ONE KILLED, FIVE HURT IN SHIP BLAST
NINE KNOWN DEAD AS WINTER GRIPS EASTERN U.S.PROPERTY
LOSS BROUGHT
BY HIGH WINDS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—A rainstorm left in its wake a death list of at least 10 persons and a string of damaged cities, towns and villages extending from Washington to the Canadian border. Chicago reported three killed on account of a blizzard of snow and sleet.

High winds and rain that caused serious damage and the loss of life in Washington, threatened a flood in New England, hit the metropolitan district of New York, New York state and some parts of Pennsylvania with unusual severity.

Auto Plunges Into Canal
Slippery roads and a heavy mist were responsible for the death of a person who was drowned when his automobile plunged into a canal. A motorist killed by a train on a grade near Washington, N. J., when he obstructed his vision, and another man was drowned near Salisbury, N. C., when a ferry boat swept from its moorings.Three Killed In Chicago Accidents
CHICAGO, Nov. 18 (AP)—A swirling blizzard of sleet and snow that flowed close on the heels of a freezing gale from the northwest, most halted traffic in northern Illinois and Indiana, and southern Wisconsin, blanketed the states under a two inches of snow, and was charged with the responsibility of the deaths in Chicago.Many Caught Unaware
Hundreds of Chicago's floating population were caught unaware and hunted lodging in police stations.Washington Digs Into Its Ruins
WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The national capital turned today to the task of braving order out of the tangle or tornado strewn wreckage in the eastern section of the city.

Sweeping out of the south on the wings of a 53 mile gale, the devastating twister left a swath of destruction late yesterday from Alexandria, Va. to Hyattsville, Md. It uprooted houses, felled trees, overturned automobiles and tore down transmission wires. A negro was killed, more than 200 persons were injured and property loss was estimated at several million dollars in Washington alone.

There was an endearing scene as Miss Remus threw herself into her father's arms and embraced and kissed him.

Remus, once the possessor of millions built up by his efforts in the illicit liquor market after he deserted a promising law practice in Chicago, asserts he is broke.

Judge Chester R. Shook mounted his bench at 9:30 a. m., but hearing the weekly report of the grand jury delayed selection of the twelve and final juror to try the former "king of bootleggers."

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Dawn Of New Era In Mexico-American Relations
Seen In Court Decision Favoring Foreign FirmsFEDERAL JURY
AT TEXARKANA
BILLS 13 MENCONSPIRACY TO KILL
AND INTIMIDATION OF
WITNESSES CHARGED(By Associated Press)
TEXARKANA, Ark., Nov. 18.—Conspiracy to intimidate government witnesses and to kill two dry agents is charged in indictments returned against 13 Miller county men in federal court here today.

Two former chiefs of police of Texarkana, Ark., are included in the list of accused. All of the men were arrested on November 4 and 5, after extended investigations by federal authorities.

The indictments charge the 13 men conspired to deter and intimidate John O'Quinn and A. E. Lambert, witnesses in federal liquor cases involving several of the defendants and that they devised plans through which hired gunmen were to kill the witnesses. O'Quinn and Lambert had served as undercover men in liquor raids in Miller county recently.

Indianapolis Is
Still In Turmoil

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Indictments charging that four members of the Indianapolis city council solicited and accepted bribes to influence them against taking for impeachment Mayor John L. Duvall last month, were returned today by the Marion county grand jury. Those indicted were Claude E. Negley, Austin H. Todd, Walter R. Dorsett, and Boynton J. Moore.

Two Penney Stores
Damaged By Fire

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Loss estimated at \$150,000 was caused by fire which wrecked a two story building containing the J. C. Penney company store and Mahoney's Cafeteria here early Friday.

J. D. Jones, fireman, was badly bruised and shaken up when a ladder fell throwing him 20 feet to the ground.

The old Alpine hotel above the two stores was vacant at the time of the fire.

Quick work by firemen was all that saved the Elks club on the second floor of the building adjoining the one burned.

BEAUMONT FIRE
BEAUMONT, Nov. 18 (AP)—Christmas goods belonging to a local nation store, which were stored on the top floor of the building occupied by the J. C. Penney store here were destroyed by a fire which started shortly before 10 o'clock this morning.

The loss of the Penney store, located on the first floor, was confined to water damage, and no estimate was made by the manager pending an inspection by insurance adjusters.

From Same Soil
Wheeler has nine children, the youngest being older than his bride. He was married 56 years ago for the first time to a woman who was born on the same farm in Missouri where Miss Glenn was born. His first wife died five years ago.

"I knew of Madge through her folks," he said. "I wanted a young wife whose mind was not spoiled by modern jazz ideas, one who could cook, sew and make a happy home for me."

"I never saw Madge until an hour before our marriage. We were introduced by mail through her cousin last June. She said she could be happy as my wife and I knew she was the type of girl I wanted. She has not spent her time in dance halls and in parked automobiles."

Wheeler was the boyhood chum of her great-grandfather in Missouri before he came to Colorado 40 years ago by ox team. He became wealthy in Colorado farming projects.

HALTS ACTION
ON CRUDE LAWINJUNCTION GRANTED,
RESTRAIN CANCELLING
OF DRILL PERMITS(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Nov. 18.—The dawn of a new era in Mexican-American relations was seen today in many quarters here both Mexican and American in the Mexican supreme court decision favoring a foreign oil company in the first test case under the new petroleum law.

It was believed that the decision in favor of the Mexican Petroleum company, an American concern, established a principle which, if continued in other cases, will ultimately remove one of the principal points of difference which has existed in recent years between the Mexican and United States governments, namely, the alleged retroactive and confiscatory features of the new petroleum law.

Follows: Calles Statement
The supreme court decision follows closely the recent official expressions of President Calles and American Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, of their hope and desire for an amicable adjustment, mutually satisfactory to both governments, of the points at issue between them.

Some observers point out that President Calles from the beginning of the oil law controversy has consistently contended that if the new laws are unjust the Mexican courts will say so and give justice to those who complain.

The decision while considered significant as indicating the policy of the government, does not in fact establish a legal precedent and does not rule upon the general question of the constitutionality of the law as a whole.

Injunction Granted
The present decision grants to the Mexican Petroleum company, one of a number of foreign companies having similar cases pending, an injunction restraining the government from cancelling, under the new law, drilling permits that had previously been issued to that company. The degrees also declared unconstitutional, but only so far as this case and company are concerned, the section of the law which substitutes fifty year confirmatory concessions for the oil land titles acquired before the adoption of the 1917 constitution, and also the section which forfeits titles to oil lands if publication for the confirmatory concession is not made within a year after the law became effective.

Similar rulings in other cases would apparently remove the principal objections foreign interests have expressed to the law.

Cost of the pipe line is estimated at \$40,000,000.

All Or None

Former Texan Is
Bankrupt After
Plunging Series(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—A man, who his associates say "would rather have nothing than just a little," was petitioned into bankruptcy in federal court yesterday after a spectacular career in Wall street, during which he was said to have pyramided \$200 into \$5,000,000.

The petitioner said that Eugene G. Seales, former Texan, widely known for his operations in the cotton market, had access with ten commission houses and listed his liabilities \$59,000 and his assets at nothing. At one period his fortune, said to have been started with \$200 by pawning a diamond ring, was estimated at \$5,000,000.

Seales was a victim of the cotton break in 1914, after which he filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy listing debts at \$228,585 and assets of \$200,500. His friends said that he speculated to win "all or none."

FIVE MEN HELD
WITH CARGO OF
MEXICAN ARMSTWO SHIPS ENROUTE TO
MEXICO HALTED IN
NEW ORLEANS PORT(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 18.—Five men were arrested and 7,500 rounds of ammunition was seized on two ships, bound for Mexico, by customs officials here today.

The largest seizure was on the Honduran steamer Bholoteco where 4,500 rounds of ammunition was found. Of this amount, 1,500 rounds was said to have been in possession of Franklin Woods and the other 3,000 rounds was reported to be held by Joe Martinez, Carlos Gracia, Juan Portilla, and Juan Lopez.

The men were turned over to department of justice agents pending investigation. After the first seizure the agents went aboard the steamer Winico, where they said they found 3,000 rounds. It could not be learned to whom the ammunition belonged and ship officers denied knowledge of its being on the boat. No arrests were made.

Bankers Refuse To
Comment On Robbery

DALLAS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Officials of the Texas Bankers association declined to comment on the holdup of the Grand Avenue State bank here late Thursday in which nearly \$2,000 was taken and no robbers were slain, despite the \$5,000 reward recently offered by the association for each dead robber.

Weldon Miller, bookkeeper in the bank, started to offer resistance to the two robbers, but was driven into the vault by blows from pistols.

Brother Of Local
City Official Dies

A wire was received by city officials this morning from G. W. McCleary telling of the death of his brother, Ernest, at Colorado City. He had been seriously ill for several days and Mr. McCleary had made two visits to his bedside.

Funeral services will likely be held tomorrow.

GAS TANKS ARE
HELD CAUSE OF
BIG EXPLOSIONMANY OTHERS BELIEVED
INJURED ON STEAMER
AT DOCK(By Associated Press)
BALTIMORE, Nov. 18.—A terrific explosion tore the steamer Jacob Luckenbach to pieces today, killing one man, injuring five others, and blowing at least one man overboard.

The explosion occurred on the first deck of the vessel, where workmen were said to have been engaged with an acetylene torch near a fuel tank.

Every ambulance in the city was summoned to the yards of the Union Ship Building company, at Fairfield, on the southern edge of town where the ship had put in for repairs.

35 At Work On Board
Thirty five men were at work on board the vessel, and police had reports of a large number of injured.

Harry Hughes, an employee of the ship building company was the first to reach the wreckage. All of the ship falling in every direction I went to the aid of the injured men, but I don't know how many there were."

Like the explosion in Pittsburgh on Monday last, when more than a score of persons were killed, acetylene gas tanks were believed to have been the cause of today's blast.

The dead man was identified at Toddl Simonsen, of this city, a logger and crane man. All of the injured were thrown from 25 to 30 feet by the blast. The awning deck of the freighter, a piece of steel 18 by 12 feet was hurled to the deck of the steamer Columbus, nearby.

The Luckenbach which was rated at 4,570 tons, was built at Sparrows Point, Md., in 1919.

Scarcely had echoes of the blast died away when frightened, terrified women, whose husbands were at work in the ship building plant, attempted to storm pier and dock, and ally fears as to the safety of loved ones.

Huge Explosion
Rocks Jefferson

COFFEYVILLE, Nov. 18 (AP)—The explosion of eight quarts of nitroglycerin shortly after noon today in the warehouse of the Independent Torpedo company, eleven miles northwest of here, near Jefferson, destroyed the plant and rocked houses and buildings in nearby towns. No one was killed and no one was injured so far as has been learned.

Fire attacked a storage house containing 800 quarts of nitroglycerin and farmers in the vicinity fled from their homes fearing a terrific blast when the fire should reach the storage plant.

Talks On Foods For Children Heard By Patrons

More than a hundred patrons and teachers of the Dupre ward school heard talks on food for school children and infantile paralysis epidemics last evening when they met at the school for a night P. T. A. meeting and social hour.

In telling of food requirements, Miss Margaret Weeks, dean of the Tech home economics school, said that milk is one of the most essential requirements of a growing boy or girl and that each child should have at least a quart of milk daily. She stressed the importance of cereals and cream, cheese, beans and other foods and said that the meat should be eaten by children.

Miss Bessie League, Tech biology teacher, said that infantile paralysis occurs in cycles and that doctors have not agreed upon exact measures to take in curbing the disease.

Mrs. J. T. Shaver, a teacher in the school, sang two songs, accompanied by Miss Margaret Stone at the piano. At the close of the meeting, coffee and cake was served to those attending by Mrs. John Lamond and Mrs. E. George, assisted by Mrs. John Demman and Mrs. N. L. Peters.

SKATING AND OTHER GAMES FEATURE IN WARM CLIMATE

(By Associated Press)

Elwin Carroll, manager of the rink at Houston, announced plans for bringing northern college teams to Houston for the holiday season series, and also indicated favorable consideration of the league composed of Kansas City, Oklahoma and Texas teams.

Although most of those who visited the rinks last year in Texas had never seen a hockey game, and never before attempted to skate on ice, they took to the sport enthusiastically.

Games here this year will be played on a new \$250,000 rink, said to be one of the four largest in the country.

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NAME IS CHANGED AND NUMBER OF TRUSTEES IS INCREASED

(By Associated Press)
WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 18.—Two resolutions affecting Baylor University at Waco, one authorizing a change in name and the other recommending an increase in the board of trustees from 21 to 27 members, were passed Thursday afternoon by the Baptist general convention of Texas in session here this week.

Presented By Thomas
The resolutions were presented by Cullen P. Thomas, vice president after Dr. S. P. Brooks, president of Baylor university had submitted his report showing the condition of the school. The resolution set forth that the name of Baylor university of Waco, Texas, be changed to "Baylor university."

The other resolution recommended that the board of trustees be increased to 27 members instead of 21 as at present with the provision that seven of these be selected from Dallas county and seven shall be residents of Tarrant county.

Has 2,165 Students
There are now 2,165 Baylor university students and out of this number 1,467 are in Waco and 698 are in professional schools in Dallas. Dr. Brooks pointed out in the report he submitted on Baylor that the report was adopted without dissenting vote.

Other Baptist schools on which reports were submitted and accepted by the convention were Simmons university, Howard Payne college, Burleson college at Greenville, College of Marshall, Decatur college, Rusk college, Wayland college at Plainview and the San Marcos academy of San Marcos. An outstanding feature of these reports was that all the schools showed progress in eliminating their indebtedness.

TECH STUDENTS TURN ATTENTION TO BIG DEBATE

The Cambridge team is on a tour of the United States in which they will meet some 30 or more college debate teams. They have had excellent success in their past contests, press reports say.

The Tech will be represented by Alton Hutson and Clarence Whitehead of Lubbock and Hal Lary, of Clovis, New Mexico, Wilbur Edelman, of Plainview, is alternate. The English team consists of H. M. Foot, A. B. King-Hamilton and H. L. Elwin. All students are advised to be in their work.

The outstanding feature of the evening will be the deciding of the winning team which will be made by the English method, that of letting the audience vote on the winners.

REFUGEES FROM SHANTUNG SEEK AID IN FAMINE

PEKING, Nov. 18.—Refugees from the famine in the Shantung province are flocking into Tsinan and it is estimated that twenty thousand persons are begging in the streets. They are without shelter and scantily clad despite the wintry weather.

The Chinese international famine relief commission is without funds at present but is hopeful of obtaining a small grant from the government. The resources of all the Chinese agencies, however, are not sufficient to mitigate the suffering appreciably and the war lords are too absorbed in their conflict to help greatly.

Hundreds of thousands in the province of Honan are likely to share in the suffering this winter not because of any national calamity but because of the constant sweep of armies across the province ravaging the farmers' stores.

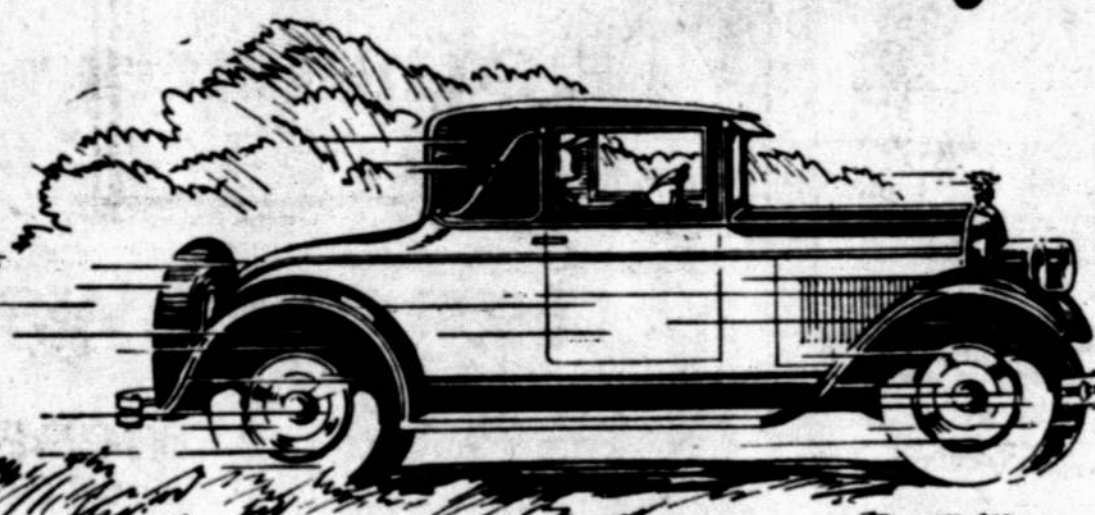

GORDON GIVES UP HIS PLACE IN JURY PROBE

HE SAYS INCONSISTENT TO PROCEED, IN HIS RESIGNATION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—District Attorney Gordon resigned today from the special committee of three appointed by Justice S. D. S. to determine whether there had been a criminal attempt of court in the Fall-Sinclair oil trial jury scandal.

In a letter to Justice S. D. S., Mr. Gordon said he and the special committee could not proceed with the affidavits upon which a criminal trial in the case was ordered and added:

Convinced of Wrong
"I was then, and am now, as were also the special government counsel, convinced that there was a criminal attempt of the court to have been committed, and I and those with whom I was associated were ready and willing to prosecute such persons against whom the court might see fit to issue a writ to show cause, or a citation, why they should not be adjudged in contempt of court; and the affidavits thus presented to and filed in court were the basis and cause of the action of the court on November 2, 1927, in withdrawing a juror and discharging the jury from further consideration of the case and declaring a mistrial."

Since then, "in my official capacity," Gordon added, "I have presented to the grand jury evidence on every phase of the situation, and have quite positive views as to who should be prosecuted and the course I should pursue in that capacity."

STORM DAMAGE

(Continued from Page 1)

War department immediately volunteered the service of all its army forces in the vicinity of Washington, the Red Cross dispatched its relief workers to the scene and the local authorities mobilized police and firemen for service in the stricken area.

School houses were thrown open for the night to residents whose homes had been made uninhabitable and the Red Cross and the army supplied out and blankets. A supply of tarpaulins for the protection of the interior of the unroofed homes was made available by the fire department.

Only the eastern half of the city felt the effects of the tornado and the western half, at the height of the storm, pursued its usual routine, unaware of the havoc being wrought on the other side of the capital.

25 Seriously Hurt
In Alexandria, the Red Cross reported that 25 persons were in a serious condition at hospitals and that 75 had been treated for injuries in their homes. Seventy-five buildings and dwelling houses were damaged and property loss was estimated at \$500,000.

Half a million dollars damage was done at the Anacostia naval air station, while by a freak of the elements, the property of the army flying unit just across Bolling field went unscathed. Eight navy seaplanes were wrecked, a hangar unroofed and barrack buildings shaken. Damage at Washington navy yard was estimated at \$100,000.

Many Houses Unroofed
More than a hundred roofs were ripped from Washington buildings. These included a portable school house, but its pupils escaped unhurt.

The weather bureau declared the storm the worst that Washington has experienced within the fifty years covered by its records. The tornado, it said, had its origin in a water spout down the Potomac, adding that there is very little difference fundamentally between the two phenomena beyond the fact that one originates over water and the other over land.

LONG SERMONS BAD PRACTICE BISHOP AVERS

LENGTHY DISCUSSIONS ARE HELD INJURIOUS TO CHURCH MORALE

(By Associated Press)
PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 18.—The period of the long sermon is past. Long sermons mean empty pews. That was the declaration of Bishop Sam R. Hay at the Methodist conference here Friday while conducting a ceremony that received seven new preachers in the organization.

"Some preachers are deficient in terminal facilities," Bishop Hay told the newly ordained ministers. "They don't know when to cut off their sermons. A long sermon usually is an unprepared sermon."

RADIUM WILL BE USED HERE FOR UNUSUAL CASES

Placing Lubbock in the class with the leading clinical centers of the South, radium will be available for treatment of unusual cases at the Lubbock sanitarium in the future, according to information gained from officials of the institution this morning.

The radium will be in Lubbock and ready for use in about ten days, the first to be in this section of the state, it was learned. Dr. J. T. Krueger, of the sanitarium, recently returned from New York city, where he made a study of the methods of radium treatment and made arrangements for the establishment of the treatment for South Plains patients. The substance is used in the treatment of certain kinds of cancer and tumors and for skin disease in cases without having to resort to surgery.

As a workable amount of the radium is very expensive, officials of the institution feel that they are fortunate in obtaining the service for the South Plains people.

In receiving Major Gordon's resignation Justice S. D. S. expressed regret "because a member of the bar of the court of many years standing, who believes that a contempt of that court, of a grave character, has been committed, yet nevertheless seeks to be relieved or excused when called upon by that court to assist it in ascertaining the truth as to whether or not a contempt is said to have been committed and if so to aid in the administration of justice, by vindicating and maintaining its authority, if that authority has been defied."

TAOS N. M., Nov. 18.—Jose Cruz Maestas, 13, sheep herder, charged with slaying Russell P. Deweiss, of Dallas, with the intention of attacking his bride of two months, was found guilty of second degree murder by a jury here and sentenced to from ninety to ninety-nine years in the penitentiary.

District Judge H. A. Kiker dismissed the jury without thanks after the verdict was returned late yesterday and told Maestas he believed he deliberately killed Deweiss and should be hanged. The judge said he hoped no governor would pardon Maestas.

Deweiss was a professor at the Terrill school for boys at Dallas. He was the son of the old Lincoln Motor company. Acceptance of the subpoena, it was said, will assure Mr. Ford's appearance as a witness in the case which is expected to come to trial in January in the Oakland county circuit court at Pontiac, Mich.
