

SHRIMP SEASON OPENS WITH GOOD HAULS

Aransas County Gives Atkinson 2 to 1 Vote Over Harvey Shell

Run-Off Primary
Draws Less Than
200 Voters

Beeville Man to Be New
State Representative
From This District

Less than two hundred voters went to the polls in Aransas County last Saturday to vote in the second Democratic primary, in which the nominations for three officers were decided. Only race of local interest was that between H. L. Atkinson and Harvey Shell for state representative.

Voters in this county gave Atkinson a two to one vote over Shell, who was seeking re-election to the post he has held since 1937. Aransas county vote was 135 for Atkinson and 63 for Shell. Atkinson's total in the three county district, Aransas, Refugio and San Patricio was 1,620, and Shell's total was 1,080.

Aransas county gave Sellers 114 votes for attorney general and his opponent, Martin, 85 votes. Richard Critz received 105 votes to Simpson's 84 votes for Associate Justice the Supreme Court.

Rockport Schools
Open Tuesday
For Registration

Students Will Get Down
To Studies and First
Classes Wednesday

Rockport schools will get under way Tuesday at 9 a. m., with the Rev. R. R. Gormley giving the invocation. The student body will sing "America," and Father Kelly will give a talk to the students. Harris Pollard, president of the student body, will lead in giving the pledge of allegiance to the flag. Rev. E. J. Meyers will give the benediction.

After the short program, pupils in elementary grades will report to home rooms to receive instructions and to receive their books and assignments. The high school students will register, and will receive the books for the first classes on Wednesday morning.

The school will start with one vacancy, that of homemaking, since Mrs. Eva Dean Groffin resigned after failing to find a place for room and board. Mrs. Otis Henderson resigned to teach near Waco, and in her place will be Mrs. Fred James, daughter-in-law of the dean of students.

The students will leave before noon on Tuesday to report on Wednesday morning for first classes. Tuesday afternoon the teachers will arrange schedules, and enter students' names on the registers.

"Several" of the teachers have made and are making progress toward a better teaching attitude by going to school and taking correspondence courses," Supt. Wheeler said. "Two teachers, Mrs. Charlyne Hunt and Mrs. Ruth Hayden, received their degrees in elementary education and educational work respectfully, this summer."

"Other teachers who went to school are Mrs. Ruby Mae Mixon and Mrs. Gustava Cavitt to a J. pine. Teachers who started correspondence courses last spring and summer are Mrs. Gordon Gunter, who finished her course at the University of Texas; Mrs. Ruby Harp from A and I College, and Mrs. John Haynes from A and I College. Mrs. Bertha Harper completed a geography course from A and I College in the late spring. Teachers were urged to go to school to learn new methods of teaching, etc., last spring when raises were assured them."

FUNERAL SERVICES SATURDAY
FOR DELO H. CASPARY, SR.

Sudden Death of Popular
Business Man Comes
As Shock to Community

Funeral services for Delo H. Caspary, Sr., have been set for 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon here at the family home, with interment in the Rockport Cemetery.

The Rev. Rodney Sunday, former Presbyterian minister here will conduct the services. Cages in charge of arrangements.

The entire community here was shocked Tuesday afternoon when news of Caspary's sudden death in Sinton was received. It was almost impossible for his many friends here to believe—since he had been about town as usual earlier in the day.

After coming down to his service station, going to the post office for mail, and to Johnson's for coffee, he and Mrs. Caspary left shortly before noon to go to a Sinton physician, where he was to undergo a minor operation.

Shortly after he arrived at the doctor's office he was stricken with a heart attack and died at 12:20.

"Cass," as he was familiarly known to his friends, had been a manager on Matagorda Island for the Liberty Oil Company. He gave up that position to come to Rockport as consignee for the Gulf oil Company, and became the operator of service stations here and in Aransas Pass. He also supplied many of the fishing and shrimp boats out of Fulton, Rockport and Aransas Pass.

He is survived by his wife, the former Trudie Wright; one son, Delo H. Caspary Jr., stationed at Traux Field, Wis.; his mother, Mrs. Lillian Cooper of San Francisco, Calif., one sister, Miss Dollie Caspary of San Francisco; one brother, George Cooper, Washington, D. C.

His son arrived Thursday at noon and his mother and brother are on their way here and are expected Friday.

Caspary, who was 50 years old, was born in John Day, Oregon, and was reared in the state of Washington. He became a flier before World War I and was one of the first to volunteer when the Army Air Corps was organized. He became an instructor and was assigned to training fields during the last war and was a lieutenant when the war closed.

W. W. Clarke Buried
In West Columbia

County Commissioner William W. Clarke, 58, was buried in the West Columbia Cemetery Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with one of the largest attendances at a funeral in Brazoria county in recent years, attesting the high esteem in which he was held.

Interment was under the auspices of the I.O.O.F. Lodge, No. 4, of West Columbia, following the funeral services at the Methodist church conducted by Rev. F. N. Pack, Baptist Minister; Rev. J. R. Gibbs, Methodist minister of West Columbia and Rev. Yeagen, Presbyterian minister of East Columbia with the West Columbia Funeral home directing.

Born May 11, 1886, and died August 18, 1944, Mr. Clarke was 58 years, 3 months and 7 days old.

Rev. Pack conducted church services, with Rev. Gibbs leading the prayer and Rev. Yeagen reading the Scriptures. Music was furnished by the combined musical talent of West Columbia.

The funeral was attended by people throughout Brazoria county—from Freeport, Brazoria, Sweeny, Damon, Angleton, Alvin, Danbury and other points. The entire personnel of the court house was in attendance to pay their respects to the last rites of Commissioner Clarke, who was one of the most popular officers Brazoria county ever had.

The survivors are his wife, Mrs. W. W. Clarke, of West Columbia; one sister, Miss Katie Lee Clarke, of Rockport, Texas.

Active pallbearers were Wood Guinn, M. M. Galloway, Roy Wright, Phil Gupion, all of West Columbia; L. E. Nordt and Kyle Hall, of Damon.

The honorary pallbearers were the entire personnel of the Brazoria County Court House.

Mr. Clarke was born in Corpus Christi on May 11, 1886, moving to Rockport in 1891 and to West Columbia in 1913. He followed the duties of marine engineer and licensed pilot for a number of years and operated along the Gulf Coast out of various towns.

At West Columbia he was a valuable employee of the Humble Oil Company and from 1931 to 1941 he was engaged in the grocery and filling station business.

He was elected County Commissioner in May, 1942, and held that office at the time of his death, having been re-elected without opposition in the May primaries of this year.

He was married to Miss Eula Wrenn of West Columbia, October 13, 1914. No children were born to this union.

Commissioner Clarke was a man of many fine qualities—sincere, conscientious and most faithful to duty in any performance, and he will be missed in precinct and Brazoria County.

Rockport Soldier One of Glider Troops
Who Held Two Nazi Divisions At Bay

HEADQUARTERS, Second Airborne Division, Normandy.—While American, English and Canadian soldiers were wading to the beaches of France on D-Day, glider troops of the 82nd Airborne Infantry Division who had landed hours before, were holding off two full German divisions which were trying to break through to stop the landings.

One of these soldiers was Pfc. Jesus Solis, whose family resides in Rockport.

To stop the rush of German reserves, the glider troops captured the town of Ste. Mere Eglise and fought for and held four bridges over the Merderet River at La Fiere and at Chef du Pont de la Douve River at Pont l'Abbe and at Bezeville la Bastille.

In successfully completing their assignment, the plan for the invasion of the Continent, the members of the division, many of them veterans of landings in Sicily and Italy, then fought some of the greatest battles in the history of Bronze Stars for individual acts of bravery.

The unit fought for 33 days without relief or replacements; they accomplished every mission assigned to them and no ground they

Shrimpers Expect
Good Catches As
Weather Settles

First Day's Catch of All
Boats May Reach Total
Of 50,000 Pounds

Rockport and Fulton shrimp boats went to work early this morning about fifty strong, and it was estimated by dealers that the average catch per boat for the first day probably would be about one thousand pounds. This would mean that the gross income of the fleet would be from two to three thousand dollars for the first day.

Dealers and shrimpers alike are looking for good shrimping in Aransas Bay during the next few weeks. Catches will likely be larger within the next few days as the weather settles down. It was believed by some that the squall Wednesday scattered the shrimp in the bay.

Most of the dealers reported that the outlook was favorable for a good season.

The last shrimp season was bad, due to weather conditions. Some boats returned early today because of mechanical trouble. One boat that came in early at Fulton brought in 888 pounds.

Taking to the bay early this morning (Thursday) were fifteen boats from Jackson Seaford, twenty from Johnson Fish Company, three from Rouquette & Wendell; ten from Cecil Casterline's, and seven from William Johnson's.
