Quota Of \$30,000
Goal In Four-Day
Local Campaign
Two Hundred Workers Will
Take Field Early Today
In Effort To Put First
Annual Drive Over Top
Aid Six Agencies
Soldiers Of Vast Army Of
Solicitors To Get Final
Instructions At Hunting
Breakfast This Morning
FOLLOWING several weeks of
preparation approximately 200
workers will take the field this
morning, inaugurating Lubbock's
first Community Chest drive for a
quota of \$30,000. Soldiers of the
vast army will start with a hunt-
ing breakfast being at 7:30 o'clock
at the Hotel Lubbock. After the
breakfast the drive will be on for
four days.
The first report meeting will be
held at noon, at which time a re-
port of the progress will be made.
Six Agencies Benefit
Six Lubbock agencies will re-
ceive the benefit of the funds to be
raised in the campaign, and for
four days every individual in the
city, homes, stores, offices, com-
mercial and wholesale houses, util-
ities and financial concerns will be
approached by the workers in ef-
fort to "go over the top" in this
the first movement of such a nature
Lubbock has ever attempted.
"Our Community Chest must be
filled," stated Neil H. Wright, gen-
eral chairman of the organization,
"and the workers are the hunters to
hunt the where-withal to fill it. All
must be present Thursday
morning to receive the ammunition
before starting out to hunt in the
assigned territory."

Liquor Seizure Up
To Supreme Court
Confiscation Of Cars And
Issuance Of Permits For
Liquor Manufacture To
Be Acted Upon
WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. (AP)—Two
phases of the powers of the federal
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mits, will be passed upon by the
supreme court.
The questions will be presented in

the right to confiscate automobiles

Freighter Caught
In Teeth Of Reef
OSWEGO, N. Y., Dec. 2. (AP)—
The freighter Sarnadoc, with a
score of men aboard, remained
caught in the teeth of a Lake On-
tario reef tonight as coast guard-
men fought their way to the home
through a slowly dying northwest
gale.
Two coast guard vessels left New
York state ports for main Duck Is-
land, 36 miles north of this city,
where the freighter stranded in yester-
day's blizzard. Shipping men be-
lieved only one of the coast guard
craft would be able to render as-
sistance on reaching the scene,
pointing out that the sturdy 36-
foot motor boat which left here at
noon would be more seaworthy than
the 75-foot run chaser which put
out from Rochester for main Duck Is-
land.

Nine Members Of Alleged Bootleg Ring Make Bonds

AMARILLO, Dec. 2. (AP)—Nine of 16
Hutchinson county men charged
in Federal court with conspir-
ing to violate the prohibition law,
made bonds ranging from \$5,000 to
\$10,000 here today and were given
their freedom. Three others were
expected to make bond late today
or early tomorrow.
Former Sheriff Joe Ownbey was one
of the three men charged in the
complaints who were still at large.
One of the men named is in the
state penitentiary.
Bootleg Ring Claimed
The men, all of whom are alleged-
ed to be members of the same boot-
leg ring were arrested as a result of
investigation conducted by Federal
officers over a period of several
months.
The investigation covered alleged
operations extending over three
years, it was said. The complaints
themselves were a stereotyped form
which revealed nothing of the na-
ture of the evidence against the men.
Former Mayor Included
Former officers whose bonds were
set at \$10,000 each included Glen A.
Pace, former mayor of Borger; Joe
Ownbey, former sheriff of Hutchin-
son county; Bill Millhollon, Cal
Baird and Jim Crane, former deputy
sheriffs, and Sam Jones, former
deputy constable at Borger. Jack
Payne, once a deputy sheriff and
Johnny Jones, former probation of-
ficer were granted bonds of \$5,000
each. Jones was released but Payne
had not made bond late tonight. E.
T. Blasingame, still at large; R. T.
Macey, arrested today; H. O. Tay-
lor, E. L. Lantorn, Louis Weitzman.

PLANS ANNOUNCED MacDonald Gives Program Of Naval Conference

LONDON, Dec. 2. (AP)—Prime Min-
ister MacDonald today announced
the plans and scope of the five
power naval conference which will
open January 21 in the royal gallery
of the house of lords and will then
hold its subsequent sessions at St.
James' palace on the invitation of
King George.
The four chief British delegates
will be MacDonald, Arthur Hens-
on, the foreign secretary; A. Y.
Alexander, first lord of the admir-
alty and Wedgwood Benn, secretary
of state for India.

Tech Student Is Hurt In Accident

Trent Campbell, 19-year-old Tex-
as Tech student, and son of Mr. and
Mrs. R. T. Campbell, 1621 Avenue
Y, who was seriously injured about
5:30 o'clock Sunday night when the
car in which he was riding with
two companions was overturned on
the highway 17 miles south of Post,
was reported improved last night.
Campbell was brought to Lubbock
and arrived at the Lubbock sanitar-
ium Monday morning at 1 o'clock
for treatment. Examination showed
that no bones were broken but that
he was suffering from severe bruises
in the chest and back.
Campbell and another Tech stu-
dent, Bill Collins, had gone to
Sweetwater earlier in the day to
meet James Dallas and the acci-
dent occurred between Post and
Snyder on the return trip. Dallas
was driving the car and threw on
the brakes when the car struck a
rough place in the road. Campbell
was thrown from the auto, a Ford
coupe, but his companions were
held inside. They were not injured.
Reports from the sanitarium last
night stated that, barring compli-
cations, Campbell should recover
speedily.

The husband who gives his
wife money to pay cash in-
stead of having her buy on his
credit, won today in a de-

bia court of appeals, which
excused Representative George
Huddleston of Alabama for a
\$245 debt for furs bought by
his wife, Bertha.
The Alabama had said he
gave Mrs. Huddleston \$75 in
cash each month for her per-
sonal expenses and had forbid-
den her to pledge his credit.
She purchased furs, on credit,
nevertheless, paying \$8 down
on a coat and fox scarf cost-
ing \$235.

Special Session Of State Solons Looms At Austin

Two Committees To Report
Recommendations During
Extraordinary Meeting Of
Texas Legislature

Witt Starts Today

Senator Pink Parrish Of
Lubbock Will Submit His
Findings In Investigation
Of Present Fee System
By Associated Press
AUSTIN, Dec. 2.—It began to look
like a special session of the leg-
islature today, when the vanguard
of the two committees which will
submit reports and recommenda-
tions to an extraordinary meeting of
the solons, moved into Austin.
Senators Pink L. Parrish of Lub-
bock and Walter Woodul of Hous-
ton, members of the committee em-
powered to investigate the amount
of fees retained by county and dis-
trict officers, and Senator Edgar E.
Witt of Waco, who has been as-
signed to write the draft of the re-
port and recommendation of the
penitentiary centralization commis-
sion, arrived here today. Bob Bar-
ker of Fort Worth, executive sec-
retary of the commission, is here.

Witt Starts Today
Senator Witt will begin writing
his report tomorrow and the fee
committee will draw a draft of the
bill it will sponsor to curtail earn-
ings from fees of officers this week.
Senator Parrish attempted to get
a law enacted during the second
called session to limit remuneration
of officers to \$10,000 annually, but
failed. He succeeded in getting the
legislature to create a committee to
investigate earnings of officials and
make a report and recommenda-
tions to the legislature, when it
meets in special session, presumably
in January.—The committee con-
ducted hearings at several points in
the state.
It was indicated that Senator
Witt would have his penitentiary
centralization report ready for sub-
mission to the commission not later
than December 15. The majority
report will recommend that the
centralized plant be located within
20 miles of Austin and that \$500,-
000 be appropriated immediately to
begin its construction, with \$500,-
000 to be appropriated annually un-
til the plant is completed.

Judge J. C. Hutcheson in Houston
recently when he held an error was

the Southern Texas district, and
representatives of the magazine in
turn filed a second motion to quash
it.
Judge Hutcheson today disquali-
fied himself to sit in the case on
grounds of friendship for the
plaintiff. No date for hearing tes-
timony was set.
Creager entered the suit on two
counts, each for \$500,000, based on
articles that appeared in the mag-
azine June 15 and June 22.

Air Mail Pilot Is Missing In "The Graveyard Of Aviators" After Encountering Severe Snowstorm

FRANKLIN, Pa., Dec. 2.—An
air mail pilot, was missing
tonight in "the graveyard of aviators," the mountainous
section of Central and Western
Pennsylvania that has taken a
heavy toll in air men and their
craft.
Pilot Thomas P. Nelson, of
Plainfield, N. J., was believed
frozen down in the bleak, snow-
covered hills that kept his
whereabouts secret while fellow
airmen scouted the air mail
route between Brookville, Pa.,
and Cleveland, for some trace
of his ship. Hunters, in the
woods for the opening, deer
season, likewise searched. News
of his plight was broadcast
through this section.
Storm Encountered
Nelson encountered a blinding
snowstorm as he winged his
way westward early today, and
last, was reported sighted at
Brookville. He left Brookville at
11:15 o'clock last night and
was scheduled to arrive at
Cleveland at 2:15 a. m. today.
Several inches of snow today
keted the countryside as the
search for the plane was con-
ducted. W. L. Smith, superin-
tendent of the National Air
Transport company, headed an
expedition of five planes that
flew eastward from Cleveland
hunting Nelson.
Nelson was an experienced
and resourceful flier. On No-
vember 6, he escaped death
near Shenandoah by leaping
from his burning plane with
his parachute. He formerly
was engaged in carrying mail
out of St. Louis.

Vernon Admits Train Wrecking and Holdup

Former Rodeo Rider
Confesses Holdup
In California

PAWNEE, Okla., Dec. 2.—Tom Ver-
non, former rodeo rider, who was
arrested here last night in con-
nection with the robbery of a train in
California, and another, later, in
Wyoming, tonight confessed to the
wrecking and robbing of the train
in California. Allen N. Jones, Pawnee
county sheriff, said.
Vernon Sheriff Jones said, denied
any part in the holdup a week ago
today, near Cheyenne, Wyo., how-
ever, and said he would fight extra-
dition to Wyoming on that charge.
He told the sheriff he was willing
to go to California to face a charge
of robbing a train near Sausalito,
California, November 10 and would
not oppose extradition to that state.
Needed Money
In his confession, Vernon told the
sheriff he robbed the train because
he was out of work and needed
money. He had been promised a job
by the railroad company, he said,
and "had been disappointed."
Playing a lone hand, Vernon said,
he wrecked and robbed the train
and made his escape without aid.
After prolonged questioning by
Thomas J. Higgins, deputy sheriff of
Los Angeles, Vernon admitted that
he was "willing to come clean."
Signs Confession
With Higgins, Sheriff Jones of
Pawnee and Sheriff C. H. Rouse,
of Cheyenne, he sat down at a table
in the sheriff's office, and taking a
pencil, wrote and signed his brief
confession to the California robbery.
Afterward he was looked up again.
Sheriff Jones indicated that he
probably would not question him
further tonight, regarding the
Wyoming robbery. The sheriff said
that Vernon probably would be in-
terrogated in detail tomorrow morn-
ing.

Tax Reduction Is First Problem To Confront Session

Solons Dispense Quickly
With Opening Formalities
And Prepare For Action
Of Pending Measures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. (AP)—Con-
fronted with a \$160,000,000 income
tax reduction resolution in the ear-
ly minutes, the first regular session of
the seventy-first congress quickly
dispensed with the formalities of
opening today to make ready for
legislation.
The booming voice of Chairman
Hawley, of the house ways and
means committee, gave notice short-
ly after the gavel fell that the tax
reduction was on its way. He
obtained unanimous consent for
its consideration Thursday.
Handicapping Features
Otherwise the tariff work senate
and the restless house confined their
first day activities to handicapping
and the routine of convening. Ac-
customed to the routine by the
seventh months extra session, the leg-
islators uniformly went about their
business. Tonight conference were
under way looking to an arrange-
ment of the program which prom-
ises to carry well into next summer.
Only 64 senators reassembled af-
ter their week's rest from the extra
session, while 392 members of the

Second Cold Snap Pushes In Texas

Several Points In State Report Below Freezing Temperature; Accidents Prove Fatal Monday

(By Associated Press)
The second cold snap within half-a-dozen days pushed into Texas today with at least two points reporting mercuries several points below freezing.

Early this morning, Amarillo citizens saw a reading of 18 degrees on the thermometer indicators, one of the coldest of the season. At Wichita Falls the mercury slid to 25 degrees just after midnight, while at Dallas it stood just two degrees above freezing.

Crash Fatal
One automobile accident in which there were two fatalities, and a near-serious airplane accident were attributed to the weather.

Two Dallas hunters were killed near McKinney when their car skidded on a pavement made wet by the rain and overturned on a concrete bridge. At Temple an airplane pilot crashed against a windmill or a house top while flying low to get his bearings in a fog, wrecking his landing gear, and then landed in a farmer's yard, escaping injury.

A slow misting rain was general over Northeast Texas yesterday, however reported as a drizzle at the same time and in sunny San Antonio, a nother was blowing.

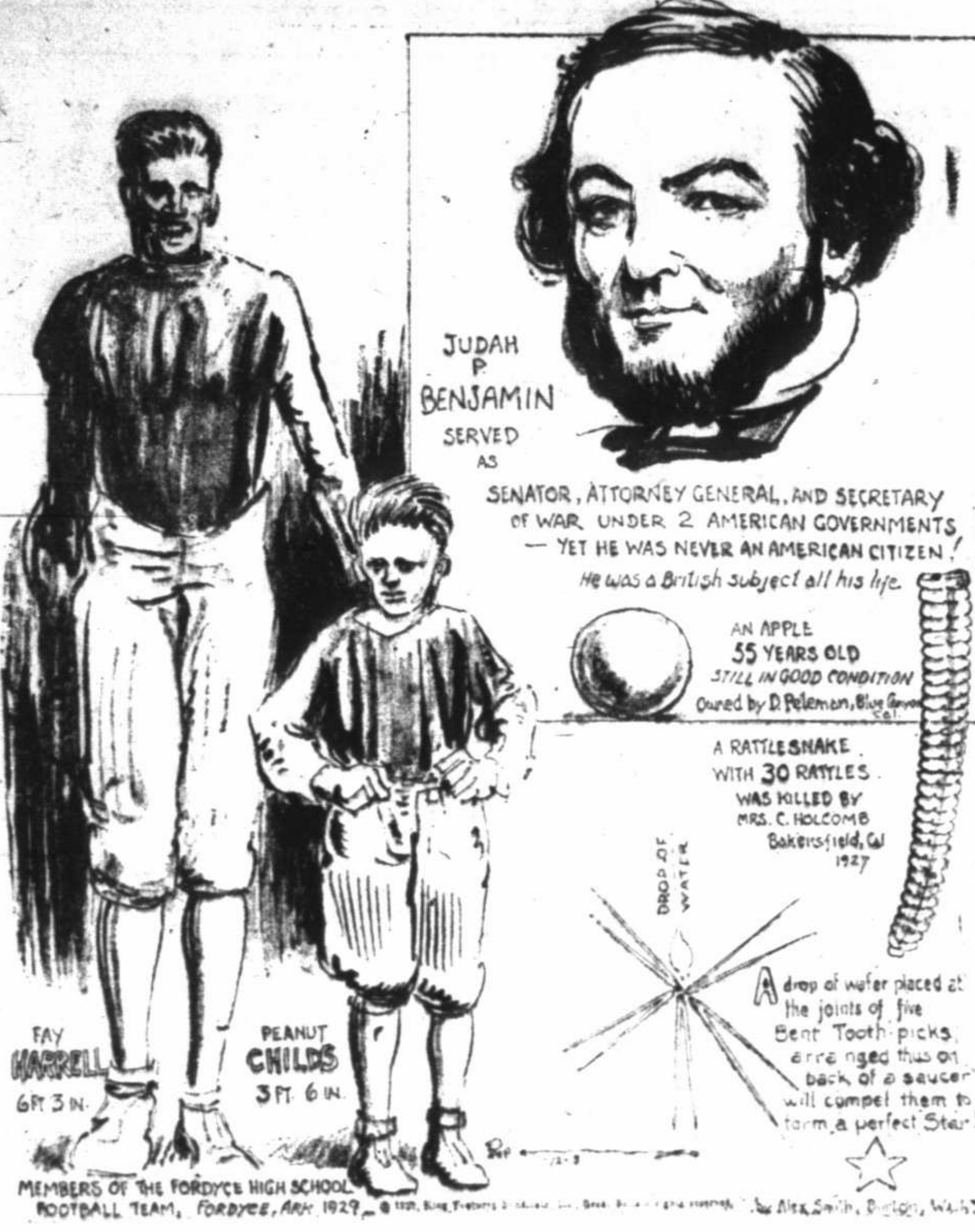

Fate Of Steamers Shrouded In Snow

Three Freighters And 12 Schooners Are Stranded Along New Foundland In Severe Snow Storm

ST. JOHNS, N. F., Dec. 2. (AP)—The fate of three freighters and a dozen schooners was shrouded in a snow storm that blanketed the New Foundland coast today.

A pilot boat which put out to reach the 100-ton Norwegian freighter Hertha, driving with her fuel exhausted off Cape Spear, failed to return. Two tugs returned without finding a trace of the Hertha.

A tug left Sydney Friday night to take in tow the Norwegian freighter Grey County, disabled 140 miles east of Cape Race with a broken rudder. The Norwegian freighter La Belle County was in trouble 400 miles southeast of St. John's with her smokestack and bridge deck carried away.

The crew of the schooners George Kay and Catherine B. were landed here by the steamer Jokelin, which took them off the foundering vessels 45 miles from port.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 2. (AP)—Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow will leave here Friday for the United States, not to return until after he has finished as a delegate to the Five Power Naval conference in London in January.

That over, he is expected back in this capital to wind up also three years as ambassador before returning to his New Jersey home and accepting the senatorial toga worn recently by Senator Edge, just appointed ambassador at Paris.

Friends believe political conditions in the United States may govern the length of his stay in Mexico after the London naval conference. In the event of a long congressional session or a special session, it is expected he will retire as ambassador early in the summer or sooner.

Eight High School Grid Teams Enter Quarter Finals

DALLAS, Dec. 2. (AP)—Only three of the eight high school eleven teams that won district titles last year will answer roll call in four bi-district struggles scheduled this week-end at Breckenridge, Denton, Waco and Houston.

The Amarillo Golden Sandstorm in district 1, Fort Arthur Yellow-jackets in district 7 and Marshall Mavericks in district 6 have won sectional championships for the second straight year. Five other teams that lost out early last year find themselves in the quarter-finals of the state race.

Of the four bouts scheduled this week, that between Amarillo and the Breckenridge Buckaroos at Breckenridge promises the most fireworks. They clash Saturday, and 10,000 fans are expected to watch the two mighty undefeated teams battle it out for the championship of all West Texas and the Panhandle.

Both Teams Strong.

Breckenridge has an impressive record of nine straight victories in district 2, the oil belt, generally regarded as the strongest section of the state. Amarillo has swept through everything in its district and crushed several strong non-conference rivals.

The Central Texas corn belt will be at stake in the struggle Saturday at Waco between Central of Fort Worth and the Waco Tigers. Central noosed out in district 3, despite a defeat and tie against its record, Waco waded through district 4 without a loss and will be a favorite to progress to the semi-final.

Denton-Marshall Tangle.

The Denton Broncos and Marshall Mavericks, survivors in North and East Texas, will tangle Friday at Denton for the championship of districts 5 and 6. Each chalked up five straight victories in its section.

William Gillette, Personification Of Sherlock Holmes, to Bring Back Theater Portrait of Famous Sleuth

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—After 30 years it becomes more than ever apparent that while Conan Doyle invented the character of Sherlock Holmes, it was William Gillette who created the portrait.

The Holmes who comes down through the years with his dry, crisp voice, his inevitable pipe, his sharp features, his contemptuousness of death and danger, his unerring calm and assurance, his eccentricities, his almost academic manner—this is all William Gillette.

And at the age of 74, Gillette has conspired to reach back into the storehouse of time and bring back one of the imperishable theater portraits to a generation which has since come along. At 74 Gillette is as surely Sherlock Holmes as he was at 44. So indelible is his imprint upon this creation, that the super-sleuth of Baker street walks the Broadway stage again, as miraculously accurate as one of Holmes' own deductions.

It was Booth Tarkington, I believe, who remarked that the thrill of Gillette's Holmes had lasted longer than the thrill of Santa Claus.

And sitting in a comfortable Broadway seat, it was easy to let the cyclids drop during intermissions and recall a lad of a quarter of a century ago climbing endless stairs to the hard benches of "nigger-heaven." The spell, somehow, has gone unbroken.

The play itself, to be sure, has been touched by time. Yet it is easy to see that scores of mystery-detective plays which since have come and gone were not above borrowing, begging or stealing from Gillette's "Sherlock Holmes."

There can no longer be any doubt but that all the drawings and paintings and photographs which will persist, as long as Sherlock is read, will be those of Gillette. He has achieved a sort of immortality—less for himself than for his portrait.

Gillette has been in retirement on his Connecticut estate for several years. But his followers have been going loyally on—an amazingly diverse congregation, including college professors, ex-presidents, financial giants and mere people.

At the opening performance, for instance, it was possible to see and hear Prof. William Lynde Phelps, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, Winthrop Ames, Charles D. Hillis, a certain descendant of Harriet Beecher Stowe and others who are seldom.

if ever, to be found in a first night crowd.

Like so many others, they had come for a last cheer for the William Gillette who has consented to give Broadway but a few brief weeks more of his life and then lock Sherlock Holmes back in that dim past which contains Jefferson's "Rip Van Winkle," Mansfield's "Beau Brummel," and so many other immortal portraits.

Co-incidental with its second production of the season, the Theater Guild bows in the tenth year of its existence by a history of its career—and a worthy, important organization it has been.

But future histories that may be written would do well to eliminate the first two plays of the current season from such a document. The present piece is from the pen of Romain Rolland, the novelist who wrote "Jean Christophe"—but who would be a playwright. He has

composed something like a dozen dramas around the French revolution, of which the present is "The Game of Life and Death." This, like his novels, is something to read, rather than to see and hear. It's grand reading and a fine library evening. As an evening in the theater, it's more elocutionary than anything else, and one begins to wonder whether or not the Guild was not more impressed by his name than by his work.

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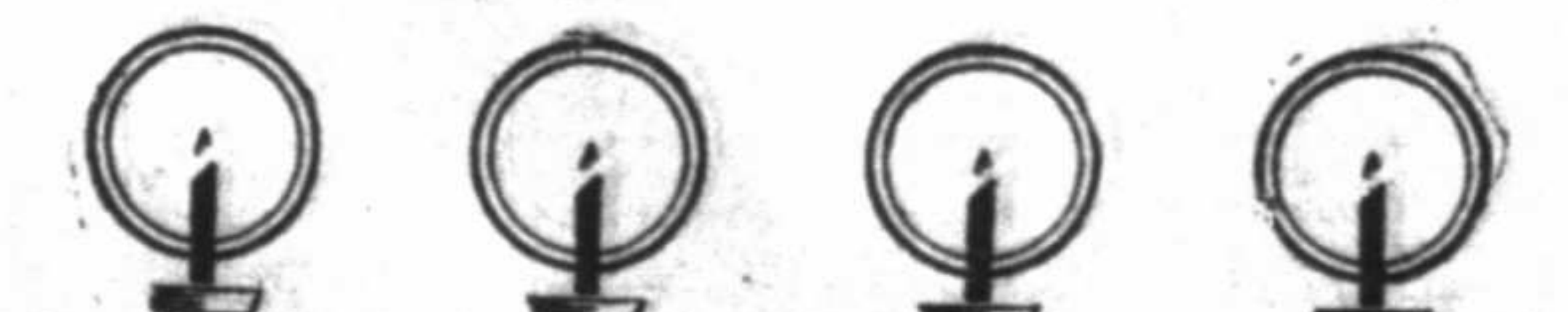

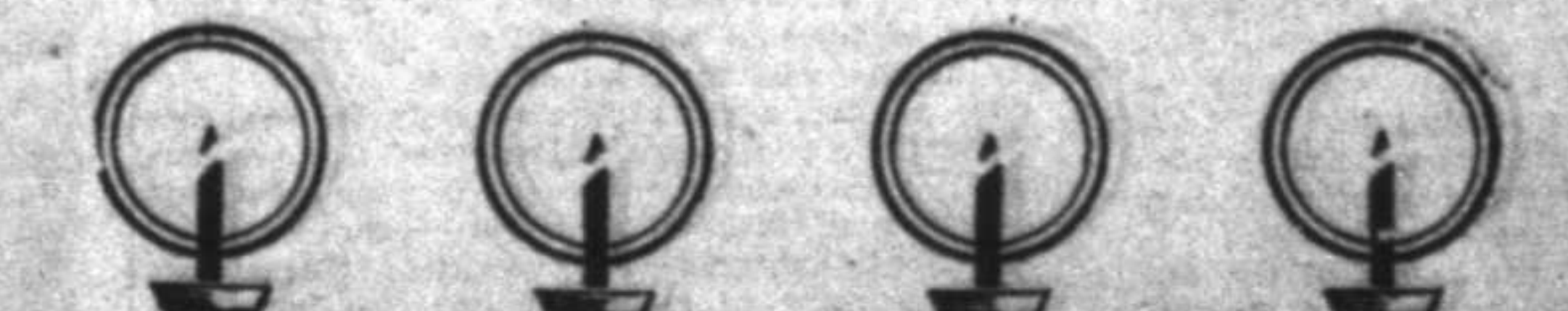

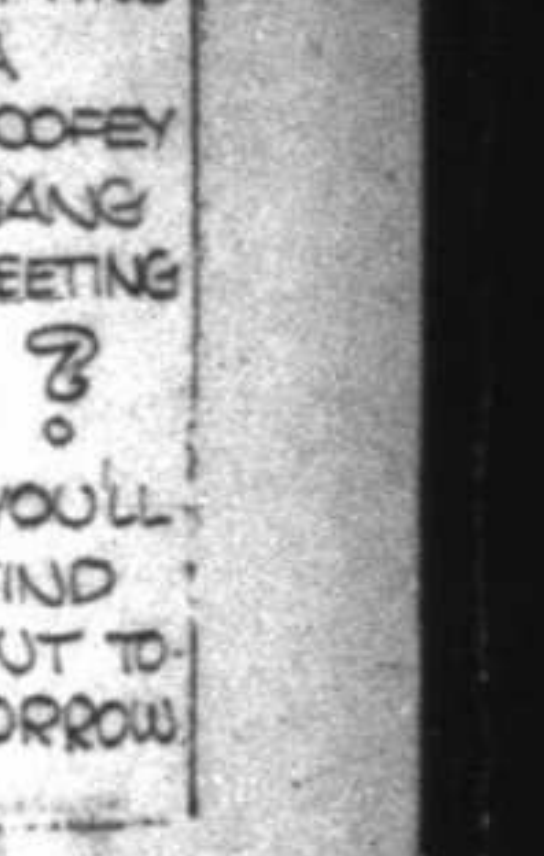

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Another Etiquet Row Is Started In Capital With Story Of Senator Brookhart About Alleged "Big Booze Party"

How Much Should A Senator Tell Is Question Asked

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Argument rages hotly here over the question: "Should a senator tell?"

And is the Hon. Smith W. Brookhart of Iowa simply a brave and honest public servant or does he qualify for membership in the "Polecat club," as was suggested in a letter to him which he read on the senate floor?

Brookhart certainly had a good deal to unfold. If anything were needed to prove the existence of a social lobby it was the tale of how this simple gentleman from the middle west was invited to a "booze party" and placed between Otto Kahn and one of J. P. Morgan's boys each of whom tried to educate him on matters pertaining to railroad legislation. And how such distinguished republican senators as Smoot and Edge were there, too, not to mention Mr. Vane, or Mr. Moers, who urged Brookhart to go.

A Question of Ethics. But the general opinion is against Mr. Brookhart. Most members of congress, lobbyists and newspapermen agree that Mr. Brookhart, if put to torture, never should have squealed on his hosts. In these contentions the point of a gentleman's honor is heavily stressed, although some of the Iowa state's loudest critics are those who would suffer most severely if undue publicity were to discourage gentlemen with plenty of money from giving "booze parties" in Washington's best hotels.

The minority point of view is that Brookhart's disclosures are not to be compared with the conduct of a guest who sees liquor served at a private party and then goes and calls up the prohibition agents.

Brookhart always has been a radical on railroad legislation. If these "Wall-Streeters," as he calls them, tried to get him picked or otherwise attempted to wangle him away from his convictions, well, it just served them right.

The Senator Isn't Worried. Brookhart himself is losing no sleep over the ethics of the case. "There's no ethics in covering up crime," said he to this correspondent.

"When a fellow invites me down to a dinner and tries to get me to take liquor and fixes it so millionsaires can attempt to swerve me from my duty, I'll trade my ethics for his any time."

"I was the only progressive there, out of seven or eight senators. But there was Gooding of Idaho, who was a progressive in railroad mat-

ters, and they tried to work on him, too.

"That's the most important social lobby that has been around here—that bunch of Wall-Streeters with their biennial banquets for republican senators."

"If you drink some booze, that makes you still more agreeable and willing to listen to them."

"I don't know whether they had checked up on my personal habits. But they found out, all right."

Denies Holding Secret. One asked Mr. Brookhart why he had refrained so long from telling the world about the "booze party" and Wall Street's attempt to influence him. Mr. Brookhart denied that he had. He had only mentioned it casually on the senate floor, apropos of something or other, and his reference had caused so much excitement that everyone began to demand more details. From the outset he refused to nurse the ugly secret in his own bosom.

"Right away I told the vice-president of the National W. C. T. U. about it," he explained. "That's Mrs. Ida B. Wise Smith, who is also president of the Iowa W. C. T. U. She's a fine woman."

"No, she wasn't excited about it. She knew the kind of thing that was going on down here."

"I mentioned it to quite a lot of

people and told the story in many of my speeches."

Inmates Of Sing Sing Questioned In Stabbing Case

Youthful Convict Killed While In Line At Pen: Four Prisoners Placed In Solitary Confinement

OSISING, N. Y., Dec. 2 (AP)—Four inmates of Sing Sing prison were in solitary confinement today while prison authorities sought the slayer of a young convict who was stabbed to death as he stood in line with 170 of his fellows.

Robin Kaminsky, 17, of Brooklyn, serving seven and one-half to 15 years for robbery, fell with four stab wounds near his heart yesterday. The inmates were lined up in the old prison yard at the end of the recreation period and were about to be marched to the new prison to witness a performance of the annual Sing Sing play, Good News.

Warden Lewis E. Lawes ordered Jacob Burakoff, also 17, and three others placed in solitary for questioning.

Burakoff was convicted of the same holdup for which Kaminsky was in prison. Warden Lawes said Burakoff was captured and convicted on information furnished by Kaminsky.

Pastor Found Guilty of Violating Law But Trial Judge Donates Fine

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 2 (AP)—The Rev. A. J. Vallery's defiance of the law didn't cost him anything, but it stuck the judge who fined him one dollar.

The minister was found guilty of violating a city ordinance which prohibits solicitation of funds on the streets without a license for institutions not members of the Community Chest. He contested constitutionality of the law, but admitted its violation.

Judge Lewis T. Fitzhugh said it was too near Christmas to rule on a law affecting charitable work so he fined the Minister one dollar and then paid the fine himself.

Mrs. Marian Putman Testifies In Trial Of George McManus For Murder Of Arnold Rothstein

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—Mrs. Marian A. Putman of Asheville, N. C., star state witness, was back on the stand today at the opening of the third week of the trial of George McManus for the murder of Arnold Rothstein for cross-examination by James D. C. Murray, defense counsel.

She was being examined by Murray, who sought to destroy her credibility as a witness, when court adjourned Friday.

Senator Witt To Begin Work Today

Waco Man Will Write Most Of Report To Be Submitted To Governor Moody; Prison Group To Help

AUSTIN, Dec. 2 (AP)—Senator E. E. Witt, of Waco, assigned by the penitentiary centralization commission to write the majority report for submission to Governor Moody and a special session of the legislature, will begin his work tomorrow. He will arrive in Austin tonight.

After Senator Witt puts together the report, which will carry recommendations, the 18-member commission will be called together and the draft submitted for final approval.

To Meet December 10. The prison board of nine members, constituting half of the centralization commission, will meet in Houston on December 10 and it is likely the session to consider the final report and recommendations for relocation and centralization of the penitentiary system will be held here shortly afterward.

The majority report will recommend location of a modernized, industrialized central penitentiary plant within 20 miles of Austin, and a minority recommendations will urge that a central plant be situated on lands now owned by the state, preferably on the Waco farm or at Huntsville. Both recommendations will be submitted to the legislature on the present scale, it will be proposed that the legislature appropriate \$500,000 immediately to start the new central plant and \$100,000 annually until it is completed.
