Rebels Lose First District Contest

The Rivercrest Rebels suffered their first district defeat this year from a new foe in the district, the New Diana Eagles. New Diana and Rivercrest each have one loss, but New Diana faces a tough competitor, Ore City, next week, while the Rebels are open. A loss for the Eagles will make Rivercrest and Ore City district co-champions and Rivercrest will represent the district in bi-district. If New Diana wins, however, they will take the honors. Rivercrest will then be district co-champions with the Eagles.

In the game Friday night, New Diana ended the Rebel's streak by taking a 28-14 win. Both teams came onto the field fired up and ready to go. This was evident as neither team scored the first quarter because both defenses were

putting pressure on the other's offense. On the last play of the first quarter the Rebels fumbled on their own 44 yard line and New Diana recovered. New Diana ran on the next three plays, but then put the ball up and completed a 31 yard touchdown pass to give them six points. Next the Eagles made their extra two count.

On their next possession the Rebels fumbled the snap and New Diana took over the Rivercrest's 24. Six plays later the Eagles put the ball across the line on a ten yard pass and this time kicked the extra point for a 15-0 lead.

The Rebels had to punt on their next possession and the Eagles took over at the Rebel 49. New Diana moved their way down field and with 13 seconds left in the half scored on a three yard run. At the half the Eagles

led 22-0.

To begin the second half the Rebels came out fired up and scored on their first possession. The Rebel score came on a seven yard run by

Jerry Merchant after Strickland set the ball there with an eighteen yard pass to Billy Froelich. The attempt after was no good. New Diana came right

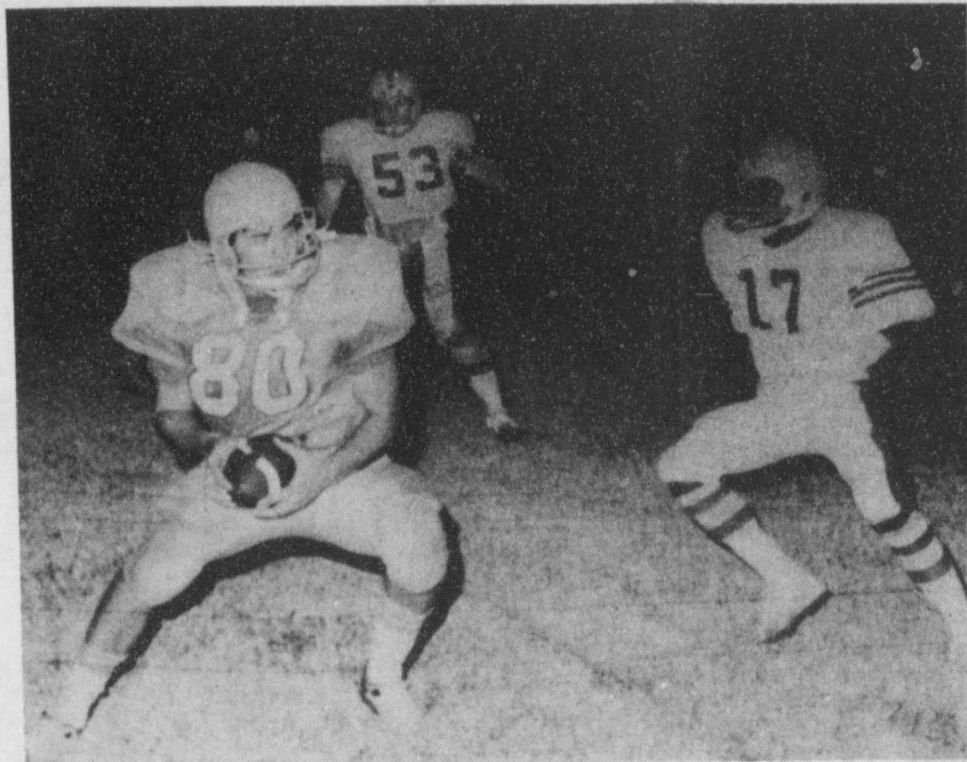
back with another score on their next possession. The TD came on a four yard run and the point after was no good. The score now stood 28 for New Diana and 6 for

Rivercrest.

The Rebels had one more quarter to go and they refused to give up. After all, this was the last chance for some of them to play in front of their home fans. With their running game shut down, the Rebels went to the air. The fans saw a passing attack not shown by the Rebels before. On the passing end Strickland attempted 16 passes and completed 7 of them to his numerous receivers for 107 yards and a touchdown. His receivers took turns catching. Scott Ward caught two for 33 yards, while teammate Brian Harville snatched two also for 16 yards. Billy Froelich caught the other three and turned one of them into a Rebel touchdown with only 2 minutes and 51 seconds remaining in the game. A run by Merchant made the two extra good and the game ended with the Eagles on top 28-14.

Lake Channel Meeting Set

A public meeting will be held in Sulphur Springs on November 24, 1980 for the draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement on the Cooper Lake and Channel project. The meeting will be held in the Hopkins County Civic Center, 1200 Houston Street, and will begin at 7 p.m.

Colonel Donald J. Palladino, District Engineer for the Fort Worth District U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, stated the public meeting is being held to give interested parties an opportunity to express their views concerning information in the draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement, including changes which have been made in the plan tentatively selected for recommendation. These changes include the deletion of remaining levee and channel work downstream from Cooper Dam, and the proposed acquisition of wildlife mitigation lands.

Voting Miscounts Reverse JP Vote

The Red River County Commissioners' Court on Monday reversed the outcome of the November 4 Precinct 3 justice of the peace race in favor of Democratic nominee Belle Glass in the course of canvassing the election vote.

Mrs. Glass, of Bagwell, was named the winner by a vote of 480 to 333 for write-in candidate Clifford Ritchie of Detroit, County Judge Connie Sullivan said.

Ritchie was shown the winner in unofficial totals released by county officials on election night that gave Ritchie a 10-vote victory margin over Mrs. Glass' 323 votes. According to Judge Sullivan, the discrepancy in the unofficial vote total for Mrs. Glass was traced to boxes in Detroit and the Woodland community.

Votes cast for Mrs. Glass in voting the straight Democratic ticket at the Detroit box were not added to Mrs. Glass' total in the unofficial election results, Judge Sullivan said.

In almost a complete reverse of the error at the Detroit box, officials at the

Woodland box mistakenly tabulated votes cast for President Carter only as votes for a straight Democratic ticket.

Errors were found in only two of the seven boxes, including absentee ballots, involved in the Precinct 3 race, Judge Sullivan said. The Woodland ballot error was discovered on election night and corrected on the election judge's tally sheet, Judge Sullivan said.

The Detroit box error was not discovered until the Commissioners' Court canvass of the ballots Monday, Judge Sullivan explained.

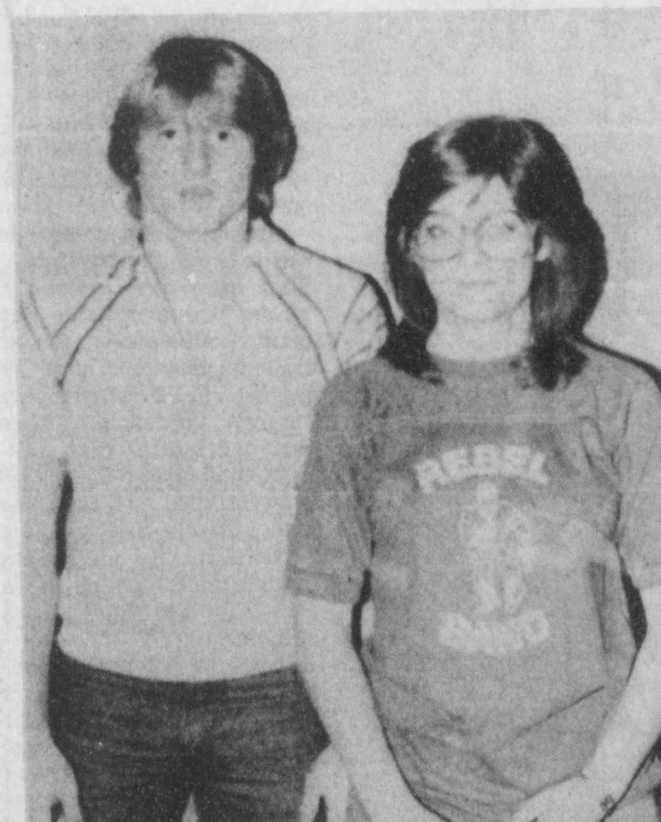
According to Judge Sullivan, vote totals for all Democratic candidates on the county ballot would be affected and that the newly tabulated returns would be released Tuesday.

The Ritchie-Glass contest was the only local contested race on the November 4 ballot.

Ritchie said that he did not plan to protest the findings of the canvassing for the Precinct 3 results, when

reached at his home Tuesday. "I don't want to cause any problems for the Detroit box election judge," Ritchie said.

Mrs. Glass and Ritchie were seeking to fill the remainder of an unexpired term left by the late Justice of the Peace Claude Smith.

Gasoline Consumption

Takes Nosedive In Texas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock states that during the past year gasoline consumption in Texas took a nosedive at a time when the number of vehicles on the state's roads increased.

He said during the state's past fiscal year, which ended August 31, Texas motorists consumed eight billion gallons of gasoline.

Figures for the 1979 fiscal year show that more than 8.5 million gallons of gasoline were sold in Texas and about the same amount sold in 1978.

Bullock put total vehicle registration in Texas for the 1980 fiscal year at 11.9 million vehicles, compared to 10 million vehicles on Texas roads during 1979.

"A half billion gallon drop is significant at a time when the state's car and truck population is skyrocketing," Bullock said.

"Our analysis doesn't show whether people are driving less or getting better mileage, but they are definitely buying less gas," he said.

Texas motorists used between 600 and 700 million gallons of gasoline a month, Bullock said.

Bullock said his office collected \$399.4 million in gasoline taxes during the past year, compared to \$417 million turned into the state during 1979.

He said three-quarters of the tax goes to the highway fund and one-quarter is put into the Available School Fund.

Gasoline is taxed at five cents a gallon and diesel fuel is taxed at six and a-half cents a gallon, according to Bullock.

Diesel fuel tax revenues amounted to more than \$78 million during fiscal 1980, compared to \$70.7 million during 1979.

About five billion gallons of diesel fuel were sold in Texas last year, Bullock said.

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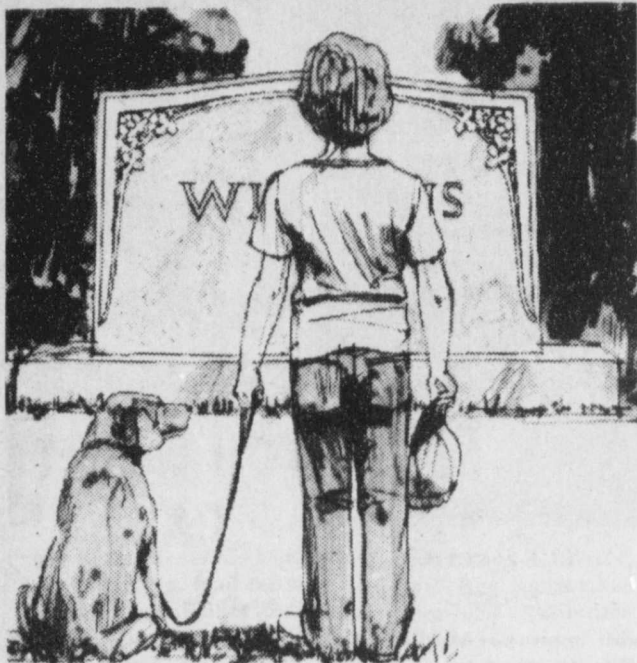
To help teachers and organizations conduct more meaningful Arbor Day programs, the Texas Forest Service is offering free program kits.

Gardening Made Easy

Now is an excellent time to seed your lawn with annual (Italian) rye grass for a green lawn all winter and a lush green carpet next spring when all the neighbors have are weeds. Poor thin lawns in shade, poor soils or slopes need help. Also, new lawns and bare soil that will wash all winter during the down-pours we will experience. The roots and clippings will help your permanent lawn by improving the soil with organic matter. Be sure that you are getting the annual rye and not pasture rye grass which makes coarse clumps. I've had a lot of people complain about rye grass and yet exclaim at our lawns each spring, wanting to know what could be so green and soft in February or March! They must have gotten the wrong thing when they planted before; we have no trouble with clumping or getting rid of the grass as summer approaches. When the bermuda and St. Augustine grasses start to grow in April and May, the heat kills out the rye. This leaves a mellow soil rich in organic matter and nutrients for a better lawn each summer.

Check all peach, plum, apricot, nectarine and cherry trees for an amber or clear "jelly" on trunks, branches or tree bases (at ground level). This indicates borers and sure trouble and even death of the tree without treatment immediately. Scrape off the jelly and apply Borer-Sol full strength with a paint brush over the entire area. This is the only treatment that we have found to kill borers inside the tree. Untreated trees die quite quickly and usually account for 90 percent of the home orchard losses in the stone fruit class. A few minutes and a couple dollars for Borer-Sol may well save those orchard trees

in the yard. It takes years to replace a fruit tree to bearing age.

Add pansies to areas of full sun or partial shade for winter-spring color. Start getting daffodils, dutch iris, anemones and ranunculus bulbs planted as these like an early start. All of these bulbs are sprouting in the beds from last year's planting (a good sign that new bulbs are ready too for growth). As with all plantings work in plenty of peatmoss or compost and bulb food or complete plant food to encourage healthy plants. Rainfall has reached nutrients past the root zones of these shallow rooted plants. All summer I recommended using the fine ground pine mulch to keep the ground cool and moist, use it now to hold in ground warmth all winter.

Beans can be a big help in stretching the food dollar as the prices for red meats, fish and other main dish protein foods continue to rise. Buy beans, peas or lentils in cellophane bags or other "see through" types of packages so you can consider the following important factors. Brightness of color: Beans, peas and lentils should have a bright uniform color. Uniformity of size: Look for beans of uniform size. Mixed sizes will result in uneven cooking, since smaller beans cook faster. Visible defects: Cracked seed coats, foreign material and pinholes caused by insect damage are signs of a low quality product. Dry beans, peas and lentils should be kept in tightly covered containers and stored in a cool dry place. Under these conditions they will keep their quality for several months.

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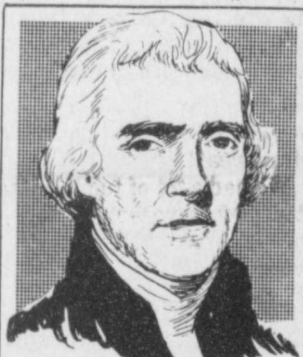

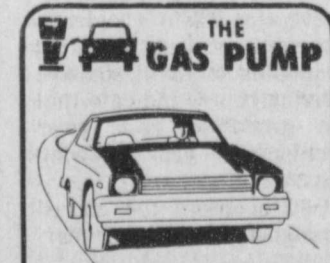

Franklin Has New Industry

An Open House Sunday, November 16 from 1 to 3 p.m. will mark the grand opening of Franklin China Company, located a mile west of Mount Vernon on Highway 67.

The public is invited to attend the open house and tour the 107,500 sq. ft. facility which, upon reaching peak capacity, will be the largest industrial plant in the county with the exception of Getty Oil Co. China plant employees and officers will be on hand to explain the various pieces of the operation.

Refreshments will be served.

The plant will eventually employ 125 to 150 people, and will be in operation 24 hours a day.

Ribbon cutting ceremonies Thursday, November 6 were held at the plant and attended by county and state officials, members of the Franklin County Industrial Board, suppliers and representatives of business and industry.

Participating in the ribbon cutting were John G. Sayle, vice-president and treasurer of Hall China Co., Sam Harvey, president of the

Franklin County Industrial Board, and Ronnie Davis, plant manager. In opening remarks Sayle said he represented the owner of Hall China, John T. (Jack) Hall, that Harvey represented the efforts of the industrial foundation, and that Davis represented the local community and plant.

Harvey opened the ceremony with remarks welcoming the company to the county, and cited the cooperation and efforts of the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce and county government in bringing the plant to Mount Vernon.

Hall China operates plants in East Liverpool, Ohio, East Palestine, Ohio, and Gilmer, Texas. The Franklin China plant is the fourth installation for the company.

Sayle commented that Hall China was looking for special people to make a special product in a special place, and that they found what they were looking for in Mount Vernon.

After meeting with local community leaders and the Industrial Foundation, Sayle quoted John Hall as saying,

"These are the people. This is the place." Sayle said that with the completion of the plant that they felt they had become part of Mount Vernon.

Location of the plants in Texas resulted from a shortage of natural gas in the north in 1975. The company has secured ample supplies for the Franklin County plant through a contract with Arkansas Louisiana Gas Co.

Among those attending the ribbon cutting, tour of the plant and luncheon at Cypress Creek Country Club which followed, were general contractors Charlie Walker and Jay Harrison with Harrison, Walker and Harper of Paris. David and Carol Tomkins of Bryan College Station attended. Tomkins is a ceramics engineer and the owner of Ceramics Souther, Inc. He designed and engineered plans for the layout of the plant.

Barney Merwin, a ceramics engineer and chief ceramic technician for operation start up for Franklin China has become a permanent resident of Mount Vernon. He and his wife, H. Louise, are living in the Harvey Morris addition.

Dr. Robert J. Beals, a ceramic engineer and director of research and development for Hall China Co. was responsible for the day to day direction of the building of the plant. Beals gave technical advice from the home office for the local plant.

Attending from the financial community were Ken Greer with the First National Bank of Mount Vernon, Billy Means with the First National Bank of Mount Vernon, and C. Glenn Lowe with Sulphur Springs Building and Loan Assn., Franklin County Commissioners, County Judge Bill Meek, State Representative Pete Patterson, and many other local dignitaries and business people attended.

Seed Bed Preparation Important

Springing time is near and one of the main factors which is important in establishing a good stand of grass is seedbed preparation. Farmers and land owners of the Lamar Soil and Water Conservation District should be aware of the need for a proper seedbed springing time. Improper seedbed preparation can result in a waste of time and money.

Smooth seedbed is prepared from 4 to 6 inches in depth during the fall of the year the ground has enough loose soil, and time to soak in enough moisture, for springing in the spring. In most situations when seedbeds are prepared months prior to planting, it may be necessary to disk lightly and use chemicals to control vegetation before planting, but it is well worth it according to Alfred C. Mackin, Jr. Chairman of the Lamar SWCD.

Gloriosa Lily Grows To Be Over Six Feet

The Gloriosa lily (Gloriosa rothschildiana), a member of the Liliaceae family, comes from tropical Africa and is a climbing lily that can reach heights of six or more feet. Oftentimes called Glory lily due to the exotic flowers that are somewhat different than those of the ordinary lily.

Flowers are approximately three inches across with six waxy petals that bend backwards to show their yellow bases and prominent, extruding stamens. The crimson outer sides are marked with showy bands of yellow or gold.

The plant climbs by way of tendrils on the ends of the smooth green leaves that taper to a point at the terminal part of the leaf or stem.

Gloriosa lilies are easily grown and can be trained to climb on tree trunks,



balconies or on a small tree branch as a support for a potted plant. Requirements for healthy plants are rich soil, bright light or sun and a thorough watering when the soil feels dry to the touch. A good mixture for the soil is loam, peat and a little sand.

When the blooming period is through and the leaves begin to turn yellow, gradually reduce the amount of water until the plant dries out. Lay the pot on its side to dry out thoroughly. Store the pot in a cool place until new shoots appear. New shoots can be separated and potted individually in their own pot. In a year's time, new shoots should reach flowering stage.

Tubers are very brittle and easily broken. They should be handled with care. After repotting, proceed with the same normal care.

Cold Tomatoes Don't Ripen

Since tomatoes aren't always fully ripe when they reach the grocery shelves, especially in fall and winter, they need a little special attention at home.

When tomatoes are light pink and still firm, they are not in the best condition for optimum flavor. However, they will turn red if placed in a bowl and set at room temperature for about 24 hours, says Tom Longbrake, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Tomatoes will turn bright red and juicy if given the opportunity, but most people eliminate that possibility by promptly placing the unripe fruit in the refrigerator, says Longbrake.

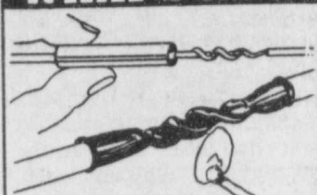
Best ripening conditions for tomatoes is a temperature of 65 to 75 degrees F. Do not place tomatoes on the stove, in a microwave oven or in direct sunlight as overheating will soften them too much. The best humidity is 95 percent. Higher humidity stimulates micro-organism growth while lower humidity can cause dehydration and shriveling. Use a ripening bowl or a plastic bag with air vents cut into the side to control humidity.

Only after ripening should tomatoes be refrigerated, points out the horticulturist.

Research has shown that tomatoes arrive to the consumer in better condition if harvested and marketed before becoming fully ripe.

During fall and winter, tomatoes are grown in the South where it's warm—Texas, Florida and California. Most fruit are picked in the immature green or pink stage. After picking, tomatoes are boxed, hauled to packing sheds, graded, packed into cartons, loaded onto trucks and hauled to warehouses. Then, says Longbrake, they are distributed to local grocery stores where consumers may purchase one of the main ingredients for the popular tossed salad.

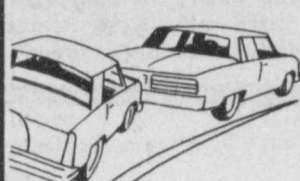

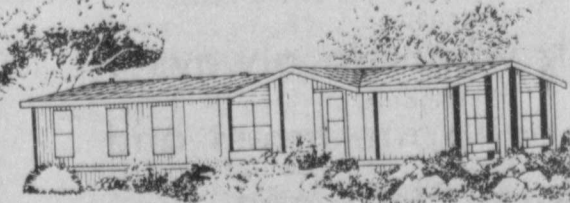

Farm Income

Prospects To Improve

Texas farmers and ranchers will have to "wait till next year" for any improvement in their income.

"Higher farm prices resulting from a sizable drop in crop production this year, smaller meat supplies, and strong export demand all point to an improved agricultural income picture in 1981," believes Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Crop producers will likely fair much better in 1981 because of this year's short crop and a rise in prices. And, with meat supplies expected to slip under year-earlier levels, prospects look somewhat better for livestock producers as well.

Although production expenses will rise again, price increases are not expected to be as sharp as in 1980, says Anderson. During the past 12 months, fertilizer prices jumped 28 percent, fuel and energy prices and interest rates climbed 25 percent, and agricultural chemicals rose 21 percent.

"Texas agriculture suffered considerably from the extended dry, hot weather during late spring and summer. Dryland farmers, cow-calf operators and poultry producers experienced big setbacks. Irrigated crops were even stunted by the intense and prolonged heat wave," notes Anderson.

Despite the steep drop in crop production, cash receipts for 1980 are estimated by Extension specialists to total only a little less than in 1979. Crop inventories carried over from the bumper 1979 harvest and price increases for

many commodities have helped maintain sales close to last year's level.

Livestock sales sagged a little as lower cattle and hog receipts more than offset increased sales of poultry and milk.

While overall agricultural receipts won't be down too much from last year, net income will be off sharply due to surging costs of running a farm or ranch, says Anderson.

And, to make matters worse, the purchasing power of income has been further reduced by this year's double-digit inflation.

"Declining farm income is also hurting businesses serving agricultural producers. As farmers and ranchers tighten their belts, they will be buying fewer production and consumption goods and services," notes the economist.



Eggs Are Best Buy In Protein Category

Eggs are one of the best protein buys available in the supermarket today.

The yolk color is almost completely dependent on the feed the hen eats. Birds that have access to grass, pasture, yellow corn or alfalfa in their diet tend to produce dark-colored yolks.
