Legislature To Hear Terrell Impeachment Charges

Solons Vote To Retain Present Prison System Units

Sale Of One Farm Sought By Action Of House Monday

Plan With Senate

Appropriation Of \$550,000 Approved For Rehabilitation Of Penitentiary At Huntsville And Farms

(Special To The Avalanche)

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—The house of representatives today voted to retain all units of the Texas prison system as they are now located with the exception of the Shaw farm in Bowie county which it would sell. It would be sold by August 31, 1931, in rehabilitation of the system. This amount would be divided equally between the Huntsville penitentiary and the farm.

The house action disposed of hopes which Gov. Moody and his supporters might have had of gaining his approval for a central plant at Austin during the present session.

Up To Senate
Such a plan is approved, however, in the bill which waits final passage by the senate.

The senate has expressed such a bill, accompanied by resolutions guaranteeing certain improvements on the farm, and it was scheduled for final passage today, but instead of considering it, the senate spent the day on other matters.

The house bill is to be sent to the senate tomorrow, and the senate is expected to substitute the Austin plan as an amendment which the house will, in turn, reject.

To Draft Bill
The drafting of a bill designed to meet the approval of both bodies will then be begun in hands of a conference committee composed of members of both houses. In accordance with custom, the major-

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Decide Wednesday On Brady's Trial

Change Of Venue Asked By District Attorney For Second Trial Of Jurist On Murder Charges

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—John W. Brady will know Wednesday or later where his second trial on charges of murdering Miss Leila Highsmith, capital stenographer, will be held.

Judge J. D. Moore of the Travis county district court, where the Brady case was on trial for three weeks announced today that he would not take action on a motion for a change of venue filed by the state until District Attorney Henry Brooks could consider a probable site for the second trial. Brooks said he would be ready Wednesday.

A Travis county jury was discharged Saturday after it reported it could not agree on the guilt or innocence of the former court clerk. The jury reported that it stood 11 to 1 for conviction. Of those favoring conviction, nine wanted to inflict the death penalty and two voted for life imprisonment.

District Attorney Brooks, who said he would follow the case as prosecutor where ever it went and that he would oppose it for Brady pending another trial, declared that he had been advised by District Attorney D. R. Wood of Williamson county that he doubted if a jury could be obtained at Georgetown, suggested site for the next trial, in view of wide publicity given to the testimony adduced at the trial here.

MEREL BANK FAILS

Affairs Placed In Hands Of Banking Department

MEREL, Feb. 10. (AP)—Affairs of the Farmers State bank of Merel today were in the hands of the state banking department after it had failed to open for business this morning.

The failure of a Fort Worth bank which held cash assets of the bank here was given as the reason for the closing. A reorganization was planned.

"Conditions over which the local management had no control prompted us to turn over the assets to the state banking department for protection of depositors," R. O. Anderson, active vice-president, said.

Wurzbach Seated In House To End Long Controversy

Report Of Elections Committee Probing Contest Says Charges Of Fraud Are Substantiated

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Harry M. Wurzbach was seated today as representative from the 14th Texas district, ending a controversy between himself and Augustus McCloskey that sprang up immediately after the 1928 elections with the charge by Wurzbach that his democratic opponent had been seated by fraudulent alterations of returns.

While the elections committee in its report said only that Wurzbach had been elected and McCloskey had failed of election, Chairman Sears of the group which investigated the contest said on the floor that the fraud charge had been substantiated.

The elections committee was roundly criticized tonight by Representative O'Connor, republican, Oklahoma, who resigned from the committee today because the report filed did "not make any finding of fraud and in my opinion such a finding should have been made."

Lester Fails to Make \$1,500 Bond

R. B. (Blackie) Lester, of Lubbock, held in the county jail on charges of violation of the prohibition laws, last night had not been able to furnish bond for his release, according to announcement from the local sheriff's office.

Quarrel With Wife Blamed In Lubbock Suicide; Slaton Man Fails To End Life

H. B. Martin Shoots Self Following Family Row

PLACING a .32 automatic to his breast and pulling the trigger, H. B. Martin, 33, Sunday night at 10:30 o'clock took his own life, following an alleged quarrel with his wife, a waitress at Tech cafe. The shooting occurred in the yard of the couple's home at 1813 Avenue O. Martin formerly was an employee of the Yellow Cab Taxi company, of this city.

No inquest was held over the body after his death, which occurred before emergency treatment could be rendered. One shot was fired into the heart.

Martin was said to have returned Sunday afternoon about 6 o'clock following several days visit with relatives at Abilene. He worked until February 2, with the local taxi company.

Quarrelled On Return
He and his wife were said to have quarrelled when he returned. G. E. Knight, owner of the home in which the couple roomed, was said to have made an effort to halt the argument, telling Martin that he "would not tolerate such conduct in his home." At the time, about 9 o'clock, Martin apologized for his conduct and for a short while there was no disturbance.

The quarrel started when the former taxi driver sought information from his wife as to "name of the person who told her why he was discharged from employ of the local company."

He is reported to have assembled employees of the Yellow Cab company in the rear of the local office early Sunday evening in an effort to discover who had "told his wife." Members of the Knight family related that the couple were quarrelling when they entered their room about 8 o'clock. 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Progress Made In Naval Conference

Attack On Submarine War On Schedule In Plenary Session Today; U. S. And Britain Seek Abolition

LONDON, Feb. 10. (AP)—While preparing to attack the submarine war at tomorrow's plenary session, the five power naval conference today continued to make progress made on all fronts—as Ramsey MacDonald put it. The British prime minister said this paraphrased a familiar communique of World war days in his declaration to the house of commons on the state of London disarmament negotiations.

He referred for one thing to the progress on an important phase of conference work which for years has been a stumbling block to disarmament.

Compromise Worked Out
It was practically completed today with a compromise of global and category tonnage theories worked out by committee experts to be turned over to the chief delegates, who expect to receive it at 4:30 p. m. Wednesday.

The question of submarines overshadowed all others on the eve of the plenary session wherein Great Britain and the United States will declare for abolition of underwater craft. Italy probably will support their argument in principle against France and Japan.

Hughes As Chief Justice Opposed By Solon Monday

Vote On Confirmation Of Nomination Blocked As Senator Norris Relates Objections In Statement

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Opposition to the nomination of Charles Evans Hughes to be chief justice was expressed in the senate today by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, and a vote on confirmation went over until tomorrow. He had read a lengthy statement setting forth his objections.

Senator Blease, democrat, South Carolina, blocked the vote on confirmation. He later explained that he wanted first to receive a certificate from the physicians of William Howard Taft as to the condition of the former chief justice, who he urged be reappointed.

Taft is ill bed.

Overwhelming support for Hughes, however, was believed to be indicated in the solid line up of democrats on the judiciary committee earlier today for a favorable report on the nomination. That committee voted 10 to 2 to report the nomination to the senate, with Chairman Norris and Senator Blease, republican, Wisconsin, opposing.

Senator Norris based his objections to Hughes, whose ability he acknowledges, on the fact that he had left the supreme court to run for president and was not returning to that bench; and because he felt Mr. Hughes "looks through glasses contaminated by the influence of monopoly as it seeks to get favors by means of which are denied to the common."

Honeymooners Die As Plane Crashes

MARDEN, KENT, England, Feb. 10. (AP)—An English honeymoon couple were killed and four other persons were injured when a "Go-lish" plane bound from Paris to London, dived down to the emergency landing field here and burst into flames this afternoon.

A. Hodges, a naval schoolmaster, aged 28, and his wife, aged 21, were killed in the wreck. They were married only last Wednesday.

Hugh Curson of Hull, England, the French pilot Nevo, and two French mechanics, Albeaux and Lesolier, were injured. All of them are expected to recover.

Curson did heroic rescue work, dashing into the flaming airplane in spite of his own injuries and extricating some of the others. He failed in his efforts to save Mr. and Mrs. Hodges, whose bodies were charred when recovered.

CRANK IN EVIDENCE
Instrument Used In Slaying Introduced By State

DALLAS, Feb. 10. (AP)—The bloody crank with which J. I. Broome, night watchman for a cemetery store house, was beaten to death last Dec. 15 was offered as the final evidence for the prosecution today in the murder trial of L. W. Conway, 21.

The judge's charge will be read to the jury tomorrow, followed by closing arguments.

Victim Unconscious And Not Expected To Recover

SLATON, Feb. 10. — Unconscious from a self-inflicted bullet wound, Chester L. Alexander, 30-year-old employee of a wholesale grocery firm here, is not expected to live through the night, according to a late report by Dr. W. E. Payne, attending physician.

With his young wife looking on, Alexander, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Alexander, of the state community in the south part of the county, shot himself shortly after 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning.

The bullet entered his forehead and lodged in the back of his head, after crushing the brain. He was rushed to the Merry hospital for emergency treatment.

Alexander is the father of three children, ages 10, seven and four years old, respectively. He had been a resident of Lubbock county for the past seven years, moving here from Whitewright, in Grayson county.

No reason for the act could be advanced by relatives.

CROWDS SEE PLUNGE

Woman Trapped By Flames Leaps Eight Stories

CHICAGO, Feb. 10. (AP)—While a crowd estimated at 5,000 looked on, Margaret Paine, 25, one of about 200 employees of seven different firms trapped on the upper floors of a burning building near the Loop, leaped from the eighth story and was probably fatally injured late today when she struck the edge of a life net and fell into the street. All the others escaped without serious injury.

Preparations For Pro Modification Hearing Are Made

Resolution For Probe Into Volstead Enforcement Introduced By Senator Wheeler Monday

Claim Breakdown

Dry-Wet Controversy To Be Aired In House Judiciary Committee Starting Wednesday; Witnesses Named

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. — Preparations continued today for the first congressional hearing on proposals for modification and for repeal of the prohibition law, Senator Wheeler of Montana introduced a resolution today for an investigation of Volstead enforcement.

The house judiciary committee Wednesday begins what is expected to be a protracted airing of the dry wet controversy. The outlook is for the appearance of numerous prominent persons to testify with prohibition opponents being heard first. The first witnesses were named today.

Breakdown Claimed.
Wheeler, who voted dry in Montana 10 years ago—declared in the senate there was "a complete breakdown of prohibition enforcement."

He was challenged by Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas, with a reply that the dry law has been a "glorifying and tremendous success."

The Texas sponsored the Eighteenth amendment.
The Wheeler resolution, after this brief outburst, was referred to the judiciary committee, which the Montana senator had recommended make the inquiry. Chairman Norris of this committee, said it would be considered at the regular meeting next Monday. There was no indication of the sentiment in the senate towards the proposal.

Chairman Graham, of the house judiciary committee, has said that all persons who want to appear at the prohibition hearings will be heard. The association against the prohibition amendment has named some of its most widely-known members.

FOOD ISSUED

Cook County Gives Items To Unpaid Employees

CHICAGO, Feb. 10. (AP)—Cook county began today to issue food, clothing, shoes, coal and milk to its employees, unpaid since December 15. The plan was inaugurated by A. J. Cermak, president of the county board.

The county carries large supplies to provide emergency relief for persons in distress who are without funds or friends. It is from this supply that the clothing and food rations will be drawn. Contracts with large firms to supply such goods until March 31 are held by the county.

SLAYS CHILDREN

Farmer Takes Life After Killing Three

COVINGTON, Ga., Feb. 10. (AP)—Roger Smith, 40-year-old farmer, today shot and killed his three children and then himself at his home near here. His wife was in a barn milking.

The slain children, aged three, seven and nine, were Smith's by a former marriage. Mrs. Smith's two children by a former marriage were not molested.

Sheriff B. L. Johnson said his investigation disclosed Smith had recently been depressed although the reason could not be assigned.

One Hundred And Fifty-Five Under Pro Indictments

Gigantic Coast To Coast Liquor Conspiracy Involving Thirty-One Firms Thought Exposed

(By The Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—One hundred and fifty-five persons and 31 firms of New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and other cities were indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of violating the national prohibition law by means of a conspiracy, whose operations extended from coast to coast.

The indictment listed 297 overt acts in violation of the dry laws and gave as the basis for the conspiracy the illegal diversion of more than 1,000,000 gallons of government alcohol during the last seven years.

All the firms indicted either are now or once were in business requiring the use of alcohol in the manufacture of toilet articles, perfumes, medicines and similar products to which the government gave permits for withdrawing the alcohol. It is charged that much of the alcohol was diverted and re-distilled for beverage purposes, and that several of the firms operated merely as a blind or "cover house" for the appliers.

The principal defendant, according to George E. Q. Johnson, United States district attorney, is Anastasios Greben, an expert chemist who discovered a process for treating government alcohol to make it suitable for beverage purposes.

County Dads Take No Action On Jail

Signed by 118 citizens, the petition for a proposed \$250,000 bond issue for a new criminal court building and jail quarters was presented yesterday to the regular session of the Lubbock county commissioners' court but no action was taken by the body.

Those to present the petition to the court, all of them signers, were J. E. Garrison, Chas. Nordyke, John L. Vaughan, E. R. Speck, John H. Moore and John Jarrett.

The proposed issue is an expressed measure to remove the present jail structure to create a satisfactory landscape for the new \$250,000 federal building, to be located on the southeast corner of the court house square.

Federal authorities have stated that the present jail building must be removed before building plans for the structure can be pushed to completion.

TRACTOR KILLS TWO

Driver, Another Crushed By Huge Machine

HOUSTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—A tractor-grader, which ran wild here today, took two lives.

The driver, A. McCarty, was crushed to death as was Wade Gatwood, who tried to stop the destructive progress of the machine, which damaged a down motor car before it was halted.

McCarty fell from the tractor as it rounded a corner. The witness had tried to shift gears and had been unable to do so because the clutch stuck.

Gatwood, employed by the state highway department as a tractor operator, braved up on the grader, grasped the emergency brake, it broke and he fell beneath the wheels.

Hearing To Open Thursday Before Representatives

House Resolves Itself Into Committee Of The Whole To Consider Allegations Proposing Impeachment

Exonerate Hatcher

Resolution Making Charges Against State Treasury Tabled; No Account Is Made \$60,000 State Fund

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 10.—The house of representatives today resolved itself into a committee of the whole to hear charges proposing impeachment of Comptroller S. H. Terrell, and decided to begin hearing testimony on Thursday.

The house decided to take up the charges, which were based on a special report of State Auditor Moore Lynn, in which it was alleged that Terrell had failed to "satisfactorily account" for approximately \$60,000 of the state's funds.

A resolution by Rep. Joseph McGill of El Paso; Alfred Petch, of Fredericksburg, and Coke R. Stevenson, of Junction.

Resolution Tabled.
A pending resolution by Rep. Petch preferring charges against Terrell and State Treasury W. Gregory Hatcher, the latter for "incompetency and inefficiency," was tabled, after Petch requested such action. He said it had been decided not to prosecute the charges against Treasurer Hatcher.

Hatcher sent a letter to both Speaker of the House W. S. Barron and Lieut. Gov. Harry Miller today asking permission to appear before the two houses "and answer in person those matters alleged and charged against me by the state auditor and set forth in the resolution of Representative Petch."

A resolution by Rep. Jack Keller of Dallas, granting Hatcher's request and inviting him to appear.

Restriction Held Unwise By Legge

Chairman of Federal Farm Board Testifies Ban Of Mexicans Would Produce Serious Labor Shortage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Chairman Legge of the Federal Farm Board testified today before the house immigration committee that restriction of Mexican immigration would result in a serious labor shortage in the agricultural Southwest.

"If Mexican labor cannot be obtained for growing vegetables and small fruit crops, he said, 'the land will probably be devoted to cereals, of which the country now produces a very great excess, and on which we are putting forth our best efforts to try to curtail the acreage.'"

"It is my belief that these people have a very difficult problem to deal with if they are to continue to produce the kinds of products which they have been producing in the past," he said. "This kind of labor is never very attractive, because stooping, bending and working on the knees is involved in weeding and thinning the kind of crops which many of these people find is most profitable to raise."

U. S. Seeking One More Battleship

American Delegation Makes Public Hope For Parity With Great Britain With Another Giant Ship

LONDON, Feb. 10. (AP)—The American delegation to the naval conference today made known their hope of being allowed to build one new giant battleship as part of the American program of establishing naval parity with Great Britain. It would be of the Rodney type, that is, of 33,000 tons with sixteen-inch guns.

It is the American suggestion that four of its lesser capital ships be scrapped, instead of the three it was planned originally to scrap, and that the new giant battleship be authorized to bring the American fleet to the high British standard, both fleets then to have fifteen battleships.

The Americans added that the United States probably would not build this ship if the privilege is granted to them, although they wished the right to do so if desired.

Intense activity marked the naval conference proceedings with the opening of the new week, which promised to be the most important seven days it has seen thus far. The delegation heads met at St. James' Palace at 11:30 A. M. while the committee of experts continued its discussion on global and categorical tonnage.

This morning the committee dealt with special ships which it had been suggested should not be included in any scheme of tonnage limitation. Secretary Stimson, head of the American delegation, planned to confer with Premier MacDonald at No. 10 Downing street later in the day.

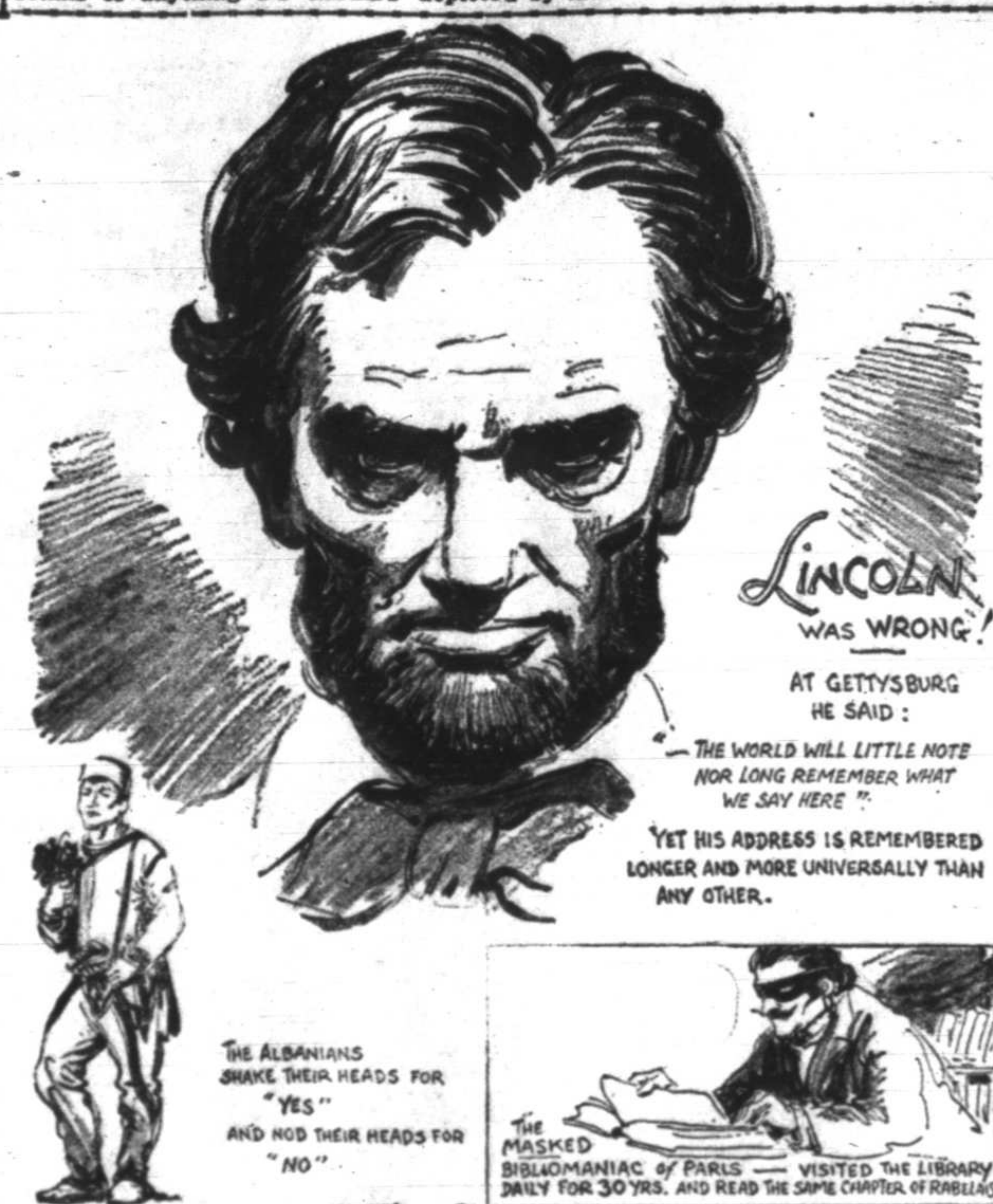

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LETTER FROM WILKINS TO BROTHER CAUSES ATTENTION; NO WORD HEARD

(By Associated Press)
ADELAIDE, South Australia, Feb. 10.—In view of the anxiety caused by the silence of Sir Hubert Wilkins, Antarctic explorer, who has been unreported since January 28, a letter made public here today has attracted wide attention.

The letter, which the explorer wrote to his brother from Montevideo, Uruguay, last fall just before leaving for the Antarctic, follows: "You may not hear from me for 12 months, if nothing is heard after 12 months you will know I am lost and it will then be too late to send out a rescue party. I have fine feelings, but in whom I have every confidence—good mechanic, good plane.

"In the event of our plane coming down I am carrying every conceivable thing for our safety and for getting back overland. I want you to use all your influence and power to discourage anything in the way of sending out a rescue party if we are reported lost. I wouldn't under any circumstances like for anybody to come out to my assistance and risk their lives."

THE NEW PETITION

THE passing of petitions, urging the Lubbock County commission to order a bond election to provide funds for a new jail and criminal court quarters, is rapidly bringing to a head a campaign promoted by thinking citizens—or, perhaps, we'd better say by citizens who realize that the step is essential.

The Morning Avalanche voiced the belief that new jail and criminal court facilities were essential in Lubbock county something like eight months ago. Since then investigations and inspections, both on the part of this newspaper and interested citizens, have strengthened the belief until it has spread to entail a large percentage of the county's residents.

First, because they have been hopelessly outgrown. Lubbock county's jail and criminal court facilities must be augmented to care for the public's business. Second, because nothing can be done toward actual construction of the new Federal building here until after the present jail is moved, some action must be taken in the matter soon.

There are two problems facing Lubbock county today—problems which must be solved.

Doubtless there are persons in Lubbock county who are not convinced of the need of more jail space and more room for criminal courts. To them The Morning Avalanche advises only: "Go Over and See." If there is a private business in Lubbock county attempting to operate upon the basis that this lack of room and equipment forces the public's business to be operated upon, we don't know where it is. Certainly, if there is such a place, its owners and operators won't allow it to remain that way long.

The voters of Lubbock county are the owners and operators of the courthouse and jail. Officials of these institutions are, in the final analysis, merely the agents of the taxpayers and the public at large. We, the latter group, hold the balance of power. We are, in brief, a board of directors.

County Judge Robert H. Bean, estimating that the needed improvements will total not more than \$250,000, further advises that no increase in taxes is essential to erect the building, should the bond issue pass. A surplus, he reports, is running in the permanent improvements account and will take care of interest and sinking fund adjacent to the project.

Thus, with the bugaboo of "higher taxes" removed, there is little reason to believe that the voters will turn thumbs down on the plan when the ballots are distributed.

The Morning Avalanche hopes the County commission sees fit to call a bond election covering these questions within the near future. Efficiency and human desire for improvement, demand that such an election carries.

THE INTERNATIONAL SPORT

In his accounts of the Asua Caliente golf tournament, Walter Hagen painted in a lively international color. In this tourney of the Dons four of the five top-place winners were Dons of the U. S. A., men of Latin blood—Baranen, Equizones and the Dura brothers. The tourney with golf sticks involved the distribution of 50,000 gold pesos rather than of \$25,000. So there we are on this continent, all brothers in pursuit of the little rubber ball around the landscape; and we all know besides that, after the preliminary era of golf which served to Scotland, the peoples of nearly all the world now participate in the same and its honors.

Doubtless there are those who arise to say that boxing offers a true rivalry of golf as the international sport of the hour. An Italian giant at the moment has the center of the boxing stage; there are German, French, Spanish, British and Argentine aspirants, together with an array of home talent having variegated racial and national antecedents, all contending for title and the amusement as the foremost master of fistfists in the world. That notwithstanding, the double of golf is as a sport, a more serious hazard confronting golf and golfers today. While in the main it seems convincing that golf remains a sport controlled by sportsmen and, on the whole, clean, the ever-increasing money in it is a red flag of warning.

FILCHING RIDES

Every mode of travel has its parasites. At sea it is the slowaway, and his tactics have remained the same from the era of sailing vessels down to the modern liner and the days of restricted immigration. On land there has been more variety. Thirty years ago the railroads were the main highways for the hobo, who was content to view the country from a freight car door. Once these wanderers were numerous enough to be a pest to train crews. Now they are heard of occasionally, sometimes being listed as "unknowns" among the victims of a freight wreck, but they have mostly disappeared.

Have they taken to the automobile? With their instinct for wandering, they may have seen that the great state and national systems of highways offer them the best opportunities. They depend on the good will of the autist to "get a lift," and on the long stretches, away from the populous districts, they are generally successful.

The spread of this habit of accepting or soliciting rides is an imposition on the good nature of auto owners. Their real object, of course, is to have carfare home. The whole thing amounts to a petty hold-up and should be stopped. The hobo's way of stealing a ride does not differ so much after all from the more up-to-date method of begging a ride.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

DRYS DROWN OUT WETS IN CONGRESS AS PROHIBITION FIGHT WAKES HOT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Prohibition would not be much of a fight in congress this session if it were between wets and dries alone.

According to all rules the wets are in bad shape.

Their minority, hopeless ever since the Eighteenth amendment's adoption, is at its smallest right now.

Even those who remain have lost their bitterest scrappers, at least in the senate—like Senators Bruce of Maryland and Edwards of New Jersey; beaten in the last election. Among the representatives such hard hitters are left as Congressmen LaGuardia and Black, but both handicapped by their New York origin, which discounts them as "wets, of course."

So if the encounter were solely between wets and dries, there would not be any encounter whatever.

In the house of representatives the wets simply would be hushed up—not allowed to say a word.

They could talk in the senate, because speech making is entirely unregulated there, but there are not enough of them to keep it up long.

Nevertheless, at the two ends of the Capitol building at once, prohibition is already the hottest fight of the session, hotter than it has been any time yet, and getting hotter every day.

It is not on account of the wets, though they are stirring it up all they can.

It is because the dries are by the ears among themselves.

One faction of them controls that prohibition has been doing about as well as could have been expected—may need a few readjustments here and there, but they are being made—and resents attacks on the present enforcement program the worst way.

An opposing faction of them denounces the entire enforcement campaign thus far as a grotesque fiasco—using stronger language than the most violent wet ever used—and howls for the scalp of every official connected with it, from the top on down.

The meanest personal angles are involved in the rumput, too. For instance, the senate recently voted to abolish the custom of permitting congressmen who have been abroad to return home without a custom house investigation. Three representatives who are under indictment, charged with trying to smuggle liquor under this privilege, promptly interpreted the senate's action as a slam at them, and are mad as hornets.

Senator Howell of Nebraska, trying to get congress to pass a stricter District of Columbia dry law than Attorney General Mitchell thinks would be desirable, finds himself challenged to dry up his own city of Omaha.

Senators Borah and Wheeler charge that government agents have spied on them for scoring against enforcement methods in their respective states of Idaho and Montana, and are raising the departments with fine tooth combs to demand his official head.

All these folk are dries—not a wet in the bunch—and the ones mentioned by name are no more than a beginning.

Dries by the dozens are bursting into interviews in defense of trial by jury, which Chairman Wickert of the President Hoover's anti-crime commission is accused of attempting to undermine, despite his denial that he proposes any such thing. Though mostly dries, congress members also are mostly lawyers and the jury system is sacred to them.

The wets have long contended that the dries care nothing for the constitution when prohibition is involved, but they never can say so again. The Capitol dome rings with constitutional arguments today.

Incidentally the treasury wants treaties with all foreign governments, pledging them to allow no liquor shipments from their ports in ships under 100 tons, inasmuch as most smuggling is done in small vessels.

It likewise suggests that overseas powers be asked to put their ship captains under bond to land no alcoholic beverages in America before letting them sail, and then forfeit their bonds if they cannot prove that they have refrained from doing so, when they get home.

A good many dry senators object, however, on the ground that such international agreements would place the United States under too heavy obligations abroad, for help in enforcing this country's laws.

A rumput over that question looms in the offing.

The tariff row was not over in the senate before the prohibition uproar began. It promises to continue until the session's end. Indeed, plenty of lawmakers mean to see that it does. They intend to make capital out of it for their coming re-election campaigns.

Meanwhile the wets look on dumbfounded.

They had anticipated a terrible time, trying to get an occasional damp remark in edgewise, but the last thing they imagined was that the dries would drown them out jowling over the same subject among themselves.

Your Health

ULTRA-VIOLET RAYS' ABILITY TO CURE DISEASES STILL IN DOUBT
By DR. MORRIS FISHER
(Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine)

Again and again claims are made in advertising and in other ways that radiation with carbon arcs and quartz mercury vapor lamps benefits the general condition and helps the human being resist infection.

Within the past few years, scientific investigators are making more and more experiments in an endeavor definitely to establish or disprove this claim.

The experiments thus far made on animals have not been such as to convince the observers that ultra violet radiation is useful as a general agent of treatment in infectious diseases and they are not at all convinced that it is capable of increasing the natural resistance to disease in normal people.

Such controlled experiments as have been conducted on human beings indicate that radiation treatment did not have any definite effect in reducing the incidence of coughs and colds. Apparently the chief effect of the radiation was to aid growth of the body and particularly to prevent rickets.

It has been thought that the use of the light on wounds would aid their healing and a good deal of work has been done in this direction. A recent review of the available evidence by Dr. E. M. Clausen points out that the claims for specific curative effect of radiation on wounds cannot be regarded as proved but that the good results that have been reported cannot be disregarded.

It must be remembered that our knowledge of methods of producing ultra-violet rays artificially is quite recent and that the scientific work as to its value for various conditions must be repeated on a large scale over many years before a certain answer can be given as to just how important artificial radiation may be for the improvement of human health and life.

The questions of dosage have not been absolutely established. There are all sorts of apparatus on the market and one must keep in mind the value of different types of apparatus in evaluating the results.

EDISON'S BIRTH

On Feb. 11, 1847, Thomas A. Edison, America's great inventor, was born at Milan, O. Most of his boyhood, however, was passed in Port Huron, Mich., where his family moved when he was seven years old.

Even as a boy Edison had marked abilities in organization and invention. He started in business by selling newspapers on the Grand Trunk railway. In his leisure he occupied himself in a self-constructed laboratory in a freight car. It was here, too, that he printed, on his own initiative, a weekly of interest to employees of the railroad.

After having attracted some attention by the invention of appliances in printing and telegraphy, which he studied at the expense of a stationmaster whose daughter he saved from the wheels of an approaching train, Edison sold his ideas for \$40,000.

With this money he established a laboratory of his own. Some of the major developments coming from that workshop were the telephone, incandescent lamp, phonograph and moving picture. The golden jubilee of the invention of the incandescent electric lamp was universally celebrated last year.

TO SET HEARING

AUSTIN, Feb. 10. (P)—The railroad commission will set a date for a hearing on recommendation of the advisory committee to reduce the daily allowable production in the Yates field from 130,000 barrels to 100,000 barrels daily. R. D. Parker, of the Oil and Gas division, has announced. The commission is required to give 10 days' notice of such hearing, he said, and the date will be set within the next few days.

Decreases in U. S. Wheat Predicted

CHICAGO, Feb. 10. (AP)—Announcement of a much greater decrease of the United States wheat visible supply than was looked for helped give decided strength to wheat values today. stances, I believe you will see the tenant farmer of today working under conditions that will relieve him of that great worry of whether or not he and his family are going to come out at the end of the crop year free of burdensome debt.

"I think a man who receives \$5 a day for 300 days a year, with a small amount of \$1.00 to \$2.00 a better off, than the average tenant farmer. And, under corporate farming or share production, it is likely that work will be so arranged that farmers who operate for these big corporations will be kept busy most of the year."

Expect Too Much. It is Mr. Price's belief that the tenant farmer expects too much for too little effort, in cash returns from agriculture. He declares that a million acres of land operated at a clear profit of one dollar per acre each year, considering many millions of acres of unused land in the United States, would ultimately be worth more to humanity and the scheme of things in general than any efforts toward upholding prices on commodities.

Mr. Price has travelled approximately 200,000 miles, by automobile, during the past two years, visiting every state in the Union and parts of Canada, and has been investigating and studying agricultural conditions. He came to Lubbock from Galveston and arrived at the Lubbock City following several weeks spent in Florida and other Atlantic states.

Area Praised. "The coastal plains of Florida and other southeastern states can not compare in possibilities with the great plains of the Texas Panhandle," he said. "On my recent trip I inspected many places along the Maryland and Delaware, low and flat prairie country similar to this and to Florida. Naturally being interested most in wheat growing and observations were of this nature."

It was here that he told of an official of the Galveston Wharf company predicting that the Texas Panhandle would lead all states in wheat production, "surpassing even the state of Kansas." Panhandle wheat production will reach the neighborhood of 150,000,000 bushels or more per year. Kansas City, as a wheat market, will soon be surpassed by Fort Worth, and Amarillo will surpass Fort Worth in a few years. Abandonment of wheat lands of the north and mid-west will make this possible, added to the putting in of several million acres of Panhandle land to wheat.

There are about 2,500,000 acres of wheat land cultivated in the Panhandle now, with last year's production about 42,000,000 bushels. Tillable acres in the Panhandle wheat section total about 15,000,000. This year's production will be approximately 50,000,000 to 55,000,000 bushels.

"There is a vast greater opportunity for trained, skilled agriculturists than there is for men entering any other line of business," said Mr. Price. "The I believe that the solution of agricultural problems now confronting America does not lie in keeping prices up, but simply is a question of cutting out of production, in modernizing our methods. The pressure of the economic crisis will bring about mass production on a big scale on our farms. The man, or the company, with cash, is the great need of the Panhandle-Prairie section for development of our untapped acres."

This will mark the second appearance of the Baylor group in Lubbock, the first having been about eight years ago.

The Baylor College Choral club of Dallas, one of the most popular college musical organizations of Texas, will appear in Lubbock for two concerts on March 29 and 30, according to an announcement last night by C. C. Hooper, business manager of the college, who is touring this section mapping the itinerary for the club.

The two appearances will be made at the First Baptist church, sponsor of the concerts. The first will be given on Saturday night, will be the club's regular or secular concert while the second will feature sacred presentations.

The club, composed of 24 girls picked from a student body of over 2,000, and under direction of Arthur Faguy Cote, head of the voice department of the college, will make its annual tour through north and west Texas starting at Fort Worth. Other cities already signed include Bowie, Wichita Falls, Vernon, Quanah, and Florida. Plans at this time are to visit 18 cities.

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Senate Judiciary Committee Asked To Probe Dry Law

Resolution Is Offered By Senator Wheeler Asking Investigation If Act Is Enforceable

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Out of the tumult prohibition has stirred up in the capitol, there emerged today a proposal for the senate judiciary committee to investigate whether the dry laws have been enforced and if they can be.

Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, prepared a resolution to introduce today calling for such a study.

Sub-Committee Busy. His suggestion found a house judiciary sub-committee still engaged in taking testimony on the recommendation of the law enforcement commission to broaden the powers of United States commissioners to punish them to dispose of casual offenders.

Already the house has finished work on the first recommendation of the commission and the Williamson bill to transfer prohibition enforcement from the treasury to the department of justice has been sent to the senate.

In that branch, the tariff bill stands ahead of all other business, and the fitness of Senator King, will prevent its being taken up by the senate judiciary committee for the present.

Propose Amendments. As the proposal came for the senate judiciary committee to investigate whether the prohibition laws have been or could be enforced, its corresponding committee in the house was prepared to open the way for a flood of proposals to amend the laws.

On Wednesday, it will begin the first hearings on legislation to make less rigid or to repeal the dry laws. One of these proposals—that of Representative Dyer, republican, Missouri, to provide 2.75 per cent beer—draw from Bishop James Cannon Jr., in Spain, a cablegram concluding that the suggested legislation was unconstitutional.

Federal Witness May Not Testify On "Love Piracy"

Testimony Depends On Decision Whether Marriage To A. C. Killian Is Held Valid by Courts

PORT WORTH, Feb. 10. (AP)—Whether Mrs. Maggie Hopkins, prosecuting witness, could testify against A. C. Killian, a defendant in the "love piracy" case on trial in federal court, apparently depended today on the decision as to whether her marriage to Killian in 1923 was valid.

Testimony of Mrs. Hopkins, first witness this morning, was attacked by defense attorneys, who presented a certificate showing her marriage to Killian on May 16, 1923. They cited authority showing state courts had held a wife could not testify against her husband, even after marriage relations had ceased, and even though the offense had been committed before the marriage.

Annulment Claimed. The government introduced records of annulment proceedings in the district court of Gray county filed May 9, 1929, stating the "attempt to have entered into marriage" by Mrs. Hopkins and Killian was annulled. The records declared Killian was under disabilities at the time of the marriage that prevented his entering into a contract and that Mrs. Hopkins was never, in fact, Killian's wife. The government claimed Killian was married to another woman at the time of his marriage to Mrs. Hopkins and that a divorce decree had not been entered, although divorce proceedings were in court.

Other defendants in the \$25,000 mail fraud case are Minnie G. Martin, Hattie May Killian and Oscar R. Fowler. They are charged with participating in a scheme to defraud Mrs. Hopkins a wealthy ranch woman of Pampa, Texas, through a fake alienation of affections suit.

SUSPECTS IDENTIFIED

Deserters Charged In Two Attempted Robberies

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 10. (AP) County officers announced here today that three men in custody in connection with two attempted grocery store robberies had been identified as deserters from Fort Ringgold, Texas, United States army cavalry post.

The men were said to be John O. Smith, alias Thomas L. Andrews, McWilliams, alias Edward C. O'Leary, alias Jack Davis, Baltimore, and James H. Jones, alias William Davis, Leno, Conn. The men enlisted under the latter names, officers said.

A service revolver, said to have been stolen when the men left Fort Ringgold, was recovered. They also were questioned in connection with the stealing of an automobile, at McAllen, Texas.

Agriculture And Labor Join Hands To Oppose Rates

Open Letter From Leading Farm Organizations In Hands of Senators; Says Object Forgotten

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Agriculture has joined hands with labor in opposing the tariff bill as written by the senate.

An open letter from representatives of seven leading farm organizations was in the hands of members of the senate today charging them with forgetting the "objective" for which tariff readjustment was begun.

Slashes Opposed. A few days ago an open letter came from the tariff group of the American Federation of Labor, arguing that the slashes the senate was making in the rates on manufactured articles threatened the well-being of working men in a group of industries. The letter warned an election was approaching.

The letter from the farm organizations presented excerpts from the acceptance speech of President Hoover and said members of "general farm organizations and co-operators who have been called by the situation that has arisen have noticed that the objective for which tariff adjustment was begun appears to have been forgotten.

Defeat Illustrated. "This forgetfulness," the communication added, "was illustrated by the defeat of the rates which were requested by a combined agriculture on sugar, blackstrap molasses, rice, hides and the fats and oils."

The seven organizations whose officials signed the letter were the American Farm Bureau federation, the Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union of America, the National Cooperative Milk Producers' federation, the American Cotton Growers Exchange, the National Livestock Producers association, the American National Livestock association, and the Central Livestock Cooperative association of St. Paul.

Shortly after assuming office Cardinal Pacelli greeted the retiring secretary of state, under whose tenure the Lateran treaties, establishing the peace of the Holy See and the Italian state, were consummated.

Cardinal Gasparri's retirement came on the eve of the first anniversary of the signing of the Lateran accord.

Arrested Sunday afternoon on a charge of aggravated assault, in connection with an alleged attack upon person of Herman Wynn, of this city, Forrest Blaylock, Lubbock youth, yesterday was released on bond of \$200.

Blaylock, also charged with drunkenness, is alleged to have stabbed Wynn in the back with a long-bladed knife. The altercation occurred at Murphy's cafe, on Avenue H, three blocks north of the courthouse.

Wynn is reported recovering from the wound, following medical treatment.

BAGGAGE RIFLED

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10. (AP)—A dispatch from Vera Cruz today said that Alexander Makar, departing Russian minister in this country, told the correspondent that he was held 45 minutes by detectives in railway station there while his baggage in a hotel was being rifled. He charged documents belonging to himself and the legation were taken. He is en route back to Russia as a consequence of rupture of Mexican-Russian relations after communist demonstrations against the Mexican administration.
