Council Hopes To Close Hearings

Slaughter Accepts Sweetwater Position

Arthur Duggan, Jr., president of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, this week announced the resignation of Chamber Executive Vice-President, Leon Slaughter, who has accepted a similar position with the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce. The resignation becomes effective September 10. Slaughter has been the Littlefield Chamber's executive vice-president, since February 1965. Duggan said the resignation of

Slaughter was accepted, by the board, with great regrets, stating that the efforts of the Chamber manager had been one of the things which had helped in getting the community moving. Duggan said, "We are indeed fortunate to have had the benefit of Leon's knowledge, and feel he has been an asset not only to the Chamber of Commerce, but to the entire community."

It is always difficult to accept the resignation of one who has given so much to the community, yet it is pleasing to know that his efforts in Littlefield have earned him this opportunity for advancement in Chamber work."

In submitting his letter of resignation to the Chamber board, Slaughter expressed his thanks to the city of Littlefield and the people who have worked with the Chamber to get Littlefield moving in a progressive manner.

The Executive Vice-president said he had sincere regrets about leaving Littlefield at this time, but said he had the greatest faith in the ability of the community to continue the work that has been started. "It is always hard to leave someplace where you feel at home, and we have certainly felt at home in Littlefield."

The attitude that has prevailed in my short association with the people of the community, is one of the finest in my experience. The things that have been done in the past 18 months, could never have been done by one person, it takes people working together to accomplish what has been accomplished. It has been my privilege to be a part of the progress of Littlefield, and I will be forever grateful to the community and the people for the opportunity that has been afforded me."

Chamber President-elect, Jim Joyner added his vice to that of Duggan's by saying he was greatly anticipating working with Slaughter in the coming year, but was pleased that the executive vice-president had an opportunity to move ahead in chamber work.

Duggan said the resignation of Slaughter leaves a vacancy that will be difficult to fill, yet we will have to start looking for a man who will carry out the fine programs that have been begun.

Rains Drench Soggy Area

"Feast or famine," is almost becoming the by-word for farmers of the area, as rains once again soaked the area over the weekend, bringing cries of "too much," and "won't it ever stop."

The most recent rain fall followed a nine inch deluge earlier in the week, which had farmers holding their breath, lest the rain and cool weather damage the crops of the area.

While the weekend rains were general they were mostly light with up to one inch being recorded around the county and area. The rains over the weekend brings the total for the month to almost 11 inches, one of the wettest Augusts ever recorded. In the country where rain and a new calf is always welcome, the growers are beginning to feel the benefit of the moisture has reached the saturation point, and prolonged moisture will hurt rather than help.

The observers feel that it is possible the grain may have benefited more than the cotton as the heads have picked up additional weight, and the burning conditions have been lessened. Cotton on the other hand seems to have come through the rains in good shape and with warm weather the area could have another excellent cotton harvest this fall.

The grain crop, thanks to the rains, is expected to be one of the finest in many years, as the growers look not only to a bigger harvest but to increased prices as well.

The prospects of a bumper cotton and grain harvest, along with the ASCS announcement that they will release an estimated \$9 million in mid-September has caused farmers, merchants, and trades-people of the area to take another look at the situation, and the optimism of the area to increase ten fold, unless we get another rain.

Shooting hours are from noon until sunset. The limit is 12 per day and not more than 24 in possession. Before you take off on a hunting trip out of the county, be sure to buy your new hunting license. The old license expired August 31. The hardware and sporting goods dealers have the new license. The price is \$3.15.

Wildcats Polish Attack

The Littlefield Wildcats this week began to polish the attack which sunk the Morton Indians under a deluge of points in last week's scrimmage, in preparation for the Friday night scrimmage with Seminole, in Seminole at 7 p.m.

The polishing work was started after the 'Cats saw films of the Morton session, and found some of the areas where more work was needed.

Head Coach, George Kirk, said the squad is back at full strength, with the return of Randy Birkelbach, as two-way

guard, who has been out with a lung infection. The return of Birkelbach leaves the 'Cats missing only Mack Mangum, who remains on the doubtful list, pending the results of examinations and tests in the next several weeks.

Kirk said the staff feels the team is just about set, but the real test will come Friday night in Seminole, as the team winds up pre-season action. Only one more two-a-day workout are scheduled for the Wildcats, that coming Monday, only four days before the opening game with the Plainview Bulldogs.

As the team stacks up now, Kirk feels it will be a backfield of Fred Kootz, Wilmer Williams, Nevil Manning and either

Tim Tapley or Mike Grissom, in the opening game. The problem of the quarterback position is very unusual for the Wildcats, but Kirk admits it's pleasant to have depth at the man-under spot. In addition to the battle between Tapley and Grissom, the battle could become more involved when Lindy Stansell recovers from a broken bone in his hand. The return of the 5'9" senior would give the Wildcats three capable quarterbacks, and give the coaches fits finding the starter for each game.

In the line, several battles still loom as the Wildcats find themselves two deep in a couple of spots, but under manned (See WILDCATS, Page 9)

When the Littlefield City Council meets tonight, it is hoped the public hearing on the city paving program, which was begun in June, can be closed and a decision reached on the streets to be paved.

Mayor J. E. Chisholm said Wednesday morning, it is obvious all the streets in the original plan would not be in the final program, but declined to say what streets might be taken out.

The issue on the paving program was first heard in June, of this year, as the council notified property owners of the city's intent to pave about 30 blocks of unpaved city streets.

Property owners on many of the streets turned out at the opening of the hearings to express opposition to the paving of about three-quarters of the streets, causing the city to postpone any decision until the meeting tonight.

City manager, Richard Bean, said he did not know if the council's plan to close the hearings would be realized, but said he saw little reason for the hearings to continue. "Most of the comments on the issue have been heard, and the city is currently working on several of the right-of-way problems that existed. All that remains to be done is for the council members to decide which of the proposed streets would be deleted from the program, and which would be paved." The city manager stated.

In discussing the program, the mayor said most of the problems on the resurfacing of U. S. 84, through the business district have been worked out and the city is now waiting for the State to say when they will be ready to start. "The city has done about all it can do to get the problems worked out, now we have to wait for the highway department to notify us when they will be ready to start," Chisholm said.

When the discussion was first opened on the paving of the business route, the city was in hopes the work could be completed by the first of 1967, but due to some of the problems that have arisen, a mid-winter completion date is all but out.

In addition to the improvements to be done on 84, other streets, and Avenues originally included in the program are the unpaved portions of Wicker, Sunset, 14th, Phelps, Austin Avenue, Lake Avenue, and Reed Street, as well as Morse Avenue.

The total cost of the entire project, including the improvements on 84, was an estimated \$469,000. Of this total the state would spend \$340,000 on the US 84 improvements, and the city would bear \$6,757 of the cost.

On the paving of city streets, property owners in the affected area would pay in excess of \$122,000, which includes the installation of curb and gutters and fill where needed.

Mayor Chisholm said since it is very possible a number of the streets will be deleted from the program, it is not possible to give an estimated cost.

Under the proposal, curbs and gutters would be installed at a cost of \$1.40 per foot, while the cost of paving would range from \$3.22 per foot on 14th Street to \$2.34 per foot in other areas of the city. The difference in the amounts, according to Bean, is due to the amount of engineering work and grading in each section of the program.

Other than the discussion on the paving program, the council faces another light agenda, with only the setting of a hearing date on the tentative budget, on tap at press time, Wednesday.

Area Schools Open Classes

School bells will ring out across the Lamb County area today as Littlefield and area schools open the 1966-67 school year.

For several weeks now school personnel have been working and planning for the year and the increased enrollments they feel will result from new students entering school and students who will be attending area schools for the first time since moving into the region.

School officials are hesitant to say what the enrollment will be on the first day, but are in agreement that it will take several weeks before the top figure is reached.

Littlefield School Superintendent Paul Manning said one of the biggest problems in enrollment is getting everyone rounded up and enrolled. It usually takes a few weeks for the word to get around that school has started, and then a few more days until all the students are in school.

The schools opening this week, in addition to Littlefield, include Amherst, Sudan, Bula, Earth-Springlake, Whitharral, Pep, and Olton. Spade will begin classes on September 5.

Last year most of the area schools began classes the first week in September.

Recipes are as follows: ENCHILADAS

American style enchiladas with chili as a base.

2T chervil leaves, finely ground
1T chili powder
1T Worcestershire sauce
1 chili feranto (pepper)
3 garlic cloves; minced
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1/8 lb. salt pork
Salt and pepper to taste

Place all ingredients in covered bean pot and simmer slowly about 24 hours. Add hot water as needed during cooking; keeping beans immersed with hot water at all times.

24 tortillas
2 cups chopped onion
2 cups grated cheese
Dip tortillas in hot fat quickly and dip in and out of chili base (the tortillas should be soft at this point). Lay then in baking pan; add 1T chili, 1T onion, and 1T cheese and roll up the tortilla. When all tortillas are rolled in the pan, place remaining onions over top, pour balance of chili over the onions and top the grated cheese. Cook slowly in oven until cheese has melted and serve hot.

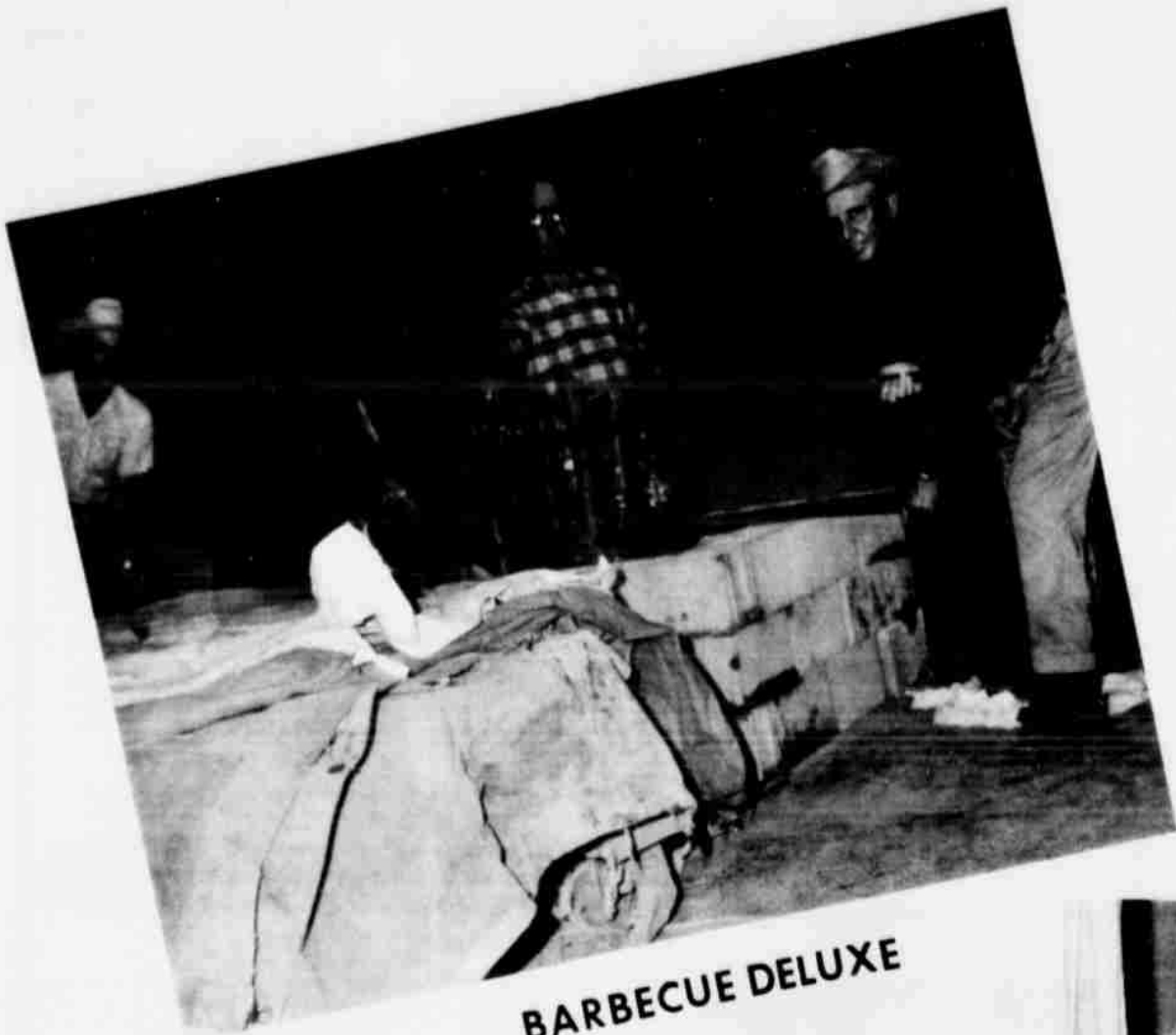

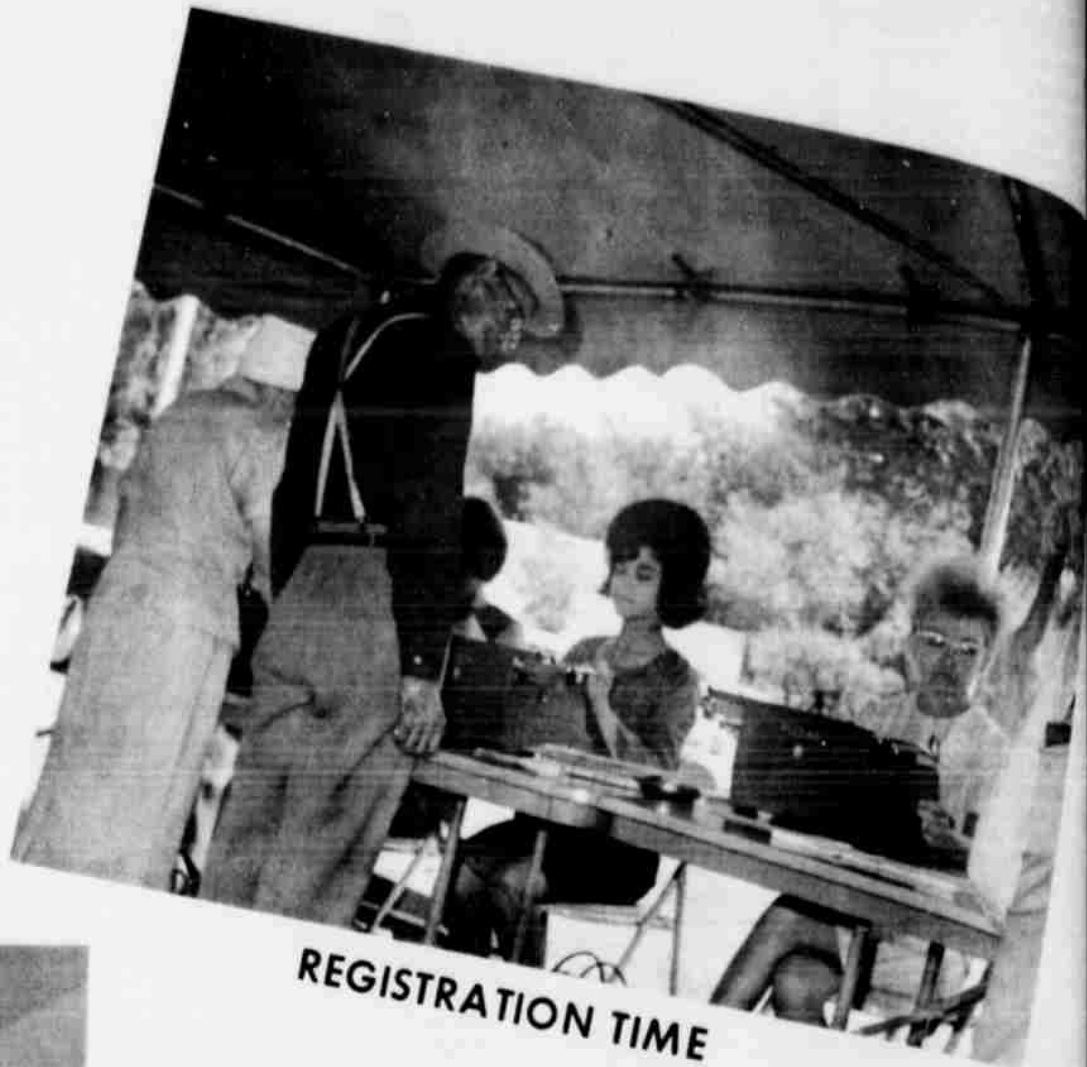

44 Year Old Debt Repaid

WHITHARRAL—Mail times the high point of retired farmer, Fred Newsom's day. Recently, he really received a surprise in his rural mail box. An envelop containing a cashier's check for \$100 that was loaned to a friend 44 years ago.

Newsom loaned Alfred Blasdel \$100 while he was working in an oil field at Ranger in 1922. The money was used by Blasdel to go to California to find work. He promised to repay the loan as soon as possible, and gave Newsom a note.

Through the years, Newsom heard about the man through friends, learning that he had later moved to New Orleans, La. and had been elected to a county office.

Last year Newsom ran across the note for the loan and burned it, after 43 years.

Newsom said he couldn't explain why the man had decided to pay after all these years. An enclosed letter stated that the debtor was now 70 years old, retired and living from a small pension while looking after his mother who was in a rest home at Mason.

Perhaps this excerpt from the letter best explains why he finally repaid the loan: "I shall kneel by my bed tonight and ask my Lord to forgive me and that you can, even in the smallest way, forgive me and pray for me."

Some of Newsom's friends who own businesses heard about the repaid debt and asked him if he would like to collect debts for them. Newsom smiled and drawled, "I'm kinda slow, but if you don't mind waiting a few years, I guess I could."

One friend used a calculator to find the sum of the debt at 10 per cent interest compounded for the 44 years—a whopping \$6,400. Newsom smiled and said, "Well, it's the principle of the thing that counts."

Rep. Clayton Attends National Conference

State Representative Bill Clayton spent the week of August 15th thru 20th in Portland, Maine, attending the National Conference of the Council of State Governments, and the week of the 22nd in Washington, D. C. attending the Council of State Governments on suggested State Legislation and working on West Texas water problems.

While in Washington, several meetings were attended by Rep. Clayton, Speaker of House, Ben Barnes, Rep. Ralph Wayne, S. B. Whittenburg, and K. B. Watson with Texas Congressmen in trying to work out some of the problems involving the importation of water to West Texas.

Rep. Clayton, currently a member of the Conservation and Reclamation Committee and a House Interim Water Study Council, and a member of the Steering Committee of the West Texas Chamber Water Resources Committee, said that many problems are involved in working out water problems for West Texas. However, he was encouraged by the receptiveness of the Texas Congressmen, Clayton said he believed the meetings stimulated enough interest among the Congressmen to make them actively push for passage of the Colorado River Basin Study Bill, which is now in the Rules Committee.

This Bill provides and authorizes for preliminary studies to be made for developing water supplies from the Colorado River Basin for eleven Western states. This Bill includes West Texas and would also provide a vehicle for additional studies of importation of Mississippi and Missouri River water into Texas. Clayton said that if Congress does pass the Colorado River Basin Bill this session, then the Texas Legislature could take whatever action was necessary when they convene in January to implement any portion of the Bill that might require state action.

Clayton said that House Speaker Ben Barnes will be very instrumental in helping West Texas meet its water needs through his influence and untiring ability.

to get things done. Clayton suggests that all people interested in water for West Texas should watch for the announcement date of the public meeting in Lubbock to be held by the Texas Water Development Board where the State water plan will be presented in full.
