Big Annual Rodeo Promises To Be Best In Many Years; Many Contestants To Enter

Plans for the big annual rodeo to be held here Thursday and Friday, June 15 and 16, are completed according to Jess Haley and Tip Frazier, managers of the affair. Contestants from all over this and adjoining counties are expected to participate. The rodeo will be staged at the American Legion ball park, east of town.

A big free barbecue will be served on the Court House lawn at noon Thursday—plenty for everybody to eat.

Contestants will parade through the streets of Sanderson at 10 o'clock each morning. Cowboys and cowgirls of the Big Bend country, colorfully attired and riding the best mounts to be found in the border ranges, will strut their stuff each morning for the benefit of admiring crowds. Many "old timers" will ride in the parade.

Rodeo events will start promptly at 2 p.m. Bronco riding, bull dogging, steer riding, calf roping and many other spectacular events will be staged. Attractive purses will be offered. Admission prices will be 50 and 25 cents daily.

Among out of town contestants expected to be here are Walter and Royce Babb, of Langtry, champion calf ropers, Allen Holden, Rankin, Edward Westfall, Fort Stockton and Bill McElroy of Toyah, Earl and Jack Sellers, Del Rio, expert calf ropers.

Many local riders and ropers have announced their intentions of taking part in the rodeo, among them, Henry Mansfield, Wade Harrell, "Coon" Chandler and Milton Smith, bronco riders; Emmett Buck, Willie Banner and Charlie Turk expect to try for the goat roping prizes. All around ropers expected to enter are, Charlie Gregory, "Son" Turner and Louie Cravey.

A big dance will be given at the C. A. C. Hall each night. A peppy dance orchestra will furnish music for the dancers.

Big Bend Ranchers Held Captive In Mexico, Returned

Art Hannold and John Rollins, Brewster county cowmen, who were captured by bandits about twenty-five miles below San Vicente three weeks ago when they crossed the Rio Grande into Mexico on the trail of horse thieves, rode their horses back across the river to Texas soil and safety Tuesday of last week after being held captive in Mexico for 13 days.

Captured by Camelario Baeza, notorious Mexican outlaw, the two men were forced to ride 150 miles into the cactus infested desert south of the Rio Grande to Ocampo where they were turned over to officials. Baeza first promised to "arroyo" the Americans but, for some unknown reason changed his mind and decided to send them before a Mexican judge for trial. At Ocampo, they report, they were not guarded and were started back on the long ride to the border as soon as release papers could be secured from Villa Acuna.

Hannold and Rollins were escorted on the return trip by two Mexican officers from Ocampo. The two officers insisted on making a detour to avoid passing near Olan, reputed headquarters of the Mexican bandit leader, they said. The ranchers still carried the rifles they had when they crossed into Mexico, on the return trip.

Century Plants To Bloom Here Next Few Days

Two large century plants, each about 25 feet in height and as nearly perfect specimens as can be found anywhere, according to local botanical experts, are in bud and will burst forth in full bloom within the next few days, their owner, Sra. Antonia Cardenas, told a Times reporter Thursday. Indications are that there will be 17 blooms on each of the big plants.

According to tradition the century plant blooms only once, at the age of 100 years. The two specimens owned by Sra. Cardenas were transplanted in her yard twelve years ago.

The plants grow wild in profusion through out this section of the country.

Terrell County Quota Of Five Entrain Tuesday For Fort Clark

Wartime days were recalled here Wednesday when a special Southern Pacific passenger train loaded with young men bound for the training camps passed through town.

This time, however, the boys are not being trained to kill and destroy but to conserve and construct. All over the United States reforestation camps are being established where unemployed young men are being trained for work in the national forests.

Five local boys, Terrell county's quota, left Sanderson Tuesday for Fort Clark where they were given a physical examination before being sent to Fort Sam Houston for a two weeks training course before being sent to the forest camps.

The five young men who were called from this county were: Elmer Haass, Norman Harold East, Fleming, J. Riley Dunman and Matias Guterrez.

AUSTIN, May 27. (AP)—The two Houses of the Legislature were at variance today on sine die adjournment date.

The House voted to quit next Saturday, while the Senate previously set next Tuesday for adjournment. The Senate refused to concur in the House date and asked the appointment of a conference committee.

Devil's River Steel Bridge Work Contract Is Let To Virginia Construction Firm

Contract for the steel work of the Devil's River highway bridge has been let to the Virginia Bridge and Iron Works, it was unofficially announced Saturday. The company was low bidder when the contracts were opened May 10 and officials stated they expect to start work with 30 or 40 days.

The Virginia Bridge and Iron Works has headquarters in Roanoke, Va., with Texas headquarters at Dallas. Work on the Devil's River bridge is expected to get under way as soon as the company completes the work on the Nueces bridge near Uvalde, officials stated.

Announcement of the company holding the contract has not been made by the State Highway Department.

LAND OWNERS GET 20 YEARS TO PAY BONUS

Burden Eased Of Oil Debt Due From West Texans

AUSTIN, May 26.—The House of the Texas Legislature Thursday afternoon adopted a conference report on the "West Texas Land bill" giving 5,000 land owners 20 years time in which to pay oil bonus due the State.

The conference report embodies the principal Senate contentions. Adoption there is expected also.

A similar bill calling for payment in 40 years was defeated at the session of the last Legislature.

Court decisions previously had held that the Legislature could not relinquish the oil bonus to the surface owners.

Many millions of dollars are involved. The amount collected by the State will go to the public school fund.

During the time the debt is running, interest will be charged at four per cent a year. To secure the extended time, affidavits of ability to pay all at once must be made.

Oil companies as well as the surface owners are liable for the bonuses that they have already paid to the surface owners.

Opponents of the conference report contended that the report is so worded that the land owners are held to the payment while the oil companies can escape. Committee members denied this.

Governor Urges House to Approve Housing Measure

AUSTIN, May 27. (AP)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today sent an message to the House urging the passage of a bill already passed by the Senate to provide better housing facilities for families of low income.

The bill would authorize the organization of companies to borrow from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to build houses for poorer people.

When the steel work on the Devil's River bridge is completed the work on Highway No. 3 that has been underway for nearly a year will be finished. Traffic has been routed on the new Castle Canyon and Evans Creek bridges for the past two weeks and the shortened highway, which eliminates many of the winding curves on the road, lacks only the topping to be complete. At present the only detour on the new road is around the Devil's River bridge, traffic being sent over the old causeway. Piers and abutments for the bridge have been completed for some time, but the bridge will not be in use until the flooring and steel work has been completed.—Del Rio Evening News.

Brewster Gets Finances For Park Projects

AUSTIN, May 27. (AP)—Lawrence Westbrook, in charge of Reconstruction Finance Corporation relief work in Texas, announced tonight that the federal government had approved 26 projects in Texas on which 5,200 unemployed persons would be given work.

Only four of the projects have been definitely approved. These were forestry camps in East Texas in Angelina, Newton, Jasper, Trinity and Polk Counties. Men will be moved to these camps immediately, Westbrook said. Two hundred men will be sent to each camp. One of the East Texas camps will be located in two counties.

Westbrook said the federal government soon probably would approve projects on which a total of 10,000 Texans would be given gainful employment.

Four park projects camps have been tentatively approved for the Palo Duro Canyon in Potter and Randall Counties, and four have been proposed for Canyon State Park in Brewster County, recently established by the State Legislature.

Two park camps in Jeff Davis County have been approved tentatively.

Tax Delinquent Bill Signed By Governor Friday

AUSTIN, May 26. (AP)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today signed a bill providing for a penalty of one per cent of delinquent ad valorem taxes were paid by October 1; two per cent between October 1 and December 31; four percent between December 31 and March 21; six percent between March 31 and July 1 of next year.

The law would apply to all property taxes now delinquent except those owned by cities and independent school districts, which might adopt the plan if they desired.

WASHINGTON, May 27. (AP)—The Reconstruction Corporation Friday approved loans of \$23,200,000 to the Southern Pacific Company.

To meet equipment trust maturities, interest on funded debt and judgments due by January 1, 1934, the corporation authorized \$22,000,000 and \$1,200,000, made under the work loan provision, was allotted for the erection of a new terminal station at Houston.

The loans were approved previously by the interstate commerce commission.

LULL IS PLEASED

HOUSTON, May 27.—Gratification was expressed here Friday night by H. M. Lull, executive vice president of the Southern Pacific Lines in Texas and Louisiana, over the action of the R. F. C. in authorizing a loan of \$23,200,000 to the Southern Pacific Company, which will include \$1,200,000 for construction of a new passenger station in Houston.

"I am very pleased that the loan has gone through," Mr. Lull said. "I am hopeful that work can be started on the new station, but I had rather wait until we get something more in detail on the loan and conditions before giving out any definite information."

While Mr. Lull would not say how soon it would be before work can be started, between two and three months will be required for preliminary details of the construction work, such as advertising for bids, tabulation, and finally awarding of the contract.

Mr. Lull said that architectural had been completed for some time drawing of the proposed terminal and were in the hands of the R. F. C.

He did not know for sure when the pictures of the building will be available to newspapers for publication.

The application for a loan was approved about two weeks ago by the interstate commerce commission, and it was generally understood that approval of the R. F. C. would follow.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

S. J. R. NO. 30.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section, Section 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have power to authorize by law the issuance and sale of the bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed the sum of Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four and one-half (4½%) per centum per annum; and payable serially or otherwise not more than Ten (10) years from their date, and said bonds shall be sold for not less than par and accrued interest and no form of commission shall be allowed in any transaction involving said bonds. The proceeds of the sale of such bonds to be used in furnishing relief and work relief to needy and distressed people and in relieving the hardships resulting from unemployment, but to be fairly distributed over the State and upon such terms and conditions as may be provided by law and the legislature shall make such appropriations as are necessary to pay the interest and principal of such bonds as the same becomes due. The power hereby granted to the Legislature to issue bonds hereunder is expressly limited to the amount stated and to two years from and after the adoption of this grant of power by the people. Provided that the Legislature shall provide for the payment of the interest and redemption of any bonds issued under the terms hereof from some source other than a tax on real property and the indebtedness as evidenced by such bonds shall never become a charge against or lien upon any property, real or personal, within this State."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the Twentysixth day of August, A. D. 1933, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, for relieving the

hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriations to pay said bonds"; Those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, for relieving the hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriations to pay said bonds."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

S. J. R. No. 32
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article VIII, Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; provided that this exemption shall not be applicable to that portion of the State ad valorem taxes levied for State purposes remitted within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, until the expiration of such period of remission, unless before the expiration of such period the board or governing body of any one or more of such counties or political subdivisions shall have certified to the State Comptroller that the need for such remission of taxes has ceased to exist in such county or political subdivision; then this Section shall be come applicable to each county or political subdivision as and when it shall become within the provisions hereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

H. J. R. NO. 43.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), of Section 29, of Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"(a): The manufacture, sale, barter or exchange in the State of Texas of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication, or any other intoxicant whatever except vinous or malt liquors of not more than three and two-tenths per cent (3.2%) alcoholic content by weight, (except for medicinal, mechanical, scientific or sacramental purposes) are each and all hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall enact laws to enforce this Section, and may from time to time prescribe regulations and limitations relative to the manufacture, sale barter, exchange or possession for sale of vinous or malt liquors of not more than three and two-tenths per cent (3.2%) alcoholic content by weight; provided the Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct, town or city may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale for beverage purpose of vinous or malt liquors containing not more than three and two tenths per cent (3.2%) alcohol by weight shall be prohibited within the prescribed limits; and provided further that in all counties in the State of Texas and in all political subdivisions thereof, wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 29, Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell barter or exchange in any such county or in any such political subdivision thereof, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters, capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicant whatsoever, unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in said county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine it to be lawful to manufacture, sell, barter and exchange in said county or political subdivision thereof vinous or malt liquors containing not more than three and two-tenths per cent (3.2%) alcoholic content by weight, and the provision of this subsection shall be self enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933. At this election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following
