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Controllers stand firm in face of dismissals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, its purge of illegally striking air traffic controllers under way, says it now wants to begin "rebuilding the air traffic system." But the controllers say time is on their side and few appear to be giving in.

By late Wednesday, the Federal Aviation Administration had sent just over 900 letters of dismissals to controllers who had not returned to work on the afternoon and night shifts, agency spokesman Charles Murchison said today.

The deadline for dismissing the last of the 13,000 strikers was 11 a.m. EDT today as controllers report to their day shifts across the country.

First reports from eastern airports this morning indicated few controllers on the job who had been among Wednesday's strikers.

Only six of 214 controllers due to work this morning reported at five facilities in and around New York City, three more than Wednesday. At Philadelphia International Airport, just five of 26 controllers due to work were on the job, only one more than Wednesday morning.

Boston's Logan International Air-

port reported four of 20 scheduled controllers on duty, a decrease of three; while seven of 19 controllers were on the job at Baltimore-Washington International Airport in Maryland, a drop of one.

At both National Airport in Washington and the Miami air traffic control center, officials said no strikers had returned to their posts this morning.

Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis said he expected to have a clearer indication later today of how many controllers remained on strike. He said more than 620 strikers had returned to work by the predawn hours today. While providing no actual figures he said 38 percent to 40 percent of the work force was on the job, including both union and non-union controllers.

Robert E. Poli, president of the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization, said the controllers remained united in their determination to continue the strike and said only about 3 percent of those who struck Monday had crossed picket lines.

The nation's air traffic, meanwhile, continued to operate smoothly, although on a reduced scale, J. Lynn

Helms, FAA administrator, told reporters. He said about three-fourths of the regularly scheduled flights were operating, but with some delays.

"The emphasis right now...is to figure out how we man this system and how we rebuild the system in the next six, eight, nine, 10 months," Lewis told reporters.

For his part, President Reagan is "very encouraged by our ability to operate the system and the level at which we can operate," presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said today.

Speakes said the White House considers the confrontation with the controllers over and added that he knows "of no possibility there could be any change in our position."

Lewis, too, said he considered the strike over, although he hoped additional controllers would return to work. Anyone not reporting for day shifts this morning — generally 7 a.m. local time — was to be considered fired with no opportunity for amnesty, he said.

Poli accused the administration of "the most blatant form of union busting I have ever seen."

Midland-based controllers picketing regional airport

Fifteen of Midland's 18 striking air traffic controllers began walking a picket line at Midland Regional Airport at 8 a.m. today.

The three missing controllers were still "on strike," according to the picketers, but were unable to join their fellow strikers on the picket line this morning.

"We've been fired," said one of the strikers-controllers.

Wednesday, with only seconds left before President Reagan's 10 a.m. deadline for the controllers to return to their jobs, Midland's controllers were cheering and standing firm on their illegal walkout at the union's strike headquarters in Lubbock.

Mark Flavin, Midland striker-controller, said from Lubbock he does not have a job anymore, but "it doesn't bother me."

"I prefer to be a controller, but it's not the only thing I can do," he said.

According to The Associated Press, Reagan was described by White House aides as being "tough as nails" on the strike issue.

"Reagan doesn't realize how hard it is to get qualified people for this job," Flavin said.

"He's not doing this because of the money issue, the government is doing this to break our union," he said. "We could go to Poland and our government would support our strike, but in this country it's illegal."

Meanwhile, Flavin's wife, Tammie, said she supported her husband and the other 17 Midland controllers in their decision.

Flavin and his wife talked by phone minutes after the deadline Wednesday.

"Mark said Reagan has moved the deadline up five hours," she said. "To me this means if they fire him

(Mark), he will eventually be hired back."

Mrs. Flavin expressed disappointment in Reagan's decision because "PATCO had all our support before he was elected, now he's turned against us."

"When Reagan said Tuesday night 'why should I fire them; they've already quit,' he was backed into a corner," she said. "This proves he (Reagan) can't do without the controllers."

On the other hand, Midland pilots are "somewhat upset and disappointed in the controllers' defiance in refusing to go back to work," according to Jay Stiles, a pilot for Tom Brown, Inc.

He said the consensus among the Midland pilots is that the controllers should have gone back to work.

"We're standing behind the U.S. government, not PATCO," Stiles said.

Israel refuses any dealings with PLO

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin today ruled out any dealings with the Palestine Liberation Organization, calling it a "bloody, murderous terrorist organization."

Begin told an Israel Radio interviewer he assumed the talks on Palestinian self-rule in occupied territory will be renewed between September and October after his visit later this month with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and in Washington next month with President Reagan.

But he rejected Sadat's call for a role in the negotiations for the PLO, which he said was "not a liberation organization, but a bloody, murderous terrorist organization in the most brutal sense of the term."

Begin said the PLO's "friends" — the 1.2 million Palestinians in the

West Bank of the Jordan and Gaza Strip — would have to be "remembered" in the talks. "But it's impossible to put them (the PLO) into the framework," he said.

In Beirut, the PLO attacked Begin's new coalition government, calling it a "war cabinet." The PLO also told all Arab countries to brace for a new Middle East conflict. PLO Interior Minister Salah Khalaf, known as Abu Iyad, said it was a "fascist government" attempting to "annihilate the Palestinian people."

In Tel Aviv, a trial began for Begin's labor and immigration minister, Aharon Abu-Hatzeira, only one day after the new government won parliamentary approval by three votes. Abu-Hatzeira, the 42-year-old religious affairs minister in Begin's previous government, skipped the

court session and instead joined Begin and his Cabinet in Jerusalem.

The minister is accused of misappropriating money from a charity fund during the mid-1970's when he was mayor of Ramle, a town south of Tel Aviv. Prosecutors claim he used the money to pay for a babysitter, carpenter and new shutters for his home, among other things.

Abu-Hatzeira's lawyers asked for postponement of the trial until the Knesset, Israel's parliament, votes on a motion to lift his parliamentary immunity.

Abu-Hatzeira was stripped of his immunity by the previous Knesset spring so he could stand trial on bribery charges. He was acquitted in May, but the prosecution says it has a stronger case this time, with 61 witnesses to testify.

After his first acquittal, Abu-Hatzeira claimed he was being persecuted because he is a Moroccan, an underdog in Israel's European-dominated establishment. Prior to the June elections, he broke with the predominantly European National Religious Party and formed TAMI, a party made up primarily of Jews of Arab origin.

TAMI won three seats in the new Knesset, a weak showing but enough to make it indispensable to Begin's coalition-building effort. His conviction would tear TAMI apart and probably bring down Begin's government.

The 61-58 division in Wednesday's parliamentary vote of confidence for the government promised unstable times ahead for Begin's shaky coalition.

It's time to leave the pool, go back to school

Even though August just happens to blaze in immediately after the blistering heat of July, it sometimes seems more like an autumn month. Store windows are stuffed with cool weather clothes; wool coats, sweaters, and pants are displayed under signs boasting "Back to School Sale." Grocery and dime store aisles overflow with notebooks, lunch boxes and pencils.

That's when you realize that, yes, it's time to drag the kids out of the pool and start getting ready to jump back into the good ol' school day routine.

Midland Independent School District will begin classes Aug. 31 and is anticipating an enrollment of 16,096 students in the kindergarten through 12th grades and the special education program. An additional 230 students are expected to participate in the Head Start and 4-year-old migrant education programs.

KINDERGARTEN students enrolled in the all-day program will attend school from 8:40 a.m. to 2:55

p.m. Those planning on entering only the morning program will attend from 8:40 to 11:25 a.m. and those in the afternoon will go from 12:10 to 2:55 p.m. Students in the first through third grades will go to school from 8:40 a.m. to 2:55 p.m. Fourth and fifth graders will be in class from 8:40 to 2:40 and sixth graders will be there from 8:10 to 3:10.

The three junior high schools and Midland Freshman High will have classes from 8:40 a.m. to 3:40 p.m. Students at Lee Freshman High will attend classes from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Students enrolled in either of the two high schools will be in class from 8:10 a.m. to 3:10 p.m.

Students entering school for the first time are required to have had their DPT series (diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus), one MMR shot (mumps, measles, rubella) and a polio vaccination. They must also have had one polio booster since their fourth birthday.

Students 12 years and older must have had a DPT booster within the past 10 years. If the student was 12 on or after Sept. 1, 1979, he or she is required to have had a measles vaccination.

THE HERITAGE School for children ages three to five will begin classes on Sept. 9. Students will attend class from 9 to 11:30 a.m. on either Tuesdays and Thursdays or Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

There are four teachers and 40 students presently enrolled.

The Hillander School plans to start the school year Sept. 8. Classes will be held Mondays through Fridays with preschoolers attending from 9:11:30 a.m., first through third graders attending from 8:30-2:30 and fourth through sixth graders attending from 8:30-3:30. The foreign language to be taught this year is Spanish and it will begin in the first grade. There are 385 students enrolled and 27 teachers on the staff.

Midland Christian School has an expected enrollment of 530 students and 30 teachers. Classes will begin on Aug. 31 in the following hours: morn-

ing kindergarten, 8:10-11:30; afternoon kindergarten, 12:15-3; first through sixth grade, 8:10 a.m.-3 p.m. and high school from 8:10 a.m.-3:15 p.m.

With 120 students presently enrolled and still more coming in, Oaklawn Park Baptist School plans to begin classes on Aug. 31. Kindergarten students will attend school from 8:30-11:30 a.m. and grades 1-12 will attend from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. There are seven teachers currently on the staff.

PERMIAN BASIN High School will open its doors for the first time on Sept. 1 to students in grades 8-12. Classes will be conducted from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays with every other Friday used for lab work. There are 20 students enrolled and the administration said it is operating on a continuing enrollment basis and is looking toward an enrollment of 40 students.

Four teachers operate five shifts per day. Students will be attending classes in language, math, science and social studies for a total of three to four and a half hours a day.

St. Ann's School has added a class

for pre-schoolers to its kindergarten through sixth grade program. Classes begin Aug. 31 for the 250 enrolled students. Pre-schoolers will attend school from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Mondays through Fridays. All other students will attend class from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. except Fridays when dismissal is at 2 p.m. to allow time for staff meetings. Besides the eight instructors for each of the preschool through sixth grade classes, there are five aides, an art teacher and a physical education teacher.

Classes will begin Sept. 8 for the 481 students enrolled in Trinity School. Students in the primary through third grades will attend class from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. while students in grades 4-9 will attend class from 8:30 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

GREENWOOD INDEPENDENT School District will begin classes on Aug. 24. Enrollment was around 600 last year but this year they are expecting some 500 elementary students and 250 junior high and high school students. There are 25 elementary

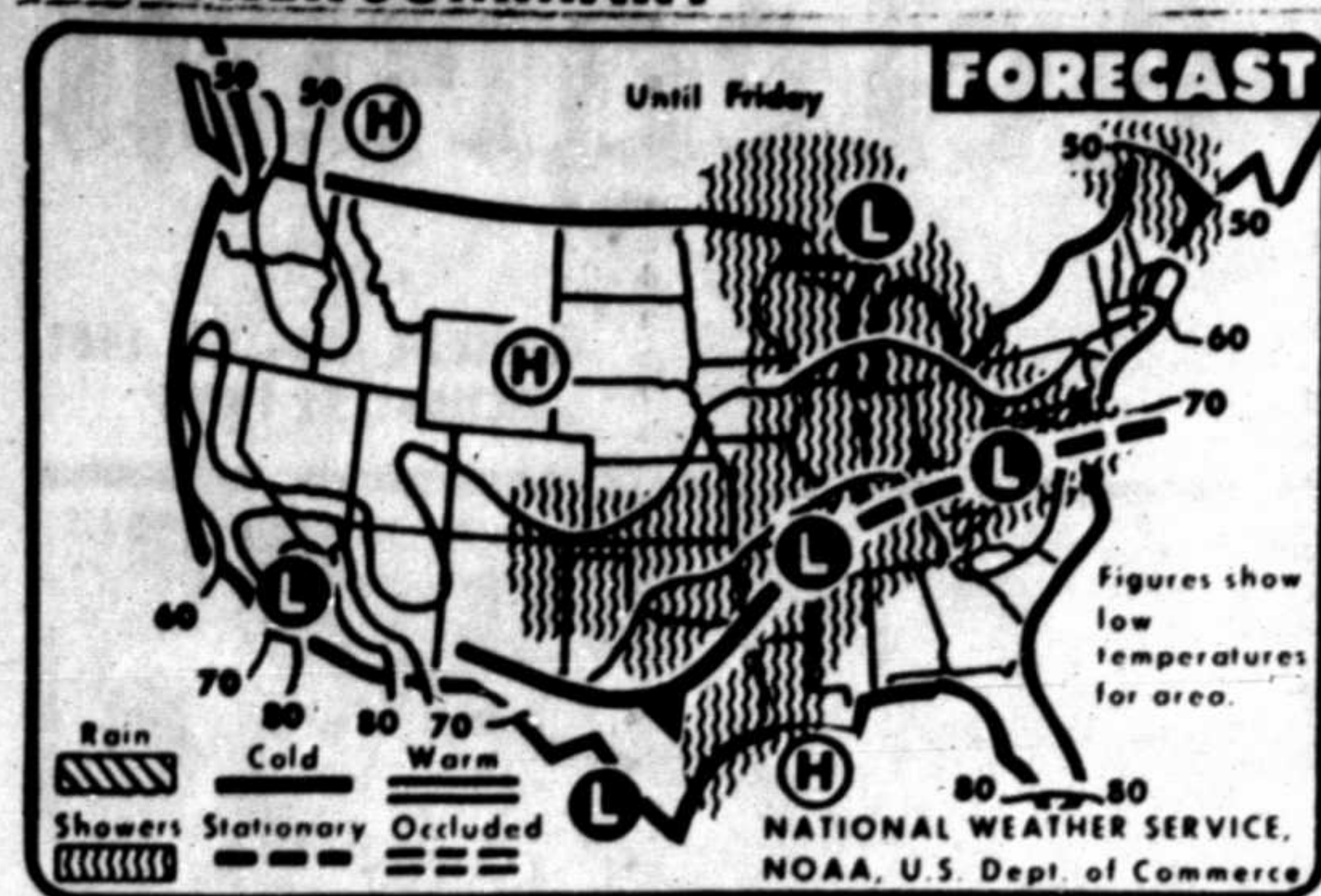

Arson believed to be cause of Miami Holiday Inn fire

MIAMI (AP) — Arson has been determined as the cause of a fire which broke out on the 10th floor of a Holiday Inn in northwest Miami, forcing the evacuation of the hotel, fire officials said early today.

Twenty-five people suffered smoke inhalation in the blaze late Wednesday night.

The fire was confined to a closet area in the north end of the 10th floor but caused smoke damage to the entire level, officials said.

Nine people were taken to two area hospitals; all but one were treated and released. A spokesman at Jackson Memorial Hospital said a child was being kept for observation overnight.

Eighteen firefighting units and 15 support units were summoned to battle the fire, which broke out shortly before midnight and was brought under control at 12:25 a.m., EDT, fire department communications operator Rhonda Usry said.

The suspect, who is expected to be arraigned today, was arrested in Odessa Tuesday, following what police said was a routine investigation. The victim, Ruben Arrellano, disappeared as he was on his way to play

video games at a local convenience store the night of July 12.

His body was discovered two days later by an oilfield worker who spotted socks and a pair of shoes on a road near the water tank. Autopsy results indicated the boy was killed by a blow to the back of the head and had been in the tank 24 to 36 hours before being discovered.

Police this morning would give no further details about the case and would not comment about a motive.

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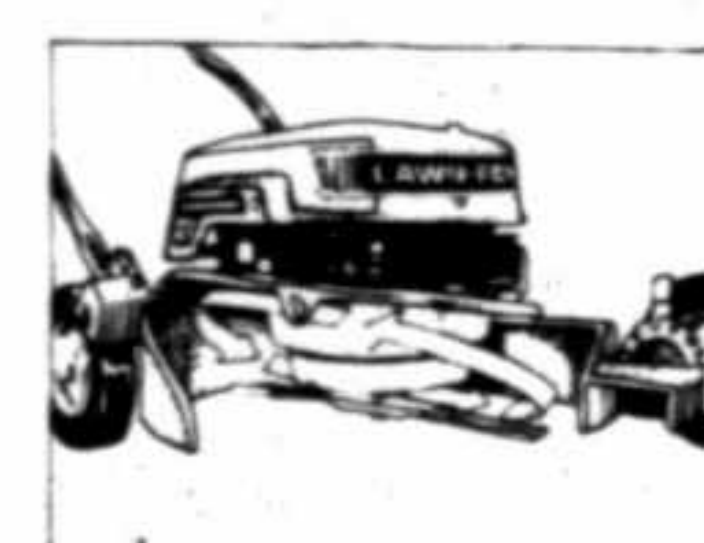
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Sadat urges Reagan to include PLO in Mideast talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, urging President Reagan to open a dialogue with the Palestine Liberation Organization, says a separate Palestinian nation should be created as part of the Middle East peace process.

Reagan was reported to have listened to Sadat's ideas for bringing about an Arab-Israeli peace without agreeing with them.

Sadat said he told Reagan on Wednesday that he thinks the United States should reverse past policies and include the PLO in discussions aimed at a comprehensive Middle East peace.

The Egyptian leader is understood to have also told Reagan that there should be a separate Palestinian nation, something the Israelis also adamantly opposed. The Israelis also are against including the PLO in peace talks.

A senior administration official said Reagan didn't respond to Sadat, but indicated he probably would have a response at a meeting today.

The main purpose of the Reagan-Sadat meetings, the first between the two leaders, is to explore ways of resuming stalled negotiations on autonomy for Palestinians in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

Reagan assured Sadat in a welcoming ceremony that despite the change in administration, "We have not altered our commitment to peace or our desire to continue building" upon the 1978 Camp David accords that have served as the basis for peace negotiations.

In a toast to Reagan at a White House dinner, Sadat said, "the willingness of the Palestinians to accept a cease-fire in Lebanon and uphold it... is a turning point that should not escape our notice. In fact, it means for the first time the Palestinians have come close to endorsing a peaceful solution."

The Palestinian action, he said, "is added ammunition for our call for mutual and simultaneous recognition between the Israelis and the Palestinians."

He told Reagan that the United

States could help the peace process "by holding a dialogue with the Palestinians through their representatives. This is certain to strengthen the forces of moderation among them."

"It also would undermine the designs of those who exploit the present state of affairs for their own selves, and it would be an act of statesmanship and vision," Sadat said.

In his toast, which was made prior to Sadat's, Reagan did not mention the Egyptian president's proposals.

But it was learned that a change in the existing U.S. policy against talking to the PLO is highly unlikely until the PLO recognizes Israel's right to exist and ceases its terrorist activities.

"We'll see what might develop, but at this point there's no change in our policy," said Edwin Meese III, counselor to the president.

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. said there was no change in U.S. policy. "The Palestinians know our requirements very clearly," he added. "All they have to do is meet them."

Reagan has said he considers the PLO to be a terrorist organization.

Sadat is understood to have told Reagan that there is a tacit recognition of Israel by the PLO — and the PLO by Israel — in the July 24 cease-fire that halted the fighting between Israel and the PLO in Lebanon.

"Why shouldn't the United States build on this and drop the condition of the second disengagement agreement which prevents the United States from contacting the PLO?" Sadat told reporters after his two-hour meeting with Reagan.

The secret protocol agreement, signed by former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger in 1975, said there wouldn't be contacts between the United States and the PLO unless the recognition requirement was met. The protocol was part of the agreement under which Israel withdrew from parts of the Egyptian Sinai.

A State Department official said the administration hasn't made any decision on whether the protocol is still binding, although he said the Israelis claim it is.

Nevertheless, the Kissinger commitment has been incorporated as administration policy, according to the official, who didn't want to be identified.

The official said the administration isn't bothered that Sadat is raising the PLO question in his talks with Reagan.

President's wife, Europeans freed

BANJUL, Gambia (AP) — A Senegalese commando force freed about 70 Europeans confined to a hotel by the rebellion in this West African country, and two Europeans rescued the wife of President Dawda Jawara and four of his children who were being held hostage by the rebels.

U.S. Ambassador Larry G. Piper said no Americans or Europeans were in any danger during the attempted leftist coup launched Wednesday to overthrow the pro-Western president while he was in London for the royal wedding.

Piper said the insurgents escorted many foreigners to his residence in the Bakau area, seven miles from the center of Banjul, and 123 people took refuge there. He said they included 80 Americans.

The rebels were holding out in a military camp in Bakau, and the 70 Europeans rescued Wednesday were in a hotel there. Senegalese authorities said the rebels had not threatened their lives.

However, Lady Jilel Jawara, one of the Moslem president's two wives, said the rebels threatened constantly to kill her, her husband's eight children and about 20 other people they took as hostages.

The conditions, she said, were "very difficult," and the children had only one meal a day.

Lady Jilel told a news conference in Banjul four of the children developed diarrhea, and the rebels let her take them to the British Medical Research Compound across from the military camp where they were held.

She said four rebels accompanied them, but the doctors asked two of them to wait outside. Then, she continued, as the children were being treated, two unidentified Europeans entered the room, captured the two guards without a struggle and set her and the four children free.

Jawara said the Senegalese troops, which the neighboring government sent at his request, were "neutralizing" the Bakau area. Piper reported that the Senegalese virtually cordoned off the area where the rebels were holding out after "heavy fighting."

Rebel leaders in Bolivia preparing for attack

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Rebel leaders in southeast Bolivia defied the military junta controlling La Paz and said they were preparing for an attack by ground and air forces. But no bloodshed had been reported yet in the three-day-old attempt to change the leadership of the Andean country's year-old military regime.

"We understand troops and aircraft are being sent against us either tonight or at dawn tomorrow," said Gen. Lucio Anez Rivero, a former army chief of staff, in a telephone interview with The Associated Press late Wednesday.

Anez Rivero was at the rebel headquarters in Santa Cruz, Bolivia's second largest city and the center of its oil industry 325 miles southeast of the capital, where he and Gen. Alberto Natusch Busch on Monday launched the fifth attempt since May to oust President Luis Garcia Meza, the former army commander who had headed the military government for a year.

Garcia Meza resigned Tuesday, handing over the government to the junta made up of the three armed forces commanders he appointed earlier this year. But he remained in La Paz, and there were indications he was still calling giving the orders via the military chiefs.

The junta broadcast a communique Wednesday night terming the rebellion an "irresponsible adventure" and expressing regret at Garcia Meza's resignation. It expressed gratitude to him for resisting "the interference of foreign powers" in Bolivia's internal affairs and for his "loyalty and work well done."

Garcia Meza met Wednesday morning with the junta, but no one would say what was discussed or decided. Meanwhile, the rebels in a broadcast said the president's resignation was a hoax and called on the junta to come to Santa Cruz and confer with Anez Rivero and Natusch.

Natusch, who led a coup in 1979 but held the presidency for only 15 days, said Gen. Waldo Bernal, commander of the air force and the senior member of the junta, agreed to meet with him and Anez Rivero. But Vice Adm. Oscar Pammo, the navy member of the junta, said they had not decided whether a negotiating mission would take

place. Bernal said earlier Wednesday that the junta was firmly in control of the government in the capital and denied reports that it would name a new president soon. He said the triumvirate would rule collectively and would not accept "political interference."

The junta warned the Bolivian media that severe censorship restrictions imposed by Garcia Meza after he seized power a year ago would be enforced, and officials of two La Paz papers were reported arrested.

The media were told to publish and broadcast only official information. But a government spokesman said foreign correspondents and new agencies could continue to function as they have been doing.

U.S. buttering up New Zealand

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration is selling some 220 tons of surplus American butter to New Zealand even though the Soviet Union was willing to buy it at a higher price.

Agriculture Secretary John R. Block said Wednesday that the New Zealand Dairy Board will pay 70 cents a pound for the butter and has agreed not to resell it to the Soviets.

State Department officials have said Moscow probably would have paid around \$1.05 a pound, but the Reagan administration decided not to deal with the Soviets because the butter is subsidized by the American taxpayer.

An official report indicates the U.S. government investment in the butter is about \$1.40 a pound.

According to the officials, a decision to sell to the Soviets might have been interpreted in Moscow as a sign that the United States is willing to set aside ideology if the alternative is a big profit or, in this case, a smaller loss.

Under the agreement, however, there is nothing to prevent New Zealand from selling its own butter to the Soviets. New Zealand is the world's principal butter exporter.

The butter represents about half the stockpile owned by the Agriculture Department's Commodity Credit Corp. Delivery begins Sept. 1 and will run through June 30, 1982.

Brady may have to undergo additional surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) — Presidential press secretary James S. Brady, recovering from a series of seizures earlier in the week, may have to undergo additional surgery if leakage of spinal fluid continues, a White House spokesman says.

Brady, who is still hospitalized for treatment of the head wound he sustained during the attempted assassination of President Reagan March 30, was reported in good condition Wednesday with no indication of further seizures like those that struck him Monday.

Doctors noticed some drainage of clear liquid, probably spinal fluid, from Brady's nose during the major seizure, but little leakage has been noticed since. The leakage had been a

problem during early stages of Brady's recuperation.

Dr. Dennis O'Leary, a spokesman at George Washington University Hospital, said the leakage was not too severe and appeared "tolerable," but that doctors were monitoring it as a sign a passageway may be open to his brain. A large passageway could let air into the brain and increase pressure, which could require surgery.

Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes raised the possibility Wednesday of additional surgery in the future to correct the leakage problem. Such an operation, termed "trans-nasal," would involve a sinus area damaged when Brady was shot.

Speakes also said Brady had a low-grade fever Wednesday and remained groggy from the barbiturate-anesthesia treatment he received to quiet the seizures. A chest X-ray showed small air pockets in the lungs resulting from the anesthesia, and these may have been responsible for the low fever, he said.

But Brady was talking and taking fluids and medication orally, Speakes said.

Doctors are giving Brady antibiotics to ward off infection, as well as a sedative and increased doses of anti-seizure medicine.

The press secretary suffered one

serious grand mal seizure, similar to the convulsions seen in severe epilepsy. It was followed by others through Monday night — mostly electrical brain seizures measured by an electroencephalograph, O'Leary said.

O'Leary said it was too early to tell the significance of the seizure activity. The seizures may never recur, or they could signal the beginning of post-trauma epilepsy, a disorder that could require continued treatment, he said.

O'Leary said about 30 percent of patients with severe head injuries like Brady's develop a seizure problem four to six months after the injury. He called it "disappointing but not totally unexpected."

Cancer researcher says family courage for all

MIAMI (AP) — The Ray Southerland family, dogged by cancer for 141 years, is a model of humanity and courage for all Americans, a cancer researcher says.

The latest chapter in the Miami family's nightmare ended shortly before noon Wednesday when Ray Southerland, 43, a former city policeman succumbed to the disease.

"They are a great inspiration to everybody," said Dr. William Blattner, chief of a study team at the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md. "This kind of thing makes you care about who dies — makes you

want to double your efforts."

"It was quick," son Stephen, 21, said of his father's death. "Two nights ago, he was still able to respond to hugging."

Southerland's death came less than two months after his 16-year-old son, Michael, died of the disease.

"In our mind, he is in heaven with two of his boys," said Stephen, who lost his left leg to bone cancer in 1974. "He has as much family there as he has here."

Southerland is survived by his wife, Jane, Stephen, and a sister, Nancy, 26, who lost a leg to cancer last year.

The disease has struck in every generation of the family but one since 1840.

Another son, Jeffrey, died in 1967 at age 4 of leukemia.

Southerland had known the odds were against him when he returned to a Miami hospital last month after being operated on for a brain tumor. Because of his own illness, he was unable to attend the funeral for Michael, who died of spinal-cancer in Cincinnati June 10.

Michael Southerland gained national attention after fighting a courageous battle against the disease, jour-

neying between Miami and the Cincinnati hospital numerous times in the years before his death. A former Junior Olympics swimmer, he was left a paraplegic last year when his spinal cord was severed to remove five cancerous vertebrae.

Police spokeswoman Kelli Miles said the cause of Southerland's death was a tumor that had invaded the partially paralyzed officer's brain.

Memorial services were scheduled at the Wayside Baptist Church in Miami Friday, with burial Monday at the family plot in Terre Haute, Ind.

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Du Pont Co. wins Conoco, now must cope with Seagram

NEW YORK (AP) — There was a champagne celebration at Du Pont Co. headquarters early Wednesday after the chemical company clinched the biggest corporate bidding war ever, but its takeover of Conoco Inc. brought concerns as well.

Du Pont said about 55 percent of Conoco's shares had been offered to it by the Tuesday midnight deadline, more than enough to take control of the nation's ninth-largest oil company and complete the biggest merger ever.

But while Du Pont will control Conoco — and Conoco's large reserves of coal, oil and natural gas — the nation's biggest chemical company must face billions of dollars of debt and a minority owner, Seagram Co. Ltd., that may wind up with a larger share of Du Pont than the Du Pont

family controls.

Du Pont, based in Wilmington, Del., prevailed because Conoco shareholders feared that a higher bid from Mobil Corp. might be blocked by antitrust problems. Mobil failed in frantic efforts to get the courts or the Securities and Exchange Commission to delay the Du Pont bid.

Du Pont will pay \$7.4 billion in cash and stock for Conoco, more than twice the \$3.6 billion Shell Oil Co. paid two years ago for Belridge Oil Co., in what had been the largest corporate takeover.

Du Pont shed little light on its plans. Chairman Edward Jefferson called Conoco "a first-rate company with a record of outstanding achievement" and said, "we see strong potential in the application of our research and engineering capabilities to meet chal-

lenges in the energy field."

The two companies had annual sales of more than \$31 billion and profits of \$1.7 billion in 1980, enough to be the No. 7 company on the Fortune 500 list of industrial corporations. Conoco ranked No. 14 and Du Pont No. 15.

Seagram, a Canadian liquor distiller, said it would continue to buy all Conoco shares offered at a price of \$92 through midnight Wednesday, and it seemed likely to pick up a large part of the shares not tendered to Du Pont.

Du Pont's own offer of \$98 a share for 45 percent of Conoco was almost completely taken, meaning that those who tender to Du Pont now will get 1.7 Du Pont shares — worth about \$77 — for each Conoco share.

If Seagram were to amass 45 per-

cent of Conoco — all the shares not tendered to Du Pont by Tuesday midnight — and then tender them to Du Pont, it would wind up with about 66 million Du Pont shares, or 28 percent of Du Pont.

By contrast, the entire Du Pont family controls 50.7 million shares and no other shareholder has more than 3.4 million.

What Seagram would do with those shares is unclear, and the company refused to comment Wednesday. There has been speculation that Seagram might try to trade its shares for some Du Pont asset, possibly Consolidation Coal Co., a Conoco subsidiary that is the second-largest coal producer in the United States.

Seagram also might be willing to

hold on to the Du Pont stock. Before launching its tender offer for Conoco, it attempted to buy a minority position in Conoco with a promise it would not try to launch a takeover.

Last year, Seagram sold the U.S. assets of its oil company, Texas Pacific, to Sun Co. for \$2.3 billion and since then has been trying to invest that money. It tried to acquire St. Joe Minerals, but lost out to a higher bid from Fluor Corp., before going after Conoco.

Du Pont, which began paying for

shares at 3:45 a.m. Wednesday, will have spent \$3.8 billion for the shares it is buying for cash and will spend at least an additional \$275 million buying out a joint venture Conoco has with Monsanto Co. That purchase was required by the Justice Department before antitrust approval was given.

Much of that money was borrowed from banks, at current high interest rates. Du Pont has not indicated whether it will refinance that debt, which it could do, or try to sell off some Conoco assets for cash.

The coal strike continues in eastern Oklahoma hill country

STIGLER, Okla. (AP) — Some where out in the woods, a pack of hounds is baying. Otherwise the silence is as deep as the yawning, black pit where union men once dug coal.

For here in the eastern Oklahoma hill country, where unions are as rare as a \$10 hourly wage, the coal strike goes on.

The union men whittle and spit in a makeshift shelter beside a road 400 yards from the Garland Coal Co. No. 9 strip mine, where they were formerly paid between \$9.78 and \$11.33 an hour to dig the rich, metallurgical coal destined for steel mills in Colorado and Japan.

The four men on the picket line are among 172 United Mine Workers members engaged in a 4½-month strike against Garland, a Fort Smith, Ark., company with three mines in eastern Oklahoma and one in Arkansas.

The strike began March 21, one week before the nationwide soft coal strike. A national agreement was reached June 6 after a strike of 82 days, but Garland officials refused to sign the contract, saying it would force them out of business.

On Tuesday, negotiators for Garland and the UMW will meet in Tulsa

for their first session since June 29. Representatives are expected to exchange "complete and full (new) proposals," said Tom Pysell, Garland's chief negotiator.

"The international union has put the highest priority on this negotiation," said Randy Vehar, a UMW attorney from Washington, D.C.

"No other companies of this size have refused to re-sign," Vehar said, adding that "1,400 to 1,600 companies have signed the national agreement that can afford this contract, live under it and make a profit."

The strikers are prepared to hold out "as long as it takes," said Jay Sumpter, whose father worked the mines before him.

"We've seen that grass come up and we'll probably see it die," picketer Charlie Apple said, gazing at a field across from the muddy picket line.

For four months, the strikers got by on savings, hauled hay by day and manned picket lines at night, and sought donations from other locals. Last week, the UMW international board voted strike benefits and medical coverage for the strikers.

Pysell says Garland objects to the national contract because of "feather-

bedding." Garland has paid "over a million dollars a year" into union pension funds, he said, adding that the company believes it can provide its workers better medical and pension benefits through a private insurance broker for just \$40,000 a year.

"There's a lot of costly clauses in that contract that does no one any good and does a lot of harm to the industry. There's a lot of featherbedding in that contract," he said. "Probably 300 or 400 companies the size of Garland or smaller who signed that contract will go under before the contract expires."

Pysell said that in its best year, Garland produced 600,000 tons of coal from mines near Stigler and Bokoshe, Okla., and Charleston, Ark. "The peo-

ple that can survive who signed the national agreement are producing probably 6 million tons of coal a year," he said.

Pysell, himself a former UMW organizer, said he thinks union members are being "misled, misguided, misinformed."

"If the union wants to save this thing, they're going to have to make some adjustments," he said. "For a union to be effective, they have to effectuate a total shutdown. That's not the case here."

The UMW claims production at the Stigler mine, accomplished with non-union workers hired during the strike, is down from 16,000 tons a month to 6,000 tons.

"It may be starting to hurt them

financially," Vehar said. "In the last two weeks there has been increased antagonism against our picketers."

Verbal abuse and rock throwing have become routine. On July 25, Vehar said, four shots were fired at picketers from a speeding car. No one was hit. In May, a Garland security guard was shot in the leg.

Last week, gunshots cut power to the mine's mammoth dragline, according to Leon Lefler, mine superintendent, who also said nails and sharpened objects have been scattered on the roads used by coal trucks.

"We've worked very hard with all four locals to see that nothing will be done to justify an injunction" to halt picketing, Vehar said.

"We've tried to have a peaceful

picket and a peaceful strike," said Donnie Oldham, president of Stigler UMW Local 1323.

Oldham said union members are optimistic an agreement can be reached, allowing them to return to work and "start producing some coal."

Pysell said Garland wants an agreement, too.

"If we were of a different view and frame of mind, we wouldn't pay any attention to them," Pysell said. "But we'd like to get an agreement. We'd just like to get an agreement we can work with and get on with the business."

"People can make a good living, we can mine coal and everyone prospers."

FTC seeks refunds for auto device

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Trade Commission is charging a Connecticut mail order company with using phony advertising to sell automotive devices in a case that could result in almost \$1.3 million in refunds for consumers.

The FTC on Wednesday charged Cliffdale Associates Inc. with falsely claiming the Ball-Matic valve would lead to lower gasoline bills.

In advertisements run in newspapers and magazines, the company said the valve would inject air into the car's carburetor leading to "more effective combustion and a fuel saving of up to 20 percent."

Cliffdale, a Westport, Conn., mail-order company, sold an estimated 100,000 of the devices for \$12.95.

The government already has brought one case against the company, a Postal Service proceeding that resulted in a 1979 consent agreement with Cliffdale to discontinue the claims. The company is no longer selling the product through the mail, said Thomas Ziebarth, a Postal Service attorney.

FTC attorney William Haynes said the new case could be a prelude to an effort to get back money for consumers who bought the Ball-Matic valve.

If the FTC wins the case before an administrative law judge the agency could then ask a federal judge to order the refunds. He called the possible refunds "an important part of this case" and said the maximum amount of refunds is \$1.295 million.

Meanwhile, the FTC announced an agreement with Ball-Matic Corp., manufacturer of the valve, to stop claiming that it will lead to significant improvement in fuel economy.

Officials of Cliffdale, including president Jean-Claude Koven, could not be reached for comment. Richard J. Barich, attorney for Ball-Matic Corporation, said the Orange, Calif., company is out of business because of the federal cases. He called it "nonsense" to say that consumers have been defrauded and added, "All I know is when I read my receipts it appears to save some gas."

The FTC said the Environmental Protection Agency has tested the valve and found that it provides no significant improvement in gas mileage.

Reagan flying to California

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is joining Congress in fleeing the nation's capital.

But unlike other air travelers, the strike by air traffic controllers strike will have no impact on his travel plans.

Reagan planned to leave this afternoon for a four-week California vacation, and aides said that he saw no reason to remain in Washington as a result of the strike.

Nor was it likely that the strike would ground his flight.

Air Force One is given priority treatment and on Wednesday, deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes said he saw no likelihood the strike would force Reagan to remain in Washington.

The president, himself, said the strike has not changed his attitude to-

ward airplane flights and air safety.

At an Oval Office meeting with reporters Wednesday, Reagan was asked if the strike made him more fearful about his flight to California for his vacation.

"As an old ex-horse cavalryman, I'm always worried about flying," Reagan said, drawing a laugh from the congressional leaders gathered in the White House office.

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
