Cotton referendum Friday

Mitchell County cotton producers will be voting Friday on a referendum which, if approved, will authorize a maximum \$1 assessment on each bale of cotton ginned to fund a county-wide insect pest survey made each year.

Nine members of a board to be called a Commodity Producers Board which will decide the assessment each year before ginning season will be elected at the same time.

The insect pest survey program was started in 1974 with just a few farmers contributing to the \$12,000 annual cost, according to Alton Raschke, president of the Mitchell County Producers Board, who notes that if approved, the referendum would divide the cost of the scouting program among all the cotton producers in the county, not just a few.

Raschke explains that the \$1 per bale figure is the maximum amount that could be charged and that during normal years, the amount would be less.

"The more bales made per year, the less the assessment will be," he explained.

The per-bale assessment would be collected at each gin to finance the programs of research, disease and insect control, education and program.

Many producers credit the uniform planting date with saving them time and money.

"There's nothing we can do that make us as much money and cost nothing as the uniform planting date," said Linden Solomon.

"I have planted as many as four times in years past," he explained. "Since we have started the uniform planting date, I have never had to plant the whole thing over."

Producer and ginner Ross Hargrove agrees, adding that "farmers should learn that if they don't work together, they're sure going to lose out."

Banker Bobby Lemons who is also a producer praises the

uniform planting date.

"We work with farm people and I think the uniform planting date has helped out quite a bit in budgeting," said Lemons.

"In the past several years by setting the uniform planting date and planting one time, we save a trip or two over that field," said Lemons.

Lemons explained that if there is excess from the assessment in any one year, that amount will be taken into consideration when setting the rate for the following year.

The referendum calls for all Mitchell County cotton ginned to be assessed.

Money from the assessment will be used in programs solely

in Mitchell County designed with the objective of increasing cotton production in the county in the most profitable manner possible.

Voting will take place in the Mitchell County Extension office from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Voters will need to show or know their 1983 base acreage and PIK acreage in order to vote.

Wolves, Bulldogs season openers slated

CHS ties scrimmage with Snyder

"It was too confusing," said Colorado High School head football coach Tom Ramsey on the Wolves scrimmage at Snyder last Friday—their final preparation for tomorrow night's season opener against Slaton here at Wolf Stadium.

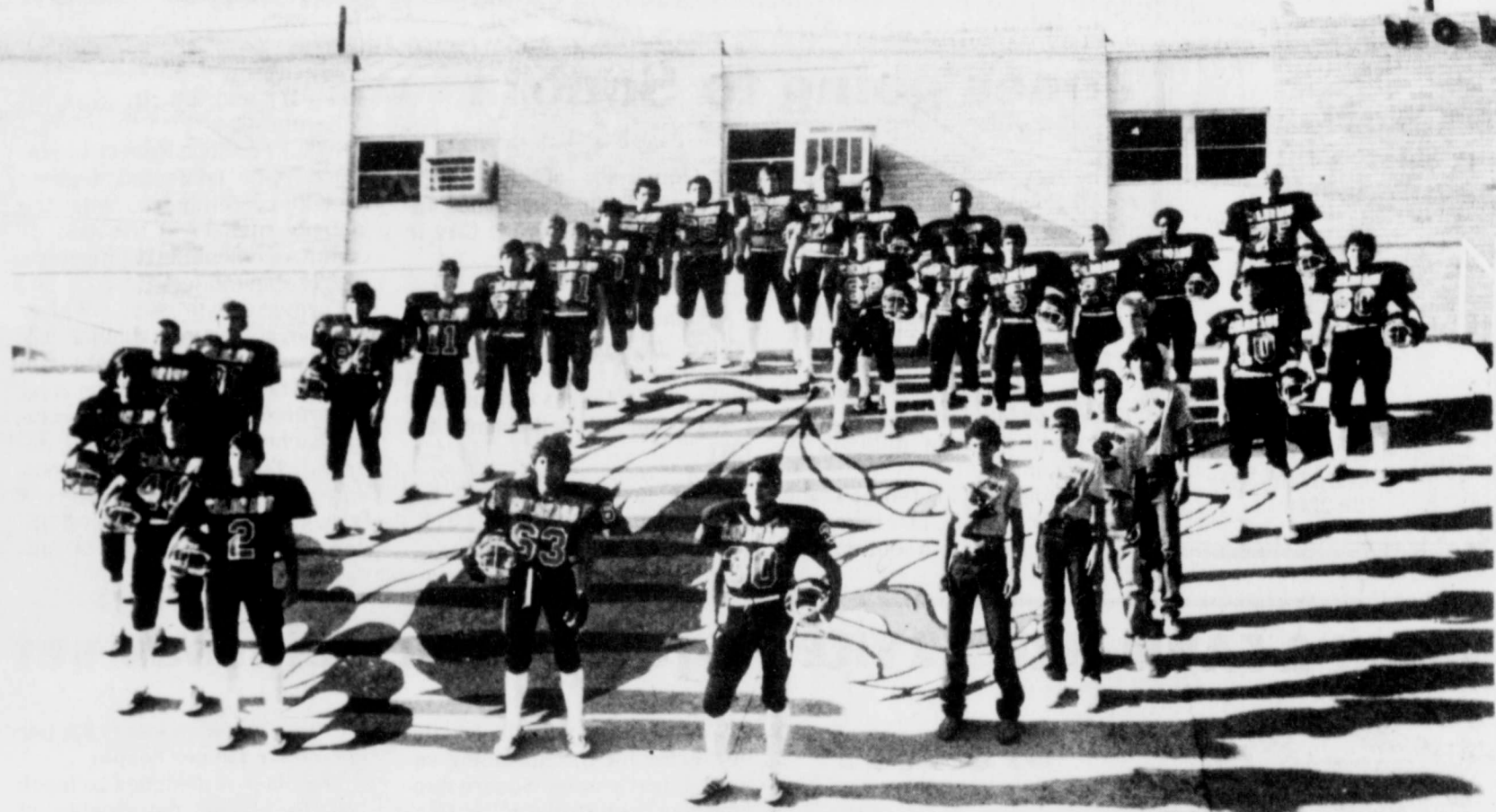
On paper the Wolves tied the AAAA Tigers 2-2, but Snyder's method of conducting scrimmages made it hard for the average fan in the stands to establish a clear cut edge for either team.

"It's set up so that you get three plays at every ten yards," said Ramsey. "It gives the offense and defense a chance to perform at all parts of the field. Eventually you will be at the goal line."

Colorado City and Snyder used to compete in the same district and judging by the way the two teams got after each other, the spark still burns in the neighborhood rivalry—more so evident by a scrimmage ending brawl.

"It was a pretty even scrimmage," said Ramsey. "I felt like we held our own and came away with something. They hit us as hard as we hit them. Tempers flared and we had to start pulling kids apart. The third

The Pack is back!

Mertzon to test Loraine Bulldogs

The Mertzon Eagles will be Loraine's first test when the Bulldogs kick off the 1984 football season at Irion County tomorrow night.

Loraine head football coach Sandy McSpadden expects an "experienced ball club," from Irion County and was "disappointed" in his club's play during last Friday's scrimmage against Big Spring's junior varsity.

"I felt we forgot a lot of our blocking," said McSpadden. "We didn't pick up their movements very effectively."

Like in their prior scrimmage, Loraine spotted Big Spring three touchdowns before erupting for two of its



own.

Fifty-five yard scoring runs by running backs Aundra Rose and Billy Mayes highlighted the scrimmage that was otherwise spoiled by 11 fumbles.

"Our primary concern is execution on offense," said McSpadden. "We had one real good sustained drive. We got some 250 yards total

time I thought we got what we could out of it so we decided to stop it. We went to play football not fight."

On offense the Wolves didn't bother to try too much yet promptly scored on a 30 yard pass from Chitsey to Billy Jackson then added a four yard scoring run from Kevin Norman.

"We needed to work on our weaknesses," said Ramsey. "We wanted to work our running game. We worked on traps and other things we were having trouble with. We didn't run much of our option plays because we needed to work on our inside game and throwing to running backs."

"Yes, I felt we held our own on defense too. I didn't feel Snyder moved the ball that much. We had a lot of people around the ball. I think we hit as hard as we ever have. It wasn't a place for the meek."

With Snyder behind them, the Wolves now begin a much expected from season-starting with tomorrow's tilt against the Slaton Tigers.

Reading other area sports publications, Colorado City is

already in the playoffs, loaded with tremendous talent and "poised on the verge of greatness" according to one source.

"That's what you have to be careful of but you don't make the playoffs in September," said Ramsey.

"You work hard to have a good program. Every team enjoys being picked. It doesn't mean a lot and doesn't change anything as far as our plans and preparations. It can have an adverse affect. I don't think we will be overconfident. When you're picked, people are shooting for you."

"The only thing we're worried about is Slaton. Playoffs are like Christmas—a long way off. All spring and summer we have worked toward September 7."

"Slaton beat Tahoka in a scrimmage. They have a few starters back and compete in a tough district. They like to play Colorado City. They put a lot into the game. If they win they feel they will have a good season. If they lose, it takes a lot out of them."

Last year the Pack ended a seven year drought by defeating the Tigers 14-6.

Colorado City manhandled the

Tigers both offensively and defensively but, stalled drives and uncashed opportunities kept the score close.

In the Harris rating system, the number 30 ranked Wolves are eight point favorites over the 119 ranked Tigers.

Was Colorado City's rare victory over Slaton last year a fluke? Obviously so, because "Coach Cook (Slaton head coach) said we couldn't beat them two years in a row," said Ramsey.

Starting for the Wolves in the 8 p.m. game will be quarterback and linebacker Doug Chitsey, running back Sam Rivera, running back and free safety Billy Jackson, center and defensive end Johnny Rivera, right guard and defensive end Freddie Pineda, right tackle and defensive tackle Wylie Stice, left guard Steve Rosas, left tackle David Britton, split end Perry Conner, tight end and linebacker Don Randle, flanker and strong safety Armando Rivera.

Helping on defense will be defensive tackle Kevin Norman, linebacker Jay Pildan and cornerbacks Garv Marsh and Joey Ritchey.

Medicare bill introduced

Millions of elderly Americans live in dread of prolonged illness.

All too often, they recover from the illness only to be ruined financially by the medical bills. Even people of means, who have worked and saved for a lifetime, are vulnerable to this kind of disaster.

Medicare and Medicaid provide some important protection, but gaps in the system can lead to ruin.

People age 65 and older make up 12 percent of our total population, yet account for 33 percent of all personal health care expenses.

They can expect to pay almost \$3,100 a year on health care, compared to \$825 a year for people younger than 65.

Medicare now picks up about 45 percent, or \$1,422, of annual medical bills for each elderly recipient. But the amount elderly patients must pay can soar the longer they stay in the hospital.

I have introduced in the Senate a piece of legislation that would ease the financial burden on older Americans who are hospitalized for long periods of time.

Currently, Medicare requires patients to pay a \$356 deductible charge for each period of hospitalization, then it covers all

reasonable hospital charges for up to 60 days. After that time patients must pay an increasing share of the costs. The longer the hospital stay, the bigger the patient's share.

For doctors' fees, Medicare requires a \$75 deductible, then pays 80 percent of reasonable physician charges.

Under my bill, Medicare would pay hospital costs for an unlimited period of time. The bill would also reduce the number of times the deductible must be paid to no more than twice a year. In 1984, this would limit the financial burden for extended hospital care to less than \$1,000 for elderly patients.

In addition, my legislation would allow patients to purchase coverage for 100 percent of reasonable doctors' fees.

The increased hospitalization benefits would be financed by an additional premium, estimated at \$3.75 a month. The increased physician benefits, which would be optional, would cost an additional premium of some \$16 a month.

My proposal to provide catastrophic coverage for older Americans is self-financing. It will in no way threaten the solvency of the Medicare trust funds.

To the Editor and To the Board of Directors of Mitchell County Hospital District.

There are a few questions that the citizens of Mitchell County are entitled to the answers to, in my opinion, on the recent decertification by Medicare.

1. Is there any valid reason the entire Medicare report on the deficiencies in the Hospital has not been made public by the Board?

2. The report states the Medical Records Department as being deficient. The report states, "There are approximately 500 charts in various stages of incompleteness over 15 days old. Medical Records Department knowledgeable that some are in excess of 60 days." Does this mean that Dr. Noonan is the only one who failed to sign reports and has had approximately 500 patients in the 60 some odd days covered? Also, how much in excess of 60 days are these charts?

3. Since Dr. Noonan was said to be the cause of decertification, is he also responsible for the deficiencies in the Medical Staff, Nursing Department, Dietary Department, Radiology Department, Complementary Department, and Laboratories?

In the past two weeks, my wife was in the hospital here very seriously ill. Drs. Thomas, Noonan, and Lindsey conferred with me about transferring her to Lubbock where she has been seeing a Pulmonary Specialist. I told them they were giving her the same medicines and treatments that she had gotten from the Pulmonary Specialist in Lubbock, therefore I saw no need

to send her to Lubbock for the same treatment. Anyone that questions their qualifications and professionalism is either uninformed or doing it maliciously.

I resent greatly that four of the Board Members have decided that they are qualified to tell me who we can use as our doctors. I thought the Board was elected to represent the people of Mitchell County and not cause dissension among the personnel of the hospital and the citizens of Mitchell County, apparently I was wrong on that thought.

Fact No. 3 - Your gin office will be forced to serve as a collection agent for the pest management committee (mandated by law) if this proposal passes.

Be sure your cotton production is correct so your vote will be counted; if in doubt check with the ASCS office before you

vote.

To the editor:

It is my understanding that recent controversy has occurred involving the Board of Directors, the former administrator and certain doctors of Root Memorial Hospital. By way of this letter, I wish to convey to you my opinion of the medical staff, particularly Dr. Lindsey, as a result of emergency treatment which was administered to our son on July 21st of this year. A severed tendon on his foot necessitated our seeking emergency treatment late in the evening. In my presence, Dr. Lindsey promptly cleaned the wound, examined it carefully and determined that further treatment was necessary. His method and mannerism was most professional and his concern legitimately sincere. His recommended treatment involved surgical procedures which he felt inadequate to perform, so the decision was made to take our son to Midland, our home, and allow our family doctor to direct the care necessary to assure proper recovery. Dr. Lindsey was most helpful in reviewing the situation by phone with our doctor in Midland and in assisting in preparing his foot for transfer to Midland.

Dr. Lindsey's professional, yet sensitive, handling of the situation, and most of all his honest appraisal of his own abilities and his relating of his opinion to us, has gained our utmost respect for him as a doctor and for your hospital.

However, I only wish to address the situation regarding your administration difficulties in light of the potential disaster which awaits a community where politics has so overtaken the direction of a hospital and those on the Board who are ultimately responsible for the quality of care administered by the staff of the hospital. It is easy to pass the buck and blame others when things are not as they should be. It must be remembered that the final responsibility rests with the Board of Directors. When those directors lose their sense of responsibility and allow the "Squeaking Wheel" or "Special Interests" to demand attention which necessarily should be channeled toward the administering the affairs of the hospital, including the support and protection of each staff member, then only disaster awaits. As I see it, Colorado City needs a hospital; one that is certified to care for the elderly by handling of Medicare benefits and other essential government programs; one that encourages competent staffing; one that controls the quality of care administered during emergencies as well as routine illnesses; and one that exists first for the community and not for the political interest or benefits of such.

I commend your Dr. Lindsey. However, I reserve commendation of the Directors only when they hold in highest regard the public interest pertinent to providing quality health care.

Substance abuse seminar set

John Goldston, Ph.D., psychologist, in private practice in Houston will be the consultant for the day-long seminar. 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Valuable coupon books are often deceptive

Coupon books are sold in many Texas communities. Buyers are told that the coupons contained in the booklet are worth a couple of hundred dollars in discounts and merchandise. The coupon booklet itself usually costs about \$20.

Many consumers complain that some merchants fail to honor the coupons. Many are misled into thinking that they are getting something free, when in most cases they have to buy something to use the coupons.

In some instances, the promoters fail to disclose the limitations and conditions on the use of coupons. In other instances, promoters exaggerate the value of the coupons.

For example, consumers weren't informed that some of the coupons, like the ones for theaters and restaurants, were good only during off-peak hours or on certain days of the week, usually not weekends or holidays.

In some cases, deceptive promotional tactics were used to sell the coupon books. Telephone solicitors for one outfit convinced the consumers to buy the book by telling them that the proceeds would go to charity. They may say it will go to help build a playing field for local youngsters. As it turns out, only a dollar of the \$20-dollar purchase price will benefit the local charity; the rest of the money

will be profit for the coupon book promoter.

Here are some ways to avoid these problems:

Read any advertisements for coupon books carefully before making the purchase. There may be limitations or conditions which may influence your decision to purchase.

Know exactly what your obligations are. In most cases, the coupon calls for a purchase of merchandise or service as a condition for getting the free merchandise or service.

Pay particular attention to the expiration date of the coupons. If they can only be used for a short period of time, they may be of limited value.

Check with a few of the merchants who are listed as participants to see that they have actually agreed to provide the promised merchandise or service.

Be wary of coupon books which are marketed through the use of a "contest." Typically, all participants end up winning, and the "contest" is only a way of promoting the sale of the coupons.

Have a problem? Here's who to write

As a United States senator, my job is to represent my fellow Texans on the national level. In serving your interests, it is very important that you communicate your concerns to me, and letters are among the best means to do this.

Despite the sometimes large amount of correspondence I receive, special attention is paid to each letter that reaches my office. I welcome both expressions of opinion, and requests to help in areas which I am able to provide assistance.

Requests for assistance range from retired persons whose Social Security checks have been delayed to military service members who need hardship discharges to cities applying to government agencies for grants. I cannot force a federal agency to decide in someone's favor, but I can make sure the matter receives careful and full consideration.

All of these areas, as well as other federal matters fall within my Senate responsibilities. However, my jurisdiction does not extend to state or local matters. Nor am I able to give personal, legal or financial advice.

I receive about 1,000 letters a day from Texas. I believe each one requires a response. I try to see that all letters I receive are answered within a day or two after they come to my office. It is, of course, too big a job for me to do myself so I must depend upon the assistance of my staff. However, much of my time is spent personally answering letters from constituents who have the most urgent problems.

There are some things you can do to make it easier for me and my staff to answer your letter. If possible, all letters should be typed or printed neatly in ink. If your letter is not legible, we cannot help you. In addition, please include your name and return address on both the envelope and the letter. Often telegrams and mailgrams do not include a complete return address, and that makes a response difficult.

When discussing pending legislation, please describe the bill and the number, if you know it. If you are writing about a problem you are having with the federal government, please be sure to give complete background on your situation and the steps you have taken before writing me. Additionally, a letter you have composed expressing your views on a subject has more impact than a mass-produced postcard.
