Flower Show Tuesday

Inviting ladies of this area to participate, members of the Country Garden club are to hold their annual flower show at the home economics cottage in Abernathy Tuesday, August 26.

Judges for the event are to be Arch Keys, Plainview florist, Mrs. A. L. Faubion of Monroe and Mrs. H. Schulz of this city.

Rules for the show:

1. The individual rates were: 1. General revenue at the maximum of 35 cents, estimated to bring in \$8,844,000 and leave the deficit at \$352,511.50

2. Schools, at 17 cents (the maximum of 35 cents) which will bring in \$1,428,000 and leave the deficit at \$335,511.50

3. Late last week, from other taxes plus bond, farmers saved at the end of the year \$1,000,000. The deficit to pay on is growing rapidly, at the rate of \$22,000,000 a year.

home B. Martin, County Agent.) after the excessive rains of this season and early summer cotton leaf worms have been causing quite a trouble in Hale County. Unless attention is given to the cotton leaf worm it is that serious damage will be to the cotton crop.

POISON POWER

Lead arsenate. When applied as a spray 3 pounds calcium arsenate is used with 50 gallons of water or 2 pounds of lead arsenate is used with 50 gallons of water. White arsenic is not recommended since there is extreme danger of burning the cotton plant seriously with the white arsenic. The cotton oil mill in Plainview has ordered a liberal quantity of lead arsenate which should be available to farmers within the next few days.

All farmers who discover cotton leaf worms are urged to report the infestation to the county agent in order that proper steps may be taken to control the pest.

Contract was awarded Tuesday morning for the construction of a building to house Abernathy school district's eight buses. The frame and stucco structure is to be 30 feet wide and 90 feet long and will have a place for washing and lubricating the machines. It is to be located on the campus southwest of the home economics cottage. The buses have been sheltered in the wool warehouse building by Crow's laundry the past year.

Completing the faculty list, Miss Dot Henderson of Shallowater Friday night was elected to teach in the grade school here. She received her B. A. degree from Texas Technological college this year.

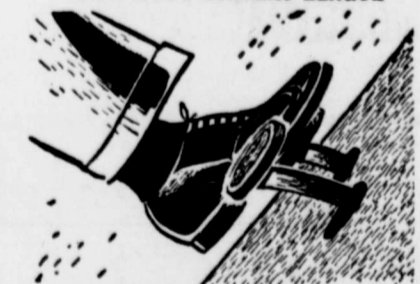

OPERATING THE CLUTCH

Learning to operate the clutch without jerking or jumping the car is not easy. But remember, only skilled drivers are smooth drivers. They understand the clutch and use it correctly.

Try this procedure in your driveway or on an untraveled street: Drive the car at crawl speed. In low gear and with the engine turning over slowly, you can control the speed of the moving car with your left foot on the clutch pedal. Find the spot in clutch movement where the car crawls at one mile an hour. Clutch movement at this stage will be very slight. The important thing is learning to locate the spot where the clutch goes out. This point controls movement of the car. Practice the maneuver described above. was advised that by the end of the next fiscal year Aug. 31, 1942, the deficit in the state's general revenue fund would reach \$44,352,000.

The board was powerless to do anything about this deficit since the rate for general revenue fund purposes is already at the constitutional maximum of 35 cents on the \$100 valuation. The cut was entirely in the school fund rate, from 27 to 17 cents on the \$100.

The individual rates were:
1. General revenue at the maximum of 35 cents, estimated to bring in \$8,844,000 and leave the deficit at \$44,352,511.50

2. Schools, at 17 cents (the maximum is 35 cents) which will bring in \$4,987,000 to which will be added \$30,441,000 from other taxes plus \$1,269,000 balance at the end of the year. This will be sufficient to pay a per capita apportionment of \$22.50 for each child of school age, plus \$2,000,000 for textbooks during the next fiscal year.

3. Confederate pensions at the constitutional maximum of 7 cents, to bring in approximately \$2,225,000. The confederate pension fund is now operating on a deficit of about \$600,000, but due to the constantly declining number of pensioners, this fund is expected to be "in the black" by the end of the next fiscal year.

No official estimate was made of the 1942-43 fiscal year deficit, but unofficial estimates were that it would be about \$52,000,000. The school rate has varied over the past few years due to the fact that every time the legislature writes a tax law, the school fund benefits under that provision of the constitution making it mandatory that 25 per cent of all gross receipts taxes go to the school fund. Thus the fund gets a quarter of the gasoline tax, the tax on oil, and a number of others, some of which the
