

The season has been a big success, and for the first time this year David Nichols Park will be the site of the district Little League tournament.

There have been a number of improvements at the park, including the construction of an imposing entrance through the civic-mindedness and generosity of the Masonic Lodge and other organizations and individuals.

The piping of city water to the park in advance of the Little League tournament to be held there next week is another improvement.

This year's play and the improvements all

came during the first season the park was operated after its gift to the City of Post by the Post-Montgomery Estate. So, along with the gift of the park to the city, the Summer Youth Baseball Program here can be said to have made its greatest strides this season.

Certainly not to be forgotten are the league officials, team sponsors, managers and coaches, umpires, scorekeepers, and other helpers, the players themselves and their parents, who always find it necessary to make sacrifices in order for their sons to make all the practice sessions and play in all the games. Nor the Post Jaycees, who operated the concession stands at the ball park.

Good showings by the Little League and Babe Ruth League all-stars in their respective district tournaments will make the season just closed even more of a success.—CD

Trinity University announces three new building projects

SAN ANTONIO — Trinity University today announced three new building projects, all additions to the University's campus master plan which has seen the construction of 38 major buildings since 1952.

The three new projects are a Center for Administrative Studies, a central reception area for the men's residence halls on Trinity's lower campus, and the construction of additional tennis courts, also on the lower campus.

Trinity currently has one major building under construction. The Ruth Taylor Theater is earmarked for completion in mid-autumn.

During the past academic year, the University opened seven new structures as part of the current \$50 million Centennial Program: Two men's residence halls, a two-story dining hall, the Moody Engineering Building, and the Margaret B. Parker Chapel. The Chapel was dedicated in late May.

Two more buildings are awaiting financing under the campus master plan. They are a life-sciences center and an auditorium with communications center. Both are to be completed before the University's 100th anniversary in 1968.

Trinity began its graduate program in hospital administration in 1965; it is now the second largest such program in the nation.

The second new building project is a \$37,500 reception area to serve the six University residence halls for men. The building will be constructed to the west of South Hall and will be connected to that structure.

Final construction project announced today is the building of seven additional all-weather tennis courts on the south campus. Seating and lighting will be provided at an estimated total cost of \$75,000.

Trinity programs in tennis are internationally known and the present tennis stadium will be reserved primarily for varsity play.

Vet's Forum

Q. I am a member of the National Guard and have served three years in this capacity, including a 15-day active duty period each year. Does this service qualify me for educational assistance under the new G. I. Bill?

A. National Guard drills and 15-day tours of training duty do not qualify a person in the new G. I. Bill. Eligibility requires at least 181 days active military service (as opposed to training), or if service were less than this period of time, it must have been terminated by reason of service-incurred disability. The veteran must have also served on or after Feb. 1, 1955.

Q. Would a doctor participating in the VA Career Resident Program as a full time physician of the Department of Medicine and Surgery be eligible to schooling under the new G. I. Bill?

A. No. Those participating in residency and internship program under 38 USC 4114 (b) would be entitled.

Q. I am a serviceman now on active duty. I previously served more than 180 days, part of this period after Jan. 31, 1955, and honorably discharged. I plan to continue my education at a nearby college and my duty schedule will permit me to carry an academic load of 10 semester hours. What is the rate of educational allowance payable to me by the VA. I have a wife and one child.

A. You will be entitled to the same \$115 per month which is payable to a discharged veteran with two dependents (VAR 14136 (B)).

It's the Law...

HOW MUCH RELIGIOUS LIBERTY?

"The crowning glory of American freedom," wrote one exultant judge, "is another religious liberty."

Yet, is "absolute" the right word? Are there really no limits at all to our religious liberty?

The great, historic test of this question arose a century ago when a Mormon was arrested for polygamy. In his defense he relied on the constitutional guarantee of religious freedom.

But the Supreme Court drew a momentous line dividing that freedom into two parts: freedom of belief and freedom of practice. The Court said freedom of belief has no limits, but freedom of practice must necessarily have limits if society is going to function successfully.

Otherwise, said the Court, any anti-social act — including even human sacrifice — would be lawful if it bore a religious label.

"Every citizen (would) become a law unto himself. Government could exist only in name."

Thus, in assorted test cases, courts have held it illegal—even for religious reasons—to use child labor, to violate a liquor law, to curse a policeman, or to handle snakes dangerously in church. However sincere the defendant's religious belief, his religious practice went beyond what society could fairly permit.

Nevertheless, in each one of these cases, the court acted only because the need for setting limits seemed very clear indeed. By and large, the law has bent over backward to avoid putting limits on religious practice.

For instance, courts have upheld the right of religious partisans to ring doorbells (even if that might annoy some folk) and to hand out leaflets (even if that might cause litter).

Furthermore, under the sturdy constitutional shelter, unusual forms of worship continue to sprout and flourish.

So our religious freedom, if not quite "absolute," is reassuringly close to it—just as the Founding Fathers intended.

"They fashioned a charter of government," the Supreme Court has said, "which envisaged the widest possible toleration of conflicting views. Man's relation to his God was made no concern of the state."

5 hurt in June county accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Garza County during the month of June, according to Sgt. A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,785.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in 19 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$44,795.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1,470 traffic deaths compared to 1,325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This 11 per cent increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

The sergeant stated, "It is estimated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10 per cent over 1965 which means approximately 3,300 persons will be killed in traffic accidents." The sergeant added one other comment, "To control accidents, we must first learn to control ourselves."

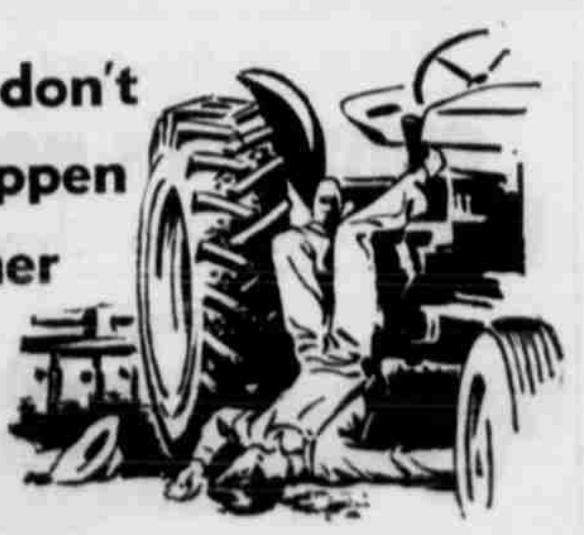

ancial program. He said the industrial foundation method is the best method of community financing.

Clark said if an industrial foundation is formed, expenditures to help new industry should be limited to the purchase of land and buildings only. Your banker, he said, is your key man here.

As for sites, Clark recommended that a city industrial park or district should be backed by a railroad, fronted by a highway, with all utilities available.

"On today's market, if you sell it to industry at \$1,000 an acre, you are competitive," Clark said. "Any price you put under \$1,000 an acre improves your competitive position."

"You need as many pieces of land as you can get," he declared. The TIC head said only 1,500 new plant decisions will be made in the United States in 1966 for plants employing 25 or more people.

TURNING TO prospects, Clark said Post's best prospect is the industry you already have—Postex Cotton Mills. They are already here and making a profit, he added.

Your second best prospect, Clark said, is "a man with an idea." Lots of towns seeking industry find the "man with an idea" living right there in their towns. He said the TIC is sponsoring three industrial expositions this year to give "men with ideas" a chance to get together with industry-seeking communities. He said Kermit got a new industry by attending one of these expositions.

The third way to get prospects is through "your allies," Clark said. He listed Post's allies as including Pioneer Natural Gas, Southwestern Public Service, the Santa Fe Railroad, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Industrial Commission.

The TIC generates both prospects and suspects each year, which are made available to all interested communities, Clark said.

HE EMPHASIZED the point that "your allies must be convinced Post can deliver the goods before the town is recommended to an industrial prospect. That, you must do for yourself."

Clark said the Texas Directory of Manufacturers is a prime source of prospects as many Texas industries have two or more plants in the state. Many communities, he said, concentrate on contacting Texas firms alone. They don't bother to go beyond state borders.

He pointed out that the Lubbock Chamber's "Think Lubbock" campaign, put on last year at a cost

of only \$5,000 in advertising and promotion, brought in a total of 323 industrial prospects which Lubbockites told the Chamber about after being made "industrial conscious."

"This five-point program we recommend to attract industry is as flexible as you want to make it, but frankly you get out of it in proportion to what you put into it," Clark said.

QUESTIONED AS TO whether an industrial site for Post should be located inside or outside the city limits, Clark answered by saying there is little cost difference to industry as they would need essential city services such as water, sewage, and fire protection and would have to pay for it instead of paying taxes if they were located outside the city limits.

"One town in Texas brags that it has no taxes, but it doesn't have anything else either," Clark said.

Most industries willingly pay their fair share of taxes, Clark said. They insist only on being treated fairly and not having to pay extra.

LARRY MILNER, industrial development consultant for West Texas of the TIC who accompanied Clark to Post, said the TIC has what he termed "community profiles" of some 150 West Texas towns which the TIC makes available to industry for site consideration when these towns meet the requirements laid down by the searching industry.

Post doesn't have its community profile on file with the TIC. But Chamber President Glen Barley promised to get one worked up shortly and forwarded to Austin.

Milner in reply to a question about available labor said the average pay industry will not consider a community for plant location unless it can prove by a Texas Employment Commission survey it has enough available labor for the plant. He said such surveys are made without cost at the community's request. Mayor Harold Lucas announced he already had requested such a survey since his recent trip to the TIC office in Austin with Tom Gamblin.

BOTH CLARK and Milner agreed that the Chamber of Commerce should spearhead the industrial hunt for the community but that any investment capital should be raised through an industrial foundation apart from the Chamber but preferably with overlocking directors.

And they added: "The buck usually stops at City Hall." Which meant the city must work closely

with the Chamber in the industrial effort.

In reply to another question, Clark said he realized that Post's size made it "marginal" for employment of a full-time professionally trained city manager. Milner said the local Chamber could have a full-time manager plus a secretary on a \$12,500 budget. The current Chamber budget, some reported, was near \$10,000.

Milner said there were a variety of successful ways to raise money for an industrial foundation. One was to require 10 per cent of all contributions in cash and the 90 per cent agreed in written contract to be provided when needed for a new industry with a five year limit on the written pledge.

Muleshoe, about Post's size, has successfully concluded a drive to get one hundred persons to contribute \$100 a year for five years for a total of \$50,000.

MILNER ALSO detailed two aids the TIC offers communities interested in learning how best to find new industry. One is the Texas Industrial Planning Seminar—nicknamed TIPS—which is an all-day session in TIC headquarters in Austin at which the TIC briefs town leaders on necessary tools and procedures. To date, 118 Texas communities have come into Austin for such seminars.

The other is the economic development clinic in which the TIC staff would come into Post and get your other "allies" involved and put on a full-day seminar "to train you and give you a chance to sell us and your allies on your town."

Barley got a confirmed date in late September for a Post group to go to Austin for a TIPS seminar.

Clark said the business district of any community is "the face of that town." Post's "face," he said isn't good, but it isn't bad either. He pointed out that improving downtown storefronts helps make a good first impression.

Clark defined "community leadership" as "that quality of character which causes a man to give up \$1 today in the hope of making \$2 tomorrow."

You've got to have "community leadership" to make this program go, Clark declared. "You can't get a better town without leadership."

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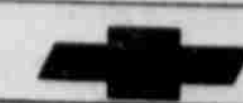

Post is rated likely upsetter of Mustangs

Texas Football, that slick and authoritative grid magazine, just onto the news stands with predictions for all the Lone Star state's football teams for 1966, picks the Denver City Mustangs as "the team to beat" in the upcoming District 4-AA race, but says Post's Antelopes have the best chance to knock the Mustangs from the top rung.

Denver City won't be as overpowering this year, as in former seasons, according to Texas Football.

"TRADITIONALLY a powerhouse, Denver City appears ready to break with tradition this year," the magazine says. "But Don Orr's team still ranks as the team to beat in 4-AA."

"Although 11 lettermen return at Denver City, there are only two holdover regulars on offense and only four on defense, which means this could be a rebuilding year," Texas Football reports.

Since the magazine went to press, the outlook for Denver City dimmed even more with the death of one of those two offensive regulars, 185-pound Jimmy Comer, in a traffic accident. Comer was rated as the best back on the Mustang squad.

"There is a residue of quality from last year's 11-1 team," Texas Football says. "Starting with guard Loyd Bingham, 6-0, 190 pounds, a real standout. Ends Dwayne Young and Mike Mead are both strong, racy types, and in the backfield halfback Gary Hatfield stirs Mustang hopes."

"POST IS the team with the best chance of making the most of Denver City's problems," according to Texas Football.

"Six offensive and five defense regulars return from a 5-5 team. Center Jackie Huff (6-0, 200 and tough) anchors what could be a stout line."

"Also capable up front are ends Don Windham and Davis Heaton, tackle Filemon Vargas, and guard Joe Hudman. Quarterback Dick Kennedy and fullback Paul Walker, 178, stoke the hottest fires in the backfield."

But Texas Football didn't have all the information on Post. Vargas tripped in the spring over scholastic hurdles and will be ineligible to play both ways again this fall on offense and defense.

HOW DOES Antelope Gridmaster Glynn Gregg feel about Texas Football's 4-AA predictions? Gregg said Saturday at the swimming pool that "I think they're pretty close."

Gregg says Post has a good chance this year "if we can get mentally ready." "It is understood," he added significantly, "that the boys will be physically ready for the first practice call."

Gregg thinks the "town as well as the team" will have to get mentally ready for the Denver City game here Oct. 21.

"If the boys are to have a positive attitude toward Denver City the fans will have to have the same attitude," Gregg said. "That's important."

GREGG SEES Stanton as the "darkhorse" entry in the district's grid race and he reports that the Stanton coach is now "talking title" among the Stanton homefolks and grid hopefuls.

Stanton, according to Texas Football, will have "the area's finest passer firing for them." He is Buddy Shanks, 6-1, 185 pounds, an all-district choice for two years.

Stanton Coach Bryan Boyd claims proudly of Shanks: "He has the finest passing ability of any high school boy."

The supporting cast at Stanton also looks "first rate," according to Texas Football: 10 offensive and nine defensive regulars returning in all and many of them have size.

"Stout line play is expected from interior veterans Phil Payne, 185; Bert Decker, 197; Carl Herzog, 190; Fred Newman, 185; Don Burns and Randy Huckaby," Texas Football reads. "While Shanks is the prominent name in the backfield, Allen Springer, 185, is a good fullback and Larry White a promising halfback."

TEXAS FOOTBALL'S rundown on the rest of the district:

"Morton has 15 lettermen, but only five returning regulars. Watch for quarterback Jon St. Clair, fullback Jimmy Waters, tackle Larry Smith, end Lammell Abbe and center Ray King to provide the team's nucleus."

"Slaton, lacking depth and experience, hopes to rebuild with the talents offered by interior veterans Joe Olague, Tommy Donaldson, and Roy Green, and running backs Doyle Ethridge, Larry Pickens and Charles Fisher."

"Frenship's case lacks strength. Only four lettermen return, which means backs Mandy Garcia, Joe Lara and Randy Curry and tackle David Hutcherson must set a fast pace."

TEXAS FOOTBALL also has these thumbnails of Post's first five non-district foes:

"Hale Center, the Antelopes' opener, is up from Class A ranks and in District 3-AA this year where Abernathy is top rated."

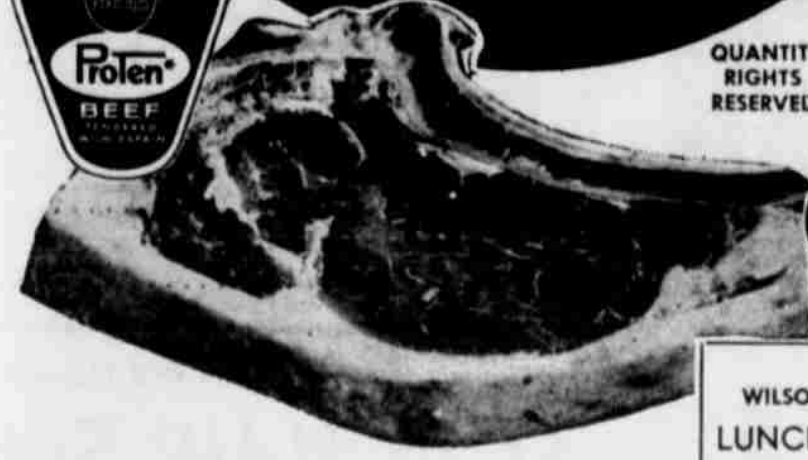

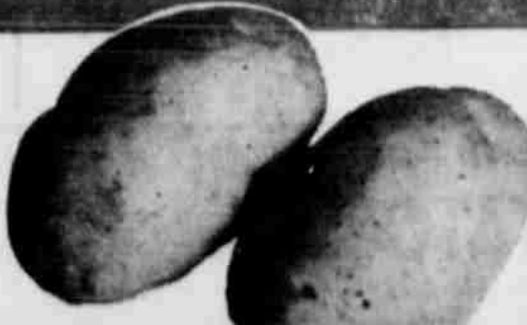
