## State Praise 'Official'

### Resolution Commends Park Action

Joint action by Colorado City and Texas Electric Service Company for new Lake Colorado City State Park has been commended officially by Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission in Austin.

A resolution has been filed in the state commission's official minutes "as testimonial of appreciation and commendation" and to inform Texas citizens of the "magnanimity

of these outstanding citizens." Copy of the resolution has been received here by Mayor C. C. (Mike) Hurt and City Council. It states:

"Whereas, it is important to record for history the gracious and beneficial support given to the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission and Department by the board of directors, stockholders and employees of Texas Electric Ser-

vise Company and the mayor and city councilmen, city employees and the citizens of the city of Colorado City, Texas, and...

"Whereas, the Parks & Wildlife Commission is desirous to officially and publicly commend Texas Electric Service Company and Colorado City for their generosity to the benefit of the outdoor recreational loving public of the State of Texas, and...

"Whereas, the Texas Electric Service Company has agreed to lease to the State of Texas an adjoining 14 acres, which has a paved artery looping through the area with shelters, showers, restrooms, fishing dock and boat ramp facilities to the State of Texas, and...

"Whereas it is the intent of the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission and Department that the tremendous recreational area, due to the scarcity of lakes in West Texas, will be made into a fine recreational facility to serve the nearly 500,000 citizens within a 110 mile radius of this constant level lake and the many other Texans using interstate highways using and, now, therefore be it...

"Resolved, that the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission, meeting in Austin, Texas July 9, 1970, at the special called meeting, is desirous to acknowledge and extend appreciation of the entire commission on to Texas Electric Service Company and the City of Colorado City in Mitchell County, and be it further...

"Resolved, that the original copy and duplicate original of this Appreciation Resolution be delivered to the Texas Electric Service Company and the City of Colorado City, and be it further...

"Resolved, that a copy of this Appreciation Resolution be formally filed in the Commission's Minutes as testimonial of appreciation and commendation so the citizens of Texas may be advised as to the magnanimity of these outstanding citizens."

Locally, the resolution has been included in the official minutes of City Council.

## City In New Light

### Some Areas 7 Times Brighter

Various parts of Colorado City are now being seen in a different light.

That's because of the completion of phase I of a five-year plan converting old incandescent street lights to new mercury vapor lighting in several sections of town.

Difference between the old and the new is seven times more light for night drivers.

Old 92-watt lights put out 1,000 lumens of light while the new fixtures with 175 watt mercury extracts 7,000 lumens according to Don Benson, manager of local Texas Electric Service Company.

New street identification signs have been erected by the city in the newly lighted area also.

Streets included in the phase I lighting project were Austin Street from Westpoint to Hickory, Sixth Street from Oak to Austin, 10th from Oak to Aus-

tin, Westpoint from Austin to East city limits.

Tenth Street from Austin to Eastover, Chestnut from 17th to 22nd and 22nd from Chestnut to south city limits; East-

## New Routing To Mail Box

A new traffic pattern is in the making for letter mailing at the Post Office curbside letter drop.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. has been authorized to prepare an ordinance for the new routing at the next City Council meeting.

The new pattern, which is a month away, will take the letter receiving box, off West Third and locate boxes at the west side of the Post Office at the alley curb facing west toward City Hall.

Traffic flow will be from the south, looping from W. 4th north of the Post Office.

Letter drops will be on the driver's side (left) as motorists travel the alley south into East Third between the Post Office and City Hall.

The new plan will be to alleviate traffic problems now resulting with postal drop at front of Post Office. This interferes with the parking in front

Public schools--except those blessed with oil income--cash of extraordinary amounts--allow the state are groaning because of the money squeeze.

Costs continue to rise, the public wants better curriculum and improved educational programs through modern innovations.

And, the state with its climbing teacher pay schedule--which will continue to go up each 12 months--will put more money into local school operations in the year to come. But, at the same time, school requirements to match those state funds will also go up.

That's why Colorado City school trustees are pleased that no increase in local property taxing is in view for the district for the 1970-71 school year.

They can put only a question mark, though, for the years to follow. Supt. James McMath, in the budget presentation Monday night less than 24 hours before he resigned to accept the Brownwood superintendency, made this plain.

Colorado Independent School District expects to raise \$611,058 through local taxes for its 1970-71 school budget requirement.

That's according to budget figures that went before school trustees this week.

It is also the reason the district keeps the same property tax schedule for the ensuing year--total \$1.78 tax rate per \$100 assessed property valuation based on 45 per cent of value.

That tax rate is divided between maintenance--operation and bonded indebtedness. For maintenance--operation \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation will be expected to produce \$611,058 in actual cash.

Remaining 28 cents of the tax rate is expected to produce

\$115,131 for interest and principal on retiring the district's bonded indebtedness.

Those combined amounts of tax revenue, of course, are far short of the \$1,303,547 that will be needed to meet all school needs for the next 12-month period.

State per capita apportionment, salary and operational funding and transportation money provide most of the almost \$600,000 more.

The proposed budget lists \$150,024 incoming to the district from apportionment, \$378,260 more from the state for

salary and operational expenses and \$36,896 in transportation funding.

A few small categories will provide about \$12,000 more--such as investment interest, revolving fund balance and miscellaneous rentals.

Instruction--that's the budget term for teacher and principal pay--will be almost three-fourths of the entire \$1,303,547 budget for 1970-71. It adds up to \$843,064--a quick indication of how the state salary schedule affects a local school budget.

The district will expect to

spend in the next 12 months additional monies like these:

About \$6,420 for health services (including health nurse and etc.); \$39,642 to transport students to and from school; \$83,266 for operation of school plant facilities (heating, water, sewerage, electricity, custodial supplies); \$44,208 for maintenance of plant (repairs); \$47,296 for the district's portion of Social Security; \$16,610 for student body activities, including \$14,000 for athletic supplement.

Interest on unpaid bonds will require about \$42,800 more cash plus \$72,100 for payment on bond principal.

Juniors--Aug. 17 at 8:30 a.m. in High School Auditorium for class schedules and yearbook photos. Girls in white blouses with button-down collars. Boys with white shirts--tie to be furnished at the school.

Freshmen--Aug. 18 at 8:30 a.m. in High School Auditorium for class schedules and yearbook photos. Girls in white blouses with button-down collars. Boys with white shirts--tie to be furnished at the school.

First day of fall classes will be Wednesday, Aug. 26, following a one-day combined in-service for Colorado City, Snyder and Sweetwater teachers.

## Cash Assures Police 'Net'

That teletype communications net linking law enforcement agencies here with 18 other West Texas counties definitely is near, thanks to a \$39,857 federal grant.

Governor Preston Smith this week approved the grant to West Central Texas Council of Governments, Abilene, for establishing the law enforcement teletype net.

His approval came on recommendation of Texas Criminal Justice Council, which administers funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U.S. Department of Justice.

The \$39,857 will be used to create a teletype network of 41 terminals for 19 West Central Texas counties.

Counties to be served by the net include Mitchell, Kent, Scurry, Stonewall, Fisher, Nolan, Knox, Haskell, Jones, Taylor, Throckmorton, Shack-

elford, Callahan, Coleman, Stephens, Eastland, Brown, Comanche and Runnels.

Commissioner's Court and City Council here months ago approved participation of Mitchell County Sheriff's Department and Colorado City Police Department in the network.

Acquisition of equipment for this West Texas area will begin immediately, according to Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of Criminal Justice Council.

When installed and linked to the participating law enforcement terminals, the network

will speed law enforcement work and improve coordination of law enforcement between the various local departments.

# Ads Aid The Shopper

Extension Specialist Says

Food advertisements can be a big help to the grocery shopper, notes Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

"Food advertisements tell what foods are available and where, often include price, and although not often enough, they include a description of the food grade, size or other quality indications," Mrs. Clyatt said.

"Quality is usually high on advertised items as the store would not profit by calling attention to items in poor condition."

Purpose of advertisement is to get the customer into the

store, but the store also wants and needs repeat business, she said.

"Before buying groceries, check the food advertisements for high quality food at low prices," Mrs. Clyatt said.

"Fryer chickens continue to take the spotlight as the bargain in most meat departments," she said. "Plentiful supplies of eggs are also on the market at prices everyone can afford."

There is little change in beef and pork prices, Mrs. Clyatt added. Best beef buys include chuck roasts and steaks, ground

beef, short ribs and round steaks and roasts, according to Mrs. Clyatt.

"Best pork values will be found on hams, picnic, shoulder roasts and steaks, end cut loin roasts and chops and all kinds of lunch meat," she said.

Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at the most economical prices include bananas, oranges, cantaloupes, watermelons, peaches, plums, corn, carrots, squash, and dry yellow onions. Others included are potatoes, head lettuce, cabbage, okra, cucumbers, ra-

dishes, green onions and tomatoes.
