CONTRACT LET ON BOREN TEST

DERRICK IS COMPLETE AND TOOLS ARE BEING HAULED TO LOCATION

It is expected that drilling will begin within the next two weeks on the Boren and Swartz block, Section 921.

The derrick is now completed and tools and boiler are being hauled to the location this week. The drilling contract has been let to Metz Brothers & Meeks, Hutchinson County oil field contractors.

The cellar is being dug at the location on the Strickler and Burton block, Section 579, on Wolf Creek, and the rig builders are to begin work this week. Part of the machinery has already been hauled to the field.

At the Meridith and Jackson block Section 471, also on Wolf Creek the rig is being built and machinery is being unloaded.

No actual work has been started on the other blocks that have been formed in Ochiltree county, but it is expected that several locations will be chosen within the next week or two. Several new blocks are being proposed, but have not been completed as yet.

Several car loads of oil well equipment and casing have been received in Perryton during the week, and have been hauled to the various locations. It isn't hard to imagine Perryton an oil center after one sees the big trucks loaded with heavy timbers and machinery, passing down the streets.

SUMMER SCHOOL STARTS MONDAY

PUPILS THAT HAVE FAILED IN LAST HALF WORK MAY ATTEND

Summer school in the Perryton High School is to begin Monday morning, May 31, lasting for eight weeks until July 16. Only students in the seventh grade or higher who have failed in one or more subjects during the second semester of the present year may attend.

Miss Lorna Hutchinson is conducting the summer session and regular high school credit will be given for the work that is taken and satisfactorily passed in that period. All classes will be held between the hours of 8 to 12 in the morning.

A special fee of \$5.00 will be charged for the first subject, and \$2.50 for each additional subject that the student may desire to make-up. About fifteen or twenty pupils are expected to enroll in the summer course.

A special class in geometry may be taught, according to Miss Hutchinson, should a sufficiently large number wish to take it. If it is added to the curriculum class will be held at 7:30 each morning.

Miss Hutchinson requests that anyone considering taking work in the summer session call or see her before Monday, in order that some sort of a schedule may be worked out, so that studies can be started with the least delay possible.

MAY SESSION OF COURT IS LIGHT

ONLY TWO CASES ON COUNTY DOCKET — ONE IS SETTLED OUT OF COURT

With only two cases on the Ochiltree County Court docket, the May term is practically over with the exception of probate work which may arise within the next week.

The following men were summoned for jury work and appeared Monday morning, May 17: Carl Ellis, R. E. Moon, L. L. Beardsley, Clarence Zirkle, O. O. Allen, C. R. Cudd, D. P. Unruh, L. L. Swink, Harry Barlow, J. R. Slavin, J. O. Wooten, and S. S. Mallett. Others summoned who did not appear were Ed Lawson, F. A. Talley, H. H. Balzer, Jess Russell, W. B. LaMaster, and B. L. Barnes. As there were no cases on the docket calling for jury hearings the jury was dismissed.

The case of C. E. McLarty versus Pete E. Erickson was called before Judge J. M. Grigsby on Tuesday, May 18, but was dismissed upon petition by the attorneys who stated that it had been settled out of court.

The case of N. A. Lewis versus J. H. Stowe, also called on May 18, was a controversy arising over a clerical error in the court records. A correction was made and the case ended.

In the absence of other cases, court was adjourned until Monday May 24, however no other cases appearing, it was not continued. With the exception of probating papers, the May term of County court is concluded.

MAXINE PUCKETT INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Maxine Puckett, 2 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Puckett, was seriously injured Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock when the car in which she was riding skidded into a truck, smashing all four fingers on her right hand so badly that amputation was necessary.

The Dodge touring car, driven by Mr. Puckett, was loaded with young folks, headed south out of Perryton. Directly in front was a truck, owned by L. T. Tucker, also loaded with young folks. A flat tire on the truck caused the driver to stop and before Mr. Puckett noticed that the truck had stopped he was nearly upon it. Swinging out in order to go around it, the car skidded, the rear end striking the truck. Maxine was holding on to the bow of the top and her hand was caught in the impact with the truck, smashing the four fingers on her right hand.

She was rushed to the Perryton Sanitarium where Dr. John V. Guyton found it necessary to remove the four fingers just below the knuckles. Luckily she seemed to suffer very little pain, the injury seeming to numb her arm. None of the other occupants of either car were injured. The Puckett car was badly smashed.

SELL BIG SHEEP HERD TO HANSFORD MAN

A large deal was closed Monday in which J. J. Deaner, Hansford county ranch, bought 1,728 ewes, and 1,522 lambs from F. P. and E. W. Rogers.

Mr. Deaner is a new comer in this section of the country, having come here from Okmulgee, Okla., moving to the Andrews ranch in Hansford county.

According to F. P. Rogers, their ranch will be restocked with sheep this fall. Mr. Rogers is a strong believer in the raising of sheep for this particular locality. He states, "I believe if people had more sheep, they would have fewer financial troubles. They are especially profitable to raise, for they will pasture and fatten on cut over stubble fields, and weeds. They require little attention and care and sell well on the market."

Laws You Don't Want

Laws requiring the Santa Fe and other railroads to spend money needlessly, tend to keep freight rates up. Limiting length of trains and saying how many men shall be employed to run a train, to that extent prevent lowering costs. This is your problem, too. Think it over.

In a manufacturing business the greater the output the lower the cost per unit. Therefore all progressive manufacturing concerns try to increase volume of output.

The railroads of this country are in the manufacturing business. They make and sell transportation.

Laws limiting the number of cars in a train, or saying how many men shall be employed on a train, are laws which to that extent prevent lowering costs and keep up rates.

Any laws that require the railroads to spend money needlessly have a tendency to keep up rates.

While primarily this is a railroad problem, in the end it affects your own business as well. That is why your attention is called to it in this way. Think it over.

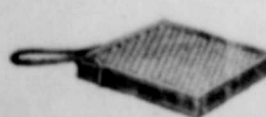

from the south, where chicken is one of the most popular dishes. She gives two southern ways of preparing it.

For southern broiled chicken, she says, select a very young chicken. Clean, singe, and split it down the back. It will almost lie flat. Season with salt and pepper, and brush melted butter all over it. Have a broiler ready over a moderate fire. Place chicken in it, and let it broil slowly for a half hour or a little longer if the chicken is not so tender.

Turn the chicken once in a while to brown both sides. When done, place on a heated platter which has been garnished with sprigs of parsley or lettuce leaves. Pour a little butter over chicken, and serve hot.

With Brown Sauce
Chicken prepared with brown sauce is good served with rice. Miss Michaelis says. Here are the ingredients:

- 1 chicken
- 2 tablespoons lard
- 1 sprig each of thyme, parsley, and bay leaf
- 1 onion
- 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper to taste

Clean and cut chicken in small pieces. Season well with salt and pepper. Chop onion fine. Put lard into deep pot. When hot add onion and let brown. Add flour. Let this brown, and add chicken. Let simmer a few minutes with thyme, parsley, and bay leaf chopped fine. Stir often. When all is nicely brown, add 1 1/2 pints boiling water. Stir until it begins to boil.

If necessary, add more salt and pepper. Cover and let simmer until tender (about an hour). The gizzard, liver, and heart may be cooked with sauce, and served with boiled rice.

No matter if the chicken is old or young, you can make it taste good if you choose one of these recipes.

SEVENTEEN MILLION TELEPHONE NUMBERS

When the user of a telephone in the United States calls for a number it may be any one of seventeen million telephones used on the continent of North America. These seventeen million telephones are interconnected so that communication may be had between any two of them, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

This interconnection of different telephone systems in the United States, and the linking up of Canadian and Cuban networks as well, gives American telephone users access to a vastly greater number of telephones than can be reached from any telephone in Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia or South America.

In Europe, for example, it is estimated that only from 3,500,000 to 4,000,000 telephones are interconnected in such away as to make conversation possible between any two of them. Europe has, in all, somewhat over 7,000,000 telephones, but a large proportion of them are not capable of being put into communication with one another.

The number of telephones in any of the remaining continents is very small in comparison with the showing of North America. Asia has something over three quarters of a million telephones, while Africa, Australia and South America have only a few hundred thousand each. Moreover, these are divided among isolated systems to such an extent that the number of telephones which are interconnectable is still more limited.

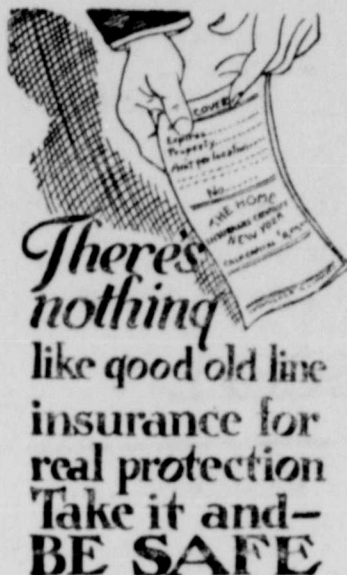

BOY SCOUTS CORNER S. H. CONDRON, DIRECTOR

The author of this corner has no object in view other than furthering the interest of one of the Best Organizations in America, the Boy Scouts. The specific purpose is to uphold ideals, aims and achievements of the Scouts, not only in this Area but in some cases the work of the Scouts in other portions of the Nation and in foreign countries.

The Boy Scout Organization, established in England nearly twenty years ago, has spread until it now has units in every advanced nation. Properly handled this could be fostered into a power that would cultivate a friendly feeling among na-

tions that would go far towards establishing peaceful relations between nations.

The aim of the Scout organization is to keep the Scout physically fit, mentally alert and morally straight. This cares for the three great needs of a growing boy. There are many organizations these days that supplement the home in instilling these in the lives of boys. But no one organization has such an all round program. No other organization reaches out to the far corners of the land and trains in these fundamentals. The boy that belongs to a Scout troop feels that he is one of thousands—that his organization is national and international in reach. This gives a stability that a local organization

could not command.

The Scout work in the Panhandle district is under direct supervision of trained experts. Every organization that is worth while has some central control or leadership. If left to each locality to provide a program it would soon deteriorate in quality and the Scouts would soon lose interest. Hence, I consider the leadership of the Area officials absolutely essential and beneficial.

It devolves on the local county or city chairman to see that properly qualified men lead the Scouts. If this is provided, I do not see how any one can oppose the work of the Scouts. The enterprise is an investment in human life with all of its possibilities. There should be an organization like this in every town of the country.

Now a word about the work of Scouts this summer. Summer time means vacation time. Camp Warner near Claude will be open for the first time to 600 Scouts of the Panhandle. Dr. and Mrs. Warner have done a great thing for the boys of the Panhandle in making this donation or I prefer to use the term, investment. I trust that every Scout will avail himself of the opportunity and spend ten days in this camp. You will come to know your companions better in camp than anywhere else, and they will also come to know you. In camping out, you are but experiencing the thrills that come to every pioneer that settled this American continent, with one element, gone, the danger. Now we can lie down to pleasant slumber with no thought of danger lurking in every bush or canyon. In the early day the lone scout never knew when his life was at stake.

Out in camp this summer learn to appreciate the things of nature. Know the names of the flowers, their uses and a value to man. Study the birds, not to kill them but to know their life history. Take a kodak with you and see how close you can get a picture of the wildest one you can find. It is far more fun than to shoot to kill. Classify the rocks around camp. If you find a little tree that needs a little care, give it a chance to grow up to be great shade tree for Scouts that will come after you quit the trail. Oh, there are so many things you can do out in camp that will be worth while. Also learn to make your way, independent of the conveniences of home. Best of all learn to work with your fellow Scouts in the spirit of good fellowship. Play the game like you plan it out in life in the busy world of commerce and professional life.

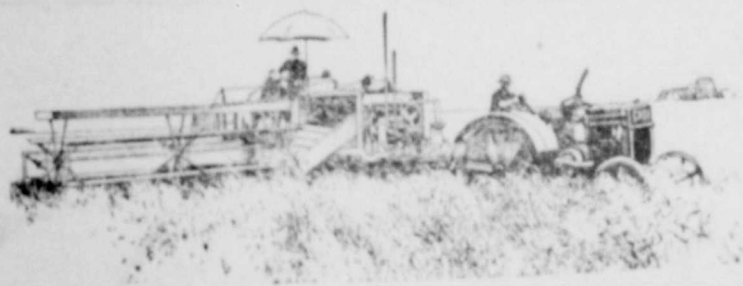

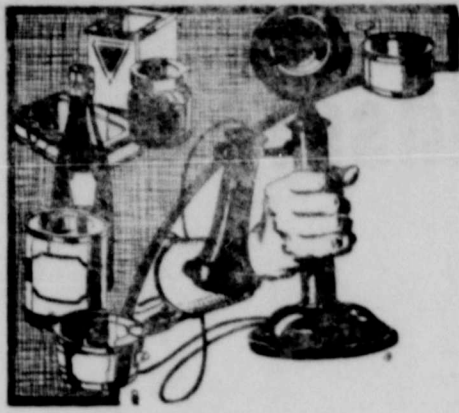

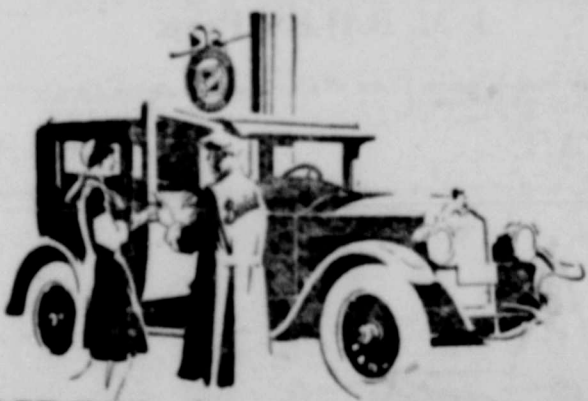
